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Grimes, Staulcup named 2018 Man & Woman of the Year

Annual Chamber Extravaganza recognizes a year of exemplary service

Service ... selflessness ... generosity ... community; a few of the words that could be used to describe the 2019 Annual Chamber Extravaganza, which took place Tuesday evening at the

Dorothy Garrett Coliseum.

"This time last year, I stated that my word for the year was going to be 'connect'; I've seen a lot of connecting with our members, our community and even outside our community... Those connections we have made will help us as we move forward in 2019," Manny Negrón, outgoing Chamber president, said.

As Negrón recalled the 2018 résumé of Big Spring and Howard County, it was evident that progress has been made. New leadership, at the Conventions and Visitors Bureau, United Way, and even the Big Spring Herald. New businesses have popped up, old businesses have moved into new homes and projects have been completed.

"Just this past year, the United Way received a new executive director, Christian Fair; the CVB is now under the directorship of Hayley Herrera, and two of the three local school districts received new superintendents ... Home Realtors moved into their new location," Negrón said. "The rail project also wrapped up and the completion was celebrated with a ribbon cutting."

In addition, new volunteer opportunities came into play, in particular, the Red Kettle Challenge, only to be added to the extensive list that Big Spring already offers. New opportunities to connect, from Alive After

5 to the revamp of the Chamber Extravaganza, are only a few of the other changes and examples of growth. This year also represented the biggest year for the Festival of Lights with more than 30,000 visitors.

"Thank you Big Spring and Howard County for making my time as your president a great experience," Negrón said as he wrapped up his time as acting president.

As Negrón exited a year focused on connection, incoming Chamber President Randy Johnson took the gavel and expressed his desire to focus on highlighting the impact of educators on the community, and building the community together.

"A lot can get done when we work together, communicate together, and spend some time with one another," Johnson said. "This isn't about me, it's about the community, and the support in the community. It's about the quality of life in the community; remember it's not about what the chamber can do for you, but what you and the chamber can do to better this community and better this economy. The Chamber is only as powerful as its members, and its board wants it to be. I encourage you to get involved in the Chamber and your community."

He continued, "I invite ownership from all the community and

"Always think before you react, and make a great decision," Big Spring Mayor Larry McLellan told a group of Big Spring Junior High students Tuesday.

During a program at 12:45 p.m. Tuesday, BSJHS' Student Outreach and Resiliency Program (SOAR) gath-

ered to hear McLellan proclaim February National Teen Dating Violence Month in Big Spring, as it is across the nation.

"It's always important to reach out to the kids, especially at this age. For them to recognize that they have to make decisions, and sometimes there are decisions that you'll regret," McLellan said. "I think by having these events here, and by spreading the word throughout our communities and throughout our schools, it's important for these children to make good decisions and recognize the fact that sometimes you react in one way, but you look back and you realize that this is really not what I wanted to do. It's hard to get out of that rut and go back to

Blown transformer knocks out power at SMMC Tuesday afternoon

Scenic Mountain Medical Center operated on backup power Tuesday afternoon after a blown transformer knocked out power to the hospital and numerous residents around town.

According to other media sources, Oncor was able to isolate the power outage to the hospital and restore power to community residents. SMMC operated on backup generators throughout the night, while repairs were being made.

The SMMC Emergency Room remained open and was able to receive and treat patients as normal. West Texas Medical Plaza providers closed offices early due to the power outage, but were able to reopen Wednesday morning.

According to SMMC, complete power is anticipated to be restored today.

Contract Bridge

You can't win 'em all

Opening lead — eight of clubs.

There is a natural urge to win a trick whenever possible, but it should not be stretched to the point where the battle for the trick takes precedence over the battle for the contract.

Take this case where East wins the opening club lead with the king, cashes the ace and continues with the queen. What should declarer play on this trick?

There are three possibilities to consider. One is to ruff the third club with the ten and hope West will not be able to overruff. If South did this in the actual deal, he would eventually go down one after West over-ruffed the ten with the jack.

A second possibility is to ruff with the king, planning to continue with the ace and another heart. This play also fails as the cards lie, since West acquires a trump trick and later also scores the king of spades to put the contract down one.

The correct play, however, is to discard a spade on the third round of clubs, deliberately losing the trick without making any effort to win it. For practical purposes, this play assures the contract.

East can do no better than shift to a spade at trick four. Declarer puts up the ace and plays the ace of hearts to see how the trumps are divided.

