## Quartet Earns Achievements Honor In 67-F

Four members of Class 67-F in the undergraduate pilot training program at Reese will be recognized as outstanding graduates during graduation ceremonies Saturday morning in the base theater.

They are Captains Winslow E. Reither and Mark B. Schaeferle, 1st Lt. James V. Newendorp and 2nd Lt. Kenneth E. Dean.

They will be presented a letter of recognition from Lt. Gen. Sam Maddux Jr., commander of Air Training Command.

Captain Reither, from Westbury, Long Island, came to pilot training from duty as a navigator with a bomb squadron. He was commissioned through aviation cadets in 1960. He was the Reese nominee for the Orville Wright Achievement Trophy, given to the highest ranking student in Class 67-F in Air Training Command. He is reassigned to Cannon AFB, N. Mex., to fly F-100 aircraft.

Captain Schaeferle, from Gladbrook, Iowa, also was commissioned as a navigator in 1960 and was with a transport squadron at Travis AFB, Calif., prior to beginning pilot training. He is going to the Pacific to fly carrier aircraft.

Lieutenant Newendorp, from Alton, Iowa is a 1965 graduate of the Air Force Academy, where he majored in astronautics. He is being reassigned to Laredo AFB, Tex., as an instructor pilot in the undergraduate pilot training program.

Lieutenant Dean, who is going to Perrin AFB, Tex., as an F-102 pilot, is a graduate of Fresno State College in California who was commissioned through Officer Training School a year ago. He is from Fresno, Calif.

Class 67-F contains 50 young officers who are receiving wings on graduation.

## Campaign Near Project Goal

Indication early this week were that Reese would almost reach its goal of 100 per cent participation in the National Health Agencies and Federal Joint Crusade campaign. The campaign was to end March 15.

Eleven units had reached the goal in both phases Monday and others were not far short.

Air Base Group had 90 per cent in the health phase, 87 per cent in the crusade. Field Maintenance had 64 and 78, respectively. Organizational Maintenance had 79 and 74, Supply 51 per cent in each area, the Hospital 57 and 89, and the Communications Squadron 71 and 65. All other units were 100 per cent.

## Flight Record Earns Praise

Hats were off this week to Flight A of the T-37 maintenance organization in the Organizational Maintenance Squadron.

From last Wednesday through Monday there were 94 consecutive scheduled sorties without a single deviation or cancellation due to maintenance in the flight. An even 100 sorties were flown during the period, with three having discrepancies.

The maintenance feat was con-

sidered "remarkable" because most of the 17 men involved are three level airmen with a minimum of experience. MSgt. John K. Dennis, T-37 line chief, in a letter to the flight, also praised the Zero Defects angle of the accomplishment.

TSgt. Harold Henniger is flight supervisor, with SSgt. William Katzenburger and SSgt. Buford Longwith as shift supervisors.

## Randolph Opens Soon As UPT Base; Reese Aids In First T-41 Training

Assignment of about 40 new student pilots to Randolph AFB March 23 will mark the establishment of the ninth undergraduate pilot training facility in Air Training Command.

Students in UPT receive their first 30 hours of training in T-41 propeller-driven aircraft at civilian contract bases. The T-41 training for the first Randolph class will be at eight present operating UPT bases, with students then moving to Randolph for jet training. Reese will be assigned four of the first Randolph class to complete T-41 work.

The nine UPT bases are scheduled to train 3,252 U.S. pilots annually, an increase of 487 over 1966. Eight classes per year are scheduled at Craig AFB, Ala.; Vance AFB, Okla.; Moody AFB, Ga.; Williams AFB, Ariz.; Laredo, Webb, Laughlin AFBs in Texas, as well as Randolph.

The 53-week UPT course consists of 30 flying hours in the

T-41 (conducted by civilian contractors near the UPT bases), 90 flying hours in the T-37 and 120 hours in the supersonic T-38. In addition to flying training, students receive 530 hours in academic and officer training and 55 hours in synthetic training.

## Students In 68-F Complete Soloes

Most of the 75 members of Class 68-F in undergraduate pilot training at Reese had soloed this week at the Lubbock Municipal Airport, Maj. William Goldfein, Air Force liaison officer, reported.

The class is the largest assigned Reese in the jet training program. On completion of 30 hours of flying in the T-41 propeller-driven aircraft in Phase I of primary pilot training, the students enter the second phase at Reese, learning to fly the T-37 jet.

