Phil grew up in Breckenridge, Texas, and spent much of his summers on his grandparents' farms. From boyhood he enjoyed the outdoors and learned how to repair cars, maintain houses, and operate equipment by following his dad and granddads everywhere; a natural mechanical ability was apparent throughout his life. He loved to help both granddads in the fields and to work cattle, plowing by hand with horses and hauling hay using horses and wagons; he would have lived on the farm if he could. In high school he studied physics and math, played tuba, water skied, hunted and fished, and even went SCUBA diving. Later he taught his daughters to fish, ride bikes, and water and snow ski. Bluegrass and Country and Western music – and dogs – were his favorites.

Phil attended Texas Tech to major in engineering and drove semi-trucks to pay expenses. He met his wife, Zandra, while working for her dad on a seismographic rig during the summers off from school. They married (eloped!) weeks after his and Phyllis' parents were tragically killed in an auto accident, and Phil withdrew from Tech. Within a few years Michele and Stacy were born, and Phil began working for Texaco, which he loved. There

he worked his way up from field jobs to managing drilling operations for the Western region.

Phil and Zandra spent eighteen years in Big Spring, Texas, with the girls and moved to Midland, Texas, for ten years after the girls went off to college. A life-long learner, he returned to college to earn a bachelor's degree in Business Management while working full time. In 1995 he and Zandra moved to Lone Tree, Colorado, to take a new position with Texaco. After thirty-three years with Texaco at age fifty-seven, he "retired" and embarked on a career as a drilling consultant for about another ten years. He retired in earnest when Zandra was diagnosed with ovarian cancer and became her diligent caregiver for three years until she preceded him in Heaven in 2013.

He was close to both sets of grandparents, was a protective big brother to Phyllis, and became close to Zandra's family. He and Zandra were married for forty-nine years and were devoted to each other. Phil was always "Daddy" to Stacy and Michele and was their sounding board and backstop. Immensely proud of his grandsons, Jack and Zane, he spent time with each of them whenever possible. He especially loved to help them build things, watch them play sports, take them fishing, and attend their events. Phil was a life-long church-goer and held tightly to his Christian faith. As a widower he developed close friendships with his church group members, and he was a mentor to several who worked for him at Texaco and others whom he encountered. Family and church were the most important things in his life, and he enjoyed visiting with and staying connected to cousins and other relatives. Phil was known for his patience, tolerance, moderation, pragmatism, and ability to listen. He also possessed a big smile, a dry wit and sly sense of humor.

In his early thirties Phil was diagnosed with Castleman's Disease but did not require treatment until about ten years ago. Shortly after Zandra's passing, he was diagnosed with and began treatment for POEMS Syndrome. He worked to maintain his health and undertook dialysis treatments at home. Like Zandra, he wanted to see his grandsons grow up. Phil lived his last days as he lived the rest of his life, loved and surrounded by his family.

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

vendors will be available at the top of the amphitheater. There is still time to reserve a spot for local vendors wanting to take part. Vendor booths are \$200 per booth and \$50 for non-profit organization.

Texas settles lawsuit over bungled search for illegal votes

The agreement announced Friday, April 26, ends an effort by Texas elections officials that led to the state wrongly questioning the U.S. citizenship of tens of thousands of voters. Whitley said the agreement allows the state to continue "voter registration list maintenance" but ensures that the same mistakes won't happen again.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas officials announced Friday that they settled a lawsuit over a bungled search for ineligible voters that President Donald Trump stoked over Twitter but that resulted in the U.S. citizenship of thousands of people being wrongly called into question.

The agreement officially ends a botched scouring of Texas voter rolls that began in January and was beset by deeply flawed data. It flagged nearly 100,000 registered voters but wrongly captured naturalized citizens, and a federal judge who halted the search in February noted in his order that only about 80 people to that point had been identified as potentially ineligible to vote.

The problems with the list were discovered within days, but not before Trump seized on the reports out of Texas to renew his unsubstantiated claims of rampant voter fraud in the U.S.

