

The runoff for mayor is between candidates Shannon Thomason and Debbie Wegman; while the City Council runoff pits Gloria McDonald against Shonda Folsom for the District 4 seat. In each runoff, the candidates were the top two vote-getters for their respective race, but the top finisher failed to amass 50 percent of the ballots in both cases.

More than 60 pieces from 29 artists graced the walls of the Heritage Museum this past month, and recognition was given where it was due June 1 at the Big Spring Area Art Association Awards Reception.

"We truly appreciate all the artists, local and the few who traveled from out of town, who joined us and displayed their artwork this past month," Ruby Bruns, BSAA Chairperson, said. "We are looking forward to next year and hope to see many of these artists back."

While the bulk of the artwork was created by local artists and members of the Big Spring Art Association, this year's show brought in talent from as far as Monahans and Colorado City. A new type of medium was introduced to the art show through Beth Henry's submission, which

uses rust as a medium.

"There is something about taking rust, something most would ignore, and turning into something beautiful and bringing it back to life again," Beth Henry, artist from Monahans said in a previous interview.

Awards for the top four spots were awarded in six categories, including: oils, acrylic, mixed, photo, pen/ink/ pencil and watercolor. This year, Kay Smith took best of Show with her entry "Proud Poppies" and People's Choice Winner was Sandrena Koning with her mixed media piece "Tokosuba'

"This (Area Wide Art Show) is something we have been doing since 1956 and it's a great way to keep art alive in our community. There are lots of talented artists here, of all ages, and this is just one of the ways we can showcase that

Time to register for SMMC Asthma Camp

There is still time to register for the fourth annual Scenic Mountain Medical Center Asthma Camp. This year, the camp will take place at the Dora Roberts Community Center from June 10-12 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. This year applications are being accepted for kids between 8 and 12 vears of age.

"We are excited to be able to bring nis back to the community. We have three days of activities and adventures planned and are looking forward to helping the kids understand how to live an active life with asthma," Lisa Parks, SMMC Respiratory Supervi-

SMMC staff has been providing information in a fun, active way for the past four years to the kids in the community who are dealing with asthma. Raising awareness is one of the most important factors when it comes to helping kids and families understand how to control asthma.

"One of the biggest myths surround asthma is that kids aren't able to have an active lifestyle. They think because they have asthma they can't play sports, they can't run around like the other kids and they have to limit their activity, but that's not the case." Parks said. "The more we can get the kids to understand and notice what sets them off and triggers an asthma attack, the more they can get out, get involved without worrying."

Monday will offer a day of educational activities to help the kids understand the basics of asthma, such as triggers, signs of an oncoming asthma attack and more. Tuesday afternoon, the kids will have an opportunity to experience the historical side of Big Spring.

"We are going to take an afternoon field trip and visit a few of the community historical sites. We are going to have transportation provided by Howard College and a personal tour



Although Coahoma residents, and anyone else who lives outside Big Spring, may not vote in the city runoff, Big Spring residents may vote in Coahoma, or any of the Vote Centers, on Election Day.

"We think that that's a good thing to have this round," Duck said. "They're doing that ragball (tournament) in Coahoma, and a lot of Big Spring people will be in Coahoma on Saturday attending that, so they can just drop by and vote while they're there."

Duck said new voting machines have streamlined the voting process, making casting your ballot quick and easy.

"All the brand-new stuff is still going to be used, and we're loving it," she said, adding that voting takes about a minute and a half from start to finish.

"Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy." 1 Peter 1:16 Did Jesus somehow mess up when

He said, "My yoke is

easy, and my burden light?". Did He mean what He said? Is it true? Is His yoke easy, and His burden light, or are His commandments griev-

Everything about Jesus says one thing – rest and simplicity. So, why should the doctrine and practice of holiness be any different?

Holiness is not something that is strictly reserved for a select fortunate few who by their own commitment to a clean way of life have attained to a

certain level of faithfulness and purity. Holiness is a gift to all who believe that by Christ's stripes we are healed. Holiness is freely given to sinners who embrace the fact that God has laid on Christ, the iniquity of us all.



Something to think

I said, "Sovereign Lord, you alone know."

Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones and say to them, 'Dry bones, hear the word of the Lord! This is what the Sovereign Lord says to these bones: I will make breath enter you, and you will come to life. I will attach tendons to you and make flesh come upon you and cover you with skin; I will put breath in you, and you will come to life. Then you will know that I am the Lord."

