School board accepts \$7,500 SM Energy donation for robotics

At their meeting Thursday evening, trustees of the Big Spring Independent School District welcomed a \$7,500 donation from SM Energy to the district's robotics program, bringing the total the company has gifted the program to \$27,500.

Kate Noble of SM Energy was on hand to make the check presentation.

"We really want to keep the robotics program going, and I will say that we've worked hand-in-hand with the district, as well as, the EDC came in and helped us out too," Noble told the school board. "What we've said from the beginning is, we didn't want to

come in and start a program in Big Spring that would then be taken away from you. We wanted to make sure that if we were going to fund something, it could continue to be funded. So that if a kid does it in second grade, they don't get to fourth grade and find out 'Oh, you can't do that anymore,' when maybe that's what they're excelling at."

"We're always grateful for any donation that a community partner offers, but SM Energy has been a particularly lucrative community partner," said BSISD Assistant Superintendent George Bancroft. "They've helped a lot of organizations in addition to the school district. This most

Farm Service Agency reminds Howard County producers of 2019 acreage reporting dates

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers that they must file accurate and timely crop acreage reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage, to prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits.

"To be eligible for FSA programs, all producers are encouraged to visit the FSA office in Howard County to file a crop acreage report by the applicable deadline," said Karla Hoelscher, Howard FSA County Executive Director in Howard County.

The following acreage reporting dates are applicable for Howard County:

- July 15, 2019: all spring seeded crops including but not limited to cotton, milo, haygrazer, and CRP
- Nov. 15, 2019: native grass for grazing that is covered by NAP

The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting dates:

- If the crop has not been planted by the reporting date, the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.
- If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above

Stay safe in the West Texas heat

High temperatures and summer activities can lead to danger without proper hydration. For older adults and young children, the risks can increase. Ensuring proper hydration is key when it comes to ensuring summertime fun can continue without a trip to the local hospital.

"When the topic of summer and the dangers associated with it comes up, we often get asked, how do I know if I am dehydrated," Heather Kincaid, administrator for Angels Care Home Health in Midland, said.

According to Kincaid, summertime presents an increased risk for older adults. Dehydration is one of the

more common risks associated with summertime, due to the heat levels and the different levels of dehydration that exist.

"The best defense against dehydration is prevention, but understanding what hydration means and the symptoms are key factors for protecting against dehydration," Kincaid said. "To help the communities we serve prepare to 'Beat the Heat' and know what actions to take, we offer the following helpful information and prevention tips."

The body needs water to survive. According to information provided by Angels Care Home Health, the body is made up of 55-60 percent

water according to the Centers for Disease Control. Every cell, tissue, and organ in the body must have water to work properly. For example, the body uses water to maintain its temperature, remove waste, and lubricate your joints. Water is needed for overall good health. When there isn't enough fluid in the body, it becomes dehydrated.

"While dehydration is something to pay attention to at any age, our older adults need to pay extra attention to the signs and symptoms because as we get older our ability to feel thirst lessens and de-

hydration can sneak up on you since you don't feel thirsty," Kincaid said.

According to Kincaid, a few of the other effects leading to dehydration is the frequency of having to use the bathroom. The more fluid lost, the more fluid is needed. In the elderly, body water content begins to fall and muscle mass declines. Muscle holds water, but fat does not, so as a person ages, their body water decreases.

"When dealing with older adults, you take the normal signs and symptoms, the increased effects of aging and you add on problems intensified by chronic illnesses such as diabetes, kidney disease and dementia. Additionally, medications that increase urination or help constipation can also cause dehydration," she said.

According to the Cleveland Clinic, dehydration is a common cause of hospitalization among elderly people because the symptoms of dehydration often go unrecognized. There are a few tips that can help avoid dehydration, such as continuously hydrate whether you are thirsty or not. To stay hydrated you don't have to chug gallons of water, the consistent consumption of ice cubes or pops can help serve the same purpose. If you are going to be outside keep a water bottle close by and drink regularly.

"It is recommended that we drink at least eight cups of water daily. That's a minimum, but more can help especially in extreme temperatures," Kincaid said. "Consuming foods high in water content can also help your body. Fruits and vegetables are good for this. About 20 percent of daily

fluid intake comes from our food actually."

