

Have you ever had to take a tremely painful. series of rabies shots, or have did?

When a person is bitten by an animal, the animal is placed under observation for a 10-14 day period. If it is determined that the animal has rabies or if the animal is not found within a relatively short time after the biting, the person who was bitten must take the series.

The series consists of 14 separate shots which are taken over a 14-day period. Each of the shots is taken in the upper abdominal

The Air Force Clinic has set aside the first part of each day, Monday through Friday, to care for military per-

sonnel with acute illnesses. Military personnel who are unable to get an appointment or who become ill overnight should report to the Air Force Clinic between 7:45 a.m. and 8:15 a.m. This clinic enables personnel to be treated before reporting to duty. If you do not report for military sick call, you will need an appointment.

Lt. Col. Kellam Adult dependents will be seen by appointment only. When you call for an appointment, please answer all questions about your problems truthfully. If your problem does not need immediate attention, you may be asked to wait a few days before seeing a doctor. This will enable us to care for patients with more urgent problems as soon as possible.

In order to care for children with acute illnesses as soon as possible, a pediatric sick call has been established. If your child becomes ill, call for an appointment. If we are unable to give you an appointment within 24 to 48 hours, you may be asked to bring your child to pediatric sick call.

For problems not needing immediate attention, call for an appointment. Emergencies will be taken care of as necessary. An emergency is defined as a situation where there is a threat to life or limb or there is undue suffering.

Your cooperation will help us provide you with more satisfactory health care and enable a greater number of patients to receive care at the appropriate time.



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
