# Railroads are not playgrounds

Railroad safety is crucial, stresses Big Spring Rail Systems engineer

Trains crossing the roads we drive on

are becoming a more common sight in Big Spring and across Howard County, thanks in large part to Big Spring Rail System Inc., a local company which operates and maintains rail lines around Big Spring to provide transport to and from the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark and local businesses that utilize it. The infrastructure of Big Spring Rail has proved a major economic boon to the area, but the increased rail traffic is causing some safety concerns, and the staff of Big Spring Rail reminds everyone to exercise caution and common sense around rail lines.

"We've been in business...it'll be seven years, and still to this day, we hear

"This is a sewer line that has been giving the city of Big Spring trouble as of late," said Bowles. "It's over there near Columbia and 700, and then after 700, into the Wastewater Plant. It's one of our main feeders into our Wastewater Plant. We received three bids. The lowest bid came from Whitewater Construction out of Waco, Texas, for a total of \$314,300. The city would like to recommend them for the proj-

The council approved the bid recommendation unanimously.

In his introduction of Bowles, Darden said the new Public Works director was raised locally and received his engineering education at Texas Tech Univer-

"About Every Five Days, a Child Dies From a Train Collision." The article makes the point that about 75 kids every year die because of collisions with trains. Many of the safety tips offered in that article are similar to those Gambrell shared: Only cross railroads at designated crossings and don't be tempted to walk along the railroad tracks. In addition:

• If lights are flashing or the gate is down at a railroad crossing, wait for the train to pass completely before crossing. It is never okay to rush across and try to beat the train. Trains may be closer and faster than you think. • If you are using a cell phone, headphones or a

game, remember: heads up, devices down when you cross the tracks.

"Railroads and train tracks are nothing to mess around with," Gambrell said, acknowledging that movies and television shows often portray characters walking or playing on railroad tracks as safe and fun. "Here a couple of years ago, I got a call. I was working a crossing, and we had a couple of young girls who were dancing and doing moves on the tracks. And we were moving trains. Thank God I was in a position...I was able to find the girls' parents and visited with them. I got that taken care of, but we don't always get an opportunity to do a oneon-one with people who are violating or who have been trespassing.'

Gambrell said BSR is more than happy to arrange organized tours of their facility and trains, and Gambrell said she would love to come out and give talks about railroad safety.

"I'm working on getting certified with Operation

Lifesaver. I'm not there yet, but if anyone would like me to come to their organization or their school or their college, or anywhere, I can talk about it just from being an engineer, being a conductor, just working for a railroad.'

# Lady Hawks selected for conference and region honors

BIG SPRING - Success is no stranger for the Howard College Hawk Softball Team and this year is no different. After bringing home their fifth consecutive Western Junior College Athletic Conference (WJCAC) championship, the Hawks fought hard to win the Regional Tournament and secured their fifth straight trip to the NJCAA Division I National Tournament in St.

In addition, the Hawks landed eight student athletes on the WJ-CAC All Conference and Region V West All Region softball teams for their efforts in the 2018-2019 season.

Headlining the list is the unanimous selection of shortstop Amanda Gonzalez as both the Conference and Region Most Valuable Player (MVP). Gonzalez was also selected to the Infield All Conference and All

Heading into the regional tournament, Gonzalez was 1st in the nation in a row. in RBIs (94) and home runs (27) and was 5th in the nation in batting average with .527.



# Astros rout Tigers 11-4, extend winning streak to 7

DETROIT — The Houston Astros are making these games pretty enjoyable for their starting pitchers.

Carlos Correa started another Houston onslaught with a three-run homer in the first inning, and the Astros routed the Detroit Tigers 11-4 on Tuesday night, extending their winning streak to seven games. Wade Miley won his third straight start. This was the fourth time this season Houston has scored at least 10 runs in a game he pitched.

"It's like I'm a fan," Miley said. "It's like they should charge us a ticket price to sit where we sit and get to

watch this.' The Astros, who have won 10 of 11, scored in each of the first six innings against a depleted Detroit pitching staff. George Springer hit an insidethe-park homer in the fifth, and Aledmys Diaz went deep in the third for Houston.

Miley (4-2) allowed four runs in six innings for the Astros. Houston led 7-0 after its half of the third.





