
to make sure we remember people that don't have a full plate of food and their bowls are empty. We want to shine some awareness on that.

WikiLeaks chief could see charges, US court filing suggests

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Justice Departinadvertently named Julian Assange in a court filing in an unrelated case, suggesting prosecutors have prepared charges against the WikiLeaks founder under seal.

pears twice in a recently-unsealed August court filing from a federal prosecutor in Virginia who was attempting to keep sealed a separate case involving a man accused of coercing a minor for sex.

In one sentence, the prosecutor wrote that the charges and arrest warrant "would need to remain sealed until Assange is arrested in connection with the charges in the criminal complaint and can therefore no longer evade or avoid arrest and extradition in this matter."

In another sentence, the prosecutor said that "due to the sophistication of the defendant and the publicity surrounding the case, no other procedure is likely to keep confidential the fact that Assange has been charged."

Any charges against Assange could help illuminate whether Russia coordinated with the Trump campaign to sway the 2016 presidential election. It would also suggest that, after years of internal wrangling within the Justice Department, prosecutors have decided to take a more aggressive tact against the secretsharing website.

It was not immediately clear why Assange's name was included in the document, though Joshua Stueve, a spokesman for the revealed. Vigil service will investigating Assange — said, "The court filing was made in error. That was not the intended name for this filing." The Washington Post

reported late Thursday, citing people familiar with the matter, that Assange had indeed been charged. The Associated Press could not immediately confirm that.

It was not immediately clear what charges Assange, who has been holed up for years in the Ecuadorian Embassy in London, might face.

But recently ousted Attorney General Jeff Sessions last year declared the arrest of Assange a priority. Special counsel Robert Mueller has been investigating whether Trump campaign associates had advance knowledge of Democratic emails that were published by WikiLeaks in the weeks before the 2016 election and that U.S. authorities have said were hacked by Russia.

Barry Pollack, a lawyer for Assange, told the AP earlier this week that he had no information about possible charges against Assange.

In a new statement, he said, "The news that criminal charges have apparently been filed against Mr. Assange is even more troubling than the haphazard manner in which that information has been someone for publishing truthful information is a dangerous path for a democracy to take."

The filing was discovered by Seamus Hughes, a terrorism expert at the Program on Extremism at George Washington University, who posted it on Twitter hours after The Wall Street Journal reported that the Justice Department was preparing to prosecute Assange and said, "To be clear, seems Freudian, it's for a different completely unrelated case, every other page is not related to him, EDVA just appears to have Assange on the mind when filing motions to seal and used his name."

The case at issue concerns a defendant named Seitu Sulayman Kokayi, a 29-year-old teacher who has since been indicted in Virginia on charges of enticing a 15-year-old girl to commit sex acts and to produce child pornography.

The document, a motion filed in late August asking to keep Kokayi's case secret, mentions Assange in two boilerplate sections, suggesting a copy-and-paste error or that his name was inadvertently left in a template used for the common filings. That document has since been unsealed.

There doesn't appear to be any connection between Assange and Kokayi.

Assange, 47, has resided in the Ecuadorthan six years in a bid to avoid being extradited to Sweden, where he was wanted to sex crimes, or to the United States, whose government he has repeatedly humbled with mass disclosures of classified in-

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Migrants streaming into Tijuana, but now face long stay

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — Exhausted migrants in a caravan of Central American asylum-seekers napped on mattresses in a converted municipal gymnasium, while men played soccer and exchanged banter on a crowded, adjoining courtyard. A woman dabbed her crying, naked toddler with a moist cloth.

Nearly 2,000 caravan migrants had reached the U.S. border in Mexico's northwestern corner by Thursday, with more coming in a steady trickle of buses. The city of Tijuana, with its privately run shelters operating well above their capacity of 700, opened the gymnasium and gated sport complex for up to 1,000 migrants, with a potential to expand

With U.S. border inspectors processing only about 100 asylum claims a day at the main border crossing with San Diego, prospects grew that migrants would be stuck waiting in Tijuana for months. Francisco Rueda, the top deputy to Baja Califor-

nia state Gov. Francisco Vega de la Madrid, said about 1,750 migrants from the caravan had reached Tijuana so far.

"This is not a crisis," he told reporters, though he agreed that "this is an extraordinary situation."

