And in particular, violence against women. When artist Kim Lord opens her new exhibit, which she calls "Still Lives", it shows images of her portraying herself as famous murdered women. cole Brown Simpson. Author Maria Hummel explores the way that our society has made murder and violence seem beautiful. As the opening night of the exhibit begins, Maggie Richter doesn't know if it will be enough to pull the Rocque Museum out of debt. The crowds pour in as everyone is delightedly shocked by Kim Lord's art.

Suspicion immediately falls on Kim Lord's boyfriend, Greg Shaw Fergusen - who just happens to be Maggie's ex. As Maggie begins her own in-

The novel, Lives, is a thought provoking read that will have

the reader on the edge of their seat. From the meticulous description of the art exhibit, to the portrayal of the people in Maggie's world, Maria Hummel has written a fantastic novel that makes a great summer read. What I love about this story is


that Hummel has used her gift of storytelling to create a mystery that both entertains us and challenges us. I think that as a society, we

Still Lives was a Reese Witherspoon Book Club pick. It was also chosen as a Book of the Month Club book, and named the top new summer read by Time.

In addition to Still Lives, Maria Hummel has published Motherland and House and Fire. Motherland was named a San Francisco Chronicle Book of the Year. House and Fire, a collection of poetry, won the APR/Honickman prize. She has worked as a writer/editor at MOCA in Los Angeles. She received a Stegner Fellowship at Stanford University and has taught there for several years. Hummel works as an assistant professor at the University of Vermont. Kaser is someone to look up to for advice. His lesson, he said, was, "Take time and think — and don't get in such a hurry." That's something we might

consider the next time we rush absent-mindedly down a perilous flight of stairs.

But the bigger lesson from Kaser is not the easily learned one: the importance of staying calm in the face of catastrophe and carefully doing what must be done. "He was his own 911, his own pre-Froma hospital, his own sur-**HARROP** geon," a surgeon at the Bryan Trauma Center in Lincoln said about

Kaser. "He saved his own life," he added, "and he made it very easy for us." All the doctors had to do, really, was clean up the amputation. Well, everyone is being modest

There are other lessons. Stay

focused on the present. On this, Eller's yoga practice must have helped. She later called her trial a "spiritual journey" to stay alive.

A few other practical pointers: Don't go out alone without your cellphone. Both Eller and Kaser did that. Also, it helps to maintain physical strength. Eller was obviously in good shape through exercise, and Kaser through

Recognizing that her happy ending was a group effort, Eller said, "This was all about us coming together for a greater purpose of community and love, and appreciation for life."

Needless to say, she came from a very different cultural landscape than the Nebraska farmer. But both worlds made people strong in body and determination. Their stories must lead many of us must ask, Could we survive as they did?

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Dodgers rally for 4 in 9th against Díaz to defeat Mets 9-8

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Trailing by three against an All-Star closer, Cody Bellinger and the Los Angeles Dodgers weren't fazed one bit.

Bellinger hit a tying double and came around with the winning run as the Dodgers scored four times off Edwin Díaz in the ninth inning to rally past the New York Mets 9-8 on Wednesday night.

"One through nine we are really good. We were just going up and down the lineup," Bellinger said. "Down three against Díaz is never easy, but once we hit the home runs it was just a matter of getting guys on base."

Joc Pederson and Max Muncy opened the bottom of the ninth with consecutive homers off after driving in the game-winning run with a sacrifice fly ball during the ninth inning Díaz (1-3), who was pitch of a baseball game against the New York Mets Wednesday, May 29, in Los Angeles. ing for the fourth time

in five days. Justin Turner followed with a double and scored on Bellinger's double to right-center. "Díaz is a good closer but we match up well," Muncy said. "He is a fastball

pitcher and this team likes to hit fastballs. We got a couple things going and we went from there." Corey Seager was intentionally walked and Matt Beaty hit a roller toward

second base. Mets shortstop Amed Rosario was slow to field the ball and late trying for a force at second, allowing Bellinger to beat the play on an infield single that loaded the bases.

