City to seek declaratory judgement on term limits

Big Spring City Council members voted unanimously at their meeting Tuesday evening to seek a declaratory judgement clarifying the implications of the city's term limit policy. The issue reportedly arose

when Raul Benavides considered running for Big Spring Mayor after reaching his term limit as District 5 councilman. Benavides has since decided not to run for the position.

Article I, Sec. 3a of the Big Spring City Charter deals with term limits for city officials, and is an amendment

added to the Charter in 2011.

"No member of the council may run for election to the same council position more than two (2) consecutive times," the sections says. "No person may be appointed or elected to the council in a general election or in a special election as provided by Section 2 of this article within two (2) full terms of having previously held a council po-

sition." The goal of the council's vote, conducted following a closed executive session during the meeting, is to have a judge clarify whether the sentence "No member of the

Pints for Polio brings in record total

The fourth annual Pints for Polio is in the books, and by the look of things, this year's Greater Big Spring Rotary Club fundraiser has pulled in more money than any of the previous three events.

"We had 400-plus attendees. If we hadn't been competing with a major wedding, I think we would have had closer to 500," said GBSRC member and event organizer Barney Dodd. "Our first year out in the street was a huge success. The weather cooperated and the band was great. We've had nothing but rave reviews about the whole event in its entirety.

Dodd wasn't ready to give final totals, but an email to Rotary Club members from club president George Bancroft said the event brought in more than \$40,000 - compared to last year's \$33,000. Dodd did confirm that this year's event surpassed previous event's totals.

"Last year we raised \$33,000; this year we did much better than that,"

The event's live and silent auctions were a big part of the fundraising mix.

"In the live auction itself, we did \$12,000...," Dodd said. "A big thank you to Cash Berry, the auctioneer. He is a heck of a salesman too, when he does it. He came out and did that on his

own. He didn't have to do it. He came out and did it just because he wants to help the community. We had six jerseys of Cowboy Hall of Famers, we had a football signed by Jerry Jones and Jimmy Johnson, which was a big deal. My friend Chef Kenneth Winchester auctioned himself off, and we had a helmet signed by Michael Irvin, Troy Aikman, and Emmitt Smith. Those items together went for \$12,000. Then, we had other silent auction items."

Money from the event is split 50-50 with half going to Rotary International's fundraising efforts to eradicate polio; and the other half staying local to

council may run for election to the same council position more than two consecutive times" allows a council member to run for a different position on the city council – either for mayor or as council representative for a different district.

In other business, the council discussed changes to the city's Nationwide Retirement Plan.

Nationwide is changing the Guaranteed Minimum Interest Rate on April 1 on fixed-income accounts from 3.5 percent, and offered the city four options about how the change would play out.

"For the past 15 years or so, the floor has been 3 and a half percent," said Jim Hammock of Nationwide. "The company thought that interest rates would eventually come back up we're talking, bank savings accounts – which they didn't. So the company doesn't find it viable to have the floor at 3 and a half percent. Most all other providers changed theirs years ago, and Nationwide is changing theirs this year."

The option chosen by the council says that Nationwide will continue to offer the fixed contract with an initial crediting rate of 1.2 percent, and a 0.5 percent GMIR.

According to Assistant City Manager John Medina, the city's retirement plan allows city employees to withhold and invest in one of several different options 6.7 percent of their paychecks. That amount is then matched by an additional 5.51 percent by the city.

"That's from Day 1," Medina said.

"They take that with them when they leave, both their own money and the city's match."

The council also:

- Voted 4-3, with Councilmen Doug Hartman, Raul Benavides, and Jim DePauw dissenting, to update the city's Cemetery, Parks and Recreation code to implement a measure voted on at the previous council meeting. The new measure allows senior citizens who pay annual limited-play greens fees to play on holidays which occur on weekdays.
- Spring Economic Development Corporation Audit and the City of Big Spring Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 2018. Both reports showed strong financial positions for the respective entity. · Approved donation of retired res-

