The Masons of Howard County honored four outstanding community members at the Masonic Lodge just off the court square in Big Spring on Saturday.

In the words of Margaret Mead, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

Each one of these four members of our community has rolled up their sleeves and invested time and sweat for the betterment of others. Each has been a great member of the team and each has been a fantastic leader too.

Two who were recognized by the Masons were

honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award for long-term dedication of service to others, and two were recognized for being Community Builders.

The ceremony at the Masonic Lodge opened with live music from the multi-talented George Bancroft, followed by a brisket dinner cooked by Master Mason Cody Hughes. Then the guests, honorees, Masons and members of the Order of the Eastern Star adjourned to the lodge room, where plaques of recognition were presented to the guests of honor.

Dr. David Ward DDS was recognized for his years of service to the residents of Howard County with the Community Builders Award.

Not only does Dr. Ward's practice offer "Big City"-level technology and service to area residents, the fact is that the level of tech-

SMMC contract on agenda for county commissioners

At their meeting Wednesday, Howard County commissioners will consider granting consent to assignment in the sale of Scenic Mountain Medical Center to Steward Texas Hospital.

The commissioners will hold a brief budget and financial review in the second-floor conference room of the Howard County Courthouse, 300 S. Main, at 2:30 p.m.; before adjourning to the third-floor courtroom for their regular bi-weekly meeting at 3:30 p.m.

According to the legal information website up-counsel.com, "consent to assignment" refers to granting permission for a party of a contract to "assign" a

contract by moving its obligations under the contract's terms to another party.

According to a press release issued by the hospital in January, Scenic Mountain will be acquired by Steward Health Care System once the parties get the details of the transaction hammered out, which should be around the end of the first quarter of the fiscal year.

In other business, commissioners will consider bids for new air conditioning and heating units for the District Court building. At previous meetings, the commissioners have discussed and approved going out for bids on four units.

Other items on the agenda for the meeting include:

Every year, there are around 1.5 million high school students nationally who experience some type of abuse from a dating partner. Around three out of four parents never speak to their children about domestic violence.

On Thursday, Feb. 14, students at Big Spring High School had a visit from and the opportunity to speak to representatives from Victim Services of Big Spring. The students received bracelets and information pamphlets on how to recognize the signs of abuse and get help.

Victim Services of Big Spring is a non-profit organization

birth, but not by education.

Ward has served on a wide variety of community projects and events in the last 30 years. Some highlights are: He's conducted several hundred Bible study sessions with local inmates; he has offered free or low-cost dental care to patients referred by area clergy; and he's offered support for organizations including Isaiah 58, the Life Center, the Humane Society, Toys for Tots, Coat Drives, Relay for Life and the Feast of Sharing. Additionally, Dr. Ward serves on the Dental Hygiene Advisory Board at Howard College.

The Ward's eldest daughter April, her husband Ben, and their daughter Clara live in Houston, as does The Ward's youngest daughter Crystal, her husband Scott, and their son Colin. The Wards have decided that, "It ain't so bad to drive seven or eight hours to Houston, since we get to see our grandkids. An interesting fact," Dr. Ward claims, is, "If you want some trivia, according to Google Maps, whether we go thru Waco, Austin, or San Antonio, it doesn't make 10 minutes difference in travel time."

Most recently Ward organized and hosted Dentistry From The Heart, a day of free dental service for the underserved of our community.

Ward said, "Now that I have a facility large enough to do it well, we plan to do it annually."

A Rising Star in Howard County is Emily McCann, who was also recognized for her efforts at "Building the Community." She is a lifelong Big Spring and Howard College nursing graduate. Her listing of community activities include, but are not limited to: active Rotarian and Assistant District Governor of Rotary's Area 11/District 5730, Hangar 25 Board Vice President, H.O.P.E. Foundation President, United Way board member, Pops in the Park Chairperson, Cubmaster Pack of Pack 305 with the Boy Scouts of America, Leadership Big Spring tour guide, Chamber Ambassador, PTO President and Big Spring ISD Site Based Committee member.

"Once I became a mother, I felt the need to step up and serve my community - to help improve the quality of life for the place my family calls home," McCann said. "It has been a true privilege and honor to serve Big Spring. I look forward to many more years of service in our community."

The daughter of the late Coy McCann and Melinda McCann, Emily has three children: Max (11), Sophie (10) and James (9). She was widowed last April when her husband, Jimmy Deleon, passed away. She is a Licensed Vocational Nurse working as a substitute nurse for the Big Spring Independent School District.

According to her fellow Rotarian John Scott, McCann is a dedicated nurse for the students who attend the Rotary Youth Leadership Academy each year.

