
FMS Sergeant Named Airman Of Year Here

Chances For Merry Christmas Marred By Needless Hazards

Many holiday celebrations end in holocausts, and greeting of "Merry Christmas" may be followed by tragedy because of some careless act or the neglect of simple safety precautions. The tragedies at Christmas time are on the increase despite all the warnings.

Several casualties, including many fatalities, have resulted at Christmas celebrations from the use of candles on Christmas trees, costumes and wearing apparel of flammable fabrics, open flames from gas heater and ranges and defective wiring from installations for Christmas tree lights.

Don't set off firecrackers or permit them to be used by anyone in your family.

Always consult your fire chief

or fire marshal for advice on decoration safety.

Christmas trees are combustible. Choose a small tree. They are less dangerous. Set it up in the coolest place in the house away from heating units and doorways.

Inspect all electric sockets and sets to insure they are in good condition. Discard sets with frayed cords or otherwise damaged. Provide a distant switch for turning the tree lights on and off. Don't leave tree lights burning when no one is in the house. Make certain that the needles are not exposed to lights. Inspect the tree occasionally and if needles near lights are burning brown, change the position of the lights.

Remove all gift wrapping promptly after the gifts have been opened. They are flammable.



Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. John P. McConnell has sent the following Christmas message to members of the Air Force:


"With another year drawing to a close, I wish to express my sincere gratitude to all men and women of the Air Force for their total dedication and devotion to

We are in the midst of the Christmas holiday season, one of the happiest times of the year. But it can also be one of the most dangerous times unless certain safety precautions are taken.

These joyous days are marked by hurried activity and increased driving. Air Force members and others during this season rush to homecomings and family get-togethers. And, because they're

in a rush, a few of these meet with tragedy.

In an attempt to combat this critical period, Air Force advanced its annual "Holidays from Danger" traffic safety campaign this year to include Veterans Day. The campaign will end at midnight New Year's Day.

Despite this intensified effort, five Air Force military personnel died in traffic accidents over the long Veterans Day weekend and five more Air Force traffic fatalities were recorded over the Thanksgiving holiday period.

Last December there were 19 Air Force fatalities and 204 disabling injuries attributed to private motor vehicle accidents.

We should be safety conscious at all times, but especially during this time of festive activity. If you're traveling over the holidays, allow time to drive at a speed consistent with road and weather conditions. Plan ahead so that you can drive and arrive safely.

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Wing OPLAN Drawn Up For Night Before...

(EDITORS NOTE: The following OPLAN was drawn up by Margie Negri, officer training section, DCO-C, a civilian employee at Reese.)

HEADQUARTERS, 3500 Pilot Training Wing
 Reese Air Force Base, Texas
 1 December 1968

3500TH PILOT TRAINING WING OPLAN 12-24-68
 OPERATION—SANTA CLAUS

1. **GENERAL:** An official visit by Major General Santa Claus is expected at this station 25 December 1968.

2. **SITUATION:**

a. Not a creature will stir without official permission. This will include indigenous mice. Special stirring permits for necessary administrative action will be obtained through normal command channels. Mice-stirring permits will be secured through Base Personnel, with prior coordination through SP.

b. Personnel will settle their brains for a long winter nap prior to 2200 hours, 24 December 1968. Uniform for nap: pajamas cotton, light, drowsing, with kerchief, general purpose, OK and/or cap, fatigue with ear flaps. Equipment will be drawn from BEMO prior to 1900 hours.

3. **ASSUMPTION:** Personnel will utilize standard ration sugar plums or appropriate beverages for visions to dance through their heads. These items will be drawn through Base Dining Hall, Officers' Mess or NCO Open Mess.

4. **GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS:** Stocking, wool, cushion sole, will be hung by chimneys with care. Necessary precautions will be taken to avoid fires caused by carelessly-hung stockings. Squadron Safety Officers will submit stocking hanging plans to this Headquarters prior to 0800 hours, 22 December 1968.