It made for another volatile chapter in Texas voting battles that have simmered for a decade, which have included federal judges finding racial discrimination in voting maps and voter ID laws created by Republicans, though the state later prevailed on appeals. In February, U.S. District Judge Fred Biery of San Antonio called Texas' search for non-citizen voters "a solution looking for a problem" and said there was no evidence of widespread voter fraud.

The settlement requires Texas to change how it investigates

voter citizenship and pay \$450,000 in fees to civil rights groups that brought the lawsuit.

"This settlement brings an end to a deplorable Texas farce, in which state leaders shamelessly lied about alleged widespread fraud by Latino and other immigrants, grabbing headlines and national attention," said Thomas A. Saenz, president and general counsel of the Mexican

American Legal Defense Fund, which represented some U.S. citi-

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zens who were wrongly flagged by the state.

Texas Secretary of State David Whitley said the agreement ensures the same mistakes won't happen again under new procedures for questioning voter citizenship.

The state originally claimed that 58,000 people on the list had voted in at least one election since 1996. But significantly, Texas officials failed to exclude voters who legally cast ballots only after becoming naturalized citizens.

But going forward, Texas agreed to only flag individuals who indicate they are not U.S. citizens when applying for driver's licenses or a state ID, yet had previously registered to vote.

"Today's agreement accomplishes our office's goal of maintaining an accurate list of qualified registered voters while eliminating the impact of any list maintenance activity on naturalized U.S. citizens," Whitley said in a statement.

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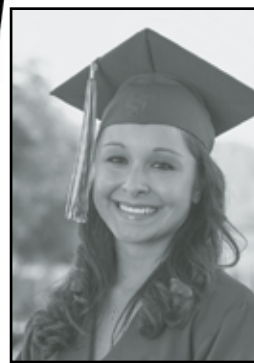
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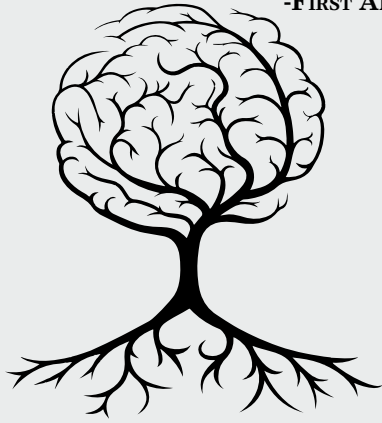

Two of the three are valued friends whose names are well-known in Texas, and the third I've never met.

There's nothing gained by keeping readers in suspense (as if I ever do), but here's the trio: Dr. Mamie McCullough, a humorous, motivational speaker and author long admired, and Texas A&M's and the old Southwest Conference's winningest football coach R. C. Slocum. Oh, the third? She's

Dr. Laura Schlessinger, a radio talk show host and author. I never met her, read her or can measure the merit of her responses to telephone "call-ins." I believe, though, that her daily closing admonition—"Now go do the right thing"—is good medicine. That's what Dr. McCullough and Coach Slocum have done for more than a half-century, and they're still at it....

Mamie has done so flamboyantly—"glitized up" head-to-toe—at lecterns, speaking largely at educational and church gatherings nationally. R. C. is more of an "overalls and brogans" guy who has coached "life, then football" like few others on the planet.

Both are refreshing news items that stand out glowingly among too much "slimy stuff" about

man's inhumanity to man.

Hers was about her 80th birthday. Six dozen "family and friends" gathered at a Frisco luncheon, some to see what Dr. McCullough had chosen from resale shop purchases for party adornment. The other "news"—received grandly by true fans of college football—is that Slocum has been named interim athletic director at his beloved Texas A&M University. At 74, he and Mamie's lifelong mantra has been doing the right thing. AND, wonder of wonders, the beloved Aggie coach who was head man for 14 seasons never had an agent, and still doesn't!...

Decked out in a pant suit as white as her hair, Mamie "glitized with gold." She dazzled as she worked the room, laughing about life today. "At my age, if I can't hide it, I decorate it," she joked.

I've known her since she rode on a bus from dirt-poor upbringing on a Georgia farm, where her late mother, a widow, raised nine children, all under age 17 when Mamie's dad died.

Arriving at Howard Payne University in Brownwood Texas—where older sister Martha already was in school—she didn't know that you "majored, or minored or paid." She knew, though, that late President and Mrs. Guy D. Newman loved students, and would see her through. Many of us felt that way.

