# West Texas VA honors peace officers

peace officers who paid the ultimate sacrifice and gave recognition to those who are currently serving. "We are here to memorialize those who gave the ultimate sacrifice. As a peace officer you never know if

you will make it home at the end of a shift," VA Chief of Police said during the ceremony. President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation desig-

nating May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day in 1962. Over the years, the day has grown into a week-long series of events honoring law enforcement, where tens of thousands law enforcement officers from around the world participate in the celebration.

"The trend has stayed constant for the past several

years, with 175 lives lost in the line of duty in 2017, 163 in 2018 and thus far, this year 35, with 18 of those being to gunfire related deaths," VA Chief of Police said.

As part of the memorial ceremony, special recognition was given to Howard County Sheriff Stan Parker and Big Spring Chief of Po-

partnership with the West Texas VA. The guest of honor was Howard County Emergency Services Chaplain Corps Senior Chaplain Joel Miller.

"Have you ever stopped and thought where we would be today without law enforcement?," Sheriff Stan

#### **Moss Creek Lake** reopens after infrastructure work

The City of Big Spring's recreational facility at Moss Creek Lake is open to the public once again.

The area had been closed while the city installed infrastructure improvements, and reopened this past Friday.

"The city had done some infrastructure improvements out at Moss Lake," said Community Services Director Hayley Herrera. "The city had to drain the lake to do those improvements back in February, and those improvements are now finished. The lake is now open. It reopened on Friday, May 10."

Colorado River Municipal Water District Director John Grant explained that the improvements were on the CRMWD's end. "CRMWD has a pump station just

below the dam, and there's a pipeline that runs from that pump station up into the dam, so that we can get water out," Grant said. "We did not have a valve in that line between the lake and the pump station so that we could isolate it...basically, shut it off in case we needed to do some work on it. Back in February and March we put in a valve."

Since the valve was replaced, the lake has been being refilled, and the city has been doing some clean up work, Grant said.

Moss Creek Lake is open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. There are several ways visitors can

make use of the lake. Entry permits

are available on a day entry basis at \$3 per vehicle plus 50 cents per person, not to exceed \$5. Children 12 and under or 65 and older receive free entry, and day permits expire at 10 p.m. on the day purchased.

Overnight camping is available at a cost of \$9 per vehicle, and camping permits expire at noon on the following day.

Usually, recreational vehicle hookups are available at the lake; however those are still being worked on at the present time, and are not currently available. When work is complete, full hookups including water, sewer and electricity will be \$15 per day, while hookups providing only water and electricity will be \$12 per day. RV hookup permits will expire at noon the following day.

Visitors can add boat or jet ski launch permits to any of the above permits for an additional \$2 per day, and they expire at the same time as the entry permit.

A motorcycle course is available at the lake. Use of the course is \$5 per day in addition to the cost of any entry permit.

Motorcycle permits expire at the same time as the entry permit.

Moss Creek Lake also offers a yearly permit for \$100, which includes day entry, boat launch, and camping; and is limited to immediate family members residing in the same household.



# Jimmy Carter to teach Sunday school days after breaking hip



ATLANTA (AP) — Former President Jimmy Carter plans to teach Sunday school this weekend just days after undergoing surgery for a broken hip, a spokeswoman said Thursday.

Carter, 94, was released Thursday morning from a Georgia hospital after getting a hip replacement. He plans to continue recuperating at his home in rural Plains, said a statement from Carter spokeswoman Deanna Congileo.

Carter's wife, Rosalynn Carter, went home with her husband after she was admitted to the hospital Wednesday for observation and testing after she "felt faint," Cong-

ileo said. "Both President and Mrs. Carter extend their thanks to the many people who sent well wishes the past few days," Congileo's statement

Carter has been released from a Georgia hospital after hip replacement surgery. A spokeswoman for Carter says former first lady Rosalynn Carter also was hospitalized Wednesday, May 15, 2019, in Americus after feeling faint but was discharged Thursday, May 16 along with her husband. The 94-year-old former president injured his hip earlier this week when he fell at his home before a planned turkey hunt.

Jimmy Carter suffered a broken hip Monday as he was leaving to go turkey hunting. Congileo said he will undergo physical therapy as part of his recovery.