McCann's mother Melinda spoke of her daughter's dedication even when times were difficult. McCann modeled for the rest of us that "A professional shows up even when he or she doesn't feel like it," Melinda said.

Cynthia was a member of First Christian Church and served as a deacon. She served as an adjunct professor at Howard College for 13 years, teaching various business classes including marketing, entrepreneurship, accounting, human relations and typing. Additionally she is a member and president of the 1953 Hyperion Club and the Green Thumb Gardening Club.

Additionally Scott is an inaugural member of the Healthy Woman Advisory Board and she has served as the president of the Big Spring Women's Club. She was elected as the Outstanding Club Woman of the West Texas Area of Women's Clubs. She has held leadership positions in the West Texas Area Board of Women's Clubs.

Scott has served on the board for the Pops in the Park, the Big Spring Symphony Guild, the Big Spring Symphony Board of Directors and the Greater Big Spring Rotary Club.

Cynthia and John have hosted two foreign exchange students from Germany and Brazil. They have also hosted various members of traveling Rotary Group Study Exchanges from Italy, India, Sweden and Brazil.

Cynthia is a sportswoman, enjoying golfing, playing tennis, riding bikes and yoga. She has traveled extensively: Mexico, 40 of the US states, Great Britain, Scotland, Ireland, Paris, Prague, Budapest, Vienna, Venice, Rome, Aruba, Jamaica, and even Pompeii. Houston asking to have firefighter pay measure invalidated

HOUSTON (AP) — A legal battle over pay raises for Houston firefighters shows no signs of being resolved anytime soon.

Lawyers for the city of Houston on Friday asked a judge to declare invalid a ballot measure approved in November

that would give firefighters pay parity with city police officers.

This comes as Mayor Sylvester Turner and the firefighters' union had met to discuss ways to implement the measure.

The Houston Professional Fire Fighters Association says Turner is continuing to defy the will of the voters.

In a statement, Turner insisted the city is working to implement the measure while it also asks the judge to resolve legal questions regarding it

Turner has said the city can't

afford the measure's more than \$100 million annual price tag and it could result in layoffs.

Search for SE Texas fisherman ends after body found

TEXAS CITY, Texas (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard has ended its search for a missing Southeast Texas fisherman after a body matching the man's description was found.

Officials say the search for 60-year-old Dale Wolf was called off Saturday after the body was found in Galveston Bay.

The Coast Guard says Wolf had been reported missing on Friday by a family member after he failed to return from a routine fishing trip in Swan Lake near Texas City.

Wolf's 16-foot fishing vessel was found at anchor with no one aboard and his keys, wallet and cellphone still inside.

A Coast Guard helicopter and boat, along with the Galveston Police Department and the Texas City Fire Department had helped in the search.

Coast Guard Commander Jordan Baldueza offered his condolences to Wolf's family.

focusing on providing necessary assistance and service to all victims of violent crimes. They focus on helping to render services to speed the recovery and to assist throughout the medical, legal and criminal justice process. They cover six counties in the area covering approximately 5,400 square miles and serving approximately 50,000 people. "The important thing is to create awareness and recognize the warning signs," says

Linda Calvio, Victim Services Executive Director. "It's not always physical abuse, and it's not only boys who do the abusing. Emotional and verbal abuse causes as much pain; bruises can heal, but the pain of verbal abuse can last a lifetime."

One of the handouts was a Healthy Relationship Quiz that asked questions to help the students recognize the signs of abuse. Some of those warning signs can include changes in behavior, mood swings, becoming isolated, and falling grades. "If you are uncomfortable speaking to a teacher or par-

ent, please know you can come to us and everything is confidential," stresses Calvio. "We are on call 24/7, and you can reach us through our website at all times."

In 1913, Mexican President Francisco I. Madero and Vice President Jose Maria Pino Suarez were arrested during a military coup (both were shot to death on Feb. 22).
In 1930, photographic evidence of Pluto (now designated a "dwarf planet") was discovered by Clyde W. Tombaugh at Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona.
In 1943, Madame Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Chinese leader, addressed members of the Senate and then the House, becoming the first Chinese national to address both houses of the U.S. Congress.
In 1970, the "Chicago Seven" defendants were found not guilty of conspiring to incite riots at the 1968 Democratic national convention; five were convicted of violating the Anti-Riot Act of 1968 (those convictions were later reversed).
In 1972, the California Supreme Court struck down the state's death penalty.
In 1977, the space shuttle prototype Enterprise, sitting atop a Boeing 747, went on its debut "flight" above Edwards Air Force Base in California.
In 1983, 13 people were shot to death at a gambling club in Seattle's Chinatown in what became known as the Wah Mee Massacre. (Two men were convicted of the killings; a third was found guilty of robbery and assault.)
In 1988, Anthony M. Kennedy was sworn in as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court.
In 1997, astronauts on the space shuttle Discovery com-

