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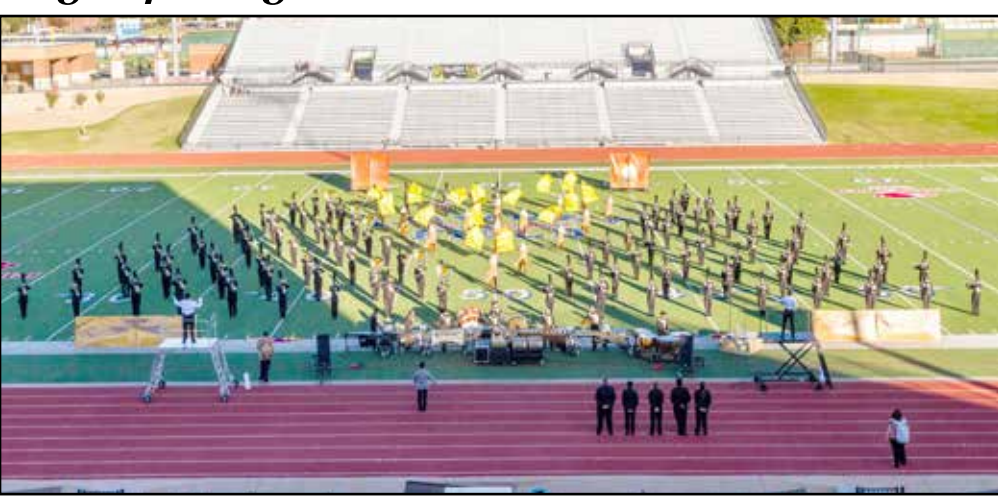

Early voting ends Friday

Totals so far exceed expectations

Early voting in the 2018 midterm elections is coming to an end...if you haven't voted early yet, you have today and tomorrow left to cast your ballot early, and the Howard County Elections Office has planned extended hours for the last two days of early voting.

"Early voting ends Friday, and our extended hours are Thursday and Friday," said Howard County Elections Administrator Jodi Duck. "Both days are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m."

All early voting is done at the Howard County Courthouse, 300 S. Main Street in Big Spring.

Duck said early voting turnout so far has been good.

"It's been wonderful. It's exceeded expectations," she said. "Last night we ended with 3,514; and so we still have today and two more days after that."

For those who don't get their votes in during the early voting portion of the election, Election Day is Nov. 6. Voting on Election Day will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and polling locations will depend on the precinct each voter lives in. Duck suggests checking your Voter Registration Card to find your precinct number.

"That's the best place, and then match it with the list we have posted on our web page and Facebook page," she said. "They match that precinct, and that's where they go."

A new road sealing process might make Howard County roads a bit more resistant to damage.

The process, called "inverted prime," was presented to commissioners by County Road Administrator Brian Klinksiek, and discussed and approved

during the Commissioners Court meeting Wednesday afternoon.

"In traditional road building, you will build, you will shape, then you prime with an MC30, an emulsion that you put a layer on top, and then you go to your first course of seal,"

Both Big Spring and Forsan high school's bands look forward to hitting the road and heading to San Antonio next week to compete in the State marching competition after qualifying at Area. The State contest takes place Nov. 5, 6 and 7.

Forsan Band Director, Jim Rhodes, is so excited to be sending his marching band to the State Contest in San Antonio next week. Forsan's band qualified for State by advancing at the Area marching contest in Amarillo this past Saturday. There were 22 bands that competed in the prelims, and 10 were chosen to march in the finals that night. When the final announcement was made, Forsan High School had finished 2nd overall and earned a spot at State along with Sundown High School, New Deal High School and Panhandle High School.

There are only 17 Bands in class 2A in the entire state of Texas that qualified, and Forsan is among those bands. All 17 will march at State, and 7 will be chosen for the Finals. Gold, Silver and Bronze medals will be awarded to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners.

This is Forsan's 11th straight time to qualify for State. They were the State Champions in 2007 and have also won 3 Silver medals.

"We would like to give a special thanks to Assistant Band Director, Chans Moellendorf, and Color Guard instructor, Misty Moellendorf. Also, a big thanks to our community, administration, teachers, staff, and to our wonderful chaperones and drivers," said Rhodes. "It truly takes a 'Team Forsan' to have this kind of success."

