


# BSPD murder investigation; tip line open





As Myfanwy delves deeper into the mystery of who she once was and why she lost her memory, her eyes are opened to a world she wouldn't have dreamed possible. There are others in the world who have superpowers. They need to be protected from

a high-level operative in the Checquy. The people she encounters inside the Checquy are dangerous and intriguing: a person with four bodies, a woman who visits her in her dreams, and children who have been transformed into deadly fighters. Amidst the conspiracy, Myfanwy balances the tension and suspense with humor.

The Rook by Daniel O'Malley is one of those books. It's an imaginative story that will keep readers on the edge of their seats. I particularly liked this book for how imperfect the main characters were. It isn't easy to figure out exactly how to tell the good guys from the bad guys. O'Malley covers the theme of identity. Most of us won't wake up in a park and learn that we're an operative in a secret agency protecting the world from supernatural threats, but we will change. The person we are today is not the same person we were ten years ago; and it's not the same person we will be ten years in the future. I think that O'Malley has cleverly used his fiction to portray the changes in identity and sense of purpose that every human experiences in some way. And despite the profound lessons that could be derived from this book, it is at it's core fun. It's a great summer read and is followed up by its sequel: Stiletto.


I remember correctly. There are

hole that will never be filled. My dad made us promise to not let him go without his putter. We made sure to put it in his coffin. At the funeral, many of the members from the Chicano Golf Association left golf balls for my dad so he could practice with his putter in heaven.

The first Texas Rangers baseball game my brother and I went to after our dad died was one of the hardest things I've ever had to do. Many tears were shed that day. I think we held hands walking into Globe Life Park. It was hard, but we did it. My dad would want us to keep enjoying one of his favorite past-times.

Of course, we had to move on with our lives. My sister now has a baby who is three-years-old; I call her my happiness. I never knew I could love such a tiny little thing so much! I wish my dad could see her today.

I know my dad is watching over us, and he showed me the other day. I woke up Saturday morning, and as is routine, let the dogs out. When I opened the back door, I could see something laying in the yard, but since I didn't have my glasses, I really couldn't tell what it was. I bent over to get a closer look, and laying there was a golf ball...on the day before Father's Day. It was the best gift I ever got from my dad.

A couple of days later, I get a message from my sister's mom that they've found a golf ball, too. These dirty little golf balls, as they have affectionally become known, were gifts from Heaven.

# Gov. Abbott signs law to increase seizure awareness in public schools

#### Special to the Herald AUSTIN - On Tuesday, July

11th, Governor Greg Abbott signed House Bill 684 (HB 684), Sam's Law, which was authored by State Representative Travis Clardy. HB 684 honors the memory of Samantha Watkins, a Kilgore ISD student who passed away from complications of a seizure in December 2016. Sam's Law will ensure school district employees receive training and education about seizure recognition and first aid.

"Sam's Law started off as a conversation between myself and constituent Shari Dudo last summer at a town hall meeting, and now we are in the Governor's office for a signing ceremony," Rep. Clardy said. "This bill would not have passed, if not for the determination of Mrs. Dudo, the Epilepsy Foundation of Texas, and so many others. I am grateful to have worked with Senator Bryan Hughes and my colleagues to ensure our public schools are seizure smart."

school nurses would complete a Texas Education Agency-approved training on treating students suffering from seizures. The Epilepsy Foundation of Texas is providing educational training videos, at no cost, to the Texas Education Agency for approval and use.

HB 684 calls for the implementation of a seizure action plan that would ensure public school nurses and other school employees are prepared to support students who have a history of epileptic seizures and to provide aid to students who experience seizures at school.

"I am proud and optimistic we can channel the loss of Sam to set in place a system that will

reach beyond Texas," said Rep. Clardy. "Efforts are underway to use Sam's Law as a blueprint to improve seizure awareness and response nationally. Sam's memory and legacy will save lives here in Texas and in other states far into the future."

Representative Clardy is currently serving his fourth term as the State Representative for House District 11, which includes Cherokee, Nacogdoches, and Rusk counties.

# Texas Tech's 4-1 CWS win sends FSU's Martin into retirement

OMAHA, Neb. — When Texas Tech's Taylor Floyd struck out Reese Albert to end the game — and Mike Martin's career — the Florida State coach walked up the dugout steps, took on his glasses and strode across the field to shake hands with the opposing coach one more time.

