## Pet ordinance changes, roofing projects approved by City Council

If you're a pet owner, the City of Big Spring has implemented some changes in your responsibilities regarding your cat or dog within city limits.

The Big Spring City Council approved the changes unanimously at their meeting Tuesday evening.

"We're asking your permission to make a couple of changes to our animal ordinance," said Big Spring Police Chief Chad Williams. "The first being increasing the time between rabies vaccinations for animals from 12 months, which we currently require, to a three-year. The vets in our area, and all the vets that I know, use a three-year rabies vaccination for the animals, so just to be in line. My understanding is, between the late '80s and early '90s, there was a rabies epidemic in this area of Texas, and that's

why it was changed to an annual requirement to have your animals vaccinated."

The second change to the ordinance eliminates the need for pet licenses from the city.

"Looking at this ordinance and looking at the fee structures, we found that the veterinarians here in Big Spring are not required to collect money for the city tag, but are encouraged to, and if they don't collect that, they're supposed to have you sign that says that you have to have a city tag for your animal," Williams said. "What we found was, no one wanted the \$3 that was offered for getting that money. So it wasn't evenly enforced across the board, so depending on which vet you went to, you may or may not. In order for us to go back and enforce that and chase down a person who did not do that, it's really impossible."

To help offset Animal Control

"Coahoma is going to go gold on

Friday night and not just in the stands," announced CISD Head Football Coach and Athletic Director Chris Joslin. "We are going to wear gold with our football uniforms. We have new jerseys for that one game. Also something that is pretty neat, the guy who is the father of the son this happened to shipped us 50 pairs of gold pants we are going to wear that night as well."

Joslin is referring to Jeff Miller, the head football coach of the 2017 3A Division I Texas football champions the Rockdale High School Tigers, and a long time friend of Joslin and his wife, Kristen. In fact, Miller hired Joslin for his first coaching position in Jacksboro 16 years ago.

Miller's son Gunner was diagnosed with an aggressive form of bone cancer, Ewing's Sarcoma, when he was a freshman.

"The reason I am telling you this is because I want you to know how passionate we are about this," Chris Joslin said before he told Gunner's story. "I told the football team today and to them over and over, you never know when your last day of doing something is. This young man was running at the area track meet as a freshman and his leg was hurting bad....They went to the doctor for shin splints and before the visit was over the doctor told them

it was cancer."

The news meant an end to his high school football playing days but not an end to his football career. Instead of leading his team on the field as the quarterback, Gunner served as a student coach for the Tigers' special teams. He was on the sidelines when the Tigers won the state football championship.

In fact, it was Gunner who snapped the final play of the game at his teammates' request.

Gunner's mother, Angel, along with Kelly Pickel, who had a child struck with cancer, started Gold Out about four years ago after learning childhood cancer research doesn't receive much fundraising dollars. In the past four years, Gold Out has raised more than \$200,000 from various participating schools in Central, East, and South Texas. The organization hopes to raise \$100,000 this year alone.

Now the Joslins want to bring that movement West.

"You guys are going to be the first school that is going to be involved with it in West Texas," Chris Joslin said. "We want more schools to get on board."

During the assembly, the theater department put on an endearing play called "Red Rover" about a young girl fighting cancer. The production was

researched, picked, and produced completely by the theater students, said Kristen Joslin, theater advisor.

Gold Out shirts are being sold for \$10 a piece to the end of this week and during the football game at Stanton Friday. Already, the theater department has had to reorder shirts to meet a growing demand. For each shirt sold, \$7 will be donated to a childhood cancer research facility while \$3 will go to covering the cost of the shirt.

On Friday, the theater department will host a special pre-game event to honor survivors of childhood cancer.

"I am really excited to do this," said Joe Manning, theater student and varsity football member. "We've been working hard at it. There has been a lot of time put into this."

The Bulldogs will face off against the Buffaloes at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Stanton.

costs in lieu of the licensure fees, Williams requested an increase of \$5 for rabies vaccinations of pets in the city pound.

"If you go take your animal to the vet, you're going to be charged \$15 for a rabies vaccination," Williams said. "If we have your animal in the shelter, and we take it and get it vaccinated for rabies, when you come and take it out, we'll charge you \$20."

