

**TxDOT provides updates on Big Spring** 87 and FM 700 construction site

Rain Thursday once again slowed progress on road and bridge construction at the section of Interstate 20 and intersection of FM 700 and South US Highway 87 Thursday. Weather and a faulty concrete pour have delayed the project, but a TXDoT spokesperson said the project is still on track to finish up before the end of 2018.

You may have noticed: The Texas Department of Transportation is doing some work on major thoroughfares in and around the Big Spring area. This week, Public Information Officer Cheryl Sawyers of the Abilene TXDoT office spoke with the Herald to provide updates on the various projects around town.

Spring's famous Big "crossroads" is at the inter-U.S. Highway 87, but for many Big Spring residents, the intersection of 87 with

FM 700 is just as vital to everyday travel. Construction on the intersection, including the US 87 bridge over FM 700, has been going on now for several months. Unfortunately, Sawyers said a combination of weather and a bad concrete pour had delayed the project slightly.

"They're still expecting that one to be complete before the end of the year," said Sawyers. "They were planning to have it done by the end of November, but now it might be a couple of weeks into December."

# Odessa Police Offering Mail Fraud & Identity Theft Prevention Tips to Public

The Odessa Police Department has recently experienced a rash of mail thefts being committed in Odessa. Thieves are stealing mail by having it forwarded to vacant properties and then committing mail fraud, credit card abuse, identity theft and writing counterfeit checks.

If you suspect that your mail has been stolen, you can monitor your mail and track packages by going to usps.com and clicking on "Informed Delivery" on the top right of the screen. This free service allows you to digitally preview your mail and manage your packages scheduled to arrive for that day.

If you have been a victim of mail fraud, please contact OPD and report it to the United States Postal Inspection Service by going to http:// postalinspectors.uspis.gov. If you have been a victim of identity theft, please contact OPD and report it to the Federal Trade Commission by going to www.consumer.gov/idtheft.

#### Identity Theft/Mail Fraud Prevention Tips:

1) Install a locked mailbox to prevent mail theft.

2) Deposit outgoing mail at a Post Office or a blue U.S. Postal Service collection box, or give it directly to your mail carrier.

3) Shred all preapproved credit card applications, loan applications, voided checks, and bank statements before throwing them in the trash.

4) Monitor your credit, all credit card statements, and bank statements on a regular basis.

5) If your wallet or personal identification has been stolen, contact all of your credit card companies, your bank, and all three major credit bureaus and ask them to place a fraud alert on your credit report.

Sawyers added that the estimate is based on clear weather; continued rain could delay the project further.

TXDoT urges drivers to use care at the intersection and follow posted traffic markers.

Another area of concern to many area drivers is the US 87 relief route, which carries through traffic around the west side of the city rather than through the middle of town on Gregg Street. The southern section of the route, connecting Interstate 20 to US 87 south of Big Spring, was completed in 2016; construction on the northern section, linking Interstate 20 to US 87 north of town, began in February of 2017, and should wrap up early next year.

"They are currently paved with the first part of hot mix. The bridge deck is being replaced, and they are slightly behind schedule, but the completion date is still expected for the spring. That's the relief route west of Big Spring from I-20 to 87," Sawyers said. "Several parts of the route are paved with the first part of hot mix, but as I understand it they're going to need to come back and do the painting, the striping and also the reflective markers. They're going to widen Highway 176 under the 87 bridge. Due to the weather – we've been getting rain now for what, three weeks in a row? We're a little behind schedule."

Some good news for people traveling east or arriving in Big Spring from the east – construction out that way is almost done.

"The construction on the east side of Big Spring – that is expected to end at the end of this month," said Sawyers. "There's some construction on 20, if you're going eastbound on 20 out of Big Spring, there's some construction. You know where 20 and Business 20 feed in together at the end of Big Spring? That is supposed to end at the end of October."



# Reflections: First Man

Last weekend we slipped into one of the premier showings of First Man, the movie portraying Neil Armstrong's first steps on the moon. The movie takes us on board the X-15, Gemini and Apollo. We feel that we are there, experiencing the sheer terror of it all, pushing the limits of technology to land a man on the moon. The movie is gripping, as is the history.



married on December 21, 1968, the day Apollo 8 launched to carry the first men to orbit the moon. They reached the moon 3 days later. On Christmas Eve, just BILL before they dis-

TINSLEY appeared to the other side of the

moon and lost contact radio with the earth, Borman and his

crew read the Genesis account of creation. (Genesis 1:1-10). In the distance the earth appeared as a fragile planet on the moon's hori-

zon.