Rueda said the state has 7,000 jobs available for its "Central American migrant brothers" who obtain legal residence status in Mexico. "Today in Baja California there is an employment

opportunity for those who request it, but it order for this to happen, it has to regulate migrant status," he said. The city's thriving factories are always looking

for workers, and several thousand Haitian migrants who were turned away at the U.S. border have found jobs and settled in Tijuana the last two Police made their presence known in a city that is

suffering an all-time-high homicide rate. A group of about 50 migrants, mostly women and children, walked through downtown streets Thursday from the city shelter to a breakfast hall under police es-

As buses from western and central Mexico trickled in, some families camped inside the bus terminal and waited for word on where they could find a safe place to sleep. Oscar Zapata, 31, reached the Tijuana bus sta-

tion at 2 a.m. Thursday from Guadalajara with his wife and their three children, ages 4, 5 and 12, and headed to the breakfast hall, where migrants were served free beef and potatoes.

Back home in La Ceiba, Honduras, he sold pirated CDs and DVDs in the street and two gangs demanding "protection" money threatened to kidnap his daughter and force her into prostitution if he didn't pay. When he heard about the caravan on the TV news last month, he didn't think twice.

"It was the opportunity to get out," Zapata said.

Zapata said he hopes to join a brother in Los Angeles but has not yet decided on his next move. Like many others, he plans to wait in Tijuana for others in the caravan to arrive and gather more information before seeking asylum in the United States.

Byron Jose Blandino, a 27-year-old bricklayer from Nicaragua who slept in the converted gymnasium, said he wanted to request asylum but not until he could speak with someone well-versed in U.S. law and asylum procedures.

"The first thing is to wait," Blandino said. "I do not want to break the laws of any country. If I could enter in a peaceful manner, that would be good.

To claim asylum in San Diego, migrants enter their names in a tattered notebook held together by

duct tape and managed by the migrants in a plaza outside the entry to the main border crossing. On Thursday, migrants who registered six weeks ago were getting their names called. The waiting list has grown to more than 3,000 names and stands to become much longer with the new arrivals. Dozens of gay and transgender migrants in the

caravan were already lining up Thursday to submit asylum claims, though it was unclear how soon they would be able to do so.

Rueda, the governor's deputy, said that if all migrants from the caravan currently in Tijuana were to register to seek asylum in the U.S., they would likely have to wait four months at current processing rates. For that reason, the state has asked Mexican federal authorities to encourage people in other caravans to go to other border cities.

There are real questions about how the city of more than 1.6 million will manage to handle the migrant caravans working their way through Mexico, which may total 10,000 people in all.

"No city in the world is prepared to receive this number of migrants," said Mario Osuna, Tijuana's social development director. He said the city hopes Mexico's federal government "will start legalizing these people immediately" so they can get jobs and earn a living.

The caravan has fragmented somewhat in recent days in a final push to the border, with some migrants moving rapidly in buses and others falling behind.

On Thursday, hundreds were stranded for most of the day at a gas station in Navojoa, some 750 miles (1,200 kilometers) from Tijuana.

"We were dropped here at midnight ... in the middle of nowhere, where supposedly some buses were going to come pick us up, but nothing," Alejandra Grisel Rodriguez of Honduras told The Associated Press by phone. "We are without water, without

After about 12 hours, seven buses began arriving to collect the migrants, Rodriguez said, but they quickly filled up.

"We would need at least 40 or 50," she said.

Texas sheriff: spare gun malfunctioned, deputy shot in foot



Parker County Sheriff Larry Fowler said Thursday that the concealed backup gun was in a holster and strapped to the deputy when it fired. Fowler says Monday's shooting remains under investigation and deputies were still seeking a trespasser seen on the private property.

The gun will undergo ballistics and other function tests.

The deputy was shot while dispatched to a rural area about 14 miles (22.5 kilometers) west of Fort Worth. The department had received a complaint from a landowner about an illegal deer blind.

Officials initially blamed a trespasser for the shooting.

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

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

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Reflections: Lincoln's Thanksgiving

Perhaps more than any other historical figure, Abraham Lincoln continues to shape the American



psyche. The success of Stephen Spielberg's movie, Lincoln, gives some indication of our continued fascination with the 16th President.

When we think of Thanksgiving, we usually think of Pilgrims and Indians gathered for a harvest feast at Plymouth, but it was Abraham Lincoln who gave us Thanksgiving as a national holiday. Prior to Lincoln, each state celebrated Thanks-BILL giving on different dates according to the discretion of TINSLEY each state's governor.

In 1863, in the middle of the Civil War, Lincoln issued a

presidential proclamation for a national day of thanksgiving.

