Salvation Army, Clark issue Red Kettle Challenge

Big Spring businesses and organizations, you've been challenged.

The Salvation Army of Big Spring needs volunteers to ring bells next to their familiar Red Kettles to help raise money for the charitable organization's expense budget for the year. Seeing that the Salvation Army is faced with the prospect of having to pay money to hire bellringers, Star Dodge's Public Relations Manager Tabitha Clark came up with the idea of issuing a challenge to local businesses and groups to get out there and ring some bells. She coordinated the idea with Salvation Army Unit Commander Capt. Josh McKain, and now the Red Kettle Challenge is a

real thing. "Star works really closely with the Salvation Army," Clark said. "My GM called me and told me, 'I need you to call and set up the day for the bell ringing, because every year all of our employees take an hour and go ring the bell. We cover both doors at Wal-Mart. So I called Josh and said, 'Okay, what day do you have open?' He said, 'Tabitha, I have everything open, because I just don't have any volunteers.' Being PR manager, that got my wheels turning, so I came up with this. You know, everybody does the 'ice bucket challenge,' the 'Kiki challenge,' the whatever challenge. So I came up with 'Star's Red Kettle Challenge.' Basically I challenged every group, business, or organization, every club, to the Red Kettle Challenge. To get out there...all the businesses, everybody in Big Spring to get out there and volunteer. I don't care if it's an hour or two hours, or if you have a bigger business, you can do a whole day."


Clark said there won't be a big prize for the winning business, just a little bit of bragging rights.


The solution, said Clark, is to purchase a Salvation Army-themed trophy. The winner gets to keep it at their place of business until "Kettle season" the next year.



This deal occurred in the match between Iceland and Australia at the 1984 World Team Olympiad.


With an Icelandic pair North-South, the opening two-heart bid showed a hand containing specifically five hearts, four spades and 11 to 15 high-card points — and North had exactly what he said he had. South's four-notrump bid was Blackwood, and after North indicated two aces, South (Bjorn Eysteinsson) bid six spades.

When East doubled, Eysteinsson correctly interpreted the double as

showing a heart void and asked for an opening heart lead. Since he was missing an ace, Eysteinsson could not afford to lose a ruff also, so he retreated to six notrump.

A club lead would have resulted in an immediate five-trick set, but West decided to lead a diamond, his partner's suit. Even after this, declarer could count only 11 sure tricks four hearts, five spades and two diamonds — but he made the contract nevertheless.


He took the diamond lead with the ace, cashed five spade tricks, discarding a diamond from dummy, played the K-J of hearts and then overtook the nine with dummy's ten to produce this position:



When Eysteinsson next cashed the heart ace, East found himself in dire straits. He could not spare a diamond, so he discarded the club queen. This allowed declarer to part with a diamond and return the club king from dummy, and South's diamond king and club jack took the last two tricks to make the slam.



This Date In History

Today is Monday, Nov. 26, the 330th day of 2018. There are 35 days left in the year.

Highlight in Today's History: On Nov. 26, 1941, U.S.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull delivered a note to Japan's ambassador to the United States, Kichisaburo Nomura (kee-chee-sah-boor-oh nohmoo-rah), setting forth U.S. demands for "lasting and extensive peace throughout the Pacific area." The same day, a Japanese naval task force consisting of six aircraft carriers left the Kuril Islands, headed toward Hawaii.

On this date:

In 1789, Americans observed a day of thanksgiving set aside President George Washington to mark the adoption of the Constitution of the

United States. In 1825, the first college social fraternity, the Kappa Alpha Society, was formed at Union College in Schenectady,

In 1883, former slave and abolitionist Sojourner Truth

died in Battle Creek, Mich. In 1917, the National Hockey League was founded in Montreal, succeeding the National Hockey Association.

In 1942, the Warner Bros. motion picture "Casablanca." starring Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman, had its world premiere at the Hollywood Theater in New York.

In 1943, during World War II, the HMT Rohna, a British transport ship carrying American soldiers, was hit by a German missile off Algeria;

1,138 men were killed. In 1950, China entered the Korean War, launching a counteroffensive against soldiers from the United Nations,

the U.S. and South Korea. In 1973, President Richard Nixon's personal secretary, Rose Mary Woods, told a federal court that she'd accidentally caused part of the 18-1/2-minute gap in a key

Watergate tape.

In 1986, President Ronald Reagan appointed a commission headed by former Senator John Tower to investigate his National Security Council staff in the wake of the Iran-Contra affair.

In 1991, the Stars and Stripes were lowered for the last time at Clark Air Base in the Philippines as the United States abandoned one of its oldest and largest overseas installations, which was damaged by a volcano.

