



SCOTUS to hear Montana case on school choice, religious liberty

The U.S. Supreme Court will hear a widereaching Montana case dealing with school choice and the First Amendment.

The Supreme Court announced Friday that it will take up the case Espinoza v. Montana Department of Revenue, which is being litigated by the Institute for Justice, a libertarian public interest law firm.

The case stems from a scholarship program passed in 2015 by the Montana legislature that would give tax credits to those who donated to private scholarship organizations, which would then give scholarships to students in need who wanted to attend private schools.

The program allowed for scholarships to be used at private religious schools.

The Montana Department of Revenue, however, determined that the program violated the state constitution's "Blaine Amendment" because it allowed for scholarships to be used at religious schools.

The Montana Supreme Court backed the Department of Revenue's argument and later invalidated the scholarship program, leading to the lawsuit.

The Institute for Justice is representing sev-

eral parents including Kendra Espinoza, a single mother who enrolled her kids in a private Christian school after public school wasn't a good fit.

Lower courts have been split on similar questions over school choice in the past, but Institute for Justice argues "that government may not – consistent with the federal Constitution – prohibit religious options in student-aid programs."

"Although the U.S. Supreme Court held that including religious options in educational choice programs is perfectly permissible under the federal Constitution, the lower courts have disagreed for decades about whether states may nevertheless exclude religious options in these programs," said Erica Smith, an attorney with the law firm. "We hope the Court will clarify that just as the government

cannot force families participating in these programs to choose a religious school, the government also cannot ban these families from choosing a religious school. The First Amendment requires

government neutrality, not hostility, toward religion."

IJ also said that the Blaine Amendment, which the Department of Revenue used to justify the religious school exclusion, "was designed to discriminate against Catholic schools and students at a time of widespread hostility toward Catholics."

Espinoza in a statement said she hoped the court rules in favor of school choice.

"The Montana Supreme Court's ruling hurts every Montana child who is counting on these scholarships," she said. "For the benefit of families across the state, and the nation, we hope the U.S. Supreme Court restores this program to families that need it to ensure their children have access to a good, safe and meaningful education."

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
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
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
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

Reflection: Spiritual Awakening in America

'n the early 1740s, a young printer in Philadelphia reached an agreement with an itinerant preacher from England to print his sermons and journals. Historians say the agreement made Benjamin Franklin rich and George Whitefield famous. With Franklin's assistance in the printed word, Whitefield's preaching sparked a spiritual flame that ignited Colonial

America. In his autobiography, Franklin noted he could not walk down the streets of Philadelphia in the evening without hearing families singing Christian hymns. Many credit the Great Awakening for creating the values that later produced American Independence. At noon on September 23, 1857, a businessman named Jeremiah Lamphier waited for others to join him for prayer in a

room on Fulton Street in New York. Six people showed up. The next week, 20 came; then 40. They started meeting daily. The crowd swelled to more than 3,000 following the financial panic BILL of October 14. In less than six months, 10,000 businessmen were T_{INSLEY} attending daily prayer meetings in New York. More than 10,000 came to faith in Philadelphia, 5,000 in Boston. At its peak, 50,000 people a week were professing faith in Christ. In Bethel, Con-

necticut, businesses closed for prayer. Led by laity and crossing denominational lines, the movement swept more than one million people to faith in Christ leading up to the Civil War.

During the Civil War, a little-known shoe salesman from Chicago ministered among the Union troops. Afterward, he gave up selling shoes to win souls. In the last half of the 19th century, Dwight L. Moody preached to over 100 million people in the United States and the U.K. On one occasion, more than 130,000 people assembled to hear him preach.

Following the Civil War, baseball became America's pass-time. A war orphan became one of the most popular players for the Chicago White Sox, arguably the fastest runner in the sport. After his conversion to Christ, Billy Sunday hit the "sawdust trail" and moved America with his passionate preaching. He is said to have drawn more press than WWI, and, like Moody before him, preached to more than 100 million people.

A tent was erected in Los Angeles in 1947 following WWII, and an un-

known evangelist named Billy Graham was invited to preach. The three week revival stretched into eight and launched Graham's career. For the next 50 years, Billy Graham preached to over 210 million people in more than 185 countries. He became close friends with Martin Luther King, Jr. in the 1950s

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and supported the civil rights movement. Graham became a spiritual advisor and confidant to every president from Truman to Barak Obama.

But what about the 21st century? In an era dominated by violence, prejudice, corruption, rising rates of suicide and addiction, our generation seems to be adrift without a moral compass. Who will God raise up to help us discover the spiritual truths that guided the generations that went before us? Our world is desperate for men and women of personal and spiritual integrity who can lift our souls to heaven.

Each of us can make a difference. When Jesus came, John preached to huge crowds (John 1), but Anna prayed (Luke 2:36-38). As did Simeon (Luke 2:25-35).

Every day, with every honest decision, with every generous action, with every kindness, every act of forgiveness, and every prayer, each of us can help save a lost and dying world.

Ryu dominates, Bellinger homers and Dodgers beat Padres 5-1

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Dodgers notched their 60th victory of the season with their ninth straight home win.

And compared to the last couple days, this one seemed rather dull.

"I apologize for the lack of drama, theatrics at the end," manager Dave Roberts said with a smile.

Hyun-Jin Ryu tossed six scoreless innings and All-Star Cody Bellinger hit his 30th home run in a 5-1 defeat of the San Diego Padres on Thursday

The Dodgers had won their previous five home games in thrilling walk-offs, one short of the major league record set by the 2000 Kansas City Royals. Bellinger had the winning RBIs on Tuesday and Wednesday.

