I've got Indian American friends and Pakistani American friends. Sometimes I can't tell the dif ference when I meet someone from either of these countries, but I know there is bad blood between their governments. It can get confusing. Besides, I'm pretty sure they'd prefer to simply be called merican. Here's how I see it and how my children will view it: I'm here now as are you. We're a ton of cultures from all over the world mixed together and each one of us should be treated as equals.

Despite the politics of water and lakes, what's done is done. The land I know better than any other is changed forever. Last winter, the logging trucks came and

Late last winter, my brother William (we call him Bubba) and I decided to document the creek before it's too late. Our reasoning? We figured that it's important to share our memories of the place with our kids and whoever else was interested.

Perhaps our most ambitious part of the project is a five day - 50 mile canoe trip from the upper float-

creek (which is about midway) towards the Red Rive Our journey was slow and peaceful and a great way to experience the massive tributary. Paddle after paddle the creek's character revealed itsplff, We'd passs hroead ripple rapids when the creek's bottom became hard and
shallow. Other times, the creek became too deep for us shallow. Other times, the creek bec

In a canoe, wildlife is less cautious. Multiple times we'd cres deer and they'd simple stare curiously as we slipped past. For three days, songbirds, ducks, otters, feral
pigs, coyotes, and other woodland creatures were just a few, magnanimous feet away from our Old Towne pigs, co
canoe.
On another date, we went to the upper reaches of the creek and floated back towards Bonham. This part of the creek was much less forgiving than the lower portion. Shallow water meant much more we cruised the creek - our canoe flanked by alligator gars and big carp. Around Bonham, we saw remnant of structures past like an old railroad trestle, a rock-and-concrete weir dam I suspect was used to dam the creek and provide water for the nearby rail line.
In the end, we stopped about four miles short of where we initially launched our journey. The last leg is scheduled for early June 2009 and that's where we plan to spending a lot of time. Along the last
four mile stretch is where Bubba and I spent most of our time as boys. Our uncle owned much of the la along this part of the creek and what he didn't own, we had leased for our small cattle operation. In this area, we fished, ran trotline, hunted squirrels, pigs, deer, and raccoons, and simply enjoyed being outside. Along our journey, we've shot hundreds of still images and hours of high-def video and were followed by film crews from Texas Parks \& Wildilife
television. In the end our plan is to create a documen-
tary film about the creek and its cultural, historical, and tary film about the creek and its