While the fans at TD Ameritrade Park showered Martin in applause, his wife of 55 years, Carol, greeted well-wishers in the stands. Martin then waved to and thanked fans who gathered above the dugout.

After the 4-1 loss in the elimination game, Martin heads into retirement with 2,029 career wins — most by any coach in any college sport. Each of his 40 teams won at least 40 games and played in the NCAA Tournament.

But, he never won a national cham-

"I can fake a smile with the best of them and I'll get through the rest of this night with a smile because I got to watch young men grow up," Martin said. "I got to work for Florida State for 45 years and I'll never forget the times I've had out here in Omaha."

Brian Klein broke a 1-1 tie in the sixth with his second homer in three games, and third of the season, and Texas Tech (46-19) won a second game

at a CWS for the first time in its four appearances.

"In the back of your mind, obviously, you're thinking about '11' a little bit," Tech coach Tim Tadlock said, referring to Martin by his nickname. "All the respect in the world for him. Love him, and just appreciate everything he's done for college baseball.

FSU (42-23) had no trouble scoring while sweeping through a regional in Athens, Georgia, and a super regional at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to earn Martin his 17th trip to the CWS. The Seminoles beat Arkansas 1-0 here Saturday, but lost 2-0 to Michigan before

the Red Raiders eliminated them. Martin's last team was one of the final four squads awarded at-large bids to the 64-team national tournament after struggling for stretches of the regular season.

"To have the success we've had the last three years, the ACC championships, two trips to Omaha, 40 wins every year," third baseman Drew Mendoza said. "To experience that with him and be part of his legacy is a dream come true."

The Seminoles batted .124 in Omaha (11 of 89) and their two runs in three games tied a CWS record low. Their 0-for-17 batting with runners in scoring position was the lowest by a team in at least 20 years, according to ESPN. Florida State also struck out 15

"Who would have ever thought six weeks ago that we would even get to Omaha?" Martin said. "The young men are disappointed now. What they accomplished will not go unnoticed — to get to Omaha and have an opportunity.'

Cameron Warren put Tech up 1-0 in the fourth when he chopped a grounder past diving Mendoza at third, allowing Dylan Neuse to score from

The Seminoles' only run came in the bottom half thanks to Tech mistakes. Brvce Bonnin (7-1) walked Robby Martin on four pitches and hit Matheu Nelson in the bill of his batting helmet. The runners moved over on a bunt, and Martin came home when catcher Braxton Fulford threw into center field trying to pick off Nelson at second.

The Red Raiders went ahead for good when Klein lofted an off-speed pitch from Conor Grady (9-6) into the right-center bleachers for his ninth homer in 150 career games.

"I have no idea where the home runs started to come from, but today it happened that it gave us a really big run, and I'm super thankful for it," Klein

Chase Haney pitched two shutout innings in relief of Grady, and then Martin went to J.C. Flowers. Texas

Tech pounced on the star closer, who didn't record an out and gave up three singles, with Klein reaching on a dropped third strike.

Flowers left with the bases loaded, and it was 4-1 when Antonio Velez walked in a run.

The Seminoles had at least one runner on base each inning and looked as though they might get something going in the eighth when, with a man aboard, Carter Smith sent a drive into the right center gap. But center fielder Dylan Neuse laid out to make

Floyd pitched one-hit shutout relief over the last four innings for his fifth

"Probably the biggest thing, this group, they really like to play," Tadlock said. "They're not going to let some type of circumstance, the results dictate their effort and their preparation. They've been really good about respecting the game and trying to play the game the right way. Not saying we always get great results, but as long as the preparation is right, we're happy with them."

The Orioles have dropped a season-high eight in a row and have the worst record in the majors at 21-53. They'll try to break the skid when Dylan Bundy (3-8, 4.44 ERA) pitches at Seattle — he's made it past six innings only twice in 14 starts this year.



sionally confronts declarer arises when he has all the tricks he needs for the contract and yet is unable to take them because of a lack of communication between his own hand and the dummy.

Consider this deal where South was declarer at three notrump. West led a club, on which East played the queen, and there was poor South, looking at nine tricks and no legitimate way to collect them.