Alex Verdugo's sacrifice fly to left field easily scored Bellinger. "Joc, Muncy, Seager, those guys did the hard stuff by hitting home runs and

getting on base. My job with the bases loaded and no outs was to get the guy in," said Verdugo, who got his first career walk-off RBI. Díaz, who blew his second save in 15 chances, had allowed only one run over

9 1/3 innings in his last 10 appearances.

After giving up four runs and five hits in one-third of an inning, he called it "easily the worst game of my career."

"The whole time I'm thinking he is going to get out of it and it didn't happen," Mets manager Mickey Callaway said. "We were in great position and couldn't get it done. I haven't seen many teams, though, that can do this consistently from top to bottom."

Scott Alexander (3-1) worked a hitless inning for the win.

Rookie slugger Pete Alonso hit a pair of two-run homers to back starter Noah Syndergaard, and the Mets built an 8-3 lead in the seventh following back-toback homers by Rosario and Dominic Smith. But they squandered an excellent chance to add more, and New York's shaky bullpen gave up six runs while managing only seven outs the rest of the way.

Turner had a two-out RBI single in the seventh off Robert Gsellman, and Seager homered leading off the eighth against Jeurys Familia to cut it to 8-5. Seager, Turner and Beaty each had three hits for the NL-leading Dodgers, who have won 11 of 14.

New York missed a chance to move back over .500 for the first time since

What's in a name? You say French Open; I say Roland Garros

PARIS (AP) — Serena Williams and Roger Federer would love to win the French Open again, of course. They'd also be thrilled to win Roland Garros. And they might not know it, but they are doing their best to triumph at what used to officially be the Championnats Internationaux de France, too.

What's in a name? Things get complicated when it comes to deciding what to call the clay-court Grand Slam tournament being contested now on the southwestern edge of Paris.

English-speakers tend to say "French Open," even though that's not used by the event itself. Most of the rest of the world refers to "Roland Garros," the tournament facility named after a World War I fighter pilot.

Williams, an American with an apartment in Paris, and Federer, who is Swiss, are comfortable speaking English and French, so they say both versions. But what hardly ever is uttered - by Williams, Federer or anyone else — is the event's original name, which translates to "International Championships of France."

That French phrase is etched on the silver trophies that will be handed to the singles champions on June 8-9. A green board showing a bracket with each day's results in white chalk says "Internationaux de France 2019."

Based on interviews with several players and coaches, though, nobody seems to know that name. "Yo," said Denis Shapovalov, a Canadian ranked in the top 25, "I've never even heard that."

Maybe that's why the French Tennis Federation, which operates the tournament, wants the world to use "Roland Garros" — or, more precisely, "Roland-Garros," owing to the country's style of hyphenating places named after people. It asked media outlets, including The Associated Press, to use "Roland-Garros," rather than "French Open."

It's "Roland Garros" that's stamped on the tennis balls and court walls. It's festooned on hats, shirts and other items sold in merchandise boutiques.

The term "French Open" derives from when Grand Slam tennis tournaments became "open" to professionals in 1968 — as in "U.S. Open" or "Australian Open" — but it is not found on-site in Paris. Oddly enough, the English version of the tournament's online store does hawk what it calls a "vial of French Open clay" for \$22 or 20 euros (the French version calls it "terre battue Roland-Garros").

"The organizers clearly want everyone to refer to the tournament as 'Roland-Garros,'" federation spokesman Nicolas Beaudelin said, "because this

is ... where the tournament is played." Think of it as akin to referring to the Masters golf

tournament as "Augusta National."

Most sporting events go by one name. The Super Bowl is the Super Bowl. The World Series is, well, the World Series. The NBA Finals are just that. Same for the Final Four. There are exceptions, to be sure, but not many. The folks who run Wimbledon ("The Championships") and golf's British Open ("The Open Championship") have a hard time getting the globe to adopt their preferred monikers.

Tennis is an international sport: 42 countries were represented in the 2019 men's draw in Paris, 35 in the women's. English is generally the lingua franca on tour, but the lone Grand Slam tournament held where that's not the primary language is proud of the distinction

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

The practice of counting your losers in a suit contract is not always the best way to assess your prospects. The general rule is for declarer to count his winners when he plays a notrump contract, and his losers in a suit contract. But exceptional situations arise where declarer is better advised to reverse the usual proce-

If all four hands of today's deal

are examined, it would appear that South must lose three trump tricks, a club trick and either one or two spade tricks. Nevertheless, with proper

play, declarer can bring in 10 tricks! South ruffs the opening diamond lead and cashes the ace of trump, disclosing the foul trump distribution. Prospects look bleak indeed, but declarer sets out to do the best he can with the limited resources he has.