When East shows out, South continues with a low trump to the nine. He then cashes the queen of trumps, leads a diamond to the ace, draws West's last trump and discards his remaining spade on one of dummy's top diamonds to finish with the 10 tricks he started with.

where you need to be. I think it's always important when you can go to a school and listen to the kids. It gives them an influence that hopefully is a positive influence in situations like this."

The proclamation read by McLellan recognized some disturbing statistics.

"Whereas teen dating abuse is a significant health issue, with 10 to 20 percent of youth reporting physical or sexual violence from a dating partner," read McLellan; "and Whereas high school students who experience violence in a dating relationship are at great risk for eating disorders, substance abuse, risky sexual behavior, and carrying patterns of abuse into future relationships...and Whereas the city of Big Spring is an important partner with Victim Services' vision to create a community where people thrive in a safe and healthy relationship; now, therefore, I, Larry G. McLellan, Mayor of the City of Big Spring, Texas, do hereby proclaim February, 2019, as Teen Dating Violence Prevention Month."

Victim Services Executive Director Linda Calvio commented on the proclamation.

"The importance is to create awareness. Teen dating violence has climbed throughout the years," Calvio said. "In 2010 they declared Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month, and we've been recognizing it, but not through the schools. Through the SOAR program we were able to join forces. We are a small organization and we cover five counties, so that's helped us tremendously to create the awareness in our community, but mainly to get it to the schools. Dating...they start pretty young. Probably middle

school is where we need to go."

Calvio said Victim Services has planned events with local schools during the month. In addition to a planned return to BSJHS next week, Calvio said the group will be in Forsan.

"Throughout the month we're going to be in Forsan, at the high school and junior high. We'll be doing the same thing...passing out information and passing out our new bracelets," she said. "Our theme is 'End teen dating violence...Love equals Respect.' So just to create the awareness and try to get the information to the kids and to the parents as well."

BSJHS Counselor and Director of SOAR Myrna Russell explained the mission of the SOAR program.

"The purpose of SOAR is to bring leadership skills to our students and to help them when they need help, to have support groups," she said. "We also do community service. It's just to help the kids improve their leadership skills, and help them along the way as they help other people."

Southwest Airlines completes test flight to Hawaii

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines has completed a test flight from Oakland, California, to Honolulu to demonstrate to federal aviation officials that it should be authorized to begin scheduled flights from the U.S. mainland to Hawaii.

In a statement, the Dallas-based airline said the Tuesday flight was intended to demonstrate to the Federal Aviation Administration its long-range navigation and communications procedures and capabilities.

Southwest has applied for FAA certification to fly to Honolulu and three other Hawaiian destinations from Oakland, San Jose, San Diego and Sacramento in California. No dates have been announced but the recent partial federal government shutdown delayed the federal regulatory approval process.

Ex-QB Vince Young arrested on drunken-driving charge

RICHMOND, Texas (AP) — Former Tennessee Titans quarterback Vince Young is free on bond after he was arrested on a drunken driving charge.

In a statement, the Fort Bend County Sheriff's Office says the former Texas Longhorns star was arrested about 4:30 a.m. Monday in the Missouri City area of suburban Houston. The six-year NFL veteran, who lists a Missouri City address as his residence, was charged with misdemeanor driving while intoxicated and released after posting a \$500 cash bond.

Sheriff's spokesman Bob Hanel told the Houston Chronicle that "the deputy noticed slurred speech and a strong smell of alcoholic beverage." He also said Young "flunked every sobriety test they gave to him."

Young served 18 months' probation after pleading no contest in January 2017 to driving drunk in Austin.

Health officials say 5 cases of measles confirmed in Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — Health officials say five cases of measles have been confirmed in southern Texas, including four children under the age of 2.

The cases, which were announced Monday, include three in the Houston area, one in Galveston County and one in Montgomery County. A possible sixth case in Texas is awaiting lab confirmation. The announcements come as a measles outbreak hits the Pacific Northwest, where more than 50 cases have been confirmed.

Officials urge vaccinations for the contagious virus, which was eradicated in the U.S. in 2000 as a result of immunization but arrives periodically with overseas travelers. The Houston Chronicle reports health officials were told the four children who fell ill had received their first of two measles vaccines. The second is given between the ages of 4 and 6.

