the military. There will be refreshments and, hopefully fun stories and socialization to become similar to close units in the military," she said. "We want women to always feel welcome at the outpost and comfortable asking for any help they need as well as just stopping by to say hello and maybe share a cup of coffee."

According to information provided by Yanez, "I'm not invisible," is the theme you will hear often in reference to female members of the armed forces past and present. Nearly all organizations support women who have served in our military, but they are often seen in the background

and, often times, the word veteran seems to more accurately reflect a man.

"Women, just like their male counterparts, joined the military and signed the same documents essentially saying they would give up their life in support of our country, and many have. Women veteran suicide rates have increased by 60 percent from 2001-2014 so it is no surprise that, since 2001, 60 percent of women veterans report difficulties adjusting to civilian life," she said.

Those attending will have an opportunity to find out about current available resources and provide input on what is needed.

"We are looking forward to meeting our women veteran's and finding out what their needs are and if we can help them with anything,"

she said. "These women in the military deserve our thanks."

The Veterans Outpost in Big Spring is committed to all our service members, veterans, and their families, male and female alike. The vision is to provide peer to peer resource services to include housing assistance, benefits navigation, and referrals to mental health and substance abuse providers if needed. We have a vast array of resource information and stand ready to advocate on their behalf to ensure the needs of our service members, veterans, and their families are met.

# Astros extend win streak to 6 with 8-1 win over Tigers

DETROIT — The surging Houston Astros were too much for Matthew Boyd.

Aledmys Diaz, Robinson Chirinos, Jake Marisnick and Alex Bregman homered for Houston, and the Astros beat the Detroit Tigers 8-1 on Monday night, extending their winning streak to six games. Two of those homers came off Boyd, the Detroit lefty who is off to a fine start this season but lasted only four innings in his shortest start of the year.

"We made him really work," Houston manager AJ Hinch said. "I looked up there in the third inning, he had 70 pitches. He got up into the upper 90s after four. We can do that to some pitching when we lock in to the strike zone. We had a lot of foul balls."

Brad Peacock (4-2) allowed a run and three hits in five innings for Houston, which has won nine of its last 10 games. Boyd (4-3) yielded three runs and five hits and threw 96 pitches.

"My stuff was working, but they have a really good approach," said Boyd, who entered with a 2.86 ERA. "They are patient and they don't chase, so you have to be in the zone against them."

Houston got homers from its No. 6, 8 and 9 hitters before Bregman added his 13th of the year. The Astros scored three runs in a three-batter span in the second inning, then added two more in the seventh and three in the ninth.

"It's nice to see production top to bottom," leadoff hitter George Springer said. "They pick up the top

of the lineup when the top of the lineup doesn't do its job."

Diaz hit a two-out solo shot to open the scoring in the second, and after a walk by Tyler White, Chirinos hit a two-run homer. Grayson Greiner hit a sacrifice fly in the fourth for the Tigers to make it 3-1.

Marisnick's two-run homer in the seventh gave Houston a four-run lead.

Ryan Pressly pitched the eighth for the Astros, extending his franchise-record scoreless streak to 36 innings.

Springer hit an RBI single in the ninth for Houston. Bregman followed with a two-run shot to left.

Justin Verlander, the star pitcher who was traded from the Tigers to the Astros in 2017, was back at Comerica Park and is slated to pitch Wednesday. He talked before the game about Detroit's World Series defeats in 2006 and 2012, when the Tigers won the AL Championship Series with ease and then faced long layoffs before the World Series.

"It comes down to the hottest team at the right time," Verlander said. "I think we were that team twice, and just, we got cooled off by the week lay-off before the World Series, both times."

