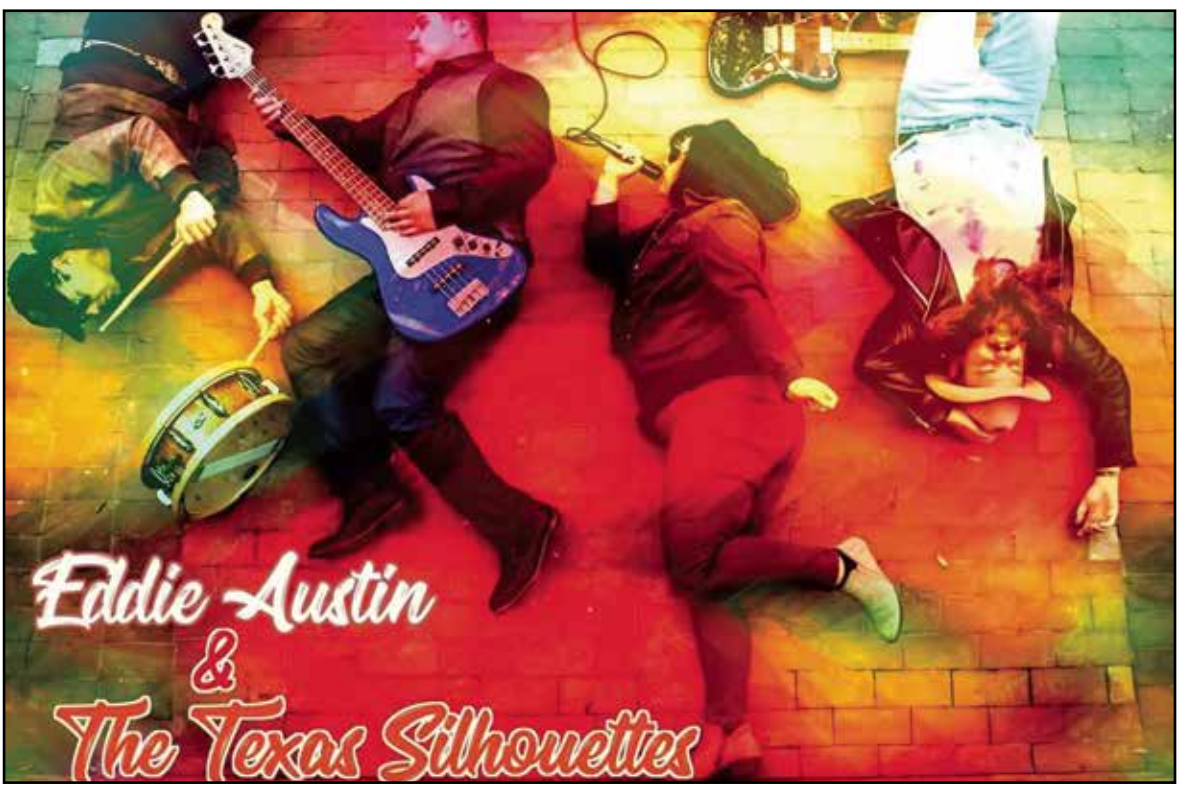

taking the stage.

"We are excited to have another local artist kicking off the 22nd annual Pops in the Park," Pops Chairperson Emily McCann said.

The gates are set to open at 5 p.m. Vendors will be on hand selling food and drink items. Vendors will remain open throughout the night and will be located at the top of the amphitheater.

"We encourage everyone to come out early and get a good spot. Parking can get tight inside the park, and if you are wanting a certain spot the earlier you arrive the better," McCann said. "There isn't a bad spot in the park to watch the fireworks, but we do encourage everyone to watch from the amphitheater where they can see the fireworks, watch the tribute video, enjoy the vendors, and hear the symphony."

Victim Service providing a voice for victims

April is National Sexual Assault Awareness Month

Rise up, stand up and raise awareness is the call Victim Services is issuing for the month of April. April is National Sexual Assault Awareness Month.