Tributes to Mamie were many, far too many to condense. She has done so much for so long for so many, including the upbringing of three children—Patti, Brian and Jennifer, ages 8, 6 and 5 when Mamie was widowed at age 42.

I don't know her college major, but her major in life has been giving, encouraging, supporting and guiding.

Covered by all that "glitz" is her "can do" spirit that continues like the unending sound of drums from deep in a forest, urging the rest of us to "be all we can be."

The world—as well as her former colleague—the imitable, late Zig Ziglar—has taught Mamie much. And she shares—as does Slocum—which is biblical, what is important and what needs to be done.

Mamie can joke, and she can take jokes. She cackled upon hearing a four-line poem read at her party: "I join mortals and angels, praising Mamie with sweetest of songs, but agreeing with some of her audiences, that much of her bling should be 'blonged'."

At age 60, she claimed to "re-ally by 59.95," and two decades later, she thinks "79.95" is more palatable. She's the best. So is R.C. Both stand for "the right things."

ALBANY – In what started out as a pitchers' duel through the first four innings on Friday night, Big Spring broke the stalemate in the bottom of the fifth with a huge 6 run inning to break the game wide open and took a commanding 6-0 lead into the top of the sixth. With a big lead and only six outs from victory Big Spring buckled down and despite giving up three runs in the top of the sixth and held on for the series clinching game three win to take home the bi-district title. Iowa Park outlit the Lady Steers 10-9 in the game, but Big Spring turned those hits into runs and did a great job defensively to keep the Lady Steers baserunners from getting home.

Neither team got anything going offensively through four in-

But it was too little too late and even though Big Spring didn't score any runs in the bottom of the inning they did come out in the top of the seventh and put Iowa Park away quickly in their last at bat to take the game and the series with an impressive 6-3 win.

Both pitchers played great in the game. Maddie Daniels got the start and the win for the Lady Steers, she pitched 3 runs in 10 hits and allowed just 3 runs on 11 hits and struck out 6 in the big win. The Big Spring defense had Maddie's back all game and it was a great defensive effort by the whole team. Ray-

SEATTLE (AP) — Edwin Encarnacion and Mitch Haniger supplied all the offense the Seattle Mariners needed against the Texas Rangers. Haniger's infield grounder with the bases loaded brought home the winning run in the 11th inning to give the Mariners a 5-4 victory over the Rangers on Friday night. Encarnacion hit a three-run homer and drove in all the other runs for the Mariners. "Edwin had a big night at the plate," Mariners manager Scott Servais said. "We didn't do a lot with the bat tonight but we put together that little rally and grinded through some at-bats. Everybody

chipped in on this one." Omar Narvaez singled with one out in the 11th before Ryon Healy and Dee Gordon walked to load the bases off Kyle Dowdy (1-1). Haniger hit a grounder to third that was bobbled by Logan Forsythe as he threw to second base, hoping to start an inning ending double play. But it was too late to get Gordon and the ball was dropped by Rougned Odor. "I just tried to break up a double play," Gordon said. "I didn't know he bobbled it, but it helped us a little bit." Roenis Elias (2-0) pitched two scoreless innings to earn the win. The Mariners used eight pitchers on a night when they started with rook-

ie Yusei Kikuchi as an opener. The Mariners led 4-3 in the ninth inning before a pinch-hit home run by Shin-Soo Choo off reliever Anthony Swarzak tied the game. Kikuchi, who made his sixth start of the season, had a two-strikeout, nine-pitch first inning before calling it a night. This is part of the plan for Kikuchi to limit his innings this season as he adjusts to the major leagues. Starting pitchers in Japan typically pitch only once a week. Justus Sheffield, acquired by the Mariners in the trade that sent James Paxton to the Yankees, was recalled from Triple-A Tacoma to make his