One possibility was to win the club lead, cash dummy's A-K of diamonds and then play a spade or a heart and hope the opponents would be kind enough to put him back in his hand by leading a second club. That would allow him to score his remaining diamonds and so make his con-

However, South realized that this line of play would probably not succeed. There was too much chance that, once he telegraphed his intentions by cashing the A-K of diamonds, the opponents would recognize his communications problem and arrange to keep him out of his hand.

So South hit upon a better scheme that might allow him to steal the hand. Instead of taking the first club, he let East's queen hold the first

Without giving the matter much thought, East returned a club, and that was that. South took the A-K, discarded the A-K of diamonds from dummy and then cashed six diamonds and the ace of hearts to finish with a neat nine tricks.

Perhaps East should have seen through the ruse and not returned a club, but that does not diminish the beauty of declarer's imaginative play. He was certainly entitled to his vic-





# This Date In History

Today is Thursday, June 20, the 171st day of 2019. There are 194 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 20, 1921, U.S. Rep.

Alice Mary Robertson, R-Okla., became the first woman to preside over a session of the House of Representatives. On this date:

In 1782, Congress approved the Great Seal of the United States, featuring the emblem

of the bald eagle. In 1837. Queen Victoria acceded to the British throne following the death of her

uncle, King William IV. In 1863, West Virginia became the 35th state.

In 1893, a jury in New Bedford, Massachusetts, found Lizzie Borden not guilty of the ax murders of her father

and stepmother. In 1943, race-related rioting erupted in Detroit; federal troops were sent in two days later to quell the violence that resulted in more than 30

deaths. In 1967, boxer Muhammad Ali was convicted in Houston of violating Selective Service laws by refusing to be drafted and was sentenced to five years in prison. (Ali's conviction was ultimately overturned by the U.S. Supreme

In 1975, Steven Spielberg's shark thriller "Jaws," starring Roy Scheider, Robert Shaw and Richard Dreyfuss (not to mention a mechanical shark nicknamed "Bruce") was released by Universal Pictures. In 1977, the first oil began flowing through the recently completed Trans-Alaska

Pipeline from Prudhoe Bay to

Valdez. In 1988, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously upheld a New York City law making it illegal for private clubs with more than 400 members to exclude women and minori-

ties. In 1990, South African black nationalist Nelson Mandela and his wife, Winnie, arrived in New York City for a tickertape parade in their honor as they began an eight-city U.S.

In 1994, O.J. Simpson pleaded not guilty in Los Angeles to the killings of his ex-wife, Nicole, and her friend, Ronald Goldman. Former airman Dean Allen Mellberg went on a shooting rampage at Fairchild Air Force Base near Spokane, Washington, killing four people and wounding 22 others before being killed by a military police sharpshooter. In 2001, Houston resident Andrea Yates drowned her

five children in the family bathtub, then called police. (Yates was later convicted of murder, but had her conviction overturned; she was acquitted by reason of insanity in a retrial.)

Ten years ago: Iranian music student Neda Agha Soltan, 27, was gunned down during election protests in Tehran; her dying moments were caught on video and circulated widely on the Internet, making her name a rallying cry for the opposition and sparking international out-

Five years ago: The Obama administration granted an array of new benefits to samesex couples, including those living in states where gay marriage was against the law; the new measures ranged from Social Security and veterans benefits to work leave for caring for sick spouses. Defiant before skeptical Republicans, IRS Commission-er John Koskinen refused to apologize during a hearing for lost emails that might have shed light on the tax agency's targeting of tea party and other groups before the 2010 and 2012 elections.

One year ago: President Donald Trump abruptly reversed himself and signed an executive order halting his administration's policy of separating children from their parents when they are detained illegally crossing the border; Trump had been insisting wrongly that there was no alternative to the policy because of federal law and a court decision. The Vatican announced that Cardinal Theodore McCarrick, the retired Roman Catholic archbishop of Washington, D.C., had been removed from public ministry and would face further punishment over "credible" allegations that he sexually abused a teenager more than 40 years earlier. (Pope Francis accepted Mc-Carrick's resignation as a cardinal on July 28th.) A suspect was arrested and charged with murder in the killing of rising Florida rap star XXX-Tentacion

# Wednesday's Sports in Brief

#### PRO BASKETBALL

The Memphis Grizzlies traded away the final piece of the franchise's best years, sending veteran point guard Mike Conley to the Utah Jazz for a trio of players, a person familiar with the deal told The Associated Press.