"There is a social context that surrounds sexual violence; social norms that promote violence using power over others, unhealthy concepts about masculinity, subjugation of women and silence about violence and abuse contribute to the occurrence of sexual violence," Chavonna Parker, Preventative Education Coordinator for Victim Services, said.

According to statistics, in Texas there are 6.3 million who have experienced some form of sexual assault in their

lifetime. There are two out of five women who have been sexually assaulted and one out of five men.

"We look at these statistics and they are shocking, but what's worse is 91 percent of sexual assault victims do not report the crime to law enforcement," Parker said. "Even sadder, is 90 percent of child victims are assaulted by someone they know."

She continued, "These statistics need to drastically be reduced. This is one crime no one wants to acknowledge and the rapist gets off free."

According to studies, the undetected rapist is a serial hunter and serial offender not the misunderstood drunk guy. There are over 94 percent of rapists roaming free with only three percent ever spending one day in jail.

"On April 1 we will be hanging teal ribbons at the court house, law enforcement center, and Scenic Mountain Medical Center, as well as Victim Services office in recognition of National Sexual Assault Awareness Month," Parker said. "The community can come out and get information on sexual assault, sexting, cyberbullying at the Stand Up Howard County event at SMMC."

Representatives will also be visiting area schools to raise awareness and distribute information about issues teens are having to deal with, sexting and cyberbullying, while handing out bracelets.

"We serve victims of all crime. We do not tell the victim what to do, but we

Kim was born Feb. 19, 1959, in Big Spring, Texas at Malone-Hogan Hospital to Patsy Morton Wade and Jim L. Wade. She passed away unexpectedly in Marana, Arizona on March 20, 2019.

The Marana Mortuary has handled the funeral arrangements of returning Kim to Texas where she will be buried at the Dallas Veteran's Cemetery. A military memorial service honoring Kim's veteran service will be held April 5, 2019, at 11:15 a.m.

Kim graduated from Big Spring High School in 1977. She later relocated to Tucson, Arizona, joining her father there. She enlisted in the Air National Guard in Tucson and served on active duty for 24 years and retired Nov. 1, 2008, receiving an honorable discharge. While in the military she was deployed to Kuwait for three months where she ran in a marathon in 140 degree temperatures and won. She beat the previous male winner and others.

Kim was always the most fit person at all times, during her enlistment. This came from being active physically (running, golfing, bowling, exercising). Kim married Mike Rogers in Tucson on April 7, 1987 and divorced in October 1988. They had two daughters: Shay Rogers Wasson (Chase) and Ken-

zie Rae Rogers (fiance John.)

Upon military retirement she immediately began civil service employment with Tucson VA Medical Center for three years. She then relocated to Marana, Arizona, to an elite retirement resort enjoying activities offered, such as golf, tennis, hiking, swimming, etc. Three years ago she met and married Pierre Guidry, formerly from Louisiana, in Tucson. This was a tumultuous union and on the day of her accidental death, she had plans to end the marriage.

Kim was preceded in death by her grandparents Lunie and R.B. Morton; Inez and Lester Wade. She is survived by her mother Patsy Wade Sharpnack (Joe) of Big Spring and father, Jim Wade of Tucson; two daughters, Shay of Keller, Texas and Kenzie of Tucson; a brother Kirk Wade (Theresa) of Midland, and two grandchildren Cal and Cash Wasson of Keller; nephews Tyler and Kelly Wade of Midland; step-brother, Jim Wade, Jr. of Tucson, Arizona, and many more nieces, nephews and cousins.

She recently had been attending the Catholic church near her home. She was baptized at the First Christian Church in Big Spring, Texas and attended until moving.

Kim was loved by all. She was a very beautiful person through-in and throughout. God allowed one last hug with her mother. May she rest in peace.

guide the victim through the different avenues to achieve the best possible outcome for the victim," she said.

There is a local office for Victim Services and they offer information, emotional support and help find resources and filling out paperwork. The representatives can provide information on

legal rights and protection, walking victims through the criminal justice process helping with safety planning, assisting with shelter and transportation to shelters, and offer confidentiality and emotional support.