In 1992, the British government announced that Queen Elizabeth II had volunteered to start paying taxes on her personal income, and would take her children off the public payroll.

In 2000, Florida Secretary of State Katherine Harris certified George W. Bush the winner over Al Gore in the state's presidential balloting by a 537vote margin.

Ten years ago: Teams of heavily armed gunmen, allegedly from Pakistan, stormed luxury hotels, a popular tourist attraction and a crowded train station in Mumbai, India, leaving at least 166 people dead in a rampage lasting some 60 hours. A Missouri mother on trial in a landmark cyberbullying case was convicted by a federal jury in Los Angeles of three minor offenses for her role in a mean-spirited Internet hoax that apparently drove a 13-year-old girl, Megan Meier, to suicide. (However, Lori Drew's convictions were later thrown out.)

Five years ago: The U.S. flew two B-52 bombers over the East China Sea, defying Beijing's move to assert greater military control over the area's disputed islands. Pope Francis denounced the global financial system that excluded the poor as he issued the mission statement for his papacy. Actress-singer Jane Kean, 90, best known for playing Trixie in a musicalized revival of "The Honeymooners" on "The Jackie Gleason Show," died in Burbank, California.

One year ago: Congressman John Conyers of Michigan gave up his leadership position as the top Democrat on House Judiciary Committee, while denying allegations that he had sexually harassed female staff members. Amid allegations that he had groped women in past, Minnesota Democratic Sen. Al Franken said he felt "embarrassed and ashamed," but that he looked forward to gradually regaining the trust of voters. (Franken announced less than two weeks later that he was resigning from Congress.) Pixar's "Coco" achieved the Thanksgiving fourth-best weekend ever at the box office,

Texas Tech fires former QB Kingsbury after 6 years as coach

LUBBOCK, Texas — Kliff Kingsbury was fired Sunday by Texas Tech after the former record-setting Red Raiders quarterback had a losing overall record in his six seasons as their head coach.

The move came a day after the Red Raiders finished their third consecutive losing season with a 35-24 loss to Baylor when they had a chance to get bowl eligible. That was their fifth straight loss after a 5-2 start this year, though it seems unlikely that a win in the finale would have saved Kingsbury's job.

"It's not based on one game. This type of decision is not based on one season. This decision was made based on a three-year pattern, a threeyear pattern of inconsistency," athletic director Kirby Hocutt said during a campus news conference. "We saw progress, but we also saw lapses of progress in key critical areas."

Kingsbury finished with a 35-40 overall record, a .467 winning perof the other 14 Texas Tech coaches in the program's history.

Texas Tech was 19-35 in Big 12 games under Kingsbury, including 3-6 in the conference each of the past three seasons even while consistently having one of the nation's top offenses with quality quarterbacks. The Red Raiders have now gone nine consecutive seasons without a winning record in Big 12 play.

"We've had one of the most highly prolific offenses in the nation and we still sit here today with a losing record over the past six years," Hocutt said. "We've got to be a well-rounded football team. We cannot be one-dimensional and have success in this league."

The Red Raiders averaged 520 total yards and 38 points a game under

> Kingsbury as a good man who represented Tech in a first-class manner. "He epitomizes class and he is truly

a Red Raider," Hocutt said. "For what he achieved and contributed to Texas Tech, as an athlete, a

student and our football coach, Kliff Kingsbury has a special place in the hearts of Red Raiders," Texas Tech President Lawrence Schovanec said. "As a coach, he was a model of class and character, and he always put the best interests of his student-athletes first. I admire and appreciate all he has done for Texas Tech."

Kingsbury was only 33 when he took over as head coach of his alma mater following Tommy Tuberville's unexpected resignation after the 2012

At the time, Kingsbury was coming off his only season as offensive coordinator at Texas A&M in 2012, when Aggies quarterback Johnny Manziel

became the first freshman to win the Heisman Trophy. Kingsbury had previously coached Case Keenum at Houston.

Kingsbury's specialty is quarterback, the position he played for 43 games at Texas Tech while throwing for 12,429 yards and 95 touchdowns from 1999-2002.

Texas Tech's starting quarterbacks under Kingsbury included Baker Mayfield, Davis Webb and Patrick Mahomes.

"Thank you @TTUKingsbury for everything you have done for me and Texas Tech University! You believed in me when very few people did and helped me become the quarterback and person i am today!," Mahomes tweeted after being at Texas Tech's game Saturday since the Kansas City Chiefs were off this weekend.