## SEVEN EARN 26 DECORATIONS

Award of 26 decorations to seven Reese officers will be a feature of graduation ceremonies for Class 67-E from undergraduate pilot training at the base Saturday. Presentations will be in the Reese theater by Col. Ernest T. Cragg, wing commander.

The Bronze Star Medal will go to Maj. Larry V. Girton, Maj. Fred A. Luke and Capt. Thomas E. Morris. Capt. James S. Freeman, Capt. David G. Parker and 1st Lt. Frank I. Poucher will receive Distinguished Flying Crosses. Capt. Charles J. Whitsett is to receive the Air Medal. Clusters to previously won Air Medal, will go to Captain Morris, Captain Freeman and Lieutenant Poucher. All awards except that to Captain Whitsett were won for Southeast Asia service.

The citation accompanying the Bronze Star Medals states the officer "while exposed to danger from hostile forces,

demonstrated professional ability, sound judgment and great enthusiasm in overcoming the many involved problems associated with his duties. His superb performance and signal contributions assisted materially in the success of the United States Effort in Southeast Asia. The exemplary leadership, personal endeavor and devotion displayed reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

Major Girton earned his medal for meritorious service as air operations staff officer, air plans and operations division, combat operations center of the U.S. military assistance command in Vietnam from Oct. 19, 1965, to Sept. 10, 1966.

Major Luke won his medal as operations staff officer of a special mission in Southeast Asia from Feb. 21, 1966 to Jan. 27, 1967.

# Flight Facility Opener Honors WWI Veteran

Jack Davis, considered a founder of American airpower, was a guest of honor Tuesday at the official opening of the 3500th Pilot Training Squadron flight facilities building. Davis, long-time Lubbock resident and prominent citizen, cut the ribbons opening the main entrance.

On hand were other leading Lubbock citizens. Many Reese key officers joined in a tour of the spacious building and assisted in explaining the Reese mission and other Air Force programs to visitors.

The opening was followed by a luncheon in the Officers' Open Mess hosted by Col. Ernest T. Cragg, wing commander.

Jack Davis who has been an Air Force supporter virtually all his adult life, enlisted in the Army Air Corps in March 1917—50 years to the month before he cut the ribbon here Tuesday.

Now a member of the Order of Daedalians, he received his early aeronautical training at Ohio State University and at Hicks Field near Fort Worth. After commissioning, he was an instructor pilot at Everman Field, also near Fort Worth.

The aircraft used in those early days was the Curtis-developed "Jenny," in which the pilot had only an altimeter and gas gauge as instruments.

After World War I, Davis came to Lubbock and has been a civic leader, serving a term as president of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and assisting with numerous other civic projects.

Davis entered military service during World War II, serving as director of supply and maintenance at several training bases. He retired in 1945 as a lieutenant colonel.

His first flight instructor was Capt. Hubert Harmon, later lieutenant general and first Superintendent of the Air Force Academy. Davis counts large numbers of other Air Force leaders among his friends.

An early important assignment for 2nd Lt. Lloyd E. (Jack) Davis, was to study and report on the Ruggles Orientator, first of simulated trainers and then used by the Naval Aviation School at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Davis reported the orientator would help medical officers determine men fit to fly "just the same as the whirling chair and other devices have been a benefit." He also said he thought it would help pilots in unusual situations, such as flying upside down.

Davis also reported the Ruggles invention would aid beginners in correcting faults and in overcoming most of their troubles. He also found the orientator would aid veteran pilots in strengthening his knowledge of stunting and varied aircraft positions.

The most important contribution the Ruggles would make, Lieutenant Davis reported, was in saving lives and aircraft by lessening the number of crashes, because pilots in the safety of the orientator, could experience pre-crash conditions and learn to react automatically to avert accidents.

## Structure Has Double Space, Many Features

The new flight facilities building of the 3500th Pilot Training Squadron, following its grand opening Tuesday, was scene of a squadron open house in which members showed its size and refinements in operating equipment and comfort.

The formal opening and open house were arranged by Lt. Col. Albert S. Martin, Squadron operations officer, and Maj. William T. Aycock, project officer.