She said Carter also plans to teach his regular Sunday school class this weekend at Maranatha Baptist Church in Plains.

Carter became the longest-lived president in U.S. history in March when his age surpassed that of for mer President George H.W. Bush, who died Nov. 30 at the age of 94 vears, 171 days.

Nearly four years have passed since Carter revealed he had been diagnosed with cancer. Carter said in August 2015 he had melanoma that had spread to his liver and brain. He received treatment for seven months until scans showed no sign of the disease.

# Something to think about... "Dad, check out how much my plants have grown!"

Ephraim, our oldest child, loves planting seeds and watching them grow. He is fascinated by the entire process. All of the kids brought home various seeds and plants this spring, but Ephraim has been the one watering and caring for them. He has become a pretty good gardener.

On Mother's Day, we drove around town to look at all the wildflowers growing in the area. It is amazing to see the ground come to life with vibrant colors in the spring time. Sara loves looking at all the wild beauty around us. God's creation is simply spectacular. Better than any bouquet I could buy her at the store, at least, that's what I keep telling

The only difference between the fields of wild flowers and a garden is that one has a gardener to tend to it. Watching Ephraim care for his plants made me reflect on a basic reality; the gardener determines what seeds to plant and what fruit will grow in the garden. And the gardener will uproot what he doesn't want growing in his garden.

What is growing in your life? Who is gardening your heart? Paul talks about this spiritual principle in Galatians 5, and it is interesting the way that Eugene Peterson translates this well known passage:

"It is obvious what kind of life develops out of trying to get your own way all the time: repetitive, loveless, cheap sex; a stinking accumulation of mental and emotional garbage; frenzied and joyless grabs for happiness; trinket gods; magic-show religion; paranoid loneliness; cutthroat competition; all-consuming-yet-never-satisfied wants; a brutal temper; an impotence to love or be loved; divided homes and divided lives; smallminded and lopsided pursuits; the vicious habit of depersonalizing everyone into a rival; uncontrolled and uncontrollable addictions; ugly parodies of community. I could go on.'

"This isn't the first time I have warned you, you know. If you use your freedom this way, you will not inherit God's kingdom."

"But what happens when we live God's way? He brings gifts into our lives, much the same way that fruit appears in an orchard—things like affection for others, exuberance about life, serenity. We develop a willingness to stick with things, a sense of compassion in the heart, and a conviction that a basic holiness permeates things and people. We find ourselves involved in loyal commitments, not needing to force our way in life, able to marshal and direct our energies wisely." ~ Galatians 5:19-23 The Message

Who is gardening your heart? What is growing in your life? "Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit." May we be a people who put our lives in the flow of God's Spirit finding His fruit growing within us that we might offer this good fruit for the world.

# Windows honoring Baptist leader in Texas removed from chapel

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Stained-glass windows honoring some religious leaders who helped shift the Southern Baptist Convention to a more conservative stance have been removed from a Texas chapel.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported Wednesday that the windows featured dismissed Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary President Paige Patterson. He was fired last May amid criticism of his responses to rape allegations made years apart by two students.

The MacGorman Chapel win-

Seminary board officials criticized Patterson for his email to campus security in 2015 saying he wanted to meet alone with a student who said she'd been raped, to "break her down."

Patterson also was criticized for contradictory responses about his review of a student's rape allegation in 2003 at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in North Carolina.







Remember the song, "In the jungle, the mighty jungle, the lion sleeps tonight."? But what if the lion doesn't sleep tonight? What if the lion is on the

prowl and wants to destroy?

That's exactly what we face as believers. We have a brutal, destructive, unrelenting, deadly enemy, as Peter described for us in 1 Peter 5:8-9: "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. Resist him, steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same sufferings are experienced by your

Devour is a very strong word that means to gulp down. How does the Devil seek to devour Christians? He wants to make you a weak, anemic, ineffective believer. He wants to get you so weighed down and distracted with everything else in life that you don't think about advancing the kingdom of God.

Because of this, your enemy can't just be ignored. Satan can and must be dealt with head on, and he can be defeated. Here are three things you can do to see that happen, according to the verses above:

- 1. Be sober. The concept of being sober is used here metaphorically to mean be mentally or spiritually sober, be self-controlled and disciplined. The battle begins in the mind (see Proverbs 23:7), so you have to think clearly.

