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Sweet sixteen

Coahoma FFA member lands in top 16 at national competition

INDIANAPOLIS - Julia Cox ended her run at the national FFA Greenhand Creed competition in the semi-finals Thursday earning a silver medal and placing in the top 16 nationwide out of 47 state champions.

"I couldn't be more proud," said Aaron Custer, FFA Coahoma Chapter.


The Coahoma High School sophomore is competing during the 91st FFA National Convention and Expo which is one of the largest student conventions in the world. In order to qualify, Cox was the Texas state champion in the event, a feat she accomplished as a freshman in the fall of 2017.

Competitors were required to recite by memory the FFA Creed, which outlines the organization's belief on the agriculture industry, and then answered questions directly related to the creed from the judges.

When she began her journey at district competition, Cox said she never imagined she would make it to nationals. "It's surreal to me that I'm here in

Indianapolis. It's still hitting me," she said. "It's a blast here (at the convention). It's crazy to see how many people are involved with FFA from all different states and seeing people from all over Texas here. It's really great."

The first and second rounds of the competition were held Thursday morning and afternoon respectively. Finals for the remaining

"The whole atmosphere in the holding room with the other competitors was very welcoming," she said. "It wasn't at all scary or nervous. We all mingled and talked with

Pharmaceutical Take-Back scheduled Saturday ger need."

The Big Spring Police Department will

be accepting drugs for disposal Saturday at Spring Town Plaza, 1801 E. FM 700. "It's called

the 'Pharmaceutical Take-Back Initiative," said Big Spring Police Chief Chad

Williams. "We do it twice a year. People can bring any prescribed controlled substances, except injectibles and syringes are not being accepted because of the hazards of the blood-borne pathogens."

The Pharmaceutical Take-Back will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday.

"It's a no-questions-asked type deal," said Williams. "People just walk up, drop it in a box, and walk off. It's an easy way for them to destroy their expired medications, or medications they no lonPeople may either simply

deposit the medication in

its original container, or those concerned about the personal information on the container may dump the medication out of the container directly into the disposal box. However, liquid medications, such as cough syrup, must remain sealed in their original container.

Although the event is primarily intended for people to dispose of expired medications and old prescription drugs, Williams emphasized that no questions will be asked - even regarding illegal drugs.

"You know what? If they want to come drop their illegal drugs in, it's no questions asked. Nothing's going to be said," he said. "If they come and drop something in that box, they turn around and walk off. We don't even look at it."

Williams said the DEA will



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

Trump plans to send troops to border as response to caravan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration is planning to dispatch 800 or more active duty troops to the southern border at the direction of a president who has sought to transform fears about immigration into electoral gains in the midterms as a caravan of thousands of migrants makes its way through Mexico.

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis is expected to sign an order sending the troops to the border, bolstering National Guard forces already there, a U.S. official said Thursday. The action comes as President Donald Trump has spent recent days calling attention to the caravan of Central Americans slowly making their way by foot into southern Mexico, but still more than 1,000 miles from U.S. soil.

Trump, who made fear about immigrants a major theme of his 2016 election campaign, has been eager to make it a top issue heading into the Nov. 6 midterm elections, which will determine control of Congress. The president and senior White House officials have long believed the issue is key to turning out his ardent base of

the Border Patrol, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss a plan that had not yet been finalized and formally announced.

It's not unusual for the National Guard to help with border security. Although active duty troops are sometimes called on for domestic emergencies like hurricanes or floods, they rarely deploy to the southern border. Fears of militarizing the border were fanned by a May 1997 incident in which a Marine on a counter-narcotics mission shot to death an 18-yearold who was herding goats in Redford, Texas.

In the current situation, active duty troops will not be on armed security missions that could lead to a similar

The additional members of the military would assist the Border Patrol by providing things such as vehicles, tents and equipment. There already are about 2,000 National Guard troops there under a previous Pentagon arrangement.

Trump has used the caravan to bolster his election-season warnings that the U.S. is being infiltrated by illegal immigrants "pouring across the border," whom he has painted with a sinister brush.

He has claimed without any apparent basis in fact that "Middle Eastern-

van — once estimated by the United Nations to number more than 7,000 — are hoping to make it to the United States. Most are Hondurans, seeking to escape the poverty and violence that plagues the region.

