Bridge work; lane closures beginning soon

Traffic on the north side of Gregg Street will be experiencing lane closures for the next nine months, as crews work to replace the concrete deck on the bridge over the Union Pacific Crossing.

According to Project Man-

ager Kenneth Corse, the project will take place in stages. The initial phase will include closing the west side lanes and shifting traffic to the east side lanes. "We will place concrete

bound lanes serving two way traffic. The sidewalk will remain open during the construction," Corse

The concrete slab will be removed and struc-

tural steel work will also take place. Once the new slab has been laid, the lanes will reopen and the east bound lanes will be closed, for the same process. In addition to the new slab and structural

steel work, the steel will also be cleaned and painted. According to Corse, the project is estimated at nine months for full completion, but the project company is looking at shortening that time frame, if possible.

"October and early November would be ideal time for the painting and the cleaning to take place simultaneously, so that is the timeline

we are looking at currently," he said.

During the constuction, Corse said those who are able to use an alternate route are encouraged to do so.

"Yes, the road will be open, but you have to remember we are going to be squeezing four lanes of traffic into two lanes of traffic. It will be a congested area during the work, but the roads will be open," he said.

Construction and road closures are expected to begin as early as Monday, March 11.

Midland police officer dies following Tuesday shooting

Local law enforcement pays tribute to fallen officer

A Midland Police Officer has succumbed to injuries sustained during a burglar alarm call early Tuesday morning.

Officer Nathan Hayden Heidelberg, a five-year veteran with the Midland Police Department responded to the call along with three other officers, according to reports obtained by local media sources.

According to reports, the officer announced his presence upon arrival at the scene; however, the homeowner believed his house was being burglarized, and fired a shot toward the flashlight Officer Heidelberg was holding. The bullet hit the officer above his bullet-proof vest, resulting in a fatal in-According to the Midland police report, the home-

owner, David Charles Wilson, has been arrested on charges of manslaughter, and was released on a \$75,000 bond Tuesday afternoon. An investigation of the incident by Texas Rang-



Area law enforcement agencies joined together to pay tribute and give honor to Officer Heidelberg as he was transported to Tarrant County for an autopsy. The Big Spring Fire Department, other local law enforcement officers and community members, lined I-20 to honor the slain officer as he passed through Big Spring; and flags at the Law Enforcement Center were lowered to half mast in mourning for Officer Heidelberg.

'Brilliant' man who was an inventor of the calculator dies

DALLAS (AP) — Jerry Merryman, one of the inventors of the hand-held electronic calculator who is described by those who knew him as not only brilliant but also kind with a good sense of humor, has died. He was 86.

Merryman died Feb. 27 at a Dallas hospital from complications of heart and kidney failure, said his stepdaughter, Kim Ikovic. She said he'd been hospitalized since late December after experiencing complications during surgery to install a pacemaker.

He's one of the three men credited with inventing the hand-held calculator while working at Dallas-based Texas Instruments. The team was led by Jack Kilby, who made way for today's computers with the invention of the integrated circuit and won the Nobel Prize. The prototype built by the team, which also included James Van Tassel, is at the Smithsonian Institu-

"I have a Ph.D. in material science and I've known hundreds of scientists, professors, Nobel prize-winners and so on. Jerry Merryman was the

Avoid problems down the road. Ensure your vehicle's heating system Period. Absolutely, outstandingly brilliant," said Vernon Porter, a former TI colleague and friend. "He had an incredible memory and he had an ability to pull up formulas, information, on almost any subject."

Another former TI colleague and friend, Ed Millis, said, "Jerry did the circuit design on this thing in three days, and if he was ever around, he'd lean over and say, 'and nights.'"

Merryman told NPR's "All Things Considered" in 2013, "It was late 1965 and Jack Kilby, my boss, presented the idea of a calculator. He called some people in his office. He says, we'd like to have some sort of computing device, perhaps to replace the slide rule. It would be nice if it were as small as this little book that I have in my hand."

Merryman added, "Silly me, I thought we were just making a calculator, but we were creating an electronic revolution."

