Are you ready to get your gems and minerals on, Howard County? The 50th annual Big Spring Prospector's Club's Gem and Mineral Show is this weekend - Saturday and Sunday, March 2 and 3.

"This will be our 50th show, so we're going to try to make it more special than our regular ones," said Gem

and Mineral Show Organizer Lola Lamb. "We just want to play it up as being our Golden Anniversary show."

The show, to be held this year in the Howard County Fair Barn, is the continuation of half a century of tradition. The magic began in 1969 with the first Gem and Mineral Show, just one year after the Big Spring Prospector's Club got its start.

"The club formed in 1968 with six men who were interested in artifacts and old bottles and metal detect-

ing. Hence the name 'prospector's,'" Lamb said. "The first show was held in 1969 in the Highland Shopping Center. They just brought the bottles and the treasures they'd found with their metal detectors. Then in 1970, a meeting was called because there were a lot of people who were interested in that, too, but they were more interested in the lapidary, cutting the rocks and things. So it was decided to add a lapidary section to the original club. By 1971, the club had grown to 43 members from the six who started it out."

The Prospector's Club has never missed a year of the

Gem and Mineral Show since that first outing in 1969, Lamb said. This year will continue most of the familiar displays and activities the show traditionally features, along with a few new things.

"We'll have displays that are brought in by neighboring clubs. Midland always brings several displays for us,"

she said. "Our displays are our one attraction, and then the dealers selling the different merchandise, gems and minerals and such. Then we have the spinning wheel for the kiddoes."

The spinning wheel is a "wheel of fortune" type device that kids can spin. Each spin wins a prize, and the prize won depends on the number spun.

Admission to the show is free, and everyone who attends is eligible to win hourly door prizes, Lamb said.

"They get a ticket when they come in, and then we give a door prize every hour on the hour," she said. "That's free for people who come to the show."

Those attending the show will also have a chance to help pick the best display.

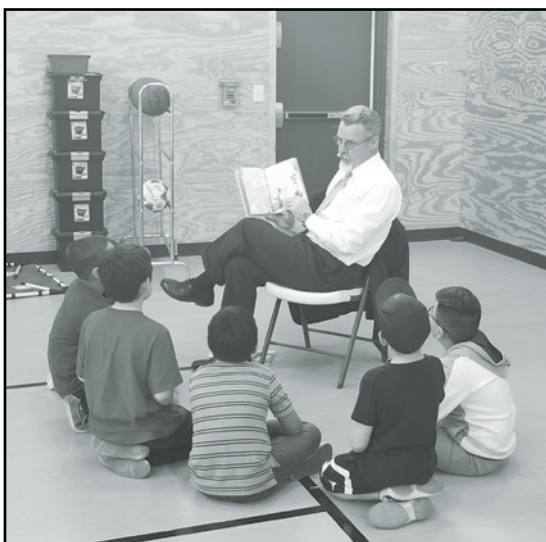
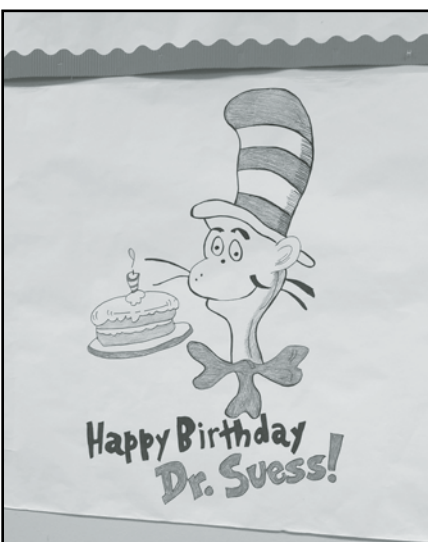
"It's the People's Choice Award," Lamb said. "The people who come to the show vote on what display they like the best, and we give a plaque to the person who set it up."