  2. Be vigilant. This means be alert and on the
- lookout. Watch out for attacks in weak areas where you are prone to fall and are easily tempted. You know what they are, and so does Satan. Don't get in a compromising position or situation where you would be more apt to yield than to resist.

3. Be resolute. Verse 9 says to "resist him" (see also James 4:7) and remain "steadfast in the faith", in the truth embodied in Scripture. This means

you have to know your Bible, as Jesus did when the Devil assaulted Him (see Matthew 4:1-10).

Cameras and cell phones light up stadiums and auditoriums with bursts of light as proud parents try to capture the magic of the moment. Our grandson graduates from high school May 19 in Sundance, Wyoming. Presidents, principals, guest speakers, and valedictorians will

speak of new horizons, a future yet to be written, a world to be  $\overline{B_{ILL}}$  changed. They will urge those who have reached this achievement to believe in themselves and to never stop learning. Every graduate that walks across the stage to shake hands with

administrators and receive their diploma has a unique story. Few are as unique as Helen Small. Helen dropped out of college as a freshman in 1938 to marry her sweetheart, help fight a war, and raise a family. 70 years later, at 88, she earned her bachelor's degree in 2007. In 2010, when she was 90 years old, she graduated with a Masters of Science degree

In 2011, she published a book, Why not? My Seventy Year Plan for a College Degree. One of her teachers, Dr. John Santrock, a professor of psychology, said, "What especially stands out about Helen, as a student, is how appreciative she is of the opportunity to learn." Commenting on her college experience as a 90 year-old, Helen said, "It's helped me start a whole new phase of life." Helen remained active, teaching, organizing, and encouraging until her death two years ago at 97.

Graduation commencements inspire us because they not only recognize significant achievement, they celebrate new beginnings, new possibilities and opportunities, or, as Helen said, the start of a new phase of life. Education offers, to the young, the opportunity to acquire knowledge and skills that equip them for the future. For those who are older, it offers the opportunity to retool, to start over, to pursue new dreams.

Nothing is as important for a new start on life as a spiritual transformation that connects us with God and places in our hearts the values that make life meaningful. Proverbs says, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge." (Proverbs 1:7). In Ezekiel, God said, "I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your

heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh." (Ezekiel

God is always about new beginnings. He offers, to the young, the opportunity to launch their lives on the path that leads to life, and, to those who are older, the opportunity to wipe the slate clean and start over. # Rangers belt 5 home runs in 16-1 rout of Royals

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Rougned Odor and the rest of the Texas Rangers had been using the Kansas City Royals' beleaguered pitching staff for batting practice most of the sunsplashed afternoon.

Then the Rangers used Kansas City's backup second baseman for it,

One of Odor's two homers came off Chris Owings, who was summoned by the Royals in the eighth inning to try to close out the 16-1 blowout Thursday. Hunter Pence also went deep off the utility man as Texas hit five homers in all, piled up 21 hits and won the rubber game of the three-game series.

"We've done a good job of salvaging the last couple of games," said Lance Lynn, who earned the win with a strong start that ultimately got lost amid the barrage of runs.

"For me, I have a chance to ride a loss or a win from the night before," he said. "That's always my motto. Whatever happened the night before I want to get the team going."

Calhoun and Joey Gallo each homered among their four hits, and Danny Santana also had four knocks, though some of that damage came off a utilityman. Royals manager Ned Yost wanted to save his bullpen for an upcoming road trip, so he called Owings off the bench in the eighth in-

"I told him, 'Look, don't be stupid," Yost said, "but he did a great job of saving our 'pen."

Lynn (5-3) allowed a run in the first but little else over the next six innings as the Rangers won their first road series in nine tries. Their last one came last September in San Diego.

Homer Bailey (4-4) allowed six runs, eight hits and four walks in an allaround dismal day for the Kansas City pitching staff. Brad Boxberger coughed up three runs in relief of him as the Royals lost the rubber game of a series for the 13th consecutive time dating to last season.

