County officials opposition to property tax rollback bills provokes public comment

Two local citizens spoke in favor of Senate Bill 2 and House Bill 2, legislation being considered by the Texas Legislature which would require a rollback election in response to any property tax increase larger than 2.5 percent; currently citizens may petition for a rollback election if the governing body raises property tax more than 8 percent. County Judge Kathryn Wiseman recently penned an open letter to Howard County residents in opposition to the bills.

Those speaking at the meeting were Kimberly York, recent candidate for Howard County Republican Party chairperson; and Shannon Thomason, current candidate for mayor of Big Spring.

"I'm real concerned about the fact that this county commission is not supporting SB2 and HB2," said York. "As taxpayers, we are way overburdened. The other thing is that, you need to be accountable to the taxpayers. We are your bosses, and with our assessments skyrocketing the way they have, you are already getting extra money. My taxes in the last five years – I mean, my appraisal – has gone up 300

Elections Office hosting Open House New equipment demos, register to vote and more

Voting in Howard County is taking on a new look.

In order to ease voter fears or concerns, the Howard County Elections Office is hosting an Open House on March 25 from 4:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Howard County Courthouse.

"It is important for people to be comfortable with the process and know what is expected when they arrive, on voting day," Jodi Duck, Howard County Elections Administrator. said. New election equipment was purchased through grants awarded through the state, as part of the Help America Vote Act (HAVA), a federal law passed in 2002, aimed at improving the country's election system. "The grant money allowed us to get this new equipment by saving the county and other entities thousands of dollars since 2005," Duck said. "The new system, along with voting centers, makes voting more accesible, more inclusive and accesible to all." The new equipment which includes Express Touch - curbside voting, and Express Poll - ballot marking, which features a touch screen display, and the DS200 - vote tabulation scanner, will be on dispaly and available for demo, during the open house. "The process has changed a little bit, but it's super easy. The new system will allow for touch screen voting by electronically marking

a paper ballot, allow the voter to review the ballot and then place it in the scanner to be counted," Duck said. "By educating the public on the new system prior to an election, we can reduce the amount of assistance they would need when casting their official balllot, making voting day easier and faster."

She continued, "The voters will be voting for local candidates who will make decisions on policies and funds that affect the community directly. This election is a great way to see your voice Amanda Duforather email editor@or call 432-263-7331.

percent. That's a lot, a huge percentage, when they say it's only supposed to be what, around six percent a year? That's way over. So those are my concerns."

Thomason addressed Wiseman's open letter in his remarks.

"I have a response to the open letter from Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman she sent out Monday," he said. "Judge Wiseman and commissioners, as a citizen of Big Spring and Howard County, I speak in opposition to your stance regarding the bills currently under consideration by the Texas Legislature in the current session. I feel your statements regarding House Bill 2 and Senate Bill 2 do not represent the will of the citizens of Howard County. HB2 and SB2 quite simply puts the question of increased taxation back in local control; however, that local control isn't a type favored by most local politicians. It puts the control of tax increases directly in the hands of the citizens, where I think it belongs."

Thomason highlighted enormous increases in valuation by the Howard County Appraisal District, the group that sets the county's property values according to state law, and which is not under the direction of the County Commission.

"What to your thinking is so wrong about the citizens having a direct say over the tax increases? After all, isn't it our money?" Thomason asked. "I can assure you everyone expects you to be good stewards of our money, and for the most part, you are. I'm glad that, in your letter, an elected official finally recognizes that appraised property values in Howard County are high. You state the Texas Comptroller's Office maintains a six-percent increase in value annually. So explain to the citizens why some of their properties have been increased in taxable value as much as 100 percent, 300 percent, or, in one case I know of first-hand, over 1,000 percent. In that case, an unimproved lot jumped from a tax value of \$1,500 to \$19,000. The valuation of that particular piece of property was subsequently lowered to \$1,200 by a state-appointed mediator last year, and was increased back to the ridiculous amount of \$19,000 this year by the Howard County Central Appraisal District, again with no improvements to the lot. Stories like this abound in Howard County."

Thomason cited the example of Stafford, a city in Fort Bend County, Texas, which levies no property tax, and urged commissioners to "...try to get creative in pursuing other streams of revenue for the county."

Wiseman made a brief response to the remarks delivered by York and Thomason.

"We are not supposed to get in a debate on this since it is not on the agenda," she said. "I do want to note there is a difference between cities and counties. Cities are allowed to collect tax...I'm talking about sales tax...counties are not. The other thing

Following the meeting, Commissioner Craig Bai-

Howard County cannot, as a county, levy a sales tax, Stafford does levy a sales tax.