Six and  $\frac{1}{2}$  months later we sat in front of our black and white TV and watched Neil Armstrong leap from the last rung of the Lunar Lander's ladder to take "one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."

James Irwin served as the commander and pilot for the lunar lander on Apollo 15. He became the 8th astronaut to step foot on the moon. After his return Irwin founded the High Flight Foundation as non-denominational evangelical organization based in Colorado Springs. He said, "Some people make light of it and ask how can a technical person, an astronaut, believe in the Bible. I guess I also was a skeptic in my early days, but I have come to believe what the Bible says as being true."

The last man to walk on the moon was Gene Cernan, commander of Apollo 17 in December 1972. Cernan described his experience. "I felt the world was just too beautiful to have happened by accident. There has to be something bigger than you and bigger than me. ... There has to be a Creator of the universe who

stands above the religions that we ourselves create to govern ourselves."

We don't know much about Neil Armstrong's faith. Like every other aspect of his life, as portrayed in the movie, he was closely guarded. But Thomas Friedman includes an account about Neil Armstrong's visit to Jerusalem that is telling, if true. According to Friedman, when Armstrong visited the Temple in Jerusalem he asked his guide if these were the very steps where Jesus stepped. When his guide confirmed they were, Armstrong reportedly said, "I have to tell you, I am more excited stepping on these steps than I was stepping on the moon."

If Friedman's account in his book, From Beirut to Jerusalem, is true, Armstrong's words reflect the greater miracle: not that man stepped foot on the moon, but that God stepped foot on earth in the person of His Son. As John wrote, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us and we saw His glory, glory as the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14).

## Tauren Wells wins 4, including new artist, at Dove Awards

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Christian artist Tauren Wells won four awards including new artist and contemporary Christian artist of the year at the 49th annual Gospel Music Association's Dove Awards.

Wells, who was the former lead singer for Christian rock group Royal Tailor, performed "Known" from his solo debut album, "Hills and Valleys," during Tuesday's award show from Lipscomb University in Nashville, Tennessee.

Wells also won awards for pop/ contemporary album of the year and also got an award for being a featured artist on the rap/hip hop recorded song of the year with Social Club Misfits.

Wells accepted new artist of the year slightly out of breath, explaining that he had been backstage changing clothes when the award was announced and rushed to get to the stage without even knowing what award he had won.

"I am so grateful - what award is this?" Wells said. "New artist of the year?! Woah!" Backstage after the show, Wells said that "Known" was about one of the God's lessons for him about image.

"While it's great to pose for all these pictures and getting to hold all these trophies, this doesn't matter as much as what is happening inside our hearts," Wells said.

Cory Asbury, a worship pastor in Kalamazoo, Michigan, rode the success of his No. 1 Christian single "Reckless Love" to three awards for song of the year, worship song of the year and worship album of

Rap duo Social Club Misfits from Florida won rap/hip hop recorded song of the year for their song "War Cry," a song they wrote after the high school shooting in Parkland, Florida.

David Price put his postseason woes behind him, pitching the Red Sox past the defending champion Houston Astros 4-1 Thursday night in Game 5 of the AL Championship Series.

Next stop for the 108win Red Sox is Fenway Park for the World Series opener Tuesday night against either the Los Angeles Dodgers or Milwaukee Brewers.

But before leaving Minute Maid Park, the Red Sox surrounded the 43-year-old Cora in the clubhouse and heartily sang "happy birthday!"

Closing in on a full recovery from a devastating college knee injury, the former Notre Dame linebacker is making the Cowboys' draft gamble of two years ago look like a good one.

FRISCO, Texas – Jaylon Smith makes himself presentable for the cameras, then turns to his locker to grab one last thing before starting an interview: the neck pad given to him by hard-nosed defensive coordinator Rod Marinelli to acknowledge the Dallas linebacker's physical style of play.

The former Notre Dame standout is proud of the memento. It still hangs loosely around his neck in front of reporters weeks after he got it, while Smith invariably gets another question about the painstaking recovery from a devastating left knee injury in his final college game.