5. **COMMAND AND SIGNAL:** At first sign of clatter from lawn, all troops will spring from bed to investigate and evaluate cause. Immediate action will be taken to tear open shutters and throw open window sashes. OPS PLAN "Saint Nick", dated 12 December 1967 supporting document to this plan, will be in effect to facilitate shutter tearing and sash throwing. Sections Chiefs will be appointed for Reese Village and will familiarize all personnel with procedures and will be responsible for seeing that no shutters are torn or sashes thrown prior to start of official clatter.

6. **EXECUTION:**

a. Prior to 2400 hours, date of visit, all personnel will be assigned "Wondering Eyes" stations. After shutters are torn and sashes thrown, these station will be manned.

b. The Base Transportation Officer will assign one sleigh, miniature, M-63, and eight (8) deer, rein, tiny, for use of General Claus. Driver assigned must have current rooftop license and less than four points assessed from driving violations. All Student Squadron personnel will automatically be eliminated by this stipulation. Driver can be hippie and wear a beard but must be able to shout clearly "On Dancer, on Dasher, on Prancer and Vixen; up Comet, up Cupid, on Donder and Blitzen." WROCC will have two helicopters on standby as backup transportation.

c. General Claus will enter Reese Village and Base quarters through chimneys. All housing units, barracks and BOQs without chimneys will draw Chimney Simulator, M-6, for use during the operation. Chimneys will be drawn on Reese Form 555 and will be submitted to BEMO in seven (7) copies prior to 22 December 1968.

c. Personnel will be rehearsed in the shouting of "Happy Christmas to all and to all a good night." This shout will be given on the termination of General Claus' visit. Uniformity of shouting is the responsibility of Squadron Commanders. **SPECIAL NOTE:** Personnel are also reminded to refrain from the slang version of this quote by saying, "Sock it to 'em Santa."



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
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Officers Wives Club Schedules Board Meeting For January

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Wing Regulation 162-2 Details Dental Program

The 3500th Pilot Training Wing has issued Wing Regulation 162-2 which outlines the details of the preventive dentistry program for dependent children at Reese — a program announced in The Roundup two weeks ago. (Dec. 6 issue).


The regulation outlines the eligibility, services to be rendered, schedule for treatment, individual responsibility, broken appointments and cancellations. The regulation is dated Dec. 9.

Those eligible are basically dependent children under the age of 21, or under 23 and enrolled in a full-time course in an approved institution of higher learning. Services will include dental examinations without X-ray, cleaning of teeth, topical application to the teeth of a fluoride solution, but definite dental treatment will not be performed under this program. Minors must be accompanied by an adult member of the sponsor's family.

Children will be scheduled for 4:15 p.m. insofar as possible. This will include Reese Elementary School pupils and pre-school children. Where school times, transportation and such dictate, program appointments will be made at 4:45 p.m. Parents will make appointments in person at the **Dental Clinic for all children who are living at home.**

Eligible children living away from home who desire treatment will secure consent forms from the Dental Clinic. Upon completion and return of the forms to the Dental Clinic, appointments will be made. All appointments must be made during normal duty hours of the calendar month preceding the child's birth month. Treatment will be accomplished during the child's birth month. Failure to make appointment during the prescribed calendar month will result in the patient being placed on a waiting list for treatment as vacancies occur.

For complete information on the program, it is suggested that sponsors obtain Wing Regulation 162-2 and read it thoroughly.

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

More First-Termers Eligible For Early Out

Air Force has expanded the early out program three months and has accelerated early release losses already scheduled. First term airmen at Reese whose dates of separation (DOS) fall between October and December 1969 will be eligible for a February, 1969 early out. Airmen who have already been identified for early release in February and March 1969 will have their DOS's adjusted to January, 1969.

First term airmen committed for an overseas assignment with an EDCSA through the month of March 1969 are ineligible for early release. These airmen will be processed for overseas assignment as previously scheduled. Airmen who indicate that they will suffer hardship if released early will be allowed to waive early out. Airmen who are otherwise eligible will be counseled by Personnel as to the advantages of reenlistment. Airmen who meet eligibility criteria and indicate positive intent to reenlist will not be scheduled for separation or have their DOS adjusted. Those not reenlisting will be scheduled for a separation physical as soon as possible. Personnel involved in this additional rollback will not be eligible for further early release under the Christmas early release program. Failure to experience the expected losses in the original rollback is indicated as the reason for the expanded program.