"Sexual violence is preventable through collaborations of community members at multiple levels of society: homes, neighborhoods, schools, faith

settings, workplaces and other areas in the community," she said. "We all play a role in preventing sexual violence and establishing norms of respect, safety, equality and helping others."

photos for the military tribute video and encourages the community to submit photos. Photos are being accepted until June 1.

"Fourth of July is about honoring those who served our country and fought for our freedom and this video gives our community an opportunity to give honor and recognize local veterans," she said.

Vendor registration will remain open through June 21. There is limited space on top of the amphitheater so registra-

tion forms need to be turned in as soon as possible.

"Our vendors add an important piece to our event. Pops in the Park is an all day event and our wonderful vendors provide a good selection of food options, but vendor spots are not strictly limited to food," McCann said.

Vendor spots are \$50 for non-profits and \$200 for commercial booth spaces. Those who will be serving food must adhere to city ordinance and have food handler permit, along with other required documentation and station set up.

"In addition to encouraging

everyone to come out early for a good spot, those who are needing handicap parking need to arrive early, as well. We have limited handicap parking and once the park begins to get full, it is harder to get to and may not be available," she said.

Volunteers are still needed. McCann said groups who are looking to get involved and give back to the community are encouraged to sign up and help out during the event.

"We can use people taking donations at the entrances, passing out fans, picking up trash and helping with crowd control and direction," she said.

"There is always somewhere and somehow people can help support this event."

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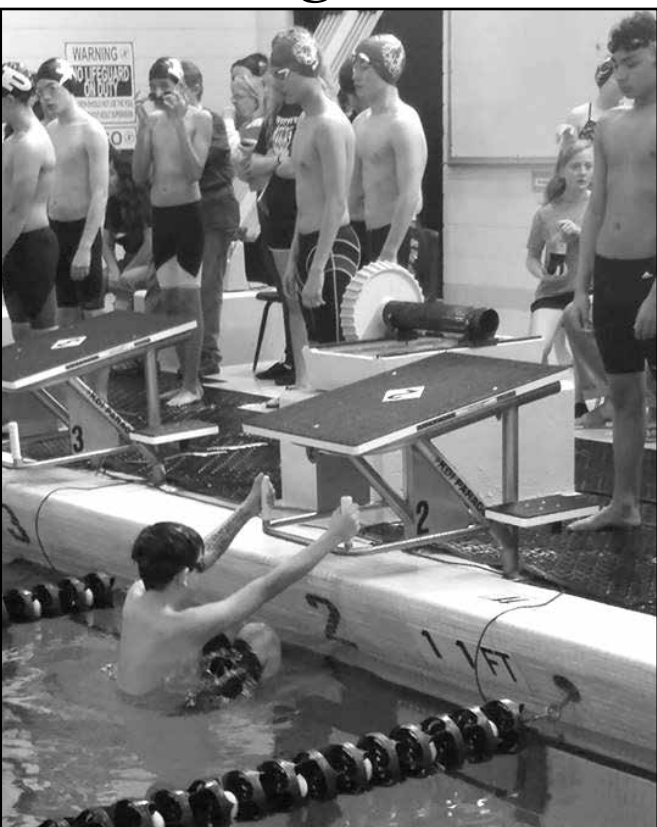

Mr. Choate attended the event with his wife, Fifi, father and mother, Carroll and Joyce Choate, family and friends.

Craig Ferguson, a member of the Coahoma ISD school board of trustees, presented Mr. Choate with a plaque in front of a small crowd who gathered for the morning ceremony in the boardroom. The plaque along with a list of Mr. Choate's accomplishments, during his football career and a Coahoma

High School jersey with his old number 44 will be on permanent display at the district.

After a successful run as a Coahoma Bulldog where he was a two-way starter, Mr. Choate went on to have an outstanding career at SMU and was signed to the Atlanta Falcons and later the Green Bay Packers. He also played three years in the USFL for the Denver Gold and San Antonio Gun-slingers. He was just one of three players in the USFL history to play in all 54 regular season games before the league folded in 1986.

Mr. Choate will be inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame on May 4, 2019, at Baylor University's Ferrell Center in Waco.