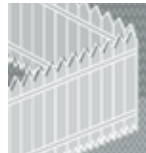

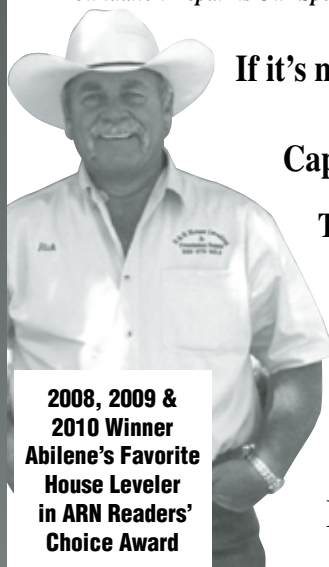

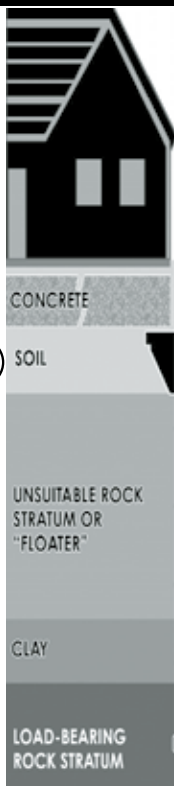

# Contract Bridge

## The art of subterfuge

East dealer.  
Neither side vulnerable.

The bidding:  
East    South    West    North  
Pass    1 NT    Pass    3 NT  
Opening lead — six of spades.

There are times when declarer is afraid to play a hand a certain way because it is likely to draw a road map that the defenders can exploit. But occasionally, declarer can divert the opposition from finding the winning defense by convincing them that a situation exists that actually does not.

Take this deal where West led a spade against three notrump. South could count seven immediate winners — two spades, four diamonds

and a club — plus the extra spade trick gained on the opening lead. The only suit that could provide a ninth trick was clubs, which would even provide an overtrick or two if the club finesse succeeded.

However, South was more concerned with what might happen if the club finesse lost. In that case, West, having noted his partner's play on the spade lead at trick one, might switch to a heart and thereby defeat the contract.

So, to deal with this possibility, South came up with a simple scheme designed to talk West out of shifting to a heart if he gained the lead with the king of clubs. On the opening lead, he played dummy's jack of spades, but, after East followed low, he won the trick with the king! The purpose was to plant the thought in West's mind that South had started with the doubleton A-K of spades.

South next crossed to the king of diamonds and tried the club finesse, losing to the king. Back came a second spade from West, who naturally thought South would have to win the trick with the ace. Declarer's ploy was exposed when dummy's ten held the trick, but it was then too late for West to recover, and declarer quickly scampered home with 10 tricks.

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, May 14, the 134th day of 2019. There are 231 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On May 14, 1955, representatives from eight Communist bloc countries, including the Soviet Union, signed the Warsaw Pact in Poland. (The Pact was dissolved in 1991.)

On this date:

In 1643, Louis XIV became King of France at age 4 upon the death of his father, Louis XIII.

In 1796, English physician Edward Jenner inoculated 8-year-old James Phipps against smallpox by using cowpox matter.

In 1804, the Lewis and Clark expedition to explore the Louisiana Territory as well as the Pacific Northwest left camp near present-day Hartford, Illinois.

In 1925, the Virginia Woolf novel "Mrs Dalloway" was first published in England and the United States.

In 1940, the Netherlands surrendered to invading German forces during World War II.

In 1948, according to the current-era calendar, the independent state of Israel was proclaimed in Tel Aviv by David Ben-Gurion, who became its first prime minister; U.S. President Harry S. Truman immediately recognized the new nation.

In 1961, Freedom Riders were attacked by violent mobs in Anniston and Birmingham, Alabama.

In 1968, John Lennon and Paul McCartney held a news conference in New York to announce the creation of the Beatles' latest business venture, Apple Corps.

In 1973, the United States launched Skylab 1, its first manned space station. (Skylab 1 remained in orbit for six years before burning up during re-entry in 1979.) The National Right to Life Committee was incorporated.

In 2001, the Supreme Court ruled 8-0 that there is no exception in federal law for people to use marijuana for medical purposes.

In 2004, Britain's Daily Mirror newspaper published a front-page apology after photographs supposedly showing British forces abusing Iraqi prisoners turned out to be

fakes. The U.S. Supreme Court refused to step in and block gay marriages in Massachusetts.

In 2008, the Interior Department declared the polar bear a threatened species because of the loss of Arctic sea ice. Justine Henin (EH'-nen), 25, became the first woman to retire from tennis while atop the WTA rankings.

Ten years ago: House Speaker Nancy Pelosi accused the CIA of misleading her and other lawmakers about the waterboarding of detainees during the Bush administration, disputing Republican charges that she'd been complicit in its use. Chrysler announced plans to eliminate 789 dealerships as part of its restructuring. A pair of spacewalking astronauts installed a new piano-sized camera in the Hubble Space Telescope.