With Councilman Doug Hartman absent due to illness, the mayor and five council members present approved the changes unanimously.

In other business, the council approved agreements with roofing manufacturer Duro-Last to re-roof the Big Spring City Hall, the City Hall Annex, and the Dora Roberts Community Center.

"This is through the TIPS purchasing co-op with Duro-Last roofing manufacturer," said Big Spring Financial Director Don Moore. "So it's a 20-year warranty through the manufacturer. We contract with the manufacturer and the manufacturer went out for bids, and this was their low bid, so it makes it all legal that way. The warranty being with the manufacturer is really good, because roofer companies kind of come and go. In 20 years the roofing company who installed this may not be around, so if we have any problems, the manufacturer will find a roofing company to resolve them."

Moore laid out the prices for the various roofs.

"For City Hall, the budget is \$70,494.20. That re-roofs the roof on City Hall, and it's also going to add a third drain. There's two drains on it, and from talk-

ing with the employees who have been around the city the longest, they say that roof has been leaking since they can remember, so it's always been an issue. How the leaks are happening is related to those drains getting plugged, so a third drain is going to help in that situation. All of these are flat roofs, or have flat portions to them. There's really only one product on the market that is really waterproof. The other products need the water to be drained. City Hall, like all of these buildings, has puddling places, where water stays, especially during colder weather."

The cost for re-roofing the City Hall Annex will cost \$177,668.12; and the cost for the DRCC's roof will be \$118,835.36, said Moore.

The council also:

- Approved seeking bids for rehabilitation of three city parking lots;
- Approved the purchase of security cameras to be installed at the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark;
- Approved the purchase of computers from Dell for the Information Technology Department;
- Approved the purchase of around \$2.4 million worth of vehicles, equipment, and other items for various city departments;
- Appointed former Big Spring Community Services Director Debbie Wegman to the Convention and Visitors Bureau board.

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## Bomb found at philanthropist George Soros' suburban home

BEDFORD, N.Y. — A bomb was found in a mailbox at the suburban New York compound of George Soros, the liberal billionaire philanthropist who has been the target of right-wing conspiracy theorists, authorities said Tuesday.

Federal investigators were reviewing surveillance video to determine whether the package had been sent through the mail or delivered some other way, officials said, adding it was also not clear if the parcel was addressed to Soros.

A security officer at the compound about 50 miles (80 kilometers) north of Manhattan became suspicious of the package Monday after-

noon and placed it in a wooded area before alerting the FBI and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, authorities said. Agents came out and safely detonated the device, which a federal law enforcement official said contained explosive powder.

"It was not a hoax device," said the official, who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the investigation.

Another federal official who also spoke on condition of anonymity said the device resembled a pipe bomb and was inside a package placed in a mailbox outside the gates of

## Sandy Hook shooter's belongings ordered released to public

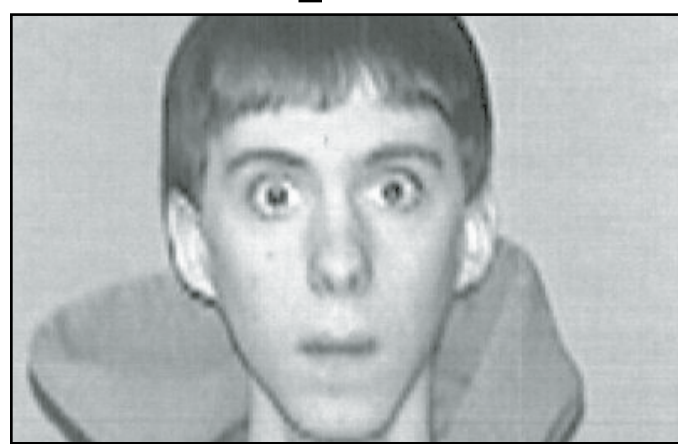
— The Connecticut Supreme Court says state police must release disturbing writings and other belongings of the Newtown school shooter to the public because they are not exempt from state open record laws.

The court ruled 5-0 Tuesday in favor of The Hartford Courant and state Freedom of Information Commission, whose order to police to release shooter Adam Lanza's belongings was

overturned by a lower court judge. It wasn't immediately clear when the items will be released.