After noting the many blessings of God in spite of the Civil War with all its suffering and severity, Lincoln wrote in his proclamation, "No human counsel hath devised nor hat any mortal hand with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

"It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged, as with one heart and one voice, by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent

peace, harmony, tranquility and union.'

Ever since that proclamation, Americans have paused on a Thursday in November to reflect on

God's blessing with humility and thanksgiving. Most are aware that Lincoln never joined a church. But it is abundantly clear that the one book that most shaped his thought was the Bible. References to Scripture can be found throughout his speeches and conversations. And his Presidential proclamation creating a national day of Thanksgiving challenges us all to a faith that includes confession of our sins, compassion for our fellow man and gratitude to our Heavenly Father. As we gather for our Thanksgiving observance next week may we hear again Lincoln's exhortation. May we seek God's face and trust in His Son that our sins might be forgiven and that we might be a nation of righteousness that blesses the earth.

It has material from Mother's Grandmother's and my aunt's clothing. I have had several nieces and granddaughters help with quilting it. What a legacy!!!


But, and you knew that was coming—I have a new life in Jesus Christ. The lesson from the clothing that

Brenham man talks about how Operation Christmas Child brightened life in Kazakhstan orphanage

BRENHAM, Texas - Christmas cheer for chil-

dren all around the world can come in all sizes. For many, it can come in something as small as

First Baptist Church's Sycamore House is the collection site for the annual Operation Christmas Child project. So far, more than 1,000 boxes have been accepted at the dropoff site. The boxes will be eventually distributed to children in need around

One of these recipients was a young boy from Petropavlovsk, Kazakhstan, who now lives in Bren-

Ethan Lawhon was in an orphanage for nine years there before being adopted by Marcus and Wendy Lawhon on Dec. 17, 2004. He hasn't forgotten the first time he received a shoebox.

"I was very surprised to receive a Christmas box," said Lawhon. "I actually did not know at the time what it was, until our orphanage caregivers gave clues that it was a gift from different places from all over including churches, different churches from the states."

He received one for four years, but said there was one in particular he will never forget.

"I saw a lot of kids receive boxes there in my orphanage, but my favorite one of all that i got was a prayer card that said, 'You are going to get a family that will be picking you up the next Christmas," Lawhon said. The letter came from Here I Am Orphan Ministries and was inserted in the box he re-

ceived. "So that Christmas of 2003 is when I got a letter in my shoebox that it was coming from an adoptive family that was going to adopt me. Sure enough a year later I was adopted."

While Lawhon admitted his testimony on what he called "a miracle" could "take the whole day," he said receiving Christmas boxes at the orphanage was very special to him and his fellow orphans.

"Getting these when I was in orphanage knowing that I did not have family there ... so being able to have a Christmas gift was a big deal to a lot of

the kids and to me too," said Lawhon. "I would get

clothes, I would get school stuff like artwork, art supplies and just little snacks.

I was four years recipient of this shoebox. At Christmas I would get one. The last one was a true miracle actually and that was a sign that I was getting an adopted family."

He recommended that churches and people contribute to the program any way they can, including filling shoeboxes or giving monetary donations for shipping. They have a special impact on the recipients, said Lawhon.

"They (orphans) don't get to spend Christmas with their families but with a lot of other kids their age," he said. "It would be an encouraging thing for those children, and it's also a way of knowing Christ. Because I got to know Jesus Christ through these shoeboxes, I would get letters, and still have those letters actually saved from those shoeboxes that I received that said 'Jesus loves you.' It's

amazing. "It means a lot to a lot of those kids that don't have families that churches out there love and support the children from all over the world," he added, thanking all the churches who partner up with

BEIRUT (AP) — Two rival Lebanese Christian leaders reconciled Wednesday ending four decades of enmity triggered by a massacre of dozens during Lebanon's 1975-1990 civil war. Samir Geagea, leader of the Leba-

nese Forces group, and Sleiman Frangieh of the Marada Party shook hands and kissed each other on the cheeks at the headquarters of the Maronite Christian church north of Beirut. The reconciliation was sponsored by Cardinal Bechara al-Rai, head of the Maronite church, Leba-

Geagea and Frangieh met in the past, but Wednesday marked the end of a bitter rivalry tainted with blood.

"It is so nice for brothers to sit together. I welcome you through prayers as happiness fills my heart and the heart of all Lebanese," al-Rai said in a speech after the two leaders met in front of journalists.

The two leaders are Maronite Christian and are both presidential hopefuls. Their reconciliation comes at a time when both their relations have become tense with foreign minister, Gibran Bassil, another presidential hopeful who heads the Free Patriotic

"The church has meant so much to me my whole life because of the people in the church," Linder said. "Lots of us got married in this church. I can't imagine going to another church.