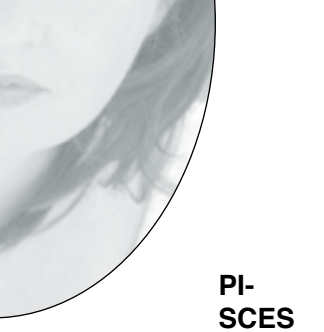

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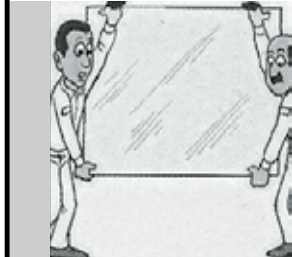
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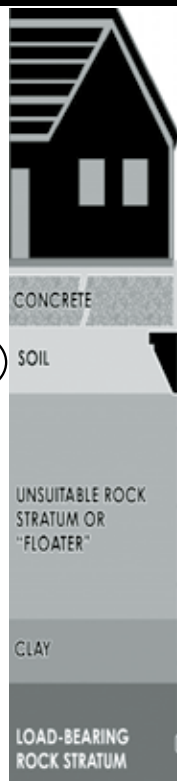
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Annie's Mailbox®

Contract Bridge

Opening lead — four of hearts.

Assume you're defending against three notrump with the East hand after the bidding shown. Partner leads the four of hearts, and South takes your jack with the king. Declarer leads the ten of spades and finesses, losing to your queen. What would you do now?

When the deal occurred, East returned a heart at trick three, and South was home free. He won with

dummy's queen, crossed to the ace of clubs and tried another spade finesse. This lost to the king, but declarer then had three spades, three clubs and three hearts for nine tricks.

In failing to find the winning defense, East fell victim to the "return your partner's lead" syndrome. While this is normally a good practice, East should have relegated it to the scrapheap in this deal.

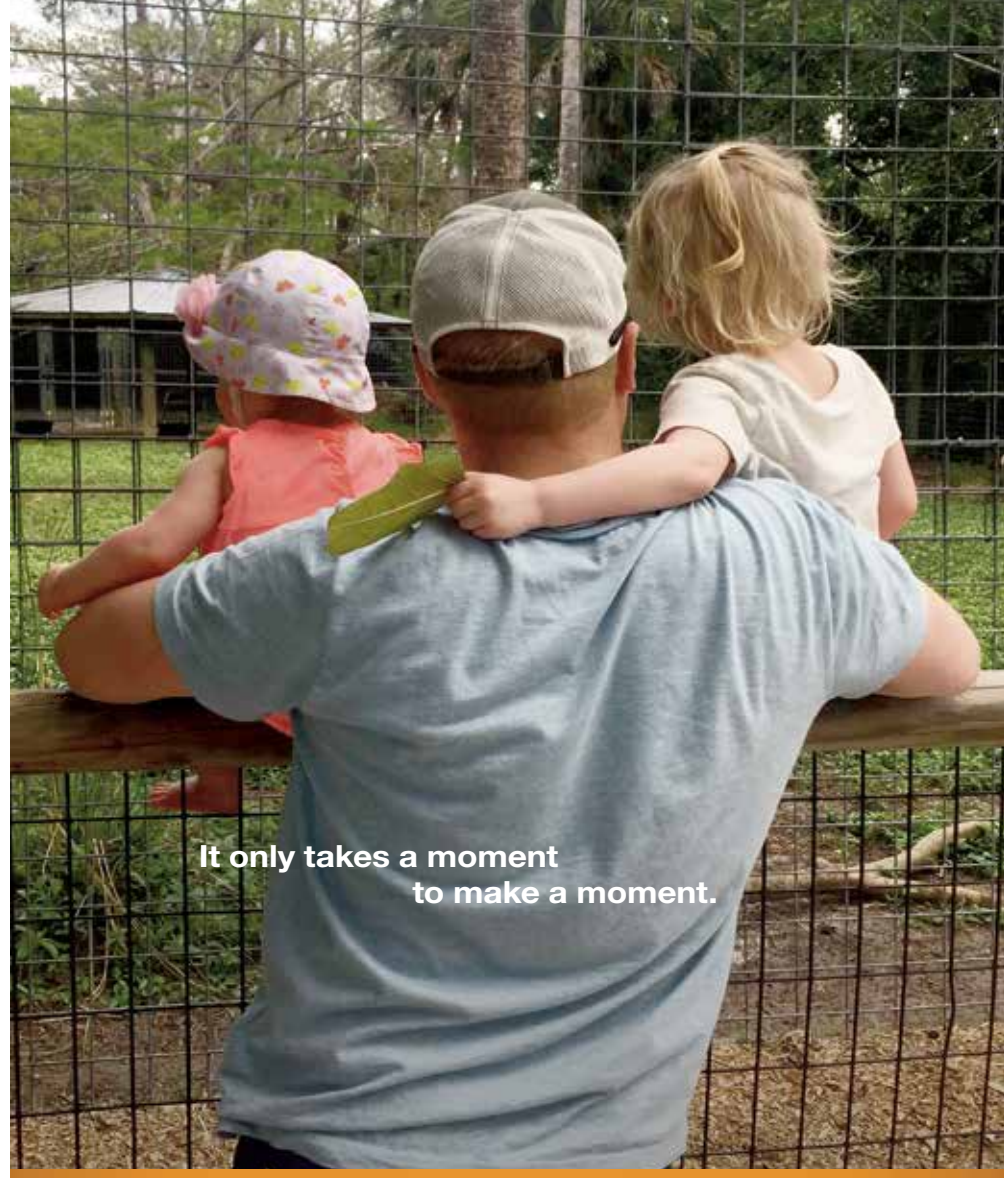
In view of South's opening bid, it was impossible for West to hold the ace of hearts. East could see a total of 26 high-card points between his own hand and dummy, leaving only 14 for his partner and declarer. West could thus hold at most one or two points.