The caravan swelled dramatically soon after crossing the Mexican border on Oct. 19, but sickness, fear and police harassment have whittled down its numbers. Since entering Mexico at its southernmost tip, the group has advanced roughly 95 miles.

Trump tweeted a direct message to the migrants Thursday, urging them to return home.

"To those in the Caravan, turnaround," he wrote. "We are not letting people into the United States illegally. Go back to your Country and if you

want, apply for citizenship like millions of others are doing!"

The migrants have largely been disconnected from news reports about them while on the road. When asked about Trump's tweets critical of the caravan and his vows to keep them out, they have generally responded that he should

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

careers, raise our families, worry about retirement and prepare for the inevitable: death and taxes. In the meantime, the lives of believers and non-believers often show little marked difference other than church attendance.

But what if He comes today? What if He comes tomorrow? What if He came yesterday? No, I am not suggesting you missed the "rap-BILL ture." But, He did, in fact, come Tinsley yesterday and He will, in fact, come today. Jesus comes to us everyday if we are looking for Him. He comes in small, imperceptible and unexpected ways. He comes in the interruptions that beg for our attention and

threaten to derail our pre-planned agendas. This is exactly what Jesus taught His disciples before His ascension into Heaven. Jesus said when He returns, "the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in,

I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' ... 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' (Matthew 25:31-46) Once He came to me in the person of a young His-

panic employee at Wal-Mart who needed words of encouragement. He came in the form of a Chinese woman named Chiu who was fishing on a pier with

her mentally handicapped daughter. Another time He came in the form of a teenage unwed mother who had given birth to a son who died a few days

He came in the form of Sultan, Abdelmassa, Saud and Moath, Muslim students recently arrived from Kuwait. How many times have I missed Him and failed to recognize Him? I don't know. He comes every day in many ways and forms that we are likely to miss if we are too focused on our own agendas.

If we live our lives alert and ready to receive Him each and every day in the small encounters with the "least of these" we will become salt and light, as Jesus described it.

In the process, we will be ready to receive Him in that day, when He appears like lightning from the east to west. We might even hear Him say, "Well done, my good and faithful servant."

"I will heal their backsliding, I will you need a hug. love them freely: for mine anger is turned away from him." Hosea 14:4





FRISCO, Texas — Dak Prescott won't know if he has a new No. 1 receiver with the Dallas Cowboys until the quarterback gets a chance to see how quickly Amari Cooper can be assimilated into the offense.

At least one thing is certain. The Cowboys paid the price of a top passcatcher by giving Oakland their firstround pick in next year's draft in a midseason trade designed to jumpstart a passing game that has mostly struggled to replace Dez Bryant, the franchise touchdown catch leader before being dumped in a cost-cutting move in April.

And Prescott didn't need such a bold move to believe there's a winnow mentality with the Cowboys (3-4), who are off this weekend before returning for a Monday night game Nov. 5 at home against Tennessee.

"There's no doubt about it in my mind that they're all in," Prescott told The Associated Press, referring to owner and general manager Jerry Jones and the rest of the front office. "They know the team that we have. They know where we can go and they want to make sure they do everything to put us in that position."

Two years ago, the Cowboys won the NFC East with a conference-leading 13 wins while Prescott won NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

Dallas never really found a groove during disappointing encores for Prescott and Ezekiel Elliott, in part because of a six-game suspension for the 2016 league rushing leader.

Year 3 with the two offensive stars has been the model of inconsistency - four road losses, with three home wins alternating in between.

And the root cause is a frequently punchless passing game that's been unable to punish defenses for focusing on Elliott. Spotty play from the offensive line hasn't helped, either.

In Cooper, the Cowboys grabbed the fourth overall pick from three years ago, believing he was still young enough at 24 to be a cornerstone alongside Prescott and Elliott, the fourth overall choice a year later.

Although his own Year 3 last season was a big letdown compared to the pair of Pro Bowl seasons that started his career, Cooper brings a solid pedigree to Dallas: 3,183 yards receiving and 19 touchdowns in 52 games. Prescott envisions something more than solid.

