Local Wound Care Center raises awareness of diabetic foot ulcer recurrence

BIG SPRING - The Wound Care Center at Scenic Mountain Medical Center, a member of the Healogics network, is participating in Healogics' National

Diabetes Campaign from October 29 to November 2. Scenic Mountain Medical Center offers advanced therapies to

patients suffering

from chronic wounds like diabetic foot ulcers. Team members across the nation will dedicate the entire week to visiting local physician offices to provide education on the treatment of potential or existing chronic wounds for people living with diabetes.

An estimated 30.3 million people in the United States (9.4 percent of the population) have diabetes, including 7.2 million who are unaware they are living with

the disease. The percentage of adults with diabetes in-

creases with age, reaching a high of 25.2 percent among those aged 65 years

or older. In addition to age, risk factors for diabetes include diet, activity level, obesity and heredity. High

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blood sugar levels, poor circulation, immune systems issues, nerve damage and infection may contribute to a diabetic foot ulcer.

With America's diabetic population expected to nearly double by 2030, it is important that people understand the risks and know the facts associated with diabetic foot ulcers. Approximately 25 percent of people living with diabetes will develop a foot ulcer. As many as 40 percent of people with a healed diabetic foot ulcer will develop a new ulcer within a year. An estimated 14 to 24 percent of people with foot ulcers will experience an amputation. An amputation results in decreased quality of life, increased medical costs and a significantly higher risk of mortality. The five-year mortality rate following a lower extremity amputation is 50 percent.

health and well-being."

Shackelford said the program has been a hit with the kids and their parents.

"I can tell you, our partnership since Ms. Sandy has joined with us at the Boys and Girls Club, it has been a very, very positive influence on our children," he said. "Our children come from all works of life. I generally tell my staff as we're training: 'What you see is what you get.' From A to Z we're going to teach, and we're going to make sure they're equipped with what they need for everyday purposes. During the summer, the average daily attendance is about 150 kids, so for Ms. Sandy to come in and work with us and provide basic cooking skills for our kids, I think that is a

wonderful, wonderful thing." Commissioners reacted favorably to the report and commended Taylor and Shackelford on their success.

In other business, the commissioners:

• Approved renewal of the routine Breath Alcohol Testing Program with Midland College for \$12,540. • Awarded the annual bid for fuel for county vehicles to Parks Fuels for 15 cents per gallon over the cost of the fuel from the refinery.

• Voted to voice no objection to a City of Big Spring zoning change at the intersection of FM 700 and Wasson Road in order to allow an electronic billboard to be installed.

• Voted to approve a 10 percent rebate to an oil company located on County Road 25 in exchange for rebuilding a portion of the road.

• Voted to table a request from Delek

US for to purchase a pipeline easement through the old Howard County Airport campus. Delek had originally requested a 50-foot easement at the Oct. 3 Commissioners Court meeting, but revised their request to a smaller regular-sized easement instead. Delek's initial offer was \$350 per rod of land; Commissioners decided to submit a

counteroffer asking for \$500 per rod instead.

Remainder of the exclusive Trump interview continued from Wednesday's edition of the Herald:

AP: Would you prefer to have an in-person interview or do it this way?

Trump: We'll see how that works out. You know that's in process. It's a tremendous waste of time for the president of the United States. To think that I would be even thinking about using Russia to help me win Idaho. We're using Russia to help me win the great state of Iowa or anywhere else is the most preposterous, embarrassing thing. And I will say that the Democrats know it and they wink. They're all laughing. And you know if I often hear that Russia likes to sow discord. The word is sow, an old English term. They like to sow chaos and discord. Well, if that's the case, you gave it to them on a silver platter because this is ridiculous. This was an excuse made by the Democrats for the reason they lost the electoral college, which gives them a big advantage — a big advantage. Very different than the popular vote. The popular vote would be much easier to win if you were campaigning on it. You know, it's like running the 100-yard dash versus a 10-mile run. You train differently. Nobody explained that to Hillary Clinton, by the way. Someday she'll figure it out. But winning the electoral college is a tremendous advantage for the Democrats. And this was an excuse for how they lost the election. How they lost an election they should have won. And one of the reasons they lost because I happened to be a great candidate. And another reason they lost is that Hillary forgot to campaign in Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania and I guess she needed a lot more time in North Carolina, a lot more time in South Carolina and a lot more time in a place called beautiful, sunny, wonderful place— called Florida.