Forsan will leave next Monday, November 5, at 10:00am to head to San Antonio. Forsan

Klinksiek said. "With this, we will get it to shape, we will place a layer of RC250 (asphalt) and a Grade 5 rock, which will allow this asphalt to sit over the winter. Part of that is letting it sit for some period of time before we seal it the following summer, as opposed to the traditional method, which allows the asphalt to bleed and come through, and cause some of the problems we're seeing in our area due to heavy traffic."

Klinksiek said that, when the asphalt bleeds through to the surface of the road, it often sticks to tires of vehicles passing over it, pulling up and damaging the road surface.

Commissioners unanimously approved allowing Klinksiek to give the inverted prime method a try.

Recent heavy rains prompted Klinksiek to request approval for another change to Road and Bridge procedure.

"In some places, the water damage reminds me of Hill County water damage, which means it has been significant, and at times it's been taxing my department's ability to fix things," Klinksiek said. "I purchased three pallets of cement yesterday, and by 3 o'clock all three pallets of cement were poured into different holes that we still had underwater."

Road repair materials already in county possession are slated for other projects, he added.

"I realized that in order to fix some areas, I need some materials from somewhere outside of our normal course," he said. "We had a significant problem on County Road 54, and if I started taking the base out of the yard, that base is already designated to go to Moss Lake Road. So if I use that material, I'm fixing one problem and I'm causing another one."

Klinksiek's solution is to pre-purchase road base material to be left with the seller until needed, and then picked up and used in response to road repair needs.

"After looking at it, I got some numbers from Laredo paving. They've got a pit down near Forsan," he said. "What I want to do is, the price you see for that rock is approximately \$10,000. There is some additional flex-base which is approximately

\$9,000, which is \$19,000, which is less than the amount we receive for lateral road every year. So it is my request to be able to move forward with locking this in with Laredo Paving, and it is sitting in their pit for when we need it for emergencies."

Commissioners approved the request unanimously.

In other business, commissioners:

- Met in closed executive session for more than an hour to discuss personnel considerations, mineral and radio system contracts, and subdivision rules.

- Approved county invoices, purchase requests, and budget amendments.

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Why is it so hard to text 911?

NEW YORK — People can livestream their every move on Facebook and chatter endlessly in group chats. But in most parts of the U.S., they still can't reach 911 by texting — an especially important service during mass shootings and other catastrophes when a phone call could place someone in danger.

Although text-to-911 service is slowly expanding, the emphasis there is on "slow." Limited funds, piecemeal adoption and outdated call-center technology have all helped stymie growth.

Emergency 911 centers stress that a phone call is still the best way to reach them, since calls provide them with location data and other needed details. But in some cases — for instance, if a person has a hearing disability, or when a call might attract the attention of assailants — texting is a far better way to call for help.

The 911 emergency system was developed for landlines. But now about 80 percent of U.S. 911 calls come from cell-phones, according to the federal government's National 911 Program. There is no legal requirement for call centers to offer text-to-911 services.

If a center requests the service from mobile companies like Verizon or Sprint, however, the companies are required to provide it within six months.

More money would speed implementation. "We need a significant federal grant program to modernize 911 systems across the country," said Jeff Cohen, chief counsel at advocacy group the Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials.

Congressional legislation could speed adoption of text-to-911, and while there are two bills currently making their way through Congress related to the issue, they need more bipartisan support, Cohen said. Traditionally 911 call centers have been funded by a combination of state and local funding, rather than relying on federal grants. For that reason technology and adoption varies widely between states, cities and counties.

While some areas may have plenty of money to implement text-to-911 service, "others are cash strapped cities or communities that would rather spend money on a police car rather than text-to-911," said Brian Fontes, chief executive officer of the National Emergency Number Association. "When you don't have the money you have to prioritize what you do with the money you have."

The first text-to-911 was sent in 2009 in Iowa. Now, according to data collected by the Federal Communications Commission, more than 1,600 emergency call centers across the nation have configured systems to receive text message requests for 911 services, up from about 650 two years ago. But that's barely a quarter of the roughly 6,000 overall in the country. Figures are a bit murky since they are self-reported to the FCC.