East's best chance to defeat the contract, therefore, was to try to establish three tricks in his own strong suit, diamonds, before South could score nine tricks. All this required was that West hold the jack of diamonds, which was certainly possible on the bidding.

If East had shifted to the five of diamonds at trick three, declarer would have been a dead duck. After taking West's jack with dummy's king, South would not have been able to come to nine tricks before the defense scored five, and he would have finished down one.

Tomorrow: South eats humble pie.

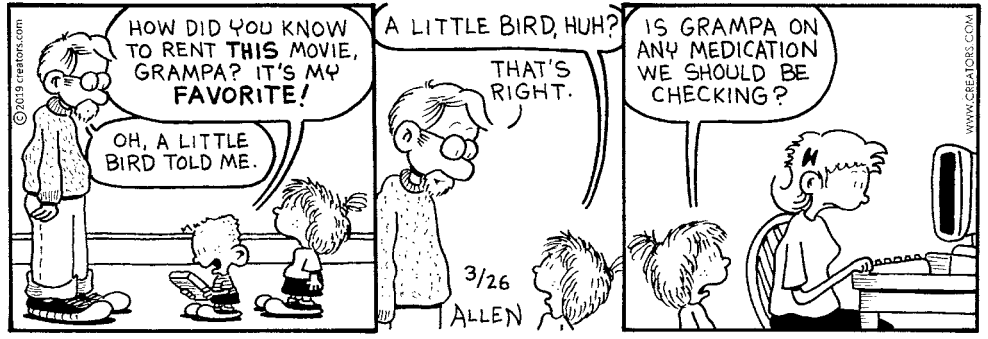
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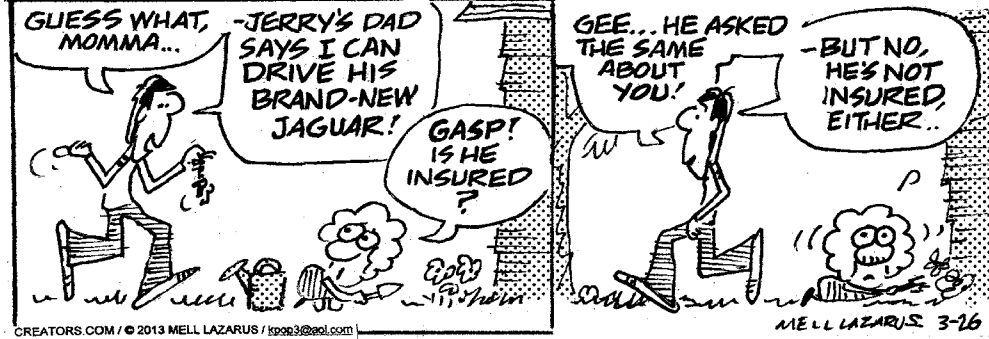

