For the 18th year in a row, the Big Spring High School Speech and Debate team has qualified teams to the University Interscholastic League Cross-Examination State Meet. "We have worked extremely hard to have built a strong tradition in CX Debate," Coach Jennifer Adams said. "Sweeping all four of the top places at district puts BSHS on a strong footing for the Spring UIL Academic Meet."

Placing first at the 5-4A District Meet was the team of Chance Carroll and Wesley Schmidt,

both first year competitors.

"I was overwhelmed when I found out we were first," Schmidt stated. "As a freshman, I didn't really know if we could win district."

This is the first year competing in the event for both students.

Falling to Carroll and Schmidt in finals was the team of Dora Hickham and Armando Martinez, also from BSHS. For Martinez, this is the second year in a row that he has

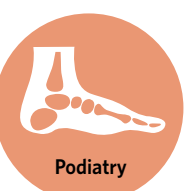
President Donald Trump signed a short-term deal to end the shutdown after delays at the nation's airports and widespread disruptions brought new urgency to efforts to resolve the standoff.

qualified for the State Meet.

"I'm excited about going back to the State Meet," said Martinez. "My partner and I narrowly missed breaking out of prelims last year, which is my goal this

year." Rounding out the placers, but not qualifying for the State Meet, were the teams of Jaden Woods with Orlando Martinez, and Thalia Solis with Tyler Lopez. "While three of the students going to State are seniors, we also have three sophomores and two freshmen that are returning," said

Adams. "So, the future of the program looks bright." The sweep of the four final positions was only the third time in 19 years that the BSHS Speech and Debate Program was able to accomplish such a feat. The UIL began in 1910 as the Debating League of Texas High Schools

said Stacy King, Benefits Coordinator for the City of Big Spring. "It will be inside the City Council Chambers, not in the blood mobiles. It tends to go a lot faster because we have more room, and we also have TVs in the room where they donate blood."

King also stated those who have donated before can go online and fill out the Fast Track Health History questionnaire online.

"It takes only 10 minutes to answer some yes or no health history questions, and will save you that 20 minute wait when you go to the blood drive," she said. "You can also schedule your appointment by

calling me at 432-264-2347 or by emailing me at sking@mybigspring.com to schedule."

Of course, walk-ins are also welcome. Donors must be at least 16 years old, weight at least 110 pounds and be in good health to donate. Donors between 16 and 22 must meet additional height and weight requirements. 16 year old donors must present a minor donor permit form signed by a parent or guardian.

That money may not be in the district budget, so the ideas go by the wayside. The goal of the HOPE Foundation is for classroom teachers in the BSISD to apply for grants from the foundation to put these ideas into action. Grants will be awarded as long as funds are available to make these ideas for learning activities into a reality.

The foundation is not attempting to replace lost state funding, nor will it take the place of the district's operating budget.

According to Foundation Board of Directors President, Emily McCann, "The foundation's goal is to give our community a way to directly help our teachers broaden the learning opportunities that make students 'work ready, college ready, and world ready.' HOPE Foundation volunteers

began fundraising in 2015. In 2016, two grants were awarded. In 2017, four grants were awarded, and in 2018 eight grants were awarded.

In order to build a perpetual source of funding, twenty-five percent of donated funds after operating costs are set aside in an endowment, and as it grows, the interest from invested capital becomes a source of teacher grants in the future. The remaining seventy-five percent of funds raised each year goes directly to BSISD teachers.

According to Cindy Jones, Foundation Board Treasurer, "We are able to award grants, but we are limited in the number of grants we are able to award by the amount of funds we have available. Our fundraising in focused on giving as many grants as possible."

In order to build a perpetual source of funding, 25 percent of donated funds after operating costs are set aside in an endow-

ment, and as it grows, the interest from invested capital becomes a source of teacher grants in the future.

The remaining 75 percent of funds raised each year will be awarded directly to BSISD teachers. This is a 100-percent volunteer organization so the operating costs are minimal.

"We are committed to making sure donors' gifts get into classrooms," said McCann.

Donations can be a one-time donation or may be pledged for payment on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis over a multi-year period. Roger Stone: A Trump ally known for dirty tricks

NEW YORK (AP) — It was vintage Roger Stone: The longtime Republican operative flashed a Nixonesque double-armed victory sign after being indicted Friday for lying to federal investigators.

Stone, with his self-professed political dirty tricks and the tattoo of Richard Nixon on his back, has long lurked in the shadows of Donald Trump's world and was instrumental in guiding him on his first steps to the White House.

Stone was only officially on the president's campaign for a few months, but would spin reporters, peddle conspiracies and, according to prosecutors, collaborate with WikiLeaks to release damaging information about Hillary Clinton in the final stretch of the 2016 campaign. He was arrested Friday for lying to investigators and trying to tamper with a witness.

Stone has a knack for commanding attention: He sports impeccably tailored suits and close-cropped bleach blond hair and is willing to say just about anything. He has known Trump for decades, pushing him to run for president as far back as 1998 after seeing in the New York celebrity developer the potent political combination of charisma, money and controversy. Stone on Friday denied any wrongdoing, flashing Nixon's famous "victory" sign as he stood outside a Florida courthouse hours after he was arrested by FBI agents who moved on this house before dawn.

He decried his arrest as motivated by the president's political enemies and as an example of overreach by special counsel Robert Mueller, who is investigating 2016 election interference and possible ties between the Trump campaign and Russia.

"There is no circumstance whatsoever under which I will bear false witness against the president nor will I make up lies to ease the pressure on myself," Stone said after being released.

Stone had predicted his own arrest for months, trying to raise money for his defense online while making sure to stay in Trump's good graces, perhaps with an eye on a presidential pardon down the road.

Trump tweeted Friday that Stone's arrest was part of the "Greatest Witch Hunt in the History of our Country!" Last month, after Stone said he would not testify against the president, Trump praised his "guts."

as federal officials grappled with a shortage of air traffic controllers, who missed paychecks Friday because of the partial government shutdown. Federal workers who have gone a month without getting paid during the longest government shutdown in U.S. history expressed relief Friday that a deal had been reached to end the impasse but are worried they'll be in the same spot in a few weeks.

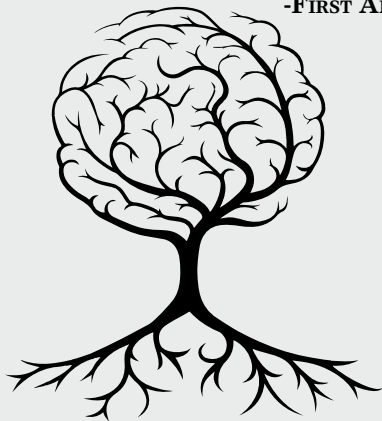

The lost art of saving is being revived

Greg Smith of Brady makes shaving soap and after-shave in a variety of flavors. “Grandpa’s Barber Shop is a traditional, clean, old school kind of barbershop scent,” he says. “We’ve got Cherry Pipe which is a sweet cherry and tobacco scent. Weekend Rodeo is a pretty popular one. It’s a mixture of tobacco and leather fragrances. We have a scent called Mr. Pepper and it flies off the shelf. It, of course, has the Dr. Pepper soft drink flavor.”

He tries to think of flavors that would be commonplace in Texas. “A lot of artisans both nationwide and worldwide are making soaps and after shave but there’s not that many in Texas. So I did some research and homework and am trying to build up an interest in it. A few years ago I became fascinated with the new wet shaving hobby, a resurgence of classic shaving with a lot of younger guys. To me it’s a rite of passage when a man

stands with his face lathered up and his young son standing by his side. That’s happening to me right now. My little boy sees me shave all the time and wants to do the same thing. Maybe we can spread this special kind of shaving.”

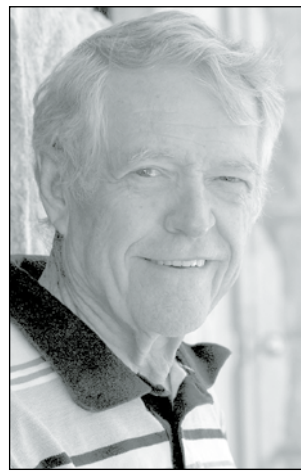
His sells his items way beyond Brady. “I have shipped stuff nationwide and worldwide. I’ve sent stuff to Naples, Italy and have seen my stuff show up on Internet in Yorkshire, England. We’ve sold it in Colorado, Kansas, New Jersey, New York, just all over from little old Brady. Every day I’m kind of shocked that people are actually buying and using something that I make. There’s a shop in California called West Coast Shaving. My Mr. Pepper scent does well there. I keep an eye on West Coast Shaving’s website and when I send a shipment of Mr. Pepper shaving soap, it’s sold out within 48 hours after posting it on their website.”

