# **USDA Seeks Applications For Value-Added Producer Grants**

"These grants strengthen rural economies and create jobs by helping farmers and ranchers add value to their agricultural products by using them for planning activities such as feadefined as a passenger van de- sibility studies, marketing and business plans, signed to transport 15 or fewer or for working capital," Vilsack said.

> "This program also supports President Obama's goal to expand our nation's renewable energy resources by helping farmers develop renewable energy from agricultural products."

> Planning grants up to \$100,000 and working capital grants up to \$300,000 will be awarded through USDA Rural Development's Value Added Producer Grant program.

USDA is encouraging projects that use

TEMPLE – Agriculture Secretary Tom existing agricultural products in nontraditional ways and/or merge agricultural products with technology in creative ways.

Businesses of all sizes may apply, but priority will be given to operators of Small and Medium-Sized Family Farms or Ranches with a 3-year average of \$700,000 or less in annual gross sales of agricultural product.

The competitive grants to be awarded under this notice are part of USDA Rural Development's annual budget and are not funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

Applicants must provide matching funds equal to the amount of the grant requested. Ten percent of available funds are reserved for beginning farmers or ranchers, and socially disadvantaged farmers or ranchers.

An additional 10 percent is reserved for projects involving local and regional supply networks that link independent producers with businesses and cooperatives that market value-added products.

by House Bill 537, all occupants of a passenger vehicle, no matter their age or where they are sitting in the vehicle, must be secured by a safety belt. Maximum fines can reach as high as \$200, plus court costs. (The previous law exempted anyone 17 and older from wearing a seat belt in the back seat.)

The law also adds seat belt requirements for larger passenger vans.\* In addition, children younger than 8 must be in the appropriate child safety seat.

(This new law makes no changes to pick-up bed and school bus requirements.)

Buckle children into the appropriate child safety seat.

A new law (Senate Bill 61) amends the existing statute re-

seats by requiring that any child younger than 8 be restrained in an approved child safety seat system unless the child is taller than 4 feet, 9 inches in height.

**New Laws Strengthen Seat Belt** 

The law becomes effective on Sept. 1, 2009, but tickets for this offense cannot be issued until June 1, 2010. Police officers are allowed to issue a warning before that date. However, the previous law remains in effect for now and requires children younger than 5 and less than 36 inches in height be in a child safety seat, and tickets can still be issued for this violation. No children younger than 5 are







As part of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' (PUCT's) directive to develop renewable energy resources in the Competitive Renewable Energy Zones (CREZ), Sharyland Utilities, LP (Sharyland) is proposing to construct a 345 kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line in Briscoe, Floyd, Dickens and Motley Counties. The proposed transmission line will be approximately 63 miles long, depending on the route approved by the PUCT. The proposed transmission line will connect a proposed wind collection station to be located in Briscoe County to a proposed wind collection station in Dickens County. The proposed line is to be constructed in a Right-of-Way approximately 175 feet wide, on doublecircuit capable towers.

In support of this process, Sharyland will be holding three Public Open House meetings to share information about the current route alternatives for this line, to seek input from potentially affected parties for use in refining routing alternatives, and to identify the preferred route for the proposed project. PBS&J, a consulting firm retained by Sharyland Utilities, has developed a series of preliminary alternative transmission routes for consideration, from which a single transmission line will be constructed. As such, these preliminary routes are subject to modification based upon the information received at these meetings.

Individuals who wish to attend any of these meetings are welcome to come by anytime between 5:00 PM - 8:00 PM to review detailed materials and maps, to ask questions one-on-one with project representatives from Sharyland, and to provide comments and input regarding the proposed route alternatives.

Sharyland is dedicated to developing and routing the proposed line in a manner consistent with the values and cultures of all the local communities, as well as the rules and policies of the Texas Utilities Code, the PUCT and the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT). Completion of this and all CREZ projects will enable the safe and reliable introduction of approximately 18,500 megawatts (MW) of renewable energy from the wind-rich regions of the Panhandle, South Plains and West Texas to the load centers in a manner which is most beneficial and cost effective to Texas consumers in ERCOT.




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
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### **PUBLIC NOTICE** Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed **Constitutional Amendments** Special Election November 3, 2009

#### **FROPOSITION 1**

HJR 132 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature for uniform standards and proceto allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to construct roadways utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues for repayment of the bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipalities and counties of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to a military installation for the prevention of enroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation."

#### **PROPOSITION 2**

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for the taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead, regardless of whether the property may have a higher value if it were used for other purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead.

#### **PROPOSITION 3**

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to require the legislature to provide for the administration and enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing dures for the appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes

#### **PROPOSITION 4**

HJR 14 would amend the constitution to establish the national research university fund to provide a source of funding that will enable emerging research universities in this state to develop into major research universities. The amendment would require the legislature to dedicate state revenue to the fund and to transfer the balance of the existing higher education fund to the national research university fund. This amendment would further require the legislature to establish the criteria by which a state university may become eligible to receive and use distributions from the fund.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing the national research university fund to enable emerging research universities in this state to achieve national prominence as major research universities and transferring the balance of the higher education fund to the national research university fund."

#### **PROPOSITION 5**

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow for a single appraisal review board for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated reviews of tax ap- HJR 102 would define what is a praisals

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated equalizations."

#### **PROPOSITION 6**

HJR 116 would amend the constitu-

tion to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds, subject to certain constitutional limits, for the purpose of selling land and providing home or land mortgage loans to veterans of the state

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized."

#### **PROPOSITION 7**

HJR 127 would amend the constitution to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices.

#### **PROPOSITION 8**

HJR 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans' hospitals in this state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans hospitals in this state.'

#### **PROPOSITION 9**

state-owned public beach. The public, individually and collectively, would have an unrestricted right to use and a right of ingress to and egress from a public beach. The amendment would authorize the legislature to enact laws to protect these rights.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to protect the right of the public, individually and collectively, to access and use



the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the Gulf of Mexico."

#### **PROPOSITION 10**

HJR 85 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide that members of the governing board of an emergency services district may serve terms not to exceed four years.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that elected members of the governing boards of emergency services districts may serve terms not to exceed four years."

#### **PROPOSITION 11**

HJR 14 would amend the constitution to provide that the taking of private property for public use ("eminent domain") is authorized only if it is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, its political subdivisions, the public at large, or by entities granted the power of eminent domain, or for the removal of urban blight. The amendment would prohibit the taking of private property for transfer to a private entity for the purpose of economic development or to increase tax revenues. The amendment would also limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain in the future unless it is approved by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large, or entities granted the power of eminent domain under law or for the elimination of urban blight on a particular parcel of property, but not for certain economic development or enhancement of tax revenue purposes, and to limit the legislature 's authority to grant the power of eminent domain to an entity."