season debut in the second inning. He allowed two runs in three innings of relief while walking four and striking out three. "I was just happy to get out there and try to keep the game close," Sheffield said. "Guys were telling me just to catch my breath and settle down out there." Shelby Miller allowed four runs in five innings as the Rangers lost their fifth consecutive game. Rangers right fielder Nomar Mazara had three RBIs, including a two-run homer off Sheffield. **A N D R U S MILESTONE** Shortstop Elvis Andrus played in his 1,500th game Friday since his Rangers debut on April 6, 2009. It makes him the fifth player to reach that milestone in a Rangers uniform. **HEARN ON IL DAY AFTER MLB DEBUT** Rangers LHP Taylor Hearn, who recorded only one out while facing eight batters in his major league debut Thursday, was placed on the 10-day IL Friday with tightness in his left elbow. Hearn will see a doctor back in Texas on Saturday, but team officials don't think the injury is serious. RHP Wei-Chieh Huang was recalled from Double-A Frisco one day after being optioned for Hearn's debut. **ODOR RETURNS**

Rangers: 2B Rougned Odor rejoined the team Friday and was activated off the IL after a two-game rehab assignment in Nashville. Odor was placed on IL April 11 with a right knee sprain. RHP Ariel Jarado also was recalled from Nashville Friday. LHP Jeffrey Springs and INF Jeffrey Wisdom were optioned to Nashville. Mariners: RHP Shawn Armstrong was designated for assignment Friday when the team recalled Sheffield from Triple-A Tacoma. **TRAINER'S ROOM** Rangers: 3B Asdrubal Cabrera, who left Thursday's game in the second inning with tightness in his left calf, had an MRI Friday and it was negative. He took BP in the cage Friday, but did not play and is listed as day-to-day. Mariners: Jay Bruce returned to the starting lineup, playing right field, after missing four consecutive games with tightness in his quad. **UP NEXT** Rangers: LHP Mike Minor (2-2, 3.21) will make his sixth start of the season Saturday night in Seattle. Minor has allowed two earned runs or less in three of his last four starts, including a shutout on April 16. But he took the loss at Oakland on April 22, allowing four runs on four hits in six innings. Minor was 0-2 in four starts against Seattle last season, posting a 6.87 ERA in those games. Mariners: RHP Mike Leake (2-2, 4.30) will make his sixth start of the season Saturday night against Texas. That's when the Rockets let a 3-2 lead slip away and saw the Warriors go on to win their second straight NBA championship. This time the teams meet in the West semifinals beginning Sunday in Oakland. "We know them well," Warriors coach Steve Kerr said Friday night after his team finished off the Clippers with a 129-110 victory to win the best-of-seven series 4-2. "They're going to come after you and pick-and-roll. We know they're already in the Bay waiting for us, so it will be a quick turnaround." Anticipating a Warriors' closeout, the Rockets flew to Northern California on Friday to be ready for the series opener. They've been resting since Wednesday, when they defeated the Utah Jazz 4-1. The Warriors were stretched to six games for the first time in the opening round in Kerr's five seasons. "One of the things that can happen during the playoffs is you can sharpen your game against an opponent that forces you to do so," Kerr said. "We had leads in some games

that we lost. Every time we thought, all right, we've got this, we didn't have it." Kevin Durant had a statement game for the Warriors, scoring 38 of his playoff career-high 50 points in the first half at Staples Center. He was 15 of 26 from the floor, made 14 of 15 free throws and hit six 3-pointers. Durant was coming off a 45-point performance in a losing effort in Game 5. "No matter what anybody does, he can get a good shot," Kerr said. Harden averaged 27.8 points in the first round against the Jazz, but he struggled at times to get going offensively. His worst effort came in Game 3 when Houston won despite him missing his first 15 shots to set an NBA record for most misses to start a playoff game. Durant believes Harden's game is much more than drawing fouls and getting to the line. "He can score in a variety of ways, so we have to be locked in from the beginning," Durant said. "You can't fully stop a guy like that; you've got to be ready to play him tough all game." Stephen Curry finished with 24 points, the only other Warrior with at least 20 Friday. Klay Thompson had nine points. Both of them were banged up slightly in the game, but Kerr said he's hopeful they'll both be good to go Sunday. Draymond Green had his fifth career play-off triple-double of 16

points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists after not playing well in Game 5. Warriors center Kevon Looney expects to see the Rockets employ some of the same defensive schemes used by the Clippers, who twice won in Oakland, including a 31-point comeback that was the biggest in NBA history. "Defending the pick-and-roll is going to be huge," Looney said. "The Clippers punched us in the mouth and woke us up. They showed us it's not a cakewalk in the West. Every game is going to be hard."

