

'Seal-coat related' budget amendment approved by Howard County Commissioners

Howard County Commissioners met Wednesday at the Howard County Courthouse. During their meeting, the commissioners approved transferring \$262,000 from the 2017-2018 fiscal year budget to the 2018-2019 fiscal year budget to pay for "seal-coat related items."

At their meeting Wednesday afternoon, Howard County Commissioners approved a budget amendment of more than a quarter of a million dollars to continue a project from the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Howard County Road Administrator Brian Klinksiek described the funds as being "seal-coat related for items." According to Klinksiek, the funds

were budgeted in 2017-2018, and the item on Wednesday's agenda was simply to move the funds into the 2018-2019 budget so the project could continue.

"We have some funds that we needed to move that weren't used in the '17-'18 budget. I had a contract that we could not get completed within the time, and if we did that, we lose a significant portion of work that we had planned in Precinct 1," Klinksiek said. "It was for seal-coat related

items, which is a little bit different than the seal coat project. It was \$262,000.'

In other business, commissioners voted to table action on a request from Delek US Holdings, the owner of the former Alon USA refinery in Big Spring, for a pipeline right-ofway on the old Howard County Airport land.

BACKGROUND:

Robert James "RJ" Volker was born and raised in Big Spring. He graduated from Big Spring High School in 2003.

After attending Universal Technical Institute in Houston for automotive collision repair in 2004, he worked at the Big Spring Collision Center until he enlisted in the United States Army in 2005, just three days after his younger brother, Jonathan, left for basic training for the United States Navy.

In 2006, RJ was killed in Baghdad, Iraq after suffering injuries from an improvised explosive device that detonated near his High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle (HMMWV).

Congressman Jodey Arrington is a member of the U.S. House of Representatives serving the Nineteenth Congressional District of Texas. He serves as a member of the House Agriculture Committee, House Budget Committee, Joint Select Committee on Budget and Appropriations Process Reform, and Chairman of the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Economic Opportunity.

Sen. Ted Cruz, challenger Beto **O'Rourke to** hold 2nd debate

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -Republican incumbent Ted Cruz and Democratic challenger Beto O'Rourke will take part in another hourlong debate as their U.S. Senate race nears Election Day.

The debate will be the second between the pair and will be televised at 8 p.m. Oct. 16 from KENS-TV to San Antonio viewers. It will also air live in 10 of the state's largest markets.

The topics are expected to focus on domestic and foreign policy issues.

Cruz and O'Rourke discussed domestic policy issues during a Sept. 21 debate at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. However, a scheduled debate last Saturday in Houston was canceled as Senate Republicans considered voting on Brett Kavanaugh's confirmation to the Supreme Court. That vote was delayed.

The Wednesday ruling means 44-year-old John Earl Nolley has been declared innocent in the 1996 slaying of Sharon McLane. The order also makes Nolley eligible for state compensation.

State District Judge Louis Sturns apologized to Nolley for the state's actions.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals overturned Nolley's conviction in May, leading to Wednesday's ruling.

Nolley was freed in 2016 after a witness admitted he lied and a bloody palm print at the crime scene was linked to another person.

The witness who lied was a jailhouse informant. Houston City Council moves to block robot brothel opening

Texas judge exonerates man

wrongly imprisoned for 19 years

HOUSTON -- Houston's City Council has changed a city ordinance in a move that would essentially stop a so-called robot brothel from opening.

A Canadian company had said it wants to open a "love dolls brothel" in Houston in which people would be able to use its human-like dolls on the premises.

But Houston's City Council on Wednesday unanimously approved a change to a city ordinance that regulates sexually-oriented businesses.

The change would ban individuals from having sex with an "anthropomorphic device," a device resembling a human being.

Houston City Council member Greg Travis said the proposed robot brothel is "not a good business for our city. We are not sin city."

The company, KinkySdollS, didn't immediately return emails seeking comment Wednesday. The company has previously opened such a business in Toronto.

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Opening lead — king of clubs. This deal occurred in a match between Poland and France in the final of the 1984 World Team Olympiad. It illustrates the important role judgment and instinct can play when there is no scientific way of determining what to do in a difficult situation.

When a Polish pair held the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. Following West's leap to five clubs, North jumped to six spades, gambling that his partner had at most one club loser and at least one ace. South's actual hand vindicated North's judgment, and Poland scored

1,430 points.

At the second table, where a French pair were North-South, West likewise jumped to five clubs. Here, too, the French North came to the same conclusion as his Polish counterpart and bid six spades.