He gets his flavors by mixing

various fragrance oils. His after-shave comes in the same flavors as his shaving soap and has some soothing ingredients. “I use witch hazel, alcohol, tea tree oil, aloe vera juice, lotta stuff to calm your skin down after abusing it with a razor.”

His soap sells for \$12.75 and comes in a flat round box. “That’s a 5 ounce container and will stretch further than any canned shaving goop and will deliver a better quality shave just because it’s slicker and better for you. Also you’ve got to remember it’s soap that you’re putting on your face. Not only are you shaving with something that’s better than canned stuff you’re also cleaning your face. When you’re shaving you get kinds of sucked into to thinking about it and get into a meditative state sometime. There’s something about it that’s way more calming than trying to rush through with a cartridge razor or electric razor.”

Greg makes his shaving items in his spare time. He has a regular 9 to 5 job as technology director for the hospital in Brady. You can find his items at westcoastshaving.com or his Facebook page Central Texas Soaps. He hasn’t started making razors or shaving brushes yet, but he’s looking into that.

Friends Will Rogers never met...

Will Rogers—a long ago American favorite whose gentle humor and keen observations made a world smile often, and sometimes even think-claimed he never met a man unworthy of his liking. Dying too soon in a 1935 plane crash, this gift to America from the Oklahoma Territory would have included women, too, had he not lived in an age of unbridled chauvinism.

Caught in the jaws of the Great Depression, we needed him. He was “everyman,” always on level ground with the rest of us.

I wish he’d known my Alabama friend, Allen Fonde. Ole’ Will would have included him on his list of special friends, even if on a chance encounter. Fact is, Fonde reminds others of Rogers. Allen isn’t profound, never was on the stage, hasn’t starred in movies and his name isn’t a familiar one....

Maybe Allen is like Will because he’s “beyond laid back.” He has a disarming smile, is slow to speak, doesn’t argue about Alabama/Auburn football games and “lays low” when contentious political arguments arise.

Wait. I’m leaving out important facts, some mighty important ones. He’s fair-minded, master of barbecuing and is a world-class granddad.

Wouldn’t most of us like to have such a reputation?....

First things first: On the matter of fairness, he’s the kind of partner to look for if one wanted

to get in the cattle business, starting with a couple of cows.

If one failed to come to the barn at day’s end, he’d likely say, “You’re the lucky one. Your cow came home, and mine didn’t.”

How’s that for fairness?...

As to barbecue, Allen is open-minded, having turned out tons of both beef and pork. Fact is, he doesn’t blink if church, youth camps and high school groups ask him to prepare feeds for a thousand folks or more.

“Why shouldn’t I?” he chuckles, “I’ve got plenty of pits and some of ‘em on wheels.”

Most Southerners have little truck for beef barbecue. I realized such years ago in Birmingham, where a hotel movie channel ran the movie Babecontinuously....

Trumping all else, however, is his kindly manner in dealing with children in general and his nine-year-old grandson Will in particular.

(This youngster is NOT related to Will Rogers, but his middle name, Allen, honors his granddad!)

At a Christmas family reunion, Allen took off his belt, as if preparing to administer licks to Will. “This here is my AT&T belt,” he drawled. “It can reach out and touch someone.” Will, of course, knew he was joking.

“Pudding-proof” of this grandfather/grandson relationship: When Will was baptized in the family lake a while back, it was a given that Allen would offer the closing prayer. That’s the way Will

wanted it....

Steve Purtz, a new friend who hails from Florida, would likewise have “set well” with Rogers.

A missionary, he’s at home with people wherever he goes, including Uber drivers—and preachers.

What many might call “sheer coincidence,” he sees as unquestioned providence....

On a recent trip to St. Petersburg, FL, he was driven to and from a medical appointment by two different Uber drivers. As it turned out, they both live in Wimauma, FL, both attend First Prospect Missionary Baptist Church and both make the hour-long trip daily to Tampa/St. Petersburg for Uber fares. (There’s not much Uber business in Wimauma, population 6,200.)

On the plane back to Dallas/Fort Worth, Steve was seated by an elderly man. Soon they were in conversation. Steve’s new friend, formerly in the Odessa, TX oil industry, had moved to Wimauma recently to retire. He learned that the church he was visiting needed a pastor.

You guessed correctly. Steve was seated next to Rev. Samuel E. Badger, pastor of Wimauma’s First Prospect Missionary Baptist Church. He said the two Uber drivers are “uncle and nephew.”

For whatever reason—or for no reason—Steve’s experience defies coincidence....

Texas news briefs

Southwest Airlines in late March ending Mexico City flights

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines will drop service to Mexico City this spring and use the financial resources to bolster other routes.

Dallas-based Southwest says it will cease operations at Benito Juárez Mexico City International Airport on March 30.

The carrier, in a statement Thursday, said the resources will be allocated to "better opportunities" in the existing route network.

The partial government shutdown delayed federal regulatory approval of Southwest's plan to begin flying from California to Hawaii. President Donald Trump on Friday afternoon announced the government will temporarily reopen for a few weeks while he negotiates with Congress to try to secure funding for a border wall.

Southwest began Mexico City service in 2014. The airline will continue to serve other locations in Mexico — Cabo San Lucas/Los Cabos, Puerto Vallarta and Cancun.

Former Fort Bliss soldier gets 35 years in stabbing death

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A former Fort Bliss soldier has been sentenced to 35 years in prison after being convicted of murder in the 2016 stabbing death of a transgender woman.

Anthony Michael Bowden was sentenced Wednesday. Bowden, who was 21 at the time of the slaying, was sentenced by the jury that last week convicted him of fatally stabbing Erykah Tijerina.

According to testimony, Tijerina, whose legal name was Eric Tijerina, was a transgender woman who worked as a prostitute.

Defense attorneys argued that Bowden killed Tijerina in self-defense. They claimed Tijerina was attempting to blackmail Bowden and had raped him and was trying to do so again when Bowden killed Tijerina.

Prosecutors argued Bowden had willingly had sex with Tijerina and went to Tijerina's apartment with the intent of killing her.

12-year-old boy charged in slaying of South Texas boxer

UVALDE, Texas (AP) — Police say a 12-year-old boy has been charged with capital murder in the fatal shooting of a boxer at the victim's South Texas home.

Uvalde police said Thursday that the boy is charged in the slaying of John Duane VanMeter and is being held at a juvenile detention center.

VanMeter's girlfriend called 911 Wednesday evening saying someone had broken into their home, and police found the man with a gunshot wound to the head.

Police Chief Daniel Rodriguez says police are trying to determine a motive.

VanMeter's trainer, David Hernandez, who runs Tree City Boxing Club in Uvalde, described VanMeter as a man with a "heart of gold and an amazing spirit." He was known as "The California Kid."

The Uvalde school district said the juvenile was a student there.

No permit for Texas Float Fest amid increasing attendance

SEGUIN, Texas (AP) — Some officials in South Texas have refused to issue a permit for the Float Fest river and music festival amid concerns about increased attendance and safety.

The Guadalupe County Commissioners Court on Thursday declined a permit for Float Fest on the San Marcos River, scheduled July 19-21 at a ranch in Martindale. Promoters sought a permit for up to 25,000 participants daily, up from last year's permit allowing 20,000 attendees.

Some nearby residents complained about river congestion, cleanliness and traffic.

Float Fest organizers didn't immediately return a message for comment Friday.

County commissioners last year initially declined a permit when Float Fest sought to host up to 30,000 people daily. A lawsuit challenged the decision, leading to a permit allowing up to 20,000 attendees daily.

Texas man dies in Oregon helicopter crash

ASHLAND, Ore. (AP) — Authorities say a 69-year-old Texas man died in a helicopter crash in southwestern Oregon.

The Mail Tribune reports Timothy Bruce Lyons, of Port Bolivar, Texas, was the only person on board the helicopter when it crashed Wednesday outside of Ashland.

Federal Aviation Administration public affairs manager Ian Gregor says the Bell 206 helicopter crashed under unknown circumstances in a heavily wooded area.

Aircraft company Erickson Incorporated's Chief of Staff Chris Schuldt confirmed Thursday it was a company helicopter on a routine training flight. The company reported it missing Wednesday afternoon.

The FAA says the aircraft departed from the Medford airport at about 8:45 a.m. Wednesday.

Search crews located the crash site and confirmed one fatality.

Texas plans \$320M psychiatric hospital in San Antonio

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — San Antonio will receive a new \$320 million psychiatric hospital to replace the slanted floors and sinking foundations of the city's decades-old facility, according to Texas officials.

The Texas Health and Human Services Commission released design plans this week for the new San Antonio State Hospital, to be opened in 2023 at the same site as the old psychiatric center, the San Antonio Express-News reported. The new 296-bed hospital would group patients into smaller units, have open-air courtyards and more areas for occupational therapy and exercise, according to the state's plans.