- cue tools to Wingate Volunteer Fire Department. Discussion regarding the donation revealed that the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department would not benefit from the item, because they do not currently perform rescue operations which would require its use.
- Approved a measure allowing Howard County residents who live outside city limits to fill up to two positions on the seven-member Parks and Recreation Commission.
- · Approved minor grammar changes to the city's Investment Policy.
- Approved an agreement with Howard College to let the South West Collegiate Institute for the Deaf to use a parcel of city land adjacent to SWCID for an "Adventure Club."

contribute to GBSRC projects around Big Spring and Howard County. "As far as local projects, we just recently put the

blue reflectors on all the fire hydrants in town. It's a big deal so the firemen can see them at night. Their lights will hit them and they can see where they are. GREENWOOD - The Lady Steers showed their firepower at the dish once again on Tuesday evening in Greenwood. Big Spring put up double digit hits and runs for the fourth consecutive game as they improved their district record to 4-0 with an 18-7 beatdown of the Rangerettes on the road. The Lady Steers had 10 hits in the game and despite giving up 9 hits to Greenwood, Big Spring turned those hits into runs at a higher clip than the Rangerettes.

Big Spring started scoring right out of the gate and put up 5 runs in the top of the first. The Lady Steers scored their first run on a walk with

the bases loaded and then scored again on an error by the shortstop on a K. Whitehead grounder. On the very next at bat Belle Ramirez made Greenwood pay. With the bases loaded Ramirez hit a hard liner to the opposite field that made it all the way to the wall for a 3 run RBI triple to give Big Spring an early 5-0 advantage. The Rangerettes answered in the bottom of the first and scored three runs of their own as they tried to fight their way back into the game. However, the Lady Steers stiffened on defense and got out of the first still leading 5-3.

In the middle innings, Big Spring allowed just one run until the bottom of the sixth while they continued to score multiple runs in every inning

except the fifth where they only got one runner across the plate. Greenwoods' 6 errors and 13 walks really made it tough for them to stay with the Lady Steers' high powered offense. Big Spring scored 7 unearned runs in the game and really took advantage of the lack of control from the rubber by the Rangerettes.

Belle Ramirez really showed up big at the plate for the Lady Steers. Ramirez drove in 4 runs on 2 hits in the game and really put the pressure on the Greenwood pitching and defense throughout the contest. Along with Ramirez, Jocelyn Gonzales and Maddie Daniels also had multiple hits on the day with two a piece as well. Big Spring ran the bases well in the win as well, the Lady Steers stole 6 bags in the game with Amber Martinez and Alexis Star leading the way with 2 each.

Daniels got the start and the win on the rubber for Big Spring. Daniels pitched six innings, allowed 4 runs on 6 hits and struck out six in the victory. Jaylene Valenzuela started off in the circle for Greenwood. Valenzuela pitched one and a third innings, allowed 7 run on just 1 hit and walked 7. Karlie Savage pitched 4 innings in relief and took the loss. Saveage allowed 11 runs on 8 hits and walked 5 Lady Steers in the defeat.

The Lady Steers improved to 4-0 in district with the big win and took their overall record to 11-2. Big Spring will travel to Snyder on Friday looking to remain unbeaten in their quest for their second straight district title.

Steers come up short in tough late game 7-6 loss to Greenwood

GREENWOOD - The Steers started off slow but found their timing at the plate late to make it a close game against Greenwood Tuesday night. Big Spring only managed 4 hits in the game compared to 8 for the Rangers. Despite only getting 4 hits in the game the Steers made hard contact in many more at bats and caused Greenwood to commit 8 errors in the field. Big Spring almost came away with a late inning comeback win but came up just short and fell to the Rangers 7-6 to drop to 1-1 in district play.

Greenwood jumped out to an early lead with three runs in the bottom of the first and would hold that lead till the top of the fifth inning. The Rangers got the scoring started on a 2 run homer by B. Lundgren then got another run on an error by the Steers. Big Spring couldn't get anything going offensively in the first two innings and really struggled to find their timing at the plate.

In the top of the third inning, the Steers finally created some offense. Big Spring scored 2 runs in the top of the inning on a 2 run RBI single by Bryson VanVleet after back-to-back walks of Elijah Munoz and Jason Miramontes to cut the Rangers lead to 3-2. Big Spring then held Greenwood scoreless in the bottom of the inning but once again got nothing going in the top of the fourth.