The Grizzlies swapped Conley for forward Jae Crowder, guard/forward Kyle Korver and guard Grayson Allen, said the person, who spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because neither Memphis nor Utah has announced the trade, which cannot be completed until the new league year starts on July 6.

Conley confirmed the trade on Twitter, thanking Memphis for making him the man he is and being his home. "Time for another chapter! Excited to give all I have to The Jazz ...!' Conley tweeted.

ESPN.com first reported the deal, which it says also includes Utah's No. 23 pick overall in Thursday night's

Conley was the final piece of the core that led the Grizzlies to seven consecutive playoff berths, including the 2013 Western Conference Finals. Zach Randolph and Tony Allen left in 2017 as free agents, and Memphis traded Marc Gasol to Toronto in February, splitting up a duo that had been the NBA's longest-tenured teammates. Gasol went on to help the Raptors win their first NBA title.

#### HOCKEY

LAS VEGAS (AP) Nikita Kucherov won the NHL's highest honors, receiving the Hart Trophy as the league MVP and the Ted Lindsay Award as the best player according to a vote of his fellow pros. The Russian right wing also formally picked up the Art Ross Trophy as the NHL's top scorer at the hockey world's annual Vegas ceremony at the Mandalay Bay Events Center.

Andrei Vasilevskiy, Kucherov's Russian teammate, won his first Vezina Trophy as the NHL's top goalie in another bittersweet recognition for the Lightning, who won 62 regularseason games before getting swept by Columbus in the opening round.

Calgary's Mark Giordano won the Norris Trophy as the NHL's top defenseman, earning the award for the first time at 35 years old. Vancouver forward Elias Pettersson won Calder Trophy given to the league's top rookie, and Ryan O'Reilly added his first Selke Trophy as the NHL's top defensive forward to the Blues' Stanley Cup victory.

Barry Trotz of the New York Islanders won his second Jack Adams Award as the best coach, while Boston's Don Sweeney was named the league's top general manager.

Wild forward Jason Zucker won the King Clancy Memorial Trophy for leadership and humanitarian contributions to hockey. Florida center Aleksander Barkov won his first Lady Byng Trophy as the player best combining sportsmanship, gentlemanly conduct and ability, while Philadelphia's Wayne Simmonds won the Mark Messier NHL Leadership

#### PRO FOOTBALL

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The NFL's top medical experts believe they can take the knowledge of college football physicians and trainers and the research from the NCAA to make football safer — together.

Dr. Allen Sills and Jeff Miller, the NFL's executive vice president for health and safety initiatives, spent Monday and Tuesday in Indianapolis sharing data about their findings on the prevention and treatment of injuries. It's the most formal presentation league executives have had with college officials, and Sills and Miller hope this presentation leads to

a broader conversation that includes discussions about lower-body inju-

The two-day meeting included participants from the NFL's health and safety team, the NCAA's Sport Science Institute and medical staffs from schools in each of the power five conferences. It comes amid a rapidly evolving landscape of injuries in football. Sills is the league's chief medical

#### COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Brian Klein hit the tiebreaking home run Texas Tech, and the Red Raiders beat Florida State 4-1 at the College World Series to close the 40-year coaching career of NCAA all-time wins leader Mike Martin.

Klein's homer, his second of the CWS and third of the season, came in the sixth inning and stood up because of the Seminoles' inability to find a spark on offense.

Tech (46-19) won a second game at the CWS for the first time in its four appearances.

FSU (42-23) had no trouble scoring while sweeping through a regional in Athens, Georgia, and a super regional at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to earn Martin his 17th trip to the CWS. The Seminoles beat Arkansas 1-0 here Saturday, but lost 2-0 to Michigan before the Red Raiders eliminated them.

Martin heads into retirement with 2,029 career wins — most by any coach in any college sport — but no national championships. Each of his 40 teams won at least 40 games and played in the NCAA Tournament.