Smith is doing more than just playing again two years after owner and general manager Jerry Jones gambled early in the draft on a player considered a top prospect before the career-threatening injury.

He has helped the defense surge into the top five while Sean Lee missed three games with a hamstring injury, when the opposite often happened in recent years during the oft-injured two-time Pro Bowler's absences. The Cowboys (3-3) visit Washington (3-2) on Sunday.

"It's just about doing my job and understanding the player that Jerry drafted," Smith said. "He believed in me. The Cowboys organization believed in me, that I would get back to this point of being a top-five pick. It's not a surprise to me. It's expected. It was just a matter of time."

With Lee out, Smith has a key companion in rookie first-round pick Leighton Vander Esch, who leads the Cowboys with 60 tackles while Smith has 57. No other Dallas defender has more than 35.

But the 2015 All-America at Notre Dame is the middle linebacker making most of the calls and displaying leadership skills that attracted the Cowboys to him in the first place, when Dallas and plenty of other teams were wondering if he could play again.

A case in point is also one of Smith's signature plays this season. Before sprinting to the sideline to deliver a hard shoulder hit that stopped Houston guarterback Deshaun Watson on fourth down near the goal line, Smith told DeMarcus Lawrence, "I got you."

That was Smith's way of turning Dallas' star pass rusher loose on Watson, and believing he could clean up the play wherever Watson decided to scramble.

"It's just the trust, the growth and my leadership and my respect on this team," Smith said. "People understanding that they can count on me and this team believes that."

Smith probably wouldn't have done that during his inconsistent debut a year ago, when it was generally acknowledged by coach Jason Garrett and others that he was forced to play too much because of injuries at linebacker and struggled as a result.

This season, Smith is no longer playing with a foot brace designed to help overcome the nerve damage associated with tearing a ligament in his knee during Notre Dame's 44-28 loss to Ohio State in the Orange Bowl on New Year's Day 2016.

GLENDALE, Ariz. -There were a lot of orange-clad Denver fans in the stands in Arizona.

They must have loved watching the Broncos beat down the host Cardinals 45-10 Thursday night.

"That was unbelievable," Denver quarterback Case Keenum said afterward. "It felt like a home game there for a lot of it. That was impressive. That was really cool."

After four straight losses, the Broncos (3-4) took control early, returning two interceptions of Josh Rosen's passes for first-quarter touchdowns. Denver led 21-3 after one quarter and 35-3 at the half, giving a rare breather of a win to embattled coach Vance Joseph.

"That's more about our football team. I'm not concerned about me," Joseph said. "It's a good win for our football team. It has been a tough, tough two weeks. We had a tough loss on Sunday. We had a short week, so it's really good for our team to win a game."

The Cardinals (1-6) have lost their first four home games for the first time since 1979, nearly a decade before the

franchise moved from St. Louis to the desert. "Definitely an embar-

rassing effort tonight," first-year coach Steve Wilks said. "Our fans deserve more than that. We have to perform better than that. Six sacks, three interceptions. It can go on and on. Unacceptable."

Arizona offensive coordinator Mike McCoy had been considered on shaky ground but there's no indication that any move is imminent.

"You guys are going to ask me about changes," Wilks said. "That's premature to talk about any changes right now. Everyone is going to be evaluated across the board."

Here are some things to consider from the Broncos' romp in the desert:

MILLER'S PROMISE

Denver's Von Miller had promised the Broncos would kick the Cardinals' backside and they certainly did.

Miller said he did it to boost the confidence of his teammates.

"And it worked," he said.

Defensive end Zach Kerr agreed.

"It puts an extra fire in us," he said. "You can feel it all week during the preparation. Everyone was zoned in, locked

in. It's a short week, but nobody complained. Nobody said anything, but we just went out there and worked."

#### HARRIS' FLIP

Emmanuel Sanders had a big night, throwing a 28-yard touchdown pass and catching a 64-varder for a score.

On the TD catch, he did a front flip over the goal line. He had said he was going to quit with the flips, but couldn't resist.

"That's what it's about, man, having fun and playing football," Sanders said. "That's how you win games. To catch that pass, I didn't have to do anything but run straight. It was probably one of the easiest touchdown passes I've caught in terms of a deep ball."

**ROSEN'S NIGHT** 

Arizona rookie quarterback Josh Rosen had a tough night.

He threw three interceptions and fumbled the ball away twice. He also was sacked six times.