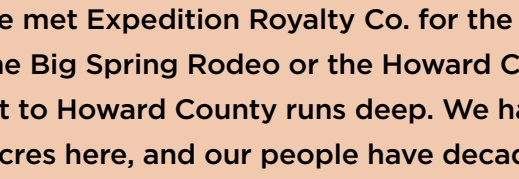

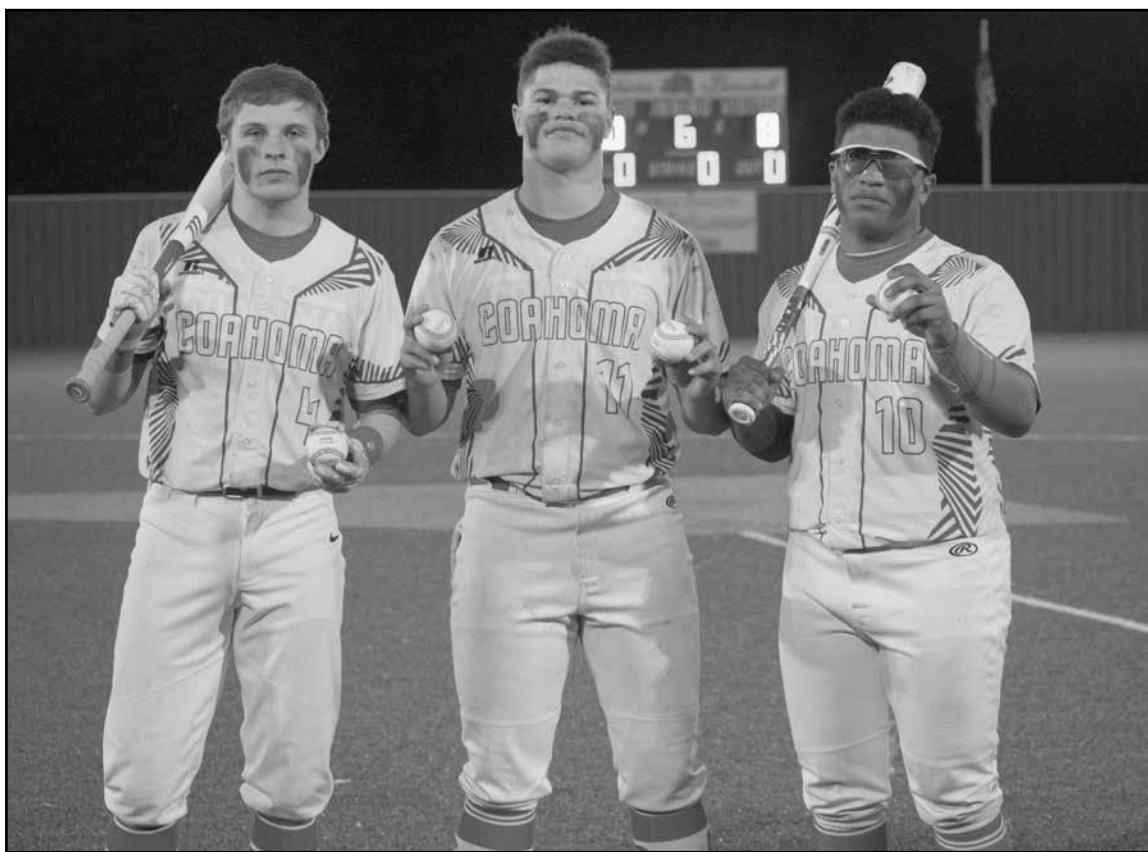

BIG SPRING — The Lady Steers have started this softball season out with a bang. 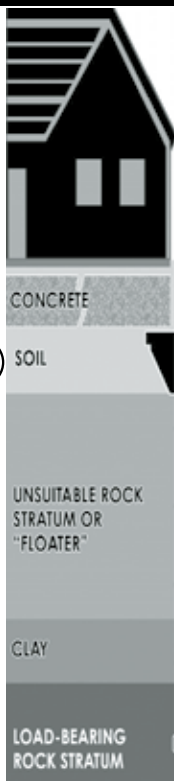

If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. Opening lead — ten of clubs.

**Here is a well-played hand.** South got to six notrump, which required no more than a 3-2 spade division to assure 12 tricks.

**But when declarer won** the club lead with the queen and played the king and a low spade to the queen, East showed out, discarding a heart. At this point, South's prospects looked very dim. He could establish a spade trick by conceding a spade

after cashing the ace, but this would merely produce his 11th trick and leave him one short of his goal.

**Declarer thought the matter over** carefully and finally came to the right conclusion. He realized there was still a chance for the slam if West had the king of diamonds, and he proceeded accordingly.

**He took three more club tricks,** discarding a heart from dummy. Then, after cashing the A-K of hearts, he played the ace and another spade, discarding a heart from his hand.

**West had to win the spade** with the jack, and, with only the K-8-3 of diamonds left, returned a low diamond. South played the queen from dummy, and, after it held, dummy's fifth spade and the ace of diamonds scored the last two tricks to make the slam.