AP: If I could turn to immigration and the families separated at the border.

Trump: Sure.

AP: There are children who have now been reunited with their families who are now showing signs of trauma from their separation experience.

Trump: By the way, many of the children — and this is unfortunate, I covered it so nicely on '60 Minutes,' but they only put on pieces of it, and they were fine but you know they cut, cut, cut because I guess they have so much time, although I heard that they did very nicely on the show. Did they do well?

AP: They just put out some ratings.

Trump: So congratulations to them, but I wish they would have left the entire answer. When people enter our country illegally, there are consequences to pay. But despite the consequences, you have many children that, sadly, are there without parents. Then you have people that grab children and use them as a prop and it's a disgrace. And they come in with a child and they don't even know who the child is five hours before. And that's a shame. That's a terrible thing what they do.

AP: There are also children whose parents have been deported.

Trump: They take children and they use them to try and come into our country. There are many, many bad things going on on the border. We have the worst laws in the history of the world on immigration, and we're getting them changed one by one. We've made a lot of progress in the last couple of weeks even, but we're getting them changed one by one. But you have children that we're taking care of, that don't even have parents at least anywhere within hundreds of miles of the border, and we're taking those children, caring for those children, and in many cases sending them back to their parents in countries where their parents didn't even make the journey up with them, incredibly. And some of those children are really young. And we are, actually, in fact, today there was a beautiful statement put out by the Washington Examiner congratulating us on the great job we do with children. Now President Obama had the same law; he did the same thing. And, in fact, the picture of children living in cages that was taken in 2014 was a picture of President Obama's administration and the way they handled children. They had the kids living in cages. They thought it was our administration and they used it and then unbeknownst to them and the fake news, they found out, 'Oh my God, this is a terrible situation.' This was during the Obama administration.

President Obama. In fact, it is going the other way. And I think we fought extremely effectively on everything I've wanted to do. Now there will be a certain point where that takes place.

AP: John Bolton, though, told us, told my colleague Jon a couple of weeks ago that troops aren't going to come out, aren't going to leave Syria, until Iran is fully out of Syria.

Trump: We're going to see what happens. We're going to see what happens. I want, No. 1, the safety of our country. And if that means knocking the hell out of them, of terrorists, long before they can ever get here, that's OK with me. And if I could help Europe and other places by doing it, that's OK with me. And they're starting to pay us for that, by the way, much more substantially than they ever paid before. You understand that's an important thing because it's unfair that the burden is all on us. As it has been. But we are ... we've made ... we've had tremendous success there. We've had tremendous success in North Korea, tremendous success in North Korea.

AP: On the subject of American soldiers and military overseas, why have you not yet visited a military base in a combat zone like in Iraq and Afghanistan?

Trump: Well, I will do that at some point, but I don't think it's overly necessary. I've been very busy with everything that's taking place here. We have the greatest economy in the history of our country. I mean, this is the greatest economy we've ever had, best unemployment numbers. Many groups are, you know, we've never even been close to these numbers. I'm doing a lot of things. I'm doing a lot of things. But it's something I'd do. And do gladly. Nobody has been better at the military. Hey, I just got them a pay raise. I haven't had a pay raise in 11 years. I just got them a substantial pay raise. 'They' meaning our military people. I just got them new equipment. They have stuff that was so old that the grandfathers used to fly it. I have done more for the military than any president in many, many years.

AP: Can you give us any update as to the plans for your next meeting with Kim Jong Un?

Trump: Yeah, we will have one, but it is going to be after the midterms because I want to stay around here.

AP: Will it be here, in the United States, sir?

Trump: I want to stay around and help people get elected.

AP: Do you think that meeting would be here? In the U.S.?

Trump: No, I don't think so. I mean, we haven't set it up yet, but I would think not yet. At some point, that will happen, too.