Affidavit: Woman alleges MMA fighter killed pair in Texas

TEMPLE, Texas (AP) — A woman has told authorities she was there when an MMA fighter allegedly killed two people last month in a Texas house and when their bodies were buried in Oklahoma.

An affidavit filed Tuesday in Texas' Bell County District Court says Maya Maxwell told Temple police that Cedric Marks killed Jenna Scott and Michael Swearingin in a Killeen home Jan. 3 and that she was there.

Marks prompted a manhunt in Texas when he escaped Sunday from a private prisoner transportation van. He was recaptured nine hours later and jailed on charges including capital murder.

The affidavit also says Maxwell, who is jailed on an evidence tampering charge, told police she was present when the bodies were moved more than 350 miles (564 kilometers) away.

Jail records don't list an attorney for Marks.

Texas governor sees school safety as a top issue

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Gov. Greg Abbott declared school safety an "emergency" issue of his second term Tuesday following one of the nation's deadliest mass shootings last year near Houston, but the Republican put no dollar amount on the table for schools and made no mention of tightening gun laws.

His clearest call during his State of the State address was giving students better access to mental health care, but Democrats said they were uncertain about the rest after the governor gave school safety preferential status that allows legislation to be fast-tracked.

Only now is the Texas Legislature in session for the first time since a student gunman opened fire at Santa Fe High School in May 2018, killing 10 people. The attack came just three months after 17 people were killed at a high school in Florida, which responded by passing a \$400 mil-

lion school safety bill and raising the minimum age to buy rifles from 18 to 21.

But any school safety package in Texas is all but certain to include no new firearm restrictions.

Abbott had suggested shortly after the Santa Fe attack that Texas — one of the nation's most gun-friendly states — should look for ways to keep guns away from people who pose "an immediate danger to others," which is the point of so-called red flag laws. But he later retreated following backlash from gun enthusiasts.

"It's not enough to give our students a quality education. We must create a learning environment that is safe," Abbott said. "No student should be afraid to go to school. No parent should be fearful when dropping their child off at school."

He elaborated somewhat more in a budget document after his speech, writing that "the state must provide the necessary funding to employ school-hardening

tools and strategies." But he did not attach a dollar amount and said schools should have flexibility in using the money.

Abbott did request \$4 million for more law enforcement training, and fully funding a school safety research center at Texas State University.

"We all agree with the governor in making our school safe," said state Rep. Chris Turner, the Democratic leader in the Texas House. But he said he was waiting to see more details.

Shortly after the Santa Fe school shooting, Abbott held three days of meetings with law enforcement officials, educators, mental health experts, attack survivors and victims' family members. A gun control group, Texas Gun Sense, got a seat next to the governor.

"I did feel like there was a foot in the door of some common-sense firearm regulation," said Gyl Switzer, the group's executive director, on Tuesday. She added, "I don't give up hope."

Exxon, Qatar Petroleum to expand LNG export plant in Texas

DALLAS (AP) — Exxon Mobil is making a big bet on the future of exporting natural gas.

Exxon and Qatar Petroleum announced Tuesday that they will go ahead with a \$10 billion project to export liquefied natural gas from a plant on the Texas Gulf Coast.

The companies said construction at the Golden Pass plant in Sabine Pass, Texas, would start before April, and the export op-

eration is expected to begin running in 2024.

Exxon said the project will create 9,000 jobs during the five years of construction and more than 200 permanent jobs. Exxon Chairman and CEO Darren Woods said it would provide a long-term supply of liquefied natural gas and stimulate the local economy.

The Golden Pass plant opened in 2010 to import gas that has been chilled into liquid form, allowing it to be loaded on to tank-

ers for shipment. Its backers saw a market in importing natural gas, a cleaner fuel than oil.

As U.S. gas production soared in this decade, however, with much of it coming from the Permian Basin in west Texas and New Mexico, Exxon and others studied ways to boost sales by using the suddenly abundant supply to meet surging global demand.

Globally, annual trade in liquefied gas grew faster than 10

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Trump calls for bipartisanship, a hard line on immigration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Face to face with emboldened Democrats, President Donald Trump called on Washington to cast aside "revenge, resistance and retribution" and end "ridiculous partisan investigations" in a State of the Union address delivered at a vulnerable moment for his presidency.

Trump appealed Tuesday night for bipartisanship but refused to yield on the hardline immigration policies that have infuriated Democrats and forced the recent government shutdown. He renewed his call for a border wall and cast illegal immigration as a threat to Americans' safety and economic security.