**The deal demonstrates** a very important principle of declarer play. South reached a point where his cause seemed hopeless, but he then improvised a line of play that gave him a legitimate chance if the opposing cards were divided favorably.

**He needed a good deal of luck** to find West with both the king of diamonds and no more than two hearts, but it was typical of the kind of luck that rewards those who refuse to yield to misfortune.

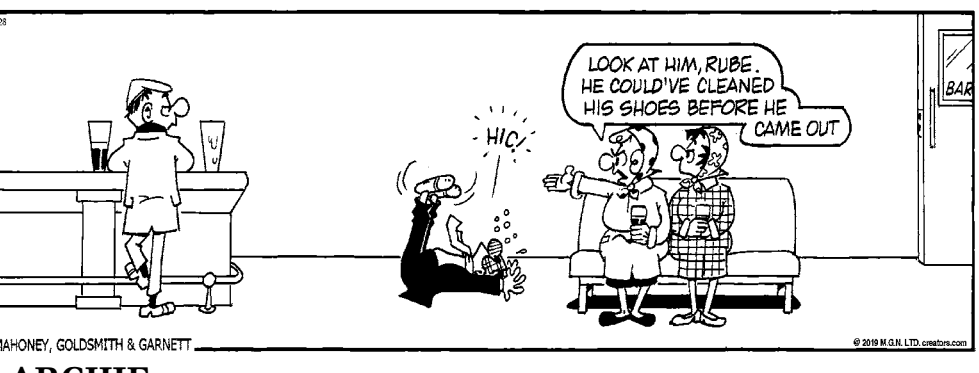

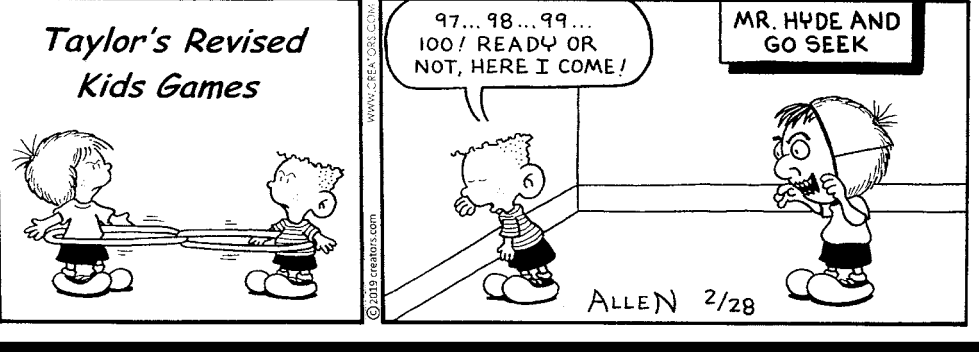

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Feb. 28, the 59th day of 2019. There are 306 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Feb. 28, 1942, the heavy cruiser USS Houston and the Australian light cruiser HMAS Perth were attacked by Japanese forces during the World War II Battle of Sunda Strait; both were sunk shortly after midnight on March 1 with a total loss of more than 1,000 men.

On this date:

In 1844, a 12-inch gun aboard the USS Princeton exploded as the ship was sailing on the Potomac River, killing Secretary of State Abel P. Upshur, Navy Secretary Thomas W. Gilmer and several others.

In 1849, the California gold rush began in earnest as regular steamship service started bringing gold-seekers to San Francisco.

In 1911, President William Howard Taft nominated William H. Lewis to be the first black Assistant Attorney General of the United States.

In 1917, The Associated Press reported that the United States had obtained a diplomatic communication sent by German Foreign Minister Arthur Zimmermann to a German official in Mexico proposing a German alliance with Mexico and Japan should the U.S. enter World War I. (Outrage over the telegram helped propel America into the conflict.)

In 1953, scientists James D. Watson and Francis H.C. Crick announced they had discovered the double-helix structure of DNA.

In 1958, a school bus clipped a truck near Prestonburg, Kentucky, and plunged down an embankment into the Big Sandy River; 22 children managed to escape, but 26 other children and the bus driver drowned.

In 1975, 42 people were killed in London's Underground when a train smashed into the end of a tunnel.

In 1988, the 15th Olympic Winter Games held its closing ceremony in Calgary, Canada.

In 1993, a gun battle erupted at a religious compound near Waco, Texas, when Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents tried to arrest Branch Davidian leader David Koresh on weapons charges; four agents and six Davidians were killed as a 51-day standoff began.

In 1995, Denver International Airport opened after 16 months of delays and \$3.2 billion in budget overruns.

