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Finances to top county commissioner meeting

Howard County commissioners will consider invoices from the Harris Corporation and consider selecting an outside auditor for the 2019 fiscal year at this week's regular meeting. The meeting will take place at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, in the third-floor courtroom at the Howard County Courthouse.

Harris Corporation is providing the radios for the joint City/County radio system the two entities have been working on for several months.

At the commissioners' previous meeting March 20, the county leaders voted to table action on authorizing payment of the invoices because the radios were in the process of being shipped, and had not yet been received locally.

In other business, commissioners plan to:

• Consider approval of invoices, purchase requests, and budget amendments;

• Discuss and consider action on approval of payroll,

Plane crash claims life of Big Spring resident

A single-engine Cirrus SR22 crashed Sunday afternoon, in New Mexico claiming the life of a Big Spring resident.

According to an FAA spokesman, the aircraft was reported missing about 3:15 p.m. Mountain Time, after disapperaing from air traffic radar. At the time of disappearance, the plane showed to be about 50 miles south of Farmington, NM. The aircraft's intended destination was Big Spring.

When the wreckage was discovered, Sunday evening, it

was determined the aircraft was occupied by a single passanger, the pilot, who has since been identified as Marvin Casey. He was pronounced deceased on scene by the Office of Medical Investigator.

According to the Public Information Officer for the New Mexico State Police, and a KOAT reporter, the cause of the accident is still under investigation.

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

Full reopening of Houston Ship Channel unclear after fire

HOUSTON (AP) – The U.S. Coast Guard says it's unclear when the Houston Ship Channel will fully reopen as crews continue cleaning up chemicals that seeped into one of America's busiest shipping lanes following a fire at a petrochemical storage facility.

Coast Guard Capt. Rich Howes said Monday that cleanup crews are making headway and that more than 2.5 million gallons of an oily water mixture has been removed.

Part of the ship channel was closed after a fire erupted March 17 at the Intercontinental Terminals Company facility in Deer Park. The fire burned for days and triggered air quality warnings. The closed portion was reopened but only during daylight hours.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says elevated benzene levels were detected over the weekend, but that residents are not in danger.

Mexican police break up 3 wildcat blockades at border plants

MEXICO CITY (AP) -Police in northern Mexico have broken up three wildcat picket lines at assembly plants in the border city of Matamoros, across from Brownsville, Texas.

The government of the northern state of Tamaulipas said Sunday there were no registered strikes at the three plants and that some employees had asked for the blockades to be lifted.

Strikes broke out in January after President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador decreed the doubling of minimum wages in border areas, apparently unaware that Matamoros plants had contracts that indexed salaries to the minimum wage.

After winning 20-percent wage increases at 48 plants, flying squads of workers fanned out to other plants to seek the same increases, though those plants didn't have the same contracts.

Picket lines continue at the local Coca-Cola bottling plant in Matamoros.

Hawks drop 3 of 4 in a conference series against Midland College

MIDLAND - The Hawks jumped out with a huge win to start the four game series against the Midland College Chaparrals, but then Howard College dropped the next three games, losing each of the three by 2 runs or less. Despite doubling the hits of the Chaps 48 to 24 and outscoring Midland 45 to 28 in the series, the Hawks couldn't get the key runs when they needed them and slipped behind the Chaparrals in the standings by losing 3 of the 4 games moving their record to 11-5 in conference play while Midland moved to 13-3.

In the first game of the series on Friday, Howard College blew out the Chaparrals 22-1 and outhit Midland College 16-1. The Hawks dominated the game in every aspect from the very beginning and really put the game away for good with a 12 run top of the fourth. Diego Ramirez, Lance Russell, Trace Bucey, Seth Ochoa and Ben McClain all drove in runs in the big inning for Howard College.

John Carlos Ariza got the win for the Hawks on the bump. Ariza allowed just 1 hit and 1 run over five innings and struck out three. Dawson Merryman was on the rubber for Midland College. Merryman pitched

three innings, gave up 8 runs on 7 hits and struck out 1 in the loss. Five other Chaparrals pitched in relief during the game as well, but none of them had an answer for the big bats of the Hawks.


With 16 hits in the game, there were multiple players for Howard College with more than one hit. Ramirez, Jodway, Russell, Coria, and Galvan each collected 2 or more hits in the game and Ramirez led the way going 3 for 5 at the dish. The Hawks went deep twice in the game. Jacob Martinez sent the first one over the fence in the fifth followed by a long shot by Blake Thistlethwaite later in that same inning. With great pitching and big time production at the plate, the Hawks made short work of the Chaps in game one.

