

Write It Up, If It Doesn't Work

What happens if the pilot fails to write up a discrepancy? Nothing, of course, since he is the only one who knows it didn't work.

How often have you heard after an aircraft accident that the aircraft was a "dog". An interview of several pilots may well substantiate irregularities in the aircraft performance, but mainten-



ance records (AFTO Form 781A) do not back up the allegation. Yet, it was obvious that there was some justification in the allegation as backed up by the squadron log but never entered in the maintenance forms. There is nothing new in the fact that pilots

must write up each malfunction that occurs during flight. Some pilots still maintain the philosophy of Capt. Garrett asking the crew chief if the bird is ready and hops in for his flight, without performing his preflight, and usually this same pilot may brief the crew chief on existing discrepancies without recording them on the appropriate maintenance form, thinking he is doing maintenance a favor. If not forgotten, those days are long, long gone.

Proper form documentation and pre-flight inspections are essential elements in any successful accident prevention program. Granted, the pilot cannot see and check for himself that his aircraft is air worthy in every respect. He is dependent upon the skill and integrity of maintenance technicians and supervisors. The skilled manpower shortage in the maintenance field often creates the need for longer working hours, and leads to fatigue factors. It has been said that "the maintenance man is not forgotten; its just that the problem is difficult to solve."

Pilots, help maintenance do their job by spending a few extra minutes after flight to be sure the discrepancy is fully written up and it will provide better aircraft for you to fly.

Income Tax Tidbits

Exemptions Provide Equality

(This is the fourth in a series of articles designed to assist you in the preparation of your 1968 federal income tax returns.)

Probably the closest thing to

absolute equality in this country is the \$600 personal exemption allowed each person filing a federal income tax return. In this respect, even Howard Hughes is treated the same as you and I. Additional exemptions are allowed in cases where the taxpayer is 65 or if he is blind. Thus, an individual who is 65, and whose vision is so impaired as to qualify him for the blindness exemption, would be entitled to three exemptions for himself. A man filing jointly with his wife is entitled to claim similar exemptions for which she qualifies.