The 20-year-old Lanza fatally shot 20 first-graders and six educators at Sandy Hook Elementary School in 2012 and killed himself as police arrived.

State police had seized Lanza's belongings from his Newtown home and rejected the Courant's request to view the items, which included a spreadsheet ranking mass murders and violent stories he wrote.

## VP Pence: Khashoggi's death will not go without US response

WASHINGTON

— Vice President Mike Pence said Tuesday that the death of Saudi writer Jamal Khashoggi "will not go without an American response" and that the CIA director was in Turkey to review evidence in the case.

Pence declined to discuss what punitive action the U.S. might take in response to the death of the Washington Post columnist and critic of the Saudi kingdom, who died Oct. 2 at the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul. Saudi Arabia has said he was killed in a fist-fight at the consulate.

Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan's claim earlier Tuesday, Pence said, that "this brutal murder was premeditated — pre-planned days in advance — flies in the

face of earlier assertions that have been made by the Saudi regime."

"This brutal murder of a journalist, of an innocent man or a dissident will not go without an American response," Pence said, adding that there probably would be an international response as well.

Asked if the U.S. would sanction members of Saudi Arabia's royal family if they were found to have been complicit, Pence said that's a decision for President Donald Trump. He says the president will make a decision that reflects the values and national security interests of the nation and will also "make sure the world knows the truth."

Pence, who spoke in Washington at an event hosted by The

## Austin boil-water notice could last weeks, official says

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Nearly 900,000 people in Texas' capital may have to boil their tap water for two weeks, an official said Tuesday, as authorities struggled to treat a water supply filled with silt, mud and debris after recent heavy rains and flooding.

The Austin American-Statesman reports that Travis County Chief Emergency Management Coordinator Eric Carter told a county commissioners court meeting that 888,000 people may have to wait 10-14 days for the system to settle.

On Monday, the city told 1 million-plus residents to boil water for drinking, cooking and making ice. Officials are also urging drastic reductions in water use and banning outdoor watering, car washing and using water to fill pools and spas.

There has been no indication of bacterial infiltration so far. But Austin Water warned that insufficiently treated water could contain bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches and other illness. It said infants, young children, some of the elderly

and people with severely compromised immune systems would be at risk.

The boil-water notice has prompted a rush on grocery and convenience stores where shelves previously filled with bottled water stand empty. Some restaurants closed, while school districts modified their menus to make it easier to use boiled water.

Area jails say they are distributing bottled or boiled-and-cooled water to inmates. In a statement, Travis County said it has 500 cases of water arriving Tuesday for use in lockups and has ordered nearly 4,500 cases to arrive in the coming days, enough for 15,000 bottles per day for a week. It is also working with the Office of Emergency Management "to get a water tanker with the capacity of 3,000 to 5,000 gallons of potable water."

Neighboring Williamson County declared its own emergency Tuesday, allowing officials to create a distribution point for providing potable water to about 80,000 people in its territory affected by Austin's boil water notice and to help affected schools.

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# No olives? Putin pokes fun at US seal amid arms pact dispute

MOSCOW — Russian President Vladimir Putin poked fun at the official seal of the United States while host-

John Bolton at the Kremlin, Putin mentioned Trump's stated intent to pull the U.S. out of a pivotal arms control treaty. He said Moscow also was aware of Washington's doubts about extending another landmark nuclear treaty and its plans to deploy elements of missile defense in space.

The Russian leader then referred to the Great Seal of the United States, which includes a bald eagle holding a bundle of 13 arrows in one talon and an olive branch with 13 olives in another.

"I have a question: Has your eagle picked all the olives and only has arrows left?" Putin asked with a laugh.

But while underlining the differences between Russia and the U.S., Putin also emphasized the need to maintain a dialogue, saying he would be ready to meet with

Trump in Paris during centenary commemorations next month marking the end of World War I.

Putin said his last meeting with Trump in Helsinki in July was useful despite their tough discussion, adding that he would be open to meet with Trump in France "if the U.S. side is interested in such contacts."

Bolton responded that Trump would look forward to seeing Putin in Paris on the sideline of events marking 100 years since Armistice Day.