People we haven't seen in years have come back just for this."

One might say Delia Wall was raised in the church. When her mother had her third miscarriage, someone from the church helped her find a baby to adopt.

That baby was Wall, who joined First United of Lake Jackson as an infant in 1958 and said the care church members took to help her mother is what has kept it standing strong these past 75 years.

"They took seeds and planted them," Wall said. "My Sunday school teacher, she followed us along from pre-K until high school. That must have been hard for her to do that, but she cared so much.

I left later to go to Jacksonville and I've only been back 16 years but I remember going, through those doors with tears on my cheeks going, 'I'm home."

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
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

Test your play

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump, and North leads the four of spades. South wins with the king and returns the seven, which you cover with the ten. North takes the queen and shifts to the jack of hearts. How would you play so as to ensure the contract against any distribution of the North-South cards?

West

- 2. You are declarer with the West hand at the ambitious contract of Seven Hearts, and North leads the queen of spades. Assuming the trumps are divided 2-2, how would you play the hand?

1. The only way you can be 100 percent sure of the contract is to play dummy's king and your ace on North's jack of hearts! Now lead the jack of spades to force out the ace, establishing two spade tricks in your

Let's assume North wins and makes the neutral return of a club to dummy's queen. You next lead a low heart to your eight. Regardless of how the opponents defend, they cannot stop you from reaching your hand with either the eight or ten of hearts, so you are certain to score two spades, two hearts, two diamonds and three clubs to come to

If you adopt any other line of play, you might make the contract, but you cannot be sure of it. The extraordinary play of the A-K of hearts at trick three removes all doubt about the outcome.

2. Take the ace of spades, cash the A-K of hearts, lead a diamond from dummy and finesse the nine. If the nine wins, enter dummy with a trump and repeat the finesse. If the diamonds are divided 3-3 or 4-2, you make the contract by discarding three spades from dummy and then ruffing the ten of spades.

It would be wrong to cash the A-K of diamonds, planning to ruff a diamond in dummy. Unless the queen fell under the A-K — less than a 20 percent chance — it would then be impossible to avoid a spade loser. As opposed to this, a first-round diamond finesse against the queen offers nearly a 50 percent chance of suc-

Note that it would also be wrong to cash the ace of diamonds first and then try the finesse, since you could no longer make the slam if South started with four diamonds to the queen.

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

Vander Esch showing 1st-round talent as rookie for Cowboys

FRISCO, Texas — Leighton Vander Esch said it almost felt weird to have the ball in his hands again on the first NFL interception for the Dallas Cowboys linebacker.

The rookie from Boise State who used to play every down — offense and defense — for his eight-man high school team never said anything about it feeling strange to diagnose a screen pass before it was in the air, slip past a pair of blockers and make a critical open-field tackle for loss.

That defensive play of the game in a season-saving win at Philadelphia was a signature moment weeks in the making, through preparation and focus that Vander Esch said should be expected of any team's first-round draft pick. At least that's how he sees

"I've never really thought that I've been caught off-guard with anyoverall last spring . "I'm confident in my abilities and my athleticism, in my preparation. It's going to put me in position to make plays on the field on game day."

Vander Esch established a Cowboys rookie record with 19 tackles against the Eagles, according to the coaches' count. He's the first rookie Dallas linebacker with an interception since injured teammate and mentor Sean Lee had two in the same game eight years ago.

Barring a surge from Jaylon Smith, who figures to be his linebacking partner for years to come in Dallas, Vander Esch could become the first rookie to lead the Cowboys (4-5) in tackles since coaches starting tracking the stat in 1977.

Vander Esch hasn't struggled nearly as much, perhaps in part because he's had Smith out there with him. And he's had Lee in his ear on the sidelines — and in the meeting rooms all week. The Cowboys have raved

about Lee's preparation for years.

"He's lucky to have a guy like Sean Lee in that room with him," coach Jason Garrett said. "To see that example really each and every day in your room, up close, seeing how a guy like that does it, how he approaches it, I think that's been really good for him."

Baylor focused on bowl for its seniors, not keeping TCU out

WACO, Texas — Baylor coach Matt Rhule is more interested in what his team and the seniors who stuck around can accomplish, and not what the Bears could do to Big 12 rival TCU in the process.