But at this table, the Polish West now displayed excellent judgment of his own. After his partner and South passed, he decided to trust his opponents, and, with the vulnerability in his favor, he bid seven clubs. North doubled, and West went down five. But the 900-point loss (which would be 1,100 at today's scoring), combined with the outcome at the other table, yielded a net gain of 530 points - 11 IMPs — for Poland.

Of course, if South had held two clubs and East one - certainly a real possibility — the slam would not have been made. In that case, the Poles would have suffered a net loss of 1,000 points - 14 IMPs.

West's final action was also strictly a matter of judgment, and in the actual case the Polish West proved to be right. Usually, a player who pre-empts does not bid again, but the Polish West here decided to exercise his independent judgment.

The Poles had the edge in this department on a substantial number of other deals, and as a result easily defeated the French to take the 1984 world title.

Missouri down to 1 abortion clinic amid legal battle

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — Missouri is down to one clinic providing abortions Wednesday, after the only other clinic in the state that performs the procedure failed to adhere to new state requirements and its license expired.

The Columbia clinic's abortion license expired Tuesday, Planned Parenthood Great Plains spokeswoman Emily Miller said.

Federal appeals court judges also ruled last month that Missouri can enforce a requirement that doctors must have admitting privileges at nearby hospitals before they can perform abortions. The judges issued a mandate Monday for that rule to officially take effect.

The Columbia Planned Parenthood clinic has been unable to secure physician privileges or find a doctor with those privileges after a panel of medical staff at University of Missouri Health Care voted to stop offering those privileges altogether in 2015 amid a Republican-led legislative investigation on abortion in the state.

Have astronomers found 1st moon outside our solar system?

AP Aerospace Writer CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Astronomers may have found the first moon outside our solar system, a gas behemoth the size of Neptune.

Plenty of planets exist beyond our solar system, but a moon around one of those worlds has yet to be confirmed. Two Columbia University researchers presented their tantalizing evidence for a moon Wednesday.

The potential moon would be considerably larger than Earth tune or Uranus. The planet it orbits is as big as mammoth Jupiter. This apparent supersize pairing of a gaseous moon and planet is 8,000 light-years away.

Researchers Alex Teachey and David Kipping evaluated 284 planets outside our solar system that had already been discovered by NASA's Kepler Space Telescope. Only one planet held promise for hosting a moon, one around the star known as Kepler-1625, which is about the size of our sun but older.

So last October, the pair directed the Hubble Space Telescope at the star in an attempt to verify or rule out — the possibility of a moon orbiting the planet Kepler-1625b. They were on the lookout for a second temporary dimming of starlight. The main dip in stel-

> lar brightness would be the planet itself crossing in front of its star. Another dip could well be a moon — known as an exomoon outside our solar system.

The more powerful and precise Hubble telescope detected a second and smaller decrease in starlight 3 ¹/₂ hours after the planet passed in front of the star — "like a dog following its owner on a leash," as Kipping put it. The observation period, however, ended before the moon could complete its transit. That's why the astronomers need another look with Hubble, hopefully next spring.

Despite the evidence, Teachey stressed "we are urging caution here.""The first exomoon is obviously an extraordinary claim and it requires extraordinary evidence," Teachey said. "Furthermore, the size we've calculated for this moon, about the size of Neptune, has hardly been anticipated and so that, too, is reason to be careful here."

He added: "We're not cracking open Champagne bottles just yet on this one."

If indeed a moon, it would be about 2 million miles (3 million kilometers) from its planet and appear twice as big in its sky, as the moon does in ours. The astronomers are uncertain how this potential moon might have formed, given its size.

Earlier, Pompeo denounced the Iranian case before the U.N. court as "meritless" and said the Treaty of Amity was meaningless and absurd.

"The Iranians have been ignoring it for an awfully long time, we ought to have pulled out of it decades ago," he told reporters at the State Department. The little-known treaty with Iran was among numerous such ones signed in the wake of World War II as the Truman and Eisenhower administrations tried to assemble a coalition of nations to counter the Soviet Union. Like many of the treaties, this one was aimed at encouraging closer economic relations and regulating diplomatic and consular ties. Its first article reads: "There shall be firm and enduring peace and sincere friendship between the United States of America and Iran." The treaty survived the 1979 overthrow of the Shah in Iran's Islamic revolution and the subsequent hostage crisis that crippled American-Iranian relations for decades. But amid a broader push to assert U.S. sovereignty in the international arena and after pulling out of the Iran nuclear deal this year, the administration determined that the court case made the treaty irrelevant.