# This Date In History

#### Today in History

Today is Wednesday, May 15, the 135th day of 2019. There are 230 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 15, 1930, registered nurse Ellen Church, the first airline stewardess, went on duty aboard an Oakland-to-Chicago flight operated by Boeing Air Transport, a forerunner of United Airlines. On this date:

In 1567, Mary, Queen of Scots, married her third husband, James Hepburn, the Earl of Bothwell, who had been implicated in (but acquitted of) the death of Mary's second husband, Lord Darnley.

In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln signed an act establishing the Department of Agriculture.

In 1918, U.S. airmail began service between Washington, D.C., Philadelphia and New York.

In 1940, DuPont began selling its nylon stockings nationally. The original Mc-Donald's restaurant was opened in San Bernardino, California, by Richard and Maurice McDonald.

In 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed a measure creating the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps, whose members came to be known as WACs. Wartime gasoline rationing went into effect in 17 Eastern states, limiting sales to three gallons a week for non-essential vehicles. In 1948, hours after declaring

its independence, the new state of Israel was attacked by Transjordan, Egypt, Syria,

Iraq and Lebanon. In 1963, Weight Watchers was incorporated in New

York.

In 1968, two days of tornado outbreaks began in 10 Midwestern and Southern states; twisters were blamed for 72 deaths, including 45 in Ar-

kansas and 18 in Iowa. In 1972, Alabama George C. Wallace was shot and left paralyzed while campaigning for president in Laurel, Maryland, by Arthur H. Bremer, who served 35 years for attempted murder. In 1975, U.S. forces invaded the Cambodian island of

Koh Tang and captured the

American merchant ship Mayaguez, which had been seized by the Khmer Rouge. (All 39 crew members had already been released safely by Cambodia; some 40 U.S. servicemen were killed in connection with the operation.)

In 1988, the Soviet Union began the process of withdrawing its troops from Afghanistan, more than eight years after Soviet forces entered the country. In 2008, California's Supreme Court declared same-

sex couples in the state could marry — a victory for the gay rights movement that was overturned the following November by the passage of Proposition 8, which was ultimately struck down by the courts. Ten years ago: General Motors told about 1,100 dealers their franchises would

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# Curry, Warriors take Game 1 of Western Conference finals

OAKLAND, Calif. — Stephen Curry had all kinds of room for a change and capitalized, finding his shooting touch in a hurry to get Golden State on a roll. Portland's defenders were too far back in the paint or a step behind all night.

"Practice shots," Trail Blazers star Damian Lillard said of Curry's wide-open chances.

So far, the Warriors are showing they can keep winning until Kevin Durant gets healthy.

Making it look easy again, Curry knocked down nine 3-pointers on his way to 36 points, leading the two-time defending champions past the Trail Blazers 116-94 on Tuesday night in Game 1 of the Western Conference finals.

"I know what I'm capable of on the floor. The situation calls for me to be a little bit more aggressive and hopefully that'll continue," said Curry, who came in shooting 37.1% the last series and got off to a good start tonight. I want to maintain that. Every game is different, you've got to re-establish yourself. That's my perspective no matter how I play."

Curry shot 12 for 23 in his fourth 30-point performance this postseason, finding far more open looks than he had in the last round against Houston. The two-time NBA MVP outplayed the Portland duo of Lillard and CJ McCollum, who combined to go 11 for 31 against a strong Golden State

"It's good to see Steph have a game like that at a time that obviously we need him most," Draymond Green

Klay Thompson had 26 points, including a late one-handed slam. Green established the energy on both ends early for the well-rested Warriors, finishing with 12 points, 10 rebounds, five assists, three blocks and two steals.

Lillard scored 19 points back home

> in Oakland, just miles away from where he grew up. He appreciated all the support but wants to stick to basketball.

"That's part of what makes it special, I'm from here," Lillard said. "I could walk home from here if I wanted to, that tells you how close it is."

McCollum had 17 and missed five of his six 3s as the cold-shooting Blazers went just 7 for 28 from long range.

Game 2 is Thursday night, and the Warriors are unlikely to have Durant back from a strained right calf. An update on Durant's status is expected that day once the two-time reigning NBA Finals MVP is re-examined.

"I think we played a terrible game and we still had a chance going into the fourth quarter," McCollum said, "so we need to tighten some things up and look forward to the game on Thursday."