In Kingsbury's first game as Tech's coach in 2013, Mayfield was the first walk-on true freshman quarterback to start a season opener for an FBS team. Mayfield later transferred to Oklahoma, where he was Heisman Trophy winner and became the No. 1 overall draft pick earlier this year.

Texas Tech used three quarterbacks this season, and all were hampered by injuries.

When junior McLane Carter suffered an ankle injury in the first half of the season opener, true freshman Alan Bowman took over and was the nation's leading passer before getting sidelined twice this season because of a partially deflated lung. Bowman missed the last three games after throwing for 2,638 yards and 17 touchdowns in eight games.

Bowman tweeted after Saturday's game that Kingsbury was "the best coach I ever had. Even a better human being. Y'all do not understand the work he puts in behind closed

Mond helps Aggies over No. 8 LSU 74-72 in 7 OTs

COLLEGE STATION, Texas With Texas A&M's game with No. 8 LSU tied at 72-72 in the seventh overtime Saturday night and the Aggies set to attempt a 2-point conversion, receiver Kendrick Rogers was frantically being tended to on the sideline for severe cramps in his

Rogers was able to get himself together just in time to get back in the game and grab Kellen Mond's 2-point conversion pass that gave A&M at 74-72 victory in a game that tied the NCAA record for most overtimes in an FBS game.

"These are moments you live for, so no matter what's going on with your body you want to be out there," Rogers said. "So, you just have to talk yourself out of it, just mentally fight through it."

Mond connected with Quartney Davis on a 17yard throw to tie it at 72. Greedy Williams was called for pass interference on the first 2-point conversion try, giving the Aggies (8-4, 5-3, No. 22 CFP), another shot. After a false start by Texas A&M, Mond found Rogers for the conversion to end it.

Throngs of fans rushed the field to celebrate after the grab by Rogers.

"We showed as a team that we're never going to quit, and we did that for four quarters and way more," Mond said.

Joe Burrow had a 10-yard TD run to put LSU (9-3, 5-3, No. 7 CFP) up 72-66 in the seventh OT, but his 2-point conversion throw failed.

"You had two teams out there refusing to lose and we just made one more play," Texas A&M coach Jimbo Fisher said.

The 74 points LSU allowed are the most ever given up by a ranked team, eclipsing the 73 No. 24 Fresno State gave up to Northern Illinois on Oct. 6, 1990, and the first seven overtime game involving a

ranked team. The 146 combined points are the most in an FBS game in NCAA history and the second-most in college football history behind the 161 points Abilene

Christian and West Texas A&M scored in Abilene Christian's 93-68 win in 2008. "I lost track of overtimes ... it is the craziest game

ever," Fisher said looking a bit dazed.

Mond threw for 287 yards and six touchdowns, three 2-point conversions and ran for one more TD as Texas A&M snapped a seven-game skid against LSU and got its first win over the Tigers since 1995.

LSU coach Ed Orgeron's clothes might have already dried by the time this one ended after he was prematurely doused with Gatorade after the Tigers

appeared to have a clinching interception in the fourth quarter. But the play was reviewed and it was ruled that Mond's knee was down before the throw, keeping the Aggies alive and setting up the wild finish.

"The momentum kept on changing both ways and the guys responded," Orgeron said. "That was one heck of an overtime, we just fell one play short. Our guys have nothing to be ashamed about, they fought, they fought hard."

Burrow threw for three touchdowns and ran for three more as the Tigers were denied their first 10win regular season since 2012 and likely knocked out of contention for a New Year's Day bowl game.

Mond threw a 25-yard TD pass to Jace Sternberger and a 2-point conversion to Rogers in sextuple overtime before Burrow had a 4-yard touchdown run and Burrow ran for a 4-yard TD and threw for the 2-point conversion to push it to a seventh OT.

Clyde Edwards-Helaire took a pitch from Burrow and launched an 11-yard TD pass to Tory Carter to put the Tigers on top in the fifth overtime, but the 2-point conversion failed. Mond answered with a 6-yard throw to Rogers, but A&M's 2-point try failed, too to send it to the sixth OT. Mond found Davis on a 19-yard touchdown pass

Anderson in triple overtime and Justin Jefferson grabbed the 2-point conversion. Rogers made it 49-49 and forced quadruple overtime when he grabbed a 25-yard TD pass and the 2-point con-

version. Both teams settled for field goals in the first overtime. Mond had a 3-yard touchdown run in double overtime and LSU sent it to triple OT when

Nick Brossette followed with a 3-yard run, too. THE TAKEAWAY

This was a game for the ages and one that both teams will remember for a long time.