She came from a family of 16; 10 brothers and three sisters. One of her sisters and two brothers are still residents of Big Spring, along with numerous nieces and nephews, while she has since relocated to Odessa.

Her family was one of the first Hispanic families to have a business in Big Spring – Casa Blanca opened by her parents Chon and Natividad Rodriguez - and their family business – Spanish Inn - still continues today. Her brother and his family currently run Spanish Inn.

One of the memorable moments, from her time in Big Spring, was they day they opened Casa Blanca Cafe on Sept. 16, 1943. She enjoyed working in the restaurant and helping her family, along with her sister in law, Dorothy Rodriguez, make the cafe a success.

Her father, originally from New Mexico, and jobs were hard to come by. His mother moved with him to the Big Spring community for a better opportunity to find work.

During her lifetimes Aurora has seen lots of things, lots of changes, but a few key moments stick out in her mind – The Depression, President Roosevelt starting the draft process before World War II, Pearl Harbor, building of the Atomic Bomb, the bombing of Hiroshima and the assassination of President Kennedy.

She has lived through many wars and seen many changes in our world and technology; she still asks how can people be picking at their phone all the time. She still has a rotary phone at home.

When asked, she said the biggest lesson she has learned over a century is respecting others and your family and always work for what you want. Her advice that she would like to impart on others is that it is important to work hard to accomplish the things you want in life and have pride in what you do.

According to her family, an interesting fact about her list of accomplishments is that she got her license to be a private detective in 1969 so she could work with her husband. She was one of the first women to work as an interpreter for many attorneys in the West Texas area, during the late 60s and 70s.

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Roger's Review

Avengers: Endgame



So I'm going to give one spoiler in this review of "Avengers: Endgame," the capstone film in Marvel Cinematic Universe's "Avengers" franchise, but it's something that pops up very early in the film, and is a necessary setup for the plot of the movie.

Here it is: After disintegrating half the living creatures in the universe with a snap of the fingers, the Mad Titan Thanos retires to an uninhabited planet where he begins life as a farmer (we saw that at the end of the franchise's previous movie, "Avengers: Infinity War"); but a short time after the snap, he uses the power of the Infinity Stones to... destroy the Infinity Stones.

That's the only spoiler I'll give for the new film, but warning: There will be some spoilers for previous films in the franchise.

If you think back to "Infinity War," you'll recall that, improbably, none of the original six Avengers - Captain America, Iron Man, Thor, the Hulk, Black Widow, or Hawkeye - succumbed to the snap. Also in "Infinity War," we learned that Ant Man was trapped in the microscopic Quantum Zone, and the folks who were supposed to retrieve him from that situation were dusted. There are some other people around: Rocket is there without his best friend Groot. Captain Marvel makes her "Avengers" debut following her highly successful solo film release a few weeks ago. War Machine is still around.

Quite a few more are gone. Spider-Man. Scarlet Witch. Drax. Star Lord.

Let's think about that spoiler for a minute. Without giving further spoilers, I'm sure you can work through some of the implications of Thanos' destruction of the Infinity Stones: How will the Avengers make things right and bring back all the people - including many iconic Marvel characters - without the power of the Infinity Stones?

It's a conundrum and there are no easy answers. It takes a couple of the MCU's greatest scientific minds - who just happen to also be Avengers - a bit of consideration to even begin to come up with a way out of their dilemma.

"Avengers: Endgame" can best be described as a slow build with a mixture of our favorite characters at their worst and most depressed with some laugh-out-loud funny scenes; a climax so overwhelming that I at times lost track of just what was going on; and a long, satisfying wrap up.

The biggest downside I have to offer about the movie is this: The big, climactic battle scene is too big. I spent half the battle trying to figure out who certain characters even were.

I spent the other half trying to figure out how they got there.

On the other hand, I spent the *other* half enjoy-

ing some pretty righteous super-heroic butt kicking, so there's that.