AP: You saw the numbers, the coverage in the last couple of days about deficits. That the projected deficit is a trillion dollars. You railed on President Obama over deficits.

Trump: Excuse me. No. 1, I had to take care of our military. I had no choice but to do it, and I want to take care of our military. We had to do things that we had to do. And I've done them. Now we're going to start bringing numbers down. We also have tremendous numbers with regard to hurricanes and fires and the tremendous forest fires all over. We had very big numbers, unexpectedly big numbers. California does a horrible job maintaining their forests. They're going to have to start doing a better job or we're not going to be paying them. They are doing a horrible job of maintaining what they have. And we had big numbers on tremendous numbers with the forest fires and obviously the hurricanes. We got hit in Texas, Florida, Puerto Rico, Georgia. Georgia was hit very hard this time. Nobody even, you know, treats that one fairly. The farmers got hit very, very hard.

AP: Mitch McConnell said he wants to consider entitlement reform.

Trump: Wants to consider what?

AP: Entitlement reform — changes to Social Security. so

Canada. And one of the things, I said 'I want the NFL fixed,' because it had to do with them keeping revenues from advertising and for not allowing the NFL to advertise in Canada. And it was very unfair and everybody knew that and Canada knew it, too. And Canada plays a very tough game. So I said I want that fixed and nobody wrote a story about it because why would they ever write about it? And, by the way, Commissioner Goodell called me last week and he, 'thank you very much.' But I settled that for the NFL. It took me literally about a minute because that's a small deal compared to the big deal. And Canada knew it was the right thing to do. So I helped a great American corporation. You have to understand, I like the NFL. I want the NFL to do well. I have many friends that are in the NFL, owners and others. I want them to do very well. I also want them standing for the American flag, not kneeling, but I just helped the NFL settle a problem that they couldn't settle for 15 years or something. This has been going on, a vicious battle with Canada, for years. I settled it. And not one person has written about it. Why don't you call what you call Commissioner Goodell and ask him. Roger. He called me last week. I thought he was calling me about the flag to say 'ceasefire.' But he didn't. He called me just to thank me, and I said, 'That was very nice.' It was a very nice phone call. You should do something about it if you want.

AP: Do you plan to pardon Paul Manafort?

Trump: Who?

AP: Paul Manafort.

Trump: I never even was asked about it. I haven't thought about it. But, you know, I think it's a very sad, sad situation. And there's another thing that had nothing to do with me. That was from years before. You do understand that, right? Do you understand that? Do you know these Russian hackers you're talking about from Moscow? They have nothing to do with me. How many people are they? Only 28 people? They have nothing to do with me. They were hackers from Moscow. Some of them supported Hillary Clinton. They had nothing to do with me. You look at all the stuff, it's just nothing to do with me.

AP: Knowing what you know today, is it still appropriate for Secretary Mnuchin to be going to Saudi Arabia next week?

Trump: Well, it depends on what we find out over the next couple of days. He doesn't have to make that determination until Friday, and I think we'll also be guided by what other countries are doing. You know, we'll look at that.

AP: What's your responsibility?

Trump: I do think this. I do think that they have ordered billions, one of the largest military orders in the history of the country. I think that we hurt ourselves far more than we hurt Saudi Arabia when we cancel an order like that.

AP: You've seen American business leaders, though, pull out of that conference. Do you endorse that move?

Trump: Too early to say. I have to find out what happened. Once they find out what happened, I'll be able to tell you exactly.

AP: Would you only serve one term, Mr. President, if you felt like you had done everything you set out to do?

Trump: No. Because the other term ... first of all, there's always things to do. Actually, it's a very nice question because I have done so much. People have said that, 'You've done so much. You may have it all put back together. And our country: Make America Great Again.' And they do ask me that question. So if you do all of the things that you're doing and you're given another two years, which is a lot of time because I've done this in far less than two years, and those papers pretty much say it, they do ask that question. There's always something to do. And you know, the new motto is Keep America Great. I don't want somebody to destroy it because I can do a great job. But the wrong person coming in after me sitting right at this desk can destroy it very quickly, if they don't do the right thing. So no I'm definitely running.