Implementing text-to-911 service usually starts with a state law requiring emergency centers to support it.

Indiana, for example, has state 911 requirements set by the Indiana General Assembly and a state 911 board that oversees the operation of the statewide 911 network, which routes and delivers 911 voice and text messages from people to their local 911 authority. It pays for 911 from monthly end user surcharges, \$1 for landline, wireless and other types of phones, which are collected by phone service providers.

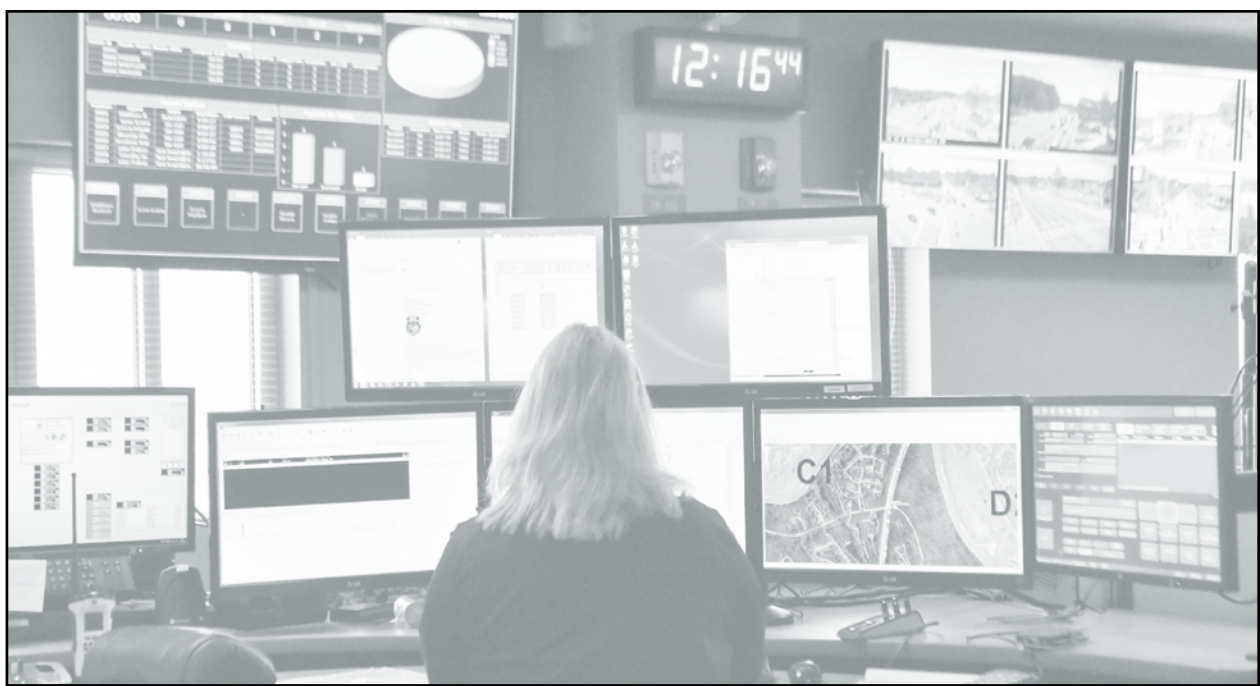
Four years after Indiana dispatch centers began adopting text-to-911 technology, residents in all 92 of the state's counties can send texts during emergencies if they're unable to speak to dispatchers, the state said in June. Minnesota, Connecticut, Maine and Vermont also offer statewide coverage.

Without state legislation, adopting text-to-911 can be more piecemeal. In California, a plan to raise taxes to pay for modernizing the 911 emergency dispatch system statewide fell one vote short in September in the Senate when Republicans refused to sign onto a tax increase.

But cities and municipalities can decide to support text-to-911 on their own. Los Angeles County, which includes cities like Los Angeles, Burbank and Glendale, has supported text-to-911 since late last year, for example.