pleted their tune-up of the Hubble Space Telescope after 33 hours of spacewalking; the Hubble was then released using the shuttle's crane.
In 2003, an arson attack involving two South Korean subway trains in the city of Daegu claimed 198 lives. (The arsonist was sentenced to life in prison, where he died in 2004.)
Ten years ago: President Barack Obama launched a \$75 billion foreclosure rescue plan aimed at saving homes. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton began a two-day visit to Indonesia. Eric Holder, the nation's first black attorney general, said in a speech to Justice Department employees marking Black History Month that the United States was "a nation of cowards" on matters of race. Pope Benedict XVI received House Speaker Nancy Pelosi at the Vatican, telling her that Catholic politicians had a duty to protect life "at all stages of its development."
Five years ago: Megan Rice, an 84-year-old nun, was sentenced in Knoxville, Tennessee, to nearly three years in prison for breaking into a nuclear weapons complex and defacing a bunker holding bomb-grade uranium, a demonstration that exposed serious security flaws at the Y-12 National Security Complex in Oak Ridge. (Two other activists received sentences of just over five years.) Maria Franziska von Trapp, 99, the last surviving member of the seven original Trapp Family Singers of "Sound of Music" fame (and stepdaughter of "the" Maria von Trapp), died in Stowe, Vermont.
One year ago: "Black Panther," the Marvel superhero film from the Walt Disney Co., blew past expectations to take in \$192 million during its debut weekend in U.S. and Canadian theaters. LeBron James scored 29 points and won his third NBA All-Star Game MVP award as his team beat the rival squad headed by Stephen

Curry, 148-to-145.

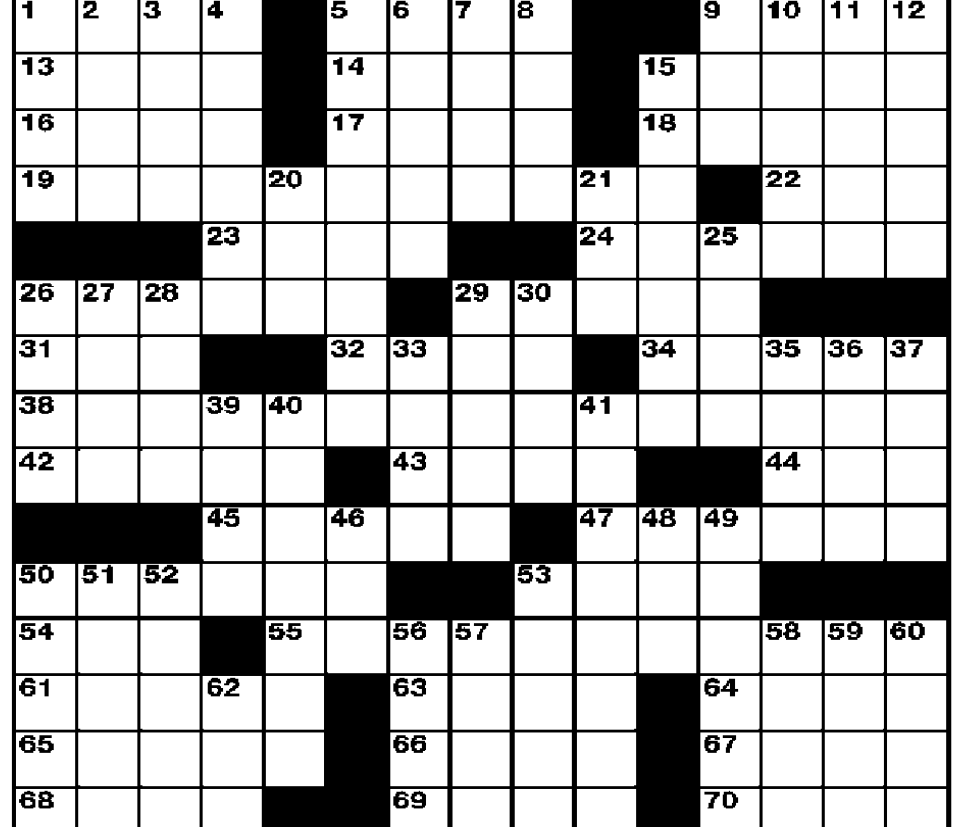