The Smithsonian says that the three had made enough progress by September 1967 to apply for a patent, which was subsequently revised before the final application in June 1974.



The more advanced plays in bridge fortunately do not arise very often, but even when they do, they are usually not hard to figure out.

The grand coup, for example, is a rather forbidding term for one type of advanced play, but it is not really difficult to execute when the opportunity presents itself. The nice part about it is that you know exactly what you're up against when the coup becomes necessary, and all you have to do is work out the details.

West led a club, and East cashed the A-K and returned the ten, ruffed by West. West returned a heart, taken with dummy's ten. Declarer then cashed the king of spades, on which West showed out.

South had already lost three

tricks, and the problem now was to avoid losing a trump trick. He could take one finesse against East by leading dummy's last spade, but how could he then overcome East's remaining Q-9?

This is the typical grand coup

situation where declarer has to take what in effect amounts to a trump finesse without having a trump to lead from dummy. The answer to how this is done lies in declarer's first reducing his trump length to that of his opponent, and then leading a card from dummy at the crucial moment to trap the adverse honor.

In the given case, declarer starts by taking the spade finesse at trick six, then leads the king of diamonds and overtakes it with the ace! Next he ruffs a diamond, crosses to the queen of hearts and ruffs another diamond He now returns to dummy with


the ace of hearts, reducing everyone to two cards. With the lead in dummy and South holding the A-J of spades over East's Q-9, East's apparent trump trick is obliterated, and the contract is made.



Today in History

On March 6, 1857, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Dred Scott v. Sandford, ruled 7-2 that Scott, a slave, was not an American citizen and therefore could not sue for his freedom in federal court. On this date:

In 1475, Italian artist and poet Michelangelo was born in Caprese (kah-PRAY'-say) in the Republic of Florence.

In 1836, the Alamo in San Antonio, Texas, fell as Mexican forces led by General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna stormed the fortress after a 13-day siege; the battle claimed the lives of all the Texan defenders, nearly 200 strong, including William Travis, James Bowie and Davy Crockett.

In 1912, Oreo sandwich cookies were first introduced by the National Biscuit Co.

In 1933, a national bank holiday declared by President Franklin D. Roosevelt aimed at calming panicked depositors went into effect. Chicago Mayor Anton Cermak, wounded in an attempt on Roosevelt's life the previous month, died at a Miami hospital at age 59.

In 1944, U.S. heavy bombers staged the first full-scale American raid on Berlin during World War II.

In 1953, Georgy Malenkov was named premier of the Soviet Union a day after the death of Josef Stalin.

In 1964, heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay officially changed his name to Muhammad Ali.

In 1970, a bomb being built inside a Greenwich Village townhouse by the radical Weathermen accidentally went off, destroying the house and killing three group members.

In 1983, in a case that drew much notoriety, a woman was gang-raped atop a pool table in a tavern in New Bedford, Massachusetts, called Big Dan's; four men were later convicted of the attack.

In 1995, "The Jenny Jones Show" taped an episode on same-sex crushes during which Jonathan Schmitz learned his secret admirer was an acquaintance, Scott Amedure; three days later, Schmitz fatally shot Amedure, later telling police that Amedure had embarrassed him on national TV. (Schmitz was sentenced to 25 to 50 years in

prison for second-degree murder but was released on parole in August, 2017; the episode was never included in the "Jenny Jones" syndication package, but did air on Court TV.)

In 2008, a Palestinian killed eight students at a Jewish seminary in Jerusalem before he was slain; Hamas militants in the Gaza Strip praised the operation in a statement, and thousands of Palestinians took to the streets of Gaza to celebrate.

In 2016, former first lady Nancy Reagan died in Los Angeles at

Ten years ago: The government reported the jobless rate reached 8.1 percent in Feb. 2009. While cknowledging an "astounding' number of job losses, President Barack Obama told critics of his \$787 billion economic recovery plan in Columbus, Ohio, that it was saving jobs and said, "I know we did the right thing." NASA's planet-hunting spacecraft, Kepler, rocketed into space on a voyage to track down other Earths in a faraway patch of the Milky Way galaxy.

