# **Election Day results in two runoffs** Runoff election is set for June 8, early voting starts May 28

When the votes were tallied following Saturday's Election Day in Howard County, Big Spring has one new city council member and has retained an incumbent school board member, but the seats of mayor and city councilperson for District 4 are still undecided.

Altogether, 2,053 people marked their ballots in the election, including 1,064 in early voting, 680 on Election Day, 207 ballots by mail, and 2 provisional ballots.

"The turnout was higher in this election, but we also had every entity on the ballot, so we were expecting a larger turnout, but it's still



not very well when we have 15,000 registered," said Howard County Election Administrator Jodi Duck.

In the mayoral race, candidate Debbie Wegman received the most votes with 750, or 47.98 percent, while

Shannon Thomason received 555 (35.51 percent), Anna Scott garnered 139 (8.89 percent), and David Mathis received 117 (7.49 percent). Since no candidate received at least 50 percent of the votes cast, there will

be a runoff between the top two vote-getters - Wegman and Thomason - on June 8. Early voting is set to begin May 28.

# Museum lecture series: Events that changed history Tuesdays at noon; Next topic: The Black Death, May 14

These past few weeks, the lectures held at the Heritage Museum Tuesdays at noon have been very interesting. Two recent topics covered Jesus and Muhammad. Whether or not you're a religious person, there is no denying their teachings changed the world.

Judea was strategically positioned but notoriously difficult to govern. Although it had been under Roman domination, it was not annexed until Augustus agreed in 6 A.D. when a group from Judea went before him to request to be formally admitted into the Roman Empire. At that time, Augustus ordered a census to be carried out. All citizens of Judea were required to return to their towns of birth to register for the census. That is where the story of Joseph and Mary begins ... one with which we are all familiar.

In the Spring of 36 A.D. is when Jesus was brought to trial before Pontius Pilate, the governor of Judea. Jesus was being charged with blasphemy by his own people of Jerusalem. Pilate initially refused to execute Jesus for blasphemy, but relented when the Sanhedrin of rabbis, and the mob, called for Jesus to be put to death. A roman soldier who witnessed the courage of Jesus on the cross was the first to proclaim Jesus as the Son of God.

Muhammad was born centuries later,

in the year 570 into a well-known family. He became involved in the caravan trade and was fairly successful. During his travels, he learned of monotheistic religions and was attracted to the idea of devotion to one true God.

Muhammad had a vision of the angel Gabriel, who told Muhammad he had been chosen by God to be a prophet and would have the final truth revealed to him. Muhammad was to spread this message and began to speak of what Gabriel had revealed to him.

Muhammad had to leave Mecca in 622 due to the hostility that had spread. This journey became known as the Hegira. He was welcomed in Medina and

# **Obituaries**

### Wilson Connell "Connie" Edwards



Lifelong resident of West Texas, Wilson Connell "Connie" Edwards passed away on May 3, 2019. He was born on April 25, 1934 in Big Spring, Texas. Upon conclusion of schooling in Big Spring and San Angelo, he began military service in the Army National Guard, where he served from 1951-1960. Having earned a private pilot's license in 1951, and commercial and airline ratings soon after, he flew

extensively throughout Central America, the Caribbean, and the United States during his service. Upon completion of his military flying career, he formed Edwards Petroleum Company with his late brother, W.P. "Budo" Edwards, Jr. in 1954. In 1959, Connie and his brother assumed ownership and operation of the family farming, ranching and oil and gas leasing operations on the family land located in Howard and Glasscock counties. Between 1968-69, Connie was chief stunt pilot for the "Battle of Britain" movie, during which he logged extensive flight time piloting Me109's, Spitfires, Hurricanes, Heinkel HE III's, Junkers Ju 52's and B-25 Camera planes. During production in Bedford, England, in 1968, a Spitfire piloted by Connie had to be belly landed, engulfed in flames and with total loss of power. Connie was able to accomplish this with no injuries, an act that earned him a Royal Commendation and honorary Royal Air Force wings. In addition to this on-screen appearance, Connie also flew his own TBM Avenger in "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and "Bermuda Triangle", among others.