"Counties only derive their revenue from property taxes, and what the state would have you believe is that all the taxes that are being raised are discretionary. Some 80 percent of a county's budget is unfunded mandates from the state."

During the regular portion of the meeting, Howard County Road Commissioner Brian Klinksiek presented a bleak outlook in his Road Damage Report.

"This is the first really hard, extensive look at damage since we completed the roadway grant, because, generally for budgeting purposes I'm looking about three years ahead, and I've extended this about six years ahead."

Klinksiek's report shows the county's investment in road repairs aren't keeping pace with the damage.

"I've come to a combined total of about \$10 million in efforts that we've put in to updating our roadway system since I showed a \$22 million road damage report in 2014. Logically you'd think we'd be down around \$12 million now, and the truth is it's gone the other way, and this Road Damage Report is up around \$52 million," Klinksiek said. "Basically it stems from this – I mean, I want to note the commitment of Howard County...I want to note the dedication of my staff in trying to fix things...plus the grant – but we have a continuing increase in traffic. Just drive around a little bit and you will see it and feel it. We also have had a significant amount of pipeline work going on, which means we have companies routinely moving 200,000-pound trenchers across my poor little old broken-back roads, and we just can't keep up. I'm outnumbered. I'm extensively outnumbered."

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

tery that shows what happens when little white lies become scars that define us.

When the body of a newborn is found in the rubble of an old house, questions are raised. Who did the baby belong to? How did it end up buried and forgotten beneath an old house? Kate Waters, a journalist who will not rest until she uncovers the truth about the baby,

investigates the neighborhood surrounding the site.

As she investigates, she learns secrets from the past of old residents. Before long she isn't sure what she can and cannot tell as the secrets grow deeper and darker than ever before.

Kate is tired of the monotonous routine that her investigative journalism career has taken. She longs for the thrill of chasing down leads and doing more than rewriting the "same old rubbish with a few frills."


For Emma, life with her mother was never easy. For one, they could never agree on men. Or at


My best friend ...







These are just a few of the events and activities helping BSHS students learn, grow and mature as BSHS is a Happening Place!


Academic Star Student of the Week Taxon Mueller, Coahoma High School

The owner needs to learn more about the dog as they are together and play around

with portion size to figure out what would be best long term when the dog gets to an ideal weight.

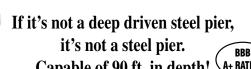



This deal occurred in a highstakes, high-level rubber-bridge game. It graphically demonstrates why a player must have the courage of his convictions.

West led the club five against six hearts, East playing the ace and South the queen. Then, despite the temptation to try to cash the ace of diamonds get right down to it, is fairly simple. East realized that West might have led the club five from a holding of 5-4 doubleton, but he also realized that the five could be a singleton and that declarer's play of the queen at trick one might be a falsecard.

Beyond that, however, there was an even more persuasive reason to return a club instead of the ace of diamonds. East correctly judged that South could not have a diamond loser and bid the way he did. (Remember, this was a high-level game.)

It would not have made any sense for declarer to leap from four hearts to six with a hand such as \blacklozenge Kxx \checkmark AKJ10xxx \blacklozenge K \clubsuit KQ. With this hand, or another one like it, South surely would have used Blackwood to find out how many aces his partner had before bidding slam.

It's true that East had to have a lot of faith in his own reasoning to refrain from playing the diamond ace at trick two, but that's what any good player has to have plenty of.



Today in History Today is Thursday, March 21, the 80th day of 2019. There are 285 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On March 21, 2006, the social media website Twitter was established with the sending of the first "tweet" by co-founder Jack Dorsey, who wrote: "just setting up my twttr."

On this date:

dent Al Gore made an emotional return to Congress as he pleaded with House and Senate committees to fight global warming; skeptical Republicans questioned the science behind his climatechange documentary, "An Inconvenient Truth."