AP: Do you have any regrets or any remorse about how this has impacted children, though?

Trump: Here's the thing. I think we've done an incredible job with children. As I just said, we've taken children who have no parents with them standing on the border. We've taken many children, and I'm not talking about a small percentage, I'm talking about a very large percentage where they have no people, no parents. In addition to that, we're separating children who are just met by people that are using them coming into the border, not their parents. They are using them coming into the border. The one thing I will also say is that when a person thinks they will not be separated, our border becomes overrun with people coming in. So that's another problem. With all of that being said, we're getting the laws changed so that catch and release, so that visa lottery, so that chain migration and every other form of incredible stupidity can be taken out of our system.

White House Press Secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders: I'll send you guys the DHS report that has the numbers that show that, like, 75 percent of the kids were actually self-separated. Their parents chose to go back and signed the paperwork to leave their kids behind.

Trump: The parents would sometimes come up with their kids, leave them at the border and go back. So we're in this position where we have an innocent young child at the border; there are no parents. We take them in, we care for the child and then we get horrible publicity. We should be getting great publicity, and the Washington Examiner did a great piece today on the fact that we've done a great job. And President Obama had the same law. And, by the way, he separated children and there are many pictures of jail cells where the children were separate from the parents.

Trump: We should be getting credit for the job we've done.

AP: Turning to foreign policy, you ran the campaign on bringing American troops home and the America First policy.

Trump: Yes.

AP: But today there are more American troops serving in Afghanistan and in Syria and Iraq, in Africa, in harm's way than when you took office. How do you explain to people at home?

Trump: The main thing I have to see is, I have to see safety at home and — not a vast difference, by the way but a little bit more. But it's not a lot more, it's a little bit more. I have to see safety at home. And if I think people are likely to do some very bad things in faraway places to our homeland, I'm going to have troops there for a period of time. But we've done an excellent job. We've defeated ISIS. ISIS is defeated in all of the areas that we fought ISIS, and that would have never happened under Medicare, Medicaid.

Trump: That I haven't heard.

AP: OK.

Trump: I haven't heard that. I'm leaving Social Security. I'm not touching Social Security.

AP: I know we are quite short on time. We were looking to do kind of a lightning round.

AP: You've spoken about security clearances. Do you have any plans to take any more clearances away any time soon?

Trump: Yeah, I do.

AP: From whom?

Trump: People I don't trust.

AP: Any updates on the White House counsel?

Trump: Yes. I've made a decision. He's ... you've been reading a little bit about it. A very fine man, highly respected by a lot of people: Pat (Cipollone).

AP: And for the U.N. perm rep? For Ambassador Haley's job? Have you made a decision?

Trump: I have many people that want the job. I have such a good relationship with Nikki. And I've talked to her about it, too. I will be talking to her about it. But I have many people that want the job, and I would say I'll be making that decision over the next week or two. They're going to work with Nikki for a little while. She going to go till the end of the year, and they'll be working

with Nikki.

AP: You've been very critical, the last year or so, of the NFL. This year, actually, rating are up a little bit. What do you make of that? What does that say about ...?

Trump: Hey, look, I did the NFL a big favor. You know that, right?

AP: By calling attention to it?

Trump: No. You didn't know this? You didn't know this?

AP: Tell us, sir.

Trump: So the NFL was having a tremendous problem with Canada on the Super Bowl and advertising and all sorts of things very complicated subject. And in about two seconds, I got, in about 30 seconds, I got that one fixed up for the NFL. They're going to make a tremendous amount of additional money because of what I did for them. It was a favor for them and it wasn't for NFL, it was that this is a great American company. I was negotiating against AP: Is there someone in particular you'd like to run against?

Trump: So far, all of them. So far, all of them. I don't see any talent. No talent.

AP: No one you're worried about?

Trump: I see no talent.

