

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Area artists shine in Plains Art Association show

PLAINVIEW – Artists from around Plainview took home high honors in the Plains Art Association's 49th Spring Celebration of Art Exhibition, now on display in the Abraham Art Gallery on the campus of Wayland Baptist University.

The show is open to artists from the region and features about 120 pieces of artwork in a variety of media, representing the varied talents of the region. The exhibition will be up through June 27, with an awards reception on that day from 1-3 p.m. in the gallery and atrium.

Ricky Plainview artist Davis earned the top honor of Best in Show for his oil painting titled "Taos Valley." The award is also the Faye Curry Memorial Award, given by J.B. and Ramona Roberts, Randall, Sarah and Drury Roberts. The Dr. Eldon C. Nicholl Memorial Award for Best Use of Color and Light was presented to "Rev Theory," an acrylic painting by Floydada resident David Mancilla.

John Hope, a member of the fine arts faculty at South Plains College in Levelland and a former Levelland schools art teacher, served as judge for the competition. Hope's own works has been represented in numerous solo and group exhibitions, and he designed and created the newest mosaic on the SPC campus, "New Morning," in 2001. He has completed numerous large-scale mural and mosaic commissions, had work included in national publications and was featured on Texas Country Reporter in 2006 with wife Bette.

Hope is a Levelland native

and is vice chairman of the Hockley County Historical Commission.

A Lamentation of Scott Brown

Scott Brown to be transformed by the Washington establishment, but it has finally happened. No longer the 41st vote against far-reaching government takeovers, yesterday Brown availed himself as the 60th vote in favor of the Dodd financial takeover bill. This came only a day after he had voted no on the very same legislation.

No significant revisions justified a "yes" vote on this legislation. It still institutionalizes "too big to fail", perpetuates unlimited bailouts and government takeovers, the bureaucracy to levy taxes on the American people and monitor their finances, all without any vote in Congress or any opportunity for judicial review of government seizures of private companies. And it still would not address the root, government causes of the financial crisis, including Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, the Federal Reserve, the Federal Housing Administration, and the Department of Housing

Sadly, Brown conditioned his support for the bill on so much less than ending bailouts or addressing root causes of the crisis. All he wanted were exemptions to the Volcker Rule's ban on proprietary trading for insurance companies and bank asset management in Massachusetts. tion costs. Brown said at the time, "With all due respect, that money is going to be transferred down to the individuals through ATM fees, increased fees. I thought banks were supposed to lend. So now they're going to take the money that they would be lending to the small businesses in this state and the men and women who want to buy homes ... and there's less of a pool there."

Alas, the Dodd bill contains such a bank tax. Institutions with \$50 billion or greater in consolidated assets will be charged assessments to finance the so-called "orderly liquidation fund." There is no cap on those assessments, nor any limit on how much money can flow through the fund. Nor will the assessments require any vote in Congress. That's taxation without representation - and Scott Brown of Massachusetts voted for it. Reverend Jonathan Mayhew, who coined the popular revolutionary slogan in a sermon in Boston, must be rolling over in his grave.

CBS' Face the Nation, Brown said that the bill "doesn't end the bailout mentality of the big banks are too big to fail concept." It still doesn't, and Scott Brown has now voted to perpetuate the concept of "too big to fail" by giving government unlimited bailout authority.

Just this past Wednesday, after he voted against cloture on the legislation, Brown issued a statement where he said, "the legislation contains loopholes that could leave the taxpayers on the hook for future bailouts of Wall Street." Then he voted for it anyway, without securing any protections for the American people against future bailouts or doing anything to unwind the current government credit lines to Fannie, Freddie, AIG, GM and Chrysler.

Other Views Congress vs. The Oil Industry

It's beyond question that the oil industry is down on its luck right now, and the black eye received from the Deepwater Horizon accident in the Gulf of Mexico is a shiner which will stay on its public face for quite awhile. And while radio host Stephanie Miller claimed the Gulf oil spill as proof that "God is a Democrat," the Democrats who sit among us mere mortals in Congress are taking direct aim at what they sneeringly call "Big Oil" with two particularly punitive measures.

With Democrats' first try at cap-and-trade (better known as Waxman-Markey) stalling in the Senate after a contentious House vote, last week Senators John Kerry and Joe Lieberman brought forth their version of energy legislation. Originally sponsorship crossed party lines when Senator Lindsey Graham, a Republican, agreed to back the bill, but Graham withdrew his support when Senate leader Harry Reid decided to press for passage of immigration reform rather than this measure.

That's not to say Graham would be staunchly against the proposal. But the sticking point he sees is that, "problems created by the historic oil spill in the Gulf...have made it extremely difficult for transformational legislation in the area of energy and climate to garner bipartisan support at this time." Predictably, Democrats representing waterfront states like Florida, New Jersey, and Maryland are already coming out dead set against the additional oil exploration included in Kerry-

Lieberman, a tradeoff intended to get Republicans to support a bill which would levy taxes on greenhouse gas emissions and, as studies have concluded, be a net job loser.