Ten years ago: In Oakland, Calif., parolee Lovelle Mixon shot and killed two motorcycle officers, then killed two SWAT team members while holed up in an apartment before he was killed by law enforcement. A busload of activists representing working- and middle-class families paid visits to the lavish Connecticut homes of Amercan International Group ex ecutives to protest the tens of millions of dollars in bonuses awarded by the struggling insurance company after it had received a massive federal bailout. Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khame-(hah-meh-neh-EE') nei dismissed overtures from President Barack Obama, saying Tehran did not see any change in U.S. policy under its new administration. Five years ago: A federal judge ruled that Michigan's ban on gay marriage was unconstitutional, striking down a law widely embraced by voters a decade earlier. (More than 300 same-sex couples in four Michigan counties wed the next day before an appeals court suspended the decision; two Detroit-area nurses are asking the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn the marriage ban.) Character actor James Rebhorn, 65, died in South Orange, New Jersey. One year ago: As a SWAT team moved in on his SUV, Mark Conditt, the suspect in the deadly bombings that had terrorized Austin, Texas for three weeks, used one of his own devices to take his own life. Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg apologized for a "major breach of trust;" the apology came after it was revealed that the data mining firm Cambridge Analytica, whose clients included the Trump campaign, may have used data improperly obtained from Facebook users to try to sway elections. The fourth noreaster in three weeks dumped more than a foot of snow on some parts of

the East Coast.

In 1556, Thomas Cranmer, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, was burned at the stake for heresy.

In 1685, composer Johann Sebastian Bach was born in Eisenach, Germany.

In 1788, fire broke out in New Orleans on Good Friday, destroying 856 out of more than 1,100 structures; one death was reported.

In 1918, during World War I, Germany launched its Spring Offensive on the Western Front, hoping to break through the Allied lines before American reinforcements could arrive. (Although successful at first, the Spring Offensive ultimately failed.)

In 1945, during World War II, Allied bombers began four days of raids over Germany. In 1963, the Alcatraz federal prison island in San Francisco Bay was emptied of its last inmates and closed at the order of Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy.

In 1976, champion skier Vladimir "Spider" Sabich was shot and killed by his girlfriend, actress-singer Claudine Longet, in the home they had shared in Aspen, Colorado; Longet, who maintained the shooting was an accident, served 30 days in jail for negligent homicide.

In 1981, Michael Donald, a black teenager in Mobile, Alabama, was abducted, tortured and killed by members of the Ku Klux Klan. (A lawsuit brought by Donald's mother, Beulah Mae Donald, later resulted in a landmark judg-ment that bankrupted one Klan organization.)

In 1990, Namibia became an independent nation as the former colony marked the end of 75 years of South African rule.

Harden scores 57 but Grizzlies top Rockets 126-125 in OT


MEMPHIS, Tenn. — James Harden did everything he could to bring the Houston Rockets back from a big deficit in the fourth quarter. He got them to overtime, but his 57 points weren't enough.

All because of a last-second free throw.

Mike Conley scored 35 points and Jonas Valanciunas had a career-best 33, including the game-winning free throw with less than a second left as the Memphis Grizzlies outlasted the Houston Rockets 126-125 on Wednesday night.

"We put ourselves in a hole and tried to pick it up, but it was too late," Harden said. "We were down (17), so I had to do something."

Harden led a 17-2 Houston rally in the fourth – scoring 15 points during that stretch — to pull the



Rockets to 106-104. He hit three free throws with 4 seconds remaining to send the game to overtime tied at 115.

Harden scored all 10 points for Houston in overtime and the teams were still tied at 125 when Clint Capela fouled Valanciunas with 0.1 seconds left. Valanciunas, who also had 15 rebounds, made the first of two free throws. The clock ran out after he missed the second foul shot.

Chris Paul had 18 points and seven assists for Houston, which had won three straight. Capela added 14 points and 10 rebounds. The loss was only Houston's second in the last 14 games.

"It was one of those games. Every once in a while it crops up," Rockets coach Mike D'Antoni said. "You've got to go on. It's too bad, but we just kind of threw that away."

Memphis dominated the game through $3\frac{1}{2}$ quarters until the Harden-led comeback. Conley made all six of his shots, including a quartet of 3-pointers, in the first quarter. Valanciunas made all nine of his shots in the first half.

But despite the double-digit lead into the fourth,

Grizzlies had to the weather Harden's 28 points after the third quarter.


"It got crazy there for a little bit," Conley said. "That was a fun game. It's the kind of game you want to be a part of — big plays, big opportunities for everybody. The way it ended was wild.

Conley has scored at least 20 points in six straight games, matching the longest such streak of his career. ... Memphis recorded no blocks for the first time this season.

BAD START

Houston had little answer for the Grizzlies early as Memphis built the lead to 19, making 74 percent of its shots in the first quarter, including going 7 of 11 from outside the arc. "We weren't doing anything," Harden said. "Defensively they were getting what they wanted. Offensively we weren't being aggressive. The fourth quarter and overtime we played well.