This Date In History

Today In History
Today is Tuesday, March 26, the 85th day of 2019. There are 280 days left in the year.
Today's Highlight in History:
On March 26, 1979, a peace treaty was signed by Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin (men-AH'-kem BAY'-gihn) and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and witnessed by President Jimmy Carter at the White House.
On this date:
In 1812, an earthquake devastated Caracas, Venezuela, causing an estimated 26,000 deaths, according to the U.S. Geological Survey.
In 1827, composer Ludwig van Beethoven died in Vienna.
In 1934, Britain enacted a Road Traffic Act reimposing a 30 mile-per-hour speed limit in "built-up areas" and requiring driving tests for new motorists.
In 1945, during World War II, Iwo Jima was fully secured by U.S. forces following a final, desperate attack by Japanese soldiers. Former British Prime Minister David Lloyd George, 82, died in Ty Newydd, Llanystumdwy, Wales.
In 1962, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Baker v. Carr, gave federal courts the power to order reapportionment of states' legislative districts.
In 1967, Pope Paul VI issued an encyclical, "Populorum Progressio," on "the progressive development of peoples," in which he expressed concern for those trying to escape hunger, poverty, endemic disease and ignorance.
In 1988, Jesse Jackson stunned fellow Democrats by soundly defeating Michael S. Dukakis in Michigan's Democratic presidential caucuses.
In 1989, the science-fiction TV series "Quantum Leap," starring Scott Bakula as an errant time-traveler, premiered on NBC.
In 1992, a judge in Indianapolis sentenced former heavyweight boxing champion Mike Tyson to six years in prison for raping a Miss Black America contestant. (Tyson ended up serving three years.)
In 1997, the bodies of 39 members of the Heaven's Gate techno-religious cult who committed suicide were found inside a rented mansion in Rancho Santa Fe, California.
In 2005, German Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger stood in for Pope John Paul II during the Easter Vigil Mass at the Vatican. (Ratzinger later succeeded John Paul, becoming Pope Benedict XVI.)
In 2013, Italy's top criminal court overturned the acquit-
tal of American Amanda Knox in the grisly murder of British roommate Meredith Kercher and ordered Knox to stand trial again. (Although convicted in absentia, Knox was exonerated by the Italian Supreme Court in 2015.)
Ten years ago: President Barack Obama held an unprecedented Internet town hall from the White House as he made a direct sales pitch for his \$3.6 trillion budget. A 23,000-ton Norwegian-owned vessel with a crew of 27 was hijacked by pirates off the Somali coastline. (The Bow Asir was released two weeks later.) A Soyuz capsule carrying a Russian-American crew and U.S. billionaire space tourist Charles Simonyi blasted off for the international space station. All-Star shortstop Miguel Tejada received a sentence of a year's probation for misleading Congress about an ex-teammate's use of performance-enhancing drugs.
Five years ago: Osama bin Laden's son-in-law, Sulaiman Abu Ghayth (SOO'-lay-mahn AH'-boo gayth), was convicted in New York for his role as al-Qaida's fiery chief spokesman after 9/11. (He was later sentenced to life in prison.)
One year ago: The Commerce Department said the 2020 U.S. Census would include a question about citizenship status; opponents said the question would discourage immigrants from responding to the census. (The Supreme Court will hear arguments next month on a challenge to the citizenship question.) A toxicology report obtained by The Associated Press revealed that the late pop music superstar Prince had levels of fentanyl in his body that multiple experts described as "exceedingly high." Two women and their six adopted children were killed when one of the women drove their SUV off a cliff into the ocean about 150 miles north of San Francisco; authorities said Jennifer Hart was drunk when she intentionally drove the vehicle over the cliff.