"He's an explosive guy that you don't have to draw too many crazy plays to get him the ball," Prescott said. "When you have a player like that, they'll be easy to put into this offense. We showed how good we can be. We've just got to continue to find

a way to be consistent." Offensive coordinator Scott Linehan and Cole Beasley, the top producer among the group of receivers Cooper is joining, both believe the open week will make a difference in getting the former Alabama standout

Texans beat Dolphins 42-23

HOUSTON — Lamar Miller's second big game in a row helped the Houston Texans to their fifth straight

This one, a 42-23 victory Thursday night over the Dolphins, meant a little more to the running back because of his ties to South Florida. Miller was born and grew up in Miami before attending college at Miami, was drafted by the Dolphins in 2012 and spent his first four seasons with the

Miller had 133 yards rushing and a touchdown for his second straight 100-yard game.

"It felt good," Miller said. "I was speaking to the guys before the game and today I just had a different type of juice. I got a lot of rest last night. So today was just good. The offensive line did a great job and I'm just thankful."

He's the first Texan to rush for 100 yards in consecutive games since Arian Foster in 2014.

Miller's 2-yard touchdown in the first quarter tied the game at 7. He had a 19-yard run earlier in the drive to set up the score.

He had a 58-yard run early in the

third quarter on his way to another 100-yard game. He hadn't had one since 2016 before last week against Jacksonville.

Deshaun Watson Quarterback raved about Miller's recent work and said it's helped make things easier

for him. "It starts with the run game," Wat-

son said. "They've got to respect it.

They've got to get seven men in the

box, sometimes eight men in the box and then they kind of open up the passing game. So the safeties are very aggressive and we can get behind those guys using our speed and our talent with Will (Fuller), Hop (DeAndre Hopkins), Tyler (Ervin) and Keke

(Coutee) when he's healthy." The winning streak, which leaves the Texans in first place in the AFC South, comes after they opened the season 0-3. Miller is impressed with how the Texans worked together to turn things around, but he isn't sur-

"It just shows the type of guys we have in this locker room," Miller said. "When we lost three games straight everybody still came in with the same mindset to get better. I think every week we've just been improving and building that bond and that chemistry, and we've just got to keep it go-

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


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Grandparents Are Past Abusers

Dear Annie:

I'm engaged to an amazing man, and we spend our days in a cute little house with our wonderful daughter. I sincerely have few complaints about my life. Alas, there is one dark cloud that I can't seem to shake.

But I can't help but stiffen every time I'm around them, because all I can do is remember the pain they've inflicted on my fiance. My fiance says that they would never hurt our daughter, that circumstances are different now. of making 12 tricks, you should allow for the possibility of either opponent having four diamonds to the jack. Play the ten of hearts under the ace, cash the king of hearts, king of spades and ace of diamonds, then finesse the nine of hearts.

Next cash the queen of hearts and ace of spades, discarding the K-Q of diamonds from dummy! Then play the ten of diamonds to force out the jack, and this will be your only loser.

If the diamonds are divided 3-2, this method of play will cost you a trick worth 30 points, but if they are divided 4-1, you will be 1,000 or 1,500 points richer, depending on the 2. If you were sure of five club

tricks, you'd also be sure of the contract, but since the odds strongly favor scoring only four club tricks, you must consider a diamond finesse for your 12th trick.

This train of thought leads to the surprising conclusion that since there are two ways to play the clubs and only one way to play the diamonds, you should try the diamond finesse first to help you determine how to

Let's say you take the first spade in your hand and lead a diamond to the jack at trick two, and it wins. Once The only remaining problem is to guarantee four club tricks, which can be done by returning to your hand in any suit but clubs and leading a low club toward dummy. This enables you to guard against either opponent

having the K-10-8-7. If the diamond finesse at trick two loses, you will then have to hope that South was dealt specifically the K-x or K-x-x of clubs (a 26 percent chance) and rely on a finesse to produce five club tricks.



and Holliday were wounded. In 1942, Japanese planes badly damaged the aircraft carrier USS Hornet in the Battle of Santa Cruz Islands during World War II. (The Hornet sank early the next morning.)

Defense, frosh QBs headline Tech-Iowa State matchup

AMES, Iowa — The matchup between freshman quarterbacks Alex Bowman and Brock Purdy could wind up being appointment viewing.

