Violet Amelia (Livaich) Mancill



Violet Amelia (Livaich) Mancill passed peacefully in her sleep Oct. 3, 2018, at the age of 89 at her home in Dallas, Texas. Her family will honor her life in a short service in the chapel of Trinity Memorial Park in Big Spring, Texas, at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, Dec. 1, conducted by Father Christian Rabone of St. Mary's Episcopal Church. All are welcome. Her ashes will be in-

terred shortly after.

Violet first shined her loving light into this world Jan. 28, 1929, in Cleveland, Ohio, the second child of Croatian immigrants Yuko and Marija Livaich.

With the family living in ethnic enclaves around downtown Cleveland, her father earned a hardworking living as a crane mechanic for Republic Steel.

Growing up, Violet loved literature and art, but most of all popular Big Band and Jazz music and singing. Around the age of 11, she entered and won a city-wide singing contest.

She graduated from John Adams High School in 1947 and worked in retail sales at the May Company and Higbee department stores, selling records and books. Later she also worked as a switchboard operator for Robert Heller and Associates.

Also during this time she began a career as a lead singer in Big Band and Jazz nightclubs around Cleveland. It is no exaggeration to say that Violet had matured into an exotically beautiful woman by this time, with brunette hair, entrancing eyes, and the features and figure of a Hollywood starlet.

In the summer of 1954, Violet embarked on a trip to Virginia Beach with some girlfriends. One evening she met a handsome Navy fighter pilot with a buzz cut from Texas. She married Jerry Mancill on Oct. 30 in Cleveland. They settled in his hometown of Big Spring, Texas.

Over 10 years they had four children. "Vi" devoted her life to her husband and growing family. She kept an immaculate home, learned Southern cooking from her kind mother-in-law, and tirelessly created a loving environment. She was unconditionally loving to her husband and her kids:

self-sacrificing, supportive, encouraging.

She was a life-long lover of reading, opera, and classical music. Her heavenly oatmeal chocolate chip cookies were the undisputed favorite of her family and and neighborhood kids.

Vi was extremely active with St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Big Spring. She taught 6th grade Sunday school for years and vacation bible school in the summers, was a member of the Episcopal Church Women (ECW), and was especially involved in that organization's chief fund-raiser, the Bargain Box thrift store.

With her younger children in junior high, Vi went to work as a receptionist for Dr. James Tipton, then helped run her husband's insurance agency until they sold it in the early 90s. After almost 42 years of marriage, Jerry passed in 1996.

Vi continued living in Big Spring until 2006, when she moved to the Dallas area to be closer to two of her children. She remained there in the same modest apartment for the final 12 years of her life, enduring the replacement of both hips and open-heart surgery in her 80s.

All the while she kept a crystal bowl filled with a variety of candy on her coffee table, which became her magical instrument for connecting with anyone who visited, whether it be her 13 grandchildren, her caregivers, or the maintenance man. Until the day she passed, she touched every soul who took an offering out of that bowl with her welcoming demeanor and her uncanny ability to show a sincere interest in the life and happiness of one and all. To Violet, every human counted and was deserving of love and dignity.

She will be forever sorely missed and remembered fondly by her surviving family, Dana Talmadge and husband John, of Farmer's Branch, Texas; Vanessa Mancill of Ft. Collins, Colorado, Kirk Mancill and wife Monica of Austin, Texas, and Chris Mancill and wife Cathy of Denison, Texas; her ten grandchildren, Caitlin, Chelsea, Jeff, Madeleine, Matthew, Sutton, Meredith, Sam, Jake, and Logan; and three great-grandchildren, Jack, Caroline, and Audrey.



just in the ag shop, but it's still pretty nerve-racking, she added.

Worley, Cox, Custer, and Green are competing as a team in public relations. Cox is competing individually in the senior creed division.

For the public relations contest, the team is tasked with creating an informational program about FFA for an audience with no previous knowledge about the program. Following the presentation, they answer questions from the judges.