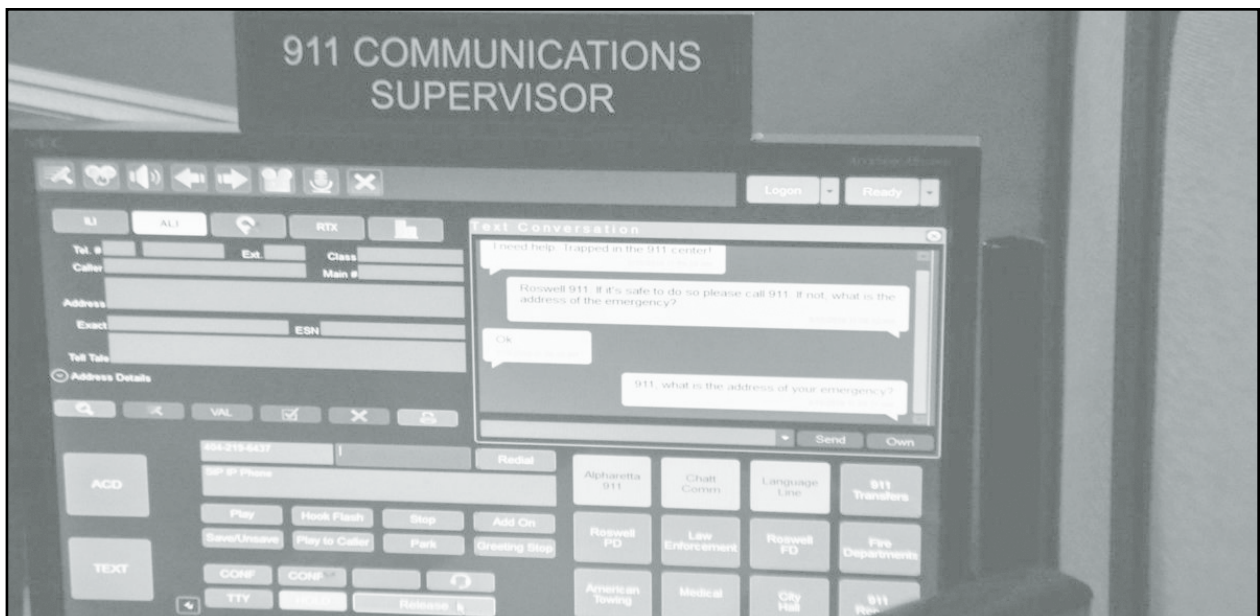
Allegheny County in Pennsylvania, where the synagogue shooting took place, does offer text-to-911 service. But high school students hiding from a gunman in Parkland, Florida, last February, had to make whispered 911 calls to authorities. Broward County, which includes Parkland, plans to have text-to-911 in place by the end of this year.

"We will never know where the next active shooter is going to be, whether it's a rural school, synagogue, church or any public place," said Fontes. "Certainly we want people to be able to text 911 for safety purposes."

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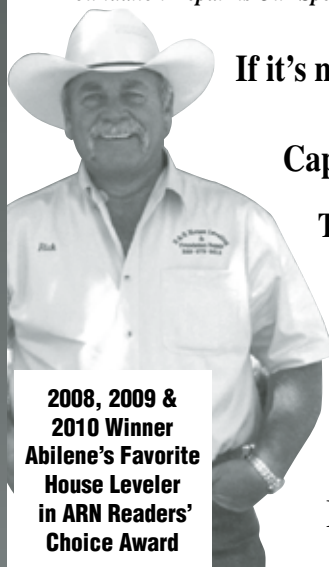
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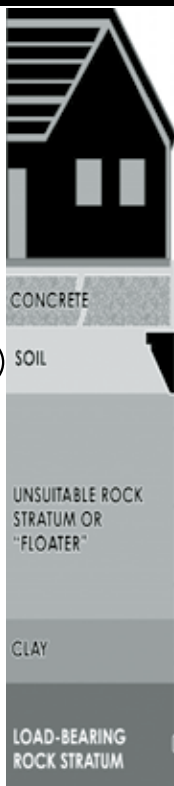

The bidding:

Opening lead — king of diamonds.