In the second game of the series, it was a shootout. Both teams were seeing the ball well at the plate and neither pitcher could really take control of the game. A five run inning in the bottom of the eighth really derailed the Hawks as they dropped the game 11-10 even though the outhit the Chaps 16 to 9 in the game.

Howard College led the entire game until the bottom of the eighth when the wheels came off and Midland tied the game at 10 all with a huge 5 run rally. Then in the bottom of the ninth



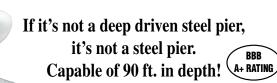

Learning a Language

Dear Annie: I love learning languages. I grew up with immigrant parents who spoke their native language to me, and I studied another language in high school. I'm also a native English speaker. I wouldn't say I'm trilingual, but I can get by in those two languages I've learned aside from English.

The thing is that learning those languages was easier than it is to learn languages now that I'm out of school. I learned my parents' language as a child, when the human brain's plasticity is at its maximum and learning new languages is easiest. And the other language

I learned while in school; I essentially didn't have a choice but to show up to class and learn the language.

Now learning a new language requires self-discipline. No outside force is going to help me learn another language. I'm not sure I have the discipline, but I really would like to learn another language or two. Any tips? -- Lazy Linguist

Dear Lazy Linguist: School is always in session on the internet. And in many cases, tuition is free. Check out the website Duolingo, and visit your local library to see whether it has a Rosetta Stone subscription. Software solutions aside, one of the best ways to practice and learn a new language is simply to speak with people in it. Once you've gotten on track learning the basics of a new language, check out Meetup to find a group in your area that speaks in that language.

It's wise of you to take such an interest in learning new languages, as it can be a big boost to your brain. **Researchers at Penn** State University found that bilingual people are better at multitasking, and researchers at the University of Chicago found that bilingual people tend to make better, more rational decisions when speaking in their nonnative tongue, presumably

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to think in a more deliberate way. Though you're already nearly trilingual, it stands to reason that you could reap more of these benefits with each new language you learn. And though it might be more challenging to pick up a new language as an adult than as a child, it's by no means impossible. See the article titled "A critical period for second language acquisition," published last year in the journal Cognition, if you'd like to read more about that.

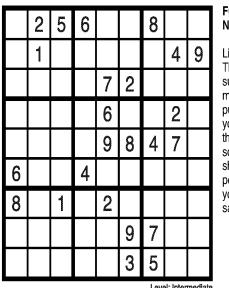

erupted in the Confederate capital as a mob outraged over food shortages and rising prices attacked and looted stores. In 1865, Confederate President Jefferson Davis and most of his Cabinet fled the Confederate capital of Richmond, Virginia, because of advancing Union forces.

In 1912, the just-completed RMS Titanic left Belfast to begin its sea trials eight days before the start of its ill-fated maiden voyage.

In 1917, President Woodrow Wilson asked Congress to declare war against Germany, saying, "The world must be made safe for democracy." (Congress declared war four days later.) In 1956, the soap operas "As the World Turns" and "The Edge of Night" premiered on CBS-TV. In 1958, the term "beatnik" was coined by San Francisco Chronicle columnist Herb Caen to refer to members of the pre-hippie counterculture; the term was inspired by the "Beat Generation" and by the Soviet launch of its second Sputnik spacecraft.

In 1968, "2001: A Space Odyssey," the groundbreaking science-fiction film epic produced and directed by Stanley Kubrick and starring Keir Dullea and Gary Lockwood, had its world premiere in Washington, D.C. In 1982, several thousand troops from Argentina seized the disputed Falkland Islands, located in the south Atlantic, from Britain. (Britain seized the islands back the following June.)

In 1986, four American passengers, including an 8-month-old girl, her mother and grandmother, were killed when a terrorist bomb exploded aboard a TWA jetliner en route from Rome to Athens, Greece. In 1992, mob boss John Gotti was convicted in New York of murder and racketeering; he was later sentenced to life, and died in prison.

In 2003, during the Iraq War,

Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich (blah-GOY'-uh-vich); the ousted Democrat denied doing anything illegal.

Five years ago: The Supreme Court's conservative majority voted 5-4 to free wealthy individuals to donate to as many political candidates and campaigns as they wanted, further loosening the reins on giving by big contributors. At Fort Hood in Texas, three soldiers were killed and 16 others were wounded in a shooting rampage by another soldier, Army Spc. Ivan A. Lopez, who then killed himself.