Kansas City actually struck in the first when youngster Nicky Lopez, capping a solid debut series, hit the first of his two doubles and Adalberto Mondesi followed with a sacrifice fly. But Lynn and the Rangers controlled the game the rest of the way.

They pulled even on Gallo's homer to left leading off the fourth, then battered Bailey and the bullpen by sending five runs across during the decisive fifth inning.

It started with a leadoff walk to Isaih Kiner-Falefa, continued with consecutive singles by Danny Santana, Calhoun and Nomar Mazara, and included two more walks by Bailey

that sent in a run. The veteran right-hander was finally vanked from the game, and Brad Boxberger appeared to have the Royals out of the inning when he induced Odor to hit a groundball. First baseman Ryan O'Hearn was able to field the ball cleanly but threw it away. keeping their misery going.

"There was a couple of hits. We missed being in the right spot cutoffwise, trying to hold the game right there," Yost said. "Brought in Boxberger and throwing error broke it open for them."

Texas pushed across three more runs in the sixth, drawing a trio of walks off Boxberger and former closer Wily Peralta. It was the second straight inning the Rangers batted through the order.

"It's kind of what we've been doing all year," Rangers manager Chris Woodward said. "It was a 1-1 game going into the fifth. Homer Bailey was doing OK at that point. Those at-bats (in the fifth) kind of set the tone for the rest of the game. Big hits, big walks. That's something we pride ourselves on. If you get a good pitch, take a rip.

If not, let the next guy do it.' NICE JOB, NICKY

Lopez was the Royals' lone bright spot. Along with an RBI double, the 24-vear-old rookie doubled in the third and drew a walk in the sixth while playing solid defense at solid

# Warriors rally from 15 down at halftime, hold off Blazers

OAKLAND, Calif. — These Golden State Warriors have long been able to score in fabulous, jaw-dropping flurries. Down by eight to the Portland Trail Blazers at home with  $4\frac{1}{2}$ minutes to go, they needed every last burst, perfect pass, driving layup and dunk.

"Our experience really paid off for us tonight having a bunch of guys who just won't quit," said Draymond Green, who was right smack in the middle of it all.

Stephen Curry scored 37 points, and the Warriors rallied from a 15-point halftime deficit before holding off Portland on the final possession for a 114-111 win Thursday night and a 2-0 lead in the Western Conference finals.

Golden State coach Steve Kerr insisted his team stole this game with a sensational final few minutes and another, familiar third-quarter out-

Counterpart Terry Stotts of the Trail Blazers considered it a "lost op-

portunity" on the road. CJ McCollum missed a driving

jumper with 32 seconds left and Green scored on the other end for the Warriors, giving Portland one final chance with 12.3 seconds to go. Andre Iguodala then blocked a 3-point attempt by Damian Lillard on the left

"They stole it, but they earned it down the stretch," McCollum said.

Seth Curry, Steph's little brother, scored 16 points and put Portland ahead on a 3-pointer with 1:03 left before Kevon Looney's dunk on the other end put Golden State back on top at 112-111. Seth tried to "distract" his brother at the free throw line late, or so the story went from Steph, who called Seth a "pest" on defense.

"This was like the coolest experience I think I've ever had playing against him. You talk about the stage, he was amazing tonight," Stephen Curry said. "For my parents, I know we've talked about it the whole series, these last two games it's probably nerve-wracking as heck for them. It worked out perfectly tonight. He

played well and we won." Stephen Curry shot 11 for 22 and made all 11 of his free throws — three

# Contract Bridg

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been: West North East South Pass Pass Pass

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands? 1. ★ KJ85 ♥ AJ763 ◆ 10 ♣ 943 2. ♠ K74 ♥ KQ64 ♦ J3 ♣ AJ92 3. ♠ A82 ♥ AK962 ♦ K86 ♣ 73 4. ♠ A ♥ QJ975 ♠ Q74 ♣ J1062

1. Pass. Once partner rebids two diamonds, it becomes clear that there is no game in this hand, so the only question remaining is where to play

The two-diamond rebid identifies a hand of minimum opening strength with a rebiddable diamond suit, nearly always six or seven cards in length. Partner cannot be keen about hearts since he failed to raise them immediately. He also cannot have four spades since he did not bid one spade over one heart.