Superheroes? Yeah, there's a lot of superheroes. Think of a character you've seen before in the MCU, and that character is almost certainly in this movie.

Some people might be put off by just how slow and depressing some of the scenes are. To those people, I'd just say: Think about what happened in "Infinity War." Based on that, if you go into "Endgame" not expecting some slow, depressing scenes, you're fooling yourself.

I'm not going to belabor things too much. "Avengers: Endgame" is a fitting end to the Avengers movie saga. It's not perfect; machines with that many moving parts rarely are. But it's very, very good.

Nine stars out of 10.

History repeats itself - Caesar crosses the Rubicon

Heritage Museum hosting Brown Bag Lunch lecture series Tuesdays

One decision brought change that effected the world for thousands of years and one man impacted the political realm and society, in ways that stretched far beyond his lifetime.

Caesar and his decision to cross (or possibly not to cross) the Rubicon was the topic of discussion for the Heritage Museum Brown Bag lecture series this week. The history making decision took place on March 15, 49 B.C., on the bank of the Rubicon - the marked boundary between provinces of the Roman Empire. Rules had been set, including the restriction of Caesar crossing the Rubicon with an army.

"Caesar was faced with making a choice that could and would change his life and his world," Nancy Michaelis, said. "We are eight weeks into the 12 week portion of the Classical time period and we will soon be moving into modern times, for our discussions. However, Caesar's time is interesting, especially with the political similarities."

While Julius Caesar could be described as a drunkard, a womanizer and a corrupt politician, in 63 B.C., he made positive impacts on the provinces and Rome. One of the interesting impacts he was able to make was finding a solution to the debt and mortgage crisis. The people were able to get their dignity back by being able to go back to work since they no longer needed to worry about paying back high interest rates.

Caesar's approach was to hold the people responsible for the money they had borrowed, but not punish them with high interest rates. This decision reduced the influence of government and lowered taxes, which in turn restored the economy.

"With the cancellation of the interest on all debts, a massive campaign was launched building the public works program," Michaelis said.

Another lecture series attendee added, "The public works program left lasting impressions, some

projects that can still be seen in Big Spring today, such as the amphitheater and several other locations around town."

It is said, before crossing the Rubicon, Caesar said, "The die has been cast," but he said "throw the dice high" - totally different meaning. The die has been cast indicates your destiny is set, you are fated to achieve or not achieve. Throw them high indicates nobody tells Caesar what his fate is; let it go either way, he is master of his fate.

Looking at the impacts Caesar was able to make, it is fair to say he was a man of boldness and forward thinking. While he faces several of the same political issues that still exist today, he stood firm and pursued affects based on his beliefs. More information is available on Julius Caesar online, through documentaries and books located in the local library. Two suggested readings from the lecture include: Caesar, The Civil War and Plutarch, Lives of Caesar, Crassus and Pompey.

The next Brown Bag luncheon discussion will take place next Tuesday, at noon at the Heritage Museum, and cover the time of Jesus.

US stocks move sideways despite strong economic growth

NEW YORK (AP) — A government report showing solid economic growth and a mixed bag of corporate earnings sent U.S. stocks sideways in midday trading Friday on Wall Street.

Stocks are on pace to finish the week slightly higher after investors weighed contrasting earnings results. U.S. companies are about a third of the way through their latest round of quarterly reports. So far they've avoided analysts' most dire predictions for a severe contraction.

Amazon and Ford led their respective sectors broadly higher as investors applauded solid financial results. But Intel's weak forecast sent shares of chipmakers lower, while Exxon led a decline in energy stocks. Both Intel and Exxon contributed to a slide in the Dow Jones Industrial Av-

erage.

The Commerce Department's latest economic growth report is helping to stabilize the broader market. The U.S. economy grew at a 3.2% annual pace in the first quarter. That marks a surge from the previous quarter and it blows away Wall Street forecasts. The report helped push bond prices higher, a sign that investors are taking a more cautious approach. The yield on the 10-year Treasury fell to 2.49%.

Earlier this week the benchmark S&P 500 index hit an all-time high, as investors grew more confident in economic growth and corporate earnings. The broad index is up more than 16% for the year.