"It's going to be a much better, healthier environment for our patients," said Vincent Creazzo, the hospital's assistant superintendent.

The current facility has buildings that date back to 1892, and an analysis in 2014 determined 80 percent of the structures were in critical condition.

The new hospital is part of the state's plan to update nearly half of its 10 aging psychiatric hospitals and accommodate growing patient demand.

Lawmakers are beginning to write the next state budget, and an early Senate proposal includes \$300 million dedicated to state hospital projects.

Texas officials are planning to replace the Austin State Hospital and renovate the Kerrville State Hospital. The state is looking to take in more patients by building a 100-bed maximum security unit at Rusk State Hospital and a 240-bed psychiatric hospital in Harris County.

About 700 Texas patients had to wait for an open bed this week.

"People are waiting in jail for access to inpatient services. People end up in the emergency room being held there," said Greg Hansch, who works for the National Alliance on Mental Illness Texas. "It's a major drain on local resources."

Ex-teacher charged with trying to support Islamic State

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former substitute teacher from Texas has been indicted on federal charges alleging he tried to provide material support to the Islamic State, the Justice Department said Friday.

Warren Christopher Clark, 34, appeared in court in Houston on Friday and was ordered held without bail.

Clark was captured recently by the Syrian Democratic Forces and was transferred into the custody of U.S. law enforcement officials this week, the Justice Department said.

He was first identified by researchers George Washington University's Program on Extremism. Clark had submitted a resume and cover letter to the Islamic State, noting that he had a bachelor's degree from the University of Houston, worked as a substitute teacher at the Fort Bend Independent School District in Sugar Land, Texas, and had done teaching stints in Saudi Arabia and Turkey, according to the documents that were obtained by the researchers.

"Dear Director, I am looking to get a position teaching English to students in the Islamic State," he wrote in the cover letter. "Teaching has given me the opportunity to work with people from diverse cultural backgrounds and learning capabilities."

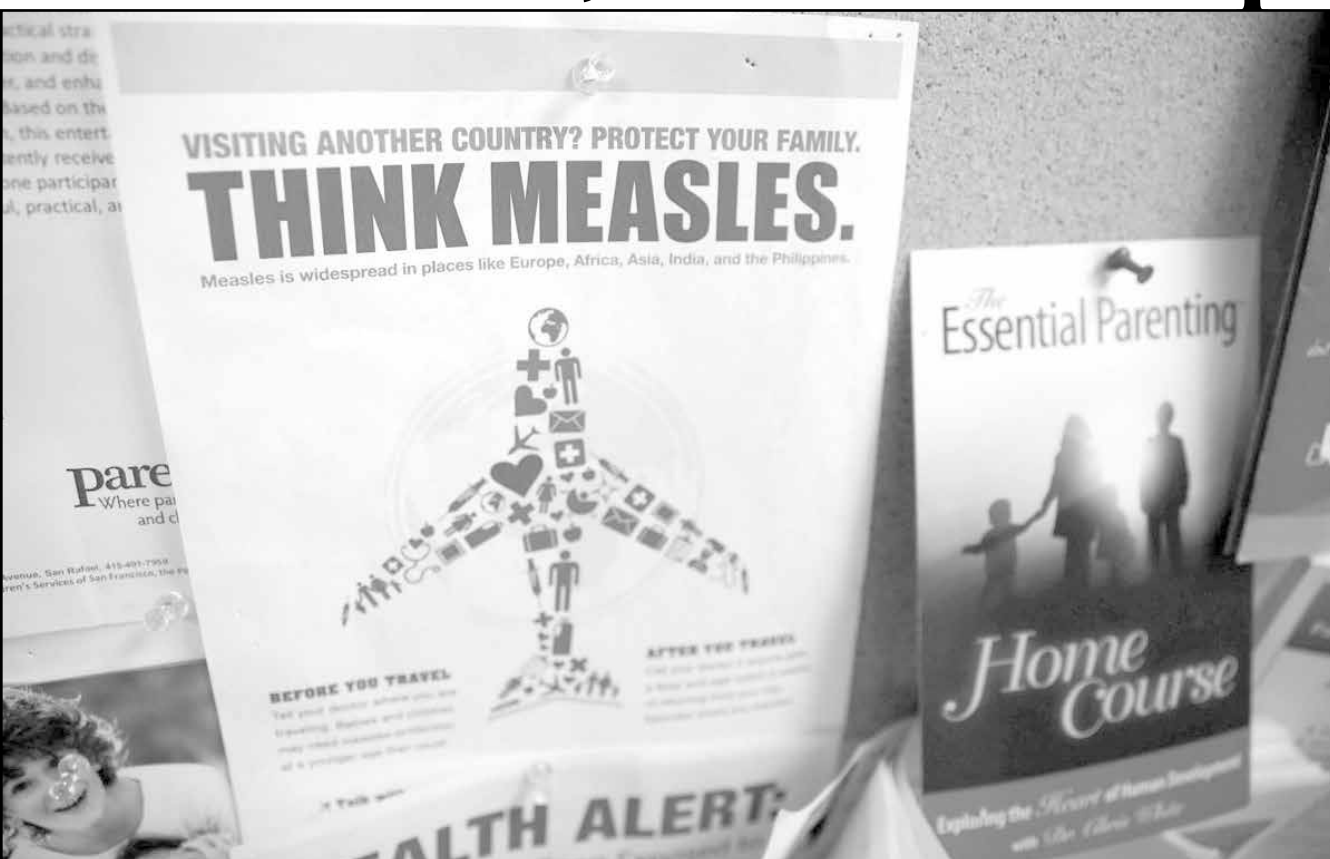

Measles outbreak grows in northwest US, 30 cases reported

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The number of confirmed measles cases near Portland grew from 25 to 30 on Friday, with nine additional cases suspected — an outbreak boosted by lower-than-normal vaccination rates in what's been identified as an anti-vaccination U.S. "hot spot."

Public health officials in southwest Washington, just across the Columbia River from Portland, Oregon, said people may have been exposed to the dangerous disease at more than three dozen locations, including Portland International Airport, a Portland Trail Blazers game, an Amazon Locker location and stores such as Costco and Ikea.

Twenty-six of the confirmed patients had not been vaccinated against measles and the vaccination

status of four others who were infected is unknown. One person has been hospitalized.

Most of the cases involved children younger than 10, the Clark County Public Health Department said in a statement. One adult is infected and the rest are teenagers.

Washington Gov. Jay Inslee, a Democrat, declared a statewide public health emergency for his state on Friday and authorities in neighboring Oregon and Idaho have issued warnings to residents.

Inslee said the number of cases "creates an extreme public health risk that may quickly spread to other counties."

Clark County, which includes the Portland bedroom community of Vancouver, Washington, has a measles vaccination rate of 78 percent, well below the 92 to 94 percent rate required for so-called "herd immunity," said Marissa Armstrong,

the department's spokeswoman.

Herd immunity happens when unvaccinated individuals are protected from infection because almost everyone around them has been vaccinated and is immune to a disease.

The measles vaccination rate for 2-year-olds in Multnomah County, home to Portland, was 87 percent in 2017, according to state data. The measles vaccine consists of two shots, one given by age 2 and the second usually between ages 4 and 6.

Data on Portland's vaccination rate for both shots wasn't immediately available.

Two doses of the vaccine in childhood are 97 percent effective and provide lifetime immunity. One dose is about 93 percent effective.

Both Washington and Oregon allow vaccine exemptions for personal and philosophical reasons. Armstrong said the vaccine exemption rate in Clark County for non-medical reasons was high, at 7.5 percent.

People who have the measles can be contagious for four days before showing symptoms.

The virus, spread by coughing or sneezing, can remain in the air for up to two hours in an isolated space. Ninety percent of people exposed to measles who have not been vaccinated will get it, public health officials said.

Every time an unvaccinated person who's been exposed to measles goes out in public, "it starts that clock over again," Armstrong said. "That's the fear."

Earlier this week, authorities were successful in identifying several people who had been exposed but were not sick yet. Those people stayed home and later got ill, Armstrong said.

"We're taking that as a win. That's how we're going to be able to slow this down is keeping these people out of a public setting," she said. "People are helping us and staying home."

Officials still are not sure where the outbreak began.

The first known patient sought medical care on Dec. 31, but it is unknown if other people may have gotten sick before that and did not seek treatment.

Those who may have been exposed should watch for early symptoms of fever and malaise and then a rash starting on the head and moving down the body. Serious complications such as pneumonia and brain infections can arise from the disease in some cases.

People who think they may have the measles should contact their health care provider before visiting to avoid exposing others.