A cursory glance at today's deal might lead one to conclude that South is certain to make four spades. With the opposing trumps divided 3-2, it appears he cannot lose more than the ace of spades and two diamonds.

Yet, when the deal occurred, declarer failed to make the contract. And, what's more, there was absolutely nothing he could do about it!

West began by cashing the K-A of diamonds, then stopped to consider where his side might pick up another

trick in addition to his ace of spades. It was obvious that East could not hold the ace of hearts, king of clubs or any high spade, since South had to have all of those cards for his opening bid.

West therefore decided that his only hope was to try to promote an extra trick in the trump suit. And so, at trick three he continued with the nine of diamonds, knowing full well that he was presenting declarer with the opportunity for a ruff-and-discard, normally the bane of all defenders.

Dummy trumped, and East did his part by ruffing with the ten, forcing South to overruff with the jack. Declarer then crossed to dummy with a club and led a spade to the queen, losing to the ace.

West thereupon returned another diamond, ruffed by East with the eight. Declarer could now choose his own poison, as either East's eight or West's nine would score the setting trick.

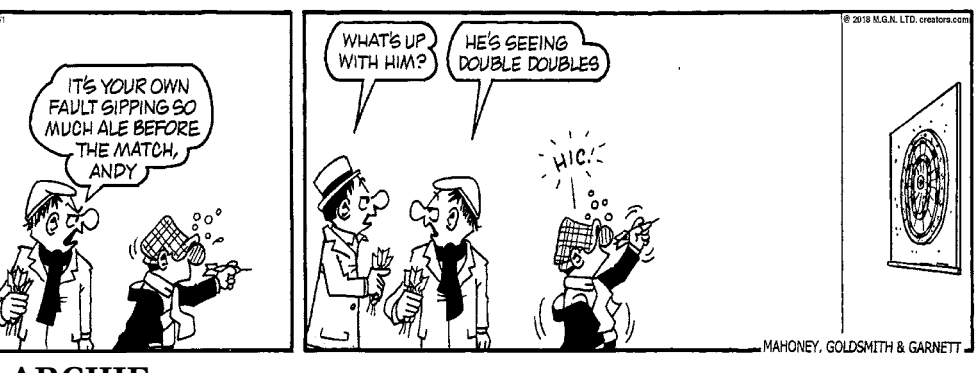
Of course, had West adopted a more passive approach by returning anything but a diamond at trick three, declarer would have made his game easily. But West worked out what was needed to defeat the contract and then put his plan into action, even though this meant defying the old ruff-and-discard bugaboo.