Trump accepted no blame for his role in cultivating the rancorous atmosphere in the nation's capital, and he didn't outline a clear path for collaborating with Democrats who are eager to block his agenda. Their opposition was on vivid display as Democratic congresswomen in the audience formed a sea of white in a nod to early 20th-century suffragettes.

Trump is staring down a two-year stretch that will determine whether he is re-elected or leaves office in defeat. His speech sought to shore up Republican support that had eroded slightly during the recent government shutdown and previewed a fresh defense against Democrats as they ready a round of investigations into every aspect of his administration.

"If there is going to be peace and legislation, there cannot be war and investigation," he declared. Lawmakers in the cavernous House chamber sat largely silent.

Looming over the president's address was a fast-approaching Feb. 15 deadline to fund the government and avoid another shutdown. Democrats have refused to acquiesce to his demands for a border wall, and Republicans are increasingly unwill-

ing to shut down the government to help him fulfill his signature campaign pledge. Nor does the GOP support the president's plan to declare a national emergency if Congress won't fund the wall.

Wary of publicly highlighting those intraparty divisions, Trump made no mention of an emergency declaration in his remarks. He did offer a lengthy defense of his call for a border wall, declaring: "I will build it." But he delivered no ultimatums about what it would take for him to sign legislation to keep the government open.

"I am asking you to defend our very dangerous southern border out of love and devotion to our fellow citizens and to our country," he said, painting a dark and foreboding picture of the risks posed to Americans by illegal immigration.

The 72-year-old Trump harkened back to moments of American greatness, celebrating the moon landing as astronaut Buzz Aldrin looked on from the audience and heralding the liberation of Europe from the Nazis. He led the House chamber in singing happy birthday to a Holocaust survivor sitting with first lady Melania Trump.

"Together, we represent the most extraordinary nation in all of history. What will we do with this moment? How will we be remembered?" Trump said.

The president ticked through a litany of issues with crossover appeal, including boosting infrastructure, lowering prescription drug costs and combating childhood cancer. But he also appealed to his political base, both with his harsh rhetoric on immigration and a call for Congress to pass legislation to prohibit the "late-term abortion of children."

Trump devoted much of his speech to foreign policy, another area where Republicans have increasingly distanced themselves from the White House. He announced details of a second meeting with North Korea's Kim Jong Un, outlining a Feb. 27-28 summit in Vietnam.

Trump and Kim's first summit garnered only a vaguely worded commitment by the North to denuclearize. But the president said his outreach to Pyongyang had made the U.S. safer.

"If I had not been elected president of the United States, we would right now, in my opinion, be in a major war with North Korea," he said.

As he condemned political turmoil in Venezuela, Trump declared that "America will never be a socialist coun-

try" — a remark that may also have been targeted at high-profile Democrats who identify as socialists.

The president was surrounded by symbols of his emboldened political opposition. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, who was praised by Democrats for her hardline negotiating during the shutdown, sat behind Trump as he spoke.

And several senators running for president were also in the audience, including Sens. Kamala Harris of California and Cory Booker of New Jersey.

Another Democratic star, Stacey Abrams, delivered the party's response to Trump. Abrams narrowly lost her bid in November to become America's first black female governor, and party leaders are aggressively recruiting her to run for U.S. Senate from Georgia.

Speaking from Atlanta, Abrams calls the shutdown a political stunt that "defied every tenet of fairness and abandoned not just our people, but our values."

Trump's address amounted to an opening argument for his re-election campaign. Polls show he has work to do, with his approval rating falling to just 34 percent after the shutdown, according to a recent survey conducted by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research.

One bright spot for the president has been the economy, which has added jobs for 100 straight months.

"The only thing that can stop it," he said, "are foolish wars, politics or ridiculous partisan investigations" — an apparent swipe at the special counsel investigation into ties between Russia and Trump's 2016 campaign, as well as the upcoming congressional investigations.

The diverse Democratic caucus, which includes a bevy of women, sat silently for much of Trump's speech. But they leapt to their feet when he noted there are "more women in the workforce than ever before."

The increase is due to population growth — and not something Trump can credit to any of his policies.

The president also defended his decisions to withdraw U.S. troops from Syria and Afghanistan over the opposition from national security officials and many Republican lawmakers.

"Great nations do not fight endless wars," he said, adding that the U.S. is working with allies to "destroy the remnants" of the Islamic State group and that he has "accelerated" efforts to reach a settlement in Afghanistan.