"Despite our differences which exist because of our different national interests, it's still important to work in areas where there is a possibility of mutual cooperation," Bolton said.

Bolton's Kremlin meeting with Putin followed two days of talks with top Russian foreign policy and security officials.

"Hopefully, I will have some

answers for you," he said. "But I didn't bring any more olives."

"That's what I thought," Putin quipped.

The Russian leader further demonstrated his knowledge of U.S. symbols, citing the motto written on the scroll the eagle holds in its beak — "Out of Many, One" — as reflecting the need to find common ground despite various viewpoints.

Putin and Bolton laughed as they exchanged the quips at the start of the meeting, setting an easy tone ahead of what ought to be a tense discussion given Trump's week-end statement about abandoning the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) Treaty.

Earlier Tuesday, Putin's spokesman said Trump took "a dangerous position" by deciding to abandon an existing nuclear weapons treaty with Russia without offering any

Washington Post, said whatever U.S. response the president decides to make will keep in mind the importance of U.S. relations with Saudi Arabia — an alliance that he noted has been in existence since shortly after World War II.

He declined to say whether he had seen any intelligence that linked the Saudi crown prince to the killing.

"I know that when the CIA director returns, she will be briefing the president, myself and our entire team on what the Turks have assembled," Pence said about CIA Director Gina Haspel's trip to Turkey.

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin, who pulled out of attending an investment conference in Riyadh, met with Saudi Prince Mohammed bin Salman separately before the forum, according to Saudi state television.

Trump spoke Sunday with the crown prince, who is the son of Saudi King Salman.

"He says he is not involved nor is the king," Trump told USA Today in an interview aboard Air Force One Monday en route to a political rally in Texas. The newspaper said Trump declined to say whether he believed the crown prince's denials. If their involvement was proven, Trump said: "I would be

very upset about it. We'll have to see."

Members of Congress and former government officials have accused Riyadh of trying to cover up the truth behind Khashoggi's death or hide any evidence that the kingdom, particularly the crown prince, authorized it.

Sen. Rand Paul, R-Ky., who has been trying to coax Trump into ending arms sales to Saudi Arabia, said Monday that it's "laughable" to believe the crown prince was not involved in Khashoggi's death.

Trump said any U.S. response should not involve scrapping billions of dollars in arms sales, which would hurt U.S. defense industries and eliminate U.S. jobs. "I don't want to lose all of that investment that's being made in our country," he said.

Whatever the U.S. response, U.S. ties with its Gulf ally have hit rough waters. The Khashoggi affair also has threatened to upend the relationship of Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner with the crown prince.

The two men — both in their 30s, both trusted aides of older, familial leaders — struck a bond last spring and consulted with one another frequently in private calls in the months that followed. The crown prince, who is known in diplomatic circles as "MBS," has drawn some praise in the West for his moves to modernize the kingdom and criticism for his government's arrests of rivals and critics.

Trump now plays down the relationship, saying the crown prince and Kushner are "just two young guys." But their back-channel relationship unnerved many in the Trump administra-

tion and Washington foreign policy establishment who feared that the White House was betting too big on the crown prince.

Kushner on Monday fended off criticism that the Trump administration was giving Saudi Arabia cover. He said administration officials have their "eyes wide open."

"We're getting facts in from multiple places and once those facts come in, the secretary of state will work with our national security team to help us determine what we want to believe, what we think is credible and what we think is not credible," Kushner told CNN.

Even Trump, however, acknowledges that Kushner's work on trying to craft peace between Israel and the Palestinians has been set back by Khashoggi's death. "There are a lot of setbacks. This is a setback for that," Trump told The Washington Post in a weekend phone interview.

Bruce Riedel, a former Middle East specialist for the CIA and National Security Council, said the Trump administration "desperately wants the Istanbul affair to go away and the MBS-Jared bro-mance obscured."

An administration official who regularly deals with Kushner pushed back against claims that Kushner and the crown prince are joined at the hip. The official was not authorized to discuss the relationship and spoke only on condition of anonymity.

The official said Kushner — like other members of the administration, including Trump — believes Saudi Arabia should suffer some sort of consequence, but said Kushner also believes the U.S.-Saudi relationship "shouldn't be blown up" because of the Khashoggi matter.

the compound. It was opened in a secure location just inside the gates, nowhere near Soros' quarters, the official said.