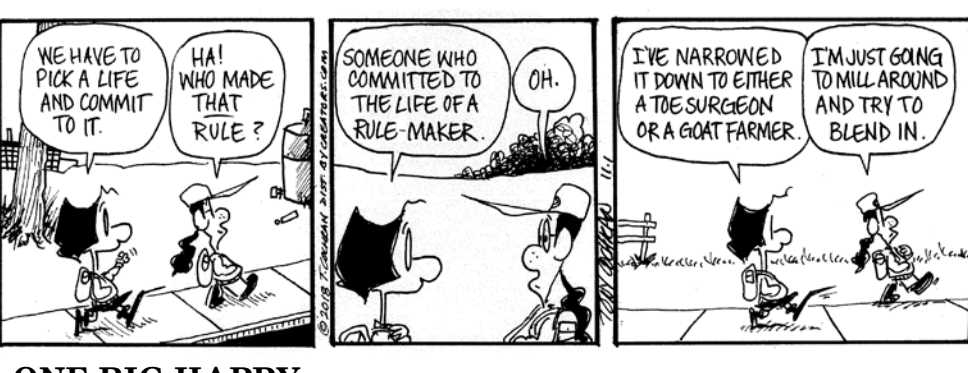

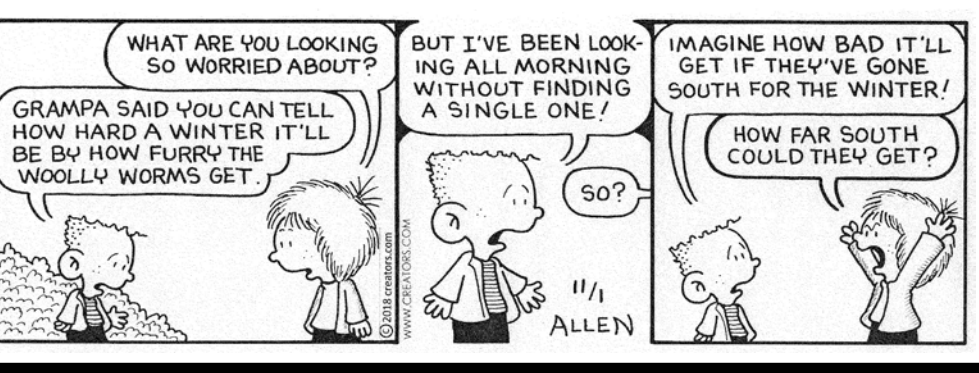
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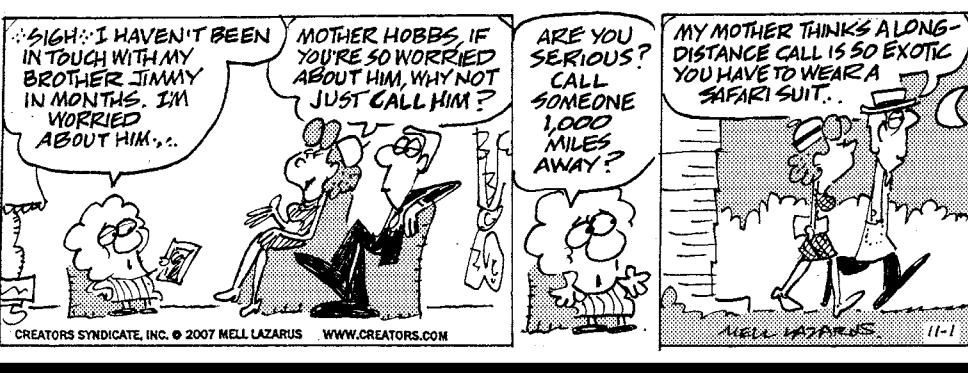

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Nov. 1, the 305th day of 2018. There are 60 days left in the year. This is All Saints Day.

Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 1, 1952, the United States exploded the first hydrogen bomb, code-named "Ivy Mike," at Enewetak (en-ih-WEE'-tahk) Atoll in the Marshall Islands.

On this date: In 1512, Michelangelo's just-completed paintings on the ceiling of the Vatican's Sistine Chapel were publicly unveiled by the artist's patron, Pope Julius II.

In 1765, the Stamp Act, passed by the British Parliament, went into effect, prompting stiff resistance from American colonists.

In 1861, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln named Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan General-in-Chief of the Union armies, succeeding Lt. Gen. Winfield Scott.

In 1870, the United States Weather Bureau made its first meteorological observations.

In 1936, in a speech in Milan, Italy, Benito Mussolini described the alliance between his country and Nazi Germany as an "axis" running between Rome and Berlin.

In 1949, an Eastern Airlines DC-4 collided in midair with a Lockheed P-38 fighter plane near Washington National Airport, killing all 55 people aboard the DC-4 and seriously injuring the pilot of the P-38.

In 1950, two Puerto Rican nationalists tried to force their way into Blair House in Washington, D.C., in a failed attempt to assassinate President Harry S. Truman. (One of the pair was killed, along with a White House police officer.)

In 1968, the Motion Picture Association of America unveiled its new voluntary film rating system: G for general, M for mature (later changed to GP, then PG), R for restricted and X (later changed to NC-17) for adults only.

In 1973, following the "Saturday Night Massacre," Acting Attorney General Robert H. Bork appointed Leon Jaworski to be the new Watergate special prosecutor, succeeding Archibald Cox.

In 1989, East Germany reopened its border with Czechoslovakia, prompting tens of thousands of refugees to flee to the West.

In 1991, Clarence Thomas took his place as the newest justice on the Supreme Court.

In 1995, Bosnia peace talks

opened in Dayton, Ohio, with the leaders of Bosnia, Serbia and Croatia present.