Researchers say Amazon face-detection technology shows bias

NEW YORK (AP) — Facial-detection technology that Amazon is marketing to law enforcement often misidentifies women, particularly those with darker skin, according to researchers from MIT and the University of Toronto.

Privacy and civil rights advocates have called on Amazon to stop marketing its Rekognition service because of worries about discrimination against minorities. Some Amazon investors have also asked the company to stop out of fear that it makes Amazon vulnerable to lawsuits.

The researchers said that in their tests, Amazon's technology labeled darker-skinned women as men 31 percent of the time. Lighter-skinned women were misidentified 7 percent of the time. Darker-skinned men had a 1 percent error rate, while lighter-skinned men had none.

Artificial intelligence can mimic the biases of their human creators as they make their way into everyday life. The new study, released late Thursday, warns of the potential of abuse and threats to privacy and civil liberties from facial-detection technology.

Matt Wood, general manager of artificial intelligence with Amazon's cloud-computing unit, said the study uses a "facial analysis" and not "facial recognition" technology. Wood said facial analysis "can spot faces in videos or images and assign generic attributes such as wearing glasses; recognition is a different technique by which an individual face is matched to faces in videos and images."

In a Friday post on the Medium website, MIT Media Lab researcher Joy Buolamwini responded that companies should check all systems that analyze human faces for bias.

"If you sell one system that has been shown to have bias on human faces, it is doubtful your other face-based products are also completely bias free," she wrote.

Amazon's reaction shows that it isn't taking the "really grave concerns

revealed by this study seriously," said Jacob Snow, an attorney with the American Civil Liberties Union.

Buolamwini and Inioluwa Deborah Raji of the University of Toronto said they studied Amazon's technology because the company has marketed it to law enforcement. Raji's LinkedIn account says she is currently a research mentee for artificial intelligence at Google, which competes with Amazon in offering cloud-computing services.

Buolamwini and Raji say Microsoft and IBM have improved their facial-recognition technology since researchers discovered similar problems in a May 2017 study. Their second study, which included Amazon, was done in August 2018. Their paper will be presented on Monday at an artificial intelligence conference in Honolulu.

Wood said Amazon has updated its technology since the study and done its own analysis with "zero false positive matches."

Amazon's website credits Rekognition for helping the Washington County Sheriff's Office in Oregon speed up how long it took to identify suspects from hundreds of thousands of photo records.

Dam holding back mine waste collapses in Brazil; 200 missing

Brazil's economy, in part by deregulating mining and other industries.

Another dam administered by Vale and Australian mining company BHP Billiton collapsed in 2015 in the city of Mariana in Minas Gerais state, resulting in 19 deaths and forcing hundreds from their homes.

Considered the worst environmental disaster in Brazilian history, it left 250,000 people without drinking water and killed thousands of fish. An estimated 60 million cubic meters of waste flooded rivers and eventually flowed into the Atlantic Ocean.

Environmental groups and activists said the latest spill underscored a lack of regulation.

The latest spill "is a sad consequence of the lessons not learned by the Brazilian government and the mining companies responsible for the tragedy with Samarco dam, in Mariana, also controlled by Vale," Greenpeace said in a statement.

"History repeats itself," tweeted Marina Silva, a former environmental minister and three-time presidential candidate. "It's unacceptable that government and mining companies haven't learned anything."

The rivers of mining waste raised fears of widespread contamination.

According to Vale's website, the mine waste, often called tailings, is composed mostly of sand and is non-toxic. However, a UN report found that the waste from the 2015 disaster "contained high levels of toxic heavy metals."

Vale is Brazil's largest mining company. Two hours after the accident, its stock fell 10 percent on the New York Stock Exchange.

SAO PAULO (AP) — A dam in Brazil that held back mining waste collapsed Friday, inundating a nearby community in reddish-brown sludge and leaving an estimated 200 people missing, authorities and the mining company said.

Parts of the city of Brumadinho were evacuated, and firefighters rescued people by helicopter and ground vehicles. Local television channel TV Record showed a helicopter hovering inches off the ground as it pulled people covered in mud out of the waste.

Photos showed rooftops poking above an extensive field of the mud, which also cut off roads.

The flow of waste reached the nearby community of Vila Ferteco, and an administrative office

for Brazilian mining company Vale SA, where employees were present, which "indicated the possibility of victims," the company said in a statement.

There were no official reports of deaths, but the state fire department told The Associated Press that about 200 people were missing. The company said it did not have any further information.

President Jair Bolsonaro sent tweets and spoke about the accident, saying he lamented it and that he was sending the three cabinet ministers to the area.

"We will take all the possible steps to minimize the suffering of families and victims," Bolsonaro said in a speech, which he posted on Twitter.

Bolsonaro, who assumed power Jan. 1, planned to tour the area by helicopter on Saturday. The far-right leader campaigned on promises to jumpstart

47 migrants stranded off Sicily as Italy refuses entry

MILAN (AP) — Italy pressured the Netherlands on Friday to accept 47 migrants, including eight unaccompanied minors, who have spent seven days at sea aboard a humanitarian rescue ship that has been allowed to enter Italian territorial waters due to bad weather conditions.

The German aid group Sea-Watch tweeted that it has received no response to multiple requests for the Dutch-flagged Sea Watch-3 vessel carrying people rescued off Libya on Saturday to access a port. The boat was permitted

to enter Italian waters Friday because of deteriorating weather conditions, and the Italian coast guard said it just off Syracuse, Sicily, flanked by coast guard and financial police boats.

Italy and Malta, the closest EU nations, have both refused to allow entry to rescue vessels operated by humanitarian groups in what they say is a bid to discourage smuggler boats from departing Libya by diminishing the prospect of rescue.

Italian Interior Minister Matteo Salvini told reporters in Rome that he sent a letter to the government in the Netherlands officially requesting that they organize landings for the migrants "aboard this vessel that waves a Dutch flag."

Dutch Migration Minister Mark Harbers said that without the prospect of such a comprehensive solution to how to process migrants rescued at sea that the Netherlands "will not take part in ad-hoc measures." He added that the ship flying the Dutch flag doesn't oblige the Netherlands to take action.

European Commission President Jean Claude Juncker's spokesman said that the commission is in touch with member states, and was watching the events closely.

"Our position is clear:

The safety of the people on board must be our first concern and priority. What is urgently needed in the Mediterranean are predictable arrangements to ensure disembarkations of rescued persons can take place safely," spokesman Margaritis Schinas said.

A similar impasse was resolved last month when Malta allowed two to disembark 49 migrants two NGO-operated vessels, including Sea-Watch 3, after the EU brokered a deal to distribute the migrants among eight EU nations.

UNICEF's spokesman in Italy, Andrea Iacomini, la-

Redford says he's ready for smaller onstage role at Sundance

PARK CITY, Utah (AP) — Robert Redford has been kicking off the Sundance Film Festival with an opening day press conference for 34 years, but Thursday, he said he was ready to take a backseat role.

"I think we're at a point where I can move on to a different place," Redford said. "The thing I've missed over the years is being able to spend time with the films and the filmmakers."

It's something he hasn't been able to do much with all the introductions he's asked to do. But he said at this point, the festival doesn't need much of an introduction anymore.

The first films of the two-week long festival won't premiere until Thursday evening, but the ski town is already bustling with activity as brands and sponsors rush to finish plastering Main Street with logos and installations as the thousands of film fans and filmmakers touch down. Although the temptations in town are many — from flashy virtual reality set-ups and performances from the likes of Arcade Fire, to cozy lounges and filmmaker panels — the films themselves remain the main event for Sundance attendees. The opening night selections are long sold out.

The festival officially starts Thursday evening with the premieres of "After The Wedding," an

adaptation of Susanne Bier's Oscar-nominated Danish film starring Michelle Williams and Julianne Moore, and "The Inventor: Out For Blood in Silicon Valley," Alex Gibney's documentary about Theranos founder Elizabeth Holmes.

"I hope (audiences) get a deep dive into the psychology of fraud and the psychology of capitalism," Gibney said. "That's what's really interesting to me about this, that journey of why we believe certain stories and why certain storytellers are effective at fooling people."

Also debuting Thursday night are "Native Son," a contemporary reimagining of the Richard Wright novel, "Memory: The Origins of Alien," about the Ridley Scott film, and "Apollo 11," which has never-before-seen or heard footage from the mission. Opening night films have tended to run the gamut from excellent ("Whiplash") to forgettable ("The Bronze").

The festival this year is host this year to 117 feature films, 105 world premieres and even some retrospectives, including a 20th anniversary screening of "The Blair Witch Project."