The Bedford Police Department said the FBI's terrorism task force was investigating.

The FBI's New York field office said on Twitter that there was "no

threat to public safety" but did not respond to messages seeking comment.

A message emailed to Soros' foundation wasn't immediately returned.

Soros, who made his fortune in hedge funds, frequently donates to liberal causes. Recently, conservative critics have accused him without evidence of secretly financing the caravan of Central American migrants making their

way toward the U.S.

Soros, who is Jewish, has also been the target of anti-Semitic smears. Some have falsely accused him of being a Nazi collaborator during World War II, when he was a child in Hungary.

Activists frequently post on social media the addresses of his homes, sometimes along with threats.

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# Sandra Day O'Connor announces likely Alzheimer's diagnosis

WASHINGTON — Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman on the Supreme Court, announced Tuesday in a frank and personal letter that she has been diagnosed with "the beginning stages of dementia, probably Alzheimer's disease."

The 88-year-old said doctors diagnosed her some time ago and that as her condition has progressed she is "no longer able to participate in public life." After her 2006 retirement from the high court O'Connor had appeared around the country championing an educational organization she founded and serving as a visiting appeals court judge, among other activities. But she stopped speaking publicly more than two years ago.

"While the final chapter of my life with dementia may be trying, nothing has diminished my gratitude and deep appreciation for the countless blessings in my life," she wrote. She added: "As a young cowgirl from the Arizona desert, I never could have imagined that one day I would become the first woman justice on the U.S. Supreme Court."

O'Connor's announcement of her diagnosis came a day after an Associated Press story in which her son Jay O'Connor said that his mother had begun to have challenges with her short term memory. The story noted that O'Connor had stopped making public appearances and recently turned over an office she had kept at the Supreme Court to newly retired Justice Anthony Kennedy. Jay O'Connor also said that hip issues have meant his mother now primarily uses a wheelchair and stays close to her home in Phoenix.

O'Connor wrote that since "many people have asked about my current status and activities" she wanted to be "open about

these changes."

O'Connor was a state court judge before being nominated to the Supreme Court in 1981 by President Ronald Reagan, who fulfilled a campaign promise by nominating a woman to the high court. O'Connor's letter Tuesday was reminiscent of Reagan's 1994 letter announcing that he had Alzheimer's disease. He died in 2004.

During her more than two decades on the court O'Connor was often the deciding vote in important cases, providing the crucial fifth vote when the court divided 5-4. On the Supreme Court, her votes were key in cases about abortion, affirmative action and campaign finance as well as the Bush v. Gore decision effectively settling the 2000 election in George W. Bush's favor.

O'Connor grew up on a ranch on the border of Arizona and New Mexico called the "Lazy B" and went to Stanford for college and law school. Although she graduated third in her class from law school she had difficulty finding a job as a lawyer at a time when there were few women in the legal profession. Despite those early challenges, she became the first woman to lead the Arizona state senate before becoming a judge.

O'Connor was 51 when she was confirmed 99-0 to the Supreme Court. She was 75 when she announced her retirement from the court in 2005. Her decision to step down was influenced by a decline in the health of her husband, John O'Connor III, who himself had been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease.

In 2007, O'Connor's family made public that John O'Connor had struck up a romance with a fellow Alzheimer's patient at the assisted living center where he had moved. Scott O'Connor, one of the justice's three sons, told a Phoenix television station that his mother was "thrilled" her husband was "relaxed and happy."

## China opens mega-bridge linking Hong Kong to mainland

ZHUHAI, China — China on Tuesday opened the world's longest sea-crossing bridge linking Hong Kong to the mainland, a feat of engineering carrying immense economic and political significance.

Chinese President Xi Jinping presided over a ceremony in the city of Zhuhai to open the 55-kilometer (34-mile)-long bridge linking it to the semi-autonomous regions of Hong Kong and Macau. Digital fireworks exploded on a screen behind him as leaders of the three cities watched. The \$20 billion bridge took almost a

decade to build while incurring major delays and cost overruns. It includes an undersea tunnel allowing ships to pass through the Pearl River delta, the heart of China's crucial manufacturing sector.

