Behold the credit card! Some cards are issued directly by merchants. Other companies issue a card good at many stores, airlines and hotels.

The cardholder is almost always responsible for purchases made by him or persons authorized by him.

Even an unsolicited card sent through the mail may contain conditions. If you use the card you have by that use accepted th

Most credit cards say you are liable for purchases until the issuer gets written notice of the card's loss or theft.

Keep a record of your card numbers. If one is lost or stolen, notify the company immediately by registered mail or telegram. Then, if a merchant is negligent in not indentifying or checking up on the unauthorized user of a card, the merchant bears the loss. (AFNS)

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

Persons eligible for vides funds to Air Force depend- assistance are the unmarried, deent children who are in need of pendent children of: Air Force financial assistance for a college personnel and Army Air Forces education or vocational training personnel who died on active duty or after having been retired from The assistance provided by the active duty; Air Force and Air Force Reserve personnel who retire from active duty; Air Force personnel on active duty; and Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve personnel on extended active duty with the Air Force.

Assistance is in the form of a combination of loan and grant in amounts not to exceed \$1,500 per student, per school year. Loans are interest free and do not have to be repaid until after the student graduates or leaves fulltime attendance at an undergraduate school, whichever occurs first. Grants are outright gifts which do not have to be repaid.

The student must submit a certificate of admission to the school he will attend before the Society can determine whether assistance may be granted. There are no scholastic requirements for prefreshmen students. Students who are freshmen, sophomores or juniors in college must submit a complete, official transcript of the college work at the close of the academic year. Those who have not earned the necessary credits required by their institutions for promotion do not qualify for the educational assistance.