This one was strictly by the book.

Ryu (10-2) allowed three hits, struck out five and walked a season-high three to become the first Dodgers starter to win a game since June 21, when Walker Buehler struck out 16 in a 4-2 victory over Colorado. The South Korean left-hander had one or no walks in his first 16 starts.

"My last game didn't go so well so I tried to go fullthrottle from the get-go," Ryu said through a translator, referring to a 13-9 loss at Colorado last week

that was his lone poor outing of the season. Ryu lowered his major league-leading ERA to 1.73 in his final appearance before starting for the National League in next week's All-Star game in

history entering the break. "He was in complete control," Roberts said.

Ryu is even better at home, with a 7-0 mark and 0.85 ERA.

Cleveland. His ERA is the sixth-best in franchise

"He's been the best pitcher in the National League. You can see why," Padres manager Andy Green said. "He pitches on edges all day long. He mixes. He gets to 2-0 counts, he doesn't give in."

Bellinger homered leading off the sixth, sending a 2-2 pitch into right field to join Reggie Jackson, Mark McGwire and Willie Mays as players 23 or younger with 30 homers before the All-Star break. Bellinger is the only Dodger to have done so.

"It doesn't matter who's throwing to him," Roberts said, "he's in such a good place."

Chris Taylor's sacrifice fly later in the inning extended the Dodgers' lead to 5-0.

The Padres dropped their fifth in a row, with JT

Chargois striking out their final five batters to end the game. "We put some grinds to the at-bats, we created

some first-and-third scenarios, just couldn't deliver that big swing," Green said. Dinelson Lamet (0-1) limited the Dodgers to two hits - including Max Muncy's 21st homer -

through four innings of his season debut and first start since 2017.

But he found trouble in the fifth.

After Matt Beaty singled leading off, Lamet loaded the bases on back-to-back walks to Taylor and Joc Pederson, scoring Beaty.

Alex Verdugo followed with a sacrifice fly to left field. Taylor tagged up and sprinted to the plate, swiping it with his left hand as he rolled over in beating the tag to make it 3-0.

Lamet missed all of last season after having Tommy John surgery. The right-hander gave up three runs and three hits in five innings, struck out seven and walked two.

"It was a really special moment," Lamet said

through a translator, "especially after everything that I went through during the post-op process. It

was great to get back out there." The Padres' lone run came on Eric Hosmer's RBI single in the eighth.

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

suit to play is diamonds, not clubs. At trick two, you should lead the ten of diamonds and let it ride if South follows low. Even if the ten loses to the king, you are assured of

nine tricks consisting of one spade, three hearts, three diamonds and two clubs. North can't profitably return a

spade, and you are home free whatever else he leads. Of course, if South has the king of

tricks by repeating the finesse.
If you were to tackle clubs instead of diamonds and South had the guarded queen, you could go down after South returned a spade through your queen.





179 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On July 5, 1954, Elvis Presley's first commercial recording session took place at Sun Records in Memphis, Tennessee; the song he recorded was "That's All Right."

On this date: In 1811, Venezuela became

the first South American country to declare independence from Spain. In 1865, the Secret Service

Division of the U.S. Treasury Department was founded in Washington, D.C., with the mission of suppressing counterfeit currency.

In 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the National Labor Relations Act. In 1946, the bikini, created by Louis Reard, was modeled by Micheline Bernardini during a poolside fashion show in Paris.

In 1947, Larry Doby made his debut with the Cleveland Indians, becoming the first black player in the American League three months after Iackie Robinson broke the color barrier in the National League. In the game against the Chicago White Sox at Comiskey Park, Doby, pinch-hitting for Bryan Stephens, struck out in his first at-bat during the seventh inning; Chicago won 6-5.

In 1971, President Richard Nixon certified the 26th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which lowered the minimum voting age from

In 1975, Arthur Ashe became the first black man to win a Wimbledon singles title as he defeated Jimmy Connors, 6-1, 6-1, 5-7, 6-4.

In 1977, Pakistan's army, led by General Mohammad Zia ul-Haq, seized power from President Zulfikar Ali Bhutto (Bhutto was executed in

"The Seinfeld In 1989, Chronicles," the pilot to the situation comedy "Seinfeld," aired on NBC-TV.

In 1991, a worldwide financial scandal erupted as regulators in eight countries shut down the Bank of Credit and Commerce International. In 2011, a jury in Orlando,

Florida, found Casey An-

thony, 25, not guilty of murder, manslaughter and child abuse in the 2008 disappearance and death of her 2-yearold daughter, Caylee. In 2013, Pope Francis cleared

two of the 20th Century's most influential popes to become saints in the Roman Catholic church, approving a miracle needed to canonize Pope John Paul II and waiving Vatican rules to honor Pope John XXIII.

Ten years ago: A bankruptcy judge ruled that General Motors Corp. could sell the bulk of its assets to a new company, clearing the way for the automaker to emerge from bankruptcy protection. Riots and street battles that killed nearly 200 people erupted in China's western Xinjiang province in the deadliest ethnic unrest to hit the region in decades. Roger Federer won his record 15th Grand Slam title when he outlasted Andy Roddick 5-7, 7-6 (6), 7-6 (5), 3-6, 16-14 in a marathon match for his sixth Wimbledon champion-

ship. Five years ago: Ukrainian troops forced pro-Russian insurgents out of Slovyansk, a key stronghold in Ukraine's embattled east. 