Its opening will cut travel time across the delta from several hours to just 30 minutes, something China hopes will bind the region together as a major driver of future economic growth. Heavily regulated traffic using permits issued under a quota system will begin flowing on Wednesday.

The bridge forms a physical link between the mainland and Hong Kong, an Asian financial hub that was handed over from British to Chinese control in

1997 with the assurance it would maintain its own legal and economic system for 50 years.

That carries major political significance for Xi's administration, which has rejected calls for political liberalization in Hong Kong, sparking fears Beijing will clamp down further on civil liberties before the end

of the "one country, two systems" arrangement in 2047.

thing to replace it.

Spokesman Dmitry Peskov warned that Washington took a "dangerous position" by declaring an intention to withdraw from the 1987 INF Treaty without proposing improvements or a substitute agreement.

"Right now, we don't have any prospects whatsoever for a new deal," Peskov said. "It's important to figure out if it's possible or not."

The treaty was signed by U.S. President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, prohibiting the U.S. and Russia from possessing, producing or test-flying ground-launched nuclear cruise and ballistic missiles with a range of 500 to 5,500 kilometers (300 to 3,400 miles.)

China was not a party to the original agreement, and Trump argued that it should be included in the treaty.

Other Russian officials also emphasized the need for dialogue in their meetings with Bolton.

Russian Defense Minister Sergei Shoigu lauded Bolton for making a two-day visit and said that "even small steps will benefit our relations and help restore trust" between the two countries.

He added that Russia and the U.S.

should build up their cooperation in Syria that helped to prevent major incidents in the sky or on the ground.

Bolton told Shoigu he was in Moscow to work on Trump's commitment to improve security cooperation with Russia.

"We certainly share your view that the U.S.-Russian discussions with respect to Syria have been useful, productive and professional, and we hope we can extend those conversations through a number of other ways that you mentioned, and even more," he said.

When signed in 1987, the INF treaty was lauded as a major safeguard for global security since the elimination of shorter-range missiles that take just a few minutes to reach their targets. The removal of such destabilizing weapons would in theory allow more time for decision-making in case of a warning of a missile attack.

The European Union warned Trump of a potential impact on European security if he decided to go ahead and leave the INF treaty.

An EU statement on Monday described the pact as an essential cornerstone of Europe's security structure, adding, "the world doesn't need a new arms race that would benefit no one and on the contrary, would bring even more instability."