Spring Term Classes At Tech Will Begin Jan. 27 At Reese

The spring term (1969) on-base college program offered through the Texas Technological College Extension Division will begin Jan. 27 at Reese AFB. Final examinations are scheduled for April 30 and May 1. Courses to be offered include accounting, economics, English, foreign languages (French, German and Spanish), government, history, math, philosophy, and sociology. Schedules with descriptions of each course are available in the education office, bldg. 1033. Tuition charge will be \$15 for all students. Military personnel may secure a reimbursement at the rate of \$11.25 per semester hour. The registration period will be Jan. 2 through Jan. 17. Military personnel desiring tuition assistance must complete AF Form 1227 (Tuition Assistance Form), available in the base education office. Registration materials are available in the base education office. Arrangements for registration after regular duty hours can be made by calling ext. 634. Since Texas Tech requires an overall average of 15 students per class established on base it is very important that all interested personnel register as early as possible. Students will not have to pay their part of tuition until the class has been officially established.

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2 Silver Stars Are Presented In Ceremonies

The presentation of a third Silver Star, to W. B. Riley, SSgt., USAF Retired, was postponed when Mr. Riley was unable to make the ceremony.

Captain Oberdier received the Silver Star for gallantry in connection with military operations against an opposing force as an A-1H tactical fighter pilot near Da Nang, RVN, April 21, 1968.

Lieutenant Johnson was awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in connection with military operations against an opposing force as an F-100 pilot near Ben Tre, RVN, on Feb. 2, 1968.

Captain Ash was selected by a blue-ribbon board of officers from among nine nominees for the singular honor. He will be given a plaque, emblematic of his achievement, and a letter of con-

Captain Ash is currently assigned to the 3500th Pilot Training Squadron and was nominated by his squadron commander, Lt. Col. Albert S. Martin. The nomination points out that Captain Ash started his career at Reese as a student in March, 1964 and was recognized by being awarded the Flying Training Award for having achieved the highest flying grades in his class.

Upon leaving Reese, Captain Ash was awarded the Top Gun award for being rated the top graduate in his F-100 gunnery training class at Luke AFB. In the first quarter of 1966, he became known as one of the "Top Ten" guns in the 354th Tactical Fighter Wing at Myrtle Beach AFB.

Captain Ash was instrumental in the deployment of the 352nd Tactical Fighter Wing to Vietnam during the buildup of 1966. In Southeast Asia he soon became known as one of the youngest and most competent flight leaders in Vietnam and was thrust into the positions of leading older pilots into combat. For his efforts in Southeast Asia, Captain Ash was awarded the Air Medal with 13 Oak Leaf Clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

Captain Ash was assigned to Reese in October, 1967. He was assigned to G Flight and given additional duties as Emergency Procedures Briefing Officer and

Associate Stan/Eval Member.

Last spring, Captain Ash was selected above all other nominees throughout Air Training Command as ATC's representative on the Junior Officers Advisory Council to the president of the Air Force Association. He was recently selected as one of 16 senior RSU controllers in the 3500th PTS.

The medals were presented by the squadron commander, Lt. Col. Albert S. Martin.

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
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

\$6,000 Savings In Management Action Realized

Management action in the Transportation Division at Reese AFB has resulted in validated savings of nearly \$6,000 a year over the next three year period. The action has been submitted to ATC for approval.

The action surrounds the method of shipment of seat ejection catapults to the Franfort Arsenal in Philadelphia and Hill AFB, Utah. Previously, this was done through commercial motor freight at a cost of \$1,087.50 per shipment to Philadelphia and \$897.75 for shipment to Hill AFB.

The management action recommends small shipments of the catapults to Cannon AFB, N.M. in a military truck for movement via LOGAIR to McGuire AFB, N.J. and then on to Philadelphia or Hill AFB at a cost of \$47.05 and \$37.05 respectively per shipment.



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