The building doubles the size of the previous operations building, with the hub, or center of activity, the mission control area which coordinates the variety of functions of the 3500th. From the center all aircraft in use are assigned and released under a new "color-coding" system which increases efficiency and provides a better control of operational planes.

The internal communication system enables a complete and instant connection with any area of the building. A public address system gives the mission control center and the commander, the capability of transmitting to the rest of the building flight conditions and other information that is of an immediate nature.

There also are individual office inter-coms which provide a two-way capability between instructor offices. Offices are provided for instructors in eight rooms and for four flight commanders.

Eight briefing rooms, a 24-hour visual flight rules control and operations dispatch room, a snack bar, a parachute room which includes a workshop and storage space, an administration and file room, an operations room, the commander's office and an outer office for the secretary and chief clerk are in use.

The Reese flight facilities building, which is a part of the military construction program, was built under supervision of the Army Corps of Engineers, with Atcheson, Atkins and Cartwright as architects. First plans were drawn by the Reese Civil Engineers.

The contractor was W. G. McMillan Jr., whose father was contractor in the original construction of the base back in 1941, when Lubbock Army Air Field, predecessor to Reese, came into being.

At an initial estimated cost of \$263,230, the building is fully air-conditioned and, because it was acoustically built to eliminate aircraft sounds of the flight line, there are only two windows in the entire building.

Constructed primarily of concrete, the building has additional materials such as vinyl and cement asbestos, gypsum wallboard, wood, metal and various types of tile. The structure is designed to withstand far more than West Texas winds will offer.

as forward air controller, 22nd Tactical Air Support Squadron, at Binh Thuy Air Base, Vietnam, from Jan. 14 to Dec. 24, 1966.

Captain Freeman earned his Distinguished Flying Cross by extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight as an F-100 pilot in Vietnam last May 10.

"On that date," says the citation, "Captain Freeman led a flight of two F-100s against a 120-foot hostile coastal freighter which had run aground about 100 feet offshore. Despite hostile fire from the coastline, Captain Freeman napalmed the ship beginning a series of increasingly violent explosions. His aggressive and courageous attacks completely destroyed a valuable source of hostile munitions."

Captain Parker earned his DFC for an aerial flight in Vietnam (See OFFICERS, Page 3)

Each of us has a basic obligation to cooperate and give positive support where we can. I believe if each one of us will try to do a little bit more in cooperating and supporting the base that supports you, life for all of us will be a little easier, a little more pleasant, and a little more meaningful. ### Plan For That Leave!

### Training Shift Brings Savings

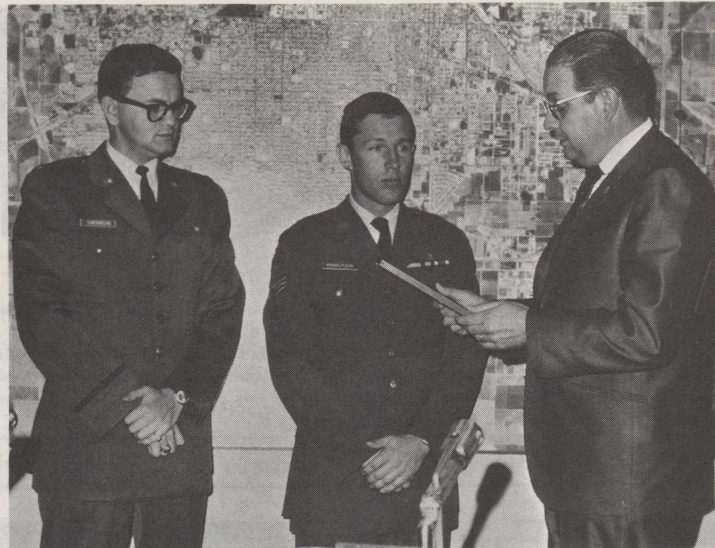
Shifting of M-16 qualification training from Lackland AFB, Tex., to Reese, has resulted in a \$17,682 annual saving to Reese in its Cost Reduction Program.

Personnel bound for Southeast Asia are required to be M-16 qualified. Reese officials asked permission to use the base rifle range for qualification and the request was granted. It was computed that \$17,682 would be spent in fiscal year 1967 for transportation and per diem of Reese personnel taking M-16 training and tests.

Use of Reese facilities saved that amount and was validated locally as a Cost Reduction savings.