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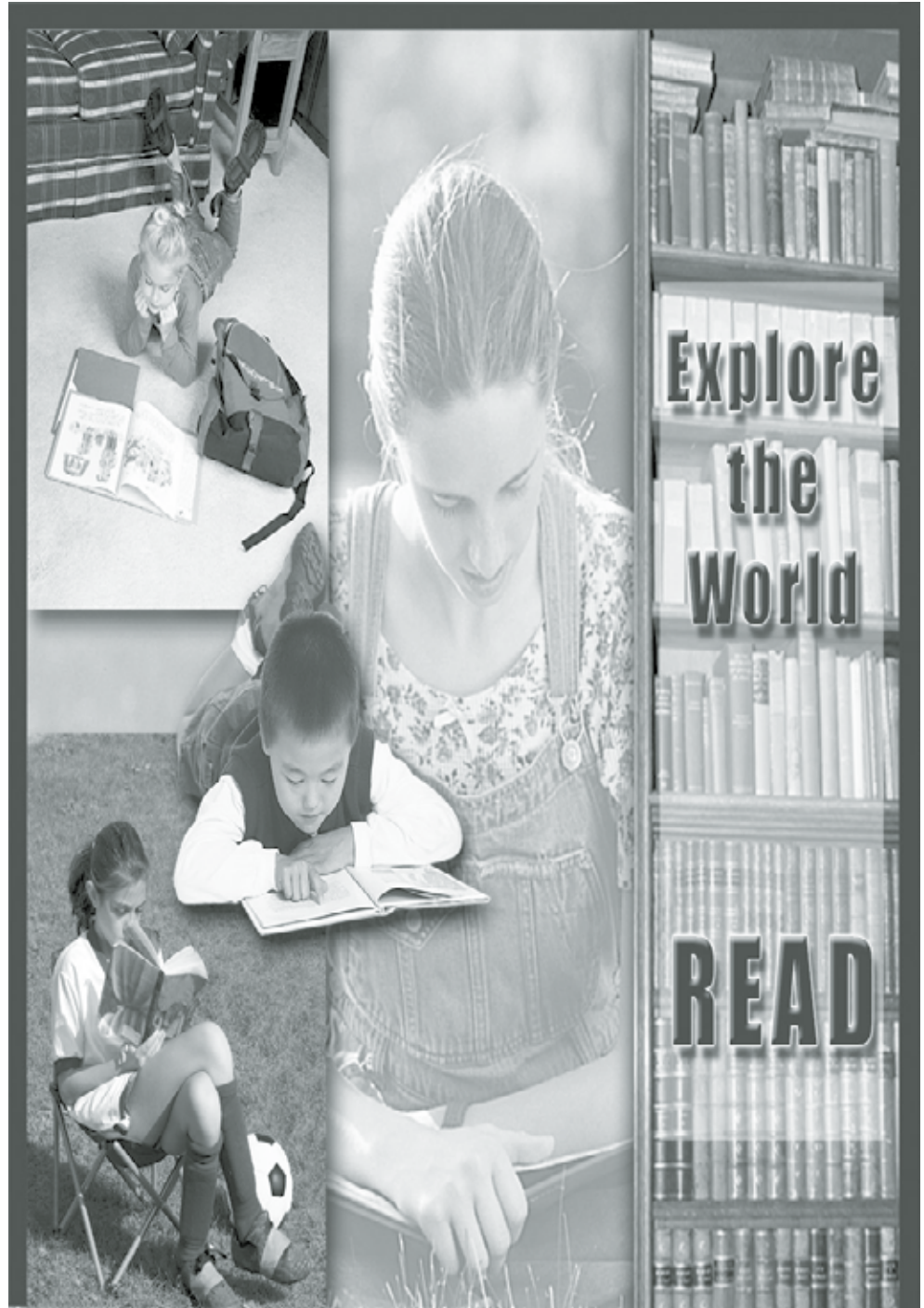
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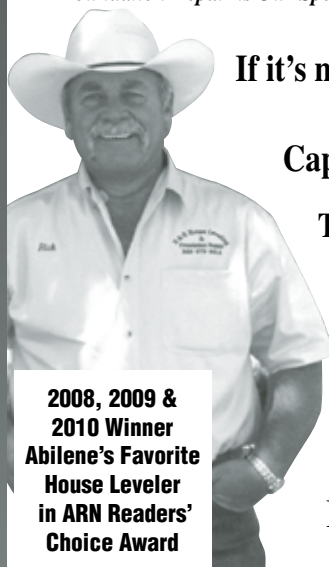
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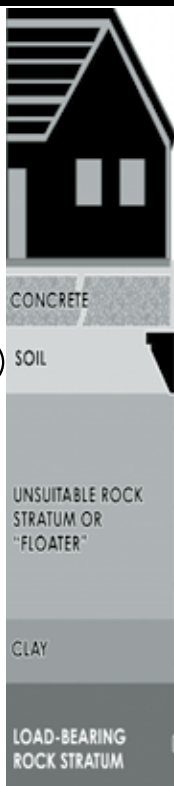

J-10-9 are usually very effective. **Whenever this occurred**, declarer easily made the contract. After winning with the ace and ruffing a club, South played the A-K of diamonds and trumped a diamond. Next came the ace of hearts and a heart ruff followed by a second club ruff, then a second heart ruff and still another club ruff. **Declarer's mission** was by now accomplished. He had scored the ace of clubs, A-K of diamonds and ace of hearts, plus six trump tricks by ruffing two hearts in dummy and three clubs and a diamond in his hand. This came to 10 tricks, after which East-West won the last three tricks with the A-Q-10 of trumps. **However**, some Wests had listened very carefully to the bidding and realized that North had either a singleton or void in hearts. They therefore decided to lead a low trump initially, despite the fact that this jeopardized their virtually certain trump trick. They reasoned that the trump lead would deprive declarer of at least one heart ruff in dummy, so that they could do no worse than break even. **Those Wests who led a trump** were handsomely rewarded for their imagination and courage. East won the trump with the ace and returned a trump to dummy's king, and declarer eventually lost two heart tricks and two trump tricks to go down one.