One year ago: Anti-apartheid activist Winnie Madikizela-Mandela who'd been married for nearly 38 years to Nelson Mandela, died in a Johannesburg hospital at the age of 81. Thousands of Oklahoma teachers began two weeks of walkouts and descended on the state Capitol to demand more education funding. Thousands of Kentucky teachers marched to the state Capitol to protest changes to their pension system; some districts that were not on spring break had to cancel classes. China raised import duties on \$3 billion in U.S. products in an escalating dispute over trade and industrial policy. UConn, Notre Dame, Baylor and Oregon reach Final Four

NEW YORK (AP) – Geno Auriemma and his UConn Huskies will face a familiar foe in Notre Dame on the game's grandest stage.

The two teams, who have had the best rivalry in the sport over the past decade, will square off on Friday night in the Final Four.

It's the second consecutive year that they will play in the national semifinals. The Irish won a thriller last year, topping UConn in overtime on a last-second shot by Arike Ogunbowale.

She hit a similar shot two nights later at the buzzer to help Notre Dame win its first national championship since 2001, capping off one of the greatest Final Fours in NCAA history.

"Well, last year's game was a great finish, so I wouldn't mind seeing that again. But they're a great team," Notre Dame coach Muffet McGraw said. "They played really well against Louisville in the final yesterday. They're a team that has so many weapons. Katie Lou (Saumelson) looks like she's back in good form. Napheesa (Collier) has had a fabulous year. (Crystal) Dangerfield is a great defender, and she can score, as well. They have a lot of weapons. And similar to us, they don't have a very deep bench, so I think there's a lot of similarities between the teams.

"Going back to the first game, we really lost our composure in that game, so hopefully we've learned a lot of lessons since then."

UConn and Notre Dame have played six times in the Final Four or national championship game since 2011. They have split the six meetings with the Irish going 3-1 in the semifinals. Baylor will play Oregon in the first game of the Final Four.

The Huskies continued their remarkable record run, making the Final Four for the 12th consecutive year. Auriemma was at a loss for how his team has been able to reach the national semifinals every year.

"I don't think it's supposed to happen." Auriemma said of the incredible run. "Not in today's world the way things change and teams keep getting better and better. It's not normal. It's something that's hard to describe because even if you're writing a book and making it up, people would say it doesn't happen in real life. It has happened in real life, I'm still boggled, my mind doesn't get how it can happen this many years in a row with a different cast of characters that change so often. No it's not normal, it's not normal."

This one was a little different as UConn was a No. 2 seed for the first time since 2006. There is less pressure on the Huskies who have lost in the semifinals the past two seasons. UConn was undefeated the past two years heading into the final weekend of the season and lost both times on last-second shots. This season UConn has lost twice — to Bavlor and Louisville.

Notre Dame was the team that came into the season with the pressure, returning most of the nation-

al championship team and adding Brianna Turner, who missed last year with an injury. The Irish lost to the Huskies by a shocking 18 points in December. They also lost two games in the ACC regular season before hitting their stride. They were down seven at the half to Stanford in the Elite Eight before rallying for the win.

While UConn and Notre Dame have been Final Four mainstays the past decade, Baylor is making its first appearance since 2012 when the Lady Bears finished off a 40-0 season with the national championship.

The overall No. 1 seed has run through the NCAA Tournament so far, winning by an average of 36 points. After falling short in the NCAAs the past few years, coach Kim Mulkey was thrilled for her seniors such as Kalani Brown, who will get a chance to play in the national semifinals.


"Certainly, you start with seniors. I am so happy for those seniors," the coach said. "I am so happy for those players, and I'm happy for Baylor University. I'm happy for Baylor University. Plaster that on the front page of every national newspaper. It doesn't get any more positive than this."

They'll face a Final Four newcomer in Oregon. The Ducks had made the Elite Eight the previous two years falling in the regional final each time. Sabrina

Ionescu wouldn't let it happen a third straight season. The Ducks junior All-American guard had 31 points, eight assists and seven rebounds.

"All I gotta say is we're not done yet," she said after the 88-84 victory Sunday over top-seeded Mississippi State.

It's been a meteoric rise under coach Kelly Graves since he took over five years ago. The Ducks went from 10th place in the Pac-12 the year before Graves took over to winning the conference regular-season title this year and now reaching the Final Four for

the first time.

"We started from scratch, so to speak," Graves said. "There were great kids in the program, really good players. We weren't quite the championship level yet. I give my staff a ton of credit. They worked their butts off. We had a plan. We stuck to it, recruited really well. ... I think our student-athletes are the real ambassadors.