Lawsuit accuses **Facebook of enabling** human traffickers **By JUAN A. LOZANO**

HOUSTON — A human trafficking survivor from Texas sued Facebook this week, alleging the social media platform provides human traffickers an unrestricted way to "stalk, exploit, recruit, groom ... and extort children into the sex trade." The lawsuit was filed Monday in Houston against Facebook, the shuttered classifieds site Backpage.com and the owners of two Houston hotels. The suit seeks at least \$1 million in damages on behalf of a woman identified as "Jane Doe," who was 15 years old when she was sexually assaulted in 2012 after being allegedly targeted and recruited by a sex trafficker on Facebook. Facebook did not immediately return an email seeking comment on Tuesday. An attorney for Dallas-based Backpage.com didn't immediately return a phone call. According to the lawsuit, Facebook should be held liable for the conduct of sex traffickers because the social media site has become the "first point of contact between sex traffickers and these children. Facebook not only provides an unrestricted platform for these sex traffickers to target children, but it also cloaks the traffickers with Surgery) credibility." Annie McAdams, an attorney for the woman who filed Available) the suit, said her

client was befriended by another Facebook user who gained her trust and promised her a job as a model.

But, McAdams said, the other person forced her into sex trafficking within hours of meeting her. She was raped and beaten by people who had paid the trafficker, the attorney said. McAdams alleged Facebook has not done enough to ensure that users aren't able to hide their identities from unsuspecting minors who may be targets of traffickers or to warn minors of the dangers posed by traffickers and how they can operate online. "It was not just because a pimp did something that Jane Doe was trafficked. That pimp is not able to traffic Jane Doe unless Facebook allowed him access to her," McAdams said. The lawsuit comes after President Donald Trump in April signed a new law aimed at curbing sex trafficking. The law weakens a legal shield for online services that host abusive content, including sex trafficking.

WASHINGTON – In response to a U.N. court order that the U.S. lift sanctions on Iran, the Trump administration said Wednesday it was terminating a decades-old treaty affirming friendly relations between the two countries. The largely symbolic gesture highlights deteriorating relations between Washington and Tehran.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said withdrawing from the 1955 Treaty of Amity was long overdue and followed Iran "groundlessly" bringing a complaint with the International Court of Justice challenging U.S. sanctions on the basis that they were a violation of the pact.

Meanwhile, national security adviser John Bolton said the administration also was pulling out of an amendment to the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations

tably the Palestinians, could use to sue the U.S. at The Hague-based tribunal. Bolton told reporters at the White House that the provision violates U.S. sovereignty.

"The United States will not sit idly by as basepoliticized claims less are brought against us," Bolton said. He cited a case brought to the court by the "so-called state of Palestine" challenging the move of the U.S. Embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem as the main reason for withdrawing.

Bolton, who last month unleashed a torrent of criticism against the International Criminal Court, noted that previous Republican administrations had pulled out of various international agreements and bodies over "politicized cases." He said the administration would review all accords that might subject the U.S. to prosecution by international courts



Bulldogs get ready for district as they head into bye week

The Bulldogs head into a bye week this week coming off another heartbreaking last minute loss to Iraan last Friday. Coahoma has suffered two closing second losses in their last three games to drop to 2-3 on the season as they prepare for district play. With a failed two point conversion that would have given them the win in the closing minutes against Wink three weeks ago and a completed pass that left them literally inches short of the goal line as time ran out last week versus Iraan, the Bulldogs could have just as easily been a 4-1 team rather than 2-3 headed into district competition next week. Those tough losses and the great second half comebacks that led up to those two close finishthe playoffs in the very competitive district 2-3A.

Offensively the Bulldogs have been fantastic so far this season averaging 31 points and 380 yards of total offense per game so far this year. With a dominant ground game that has racked up an average of 287 yards per contest leading the way for the explosive Coahoma offense, the Bulldogs are able to control the tempo and the time of possession against most teams the face. Quarterback Zack Schneider leads the vaunted rushing attack with 896 yards rushing on 106 carries for an impressive 8.45 yards per carry average.

Schneider also leads the team in rushing touchdowns with 16 house calls already this season. Coahoma' running-backs Isaac Murillo and Brysen Kerby have added to the Bulldogs' dominating run game as well. Murillo has carried the ball 51 times for 361 yards and 5 touchdowns with an outstanding 7 yard per carry average as Coahoma's primary back this season.

The Buffs gear up for another tough test against Wink

Coming off their best complete game of the season last week in a tough last minute loss to Reagan County, the Buffs (0-5) welcome in the 4-1 Wink Wildcats this week to close out their pre-district schedule with yet another stiff test. Wink enters Friday night's matchup with Forsan following a huge 55-6 victory over New Home last week for their fourth straight victory. The Wildcats bring a high powered balanced offensive attack into the game. Averaging 31 points and 370 all purpose yards per game this season, Wink has the ability to put up points on both the ground and through the air. Led by star quarterback Nick Gray, who averages 172 passing yards per game, with major contributions from standout running-back Kaneon Baker, averaging 112 rushing yards per game, and dangerous wide-receiver Wade Halterman, who averages 117 receiving yards per game, the Wildcats are a three headed monster that the Buffs will have to play their best team defense to contain.