Rosen said he tried to force things and it backfired.

"This is kind of an old saying I got in college. 'Don't turn a car crash into a fatality," Rosen said. "So I think sometimes you just have to make the smart play.

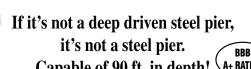

Although we know that it's a rare genetic one, we have no idea where it came from through the family. This disease has no cure or treatment. The only solution is a transplant when kidney function declines to that point. Our hope is that it will be years before my granddaughter will need a transplant.

1. Two hearts. When partner makes a takeout double at his first opportunity, he is assumed to have at least an opening bid with support for the unbid suits. You can therefore treat the situation as if partner had opened the bidding in one of your suits, in which case you would presumably drive to at least a game with the given hand. Eleven high-card points plus a void will normally make a game opposite an opening bid when a known fit exists.

Rather than attempt to guess which suit to jump to game in, you should shift the choice of the trump suit back to partner by cuebidding the opponent's suit. You can then raise whichever suit he selects to game at vour next turn

2. Two clubs. A simple suit response to a takeout double promises no values. Partner commanded you to bid by doubling, and your reply merely indicates which suit you prefer. If anything goes wrong as

a result of obeying partner's edict, the responsibility is his, not yours. 3. Three clubs. In responding to a takeout double, you must distinguish between a forced response with a poor hand and a hand with promising values. If you were to bid two clubs with this hand, as you did in the preceding problem, partner would have no way of knowing whether you had a worthless hand or a good one. A single-jump response is normally made with a good hand (nine to 11 points). The bid is encouraging, but does not force partner to bid again. If vou held an even better hand, you would either have to bid game directly or cuebid the opponent's

suit, as in the first problem. 4. One notrump. A one-notrump response to a takeout double shows about seven to 10 points as well as some strength in the opponent's suit. Here, the notrump response is preferred to two diamonds, as the notrump bid is encouraging, while a two-diamond response could be made with no values.

5. Two notrump (invitational). With 12 points facing an opening bid, game is highly likely unless partner has an absolute minimum. 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

# Spartans, Wolverines showing respect before big matchup

EAST LANSING, Mich. — Michigan State coach Mark Dantonio began his news conference this week by talking about how well Michigan is playing, and how the No. 6 Wolverines certainly deserve a lofty ranking.

He later pointed out that recent matchups between the Spartans and Wolverines have been played in good spirit.

"The three games that we've had, '15, '16, '17, I think they have played with great sportsmanship on the field, I really do," Dantonio said. "Everybody's playing hard and I think that's good for college football. Well-coached football teams and respect — respect what they have done."

When Michigan State talks about respect in this rivalry, it's often to complain about a lack of it, but both teams have avoided major sound bites in the days leading up to Saturday's clash between the Wolverines and the 24th-ranked Spartans. There's still plenty at stake this weekend — and the potential for plenty of hostility — but each side seems aware of what it's up against.

"Very good run defense," Michigan coach Jim Harbaugh said. "They're very stout up front. They've got some real hard-playing guys — linebackers that are some of the best in the league. Very sound system."

The Wolverines (6-1, 4-0 Big Ten) and Spartans (4-2, 2-1) can play nice all they want in their pregame comments, but there's no changing the history between these two rivals. There have been plenty of dustups and harsh words between them in the past. Here are a few of the highlights — just since Dantonio took over at Michigan State:

2007: After a win over the Spartans, Michigan's Mike Hart refers to Michigan State as a little brother. Dantonio responds by warning the Wolverines that "pride comes before the fall" — and the Spartans have won eight of 10 in the series since then.

Price was thrilled that he won't be questioned anymore about not having a postseason win as a start-

"That's awesome," he said. "I don't have to prepare myself for it in spring training on Feb. 20 or September when I've still got five regular-season starts. I don't have to answer that question anymore. And man, it feels good."

Price was warming in the bullpen as Game 4 ended, perhaps jeopardizing his readiness for Thursday. Instead, that session may have keyed his dominant performance.

"It felt good. Honestly, it really started last night in the bullpen. Threw quite a few pitches to come in for the next hitter, found something out while doing that and kind of just carried that over to today," Price said. Price tipped his cap to a few hundred Red Sox fans assembled behind the Boston dugout while they cheered as he walked off the field following postgame interviews.
