Col. Clyde J. Morganti, Reese AFB wing commander, has called on all base personnel to exercise maximum caution in their driving habits.

In a letter addressed to all commanders and supervisors, Colonel Morganti started off by saying: "The safety of all personnel is a matter of the highest importance of continuing concern to me."

The colonel went on to cite the recent tragic deaths of a Reese second lieutenant and his wife, adding; "This brings to bear the responsibility we all have for continued effective effort in the practice of driving safety."

The wing commander quoted a letter Oct. 23, 1967, urging unit commanders to "vigorously continue to provide an effective program of driving safety education and to take appropriate action against traffic law violators." 



Requiring that the accused in a bad-conduct discharge trial be represented, or afforded the opportunity to be represented at the trial by legally qualified counsel before a special courts martial may adjudge a bad conduct discharge.

Permit appointment of law officers to special courts martial.

Extend from one to two years the time within which a new trial may be granted in cases reviewed by a board of review.

The U.S. House of Representatives is due to act on this proposed legislation in the near future.