Five years ago: A wildfire erupted in the north San Diego suburb of Carlsbad, destroying eight houses, two businesses and an apartment complex. Canadian-born U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz officially renounced his birth country's citizenship amid speculation he could make a run at the White House in 2016.

One year ago: Israel and the U.S. held a festive inauguration ceremony for the new American Embassy in Jerusalem; just a few miles away, Israeli forces shot and killed nearly 60 Palestinians and wounded hundreds of others during mass protests along the Gaza border that were the culmination of weekly demonstrations aimed at breaking a border blockade. The Supreme Court cleared the way for states coast to coast to legalize betting on sports. Writer Tom Wolfe, who chronicled the space race in "The Right Stuff" before turning his satiric wit to such novels as "The Bonfire of the Vanities," died in New York at the age of 88.

# Invincible II? Vinny Papale long shot to make an NFL roster

ASHBURN, Va. — Vinny Papale knows his father's story and has watched the Mark Wahlberg movie "Invincible" about 30 times.

Only when he got to college at Delaware did Vinny fully appreciate the inspirational tale of Vince Papale earning a spot with the Philadelphia Eagles at age 30 despite never playing football before. The younger Papale was amazed his dad made it to the NFL, and now he's trying to follow in those footsteps.

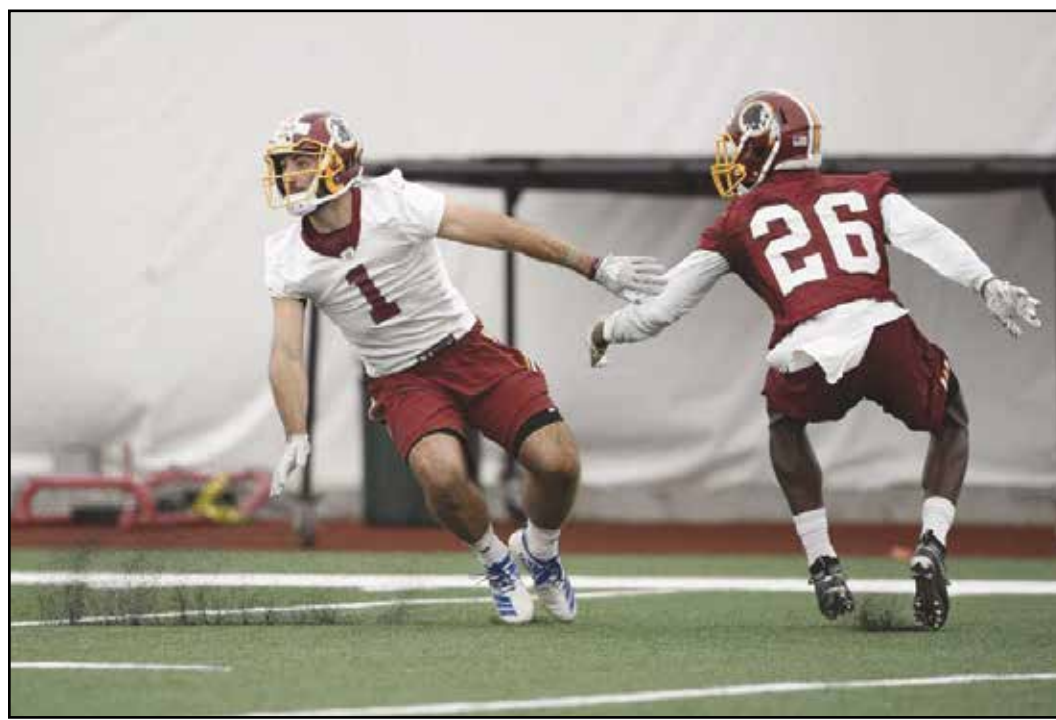
More than four decades after Vince Papale went from part-time bartender, nightclub doorman and substitute teacher to Eagles receiver, Vinny got rookie camp tryouts with the Oakland Raiders and Washington Redskins and is trying to make a name for himself in the league.

"I'm a little younger — he was 30," Papale said this weekend after a Redskins rookie minicamp practice. "But it's definitely cool just to have another opportunity to play at the next level."