Recent hits that debuted at Sundance include "The Big Sick," "Get Out," "Eighth Grade," "Sorry to Bother You," "RBG" and "Won't You Be My Neighbor?." Even with competition from Netflix and Hulu there are still some indies that break out. But lately some of the pricier acquisition deals

have not panned out, like last year's "Assassination Nation," which was purchased for \$10 million and went on to gross only \$2.5 million at the box office.

Keri Putnam, the executive director of the Sundance Institute, said Thursday that she wanted people to remember that the festival is a non-profit arm of the institute.

"At its heart this festival is one of the most important way that we support artists," Putnam said. "This festival is a home for independent artists around the world, to form a collective creative community."

This year programmers have promised a return to the discovery aspect that Sundance made its name with. With a new director of programming in place in Kim Yutani, the festival also has a diverse lineup of filmmakers behind the camera too: 39 percent of the projects were directed by women and 35 percent by people of color.

"What attracted me to Sundance in the first place was my love of independent film and the types of stories that they've showed over the years: Stories about outsiders, people on the margins, things that exist outside of the mainstream," Yutani said. "Part of (my goal) is keeping up that legacy and making sure our program is as diverse as possible."

The Institute has also taken strides to look at the demographics of both who is covering the festival and who is submitting films. This year, 63 percent of accredited press are from underrepresented groups, and the festival has given some stipends and access to mentors.

As for the makeup of those sending films, a study on the findings from USC's Annenberg Inclusion Initiative is expected to be released Friday.

The festival runs through Feb. 3.

Coroner: Model and actress Kim Porter died from pneumonia

The Los Angeles coroner's office on Friday released the results of its investigation into Porter's Nov. 15 death. Investigators determined after an autopsy that her death was from natural causes.

The 47-year-old was also a former girlfriend of Sean "Diddy" Combs and the pair had three children together. Combs eulogized Porter at her funeral in her hometown of Columbus, Georgia. Numerous celebrities, including Usher, Mary J. Blige, Lil' Kim and producer Russell Simmons attended the ceremony, which ended with fireworks.

Porter also has a son, actor-singer Quincy Brown, from a previous relationship with R&B singer Al B. Sure!

Combs called Porter "more than a soul" mate in a tweet after her death.

There was some drama early as one of the Eagles' players got ejected from the game right off the bat for coming after Bufs' guard Kobe Richardson after they got tangled up at mid court. But once it was all said and done, and Richardson had shot his free throws, Forsan had an early 6-0 lead that they would never relinquish. The Bufs shot the ball well from the field in the game going 16 for 30 and made some key free throws to keep the Eagles at bay. The key to the Bufs continued success however has been their stellar team defense and rebounding. Doncic's 32, Kleber's D and 3 lift Mavs over Pistons 106-101

DALLAS — Rookie sensation Luka Doncic's reputation as a scorer keeps growing. So does Maxi Kleber's penchant for blocking shots.

Doncic scored 32 points, Kleber hit a crucial 3-pointer after blocking a shot by Blake Griffin and the Dallas Mavericks beat the Detroit Pistons 106-101 on Friday night.

Griffin scored 35 for his eighth 30-point game in the past 11, but couldn't get a key bucket when trying to back down Kleber. After Griffin's attempt to save the ball inbounded was collected by Doncic, the 19-year-old found Kleber alone at the 3-point line.

Initially, Kleber's fourth 3 gave Dallas a 100-97 lead, but the score changed to 100-95 on the subsequent timeout. The Pistons lost two points when Andre Drummond's basket more than two minutes earlier was overturned on review by a shot-clock violation.

"That was a tough one," Drummond said. "They waited so long to take it away too and it got down to pretty much the three-minute mark before they finally got a chance to look at it. We can't control things like that."

Dallas got its 18th win in 24 home games in the first of two games between teams with matching 21-26 records.

"The game was won at the defensive end, which was great to see," Maver-

icks coach Rick Carlisle said. "It was a game we have to have as we try to claw our way back into the playoff picture."

Detroit had a chance to tie when Stanley Johnson missed a 3-pointer, and DeAndre Jordan dunked over fellow 6-foot-11 center Drummond for

the second time, this one on an assist from Doncic, who had eight rebounds and eight assists.

Kleber's fourth and final block came on a dunk attempt by Drummond, and Doncic hit a fadeaway jumper for his fifth 30-point game and a 104-97 lead with 1:18 remaining.

A second-year player from Germany, Kleber took over the team lead for blocks with 55. The 26-year-old has two more than Jordan, who was one of the league's top shot-blockers earlier in his career.

Thanks to Kleber's earlier work, it didn't matter as much when Griffin soared over him for a spectacular dunk in the final minute.

"I always try to see where the guy's taking off and then I judge, 'Can he dunk it or not?'" said Kleber, who had 12 points. "I didn't want to make the foul because I had five already, so I kind of twist to the side. I was like, 'No, he's not going to make that.' Well, he dunked that."

Drummond, who returned after missing three games while in the concussion protocol, got the better of Jordan in the battle of the NBA's top two rebounders and two of the league leaders in double-doubles, but Jordan made the clutch plays late.

Detroit's big man had 23 points and 15 rebounds for his 37th double-double, while Jordan scored 13 points with 11 boards for his 30th double-double.

HOUSTON — In a season filled with lots of injuries that have resulted in just as many ups and downs, the Houston Rockets have found help in unlikely places.

When Chris Paul was injured, they got a boost by signing Austin Rivers following his release by the Suns. And after the recent injury to Clint Capela, Houston scooped up Kenneth Faried after he was released by the Nets. After just three games, Faried is proving another great fit as he scored 21 points and had a season-high 14 rebounds Friday night to help the Rockets to a 121-119 win over the Toronto Raptors.

"The lift was great," James Harden said. "Kenneth brought the energy that we've been waiting on."

Harden scored 35 points for his 22nd straight game with 30 or more and the Rockets

never trailed and held off a late charge in the victory.

After averaging 52.2 points over the last five games, capped by a franchise-record 61 in Wednesday's win over the Knicks, Harden's torrid scoring pace slowed a bit as all of Houston's starters scored 10 points or more.

Eric Gordon led that group with 24, P.J. Tucker added 18 and Austin Rivers scored 13.

Houston led by 11 points after two free throws by Harden with 1:14 remaining before the Raptors made three straight 3-pointers to cut the lead to 121-119 with 27.3 remaining. Gordon missed a 3 to give the Raptors a chance, but Kawhi Leonard's 3-point attempt was short as he was defended by Harden.

Tucker, who is Houston's leader on defense, was asked about Harden's defense on the last play.

"He plays defense when he wants to," Tucker said with a laugh. "Everybody talks

about him playing defense but ... since I've been here he's stepped up (after) everybody called him out."

It's the 22nd straight game in which Harden has led his team and Houston's opponent in scoring, which moves him past Michael Jordan for the second-longest streak in NBA history behind Wilt Chamberlain, who did it in 40 in a row.

Danny Green, who led Toronto's effort to slow Harden down thought they did a "decent job" on him.

"We wanted the other guys to beat us and they did, and they did well," he said. "They shot well and Eric Gordon, P.J. Tucker and Faried, we made those guys look really good tonight. We have to do a better job of ... doing both — stopping one guy and limiting the other guys from getting into rhythm as well."

Harden's stretch of 30-point games is the fourth-longest in league history, behind three

streaks by Chamberlain of 25, 31 and 65 games. Harden was 15 of 15 on free throws, but struggled from long-range, shooting just 2 of 13 on 3-point attempts. The strong play of Faried gave Harden some much-needed help Friday and The Beard will get another reinforcement Sunday night when Paul is expected to return after missing 17 games with a strained left hamstring.

"I love playing basketball, so for me just to be out there with those guys helping out any way I can, rebounding, defense, blocks, just being out there giving my all," a beaming Faried said.

The Raptors got 32 points from Leonard as they dropped their second straight.

The Rockets held a 7-point lead to start the fourth and pushed it to 10 before the Raptors scored five straight points, capped by a 3 from Norman Powell to get within 99-94 with about nine min-

utes left.

Houston then used a 9-0 run to extend the lead to 108-94 about three minutes later. Rivers made a 3 late in that span before Tucker capped it by grabbing a steal and finishing with a layup.

Toronto got within 10 after scoring four quick points later in the fourth, but a layup by Harden made it 117-105 with about 90 seconds left.

Houston led by as many as 22 early, but Toronto used a 41-point second quarter to cut the lead to 70-61 at halftime. The Raptors opened the third quarter with a 9-4 run to get within 4, but Houston followed with an 18-4 spurt, with nine points each from Harden, to push it to 92-74 with about four minutes left in the quarter.

The Raptors got back on track after that, scoring the next 10 points, with two 3-pointers from Green, to cut the lead to 92-84 with about a minute left in the third.

Romo approaching first Super Bowl like regular season game

New England's Tom Brady and Los Angeles' Jared Goff are going into the Super Bowl with plenty of momentum, but the quarterback that might be on the biggest roll is CBS analyst Tony Romo.