Any further move over two diamonds would therefore be asking for trouble, so you should get out of the bidding while you still have a chance for a plus score.

2. Three notrump. An opening bid facing an opening bid equals game, and all signs here point to the game being in notrump. With 14 high-card points, notrump distribu-

tion and all suits stopped, no other

bid should be considered.

A two-notrump response at this point would not be forcing, while a three-club bid, though forcing, runs the risk of partner's venturing past three notrump at his next turn.

3. Two spades. This is a special bid designed to find the best place to play for game, which could be in hearts, diamonds or notrump. If partner next bids hearts or diamonds you will bid game in that suit. If partner bids two notrump, indicating at least one club stopper, you plan to raise to three.

If by any chance partner raises spades, which is quite unlikely since he cannot have four cards in that suit, you can always retreat to diamonds. 4. Three diamonds. This bid invites but does not force partner to


continue bidding. Game is unlikely if he passes. If partner bids again, he may show belated heart support by bidding

three hearts, in which case you will carry on to four hearts. If he bids three notrump, you will accept that If partner bids four diamonds, you will be faced with a toss-up decision as to whether to bid five diamonds or

pass. If partner has ♠ 962 ♥ K3 ♠ AK10863 ♣ A4, five diamonds is an excellent spot, while if he has ★ KQ3 ♥ 6 ◆ AKJ8652 ♣ 94, five diamonds has no play.





## This Date In History

#### Today in History

Today is Friday, May 17, the 137th day of 2019. There are 228 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On May 17, 2004, Massachusetts became the first state to allow same-sex marriages. On this date:

In 1536, Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Cranmer declared the marriage of England's King Henry VIII to Anne Boleyn invalid after she failed to produce a male heir; Boleyn, already for high was executed two days later.

In 1792, the New York Stock Exchange had its beginnings as a group of brokers met under a tree on Wall Street and signed the Buttonwood Agreement.

In 1946, President Harry S. Truman seized control of the nation's railroads, delaying - but not preventing - a threatened strike by engineers and train-

In 1954, a unanimous U.S. Supreme Court handed down its Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka decision which held that racially segregated public schools were inherently unequal, and therefore unconsti-

In 1968, nine men and women, including brothers Daniel and Philip Berrigan, entered the Selective Service office in Catonsville, Maryland, seized several hundred draft files and burned them outside to protest the Vietnam War before being arrested. (The "Catonsville Nine," as they came to be known, received federal prison sentences ranging from 24 to 42 months.)

In 1973, a special committee convened by the U.S. Senate began its televised hearings into the Watergate scandal.

In 1980, rioting that claimed 18 lives erupted in Miami's Liberty City after an all-white jury in Tampa acquitted four former Miami police officers of fatally beating black insurance execu-

tive Arthur McDuffie. In 1987, 37 American sailors were killed when an Iraqi warplane attacked the U.S. Navv frigate Stark in the Persian Gulf. (Iraq apologized for the attack, calling it a mistake, and paid more than \$27 million in com-

pensation.) În 1996, President Bill Clinton signed a measure requiring neighborhood notification when sex offenders move in. ("Megan's Law," as it's known, was named for Megan Kanka, a 7-year-old New Jersey girl who was raped and murdered in

In 2002, former President Jimmy Carter ended a historic visit to Cuba sharply at odds with the Bush administration over how to deal with Fidel Castro, saying limits on tourism and trade often hurt Americans more than

In 2006, the FBI began digging

Five years ago: Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper signed a "Right To Try" bill allowing terminally ill patients to obtain experimental drugs without getting federal approval. Thousands of cheering supporters welcomed Narendra Modi, India's next prime minister, on his arrival in New Delhi after leading his party to a staggering victory in national elections. California Chrome won the Preakness to keep alive his bid for horse racing's first Triple Crown since 1978 (California Chrome would finish tied for fourth in the Belmont three weeks later.)

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. (AP) Brooks Koepka had a record-setting start to his title defense in the PGA Championship.

Koepka delivered a 7-under 63 Thursday, making him the first player in 101 years of the PGA Championship to shoot that score twice. He broke the course record at Bethpage Black and became the first player to post 63 at a major in consecutive years.

It gave him only a one-shot lead when Danny Lee birdied his last two holes in the afternoon for a 64. Tommy Fleetwood is four shots off the lead after an opening 67.