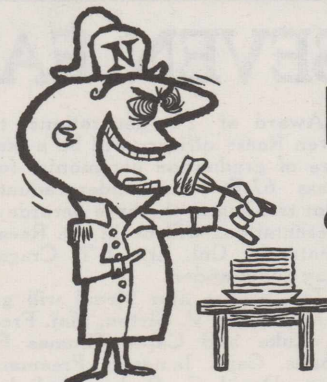

hours in the zoology class.

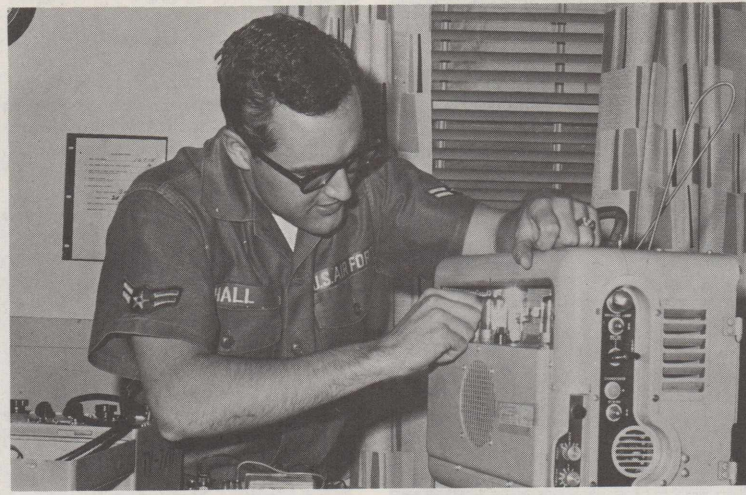
During a normal duty day, Airman Hall handles such things as issuing and storing film and equipment, and checking and repairing film. He does minor repairs on audio visual equipment.

## Officers Earn Decorations

nam Oct 8, 1966. The citation says:

"Captain Parker was a member of a flight of F-105s assigned to the mission of seeking out and destroying an SA-2 surface-to-air missile site deep in hostile territory which threatened a major strike force of accompanying aircraft. It was through Captain Parker's outstanding aerial skill, courageous determination, and selfless devotion to duty that enabled him, in the face of intense and accurate hostile ground fire and threatening MIG interceptors, to affect a timely launch of his ordnance into an active surface-to-air missile site and cause its immediate destruction."

Lieutenant Poucher won his DFC as an F4C aircraft commander in Southeast Asia July 30, 1966, on a night strike mission against "vital hostile forces' transportation and communications line."

"On initial penetration into hostile territory, severe weather made radio and radar contact with the rest of his flight impossible, and Lieutenant Poucher's navigation system proved to be unreliable, forcing him to rely strictly on dead reckoning," says the citation. "Nevertheless, he successfully navigated to the target area and delivered his ordnance while under heavy hostile fire, destroying three trucks, damaging one more, and cutting the road in two places."

Captain Whitsett won his Air Medal for overcoming difficulties when his Reese aircraft was in collision with a flock of ducks near Hill AFB, Utah, last Oct. 17. The citation says:

"On that date, when the T-38 aircraft Captain Whitsett was piloting experienced severe mechanical malfunction, Captain Whitsett at great personal risk, maneuvered the aircraft away from a heavily populated area while delaying his own ejection, was responsible for the safe ejection of the other pilot

and the aircraft impacting in an open field."

Captain Morris earned the 7th through the 15th clusters to his Air Medal through service from May 15 to Dec. 15, 1966. Captain Freeman won his 4th through 10th clusters for duty from June 19, 1965, through Aug. 13, 1966. Lieutenant Poucher won his third through fifth clusters for Aug. 10 through Sept. 28, 1966 duty.

## Officer Promoted Early At Reese

A new assignment and promotion came near together for Capt. Daniel Habura, newly arrived at Reese as information officer.

He arrived at Reese Feb. 24 and won elevation to captaincy March 10.

The new captain is a resident of New Kensington, Pa., and was

attending St. Vincent College in Pennsylvania when appointed to the Air Force Academy. He graduated from the Academy and did subsequent work at Temple University in the Air Force Institute of Technology program prior to coming to Reese.