... Then he said to me: "Son of man, these bones are the people of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up and our hope is gone; we are cut off." Therefore prophesy and say to them: 'This is what the Sovereign Lord says: My people, I am going to open your graves and bring you up from them; I will bring you back to the land of Israel. Then you, my people, will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and bring you up from them. I will put my Spirit in you and you will live, and I will settle you in your own land. Then you will know that I the Lord have spoken, and I have done it, declares the Lord." (Ezekiel 37:1-6 &







Davis' error helps Rangers to 4-3 win over banged-up Orioles

ARLINGTON, Texas DeShields found another way to help the Texas Rangers win by finding a weakness in the banged-up Baltimore

The speedy outfielder's single led to a key error by Chris Davis during his first game in right field in almost three years, and the Rangers beat the Orioles 4-3 on Thursday night.

Davis volunteered to play right a day after three Baltimore teammates exited a 12-inning loss to the Rangers because of injuries. Then the Orioles lost another player when left fielder

Dwight Smith Jr. crashed into the protocol. wall just as he caught a fly ball by Rougned Odor not long after a 13-minute rain delay.

"It's pretty crazy, obviously," said Davis, a first baseman by trade. "The last few days have been tough for us. The Yankees kind of had a similar scenario early this year, but in-season to have this many guys go down

this quickly, it's tough." Smith tried to stay in the game, grounding out for the final out of the fifth after his inning-ending catch in the fourth. He tried to play defense in the bottom of the fifth, but was unable

to continue before the inning started.

The injury to Smith forced Keon Broxton, the only healthy player on the Orioles bench, into the game as the center fielder while Stevie Wilk-

erson moved to left.

Hyde used Villar as a pinch-runner in the ninth as the potential tying run even though the skipper didn't want to. Severino took a foul ball off his mask Wednesday, and Villar left with a sore thumb.

"We're going to be in bubble wrap going to the airport," Hyde said.



1. Four spades. Partner's onespade overcall is not usually a bid directed toward making a game, but neither is it a bid made without appropriate values. Typically, it is based on a hand containing about nine to 16 points in high cards and a strong suit.

The salient feature of an overcall is safety, which means that the overcaller does not expect to go down more than 500 points if he gets doubled for penalties. It follows, therefore, that the quality of the suit in which the overcall is made is more important than the overall strength of the hand.

Opposite your hand, partner should have an excellent chance to make four spades. A bid of two hearts or a jump to three spades, neither of which would be forcing, runs the risk of missing game. As usual, the simplest bid is best.

2. Two spades. It is not likely that your side can make a game, but the raise should be made for competitive purposes and in case partner has an absolute maximum. It would be wrong to bid two diamonds, which would deny spade support and might be passed by partner.

3. Three notrump. No guarantees go with this bid, which is admittedly a gamble, but the hand should offer a good shot for game opposite a typical overcall. Partner does not need much strength outside of his spade suit. The best thing to do is to close your eyes, bid three notrump and hope for the best.

4. Three spades. This bid invites partner to go on to four with a maximum overcall, and allows him to pass if the overcall was based on minimum values. As before, your heart suit should not be mentioned.

5. Two notrump. This is also only invitational, so partner is permitted to pass. It shows roughly the values for a minimum opening bid (about 12 to 15 points), balanced distribution and all-around strength, particularly in the opponent's suit. If partner has close to an opening bid or better, a game is likely to be made.










This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Friday, June 7, the 158th day of 2019. There are 207 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On June 7, 1998, in a crime that shocked the nation, James Byrd Jr., a 49-year-old black man, was hooked by a chain to a pickup truck and dragged to his death in Jasper, Texas. (Two white men were later sentenced to death; one of them, Lawrence Russell Brewer, was executed in 2011 and the other, John William King, was executed in April, 2019. A third defendant received life with the possibility of parole.) On this date:

In 1712, Pennsylvania's colonial assembly voted to ban the further importation of slaves. In 1769, frontiersman Daniel Boone first began to explore present-day Kentucky

In 1776, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia offered a resolution to the Continental Congress stating "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States.

In 1848, French painter and sculptor Paul Gauguin was born in Paris. In 1892, Homer Plessy, a "Cre-

ole of color," was arrested for refusing to leave a whites-only car of the East Louisiana Railroad. (Ruling on his case, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld "separate but equal" racial segregation, a concept it renounced in 1954.) In 1948, the Communists

completed their takeover of Czechoslovakia with the resignation of President Edvard Benes (BEH'-nesh).

In 1958, singer-songwriter Prince was born Prince Rogers Nelson in Minneapolis.

In 1965, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Griswold v. Connecticut, struck down, 7-2, a Connecticut law used to prosecute a Planned Parenthood clinic in New Haven for providing contraceptives to married couples. In 1977, Britons thronged London to celebrate the silver jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, who was marking the 25th year of her reign.

In 1981, Israeli military planes destroyed a nuclear power plant in Iraq, a facility the Israelis charged could have been used to make nuclear weapons.