Offensively the Buffs are starting to find their identity with first year starting quarterback Kobe Richardson making big strides each week in his development and play at the position. With Richardson coming into his own the rest of the offensive unit really started to gel last week too and put together some really impressive sustained drives against a very good Reagan County team. Forsan has struggled at times to get things going on the ground but the Buffs have done a good job of maintaining balance and keeping defenses honest, especially against the Owls last week. The Buffs are averaging 16 points and 217 total yards of offense per game so far this season. While those numbers may not impress, this young Forsan team has played some really stout defensive units this year and as their line play continues to improve week after week, look for those numbers to jump up as well.

Averaging just 22 points per game so far this year while putting up over 300 yards of total offense per game, it is clear that the offense can move the ball up and down the field but have struggled to put the ball across the goal line once they get inside the red-zone. "We are still trying to find and solidify our identity as an offense. We have the weapons and have played really good in spots this year, but we have yet to build the chemistry and comfort needed to really say 'this is who we are' as a unit up to this point" said offensive coordinator Tony Cortez. "We have really worked on getting some of our playmakers in better positions this week and keeping our tempo where we want it to be as an offense. We believe that we have the ability to really create some problems for teams in the up tempo passing game and thats what we are trying to build our identity around moving forward" said Cortez.

Defensively Big Spring has been a team defined by sustained solid defense interrupted by huge splash plays by the opposition. The Steers have given up 25 points per game this season but a majority of those points have come off of big plays. Very rarely has a team put together a long sustained scoring drive against Big Spring this season which bodes well for the Steers' defense as they move forward. "We just have to work on cutting out the big plays and keeping things in front of us. A lot of that is on us as a coaching staff, we have to make sure we have our kids in good position and keep things simple schematically so they can play fast without having to think so much" said defensive coordinator Cannon McWilliams. "If we can limit the big splash plays, we have a really solid defensive unit and can make it really tough for teams to execute what they want to do against us" said McWilliams.

All-in-all Big Springs' matchup against the Eagles this week should be a perfect test and chance for the Steers to really get a good look at where they stand as a team and what they need to improve on as they get closer to their district schedule. If Big Spring can find a way to put together some sustained scoring drives and cut down on the big plays on defense they have a good chance to play spoiler and hand the Eagles their first loss of the season. "We are really proud of how hard our kids have fought all year. If we can clean up some of our mistakes and execute the way we are capable then we know we have the ability to beat anyone we face" said head coach Mitch McLemore.

The Steers and the Eagles are set to kickoff at 7:00 p.m. this Friday at Memorial Stadium. Come celebrate homecoming with the entire Steer Nation family and lets show this team we are behind them all the way!

Kerby has played well in relief of Murillo chewing up 131 yards on 20 carries for a 6.5 yard per carry average to round out the multiple threat run game of the Bulldogs.

The one troubling stat for Coahoma as they head into a bye week is their passing game. With only 464 yards through the air and 9 interceptions to only 1 touchdown, the Bulldogs risk being one dimensional headed into a district with some stout defenses. That said, there is little doubt that head coach Chris Joslin has yet to show his full hand offensively this season. If anyone is aware of the Bulldogs lack of production in the passing game, coach Joslin and his star quarterback certainly are. I expect to see some really innovative wrinkles and schemes to help get Schneider on track through the air once district begins. Defensively the Bulldogs have allowed 29 points per game so far this season. Though that number seems high, Coahoma has faced some really talented offensive teams and most of those points have come in the first

half against the Bulldogs. Each week Coahoma has given up some points to start the game but have made some great halftime adjustments and limited their opponents in the second half. Their ability to identify and correct how their defense is being attacked at the half has afforded them and their offense the opportunity to make some great second half comebacks already this year. With a full extra week to prepare and install their game plan this week for Idalou, along with the return of defensive lineman Jonathon Schneider to their front, look for the Bulldogs to get some stops early and try to take control of the game from the onset.

Zack Schneider is a leader on the Coahoma defense as well with 47 tackles and 1 interception from the safety position. Up front outstanding defensive end Keegan Dobbs leads the way with 36 tackles, 5 tackles for a loss, 6 sacks and 1 fumble recovery. Gaige Hill, Joe Manning, Avry Burgans and Alek Duenes have each played a key role and contributed big plays for the Bulldogs' defense this year too. This week should be a great opportunity for the coaches and players to all get on the same page and really put together a great plan of attack for their district opener against Idalou.