AP: Vice President Biden? Or Sen. Warren? Or anyone? Trump: Well, Biden ran twice and actually a lot of people think he really ran a third time, but he was so low in the polls that he never registered. But he ran twice. And I call him One Percent Joe because you know he did very poorly and then Obama took him off the trash heap and made him vice president. And in a sense he did a good job as vice president, in my opinion, because Obama liked him, and if President Obama didn't like him, you would have been hearing about it. So in that sense, he, I think, he did actually a nice job because the president of the United States felt very comfortable about him. Like, I like my vice president very, very much. That's an important function.

AP: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Trump: Thank you all.

FACT CHECK: Cruz, **O'Rourke claims cite** taxes, immigration



U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas, takes part in a debate for Cruz said during his Feb. 15 statement the Texas U.S. Senate with U.S. Rep. Beto O'Rourke, on the Senate floor. D-Texas, Tuesday, Oct. 16, 2018, in San Antonio.

A look at claims made in their debate Tuesday in San Antonio:

O'ROURKE: "Ted Cruz invested more than \$5 million in Cambridge Analytica, which is the very company that helped to undermine our democracy, to feed false news and false opinions to our fellow Americans."

THE FACTS: Cruz didn't personally invest \$5 million in Cambridge Analytica, the campaign consulting firm that was accused earlier this year of misusing data from 87 million Facebook accounts to target voters during elections. But Cruz's 2016 presidential campaign did spend millions of dollars purchasing the group's services.

Federal campaign finance reports show Cruz's presidential campaign committee spent \$5.8 million with Cambridge Analytica between July 2015 and June 2016. The firm's work for the campaign included voter targeting, digital media and survey research, according to the Federal Election Commission's records.

In 2016, Cambridge helped the Cruz campaign send direct messages telling Iowa residents who live near red light cameras that the senator opposes their use.

Allegations that the firm improperly accessed personal information from Facebook users surfaced in March of this year, when the New York Times and The Guardian reported on the breach and Cambridge's work with Trump's campaign. Facebook suspended the firm and its CEO Mark Zuckerberg testified before the Senate on the privacy missteps.

A Cambridge Analytica whistleblower said the firm identified voters and targeted them with messages that were true or untrue.

The now defunct company denied allegations that it used Facebook data to develop fake news or that the improperly accessed data was used to help Trump's campaign.

CRUZ: "Congressman O'Rourke voted in favor of a \$10 a barrel tax on every barrel of oil produced in the state of Texas." THE FACTS: Cruz's claim sparked a strong reaction from O'Rourke, who said the senator was being dishonest. But Cruz was correct. O'Rourke did cast a vote in the House in favor of such an oil tax that never became law. The vote in June 2016 was on a symbolic resolution opposing President Barack Obama's proposal to tax \$10 on every barrel of crude oil . O'Rourke voted against the resolution, which put him on the

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record favoring the tax. The Republicancontrolled House passed the measure.

O'ROURKE: "When the Senate voted to move forward on debate for (young immigrants) Dreamers, 98 Senators showed up that day, 97 voted to move forward. Only one senator voted no."

THE FACTS: O'Rourke is correct. Cruz cast the lone vote against advancing an immigration measure for debate on the Senate floor in February of this year. The debate was over a route to citizenship for young immigrants brought to the U.S. by their parents who were shielded from deportation as part of the Obama-era Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program. Recipients of that program are commonly called "Dreamers."

In a speech to Congress, Cruz said he was "flabbergasted with my own party" for considering an agreement that would allow some immigrants living in the U.S. illegally to apply for citizenship.

"I do not believe we should be grant-AP photo ing citizenship to anyone here illegally,"

> While Cruz's Republican colleagues agreed to engage in an immigration de-

bate with Democrats in February, days later the Senate rejected bipartisan proposals to strengthen border security while establishing a permanent solution for Dreamers to avoid deportation.

For years, Cruz has criticized policies that create

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citizenship pathways for anyone living in the country illegally. In 2016 he said he would work to deport the estimated 12 million immigrants if elected president.

CRUZ: "Congressman O'Rourke is the only Democratic Senate candidate in the country who has explicitly come out in favor of impeaching President Trump."

THE FACTS: At least one other Democratic U.S. Senate candidate has publicly supported Trump's impeachment. But other Democratic U.S. Senate candidates have not gone as far as O'Rourke's statement that he would vote to impeach Trump.