As owner and Flight CMDR-Pilot of a PBY N-4-NC, he and son, "Tex", flew to Europe in May and June 1986, recreating and commemorating the very first Atlantic crossing by aircraft. During so, Connie and the flight crew participated in the flyover of the Statue of Liberty on July 4th done in conjunction with the Navy's celebration of the 75th Anniversary of Naval Aviation, receiving numerous commendations, among them a special Commendation Medal from the Royal Navy and Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England. As owner of an HU-16 Albatross N226CG, he furnished the aircraft, crews and expenses for the celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the United States Coast Guard in 1989. He did so again in 1990 for the 75th Anniversary of USCG Aviation.

Connie accumulated numerous awards and commendations through his flying career, including being awarded the first set of Honorary USCG wings, presented by the Secretary of Transportation in 1992. He was awarded the Meritorious Service Award, the highest civilian award given by the Navy, presented by Admiral F. B. Selso, II, Chief of Naval Operations, in 1992. He was awarded an FAA Special Recognition Award, presented by Donald Engen, Administrator, in 1986. He was awarded the President's Pilot Award in 1988. He received the John Henry Towers Award from the Naval Aviation Commandery, one of the most prestigious flying awards given in the U.S.A. He was awarded one of the few Navy League life memberships to be given. He was awarded "Sea Plane Pilot of the Year" by

the Sea Plane Pilots Association, and the People's Choice award by the Experimental Aircraft Association in 1986. He was awarded a membership in the USCG's Order of the Pterodactyls and is a life member of the EAA, NRA, Air Force Historical Foundation, member of the Defense Orientation Conference Association, and member of the Royal Aero Club of Spain. He also served as Director of the Naval Aviation Museum Foundation. Honorary wings earned by Connie include: Royal Air Force, Spanish Air Force, Canadian Air Force, Portuguese Air Force and United States Coast Guard. the first ever awarded by the USCG. Connie, his late brother, Budo, and his late son, Tex, were inducted into the Lone Star Flight Museum's "Texas Aviation Hall of Fame" in 2016. In September of 2018, Connie returned once again to Duxford, England, to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the "Battle of Britain" movie filming.

An early member of the AOPA and president of the Air Force Association's Big Spring chapter, Connie remained active in base and community affairs. He also served as accident prevention counselor for the Lubbock, Texas district of the FAA and DOT. Connie's endeavors extend beyond the air having served as director of State National Bank, and director and major shareholder of various oilfield and farming and ranching companies. One of his more recent endeavors include his is co-founding of TexaStone Quarries, a limestone company that quarries and fabricates limestone for commercial and residential projects worldwide.

Wilson Connell "Connie" Edwards is preceded in death by his brother, W.P. "Budo" Edwards, and his son, Wilson C. "Tex" Edwards, Jr.

He is survived by his wife, Brenda Edwards; children, Patricia Zane of Dallas, Nicholas Deak of Austin; two daughters by marriage. Stefanie Park & husband Daniel of Liberty Hill, Texas and Tonya Crenwelge of Abilene; a total of eight grandchildren, Andrew Crenwelge & wife Nicole of Reston, VA, Blake Crenwelge of Reno, NV, Haylee Lou Park, Daniel Park, Jr. and Emilee Park of Liberty Hill, TX, Seth Crenwelge of Henderson, NV, Wilson C. "Trey" Edwards, III and Aislin Edwards, of Katy, TX. These eight grandchildren were his pride and joy.

Pallbearers will be Daniel Park Sr., Daniel Park Jr., Trey Edwards, Sam Polser, Jerry Kilgore and Pierre Ferrandi.

lived there for six years spreading the word of Islam and practicing his teachings.

War broke out between Medina and Mecca, and they traded battle victories. In the year 628, Muhammad entered Mecca with 1000 men and was acknowledged the leader. This marks the beginning of Islam's expansion towards Syria and Persia.

When Muhammad died two years later, the whole Arabian Peninsula had accepted the faith of Islam and found political and military unity.

that came out. We had a really great turnout, and we'll just be working the next few weeks and see if we can't get this thing done," said Wegman following the release of the results. "I'm ready to go to work for the citizens of Big Spring."

Thomason also offered his thoughts after the votes were in.

"I like the turnout that we had. It's better than we have in most elections. I'm encouraged to see that, though I'd like to see a lot better than 11 percent turnout," he said. "As far as my runoff, I'm excited about it. I'm looking forward to continuing this race and finishing it out. Getting down to work and trying to help the citizens of Big Spring.

