Council approves seeking RFPs for IP phone upgrade By ROGER CLINE been going to for about the last 15 years," is to do what we need to do so we can re-

The City of Big Spring took a step

closer to a phone system upgrade at Tuesday night's City Council meeting that could save the city more than \$150,000 a year. During the council's regular semi-

monthly meeting, Financial Director Don Moore outlined the benefits to the city of switching to an Internet Protocol phone system. "This is something that most organizations with multiple phone lines have

Moore told the council. "Fortunately for us, the price of the hardware has come down so much that this is a really good time. It used to take multiple years of the savings from going to an IP telephone system, because of the cost of the equipment. Now the equipment's come down to where it looks very feasible. It can all be done in one fiscal year. We received three quotes, just to get our feet wet and get a better understanding of it. These quotes would range from payback in about 8 to 12 1/2 months. The goal of this

ceive the savings from the phone lines, which is \$151,000 a year right now." In addition, Moore said the upgrade is

a good idea because the company that made the city's current phone system is out of business, and parts and repairs are hard to come by. "We have a real problem," he said.

"We had one day where it took 16 hours to fix. Some of the city offices were without phones for 16 hours. This will really eliminate all of that and put us on a new, See COUNCIL, Page 3



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

Geertje (Gert) Karwedsky



Described by her family as... strong, determined, funny, caring, unique, cheeky, ornery, honest, spunky, sarcastic, honorable, straightforward, giving, bold, creative, brash, genuine, adaptable, lovely, matriarch and mom, Gert encompassed all of these characteristics and more. She had a fun-loving spirit, a beautiful smile, and was "mom" to many. She enjoyed volunteering, knitting, crocheting, crystal hunting, collecting shells on the beach, and fishing. Gert was a homemaker, but she also worked at B.S.S.H., Wal-Mart, Howard College and Webb Air Force Base. She also worked with her husband, Bob, at Kerr-McGee gas station and AAA Storage. Despite humble beginnings, Gert always had a positive outlook.

Geertje (Gert) Karwedsky was born in Amsterdam, Holland on March 31, 1931, to Hendrik and Redika Akerboom. Her earliest memories were of happy times spent with her parents and brother, Hank, and extended family as they road their bikes, their main means of transportation, for picnics by the sea shore. Gert enjoyed hiking and swimming with a youth club. In 1938, her family started the paperwork process to come to the United States. By the time that the papers were ready, Germany was invading Europe, and their visas were cancelled leaving them behind to witness the invasion of their country, and her once carefree, childhood become one of survival in a city ravaged by war. At the tender age of nine, Gert and her mother scavenged for wood and coal, stood in rationing lines, and traded household items to local farmers for potatoes and grain. With food supplies becoming scarce, the family resorted to eating tulip bulbs, and the decision was made to send Gert, then 12, on a boat with hundreds of other children, to farms in north east Holland. She left not knowing if she would see her family again. She was taken in by a family with five children and the young "city girl" loved all the new experiences of living on a farm. With the liberation of Holland in 1945, Gert was reunited with her family, and they again began the process of immigrating to the United States. In 1947, they sailed to the United States aboard the Gripsolm from Sweden. They were met by their already naturalized American relatives and traveled to Green Bay, Wisconsin, where their new life would begin.

Gert could not speak any English when she arrived in the US and was required to attend a vocational school. She also worked in a cheese factory. To socialize, she and her brother joined a square dancing club where she met her future husband, Robert (Bob) Karwedsky. Born and raised in Green Bay, Wisconsin, Bob, too, had lived through the perils of WWll as

a seaman in the Navy aboard the battleship Wisconsin and the aircraft carrier USS Bennington CV20. Bob was in the active reserve after being released from the Navy in 1946.

Gert and Bob were married on Dec. 11, 1948. Two people from different parts of the world, speaking two different languages, united together for over 62 years until Bob's death in 2011. Bob joined the Air Force in 1951, and they started their military journey. They had one son and seven daughters and lived in seven states and Japan, always adapting and forever strengthening the bonds of their family.

The family first came to Big Spring, Texas, in 1964. While serving in the Washington D.C. area in the late 60's and early 70's, Gert and Bob opened their home to foster children. With the love and support of their six children still living at home, they loved and cared for seven foster children.

In 1970, Gert was honored, along with nine other Washington area foster mothers, at a tea hosted by then First Lady Pat Nixon. They were blessed with their youngest son who came into the family at three weeks of age through the foster care system and became a forever member of the family at age eight.

Bob retired from the Air Force in 1970, and, in 1974, they moved back to Big Spring, Texas, and later to Colorado City, Texas, where they were active at the Wallace (senior) Center. Gert and Bob shared their love of the outdoors with their children, and the family often went for Sunday drives, family camp-outs, or a day at the lake fishing. Gert and Bob loved to travel; Bob driving and Gert journaling about their trip. They camped from coast to coast, and, if their campsite was next to a fishing hole, then you would find them side by side, poles in hand and HAPPY!



really modern system."

Moore asked for, and the council unanimously approved, issuing a request for proposals to upgrade the city's phone system to an "IP Phone System," which would use Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) to communicate rather than standard phone

In other business, the council recognized KDC Associates, the architectural firm that designed the recent renovations to Big Spring's namesake, the Historic Spring in Comanche Trail Park, as well as the plaza and scenic overlook surrounding it; and architects Kelly Cook and Johnathan Pruessner, for receiving the Merit Award of Professional Achievement from the American Society of Landscape Architects for Outstanding Achievement for their work on the Spring Project.