In 1996, Britain's Princess Diana agreed to divorce Prince

Charles. (Their 15-year marriage officially ended in August 1996; Diana died in a car crash in Paris a year after that.)

In 2013, Benedict XVI became the first pope in 600 years to resign, ending an eight-year pontificate. (Benedict was succeeded the following month by Pope Francis.)

Bradley Manning, the Army private arrested in the biggest leak of classified information in U.S. history, pleaded guilty at Fort Meade, Maryland, to 10 charges involving illegal possession or distribution of classified material. (Manning, who later adopted the female identity Chelsea Manning, was sentenced to up to 35 years in prison after being convicted of additional charges in a court-martial, but had her sentence commuted in 2017 by President Barack Obama.)

Ten years ago: Paul Harvey, the news commentator and talk-radio pioneer whose staccato style made him one of the nation's most familiar voices, died in Phoenix at age 90.

Oakland Raiders linebacker Marquis Cooper, free-agent NFL defensive lineman Corey Smith and former South Florida player William Bleakley died when their boat overturned in rough seas off the coast of Florida.

Five years ago: Delivering a blunt warning to Moscow, President Barack Obama expressed deep concern over reported military activity inside Ukraine by Russia and warned "there will be costs" for any intervention.

One year ago: Walmart announced that it would no longer sell firearms and ammunition to people younger than 21 and would remove items resembling assault-style rifles from its website.

Dick's Sporting Goods said it would stop selling assault-style rifles, and ban the sale of all guns to anyone under 21.

Students and teachers returned under police guard to Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School as classes resumed for the first time since the shooting that killed 17 people.

President Donald Trump called for substantial changes to the nation's gun laws, criticizing lawmakers for being fearful of the National Rifle Association.

Political leaders paid tribute to the Rev. Billy Graham as his casket rested in the U.S. Capitol Rotunda.

West Virginia's House approved a 5 percent pay raise to end a week-

long walkout by teachers.

White House communications director Hope Hicks, one of President Donald Trump's most trusted aides, abruptly announced her resignation.

Macey is a member of the National Honor Society and Student Council, and was elected senior class president by her peers.

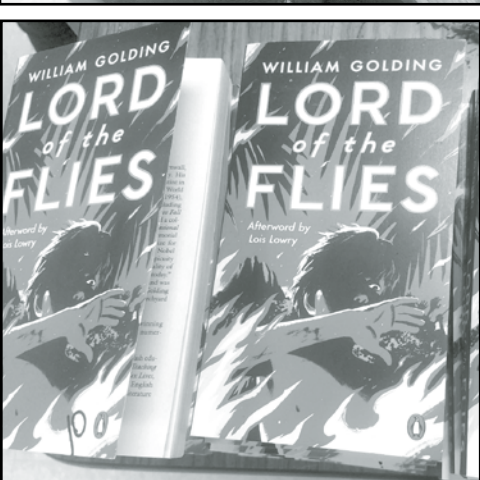
After graduation, Macey plans to attend Angelo State University to pursue major in Applied Science. She will work towards a career in Dental Hygiene.

a shelter. The shelter had to stand up to rain and wind (water sprayed and breath blown onto the shelter).