In the bottom of the fourth the Rangers scored 3 more runs and forced Big Spring to make a pitching change. With Elijah Munoz on the mound the Steers were able to get out of the inning but did so trailing 6-2. Big Spring answered in the top of the fifth as they finally got some rhythm at the dish and started making Greenwood pay for their fielding mistakes. The Steers scored 4 runs in the top of the fifth inning, all of them coming off errors by the Rangers. The first run of the inning came on an Anthony Sarmiento grounder to second that was mishandled and allowed Bryson VanVleet to score and cut the lead to 6-3. Then Kyler Seymore hit another grounder to second and again it was mishandled which led to Sarmiento crossing home plate as well and cut the lead to 6-4. With momentum building the Steers capitalized, Elijah Munoz hit a hard grounder to the shortstop who once again couldn't handle the ball allowing Josh Miramontes, who hit a double earlier in the inning, to score and cut the lead to 6-5. Michael Munoz continued the streak with a hard liner to right field that was dropped and gave Seymore a free run home to tie the game at 6-6 heading into the bottom of the fifth.

In the bottom of the sixth, despite playing great defense all night, it was an error that cost the Steers a run and put them back behind 7-6 with just one more at bat left. Needing to score to keep the game going, Big Spring just couldn't get a hit in the top of the seventh and fell in heartbreaking fashion 7-6 after such an impressive comeback to tie the game in the fifth.

With the loss Big Spring fell to 1-1 in district play. The Steers will travel to Snyder this Friday looking to get things back on track and get back on the winning side of the district.







Today is Wednesday, March 27, the 86th day of 2019. There are 279 days left in the

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 27, 1977, in aviation's worst disaster, 583 people were killed when a KLM Boeing 747, attempting to take off in heavy fog, crashed into a Pan Am 747 on an airport runway on the Canary Island of Tenerife (ten-uh-REEF').

On this date: In 1513, Spanish explorer

Juan Ponce de Leon (hwahn pahns duh LEE'-ohn) sighted present-day Florida. In 1625, Charles I acceded to

the English throne upon the death of James I.

In 1933, Japan officially withdrew from the League of Na-

In 1942, during World War II, Congress granted American servicemen free first-

class mailing privileges. In 1958, Nikita Khrushchev became Soviet premier in addition to First Secretary of the Communist Party.

In 1964, Alaska was hit by a magnitude 9.2 earthquake (the strongest on record in North America) and tsunamis that together claimed about 130 lives.

In 1968, Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin (gah-GAH'-rihn), the first man to orbit the Earth in 1961, died when his MiG-15 jet crashed during a routine training flight near Moscow; he was 34.

In 1975, construction began on the Trans-Alaska Pipeline, which was completed two years later.

In 1980, 123 workers died when a North Sea floating oil field platform, the Alexander Kielland, capsized during a

In 1995, "Forrest Gump" won six Academy Awards, including best picture and a second consecutive best actor Oscar for Tom Hanks; Jessica Lange won best actress for "Blue Sky."

In 2006, Al-Qaida conspirator Zacarias Moussaoui (zakuh-REE'-uhs moo-SOW'-ee) testified at his federal trial that he was supposed to hijack a fifth airplane on Sept. 11, 2001, and fly it into the White House.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama launched a fresh effort to defeat al-Qaida terrorists in both Pakistan and Afghanistan, ordering in 4,000 more troops. A suicide bomber set off an explosion at a packed mosque in Pakistan near the Afghan border, killing at least 48 people. The rising Red River broke a 112year record and threatened the dikes fortifying Fargo, N.D. The main suspect in the Phoenix serial shooter attacks, Dale Hausner, was sentenced to death for six murders that had put the city on edge for nearly two years. (Hausner committed suicide in an isolation cell in June Five years ago: Face to face at