California state Sen. Kevin de Leon, who is challenging U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein in the November election, told The Associated Press earlier this year he would vote to impeach Trump.

On the campaign trail in July, O'Rourke said that he would vote to impeach the president. He made the comment to the Dallas Morning News, a day after Republicans and Democrats alike rebuked Trump's statements about the U.S. intelligence community in a press conference with Russian President Vladimir Putin in Helsinki, Finland.

"Standing on stage in another country with the leader of another country who wants to and has sought to undermine this country, and to side with him over the United States - if I were asked to vote on this I would vote to impeach the president," O'Rourke told the newspaper.

Prior to that, O'Rourke had avoided calls to impeach the president. He twice voted to table a House resolution, introduced by fellow Democrats, to impeach the president in December and January.

Academic Star Student of the Week Kynleigh Toy, Big Spring High School



Worley is a senior at CHS and is the Coahoma Chapter president. She was selected to be a delegate at nationals through a lengthy election process. First she was interviewed by a nominating committee, took a quiz to show her FFA knowledge and gave a speech in front of an audience around 450 to 500 of her peers. She was then elected by her peers. Wells, a junior, is a trumpet player in the high school band and is the Coahoma Chapter

Chaplin. She will join musicians from around the nation who were all selected through a video audition process to play during the convention.

Although not attending the convention, Emilee Custer will be the only FFA member from Texas who will be featured at We are FFA booth at the national convention. Emilee's photo and biography will be shown with students across the nation to show off FFA's model members. Custer is the Coahoma Chapter 1st vice president.

This is the largest representation of Coahoma FFA members to attend the national convention under the 17-year tenure of advisor Aaron Custer. Since joining Coahoma ISD, Aaron Custer has seen the FFA program grow tremendously. Currently, 120 students are members of the Coahoma Chapter up from 100 last year.

Besides boasting a state champion in the 2017 LDE competition, the Coahoma Chapter had two teams place in the top 10 in the state their division - Radio Broadcasting and Ag Advocacy.

FFA - Future Farmers of America - is a national program designed to bring about personal growth, leadership skills, and community mindedness in young people through agricultural education.

Running a spread style offense, like the Steers do, puts a lot on the quarterback and the success and failure of that style of play is heavily dependent on the QB's ability to make the right reads and keep the offense out of bad plays and bad down and distances. Cortez has done a good job protecting the ball for Big Spring and has shown real promise with his ability to make the right reads, his arm strength and his ability to run as well.

Where the Steers have really struggled on offense is giving up the big negative plays. Far to many times during this pre-district the Steers get into scoring position and then have multiple plays for a loss that have ended promising drives. If there is one spot Cortez could improve it would be in getting rid of the ball when a play breaks down. That said, it is a double edged sword because you don't want your quarterback giving up too early on plays, while at the same time you want them to prevent as many negative plays as possible. That is a lot to ask of a sophomore quarterback at this level no matter how gifted they are, especially when they are under constant pressure like Cortez has been.

On defense, just like on offense, there are very few teams that can match the athleticism that the Steers have on the field. With speed off the edge and in the secondary, on paper Big Spring looks like they would be able to match up with and stop anyone they face. But what has happened more often than not is blown assignments leading to huge splash plays down the field. The Steers have given up a disappointing 31 points per game so far this year despite showing great promise at times in almost every game.

It's hard to pinpoint exactly what has lead to Big Springs' struggles on defense, but the offense putting them in bad positions has cer-

tainly had something to do with it. There has also been some poor tackling at times especially against power run teams and at least one blown coverage deep in the secondary in each of their losses. Mental mistakes have cost the Steers big this pre-district and they will have to clean up those mistakes as they welcome in the high flying Andrews' offense to start district. Blown coverages against the pass oriented Mustangs can put the game out of reach early if the Steers aren't careful.

It has been a tough pre-district for Big Spring, there is no denying that. But with two wins already this year and with talent on both sides of the ball there is no reason why this Steers team can't put it together now and make a push for the playoffs. 