IS militants have lost territory since Trump's surprise announcement in December that he was pulling U.S. forces out, but military officials warn the fighters could regroup within six months to a year of the Americans leaving. Several leading GOP lawmakers have sharply criticized his plans to withdraw from Syria, as well as from Afghanistan.

Trump's guests for the speech included Alice Marie Johnson, a woman whose life sentence for drug offenses was commuted by the president, and Joshua Trump, a sixth-grade student from Wilmington, Delaware, who has been bullied over his last name. They sat with Mrs. Trump during the address.

percent in both 2017 and 2018, according to the International Energy Agency. Demand has been growing fastest in Asia, especially in China, but European countries are also interested in stepping up imports as a way to diversify their energy supply and reduce their reliance on Russian gas.

Trade in liquefied gas is expected to rise by more than two-thirds in the next 20 years, said Jean-Baptiste Dubreuil, an analyst with the Paris-based group.

"It will be instrumental in the evolution of natural gas toward a more diversified, flexible and global market," Dubreuil said.

The Texas project is expected to be the first of many similar announcements by energy companies this year. Dubreuil said others are expected to come from the U.S., Russia, Africa, and Qatar.

Exxon and Qatar Petroleum say the export facility in Texas will be able to produce about 16 million tons of liquefied gas per year.

Qatar Petroleum owns 70 percent of the export project and Exxon holds the other 30 percent after agreeing to buy out ConocoPhillips' 12.4 percent stake in the existing liquefied natural gas import terminal and pipeline. That purchase is awaiting regulatory approval.

Exxon and Qatar Petroleum have worked together on exploration and development projects in Argentina, Brazil and Mozambique. Qatar Petroleum, a leading exporter of liquefied natural gas, has announced plans to invest \$20 billion in the U.S. as it seeks to continue expanding beyond its home borders.

At an event in Washington, Energy Secretary Rick Perry called the announcement "the latest example of the vital partnership between the U.S. and Qatar," including military ties and American colleges opening campuses in Qatar.

On Jan. 1, Qatar left OPEC after a nearly two-year trade embargo against it by the oil cartel's leader, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt.

Shares of Exxon Mobil Corp. rose 76 cents to close at \$75.58.

BIG SPRING – Big Spring hosted the Greenwood Rangers at Steer Gym on Tuesday night in an important district match. The Steers played really well against the 2nd place Rangers all game and showed their defense is one of the best in the area holding Greenwood's star player, Jordan Riley to just 14 points in the game. Despite their great defense, Big Spring really struggled shooting the ball in the game especially from the perimeter. With those shooting woes in full affect, it became even more important for the Steers to control the glass and out rebound Greenwood. Big Spring will play Snyder at home this Friday looking to get their third district win and improve their playoff seeding as well.

 On Feb. 6, 1911, Ronald Wilson Reagan, the 40th president of the United States, was born in Tampico, Illinois.

On this date:
 In 1778, during the American Revolutionary War, the United States won official recognition and military support from France with the signing of a Treaty of Alliance in Paris.
 In 1788, Massachusetts became the sixth state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.
 In 1933, the 20th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, the so-called "lame duck" amendment, was proclaimed in effect by Secretary of State Henry Stimson.
 In 1952, Britain's King George VI, 56, died at Sandringham House in Norfolk, England; he was succeeded as monarch by his 25-year-old elder daughter, who became Queen Elizabeth II.
 In 1968, the Winter Olympic Games were opened in Grenoble, France, by French President Charles de Gaulle.
 In 1987, Wall Street Journal reporter Gerald Seib (syb) was released after being detained six days by Iran, accused of being a spy for Israel; Iran said the detention was a result of misunderstandings.
 In 1991, comedian and television performer Danny Thomas died in Los Angeles at age 79.
 In 1993, tennis Hall of Famer and human rights advocate Arthur Ashe died in New York at age 49.
 In 1998, President Bill Clinton signed a bill changing the name of Washington National Airport to Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport. Pop music star Falco, who had a 1986 hit with "Rock Me Amadeus," died in a traffic accident in the Dominican Republic; he was 40. Carl Wilson, a founding member of The Beach Boys, died in Los Angeles at age 51.
 In 2000, first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton launched her successful candidacy for the U.S. Senate.
 In 2003, Edging closer to war, President George W.