the Vatican for the first time, President Barack Obama and Pope Francis focused on their mutual respect and shared concern for the poor. The U.S. Air Force took the extraordinary step of firing nine midlevel nuclear commanders and announcing it would discipline dozens of junior officers at a nuclear missile base, responding firmly to an exam-cheating scandal. A judge in Missoula, Montana, sentenced Jordan Graham to more than 30 years in prison for killing Cody Johnson, her husband of eight days, by pushing him from a cliff in Glacier National Park. James Schlesinger, 85, who'd held a long string of Cabinet and other high-level positions in three U.S. administrations,

died in Baltimore. One year ago: Retired Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens, in an essay on The New York Times website, called for the repeal of the Second Amendment to allow for significant gun control legislation. The coowner of a Kansas water park and a ride designer were charged with reckless second-degree murder in the decapitation of a 10-year-old boy on the ride in 2016. (A judge dismissed the charges last month, finding that state



Bledsoe scores 23 to lead Bucks past Rockets, 108-94

MILWAUKEE — Eric Bledsoe stole the show in a marquee matchup between the Milwaukee Bucks and Houston Rockets on Tuesday night.

With top-billing going to MVP front-runners Giannis Antetokounmpo and James Harden, the feisty Bucks' guard turned in one his best allaround performances of the season as the Bucks pulled away for a 108-94 victory on Tuesday night.

Bledsoe poured in 23 points, including 16 in a decisive third quarter, and tightly guarded Harden for most of the game.

"I just try to play to my strengths," Bledsoe said. Bucks coach Mike Budenholzer praised Bledsoe's all-around performance.

"To do what he did on both ends of the court, pretty special," Budenholzer said. "I think he loves that challenge. I think he's an incredible defender."

Antetokounmpo had 19 points and 14 rebounds for Milwaukee, which improved to an NBA-best 56-

Harden scored 23 points and Chris Paul had 19 for Houston, which lost for just the third time in 17 games. Harden shot just 9 of 26, including 1 for 9 from 3-point range with Bledsoe closely guarding him throughout most of the game.

"We had our open shots. We couldn't know them down," Harden said. "We competed but they went on a run in that third quarter and that was it."

After a tightly contested first half, the Bucks grabbed control in the third, sparked by Bledsoe's clutch shooting. Leading by five at halftime, Milwaukee built a 19-point lead in the third. Bledsoe went 4 of 5 on 3-pointers in the period after missing his only two attempts in the first half. His thirdquarter output, which included a single-handed 11-0 run, nearly matched the 18 points scored by

"Everybody got energy out of that and we played

even harder," Antetokounmpo said.

Milwaukee held the Rockets at bay for most of the final quarter, maintaining a double-digit lead

throughout before clearing the bench with about a minute left.

The Rockets jumped out early, building a 10-point first-quarter lead without Harden doing the bulk of the scoring. Danuel House Jr. paced Houston with nine points in the period, making all three of his 3-point attempts. The Bucks struggled in the opening period, shooting just 8 of 25, including 3 for 13 from deep. Khris Middleton missed all six of his shots in the first quarter.

Milwaukee fought back in the second and eventually grabbed the lead. A key sequence came midway through the quarter when, after a basket by Ersan Ilyasova, Bledsoe stole the inbounds pass, scored and then stood face-to-face with Harden under the basket as the crowd roared.

The Bucks led 58-53 at the break, paced by Antetokounmpo's 13 points and eight rebounds.

Houston coach Mike D'Antoni blamed an uncharacteristic rash of turnovers in the second quarter for allowing the Bucks to grab the lead.

"We got sloppy," D'Antoni said. "We turned the ball over four times in transition, errant passes that they capitalized on."

INJURY BUG

The Bucks have been beset with injuries that have altered their lineup. When starting guard Malcolm Brogdon went down with a partial plantar fascia tear earlier this month, Budenholzer replaced him with Nikola Mirotic, who then injured his left thumb and likely is sidelined for the rest of the regular season. Tony Snell, who stepped in for Mirotic, is out with a sprained ankle. Sterling Brown, who sat out 13 games with right wrist soreness before returning to the lineup last week, started against the Rockets. And now, rookie Donte DiVincenzo is expected to miss the rest of the regular season and playoffs due to heel bursitis that has forced him to miss 28 games. DiVincenzo, the 17th overall pick in the draft, is expected to get an injection to address the problem.