In 1993, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that religious groups could sometimes meet on school property after hours. Ground was broken for the

Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland. In 2004, a steady, near-silent stream of people circled

through the rotunda of the

Ronald Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley, California, where the body of the nation's 40th president lay in repose before traveling to Washington two days later for a state funeral.

Ten years ago: Extreme-right parties gained in European Parliament elections, including the first seats won by the all-white British National Party. Roger Federer completed a career Grand Slam, winning his first French Open title by sweeping surprise Robin Soderling 6-1, 7-6 (1), 6-4. The British musical "Billy Elliot" won 10 Tony Awards, including best musical and a unique best actor prize for the three young performers who shared the title character: David Alvarez, Trent Kowalik and Kiril Kulish.

Five years ago: Actor-comedian Tracy Morgan was critically injured when a Walmart tractor-trailer rammed into his chauffeured limousine bus on the New Jersey Turnpike, setting off a chain-reaction crash that killed fellow comedian James "Jimmy Mack" McNair. Ukraine's new president. Petro Poroshenko, took the oath of office, calling for pro-Russian rebels in the country's east to lay down their arms. Maria Sharapova won her second French Open title in three years, beating fourth-seeded Simona Halep 6-4, 6-7 (5), 6-4 in the final. California Chrome failed in his bid to win the first Triple Crown in 36 years, losing the Belmont Stakes by coming in fourth to long shot

Tonalist. One year ago: The Trump administration said in a court filing that it would no longer defend key parts of the Affordable Care Act, including provisions that guarantee access to health insurance regardless of any medical conditions; it was a rare departure from the Justice Department's practice of defending federal laws in court. In advance of a summit with North Korea's Kim Jong Un, President Donald Trump declared that "attitude" is more important than preparation. A government report found that suicide rates inched up in nearly every U.S. state from 1999 through 2016. The Washington Capitals claimed their first NHL title with a 4-3 victory over the Vegas Golden Knights in Game 5 of the Stanley Cup Final in Las Vegas.



Straw's 3B in 14th lifts Astros over pesky Mariners 8-7

SEATTLE (AP) — It took more than five hours, but the Houston Astros finally put away the pesky

Rookie Myles Straw led off the 14th inning with a triple and scored on Yuli Gurriel's sacrifice fly, and the Astros outlasted the Mariners 8-7 Thursday night in the longest game of the season by innings

Seattle staged tying rallies in the ninth and 10th innings and loaded the bases in the bottom of the 14th thanks to three walks by Chris Devenski (1-0), but the right-hander got Shed Long to fly out to end

"All's well that ends well," Astros manager AJ Hinch said.

Houston led 5-1 after 6 1/2 innings but Seattle chipped away, tying it at 6 in the ninth on Edwin Encarnacion's single against closer Roberto Osuna, his first blown save of the season. That prevented Justin Verlander from becoming the first 10-game

"That was not a game that was expected, given how it started," Hinch said. "And even halfway through nine innings, it felt like we were completely in control of it. Then it was like a game that was never going to end. Quite a game."

Verlander was pulled with one out in the sixth after giving up three singles. He was charged with three runs on five hits.

"From the get-go today it was a little bit touch and go for me," Verlander said. "I wasn't my best today and we made the pull. I wasn't surprised. In some of these games like this one, it comes down to pure will, who wants it most."

Josh Reddick's sacrifice fly as a pinch-hitter in the 10th gave the Astros to a 7-6 lead before Omar Narváez tied it with his ninth homer of the season. Matt Festa (0-1) allowed Straw's triple — a ball

that was played poorly by right fielder Domingo Santana — and one walk in the 14th for the Mari-

Seattle outfielder Mitch Haniger left in the seventh with what the team called a "mid-body" contu-

The Astros took three of four in the series and are 9-0-1 in their last 10 series.

Austin Adams started as an opener for Seattle and couldn't get through the first inning. He gave up three runs, three hits and two walks, including a two-run homer to Robinson Chirinos, before being replaced by Tommy Milone.

Chirinos has homered in four consecutive games, tying Cliff Johnson's club record from 1975 for lon-

Alex Bregman's 18th homer gave Houston took a 4-1 lead in the fifth. Rookie Jack Mayfield hit his first career homer in the seventh inning to make The Mariners rallied for three runs in the sev-

enth inning on five singles. After Houston added a run in the eighth, the Mariners scored again in the bottom of the inning before Osuna entered.

"It's kind of hard to be focused the whole game," Narváez said. "But we did a good job swinging

the bats. Remember, we were facing a pretty good team. They don't strike out much and put the ball in the play almost every time." **TOP 20**

Verlander ahead of Hall of Famer Mike Mussina for 20th on the career strikeout list, fanning seven to reach 2,816.


