made for our protection. If we obey them our chances of being involved in an accident are reduced considerably. Cheat and we increase the risk not only for ourselves but for others too.



Local legal assistance offices provide an annual legal checkup form for this purpose (DD Form 1543). The form includes such personal data as social security number, permanent legal residence, date and place of birth, location of birth certificate, numbers of naturalization and citizenship certificates, dates and places of marriage, divorce and adop-

The same information should be listed for other members of the family. Other information on the form concerns financial position such as credit cards, stocks, bonds, mutual funds, other securities, bank accounts, debts and other liabilities.

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

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