Last year, Worley, Custer, and Green placed 7th in state in radio broadcasting. Cox was the state champion in the junior creed.

Over the years, Aaron Custer has watched the four girls grow their public speaking skills through these types of FFA sponsored contests.

"The biggest feather in their cap when they graduate here is they all can stand up in front of people and speak when that's probably the biggest fear any grown-up ever has," Aaron Custer said. "These kids are getting an advantage upfront because they're taking these nerves they've got now and learning how to face them, how to deal with them."

In addition to honing their public speaking skills, the students have taking what they've learned back to the chapter to disseminate among their fellow members, Aaron Custer added.

After winning the state junior creed division in 2017, Cox qualified to compete against the top students nationwide at the FFA national competition held this past October. The contest requires participants to recite by memory the FFA Creed, which outlines the organization's beliefs on the agriculture industry, and then answer questions directly related to the creed.

As part of her preparations for nationals, Cox worked with younger members to help them prepare for district contest.

"It was a lot of fun getting to see how they said it a little bit differently then how I would and working together to meet in the middle," she said. "It was also neat being asked questions from them. Honestly, it felt more accomplishing to help these kids than anything."

Cox landed in the top 16 competitors at nationals.

All four plan to put their public speaking skills to use after they graduate from high school. Cox is contemplating a career in law. Custer and Worley both plan to continue their agriculture studies in college. Custer wants to major in agricultural communications with a possible minor public relations and Worley plans to study animal science. Green has not decided on a career field.

"Whatever I do, I know this is helping me because I love speaking in front of people, and I love being able to be confident. So whatever job I pick, I want that to be a part of my job," Green said.

In order to qualify for state, competitors placed first or second in their events at area. The Coahoma FFA public relations team placed first at area contest held at Howard College on Nov. 17. Cox came in second in senior creed.

FFA is a national, student-run program designed to bring about personal growth, leader-

Texas Tech hires Wells after success at alma mater Utah St

LUBBOCK, Texas — Texas Tech hired Matt Wells as its new football coach Thursday night after he was part of an impressive turnaround at Utah State, his alma mater. Wells had a 44-34 record in six seasons as coach of the Aggies, who are 10-2 this year and headed to their fifth bowl in that span. He was an assistant at Utah State the previous two years, going to bowls both times, including a school-record 11 wins in 2012 when he was offensive coordinator. "Quickly in the interview process, it became clear Matt Wells and his leadership style were a perfect fit to lead our football program," athletic director Kirby Hocutt said. "We have a great future in store under Coach Wells, and I firmly believe he is the right coach to take us to an elite level." The 45-year-old Wells replaces Kliff Kingsbury, the former Texas Tech quarterback who was fired after his third consecutive losing season and a 35-40 overall record in six seasons as head coach. The Red Raiders were 5-7 this year, losing their finale 35-24 to Baylor last Saturday with a chance to become bowl eligible.



For Texas Tech fans used to bigscoring offenses, the Aggies this season are third nationally with 47.2 points a game to trail only Oklahoma and Alabama. They have an NCAA-best 24 scoring drives of under a minute. Utah State also is solid on defense, allowing only 23 points a game. The Aggies have allowed at least 30 points only three times, including their losses to then-No. 11 Michigan State in the season opener and 33-24 at then-No. 21 Boise State last week in a game for a spot in the Mountain West Conference championship game. That ended the Aggies' 10game winning streak. The Aggies have an NCAA-best 18 interceptions, six of them returned for touchdowns. They have also recovered 10 fumbles, and their plus-11 turnover margin is among the best in the country. Earlier this week, Wells was voted Mountain West Conference coach of AP photo the year for the second time. Wells has been a player (1993) or coach (2012-14) for all four of Utah His coaching career started at Navy from 1997-01, before going to Tulsa (2002-06), New Mexico (2007-08, 2010) and Louisville (2009) until joining former head coach Gary Andersen's staff at Utah State in 2011.