Wall Street has also been rewarding some technology companies since their highly anticipated stock market debuts. Pinterest and Zoom both went public ear-

lier this month and are trading near their raised initial prices. Ride-hailing company Uber and messaging platform Slack are set to be the next technology companies to open up for public investment.

KEEPING SCORE: The S&P 500 rose 0.2% as of 12:20 a.m. The Dow Jones rose 0.1%, or 25 points, to 26,486. The Nasdaq composite fell 0.1%.

ANALYSTS' COMMENTS: Companies have mostly met profit forecasts for the first quarter, taking some pressure off the market.

"It's marginally better than expected, so the market has rallied a bit," said Andrew Slimmon, managing director and senior portfolio manager at Morgan Stanley Investment Management.

Meanwhile, investor fears of a potential recession have subsided since the year started, helping the market steadily recover from its fourth-quarter meltdown.

"With no recession, the market was due for a bounce back," he said.

Slimmon warned that investors seem to be complacent with a less volatile market, which he said could be setting it up for a pullback.

Gene Goldman, chief investment officer at Cetera Financial Group, said that "markets have gone a little ahead of themselves." He pointed out that both bond and currency markets seem to be pointing to a slowdown in growth, while a surge in energy prices threatens to cut into consumers' wallets.

The warning dragged down competitors, who also rely in large part on

growth in China to fuel sales. Nvidia fell 5.6%, Micron Technology fell 3.4% and Western Digital fell 5.8%.

Uber looks to raise up to \$9B in initial public offering

NEW YORK (AP) — Ride-hailing giant Uber is aiming to raise \$9 billion in its mammoth initial public stock offering that, while smaller than initially expected, still dwarfs most stock market debuts.

The San Francisco-based company expects to be valued at \$80.5 billion to \$91.5 billion, falling well below prior estimates that rose as high as \$120 billion, in a sign that investors may be taking a more cautious approach to ride-hailing after the stock performance of Uber's rival, Lyft.

Even so, Uber is on track for one of the largest IPOs in history. The company plans to sell 180 million shares for between \$44 and \$50 each.

Lyft went public last month and its stock price fell 21% from its initial offering price of \$72, and was selling for about \$57 on Friday.

Over the coming weeks Uber is likely to revise those figures as it launches its so-called road show, where it pitches the company and gets feedback from potential investors. It is expected to begin

trading on the New York Stock Exchange next month.

Uber also disclosed that PayPal plans to buy \$500 million in stock at the IPO price, and that the companies will explore future commercial payment collaborations, including the development of Uber's digital wallet.

Uber gave potential investors a first look at its finances this month, revealing nearly \$8 billion in losses over a decade. That mirrors the challenges faced by Lyft.

But Uber also showed impressive growth. Its revenue totaled \$11.3 billion in 2018, which was a 42% increase from \$7.9 billion in 2017, and far above its \$495 million in revenue in 2014.

That rapid growth has continued this year. On a preliminary basis, revenue rose to a range of \$3 billion to \$3.1 billion during the three months ended March 31, compared with \$2.6 billion a year ago.

However, the company estimated losses of \$1 billion to \$1.1 billion for the first quarter. Uber chalks them up to operational expenses as the company continues to invest in its core platform, including

spending on incentives and promotions. In the first quarter of 2018, Uber posted a one-time profit of \$3.7 billion, helped by the sale of its operations in Russia and Southeast Asia, which brought in \$3.2 billion, and an unrealized \$2 billion gain from Uber's investment in Didi, the transportation network company in China.

Both Uber and Lyft face an uncertain path to profitability as they deal with intense competition, high costs to pay drivers, increased regulation by cities and a long, uncertain road to the development of autonomous vehicles.

"We know that companies with large losses tend to be problematic for IPO investors," said Kathleen Smith, principal at Renaissance Capital, which provides institutional research and IPO exchange traded funds. "There is no doubt that Lyft is a factor in Uber's valuation."

Uber also lost market share after a series of embarrassing revelations and has been working to repair its reputation. It disclosed earlier this month that it faces a criminal investigation from the U.S. Justice Department into a cover-up of a massive computer break-in during 2016 that took personal information of millions of passengers and drivers, among other legal challenges.

