### School Immunization Requirement Changes Now In Effect

Changes to School immunization requirements for five vaccines vaccine. Students in grade 1 through 12 must continue to meet the curtook effect Aug. 1, according to Texas Department of Health Services rent requirement, which is two doses of a measles-containing vaccine at least one dose of each required vaccine," Sims said. "The changes were made to update the Texas elementary and secondary school immunization requirements to more closely match recommendations by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices," said Jack Sims, DSHS immunization branch manager.

Changes affect mainly students entering kindergarten and seventh grade. All immunizations must be completed by the first day of attendance at public and private schools. The vaccines and new requirements

Hepatitis A vaccine: Students entering kindergarten statewide must have had two doses of the hepatitis A vaccine.

Measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine: Students entering kindergarten and seventh grade must have had two doses of the MMR have had one dose.

and one dose each of mumps and rubella vaccine.

Varicella vaccine: Students kindergarten and seventh grade must have had to doses. Students in grade 1 through 6 and 8 through 12 must continue to meet the current requirements, which is one dose of varicella

Tetanus, diphtheria, acellular pertussis-containing vaccine (Tdap): Students entering seventh grade must have had one dose of Tdap vaccine. Students in seventh grade must have had a booster dose of Tdap, but only if it has been five years since their last dose of a tetanus-containing vaccine. Students in grades 8 through 12 must have had a tetanus-containing vaccine.

Meningococcal vaccine: Students entering seventh grade must

"A student may be enrolled provisionally if the student has received enrolled, the student must complete the required doses in each vaccine series on schedule and as quickly as medically feasible."

Information about the new Texas immunization requirements was sent to health care providers, schools and childcare facilities earlier this



#### **Current Crop Conditions**

Program cotton is ranging from 1/3 grown to cutout with a few pest problems to report. Again many of you are sitting at around five to seven nodes above white flower. Many of you in both counties received some rain today but at this time I do not know how much. We do however have a chance for some more rain tomorrow and on into Saturday but again we know how that's worked out so far

this year. So again, keep your wells going because cotton is still using 2.7-3in per week.

Pumpkins range from stage 4 (flower pollination)-stage 5 (fruit growth) with a few pest problems to report. Producers should be coming to an end on making their fungicide applications for powdery mildew.

#### **Pest Situation**



Cotton

Bollworm Populations continue to remain low in non Bt cotton. Populations are ranging anywhere from 0-2400 worms per acre. The threshold for bollworms is 8000-10000 per acre for worms that are smaller or equal to 1/4 inch. For worms that are larger than 1/4 the threshold drops to 5000. With that being said, the worms that I have been picking up are the smaller sized ones. The damage that I have been seeing is being mostly done on smaller squares and small bolls. This pest is basically taking out fruit that has little chance of making a good quality boll.



The pest situation in pumpkins continues to remain pretty calm. As mentioned earlier producers are coming to an end on making their fungicide applications for powdery mildew. I have received a few calls regarding the striped cucumber beetle. This pest will feed on the leaves and fruit. Now, I have seen this pest out in the field but they remain in very small numbers. The threshold for this pest as best as I can determine is if counts exceed 5 per plant or if defoliation is severe. This pest emerges as an adult from early to mid August. They will remain in relatively high numbers until mid to late



### Cotton Market Weekly



A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

Exchange (ICE) reached their highest level in 10 months Thursday on carryover buying, a lower U.S. dollar, and initial strength in most outside commodity markets. Buy-stops were quickly reached for the December contract which took it to its high of 65.47 cents per pound. However, the trade entered the market as sellers, halting the gains, and ICE futures ended the session only marginally higher.

Earlier in the week, many market participants average yields. were on the sidelines awaiting USDA's August supply/demand reports that were released on Wednesday. Upon release, the reports contained few, if any, surprises. Consequently, the data had no impact on the market.

USDA lowered its estimate for the 2009 U.S. crop to 13.21 million bales, down 43,000 from the July report. U.S. cotton exports, domestic consumption, and ending stocks were left unchanged at 10.20 bales, respectively.

"Today's report did not come out quite the way we had expected with regard to U.S. production," one analyst commented on Wednesday. "Most felt the U.S. crop conditions warranted a bigger crop

rate for the Texas crop and pegged production here nations. at 5.4 million bales, up almost one million bales was estimated at 296,000 bales compared to 262,000 the previous week.

Cotton futures prices on the Intercontinental last year, and the Kansas crop was pegged at 45,000 bales, up 11,000 from the 2008 crop.

> Thunderstorms with light to moderate rainfall moved across the Texas High and Rolling Plains this week, but coverage was spotty. The heaviest amounts were reported in the Northern High Plains which will help reduce the need to irrigate, however, most dryland fields remained dry. Precipitation would be welcome in the next few weeks to ensure

> USDA slightly lowered its projection for 2009 world production to 105.87 million bales and slightly raised its expectation for world consumption to 112.76 million bales compared to the July reports. Consequently, world ending stocks are now projected to be 57.46 million bales at the end of the 2009-10 marketing year, down 350,000 from the previous month's estimate.

U.S. upland cotton exports in the marketing million bales, 3.5 million bales, and 5.6 million year ended July 31 totaled almost 12.66 million running bales, according to an initial report, 2.5 percent more than the previous marketing year. From August 1 to 6, net upland sales for shipment in 2009-10 totaled 233,300 running bales. Featured buyers were Mexico and Morocco. 