Curry came off screens with authority and matched his postseason career high for 3s, also accomplished in Game 1 of last year's finals against Cleveland. He found his groove far earlier than in the Game 6 clincher at Houston on Friday night, when he scored all 33 of his points in the second half.

Little brother Seth struggled with three points for Portland, which shot 36.1% overall.

"It's not one-and-done. We've got a series, it's one loss," Blazers coach Terry Stotts said. "We've got to play better, particularly at the offensive end, but we've got to be better at both ends."

Lillard hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 6.3 seconds remaining in overtime Dec. 27 in his last regularseason game at Oracle Arena. He averaged 28.3 points and 6.5 assists in four regular-season games against Golden State this season.

He arrived for Game 1 in a custom Oakland Athletics baseball jersey having averaged 30 points in his nine previous playoff matchups against

Green has at least 10 rebounds in six straight playoff games, matching his postseason career-best streak of six also done last year.

"This series is going to get tougher and tougher," Green said.

FAMILY AFFAIR

Between warmup shots, Seth Curry stole a glance to the other end as his big brother went through his own pregame routine. Back in the locker room, Stephen

Curry said, "That was wild." Then, he joked, "Only me and Seth are going to score, the whole series." The Currys became the first broth-

ers to ever face off in a conference final and the first in any round since Marc Gasol for the Grizzlies against Pau Gasol and the Spurs in the first round of the 2017 playoffs.

"I caught myself a couple times looking up in the stands at my parents," Stephen Curry said.

ON THE ROAD

Coach Steve Kerr certainly "The schedule favored us but I

thought we took advantage of the situation and got off to a good start," Kerr said. The Blazers traveled straight to the

Bay Area from Denver after winning Game 7 on Sunday rather than return to Portland.

"Denver seems like a week ago now," Stotts said.

# Royals score early, blow out Rangers 11-5 in series opener

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Nicky Lopez rewarded the few thousand Kansas City Royals fans that stuck around through a game that stretched well past 3 in their 11-5 rout of the Texas Rangers on Tuesday

But as he gazed up from first base, the Royals' top prospect found the ones that mattered most.

"I saw my family up there," he said, "and that's how I always imagined it."

Lopez, who was called up from Triple-A Omaha earlier in the day, was hardly the only Royals player to take some productive swings against the Rangers. Hunter Dozier drove in three runs, and Alex Gordon and Jorge Soler drove in two apiece, as the

Royals scored nine times in the first two innings.

They quickly knocked out Shelby Miller (1-3), who was pulled with two outs in the second after he allowed eight runs on seven hits in two walks in another ugly post-Tommy John performance.

Danny Duffy (2-1) was only marginally better for Kansas City, using 107 pitches just to survive five innings. He allowed four runs, seven hits and a walk while striking out

"You make a couple of bad pitches and all of a sudden they get four runs," Duffy said. "When my team gives me nine runs, it's a travesty to not go as long as I can.'

Rangers shortstop Elvis Andrus left with tightness in his right hamstring after grounding out to end the seventh inning. He will be evaluated again Wednesday in another blow to a team that has lost five straight to fall a season-worst five games below .500.

"We'll obviously evaluate him tomorrow," Rangers manager Chris Woodward said, "but he seems pretty optimistic. He hasn't had a hamstring problem before. We'll see when he wakes up tomorrow

The Royals pounced on Miller right from the start, sending seven to the plate in the first inning and jumping out to a 3-0 lead. But they cracked the game open in the second, when they sent 11 batters to the plate and drove in six runs against Miller and Rangers reliever Wei-Chieh Huang.

The stunning offensive outburst came after Kansas City managed six singles and no extra-base hits in a loss to the Phillies on Sunday. And it came after the arrival of Lopez, who got the start at second base and hit second behind Whit Merrifield in the lineup.

Lopez walked in the third before his first career

hit made it a memorable night. "Nicky had some great at-bats," Royals manager Ned Yost said. "I was glad to see Nicky get his first hit. That's under his belt and now he can move for-

ward." Joey Gallo had a pair of RBIs for the Rangers, who tried to climb back into the game with a four-run third. But they stranded runners in four consecutive innings, repeatedly failing to get the crucial hit they needed to avoid a 1-6 start to their nine-game, 10-day road trip.

"They put some runs together. They put some big innings together," said Miller, whose ERA ballooned to 9.51 this season. "It's disappointing. I feel like I let my team down big-time."

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
