she said. "These women in the military deserve our thanks."



There are times when declarer is afraid to play a hand a certain way because it is likely to draw a road map that the defenders can exploit. But occasionally, declarer can divert the opposition from finding the winning defense by convincing them that a situation exists that actually does

Take this deal where West led a spade against three notrump. South could count seven immediate winners — two spades, four diamonds and a club — plus the extra spade trick gained on the opening lead. The only suit that could provide a ninth trick was clubs, which would even provide an overtrick or two if the club finesse succeeded.

However, South was more concerned with what might happen if the club finesse lost. In that case, West, having noted his partner's play on the spade lead at trick one, might switch to a heart and thereby defeat the con-

**So,** to deal with this possibility, South came up with a simple scheme designed to talk West out of shifting to a heart if he gained the lead with the king of clubs. On the opening lead, he played dummy's jack of spades, but, after East followed low, he won the trick with the king! The purpose was to plant the thought in West's mind that South had started with the doubleton A-K of spades. South next crossed to the king of

diamonds and tried the club finesse, losing to the king. Back came a second spade from West, who naturally thought South would have to win the trick with the ace. Declarer's ploy was exposed when dummy's ten held the trick, but it was then too late for West to recover, and declarer quickly scampered home with 10 tricks.

# Today in History

Today is Tuesday, May 14, the 134th day of 2019. There are 231 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On May 14, 1955, representatives from eight Communist bloc countries, including the Soviet Union, signed the Warsaw Pact in Poland. (The Pact was dissolved in 1991.) On this date:

In 16/13 Louis

King of France at age 4 upon the death of his father, Louis XIII.

In 1796, English physician Edward Jenner inoculated 8-year-old James Phipps against smallpox by using cowpox matter.

In 1804, the Lewis and Clark expedition to explore the Louisiana Territory as well as the Pacific Northwest left camp

near present-day Hartford, Illinois. In 1925, the Virginia Woolf novel "Mrs Dalloway" was first

published in England and the United States. In 1940, the Netherlands surrendered to invading German

forces during World War II. In 1948, according to the current-era calendar, the independent state of Israel was proclaimed in Tel Aviv by David Ben-Gurion, who became its first prime minister; U.S. President Harry S. Truman immediately recognized the new nation.

In 1961, Freedom Riders were attacked by violent mobs in Anniston and Birmingham, Alabama.

In 1968, John Lennon and Paul McCartney held a news conference in New York to announce the creation of the Beatles' latest business venture, Apple Corps.

In 1973, the United States launched Skylab 1, its first manned space station. (Skylab 1 remained in orbit for six years before burning up during re-entry in 1979.) The National Right to Life Committee

In 2001, the Supreme Court ruled 8-0 that there is no exception in federal law for people to use marijuana for medical purposes.

In 2004, Britain's Daily Mirror newspaper published a front-page apology after photographs supposedly showing British forces abusing Iraqi prisoners turned out to be

fakes. The U.S. Supreme Court refused to step in and block gay marriages in Massachusetts.

In 2008, the Interior Department declared the polar bear a threatened species because of the loss of Arctic sea ice. Justine Henin (EH'-nen), 25, became the first woman to retire from tennis while atop the WTA rankings.

Ten years ago: House Speaker Nancy Pelosi accused the CIA of misleading her and other lawmakers about the waterboarding of detainees during the Bush administration, disputing Republican charges that she'd been complicit in its use. Chrysler announced plans to eliminate 789 dealerships as part of its restructuring. A pair of spacewalking astronauts installed a new piano-sized camera in the Hubble Space

Five years ago: A wildfire erupted in the north San Diego suburb of Carlsbad, destroying eight houses, two businesses and an apartment complex. Canadian-born U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz officially renounced his birth country's citizenship amid speculation he could make a run at the White House in 2016.

One year ago: Israel and the U.S. held a festive inauguration ceremony for the new American Embassy in Jerusalem; just a few miles away, Israeli forces shot and killed nearly 60 Palestinians and wounded hundreds of others during mass protests along the Gaza border that were the culmination of weekly demonstrations aimed at breaking a border blockade. The Supreme Court cleared the way for states coast to coast to legalize betting on sports. Writer Tom Wolfe, who chronicled the space race in "The Right Stuff" before turning his satiric wit to such novels as "The Bonfire of the Vanities," died in New York at the age of 88.

# Invincible II? Vinny Papale long shot to make an NFL roster

ASHBURN, Va. — Vinny Papale knows his father's story and has watched the Mark Wahlberg movie "Invincible" about 30 times.

Only when he got to college at Delaware did Vinny fully appreciate the inspirational tale of Vince Papale earning a spot with the Philadelphia Eagles at age 30 despite never playing football before. The younger Papale was amazed his dad made it to the NFL, and now he's trying to follow in those footsteps. More than four decades after

Vince Papale went from part-time bartender, nightclub doorman and substitute teacher to Eagles receiver, Vinny got rookie camp tryouts with the Oakland Raiders and Washington Redskins and is trying to make a name for himself in the

"I'm a little younger — he was 30," Papale said this weekend after a Redskins rookie minicamp practice. "But it's definitely cool just to have another opportunity to play at the next level."

Papale almost didn't get this opportunity. He broke his left leg his freshman season at Delaware and tore ligaments in his right knee the next year, so it was a battle just to get on the field.

As a senior, Papale had 36 catches for 618 yards and six touchdowns and was so good on third down that his father said the team had an expression, "Third and Vinny."

"Those setbacks, they just ruin

people, but he came back stronger," Vince said in a phone interview on Monday. "I'm just so proud of how hard he works and the adversity he's battled through to get there."

Vince is proud that his son doesn't harbor any resentment toward him for living under the shadow of "Invincible" and having to answer the same questions over and over. But Vince sees parallels because Redskins President Bruce Allen's father, George, was a mentor of longtime coach Dick Vermeil, who gave him his shot off a tryout in 1976.

Vinny has received some fatherly

advice from his dad about the game.

"He just said there's limited opportunities," Vinny said. "Every time I went on the field or was in a play, just make the most of that opportunity and make sure I was noticed on film. That's what he told me."

At Washington's rookie camp, Papale had his name written in magic marker on a piece of tape on his helmet but didn't get too much flak from other players because they didn't know much about him. Vinny said most people think the movie is about his grandfather, anyway, but the attention didn't bother him.

Papale wanted attention for his play on the field and Redskins coach Jay Gruden came away im-

"He's a tough guy," Gruden said after Saturday's workout. "He runs everything hard and plays with a lot of passion without a doubt. Very similar to the movie."

Even though Papale wasn't among the six players the Redskins signed out of rookie camp, that doesn't mean he won't catch on somewhere.

"Invincible II" could be a real-life sequel if either Jay or brother Jon who coaches the Raiders — decides to sign this Papale. His father said the important thing is that "Vinny is his own man" who would get a job on his own merits.

"He's got talent, and I'm just hoping that somebody out there like Jay or like Jon sees what he's got and gives him a shot," Vince said.

Vinny Papale was invited to the Eagles' pre-draft pro day, but his father said it doesn't matter what color the uniform is as long as the NFL dream materializes. If that's Redskins burgundy and gold, Vince is on board with that, even though he'll always have a connection to the

Vince said his son wants to go into special forces if the NFL doesn't happen. But with two tryouts down, his family is optimistic.

"I'm very confident that he's going to get that opportunity," Vince said. "God bless that person or team that gives him the shot because they won't be disappointed."