Five years ago: Ukraine lurched toward breakup as lawmakers unanimously declared they wanted to join Russia and planned to put the decision to voters; President Barack Obama condemned the move and the West imposed the first real sanctions against Russia. Actresssinger Sheila MacRae, 92, died in Englewood, New Jersey.

One year ago: Top economic adviser Gary Cohn announced that he was leaving the White House after breaking with President Donald Trump on trade policy. Nashville Mayor Megan Barry, a one-time rising star in the Democratic Party, resigned after pleading guilty to cheating the city out of thousands of dollars to carry on an affair with her bodyguard. Schoolteachers in West Virginia announced an end to a nine-day walkout after state lawmakers approved a 5 percent pay raise.

Harden scores 35, Rockets beat Raptors 107-95

TORONTO (AP) — James Harden and the Houston Rockets watched a big lead evaporate, yet managed to keep their winning streak intact.

Harden scored 19 of his 35 points in the final quarter, Gerald Green had 11 of his 18 in the fourth and the Rockets beat the Toronto Raptors 107-95 on Tuesday night.

Eric Gordon and Austin Rivers each scored 13 points as the Rockets won their sixth straight, matching a season high.

Kawhi Leonard scored 26 points and Serge Ibaka had 10 points and 15 rebounds for Toronto. Pascal Siakam had 17 points, and Danny Green 14 as the Raptors had their seven-game home winning streak snapped.

Harden, the NBA's leading scorer, made 12 of 30 shots, including three of nine from long range. He was perfect at the foul line, hitting all eight of his

Houston's Chris Paul said his MVP teammates makes scoring look easy. It isn't, Paul cautioned.

"If it was that easy, everybody would do it," Paul

Harden, who eclipsed 18,000 career points Tuesday, has scored 28 or more points in 39 straight games. It's the second-longest streak in NBA history. Wilt Chamberlain (71 games) holds the record.

The Raptors overcame a 22-point second quarter deficit to reclaim the lead in the third, but couldn't hold on in the fourth. The Rockets turned it on, connecting on seven of their first eight shot from 3-point range. Houston made 15 of 34 attempts from beyond the arc.

"We locked back in," Harden said. "Our second unit did an unbelievable job of getting stops and creating opportunities on offense, and that was the

Harden made six of seven field goals in the fourth, including a pair of 3-pointers. He also had five foul shots in the quarter.

"I was playing well, but I wasn't shooting it well," Harden said of his performance through three quarters. "I had a lot of opportunities at the rim that I didn't convert on, so I wanted to make sure I converted on those, because that was the game right there.'

The Rockets outscored the Raptors 23-7 on fast break points and turned 13 Toronto turnovers into 26 points. Houston had scored 17 points off turnovers before allowing any of their own.

"We've just got to do better," Siakam said. "Not enough energy."

Teammates Kyle Lowry echoed Siakam's comments on the heels of Toronto's second straight defeat. The Raptors lost in overtime at Detroit on

"We've got to play harder as a group and continue to get better," Lowry said.

Harden missed seven of 10 shot attempts in the first, but scored nine points as the Rockets led 23-19

Houston opened the second with a 19-4 run to take a 42-23 lead at 7:28. Green and Rivers each scored seven in the quarter and Houston led 55-37 at halftime. For the Raptors, it was their lowest-scoring half of the season.

Toronto roared back as Houston missed 11 of its first 12 attempts to begin the second half. Siakam's basket at 4:44 of the third put the Raptors up 60-59, erasing what had been a 22-point deficit. Siakam scored 15 in the quarter and the Rockets were 4-for-23 shooting as Toronto took a 71-69 lead into the fourth.

Klingberg scores, Bishop stops 28 shots, Stars blank Rangers

DALLAS (AP) — Ben Bishop hasn't had a lot of room for error when he shuts out opponents this season.

Bishop made 28 saves for his 28th career shutout, John Klingberg scored a second-period goal and the Dallas Stars beat the New York Rangers 1-0 Tues-

Dallas won its third straight and moved one point ahead of Minnesota in the race for the first wild card in the Western Conference. Three of Bishop's four shutouts this season have been by a 1-0 score. His oth-

er shutout was a less-stressful 2-0 win. "Didn't know that. Maybe we should start scoring less goals," Bishop joked.