The council also:

· Held public hearings on three zoning issues before approving each one unanimously. The first two involved a tract of land near the 1000 block of East FM 700. The land was rezoned from Single Family (SF-2) to Light Commercial (LC), and height and distance variances were granted for the construction of a wireless communications tower. The tower will carry signal for Sprint, T-Mobile and Verizon wireless services. The third issue involved a zoning change from Single Family (SF-2) to Single Family (SF-4) for a tract of land immediately east of the northeast corner of the Fordham Avenue/Monmouth Street intersection. The SF-4 designation the first in the city's history – is used for single-family residences such as twinhomes and townhomes.

· Approved granting City Manager Todd Darden authority to negotiate an agreement with the YMCA for aquatic activities. The council also appointed council members Doug Hartman and Camilla Strande to work with Darden on the negotiations. YMCA board member Raul Marquez was present and requested the negotiations.

 Approved granting the mayor authority to negotiate terms and conditions for the Big Spring Senior Center with the Health and Human Services Commission.

· Tabled a resolution amending tax abatement guidelines and criteria. The resolution would decrease administration fees for tax abatement applications.

 Approved the city's investment report for the quarter ending March 31,

Today in History Today is Wednesday, May 29, the 149th day of 2019. There are 216 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 29, 1953, Mount Everest was conquered as Edmund Hillary of New Zealand and Tensing Norgay of Nepal became the first climbers to reach the summit.

On this date:

In 1765, Patrick Henry denounced the Stamp Act before Virginia's House of Burgesses. In 1790, Rhode Island be-

came the 13th original colony to ratify the United States Constitution.

In 1848, Wisconsin became the 30th state of the union.

In 1914, the Canadian ocean liner RMS Empress of Ireland sank in the St. Lawrence River in eastern Quebec after colliding with the Norwegian cargo ship SS Storstad; of the 1,477 people on board the Empress of Ireland, 1,012 died. (The Storstad suffered only minor damage.)

In 1917, the 35th president of the United States, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, born in Brookline, Massachusetts.

In 1932, World War I veterans began arriving in Washington to demand cash bonuses they weren't scheduled to receive until 1945.

In 1954, English runner Diane Leather became the first woman to run a sub-fiveminute mile, finishing in 4:59.6 during the Midland Championships in Birming-

ham. In 1977, Janet Guthrie became the first woman to race in the Indianapolis 500, finishing in 29th place (the win-

ner was A.J. Foyt). In 1985, 39 people were killed at the European Cup Final in Brussels, Belgium, when rioting broke out and a wall separating British and Italian soccer fans collapsed. In 1988, President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev opened their historic summit in Moscow.

In 1998, Republican elder statesman Barry Goldwater died in Paradise Valley, Arizona, at age 89.

In 2008, the Vatican issued a decree stating that anyone trying to ordain a woman

as a priest and any woman who attempted to receive the ordination would incur automatic excommunication. Actor-comedian Harvey Korman, Emmy winner for "The Carol Burnett Show,"

died in Los Angeles at age

Ten years ago: A judge in Los Angeles sentenced music producer Phil Spector to 19 years to life in prison for the murder of actress Lana Clarkson. Jay Leno hosted "The Tonight Show" on NBC supposedly for the final time, giving up his desk to Conan O'Brien. (After a stint in

prime time, Leno returned to "Tonight" in March 2010, stepping down again in February 2014.) Five years ago: Saying he wanted kids to play sports but play safely, President Barack Obama called for more and better research into the effects and treatment of concussions in youth athletes during a summit at the White House. Mazara, Guzman homer, Rangers beat Mariners 11-4

SEATTLE — The pitching staff of the Texas Rangers isn't sold on the idea of using an opener instead of a traditional starting pitcher — yet.

The evidence continued to mount in favor or using an opener for the Rangers in an 11-4 win over the Seattle Mariners on Tuesday night.

The Rangers used reliever Jesse Chavez as the opener and brought in former starter Adrian Sampson in the second inning. The result: Texas snapped a three-game losing streak and improved to 3-1 this season using the approach and 6-3 since

"I don't think it ever puts the debate to rest," Texas manager Chris Woodward said. "I love to debate. I love arguments when it comes to this game. There are so many things that are changing in this game on a daily basis. It's just something I feel like it gives us . an advantage in the game I feel like. Nothing is black and white, but I think it has worked

So well, Woodward is emboldened to try it again Wednesday, sending Jose Leclerc to the mound with Drew Smyly scheduled to follow. And with success like this, why not?

Chavez struck out three of the four batters he faced, then turned the ball over to Sampson. The former Mariner worked five innings, allowing three runs and eight hits while striking out six. The two are thriving under the opener approach. Chavez has pitched 12 2/3 scoreless innings with six hits as an opener, with 16 strikeouts and three walks. And Sampson, a former Mariners pitcher, is 3-0 while following an opener. He also beat the Mariners 2-1 last week.

"My understanding is we're just trying to win a game and it's working," Sampson said. "I ask questions and they give me answers. Woody's always been up front with me . we have a lot of good communication and nobody's really caught off guard

Texas hitters backed up their pitchers with a seven-run fifth inning that included two-run hits by Hunter Pence and Asdrubel Cabrera and a threerun home run by Ronald Guzman that landed in the second deck in right field. The burst ended the night for Seattle starter Marco Gonzales (5-5), who gave up eight hits and eight runs (six earned) in four innings. The left-hander has lost five games in six appearances after starting the season 5-0. He

"Hopefully it helps," Servais said. "My guess is he's watching video or in the cage or doing something right now. But sometimes you sit and watch the game for a little bit.