The former Cowboys signal-caller will call his first Super Bowl on Feb. 3 coming off acclaim for his analysis of the Jan. 20 AFC championship game between New England and Kansas City.

Romo made 15 predictions, according to Yahoo! Sports' Kevin Kaduk, of what the Patriots or Chiefs would do before the snap. He was correct on 12 plays, including going 10 of 12 during the fourth quarter and overtime.

Romo said during a conference call earlier this week that he intends to call the game the same way he has others for the past two seasons.

"I try not to predetermine too much stuff I can say because the game is the story and you're going to call it," Romo said. "Sometimes you just get passionate and excited in the moment, really talking out loud about what is going through your brain. Sometimes you see a lot of stuff and try to articulate that. Once in a blue moon, you get lucky."

Jim Nantz called Romo "Romostradamus" during the fourth quarter of the AFC championship but noted that his partner isn't a fortune teller. Instead, it is Romo's 13 seasons of preparation as quarterback of the Cowboys that has translated from the field to the booth.

"My partner had to have been in his Cowboys day and remains some sort of sick film room guru who took the time that was needed to completely solve the puzzle," Nantz said. "When you have these key moments late in the game, this is a testimony to years of his work and preparation. He is suggesting where the play should go, and it married up and was in perfect symmetry."

"We and the viewers are the beneficiaries. They are having a wonderful ride and seeing a broadcast that has tipped off plays more than ever before."

Romo's deep dive into film has many similarities to what he did when he was a player but now it takes less time. His biggest task during the week is diving into the different systems the coaches have and trying to figure out the rules they have for their teams.

"Everyone is usually under their own umbrella. Once you figure out someone's system and rules, you can figure out how far to go and how to take advantage," he said.

Nantz and Romo have called 14 Patriots games the past two years, including five this season. They have done just one Rams game, which was against Seattle earlier in the season. Even though he has not seen Los Angeles as often as New England, Romo

about whether he would be successful. But he has been one of the few ex-players to make a seamless transition while earning praise for his ability and enthusiasm to translate the game for the viewer.

Nantz said Romo has been consistent since their first game together — Oakland at Tennessee in 2017. But to get to that point, Romo watched plenty of tape to find his voice.

"It is the same as throwing the football, it is getting reps and then you adjust from there," he said. "This is the natural version you are hearing. It is me watching myself and seeing what I don't like. You sit there and nitpick and start to find your voice."

Romo, the 11th QB turned analyst to do a Super Bowl, said John Madden stands out as an analyst he has always looked up to. While Madden brought in the telestrator and made football easier for the masses to understand, Romo has taken it to a new level with a generation of fans consumed by analytics and who have access to the same kind of video that coaches watch.

Network executives' efforts to find the next Romo is something that has started to gain steam the past two off-seasons.

"It is hard to find someone with the ability to communicate the game like he does," Nantz said.

Nantz, who will call his sixth Super Bowl, has said his biggest advice for Romo is to enjoy Super Bowl week but to approach it the same.

"I'm excited for him. He has such an appreciation for television and old broadcast teams. I want to see him soak it all in and then we'll drop in and enjoy doing the game," he said.

• Place half of the chips in the bottom of a medium cast-iron skillet. Sprinkle with 3 tablespoons of the cheese, followed by ¼ cup (30 g) of the beef, then ¼ cup (60 ml) of the salsa and half of the chile, if using. Repeat the layering, then finish with the remaining 2 tablespoons cheese.

• Place in the oven and bake for about 10 minutes, until the cheese is melted. Top with the scallions and cilantro. Dollop the sour cream on top and add the guacamole to the sides for dipping. Serve immediately, straight from the skillet.

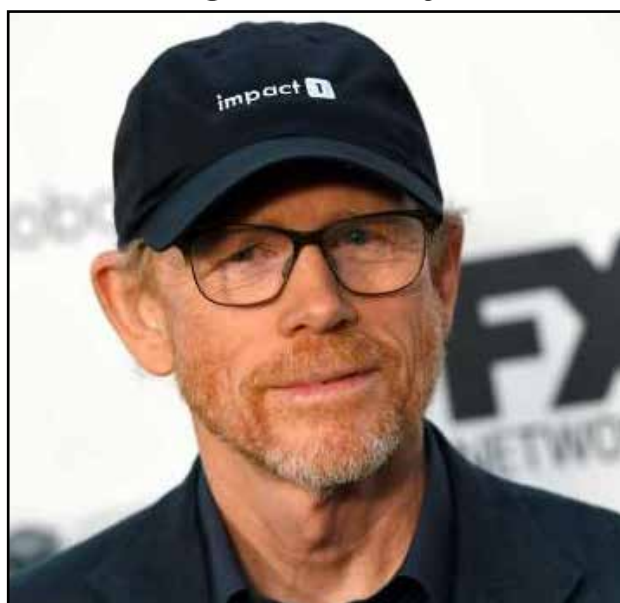

Howard to make doc about town devastated by wildfires

PARK CITY, Utah (AP) — Director Ron Howard is planning to make a documentary about a Northern California town's attempt to rebuild after a devastating wildfire last year.

National Geographic Documentary Films announced the project Thursday which will focus on the Sierra Nevada foothills town of Paradise, California. In Nov. of 2018, flames destroyed nearly 15,000 homes and dis-

placed over 50,000 people. Its working title is "Rebuilding Paradise."

Howard said he has relatives in the area and was drawn to the universal human experience of the tragedy. The film will follow the residents of Paradise, first responders and volunteers helping to rebuild the town over the course of a year.

National Geographic Documentary Films is also the shop behind the climbing documentary "Free Solo" which was just nominated for an Oscar.

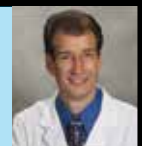

ROGER'S REVIEWS: THE MULE

Once in a while, it's good to watch a nice, simple little movie.

Normally I love a good complex plot with lots of twists and turns and surprises, but every once in a while, simplicity is a good thing.

Clint Eastwood's most recent effort, "The Mule," is such a beast.

Earl Stone (Eastwood) is an award-winning horticulturalist. The movie starts with Earl being given an award for creation of a new breed of flower. Unfortunately, the award ceremony is on the same day as his daughter's wedding. He misses the wedding, and daughter Iris (Clint's real-life daughter Alison Eastwood) and wife Mary (Dianne Wiest) aren't happy about it.

Flash forward 12 years, and Earl's nursery has gone belly-up and is being foreclosed on. He packs everything up in his trusty brown-and-cream old pick-up truck and heads to the home of his now-ex wife Mary, where his granddaughter Ginny (Taissa Farmiga) is having her own pre-wedding barbecue. While Ginny is glad to see him, Mary and Iris throw a fit at his presence, his destitute status, and his lack of money to contribute to the wedding fund.

As he's leaving, a guest at the barbecue approaches him with an opportunity to make some extra money by driving packages from place to place, hinting that his clean driving record and careful driving

habits will be big assets.

Eager to work his way back into the lives of his family members, Earl soon pursues the opportunity, showing up at a shady garage, meeting some tough-looking Latino gentlemen, and receiving a mysterious bag and a burner cellphone. Yep, Earl becomes a drug mule for a Mexican drug cartel. He heads to Chicago, leaves his truck parked at a motel for an hour, and returns to find the bag gone and packet with a stack of hundred-dollar bills in his glove box.

Earl uses the money to pay for the flowers and open bar at Ginny's wedding reception, and to buy himself a sleek new pick-up truck.

Meanwhile, DEA Agent Colin Bates (Bradley Cooper) arrives in Chicago and, along with his partner Trevino (Michael Pena), is tasked by his boss (Laurence Fishburne) with making cartel busts in the area.

I'll stop the narration there. Other performances include Andy Garcia as Laton, a cartel boss; Ignacio Serricchio as Julio, a cartel handler; and Manny Montana, Clifton Collins Jr., Noel Gugliemi, Robert LaSardo, and Eugene Cordero as other cartel personnel.

As I said, there's nothing really complex about "The Mule." Earl tries to balance his two lives – rebuilding his family connections versus his deepening entanglement with the cartel. He does okay for a while, but we all know from the beginning that it's an impossible task.

"The Mule" does play on the old emotional heartstrings, making you laugh at Earl's antics in one moment,



fear for his safety in the next, and cry for his estranged family life the next. But it does so in an honest fashion. What you see is what you get, and you know that going in.

It's a good, simple movie about a flawed man trying to redeem himself in the eyes of his family in a really, really strange way, and succeeding to some extent. Warning, there is some content that is inappropriate for young viewers. Eight stars out of 10.