"That's just the way it's worked out." Bishop also entered the third period with a 1-0 lead in a win Saturday at St.

"Our goalies have been instrumental throughout the whole process," Stars coach Jim Montgomery said. "I don't think (Bishop) had as hard a night as he had on others, but he managed the traffic in front of him really well."

Klingberg provided the offense 1:16 into the second period. He took a crossice pass from Miro Heiskanen at the blue line, skated to the top of the right circle and sent a wrist shot into the net off the left post.

"Post in, that's nice because it's usually post out," Klingberg said. "Miro made a great play. I talked to him. I was open. I got the puck on my tape. I saw someone screened the goalie really good."

Rangers goalie Alexandar Georgiev said he saw the shot coming.

"But I didn't see how it went in. There was a lot of traffic in front of me, so I tried to just move into the direction the puck was going and block it."

Georgiev had 31 saves for New York, which hasn't won in five games.

The game ended two seconds after a scrum in front of Bishop that resulted in 24 minutes in penalties, 20 against the Rangers. Ryan Strome had a crosschecking penalty and a game misconduct.

"Strome absolutely crushed (the Stars' Jason Dickinson) into me." Bishop said. "It's one of those where we don't play them the rest of this year, but we'll remember it next year."

The Rangers had only one minor penalty in the first two periods but racked up 35 minutes and killed four Dallas power plays in the third period. Mika Zibanejad received a major penalty for boarding and a game misconduct when he knocked the Stars' Radek Faksa out of the game midway through the third.

"The linesman called it and he felt that (Zibanejad) hit (Faksa) in the head," Rangers coach David Quinn said. "That was the call, that was the explanation I got, and we had to kill a five-minute major."

The goalies had 11 saves each in the first period.

Georgiev had more difficult chances in the first. He stopped Faksa on a breakaway and gloved Jamie Benn's shot from the top of the left circle off a faceoff. Bishop's best was at 17:40 on Vladislav Nemestnikov's shot as he skated down

Dallas killed three penalties in the first two periods. On the third, Zibanejad hit the crossbar behind Bishop.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — South Carolina coach Frank Martin was thrilled his team ended its losing streak with a win against Texas A&M on Tuesday night.

He might have been equally as happy that it came thanks to a bounceback performance from senior star Chris Silva.

Silva had 22 points and a careerhigh 17 rebounds to help South Carolina snap a three-game skid with the 71-54 victory.

Silva's big game comes after the 6-foot-9 player didn't have a rebound in a loss to Missouri on Saturday.

"I'm really happy for Chris," Martin said. "He's been an unbelievable guy to coach for four years and he's worked his tail off and I so want him to finish his senior year the right way. And the way he played last game, it's not indicative of the kind of player that he is and the kind of conference season he's had."

Silva didn't miss from 3-point range, making a career-best four after never attempting more than three in

"He was a force rebounding and when he's making 3-pointers like

since the All-Star break.

he did, it's tough," Texas A&M coach Billy Kennedy said.

Silva said being versatile in his scoring was big on Tuesday night.

"The players got to respect me when I step on the 3 so they've got to guard me," he said. "Down low I try to do the same thing when I post up. Whenever I get the ball I try to make my player guard me so the court opens."

South Carolina (15-15, 10-7 Southeastern Conference) led for the majority of the night and used a big run in the first part of the second half to pull away for good.

The Gamecocks led by 5 at halftime and had pushed the lead to 52-40 after scoring five straight points, capped by a 3 from Silva, with about 15 minutes left.

Wendell Mitchell made four quick points for the Aggies after that. But South Carolina countered with a 10-1 spurt that extended it to 62-45 with about eight minutes remaining and cruised to the victory. Keyshawn Bryant and Hassani Gravett scored three points each in that stretch and Silva capped it with a dunk.