Ten years ago: Democrat Barack Obama and Republican John McCain plunged through the final weekend of their marathon race for the White House; McCain poked fun at his campaign's financial shortcomings and his reputation as a political maverick in an appearance on NBC's "Saturday Night Live." Machinists union members ratified a new contract with The Boeing Co., ending an eight-week strike.

Five years ago: A man carrying a bag with a note that said he "wanted to kill TSA" opened fire with a semi-automatic rifle at a security checkpoint at Los Angeles International Airport, killing a TSA officer and wounding two others. (Gerardo Hernandez, 39, became the first TSA officer in the agency's 12-year history to be killed in the line of duty. Paul Ciancia pleaded guilty to murder and 10 other charges in exchange for prosecutors dropping efforts to seek the death penalty; he was sentenced to life plus 60 years.) A U.S. drone strike killed Hakimullah Mehsud (hah-ke-MUH'-lah meh-SOOD'), leader of the Pakistani Taliban.

One year ago: Federal prosecutors brought terrorism charges against the man accused in the Manhattan truck rampage a day earlier that left eight people dead; prosecutors said Sayfullo Saipov had asked to display the Islamic State group's flag in the hospital room where he was recovering from police gunfire. President Donald Trump tweeted that the suspect in the truck attack should get the death penalty. Prompting celebrations in a city still recovering from Hurricane Harvey, the Houston Astros won their first World Series championship, beating the Dodgers 5-1 in Game 7 in Los Angeles.

"Everyone else said it was just a branch or something tapping in the

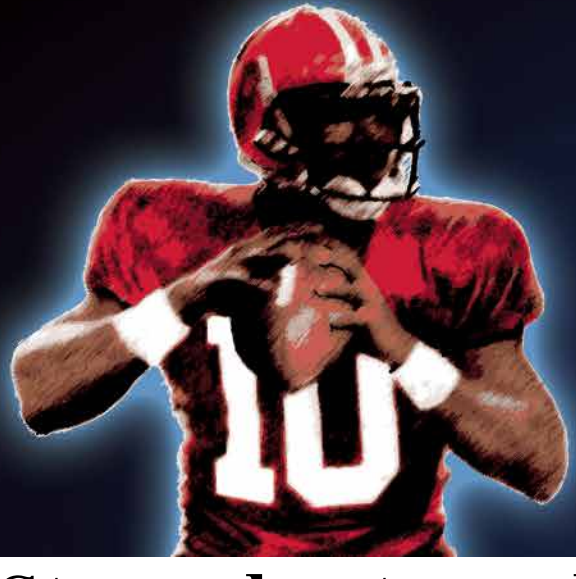

Steers host run heavy Seminole in big district matchup

The Steers dropped their first district game last week in a tough 42-20 home loss to rival Andrews. This Friday 2-6 Big Spring will host the 4-3 Seminole Indians looking to get back to even in district play. The Indians enter Friday's matchup with the Steers coming off a big 55-6 district win over San Angelo Lake View last week. Seminole is a run first team that will look to get an early lead then shorten the game by pounding the rock.

The Indians are averaging 347 yards and 31 points per game this year offensively with 266 yards per game on the ground. The Steers will have to play well at

The 1-7 Buffs welcome the 7-1 Hawley Bearcats into town this Friday looking to get their first district win of the season. The Bearcats enter this week's matchup against the Buffs coming off an impressive 56-42 win over Stamford last week to give them outright district lead. Forsan will have to play their best game of the season this week if they hope to derail this talented Hawley team. Look for the Buffs to try to establish the run early to shorten the game and keep the dangerous Bearcats' offense on the sidelines.

Hawley's offense has been nothing short of dominant this year averaging 416 yards and 36 points per game this sea-

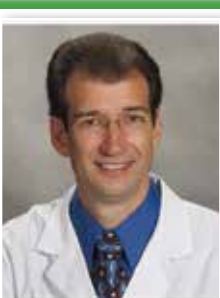
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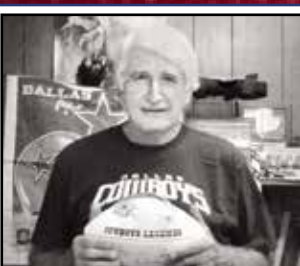
