


<image>

At least 1 killed in crash of small plane near Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — At least one person was killed when a small airplane crashed near a Houston-area residential development.

The crash happened about 4:15 p.m. Thursday in a wooded area about 25 miles (40 kilometers) west of Houston.

Peter Knutson, a spokesman for the National Transportation Safety Board, confirmed one fatality.

However, Richard Sandifer, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the damage to the

Trump blames Russia as US pulls out from key arms treaty

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration said Friday it is freeing itself from the constraints of a nuclear arms control treaty with Russia and will begin withdrawing from the pact on Saturday.

President Donald Trump blamed the Russians for the demise of the Cold War-era pact, known as the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces treaty.

"For too long," Trump said in a written statement issued by the White House, Russia has violated the treaty "with impunity, covertly developing and fielding a prohibited missile system that poses a direct threat to our allies and troops abroad."

The INF treaty, signed in 1987, has been a centerpiece of superpower arms control since the Cold War. Some analysts worry its demise could fuel a new arms race.

Trump said that on Saturday, the U.S. will "suspend its obligations" under the treaty, meaning it will be freed from its constraints, including the testing and deployment of missiles banned by the pact. At the same time, the U.S. will begin the process of withdrawing from the treaty, which will be effective in six months, he said.

He said the U.S. "has fully adhered" to the treaty for more than 30 years, "but we will not remain constrained by its terms while Russia misrepresents its actions. We cannot be the only country in the and partners to deny Russia any military advantage from its unlawful conduct." An American withdrawal had been ex-

pected for months, after years of unresolved dispute over Russian compliance with the pact. It was the first arms control measure to ban an entire class of weapons: groundlaunched cruise missiles with a range between 500 kilometers (310 miles) and 5,500 (3, 400)kilometers miles). Russia denies that it has been in violation.

U.S. officials also have expressed worry that China, which

is not party to the 1987 treaty, is gaining a significant military advantage in Asia by deploying large numbers of missiles with ranges beyond the treaty's limit. Leaving the INF treaty would allow the Trump administration to counter the Chinese, but it's unclear how it would do that.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said in early December that Washington would give Moscow 60 days to return to compliance before it gave formal notice of withdrawal, with actual withdrawal taking place six months later. The 60-day deadline expires on Saturday, and the administration is expected to say as early as Friday that efforts to work out a compliance deal have failed and that it would suspend its compliance with the treaty's terms.

Technically, a U.S. withdrawal would take effect six months after this week's notification, leaving a small window for saving the treaty. However, in talks this week in Beijing, the U.S. and Russia reported no breakthrough in their dispute, leaving little reason to think either side would change its stance on whether a Russian cruise missile violates the pact.

A Russian deputy foreign minister, Sergei Ryabkov, was quoted by the Russian state news agency Tass as saying after the Beijing talks Thursday, "Unfortunately, there is no progress. The position of the American side is very tough and like an ultimatum." He said he expects Washington now to suspend its obligations under the treaty, although

options and will no nuclear-capable missiles based in Europe; the last of that type and range were withdrawn in line with the INF treaty.

Nuclear weapons experts at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace said in a statement this week that while Russia's violation of the INF treaty is a serious problem, U.S. withdrawal under current circumstances would be counterproductive.

"Leaving the INF treaty will unleash a new missile competition between the United States and Russia," they said.

Kingston Reif, director for disarmament at the Arms Control Association, said Thursday that the U.S. had failed to exhaust diplomatic options to save the treaty.

Reif said the period between now and August, when the U.S. withdrawal would take effect, offers a last chance to save the treaty, but he sees little prospect of that happening.



According to the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention suicide rates increased in all but one state between 1999 and 2016. In 2016 there



were twice as many suicides and homicides in the United States. Last week a group of high school students took to the streets of Denver to launch a campaign to cut suicide rates in half. They gave away "Its ok to be not ok" bracelets and sought to engage anyone and everyone in conversation.

A few years ago Anna, Texas, with a population less than two thousand, was rocked by

B_{ILL} a series of suicides and suicide attempts. Three times in a sixteen-day stretch the police

responded to calls involving apparent suicides or suicide

attempts. Churches in the city urged residents to gather at Slayter Creek Park in Anna to pray for the city, its residents and for its leaders.

each of us. Someone we know, or someone close to us takes their life. A number of years ago, my cousin's husband, a psychologist with a doctorate from SMU, wandered out into the woods behind their home, sat down at the base of a tree and shot himself.

Suicide, whenever and wherever it occurs always leaves a wide swath of emotional destruction among family members and friends leaving in its wake feelings of confusion, anger, guilt and grief. Like all wounds, time helps, but the shadows of suicide never completely disappear in the lives of those closest to the victim.