But the key to Saturday's Texas Tech-Iowa State game in Ames might lie with a pair of better-than-expected

Bowman has thrown for 2,088 yards and 14 touchdowns with just four picks for the Red Raiders, and he's third in the country with 348 passing yards a game. Purdy has been just as sensational in his last two games, accounting for nearly 700 yards of total offense and eight TDs in leading the Cyclones (3-3, 2-2) to wins over Oklahoma State and West Virginia.

"He's a very dynamic player, can run, can throw, very poised (and) has really given them a spark," Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury said of Purdy. "He's a big time talent, big time play-

The Red Raiders (5-2, 3-1) and Cyclones aren't bad on the other side of the ball, either.

Texas Tech allowed just 31 combined points in back-to-back road wins over the Cowboys and TCU, and it's allowing a respectable 26.4 points a game after years of getting gashed

"They're physical," Iowa State coach Matt Campbell said. "Their linebackers can really run, their defensive line, a lot of those guys have played. They understand where they need to

Iowa State is allowing just 22.7 points a contest, good for second in

It is the first game for Texas Tech in Ames since the Red Raiders and current NFL star Patrick Mahomes were blown out 66-10 by Iowa State.

IN CONTROL?

If Texas Tech can get past the Cyclones, it has a chance to take control of one of the two spots in the league

title game because it then hosts Texas and Oklahoma in back-to-back weeks. Kingsbury knows not to overlook the Cyclones, especially at home, after what happened in 2016. "We've had our struggles at Iowa

State," Kingsbury said. "Against Iowa State, they've done a tremendous job against us; offensively, defensively, special teams."

MONTGOMERY'S BACK

Iowa State junior running back David Montgomery struggled — at least by his high standards — during the early portion of the season. A week off to rest an upper arm injury seemed to do the trick, as Montgomery ran for a career-high 189 yards against the Mountaineers.

PEAVY AND PAYNE VS. WESLEY Iowa State has two of the better cornerbacks in the country in Brian Peavy and D'Andre Payne, but they will be tested by receiver Antoine Wesley. He leads the Big 12 with 50 catches and 858 yards receiving. Wesley is also fourth in the league with six TD grabs, and his 17.2 yards per reception is impressive in an offense reliant on short throws.

EXTRA POINTS

A win would put Tech in a bowl for the 16th time since 2000. ... Iowa State broke and then matched the school records for sacks in a game in its last two outings, recording seven apiece against Oklahoma State and West Virginia. The Cyclones average 3.3 sacks a game, third-best in the country. ... Red Raiders opponents are converting just 30.8 percent of their third downs, which ranks second in the Big 12. Tech was last in that category a year ago. ... Iowa State's eight losses since the start of 2017 have all been by 10 points or less.

HE SAID IT

"From stories I've heard, everybody says it gets real cold up there. Sometimes the grass freezes over, and it's like playing on icicles." — Texas Tech cornerback Adrian Frye said of playing in Ames. The forecast is for rain and a high of 55 degrees on Saturday.

While the focal point of the Dallas offense is still second in the league in rushing with 619 yards, there have been a lot of tough yards for Elliott. Plus, he's coming off the second-worst game of his career: 33 yards on 15 carries in a 20-17 loss to Washington.

While there were some bright spots for the NFL's 29th-ranked passing attack with the Redskins so focused on Elliott, including Prescott's season-high 273 yards, there were still plenty of problems for an offense averaging just 13.5 points on the road.

"I think it's going to help us as an offense," Linehan said. "You add firepower to your offense in proven-type guys like this, gives you some options. And even if it's just the threat of the option, it might help the other part of your offense."

Prescott and Cooper have been on opposing sidelines several times, mostly notably as juniors in college when Cooper and the Crimson Tide handed Mississippi State its first loss in 2014 when

the Bulldogs were ranked No. 1 for the first time in school history.

Last year, the Cowboys were hanging on to fading playoff hopes against the also-ran Raiders in a 20-17 Dallas victory in Week 15. Prescott had a mostly forgettable night and Cooper was out with an ankle injury. Now they're hoping to make memories together.

ball," Cooper said. "It's a good ball." And Prescott thinks the Cowboys made a good move.



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