Uber stockholders also will be selling 27 million shares if the underwriters exercise their option to purchase stock.

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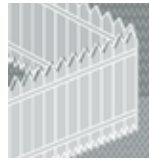
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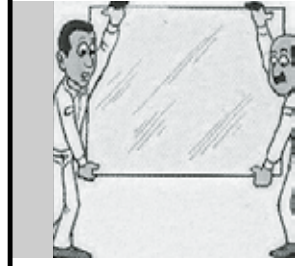
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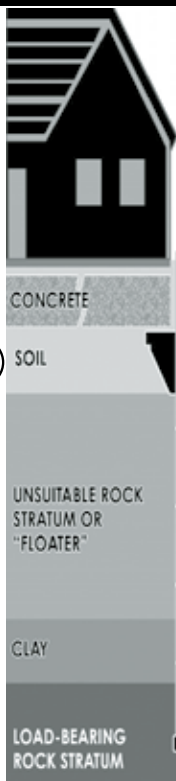

On many deals where there is no clear-cut line of play, declarer has to feel his way along until he learns more about the opposing distribution. If all goes well, he may eventually acquire enough knowledge about the lie of the opposing cards to bring about a successful resolution.

Consider this deal where South wound up in three notrump after West had overcalled with one heart. Declarer allowed East's jack to hold the first trick, then took the heart

continuation with the ace, learning in the process that West had started with no more than five hearts for his overcall.

At this stage, South could count eight sure tricks — four spades, a heart, two diamonds and a club — but it was not apparent where the ninth might come from. Putting that problem on the back burner for the moment, declarer cashed four spades, discarding a heart and a club while West let go of a club.

South now turned his attention to diamonds, cashing the A-K. Had West dropped the jack or queen under one of the top diamonds, declarer would have led a diamond toward the ten as the best chance to set up his ninth trick, hoping East had started with Q-x-x-x or J-x-x-x.

But when West discarded a club on the second diamond, the plan to set up an extra diamond trick went up in smoke. However, this development opened up another possibility, and declarer was quick to exploit it.

At trick nine, he led the heart ten from dummy, allowing West to collect three heart tricks. This left declarer with the Q-6 of clubs in dummy opposite his A-9, and West on lead with the K-J. When West exited with the jack and dummy's queen held, the contract came sailing home.

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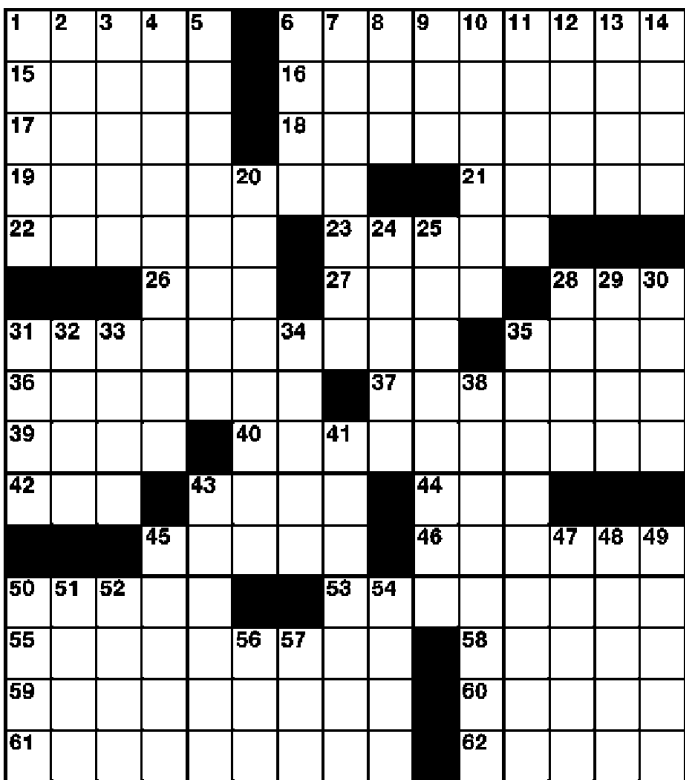