"My family and I are excited to join the Red Raider family," Wells said. "I

Red River rematch: No. 5 Oklahoma, No. 9 Texas for Big 12

ARLINGTON, Texas — Texas players celebrated on the field at the State Fair of Texas, flashing "Hook 'Em Horns" signs and posing for pictures with the "Golden Hat" trophy that goes to the winner of their Red River rivalry against Oklahoma.

Soon after leaving the field, though, the Longhorns were already thinking about the possibility of another meeting this season against the threetime defending Big 12 champion Sooners — for a different trophy in a different location.

"Absolutely. It was one of the first things we said after we got back to the locker room," Texas tight end Andrew Beck said. "Some of the senior guys who walked in front of the team said, be smart with what you say because we're going to see those guys again."

Eight weeks after Texas won 48-45, they do meet again. Fifth-ranked Oklahoma (11-1, 8-1 Big 12, No.

5 CFP) plays the ninth-ranked Longhorns (9-3, 7-2, No. 14 CFP) in the Big 12 championship game Saturday.

For the Sooners, this unusual rematch is about more than avenging its only loss. They can become the first Power Five team since Florida in the mid-1990s to win four consecutive outright conference championships, and a win could get them into the College Football Playoff for the third time.

"It's one of the greatest rivalries in college football, but this week is about winning a championship and that's what we're focused on," said Oklahoma linebacker Kenneth Murray, no relation to the Sooners' Heisman Trophy-contending quarterback Kyler Murray.

"There's always a lot riding on this game when you play it in October, no question about it, but there's a lot of season left," Sooners coach Lincoln Riley said. "This one, I think, I'm sure it's gonna be heated. But I think it would have been heated no matter who the two teams were in there. iust because of what you're playing for."

This is only the third time in the series that started in 1900 that the bitter border state rivalry will be played twice in the same season. The last time was 115 years ago. Every game in the series since 1929 has been played near the midway at the State Fair of Texas.

The Big 12 title game will be about 20 miles away at AT&T Stadium, the home of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys where the Sooners could play again if they make the playoff. That is also the home of the Cotton Bowl, one of the national semifinal games Dec. 29.

To win their first Big 12 title since 2009, the Longhorns have to beat their biggest rival for the second time.

"It is a bit odd ... the Red River Showdown happened in October, and we've got our Golden Hat.

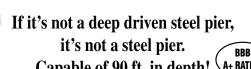


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

Bidding quiz

Your right-hand opponent deals and opens Four Hearts, neither side vulnerable. What, if anything, would you bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠ AQJ94 ♥ 8 ♦ K5 ♣ J10752 2. ♥ AK83 ♥ — ♦ KQJ10 ♣ QJ1063 3. ♠ A95 ♥ QJ98 ♦ 763 ♣ KQ7 4. ♠ K7 ♥ — ♦ AKJ8 ♣ AKQJ984

1. Pass. The primary objective of a pre-emptive bid is to make it difficult for the opponents to enter the bidding safely and accurately, and that is what has happened to you here.

After your opponent's opening four-heart bid, there is certainly a temptation to bid four spades. If you are by nature fearless, you bid four spades and hope the roof doesn't cave in on you. But if you are more cautious by nature, you pass and hope partner has the proper values to enter the fray in one way or another.

Actually, if you were to take a poll of the several hundred 10-best players in the world, probably 60 percent of them would pass, while a respectable 40 percent would step into the unknown by bidding four spades.

2. Double. There is a real possibility that partner will pass the double

(which is intended primarily as takeout), and though you might deem this undesirable, there is no better alternative to the double. The dilemma you face merely emphasizes how annoying a well-timed pre-emptive bid can be. However, it might well turn out that the best result your side can achieve is to let the opponent play in four hearts doubled.

3. Pass. This time you should expect to beat four hearts, but you can't afford to double because your partner will almost surely bid, and the wrong side might wind up playing the hand. It is true that a pass here might result in failing to punish your right-hand opponent to the fullest extent (if the next player and your partner both pass), but a far worse result might ensue if you doubled and partner took the double out.