Today is Wednesday, Oct. 24, the 297th day of 2018. There are 68 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:**  
On Oct. 24, 1972, Hall of Famer Jackie Robinson, who'd broken Major League Baseball's color barrier in 1947, died in Stamford, Connecticut, at age 53.

**On this date:**  
In 1648, the Peace of Westphalia (west-FAY'lee-uh) ended the Thirty Years War and effectively destroyed the Holy Roman Empire.  
In 1861, the first transcontinental telegraph message was sent by Chief Justice Stephen J. Field of California from San Francisco to President Abraham Lincoln in Washington, D.C., over a line built by the Western Union Telegraph Co.  
In 1931, the George Washington Bridge, connecting New York and New Jersey, was officially dedicated (it opened to traffic the next day).  
In 1939, nylon stockings were sold publicly for the first time, in Wilmington, Delaware.  
In 1940, the 40-hour work week went into effect under the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938.  
In 1945, the United Nations officially came into existence as its charter took effect.  
In 1952, Republican presidential candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower declared in Detroit, "I shall go to Korea" as he promised to end the conflict. (He made the visit over a month later.)  
In 1962, a naval quarantine of Cuba ordered by President John F. Kennedy went into effect during the missile crisis.  
In 1980, the merchant freighter SS Poet departed Philadelphia, bound for Port Said (sah-EED'), Egypt, with a crew of 34 and a cargo of grain; it disappeared en route and has not been heard from since.  
In 1989, former television evangelist Jim Bakker (BAY'kur) was sentenced by a judge in Charlotte, N.C., to 45 years in prison for fraud and conspiracy. (The sentence was later reduced to eight years; it was further reduced to four for good behavior.)  
In 2002, authorities apprehended Army veteran John Allen Muhammad and teenager Lee Boyd Malvo near Myersville, Maryland, in the Washington-area sniper attacks. (Malvo was later sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole; Muhammad was sentenced to

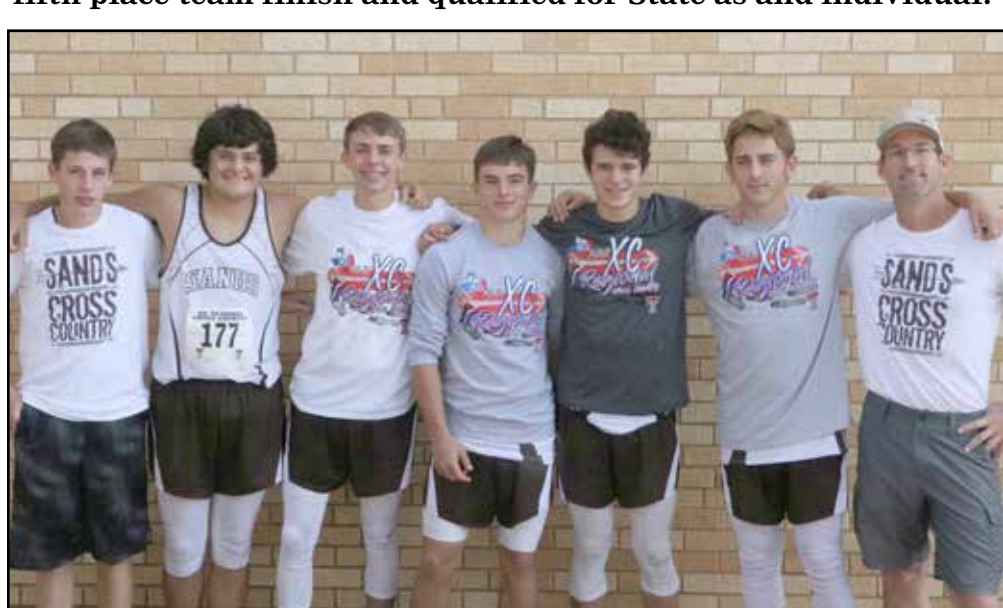