'The milkman model': Big brand names try reusable containers

A new shopping platform announced Thursday at the World Economic Forum aims to change the way we buy many brand-name products. "Loop" would do away with disposable containers for things like food, shampoo, laundry detergent and diapers from some of the world's biggest manufacturers.

Instead, those goods will be delivered in sleek, reusable containers that will be picked up at your door, washed and refilled.

"Loop is about the future of consumption. And one of the tenets is that garbage shouldn't exist," says Tom Szaky, CEO of the Trenton, New Jersey-based international recycling company TerraCycle, which is behind Loop.

"Removing plastics from the ocean is not enough. We need to get at the whole idea of disposability and single-use items," says Szaky. "We're going back to the milkman model of the 1950s. You buy the milk but the milk company owns the bottle, which you leave in the milk box to be picked up when you're done with it."

Companies partnering with Loop include Nestle, Procter & Gamble, PepsiCo and other top brands.

"Our goal is that by 2030, all of our packaging will be reusable or recyclable," says Virginie Helias, vice president and chief sustainability officer at Procter & Gamble. Loop, she said, "is a very new idea and somewhat risky because no one has tried it. But the response has been very positive, and we've selected 10 of our brands to be a part of the pilot project, with a plan to add more later pending positive results."

Pantene shampoo, for instance, "will come in a beautifully decorated, lightweight-aluminum pump container," Helias says. "Tide in the U.S. will come in a stainless-steel bottle with a durable twist cap. Cascade will come in ultra-durable packaging. Crest mouthwash will come in a glass bottle. The idea is ultra-durability, convenience and also ultra-luxurious packaging."

Haagen-Dazs Ice Cream, a Nestle product, will be delivered in a posh, double-walled, stainless-steel tub designed to keep ice cream cold longer.

And instead of adding dirty disposable diapers to landfills, soiled diapers can, starting only in the Paris area, be placed in sleek, durable diaper containers.

When a container is filled, Loop will pick it up and deliver a clean, empty one. New technology allows Loop to process and recycle the dirty diapers, something TerraCycle has already started doing in Amsterdam.

"We have only one planet, and we have to take care of it for the long term," says Laurent Freixe, CEO of the Americas Region of Nestle, which hopes to do away with all its non-recyclable packaging by 2025. "We want to strive for Zero Waste at both the production and consumption level. Loop is so innovative that we felt we had to be a part of it and learn from it."

The rise of the "Zero Waste" movement and concern about the environment have led many businesses to try to reduce packaging and single-use containers.

Loop is unusual in its international scope and the size of the companies participating.

Initially, Loop will offer about 300 products, with plans to add to the list later. According to TerraCycle, partners include Procter & Gamble, PepsiCo, Nestle, Unilever, Mars Petcare, The

Clorox Company, The Body Shop, Coca-Cola, Mondelez International, Danone, Jacobs Douwe Egberts, BIC, Nature's Path, Thousand Fell, Greenhouse, Grilliance, Preserve, Carrefour, UPS and the sustainable-resource management company Suez.

Greenpeace, which has criticized many big manufacturers for creating much of the plastic waste

polluting the world's oceans, joined in a panel about sustainable consumption at which Loop was announced in Davos, Switzerland, on Thursday. Jennifer Morgan, international executive director of Greenpeace, said beforehand, "While Greenpeace welcomes the aim of the Loop Alliance to move away from throwaway culture and disposability what the platform will mean for the environment depends on whether corporations worldwide are actually ready to change their business models, or if this effort just becomes a distracting side project to generate positive PR."

She warned that most businesses behind the initiative are still expanding production of single-use plastic, although company representatives focused on the progress they have vowed to make in adopting more sustainable packaging.

Loop is slated to launch this spring in New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, and also in Paris and some of its suburbs. Shoppers will be able to buy Zero-Waste products from the Loop website to be delivered to their homes in specially designed shipping totes, and, eventually, at participating retailers, such as Carrefour grocery stores in Paris.

Tech and high-growth stocks take US indexes higher

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. stocks are climbing Friday and technology companies and consumer-focused companies were leading the gains. Optimism over economic growth is boosting industrial and energy companies, along with banks and makers of basic materials.

KEEPING SCORE: The S&P 500 index rose 24 points, or 0.9 percent to 2,666 as of noon Eastern time. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 217 points, or 0.9 percent, to 24,770. The Nasdaq composite rose 80 points, or 1.1 percent, to 7,153. The Russell 2000 index of smaller company stocks rose 16 points, or 1.2 percent, to 1,481.

MIXED TECH: Hard drive maker Western Digital jumped 6.1 percent to \$42.58 after the company said it expects business to improve in the second half of its fiscal year. That overshadowed a weaker-than-expected second quarter. Competitor Seagate Technology also gained 5.4 percent to \$43.20.

Those gains outweighed disappointing quarterly results and a weak outlook from the world's largest chipmaker, Intel. The company is also still without a permanent CEO, following Brian Krzanich's resignation in June. Shares fell 6.3 percent to \$46.61.

Other tech stocks climbed. Apple rose 2.6 percent and Microsoft picked up 1.3 percent to \$107.54.

FED CAUTION: The Wall Street Journal is reporting that the Federal Reserve might soon halt the shrinking of its bond portfolio. The Fed bought trillions of dollars in bonds following the recession in 2008 to help keep interest rates low and aid an economic recovery. It started gradually letting its portfolio shrink recently, but investors are concerned that will tighten credit conditions, which could slow economic growth.

"Although the economic data are pretty solid right now, the markets have basically told us that we are not tolerating additional tightening," said Guy LeBas, chief fixed income strategist at Janney Montgomery Scott.

CAFFEINE RUSH: Starbucks shares jumped 3.6 percent to \$67.10 after the company reported revenue and profit growth with the help of a strong holiday season. The results topped expectations and the company gave an upbeat outlook for the year. Other consumer-focused companies also moved higher. Amazon added 1.4 percent to \$1,667 and Home Depot climbed 1.6 percent to \$180.09.

GROW ON: Industrial companies benefited from

greater optimism about future economic growth. Boeing rose 1.8 percent to \$364.78 and General Electric gained 3.9 percent to \$9.13. Among banks, Citigroup rose 2.4 percent to \$64.19.

High-dividend stocks lagged the rest of the market. Investors tend to prefer "defensive" stocks like utilities and household goods makers when they are more fearful about the economy.

Bond prices also fell. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note rose to 2.74 percent from 2.71 percent.

TAKEN ILL: Abbvie fell 6.3 percent to \$80.46 after the company said international sales of its drug Humira weakened in response to growing competition in key markets including Europe. AbbVie gets most of its revenue from Humira, which is the top-selling prescription medication in the world in terms of revenue.

Cowen & Co. analyst Steve Scala said Humira sales outside the U.S. were worse than expected.

BUMPY FLIGHT: Airlines stocks were jolted after widespread delays were reported at LaGuardia Airport in New York and Newark Liberty International in New Jersey. The Federal Aviation Administration said the cause was a "slight increase in sick leave" at East Coast air traffic control centers in Jacksonville, Florida and Washington D.C.

FAA: Increase in sick leave causing flight delays

NEW YORK (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration reported delays in air travel Friday because of a "slight increase in sick leave" at two East Coast air traffic control facilities.

The delays come as a partial government shutdown threatens to undermine the nation's air travel system. Air traffic controllers and airport security agents have been working without pay since the federal shutdown began in December, but high absentee rates raise the possibility of long airport lines, or even worse.

The White House spokeswoman Sarah Sanders said President Donald Trump has been briefed on the delays and "we are monitoring the ongoing delays at some airports."

"We are in regular contact with officials at the Department of Transportation and the FAA," Sanders said in a statement.

New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo wrote a letter to Trump earlier Friday saying the shutdown is impacting safety and security at airports and putting travelers at risk.

FAA spokesman Gregory Martin said

Friday that it had augmented staffing, rerouted traffic and increased spacing between planes as needed.

The staffing problems were at air traffic centers in Jacksonville, Florida and a Washington D.C. center that controls high-altitude air traffic over seven states.

"The results have been minimal impacts to efficiency while maintaining consistent levels of safety in the national airspace system," Martin said in an emailed statement.

LaGuardia Airport in New York and Newark Liberty International

Airport in New Jersey were both experiencing at least 90-minute delays in takeoffs Friday.

Sanjay Shetty was waiting at LaGuardia to board a flight to Detroit when he heard an announcement about a ground stop due to a "staff shortage" around 10:15 a.m. He said he and other passengers eventually started boarding at 10:50 a.m. — the plane's scheduled departure time. It wasn't clear when they would get off the ground.

"The shutdown hadn't affected me until now," the management consultant from Ann Arbor, Michigan, tweeted.