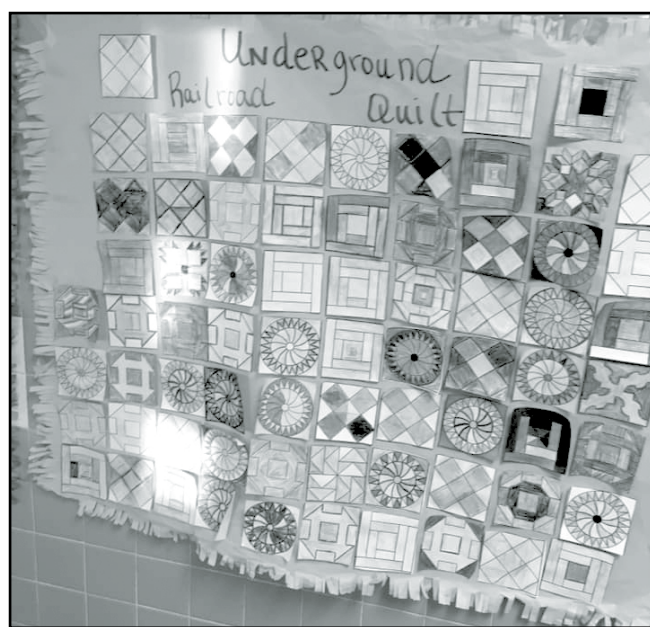

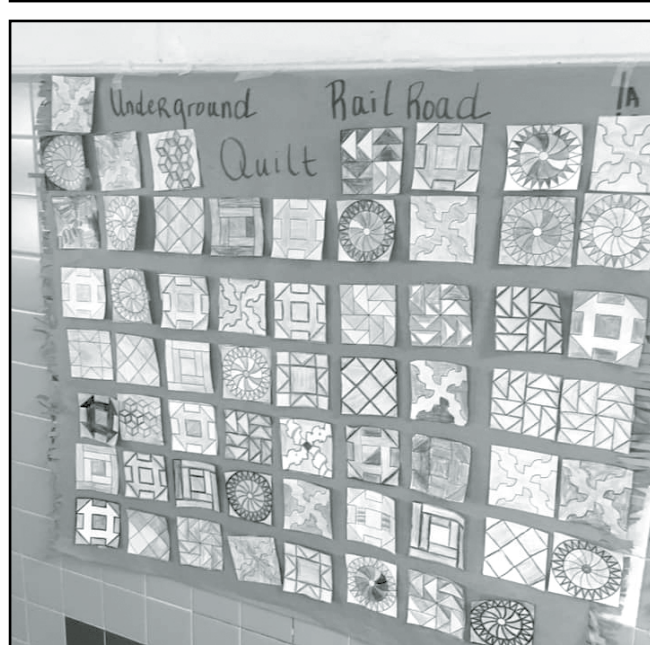
"Harriet Tubman led the Underground Railroad. Symbols were placed in windows of homes to help keep slaves free or safe."

## Mavericks' Doncic turning 20 after sensational run as teen

DALLAS — At some point, Luka Doncic will be measured by wins and playoff success rather than how many triple-doubles he had as a teenager, or so Dallas Mavericks coach Rick Carlisle hopes with his rookie sensation.

The budding Slovenian star's final game before turning 20 was just the illustration his coach had in mind.

The ball was in Doncic's hands late in a close game against a playoff contender, just as it has been regardless of the opponent most of the season once the Mavericks realized what they had in the No. 3 overall pick from last summer's draft.

Doncic had a hand in four straight 3-pointers in the closing minutes to help Dallas hold on in a 110-101 victory over the Indiana Pacer-son Wednesday night. He connected on two long 3s and assisted on the other two from behind the arc.

The win stopped a five-game losing streak that was more on the mind of Carlisle before the game than the litany of teen milestones for a player who has brightened the outlook of a franchise trying to become relevant in the

postseason again.

"Luka's an amazing player for his age," Carlisle said. "Even when he turns 20, it's still going to be remarkable, the things that he's doing. But these last 22 games ... is going to be a test of how much of that load he can take on his back."

The Mavericks are playoff long shots in the Western Conference after trading their other four starters in a pair of deals before the deadline, and the most important player they got in return won't suit up this season.

Dallas decided to play it safe after completing a seven-player trade with New York that landed 2018 All-Star Kristaps Porzingis, who tore a knee ligament last February in what turned out to be his final game with the Knicks.

So while the Mavericks wait to see what Doncic and the 7-foot-3 Latvian can do together next season, the burden is on the only NBA player with multiple triple-doubles as a teen. Until the next teen star comes along, Doncic has four of the five in league history.

"I don't think it's just me," said Doncic, who turns 20 on Thursday. "A lot of players help us a lot. We have to trust everybody."

Even with Porzingis, the Mavericks will run their offense through their 6-7 point guard of the future. Twice as a teenager, Doncic had games with at least 35 points, 10 rebounds and five assists. There have been just two others in NBA history — one each for LeBron James and Kevin Durant.

"It's crazy that he's that young," said 40-year-old Mavericks star Dirk Nowitzki, in his record 21st season with the same franchise.

"If you watch him play all year, if you watch him play tonight down the stretch, you wouldn't think you're talking a 19-, 20-year-old kid. It's just how he carries himself, the confidence, is of a veteran. He's going to be fun to watch for a long, long time."

Now that he's turning 20, Doncic has the same expectations he did at 19 after coming into the NBA as a Euroleague MVP and champion. "Probably been asked this question 100 times, but I always say I knew I could play here," said Doncic, who leads all rookies at 20.9 points per game and is second in rebounds (7.3) and assists (5.7). "I knew what I can do. It's been great. I just have to keep working."

The teen portion was a big hit.