The primary symptoms leading to suicide appear to be depression and hopelessness. Almost everyone gets depressed at one time or another. Some of the greatest personalities in history have battled depression, including Abraham Lincoln. But when depression slips into despondency and hopelessness, an irrational moment can result in the shocking headlines we read in the newspapers.

As human beings, each of us faces a difficult moment at some point over the span of our lifetime. In today's connected world we can scan the globe on our keyboard and, at the same time, not know the name of our neighbor next door or across the street. Individuals come and go in such a hurry that the support network of family and friends has shrunk in today's society and some feel they have no place to turn.

None of us can read the minds of those around us, but each of us can resolve to be a better friend, a better listener and simply be there for others. Suicide is never God's plan for anyone's life. God always offers a future and a hope. He can remove the guilt that often leads to despair. "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord. Though your sins be as scarlet they shall be white as snow." (Isaiah 1:18) Even when circumstances are darkest and the future seems impossible, God has a way forward that we cannot see. "For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans for welfare and not for calamity to give you a future and a hope."" (Jeremiah 29:11).

T-Birds end Hawks' five game conference win streak 78-70 in a tough back and forth contest

BIG SPRING - Howard College hosted the NMJC Thunderbirds at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum Thursday night looking to improve their conference record and take sole possession of second place after losing to the T-Birds early this season. But NMJC had other plans and with great defense and great rebounding all night were able to get the season sweep over the Hawks and push both teams conference records to 6-3. With the 78-70 loss to NMJC, Howard College drops to fourth place in the conference standings due to the tie breaker advantage of the head-tohead losses to the T-Birds. Howard College has plenty of time left to make up that ground, but if it comes down to a tie the Hawks will be out of luck.

In the first half, both teams played exceptional defense and put a lot of pressure on the back court causing multiple turnovers and leading to easy transition baskets. The biggest difference between the two teams in that opening half was the paint presence of NMJC's Hall Elisias and Gideon George who had a combined 9 first half blocks defending the rim. By limiting the Hawks inside presence and turning away the slashing Howard College guards, the T-Birds were able to work their way into a narrow first half lead after trailing by as

Derrick White's career night leads Spurs past Nets, 117-114

SAN ANTONIO — The San Antonio Spurs relied on LaMarcus Aldridge until they were able to put things together against a sneaky zone defense from the Brooklyn Nets.

Leaning on Aldridge has worked out pretty well this season.

Derrick White scored a career-high 26 points, Aldridge had 20 and the Spurs rallied in the fourth quarter to beat Brooklyn 117-114 on Thursday night, their 16th straight win at home over the Nets.

White added six assists, including four in the second half as San Antonio improved to 3-0 on its four-game homestand.

"He's working hard," Aldridge said of White. "He helps this team get better. He's making the right reads, he's growing offensively (and) he's getting to the basket. I think he's that difference maker right now."

Aldridge, fresh off his seventh All-Star selection, made a critical threepoint play in the final minute and had 13 rebounds.

"He's had a great season and really kept us together when we were still learning," San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich said. "During the tough times when we were really discombobulated, he's been a beast all season. It's a good reward for him to make the All-Star team. He deserves it."

DeMar DeRozan added 15 points and 10 rebounds in his return from a three-game absence because of a sore left knee.

After failing to make the All-Star Game as a reserve, D'Angelo Russell pressed his case to replace injured selection Victor Oladipo. Russell had 25 points, nine assists and four turnovers in 33 minutes for Brooklyn.

The Nets eclipsed 100 points for the 12th straight game even without Spencer Dinwiddie, their third-leading scorer.

"They're not going to beat themselves," Russell said of the Spurs. "So, when you go to an away game, you've got to come with your hard hat on and be ready to take that win."

Brooklyn shot 47 percent from the field and had 30 assists, which was four off its season high.

Joe Harris and DeMarre Carroll had 18 points each for the Nets.

Brooklyn, which had won seven of eight coming in, erased a 12-point deficit in the first half and led 97-90 with eight minutes remaining.

The Nets used a zone defense off their own made shots and played man-to-man when they missed. The strategy threw the Spurs off-kilter.

"Zones are tough for everybody in the NBA," Popovich said. "With the short clock, people just sort of stop. It's a good move. They've been really successful at it. They've used it quite a bit and it's really helped them out. There were times it gave us trouble, at times we had good shots and missed them, but it keeps you on your toes and keeps you off balance. It's a good tactic by coach (Kenny) Atkinson."

San Antonio rallied in the fourth quarter, when it started finding some seams in the zone.

"It was one of them nights where we couldn't make nothing to save our lives," DeRozan said. "We just kept pushing, kept fighting and it turned for us."

Aldridge's three-point play after a foul on his own follow-up shot put the Spurs ahead 115-111 with 51.1 seconds remaining. Aldridge added two free throws with 3.6 seconds left, and Shabazz Napier missed a 26-footer at the buzzer that would have tied the game.