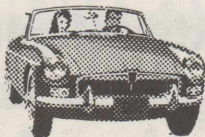

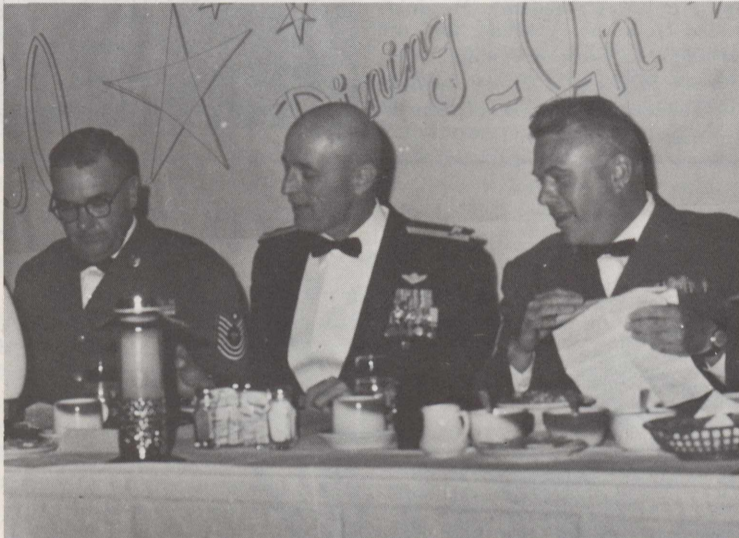

### Tighter Money Affects Reese Civil Engineering Production

The second revision of the Air Force financial plans has forced a "tightening of the belt" in Civil Engineering activities at Reese, Capt. Robert B. Gleason, base engineer, stated this week. Delayed or eliminated services will result on-base and in Reese Village, it was pointed out. In some instances responsibilities will be shifted. A lack of funds for overhire personnel makes it necessary to delegate upkeep on Reese grounds to using organizations, which will be assigned mowers. The lack of overhire personnel may also delay reactivation of evaporative coolers.

The shortage in supply funds may delay normal maintenance and minor repair action, such as painting, replacing floor tiles and replacing floors. Essential repairs will be made as the need arises if supplies are available.

Work requests for minor construction will be processed normally, with those considered most essential, necessary to the mission and effecting health, safety and security taking precedence. Work requests not in the three top priority areas must be justified for urgency. Other projects, including self-help projects, will be approved when supplies are again available.

There will be little impact on service calls under the revised financial plan, Captain Gleason pointed out, except that minor repairs in the area may be delayed by lack of materials on hand. The size of bench stocks is expected to diminish some and will have a heavy bearing on what can be accomplished.

Captain Gleason said that in the housing area contract maintenance and repairs will not be affected. Preventive maintenance and service calls may be delayed if bench stocks are low. Occupants of Vil-

lage homes are encouraged to make minor repairs and adjustments, but bonafide emergencies will be cared for immediately, it was said. Self-help work orders requiring Government furnished material will not be processed until the money situation eases. Stocks of fertilizer and grass seed for Reese Village will be very limited and stocks will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Details will appear in the Daily Bulletin. Lawn watering will be restricted at once. Residents of the base and Reese Village are being urged to conserve utilities in order to make potential savings in gas and electricity available to ease fund shortages in other areas.