In the City Council District 4 race, Gloria Byrd McDonald received the most votes, with 168, or 41.79 percent; while Shonda Folsom garnered 89 ballots, or 22.14 percent. McDonald and Folsom will face each other in the June 8 runoff election. David A. Scott received 60, or 14.93 percent; Adriel Saldivar got 52 (12.94 percent); and Dylan Archer-Pauchet received 16 votes (3.98 percent).

Camilla Strande is the new city council member for District 5 with 240 votes (54.42 percent), while Daniel Moreno received 173 votes or 39.23 percent.

"I'm ready to get to work and I'm very excited. I appreciate all the support I've gotten," Strande said. 'It's been really wonderful. I just appreciate everybody that got out and voted."

Big Spring School Board incumbent for District Fabian Serrano, retains his seat with 116 votes. or 50.88 percent; while challenger Nadine Reyes earned 99 votes or 43.42 percent. There were 13 undervotes in the race. An undervote occurs when a voter is eligible to vote in a given race, but marks no choice for that race on their ballot. Each of Coahoma and Forsan's races elected at least two at-large candidates, so no runoffs are required. In the Coahoma City Council race, two at-large seats were up for grabs. Top vote-getters were Brandy Manning, with 102 (40.48 percent); and Jay Holt with 95 (37.70 percent). Candidate Eric Her-

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rera received 22 votes (8.73 percent) while Robert Martinez garnered 18 votes or 7.14 percent.

Two jobs were also decided in the Coahoma School Board race. Brandon Atkins and Scott Tutle received the most votes, with 145 (22.17 percent) and 136 (20.80 percent) respectively. Jarod Wells received 102 (15.60 percent), Gregg Moore got 100 (15.29 percent) and Stormy Bradley got 95 votes (14.53 percent).

The Forsan City Council race decided three council seats. Ramon Holguin and Benny Pickett each recieved 34 votes (21.38 percent), while Mary Gressett got 26 votes (16.35 percent). Those three will be the council members. Ryan Foust garnered 19 votes (11.95 percent) and Tracy Johnson got 13 votes (8.18 percent).

In the Forsan School Board election, two seats were decided by the race. Beckie Wash got 106 votes or 28.04 percent and Chris Evans got 103 votes or 27.25 percent. Misty Matthies earned 71 votes (18.78 percent) while Jennifer Valdez got 43 (11.38 percent).

Duck said some of the new election equipment and

procedures were big hits in this election. New voting machines and countywide Voting Centers open to all voters were part of the mix this year.

"I think the new machines did excellent. They were outstanding. The voters really liked them," said Duck. "The vote centers also have turned our phones to 'off.' Nobody is calling down to find out where their precinct is, so that's a huge success."

Today in History Today is Monday, May 6, the 126th day of 2019. There are 239 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 6, 1954, medical student Roger Bannister broke the four-minute mile during a track meet in Oxford, England, in 3:59.4.

On this date: In 1863, the Civil War Battle of Chancellorsville in Virginia ended with a Confederate victory over Union forces. filed suit against President Bill Clinton, alleging he'd sexually harassed her in 1991. (Jones reached a settlement with Clinton in November 1998.) Britain's Queen Elizabeth II and French President Francois Mitterrand (frahn-SWAH' mee-teh-RAHN') formally opened the Channel Tunnel between their countries.

Ten years ago: After a day of meetings at the White House, President Barack Obama declared he'd received the commitments he wanted from the leaders of Pakistan and Afghanistan to more aggressively fight Taliban and al-Qaida militants. Gov. John Baldacci (bahl-DAH'-chee) signed a bill making Maine the fifth state to legalize same-sex marriage (however, the law was later overturned by a public vote). Five years ago: A federal report said that global warming was rapidly affecting the United States in both visible and invisible ways; shortly after the report came out, President Barack Obama used several television weathermen to call for action to curb carbon pollution before it was too late. The Vatican disclosed that over the past decade, it had defrocked 848 priests who raped or molested children and sanctioned another 2,572 with lesser penalties. Oklahoma City forward Kevin Durant won his first NBA MVP award. One year ago: The number of homes destroyed by Hawaii's Kilauea volcano reached 26, as scientists reported lava spewing more than 200 feet into the air. Lebanon's Iranian-backed Hezbollah group scored major gains in parliamentary elections, as the

main Western-backed faction headed by Prime Minister Saad Hariri lost a third of its seats.



David Fletcher also homered of seven before everything went wrong in Mexico.

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
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