Bush declared "the game is over" for Saddam Hussein and urged skeptical allies to join in disarming Iraq. ABC's "20/20" aired a British documentary, "Living With Michael Jackson," in which the King of Pop revealed he sometimes let children sleep in his bed.
 In 2008, the Bush White House defended the use of the interrogation technique known as waterboarding, saying it was legal — not torture as critics argued — and had saved American lives. The Phoenix Suns acquired Shaquille O'Neal in a stunning blockbuster deal that sent four-time All-Star Shawn Marion and Marcus Banks to the Miami Heat.
 Ten years ago: Key senators and the White House reached tentative agreement on an economic stimulus measure at the heart of President Barack Obama's recovery plan. Federal health officials said Peanut Corp. of America, a Georgia peanut processor, had knowingly shipped salmonella-laced products as far back as 2007. A suicide bomber blew himself up at the gates of a Syrian prison and rebels stormed in behind him, freeing hundreds of inmates. Jay Leno said goodbye to NBC's "The Tonight Show" for the second time, making way for Jimmy Fallon to take over as host. Baseball Hall of Famer Ralph Kiner, 91, died in Rancho Mirage, California. Former U.S. poet laureate Maxine Kumin died in Warner, New Hampshire, at age 88.
 One year ago: Casino mogul Steve Wynn resigned as chairman and CEO of Wynn Resorts amid sexual misconduct allegations. SpaceX's big new rocket blasted off from the Kennedy Space Center on

its first test flight, carrying a red sports car on a route that would take it to the asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter. Poland's president signed legislation making it a crime to blame Poland for Holocaust crimes committed by Nazi Germany.

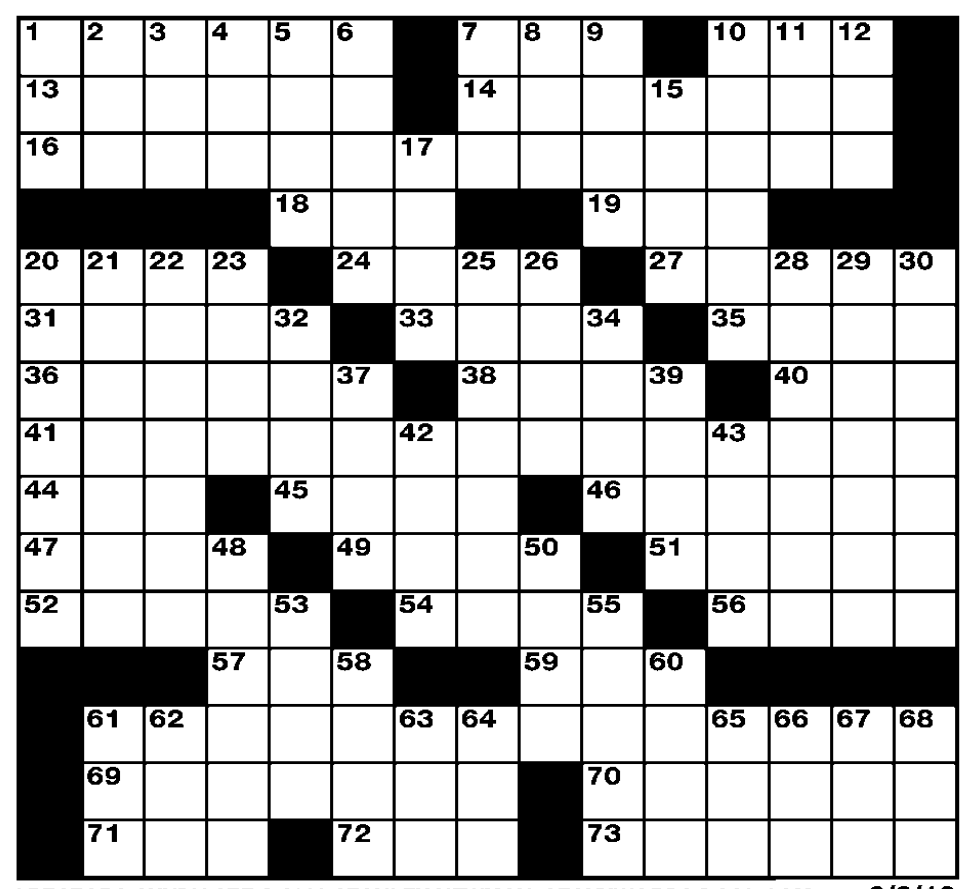