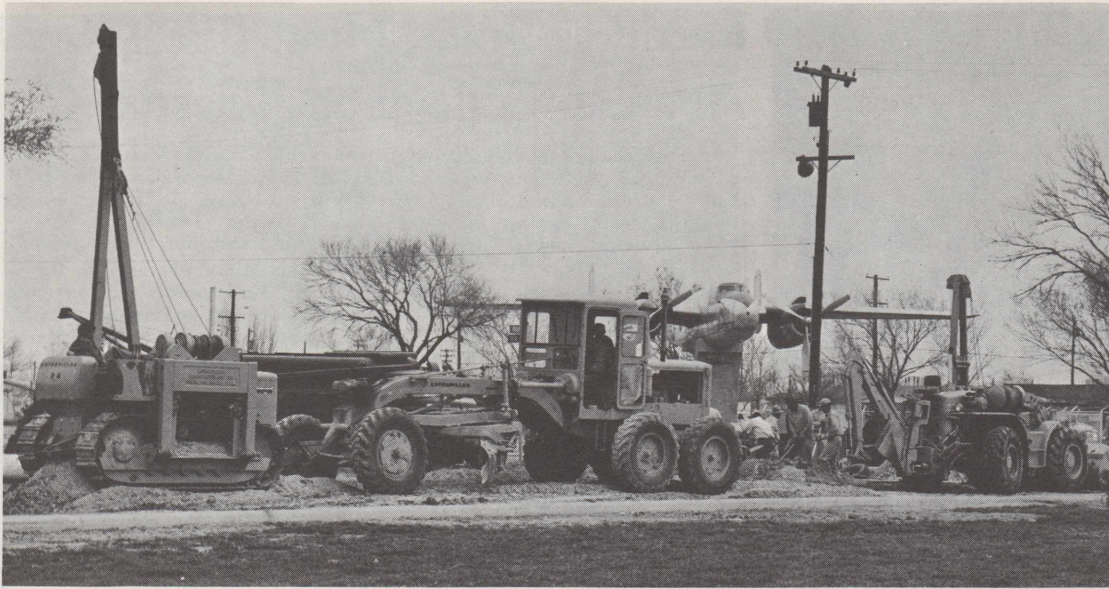

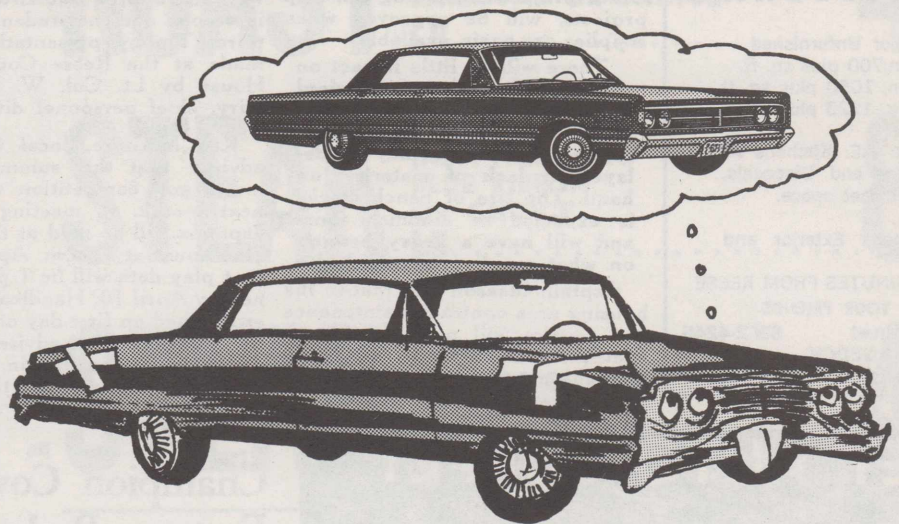

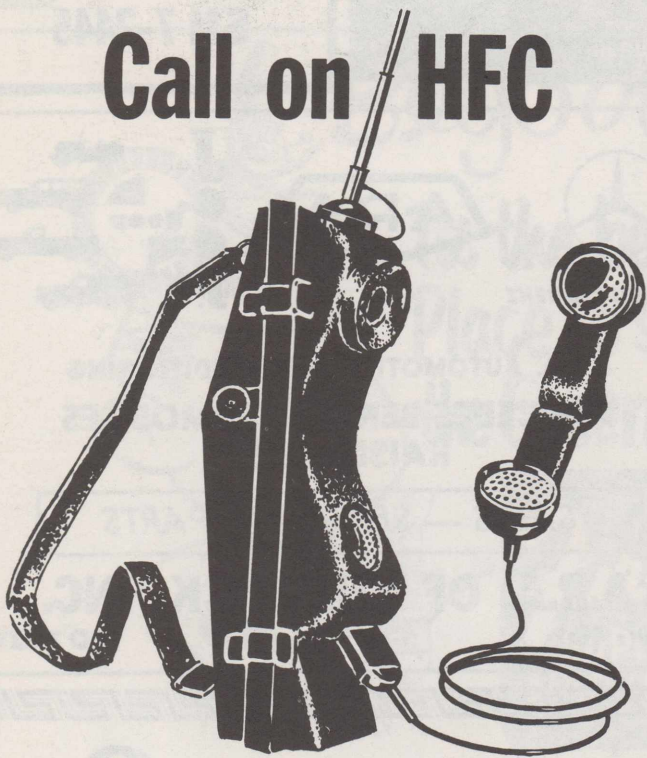