Moreover, Kerry-Lieberman gives a rare nod to states' rights from the liberal side, allowing affected states more liberty to curtail or cease oil exploration off their shores. It's a complete turnaround in one month's time - only a few weeks ago the oil industry was cautiously optimistic about the Obama Administration allowing exploration in certain leaseholds to go ahead beginning in 2012. Needless to say, those ambitious plans are on hold after White House adviser David Axelrod warned, "no additional drilling has been authorized and none will until we find out what has happened (with the Deepwater Horizon)."

A second Congressional attack on the energy industry in the accident's aftermath comes from their bid to bolster a little-known federal fund called the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund (OSLTF). Created by Congress in 1986, the OSTLF lay dormant until 1990, when in the wake of the Exxon Valdez tanker accident a per barrel tax was levied on petroleum produced or imported into the United States. Currently oil companies pay eight cents per barrel toward this fund. In addition, there is a limitation on liability of \$75 million per incident for economic damages - companies already have to shoulder the actual cleanup costs.

But a new proposal would devastate

small- and mid-size oil companies, forcing them out of business by increasing the prospective liability to \$10 billion. Naturally, the OSTLF would be increased as well through the possible fourfold increase of the per-barrel tax to 32 cents, but the additional revenue may not necessarily go to the OSTLF - proceeds could be spent on other projects Congress deems worthy of funding.

These are just two of the more egregious examples of how Congress wants to punish Big Oil for the sin of having a tragic accident occur on an offshore platform. The federal government has done its part to assist British Petroleum in coping with the accident and its aftermath, so there's no need for Congress to exert another pound of flesh from an apologetic industry.

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

Henry was born on November 13, 1919 at the family farm near Sylvester in Fisher County to John Robert and Ada Jameson Hinton. Six months later the family moved to Magdalena, New Mexico and homesteaded a section of land until it was proven up and then moved into the town where Henry started school.

In 1932, J.R. Hinton and Charles Gray traded places with the Grays getting the ranch in New Mexico and the Hintons getting the farm in the Dougherty community. Henry was enrolled in the Dougherty School for the seventh grade through ninth grade and then on to Floydada High School for 10th and 11th grades and graduation in 1938.

With war being declared on Japan after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Henry was drafted into the army in 1942 and served with the Company B 543rd Engineer Boat and Shore Regiment in the Pacific theater in the Philippines, acquiring the rank of Tech Sergeant. He has written a book about his army years.

Upon discharge in December of 1945, Henry returned to the family farm and began partnership with his older brother William until their retirement. For several years, during the winter months when the crop was gathered, Henry worked for a concrete elevator construction company helping build elevators in Clovis, Melrose and Plainview.

Olive was born on April 27, 1930 to Fred and Eula Mae Gross on the farm in the Ellen community of Hale County, just a stone's throw from the Floyd County line. In 1935, they moved to the two story house in the bottom of the draw where the Running Water and Callahan Draws run together to become White River.

She started school in Sandhill in 1936 and attended through the ninth grade and then graduated from Floydada High School in 1947.

She helped out on the farm til June, 1949, when she went to work for Dr. Thacker's dental office in Floydada. The story of Henry and Olive Hinton together began in the summer of 1949 in the office of Dr. Thacker. Henry had come in as a patient. After getting Henry settled into the dental chair, Olive stayed and visited with him as Dr. Thacker was taking a very long time. It was the next February 15, 1950 before they had their first date. One time while there were riding around town, they had two other girls riding with them named Barbara and Lavern. Kenneth Willis and Louis Anderson drove up at the stop light and asked Henry if he had seen any girls around. He told them he just happened to have a couple extras in the back and would trade them for a dollar each. It seems he never has been paid on the trade.

James was born in April of 1953, Ray in September of 1954 and Dean in January of 1959, all at People's Hospital in Floydada. They moved into a new house on the pavement two months after Dean's birth.

Olive was active in the Community Club supporting the Dougherty School activities all of the years that the boys attended school there. Henry was on the Dougherty School board most of those years. ily. Together they were sponsors of the Dougherty 4-H club and Floydada 4-H club until Dean graduated high school.

When the Dougherty School explosion occurred in the spring of 1972, Olive was right there in her trusty station wagon to help transport injured children to the hospital as there were too many for the ambulance to carry.

During the 1960s and 70s, Henry had several demonstration projects with County Agents Joe Wilson and Doyle Warren. His family was among the first to install center pivot irrigation in the eastern part of the county.

They took the boys on numerous stock show trips to Dallas, Houston, Ft. Worth, San Antonio and Denver with the boys showing polled Hereford steers and Suffolk sheep raised on the Hinton farm. There were several show champions during those years

In 1976, they bought a mini motor home and pulled the stock trailer along while attending the shows and that was into a 12-year job instead. For the beginning of their travel the next 15 years, she worked in Canada and all of the lower 48 states except Washington and South Carolina. In 1989 they traded for a full size motor home and began making several extended journeys. Among them were attending several of Henry's Army unit reunions.