4. Six clubs. Here you should bid what you think you can make. Of course, you might go down, but against that you should weigh the probability of making 12 (and perhaps all 13) tricks. The best you can do in these sticky situations is to make the bid you think will win most often in the long run, and in this context six clubs should be regarded as the best percentage bid.

Rapper DMX pleaded guilty to tax fraud, admitting he concealed millions of dollars in revenue to dodge \$1.7 million in taxes. (The rapper was sentenced in March to a year in prison.) Actor Jim Nabors, best known as TV's "Gomer Pyle," died at the age of 87.

Cowboys stifle Brees, end Saints' 10-game win streak, 13-10

ARLINGTON, Texas ____ Dak Prescott desperately scrambled for a first down in a game of fourth-quarter keepaway, then took three knees starting from the New Orleans 1 to run out the clock by the narrowest possible margin.

Anything to keep Drew Brees and the NFL's highest-scoring offense on the sideline.

Ezekiel Elliott scored the only Dallas touchdown on a 16-yard screen pass and the Cowboys stifled Brees and the Saints, ending New Orleans' 10-game winning streak with a 13-10 victory Thursday night.

The Cowboys (7-5) won their fourth consecutive game and assured they will at least remain tied for the NFC East lead.

The Saints (10-2) were shut out in the first half, had their fewest points in three years and finished with a season-low 176 yards. They missed a chance to perfectly match Dallas from two years ago, when then-rookie sensations Elliott and Prescott won 11 straight after dropping the opener.

"Everybody knew it. We had to keep the ball away from Brees," Cowboys owner and general manager Jerry Jones said. "We needed to play this kind of game. I must tell you, the defense played beyond my expectations. They played like a championship defense.'

in 2006 with 39, and couldn't get a potential winning drive going in the final minutes.

Instead, Jourdan Lewis' interception — just the third for Brees while he became the NFL's first with at least 30 TD passes in 10 seasons – gave the Cowboys a chance to run out the clock from the New Orleans 1 after an interference penalty in the end zone.

Brees said he was trying to throw the ball away behind pass-catching back Alvin Kamara, who cut outside just as Brees threw it and Lewis dove forward, barely keeping the ball off the ground.

"As an offense, we think complementary football," Brees said. "Let's put together a drive. Let's keep our defense off the field. Let's control the game, control the clock, control the ball. Just never felt like we really did that as an offense like we've done this year."

The Cowboys spent the fourth quarter trying to protect their three-point lead, with Prescott breaking several tackles on an 11-yard scramble on third-and-10 and Cole Beasley catching a third-down pass and diving for 5 yards on third-and-5.

But Prescott fumbled on his seasonhigh seventh sack with Dallas in position for at least a field goal, giving Brees another chance from his 15 with more than two minutes remaining.

The Cowboys had just enough time to end the game, with the play clock matching the game clock down to zero after Prescott took a knee for the third time.

Brees was 18 of 28 for 127 yards, actually the second straight game and third overall under 200 yards for the MVP contender. The running game didn't do much either, with Kamara getting 36 yards rushing while the Saints had 65 as a team after averaging 177 the previous four games.

The only touchdown drive for the Saints was aided by three first downs on Dallas penalties. The biggest was Randy Gregory's roughing-the-punter penalty on Thomas Morstead.

Two plays later, Brees dropped a deep throw to a backpedaling Keith Kirkwood in the end zone for a 30yard score to get New Orleans within 13-10.

Prescott had 194 of his 248 yards passing while helping the Cowboys to a 13-0 halftime lead — the first scoreless first half for the Saints since 2014, also against the Cowboys, and their first deficit in five games.

Elliott had 136 scrimmage yards with 76 rushing and 60 receiving on six catches.

Those three held their titles for the franchise's first 29 years before Jerry Jones bought the team.