A club to the queen is followed by a diamond ruff, a club to the ace and another diamond ruff. Declarer then crosses to the ace of spades and ruffs dummy's last diamond before cashing the spade king.

South has made no extraordinary plays, but his mission is already accomplished. He has won the ace of hearts, the A-K of spades and A-Q of clubs, and has also ruffed all four of dummy's diamonds to bring him to nine tricks. The king of hearts still in his hand constitutes trick No. 10.

After South takes the first 10 tricks, he still has two losing spades and a losing club. West has the high cards to win them all, but East is forced to trump them with his Q-J-10 of hearts. The defenders' six apparent tricks are thus telescoped to just



This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, May 30, the 150th day of 2019. There are 215 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 30, 1911, the first Indy 500 took place at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway; the winner was Ray Harroun, who drove a Marmon Wasp for more than 6 1/2 hours at an average speed of 74.6 mph and collected a prize of \$10,000. On this date:

In 1381, the Peasants' Revolt against economic injustice erupted in England during the reign of King Richard II; the king and his men, initially caught off-guard, were able to crush the rebellion several weeks later.

In 1431, Joan of Arc, condemned as a heretic, was burned at the stake in Rouen (roo-AHN'), France.

In 1883, 12 people were trampled to death in a stampede sparked by a rumor that the recently opened Brooklyn Bridge was in danger of collapsing.

In 1922, the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., was dedicated in a ceremony attended by President Warren G. Harding, Chief Justice William Howard Taft and Robert Todd Lincoln.

In 1935, Babe Ruth played in his last major league baseball game for the Boston Braves, leaving after the first inning of the first game of a doubleheader against the Philadelphia Phillies, who won both games (Ruth announced his retirement three days later). In 1937, ten people were killed when police fired on steelworkers demonstrating near the Republic Steel plant in South Chicago.

In 1943, during World War II, American troops secured the Aleutian island of Attu

from Japanese forces. In 1958, unidentified American service members killed in World War II and the Korean War were interred in the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cem-

In 1989, student protesters in Beijing erected a "Goddess of Democracy" statue in Tiananmen Square (the statue was destroyed in the Chinese government's crackdown). In 1994, Mormon Church

died in Salt Lake City at age

In 1996, Britain's Prince Andrew and the former Sarah Ferguson were granted an uncontested decree ending their 10-year marriage. In 2008, diplomats from 111

nations meeting in Dublin,

Ireland, formally adopted a landmark treaty banning cluster bombs. (The United States and other leading cluster bomb makers — Russia, China, Israel, India and Pakistan — boycotted the talks.) Ten years ago: Britain's Prince Harry raised money for an AIDS charity by playing in a polo match on Governors Island in New York Harbor. Internet sensation Susan Boyle placed second on "Britain's Got Talent," with dance troupe Diversity taking the top prize.

Five years ago: Beset by growing evidence of patient delays and cover-ups, embattled Veterans Affairs Secretary Eric Shinseki resigned from President Barack Obama's Cabinet, taking the blame for what he decried as a "lack of integrity" in the sprawling health care system for the nation's military veterans.

One year ago: Harvey Weinstein was indicted in New York on rape and criminal sex act charges, furthering the first criminal case stemming from sexual misconduct allegations against the former movie mogul. Russian journalist Arkady Babchenko stunned colleagues by appearing at a news conference in Kiev less than a day after police in the Ukrainian capital said he'd been assassinated; authorities said his death was staged to foil a plot on his life by Moscow's security services. A senior House Republican, Trey Gowdy, said there was no evidence that the FBI planted a "spy" on Donald Trump's 2016 campaign, as Trump had alleged. Reality TV star Kim Kardashian West visited the White House to appeal to Trump on behalf of a woman serving a life sentence for drug offenses. (Days later, Trump granted clemency for