Papale almost didn't get this opportunity. He broke his left leg his freshman season at Delaware and tore ligaments in his right knee the next year, so it was a battle just to get on the field.

As a senior, Papale had 36 catches for 618 yards and six touchdowns and was so good on third down that his father said the team had an expression, "Third and Vinny."

"Those setbacks, they just ruin

people, but he came back stronger," Vince said in a phone interview on Monday. "I'm just so proud of how hard he works and the adversity he's battled through to get there."

Vince is proud that his son doesn't harbor any resentment toward him for living under the shadow of "Invincible" and having to answer the same questions over and over. But Vince sees parallels because Redskins President Bruce Allen's father, George, was a mentor of longtime coach Dick Vermeil, who gave him his shot off a tryout in 1976.

Vinny has received some fatherly

advice from his dad about the game.

"He just said there's limited opportunities," Vinny said. "Every time I went on the field or was in a play, just make the most of that opportunity and make sure I was noticed on film. That's what he told me."

At Washington's rookie camp, Papale had his name written in magic marker on a piece of tape on his helmet but didn't get too much flak from other players because they didn't know much about him. Vinny said most people think the movie is about his grandfather, anyway, but the attention didn't bother him.

Papale wanted attention for his play on the field and Redskins coach Jay Gruden came away impressed.

"He's a tough guy," Gruden said after Saturday's workout. "He runs everything hard and plays with a lot of passion without a doubt. Very similar to the movie."

Even though Papale wasn't among the six players the Redskins signed out of rookie camp, that doesn't mean he won't catch on somewhere.

"Invincible II" could be a real-life sequel if either Jay or brother Jon — who coaches the Raiders — decides to sign this Papale. His father said the important thing is that "Vinny is his own man" who would get a job on his own merits.

"He's got talent, and I'm just hoping that somebody out there like Jay or like Jon sees what he's got and gives him a shot," Vince said.

Vinny Papale was invited to the Eagles' pre-draft pro day, but his father said it doesn't matter what color the uniform is as long as the NFL dream materializes. If that's Redskins burgundy and gold, Vince is on board with that, even though he'll always have a connection to the Eagles.

Vince said his son wants to go into special forces if the NFL doesn't happen. But with two tryouts down, his family is optimistic.

"I'm very confident that he's going to get that opportunity," Vince said. "God bless that person or team that gives him the shot because they won't be disappointed."

## LEADING OFF: Yanks put Andújar on IL, Paddack vs Kershaw

### BRONX BOO-BOOS

No sooner do the injury-ravaged Yankees finally get a player back than two more go down. On the same day New York activated center fielder Aaron Hicks for the first time this season, third baseman Miguel Andújar and right-hander Jonathan Loaisiga were placed on the 10-day injured list. The moves Monday left the Yankees with 13 players on the IL.

They've put 17 on the list for 18 total stints this year — Andújar now twice because of a small labrum tear in his right shoulder. Loaisiga, the rotation replacement for injured James Paxton, has a strained rotator cuff and will be shut down for four weeks.

Following a rainout Monday, J.A. Happ (2-3, 4.36) leads New York against Baltimore.

### TEXAS TWO-STEP

Padres rookie and cowboy-hat enthusiast Chris Paddack takes on another notable Texan in a matchup with Dodgers lefty Clayton Kershaw. Paddack (3-1, 1.55) has become a fan favorite in San Diego for his Western get-ups, wearing cowboy hats and boots to the stadium on game

day. He's coming off his best start yet, striking out 11 over 7 2/3 innings in a 4-0 win over Jacob deGrom and the Mets. Los Angeles has won every game started by Kershaw (2-0, 3.31) this season.

### QUICK WORK

Cubs right-hander Kyle Hendricks has been on a most efficient roll, something he'll try to continue against Cincinnati. He delivered an 81-pitch shutout against St. Louis on May 3, then followed with eight solid innings against Miami, allowing an unearned run while throwing 96 pitches. The

Reds will counter with righty Tanner Roark (3-1, 3.27).

### PETEY ON HOLD

Dustin Pedroia's injury rehab assignment has been put on hold following a setback with his lingering left knee injury. The Red Sox second baseman was scratched from a game with Double-A Portland on Saturday, and his return from the rehab assignment was announced Monday. Boston hasn't announced a next move for the 35-year-old.