The Bears (5-5, 3-4 Big 12) can get bowl eligible with a win Saturday in the home finale for 10 fifth-year seniors who remained through a sexual assault scandal that rocked the school more than two years ago, and led to only one win in Rhule's debut last season. They host the Horned Frogs (4-6, 2-5), who have to win their last two games to get to a bowl.

"Probably no group of seniors has ever been through more than they've been through," Rhule said. "My whole focus with our team this week is going to be about sending the seniors out on senior day the right way, and really send them out with the best home record. ... This is a special group to me, and I'd love to have a chance to play one more game with them."

Baylor will honor 20 seniors overall before the game. That includes the fifth-year guys and three players who came into the program from other schools as graduate transfers.

Receiver Chris Platt, nose tackle Ira Lewis and the other fifth-year seniors arrived in Waco at the peak of the program's on-field success — after the Bears' first Big 12 championship in 2013, and then a share of the title in 2014 in their first season on campus. Eight of the fifth-year seniors already have degrees and could have gone elsewhere this season as graduate transfers. They have been part of two bowl wins, during a 10-win 2015 season and the Cactus Bowl

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Harden scores 27 as Rockets rout Warriors 107-86

HOUSTON — For a team with championship hopes, it seems a bit silly for the Houston Rockets to be happy about being .500.

But after the way they started the season, the Rockets took a moment to appreciate their recent progress after a rout of Golden State on Thursday night improved them to 7-7.

James Harden scored 27 points in Houston's 107-86 victory in a rematch of last season's Western Conference finals.

The Rockets, who announced before the game that they were "parting ways" with 10-time All-Star Carmelo Anthony, have won three straight and six of their last eight games after starting 1-5 to reach .500 for the first time since they were 1-1.

"I just told them: 'Congratulations, guys. We're .500. That's really good,'" coach Mike D'Antoni said with a laugh.

Then he got serious.

"This is a good step ... it's early but we do have the potential to be really good in different areas of the game and we've just got to keep building on it."

The Warriors, who got Draymond Green back from his suspension but were without Stephen Curry for the fourth straight game, have lost two of their last three. Curry has already been ruled out for Golden State's next two games because of a groin injury.

"We're banged up a little bit physically and right now we're banged up spiritually," Golden State coach Steve Kerr said. "There's no getting around that. So we've got to fill up our cup and get our spirit back, get our energy back and we're going to. It's a long season and this is a tough stretch we're dealing with."

Houston had a 13-point lead after three and opened the fourth quarter with a 12-2 run to make it 88-65 and

spur Kerr to call a timeout. The Rockets then scored the first nine points after the timeout, with six from James Ennis, to make it 97-65 midway through the quarter and put the game out of reach. Both teams cleared their benches a couple of minutes after

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Harden likes the attitude the Rockets have shown in clawing back after their terrible start.

"Our spirit and just the way we're getting after it," Harden said. "We're taking an individual challenge and the team challenge of guarding and offensively we're just sharing the basketball and obviously we're knocking down shots."

Kevin Durant had 20 points for the Warriors on a night they were just 4 of 18 on 3-pointers.

Green had five rebounds and five assists in his return from the one-game ban imposed by the team for a dust-up with Durant in Monday night's overtime loss to the Clippers. Green addressed the situation for the first time after shootaround but did not

apologize for his actions in the heated exchange.

He said he and Durant had spoken and that they were "moving forward."

"I think there's no secret that I am an emotional player," he said. "I wear my emotions on my sleeve. I play with that same emotion. Sometimes they get the best of me. And (if) it doesn't work to my favor I'm going to live with that."

Durant was in no mood to discuss their relationship after the game, saying: "Don't ask me about that again," before turning away from the reporter who posed the question.

While the Warriors dealt with the drama between Green and Durant, the Rockets were left to answer questions about the decision to move on from Anthony.

Anthony played just 10 games after signing a one-year, \$2.4 million deal during the offseason.

"In the summer we tried to hit a home run and it didn't work out," D'Antoni said. "He tried everything he could. He was great while he was here. It just didn't work out for whatever reason. I just thank him for his professionalism. It was good. He tried everything he could to make it work and it just didn't work out."

The Rockets opened the third quarter with a 7-2 run to stretch the lead to 54-43. Harden scored five straight points to make it 63-47 on his 3-pointer with about 5 1/2 minutes left in the quarter.

Golden State got going after that, using an 8-2 spurt to get within 65-55 a couple of minutes later.

Gary Clark ended the run with a 3-pointer, and two more 3s by him within a minute of each other late in the third extended the lead to 76-59. It was 76-63 headed to the fourth.