#### **BOXING**

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — The International Boxing Association is near bankruptcy, days before a decision to formally exclude the body from the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

AIBA executive director Tom Virgets told board members it will be

insolvent if International Olympic Committee members derecognize the troubled body next Wednesday.

The full IOC membership is expected to sign off on recommendations made last month by its executive board, which would deny AIBA its expected \$17.5 million share of Tokyo Games commercial revenue and cut off the men's and women's 2019 world championships in Russia as qualify-

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — NAS-CAR denied Ross Chastain's appeal after his race-winning truck was disqualified following a postrace inspection at Iowa Speedway over the week

National Motorsports Appeals Panelist Bryan Moss heard Chastain's appeal and chose to uphold the original penalties assessed by NASCAR for the No. 44 being too low. Chastain's disqualification was the first under strict new rules put in place this season to deter cheating and it was the first time this year a winning car had been DQ'd on race day. NASCAR said the last time it disqualified an apparent race winner was April 17, 1960, when Emanuel Zervakis' victory at Wilson Speedway in North Carolina was thrown out because of an oversized fuel tank. The series also stripped Mike Skinner of a victory the day after a 1999 race at Atlanta Motor Speedway for an unapproved cylinder head, but that decision was overturned on appeal.

Chastain's misfortune gave the victory to Brett Moffitt and Chastain will be scored as if he finished last in addition to his victory and bonus points being stripped away.

# Kipnis homers twice in Indians' 10-4 win over Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas — Jason Kipnis is finding it difficult not to get excited after struggling at the plate for much of the season. The veteran second baseman hit two home runs, going back-to-back with

Roberto Pérez during a five-run first inning, and the Cleveland Indians beat the Texas Rangers 10-4 on Wednesday night. Kipnis, a two-time All-Star, said he discovered something in his swing last

weekend in Detroit. He's 7 for 15 with three homers in his last four games after going homerless in his previous 24, with his .227 batting average being his highest since May 31.

"I don't want to get ahead of myself, but when you think you've found something and can go into games and get results, it's nice to see and it kind of reastures you that you're doing the right things," Kipnis said

He pulled a three-run homer that cleared the Texas bullpen in right-center and gave Cleveland a 4-0 lead in the top of the first. Pérez followed by slicing an opposite-field homer that landed just inside the right-field foul pole.

Kipnis also homered down the right-field line in the fifth with two outs for his second two-homer game of the season and sixth of his career.

"He's starting to use his hands like he's can," Indians manager Terry Francona said. "That's really good because he's hitting off righties and lefties. That's The Indians have won 10 of their last 14 games while the Rangers have lost

three of their last four.

Indians starter Adam Plutko, staked to a 7-1 lead in the third inning, lasted only 4 1/3 innings and gave up three runs, two earned, on seven hits. Oliver Perez (2-1) pitched 1 2/3 innings of scoreless relief for the win. Joe Palumbo (0-1), recalled from Double-A Frisco earlier in the day to make

his second major league start, was pulled after allowing the first four batters to reach base in the third inning. Palumbo gave up seven runs and six hits, with three walks and one hit batter. He lasted four innings against the Oakland Athletics on June 8. Rangers manager Chris Woodward said the Indians sat on Palumbo's fast-

ball and apparently learned from studying his start against the A's. "His fastball's got some characteristics that you'd have to make an adjust-

ment to hit," Woodward said. "They did that."

Asdrúbal Cabrera and ninth-inning pinch-hitter Danny Santana hit solo home runs for Texas.

Indians RF Jordan Luplow made a running, shoestring catch on a flyball hit by Willie Calhoun in the seventh inning and then doubled Nomar Mazara off first base when Texas threatened to cut into a four-run Indians lead.

Luplow's throw nearly struck first-base umpire Doug Eddings on its way to first baseman Carlos Santana.

"I was like, 'I've got to throw this right through him,'" Luplow said. "He's got to get out of the way."

Woodward said he'll consider reliever Jesse Chavez as a starter — and not ist as an opener, which Chavez has done four times this season — in Palum bo's new spot after the 35-year-old threw 59 pitches and went five innings for the first time since June 1, 2018, allowing only one run.

"It's obviously concerning when a young kid goes out and gives up seven," Woodward said. "We've got to be mindful of his psyche."