NEW YORK (AP) — Lady Gaga is a double nominee at the Academy Awards, where rapper Kendrick Lamar is nominated for the first time while songwriter Diane Warren is also vying for her first win with her 10th nomination.

Gaga scored best actress and best original song nominations Tuesday for her work in "A Star Is Born" — repeat-

ing the success Mary J. Blige achieved last year when she became the first person to compete for both acting and songwriting awards in the same year.

Gaga's "Shallow" was co-written with Anthony Rossomando, Andrew Wyatt and Mark Ronson, the producer behind hits for Amy Winehouse, Bruno Mars and more.

"I mean it's so incredible," Ronson said quietly Tuesday as he was boarding a flight. "It's insane and it's so wonderful."

Lamar's nomination for "All the Stars" from "Black Panther" puts him in a group of elite rappers to be nominated for an Oscar; Eminem, Common and Three 6 Mafia are all winners of best original song. The prestigious nomination comes a year after his "Damn" album won the Pulitzer Prize for music, making him the first non-classical or jazz artist to win the honor.

The nomination is also a major milestone for R&B singer SZA, who was the most nominated woman at last

year's Grammys but walked away empty-handed. The Top 10 hit "All the Stars," which also earned co-writers Mark Spears and Anthony Tiffith nominations, is up for four Grammys at the Feb. 10 show and could finally win the singer an award.

Other original song nominees include "The Place Where Lost Things Go" from "Mary Poppins," written by Marc Shaiman and Scott Wittman; "When a Cowboy Trades His Spurs for Wings" from "The Ballad of Buster Scruggs," written by David Rawlings and Gillian Welch; and "I'll Fight" from the Ruth Bader Ginsburg documentary "RBG," written by Warren.

Warren joked about being up for her 10th Oscar without ever winning.

"I'm now in the double digits," Warren said, laughing.

"I'm not jaded at all," she continued. "I need some coffee though because I'm sleep deprived. I was anxious so I was up and my friends came over and we basically had an all-night party waiting for the nominations."

"I'll Fight" from "RBG"

— which also earned a nomination for best documentary feature — is performed by Oscar-winner Jennifer Hudson.

"I wanted to write a powerful song that captures what ... Ruth Bader Ginsburg does and what she's always done, which is fight. And she's still fighting and I'm sending good wishes out to her right now for a speedy recovery," Warren said of the U.S. Supreme Court justice, who recently underwent surgery to remove cancer nodules from a lung.

"Shallow" is the frontrunner and has won a number of original song honors so far, from the Golden Globes to Critics Choice Awards.

The song has become a radio hit, peaking at No. 5 on Billboard's Hot 100 chart and scoring four Grammy nominations. The soundtrack, featuring songs co-written by Bradley Cooper as well as Gaga, is platinum and debuted at No. 1 on the charts.

"(Gaga) painstakingly paid that much attention to

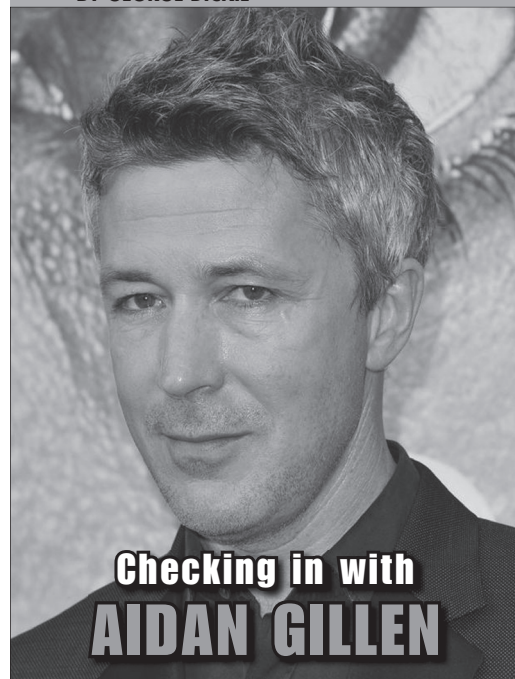

Checking in with
AIDAN GILLEN

In playing 1950s astrophysicist J. Allen Hynek in History's UFO drama "Project Blue Book," Aidan Gillen realized that he shared at least one belief with his character – that, yes, there's probably something out there.

"My line would probably be along the same as Hynek's or Carl Sagan's," the 50-year-old Irish actor says, "that the distances are so vast the chances of a similar kind of life form or even anything vaguely similar to our own, whose technology is going to evolve in any way similar to our own within even a small number of light years, it makes it almost impossible that we're going to encounter each other. But it'll probably happen, though. It'll happen at some point, maybe not with us. We may not be here anymore."

In the Tuesday series, Gillen ("Game of Thrones") stars as Hynek, a brilliant college professor recruited by the U.S. Air Force to lead a clandestine operation researching thousands of cases of UFO encounters in the 1950s and '60s. That operation, dubbed Project Blue Book, ended in 1969 with about 700 cases still unsolved.

Gillen admits he had his own UFO encounter as a 13-year-old, lights in the sky that moved like no conventional aircraft he or his friends knew of. But he's quick to add that what he saw over Ireland that night could have been anything, and that his and his

pals' imaginations were in overdrive after having just seen "Close Encounters of the Third Kind."

"It sets fires in the minds of kids," he says. "But then the more you're looking, then you really might see something."

Considering keto? YouTube has the lowdown on the popular diet

It seems counterintuitive that a diet high in fat will help you lose weight. But those who have dropped pounds in the triple digits on the ketogenic diet swear by it.

As the new year and your resolutions move into their second month, you may or may not be meeting your weight-loss goals. So if you're thinking keto might be the way to go, a number of videos on YouTube can tell you what it's all about and show you how to get started.

"Everything You Need to Know About the Keto Diet" (www.youtube.com/watch?v=Bspqlf7fgnw): Here, Dr. Mehmet Oz explains how a high-fat, moderate-protein and low-carb diet can get your body to burn fat, discusses dos and don'ts and brings on a "keto coach" to talk about her success story.

"How to Do a Keto Diet: The Complete Guide" (www.youtube.com/watch?v=Bw2rdwBfZE): In this 46-minute video, Thomas DeLauer, a nutrition and business performance coach, walks through the steps to help get started on a ketogenic diet and goes into finer detail on the types of nuts, vegetables and meats that work best.

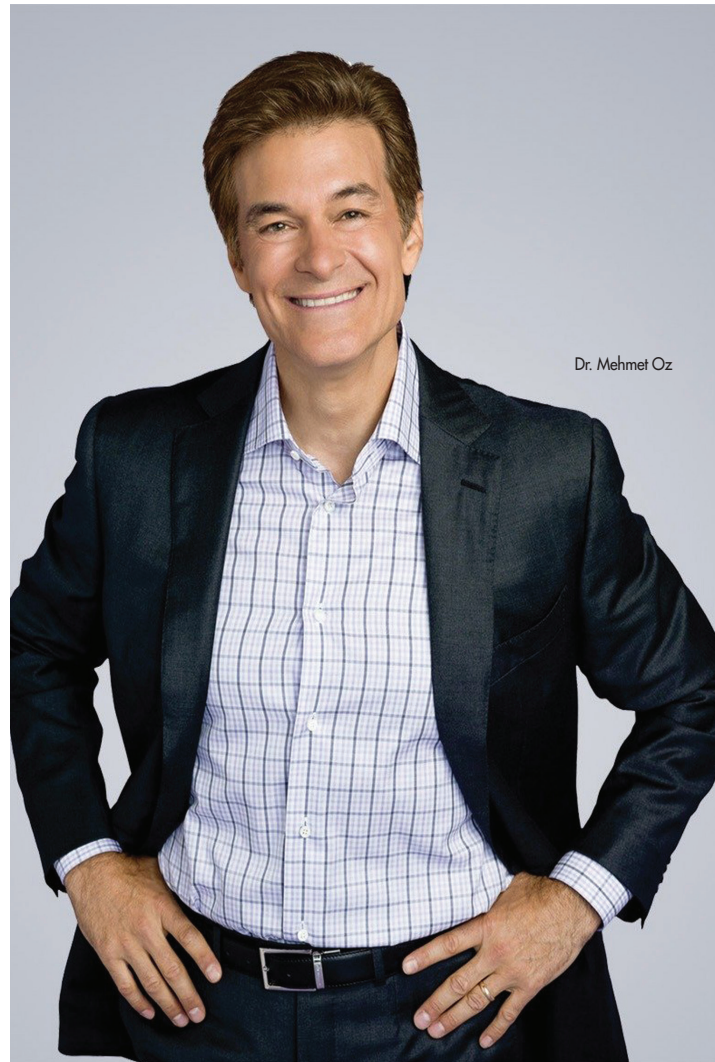
than dropping a lot of money on food that just sits there.