The Gamecocks made 8 of 10 3-pointers in the first half and finished with 13 3s. It was their second big longrange shooting game against the Aggies this season after they tied a school record by sinking 16 in an 84-77 win on Feb. 16.

Freshman A.J. Lawson led the team with six 3s in that first meeting, but with Lawson out with an ankle injury, Gravett joined Silva with four.

Texas A&M (13-16, 6-11) got 15 points from Mitchell and 14 from Savion Flagg as it lost for the second time in three games.

The Aggies had two players in their starting lineup finish with no points.

"It's hard to beat people when you

don't get offensive production from everyone that's playing," Kennedy said. The Gamecocks had shot just 36.3

percent from the field during their losing streak, but rediscovered their offense against A&M, making 45 percent of their field goals, including shooting 57 percent on 3s.

Gravett added 17 points with eight assists for South Carolina and Bryant finished with 15 points.

BIG PICTURE

South Carolina: The Gamecocks got back on track offensively after three tough games, but will need to keep it up if they hope to make any noise in the SEC tournament next week.

Texas A&M: The Aggies managed to play well enough to hand Vanderbilt its 17th straight loss on Saturday, but they'll have to play much better if they hope to wrap up this tough regular season on a high note or do anything in the conference tournament.

Martin said Lawson got the cast removed from his ankle on Monday and that he was doing much better. He said he's been doing intense rehabilitation for the last two days, but he isn't sure when he'll return.

"I think he'll play again this season ... but I don't think it will be Saturday," he said.

Hayward, Celtics run away from Warriors for a 128-95 win

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — DeMarcus Cousins lost his cool and the Golden State Warriors lost at home in embarrassing fashion once again.

Gordon Hayward scored 30 points off the bench, Kyrie Irving had 19 points and 11 assists, and the Boston Celtics ran away from the Warriors early on the way to a 128-95 win Tuesday night in a game that turned testy with the twotime defending champions down big.

Cousins and Terry Rozier received double technicals with 8:44 to play. Cousins was called for his fifth foul on a charge drawn by Aron Baynes, then the fiery Warriors center stood over Baynes in clear frustration. Jayson Tatum bumped Cousins with his right arm and Cousins pushed back with some force, then Rozier entered the fray and he and Cousins traded shoves.

"It was silly. It was nothing, absolutely nothing," Cousins said without elabo-

Boogie's moment summed up an ugly evening of basketball by his team and fans seeing their final season in the East Bay made a mad dash for the Oracle Arena exits in the closing minutes. It was the Warriors' fifth home defeat by 20 or more points.

"I'd love to have some magic potion and say we can come out and play with better energy and better discipline and kind of rectify it, but we've got to, at some point, stop talking about it and figure it out," Stephen Curry said.

Curry provided a bright spot with 23 points and four 3-pointers on a night Splash Brother Klay Thompson sat out with soreness in his right knee. "Klay would have had to play a hell of a game to overcome all that," coach

Steve Kerr said. Kevin Durant scored 18 points but committed five turnovers, while Cousins

wound up with 10 points on 4-for-12 shooting — missing all five of his 3-point tries — and nine rebounds to go with four turnovers. The Warriors, who had won the last two meetings with Boston, couldn't

overcome a lackluster first half in which they were outhustled on both ends and faced a daunting 73-48 halftime deficit. "It looked to me like we were jogging up the floor. You can't play basketball

jogging. You've got to sprint," Kerr said. "Your cuts have to be hard. You have to be going all out. We did not go all out and it was embarrassing." Tatum scored 17 points for the Celtics, who came in having lost five of six

"I think we played with purpose all the way through. We were very businesslike the whole night, even at halftime and just now after the game," Celtics coach Brad Stevens said. "We know we haven't played like that enough but It's encouraging as a reminder that we can."

Golden State missed its initial four shots and fell behind 11-0 as Boston started 5 of 7 before Curry's jumper at 8:26. The Warriors made five straight shots and used a 12-2 burst to get right back in it.

Alfonzo McKinnie started in place of Thompson and contributed seven points in 17 minutes.

"It starts with a passion and an anger and an intensity, and it wasn't there tonight," Kerr said.