Jones fired Landry immediately, and Schramm resigned less than two months later. Jones fired Brandt after the owner and general manager's first draft in 1989. Brandt has been nominated as a contributor for next year's voting for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Mayfield, Cleveland face big test with Houston's pass rush

AP Sports Writer HOUSTON — The Cleveland Browns have done a great job of protecting Baker Mayfield recently, and have the longest active streak in the NFL by not allowing a sack in 125 snaps.

Things will get more difficult for the Browns (4-6-1) on Sunday when they visit the Houston Texans (8-3) and their defense led by pass-rushing stars J.J. Watt and Jadeveon Clowney. Watt is tied for second in the NFL with 11 1/2 sacks and has 19 quarterback hits, and Clowney has seven sacks and 15 quarterback hits.

"I have a job to do and that's my job to go out there and hopefully end that streak," Watt said. "They've obviously been doing a good job. It's going to be a good battle."

Mayfield, who hasn't been sacked in two games, said he's watched Watt play since the quarterback was in high school and knows he'll have to account for him and Clowney on every play.

"I have to get it out very quick," Mayfield said. "They have two of the best defensive ends in the league. That is not discrediting any of the other guys, but they are talented. The emphasis has to be on getting the ball out, which we have been trying to do these past weeks. We have to keep doing it."

The Texans know the key to stretching their franchise-record winning streak to nine games will be slowing down Mayfield, the top overall pick in this year's draft. Mayfield has 17 touchdowns and seven interceptions in eight starts this season and is coming off a season-best four touchdown performance in Cleveland's 35-20 win at Cincinnati last week.

"Baker's a winner," Houston coach Bill O'Brien said. "He's a competitor, very accurate, has a great instinct for the game, excellent ability to keep plays alive. I can just tell you we hold him in very high regard."

While Houston attempts to contain Mayfield, the Browns will try and limit the Texans' young quarterback Deshaun Watson, who is also coming off a good game. Watson threw two touchdown passes and ran for a career-high 70 yards and a score in a

Cleveland interim coach Gregg Williams has been impressed with Watson's improvement in his second season after playing just seven games as a rookie before suffering a seasonending knee injury.

"I think the game's slowing down for him," Williams said. "You can see that he's more relaxed. He never did show any stress or panic, but you can see he's more comfortable in what he's doing ... you can see as the season's gone on, each week he's more and more comfortable with how he's playing physically (and) mentally."

Some things to look for when the Browns visit the Texans:

RUNNING WILD

The Texans are averaging the fourth-most yards rushing a game in the NFL after running for a franchiserecord 281 yards on Monday night. Lamar Miller led the way with 162 yards rushing and a 97-yard touchdown against the Titans. The 27-yearold Miller is having a solid season after being slowed by minor injuries last year. He has three 100-yard rushing games after not rushing for more than 75 yards in a game last season. are linebackers and D-line are in the holes and just trying to reach out trying to bring him down. He is running through it, and you see he has the speed to take it all the way to the house like we saw the other day."

ROAD WOES

Cleveland's win at Cincinnati last week snapped a 25-game road losing streak and was its first victory away from Cleveland since Oct. 11, 2015. Now the Browns will try to win consecutive road games in a season for the first time since they beat San Francisco and Pittsburgh on Sept. 21 and Oct. 5, 2003.

While the Browns have been ter-

rible on the road, they haven't been much better at home. Sunday's victory marked the first time they'd won two straight games overall since 2014, when they won three in a row.

QB REUNIO

Once foes, Watson and Mayfield are now friends.

The quarterbacks will have an on-field reunion Sunday, meeting for the first time since the 2016 Orange Bowl when Watson led Clemson to a 37-17 win over Mayfield and the Oklahoma Sooners. Watson and Mayfield are part of the NFL's next wave of star quarterbacks, and the pair already shares a mutual respect.

"He's going to have a bright future, a bright career, win a lot of games, win championships and do a lot of things for himself and that organization," Watson said of Mayfield. "I'm a big Baker fan and everything that he has been doing for a long time. It's going to be very exciting to see him pregame and compete against him. I'll talk to him later this week