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Warriors star Kevin Durant will miss the upcoming Games 3 and 4 of the Western Conference finals for Golden State in Portland as he continues to recover from a strained right calf.

Durant was re-evaluated Thursday before Game 2 of the best-ofseven series with the Trail Blazers and is not ready for on-court work examined in another week.

The Warriors said Durant "has shown good progress since beginning his rehabilitation program one week ago. At this point, Durant is not ready to advance to on-court work."

HOCKEY

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Tuukka Rask posted his seventh career playoff shutout, and the Boston Bruins swept the Carolina Hurricanes out of the Eastern Conference final, winning 4-0 on Thursday night to reach their third Stanley Cup Final in nine Rask made 24 saves in his second

straight series-clinching shutout. Patrice Bergeron scored two goals, David Pastrnak had a goal and two assists and Brad Marchand added an empty-netter. Both Bergeron and Pastrnak scored on second-period power The Bruins won their seventh

straight postseason game — their longest playoff winning streak in nearly half a century — to return to the Cup final after winning it in 2011 and losing to Chicago two years later. On its longest postseason win streak

since reeling off nine straight in 1972, Boston earned a break before taking on the West winner. San Jose leads its series with St. Louis 2-1 heading into Game 4 Friday night.

NEW YORK (AP) — Jim Schoenfeld nas resigned as vice president and assistant general manager of the New York Rangers.

The former NHL defenseman and coach spent 17 seasons in the Rangers' organization, serving in a variety of roles. He spent most of that time as general manager of the AHL's Hartford franchise, which he also coached for two seasons.

The Rays got Kratz and cash considerations from the Giants for a player to be named or cash considerations.

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Maximum Security jockey Luis Saez has appealed his 15-day suspension by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission.

He says the stewards' penalty for failing to control the horse in the Kentucky Derby is "unduly harsh and not supportable by facts and law." The rider also seeks to stay his suspension pending appeal to fulfill riding commitments.

Maximum Security was first across the line at the Derby at Churchill Downs on May 4 before stewards disqualified the colt to 17th for impeding the paths of several horses. Stewards suspended Saez this week after ruling that he did not "make the proper effort to maintain a straight course" and caused the interference and disqualification. The suspension covers racing dates from May 23 to June 14.

Saez's appeal filed Wednesday states that under Kentucky racing law, a foul is not determined as chargeable to the jockey.

COLLEGE BASKETBALL

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — TCU running back Sewo Olonilua, who set a school bowl record with 194 yards

rushing in a victory over California last season, has been arrested on drug possession charges. The Walker County Sheriff's De-

partment said Thursday that Olonilua is facing third-degree felony charges of possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of a controlled substance weighing more than 1 gram and less than 4 grams. Olonilua was arrested Tuesday and released on \$4,000 bond a day later. The 21-year-old Olonilua, who

graduated Saturday with a season of eligibility remaining, is expected to be a key part of the TCU backfield this year. The school said it was aware of Olonilua's arrest and looking into it.

Among conclusions from an investigation into one of those episodes was that WADA leaders need to undergo mandatory training "to help sensitize members as to how culture and gender differences and perceptions can affect communication."

That recommendation came as part of a 58-page report into athletes' chair Beckie Scott's allegations of bullying. The report, delivered to the WADA foundation board Thursday, offered the latest illustration of how the largely white, largely male Olympic aristocracy can come off as tone-deaf and not fully aware of the needs of athletes and others in the movement.

OBITUARY

SEATTLE (AP) — A College Football Hall of Fame member and the first two-time MVP of the Rose Bowl has died. Bob Schloredt was 79.

The University of Washington issued a statement announcing the death on Thursday night on behalf of Schloredt's family.

Schloredt led Washington to consecutive Rose Bowl victories following the 1959 and 1960 seasons. Schloredt shared MVP honors with George Fleming in first Rose Bowl victory over Wisconsin. A year later, the Huskies beat No. 1 Minnesota 17-7 and Schloredt had one touchdown rushing and one passing to earn MVP honors again.

Schloredt was a first-team AP all-American in 1959 as a two-way player. He led Washington with six interceptions that season.