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's nutrient database the top three hydrating foods are cucumbers, celery and iceberg lettuce. Other good foods include: zucchini, watermelon, strawberries and cauliflower.

Kincaid pointed out, just because you are drinking something does not mean you are staying hydrated. Alcohol and drinks high in caffeine can have a negative effect. Coffees, teas, or sodas can cause you to urinate more, but leave no hydration behind.

"The most important thing anyone, regardless of age, can do is to stay hydrated and know the symptoms of dehydration," she said.

Common symptoms include thirst, dry mouth, dark yellow urine, fatigue, headaches and irritability. Some people feel dizzy, have confusion, display sunken eyes, have muscle weakness or cramps.

"If you or someone you know has chronic dehydration and it is related to their lifestyle, occupation, or diet, they can work with their healthcare provider to make changes that make dehydration less likely," added Kincaid. "Most importantly, if someone has a chronic medical condition, such as congestive heart failure, it is important for them to talk with their doctor about how much fluid is needed to help prevent or minimize the risks for dehydration."

Overall, most seniors are unprepared for the health implications of Summer, specifically the changes that can occur from dehydration.

acreage reporting date, the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendars days after purchasing or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

Producers should also report crop acreage they intended to

plant but, because of a natural disaster, were prevented from planting. Prevented planting acreage must be reported on form CCC-576, Notice of Loss, no later than 15 calendar days after the final planting date for uninsured crops and crops covered under the Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program, and three days after the late planting date for insured crops.

Non-insured Crop Disaster As-

sistance Program (NAP) policyholders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP-covered crops is the earlier of the dates listed above or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.

recent \$7,500 will be allocated to three different campuses. I think that makes the total that SM has donated to our robotics program here in the district - I want to say it's \$27,500 over the last two or three years. We're incredibly grateful for that. It enriches the activities of our children."

Bancroft said the robotics program is a great addition to the district's curriculum.

"What we really like, there's three things about the robotics program that are beneficial," he said. "It is hands-on, but most importantly, they're learning a workforce skill. They're learning to code. And they have to work as a team to do that, so it satisfies our effort to groom kids to be good employees, or good business owners, for that matter. You're going to have to work with people. You're going to have to solve problems with other people. You're going to have time constraints on that problem solving. Robotics brings all that to the table and allows a kid to do all that in a low-risk opportunity. They get to wrestle with that when they're not on somebody's payroll."

In other business, the school board:

- Held a budget workshop during which the district's Chief Financial Officer Susan Bryant described the district's financial position and some of the features of the proposed 2019-2020 budget.

"We had a really good year. It's all good news," Bryant told the trustees. She added that the dis-

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trict is doing well, despite the fact that increased tax revenues have prompted the state to reduce the amount of financial support it's supplying to the district.

- Reviewed LEGAL and LOCAL policy updates.
- Set a proposed tax rate of \$0.97 per \$100 value, plus a \$0.15 per \$100 value tax rate for debt service. The proposed rates will be discussed along with the proposed budget for 2019-2020 at the August 8 school board meeting.

- Approved the Howard County Appraisal District budget for 2019-2020.

- Approved tools for evaluation of the district's superintendent. Superintendent Jay McWilliams described the evaluation tools as worksheets, one of which he fills out to give trustees data about district progress under his tenure; and separate worksheets to be filled out by each trustee regarding his performance.

- Met in closed session before returning to open session and approving two items: The first gives McWilliams status as an "authorized representative of Big Spring ISD to execute any and all subsequent release and settlement documents, as may be appropriate and necessary to finalize any settlement"; while the second authorizes the law firm Gravely and Pearson LLP as "litigation counsel of record" for Big Spring ISD.

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Reflections: Ants

The ants are back! We have kept them at bay inside the house, but outside, that is a different matter. A single dropped crumb on the patio and the next morning a stream of ants appear, hundreds of them in a neatly organized operation to dismantle the discarded food and store it in bits and bites for later use.

How do they do this? Do the wandering scout-ants have cell phones? When they make a discovery do they place a call back to home base and say, "Send the troops. We have food!" Who organizes the operation? Who tells these worker ants to answer the call, and who plots the shortest and least obstructed route to the treasure?

If they were humans, the searchers who discovered the food supply would immediately

stake a claim, lay title to it and horde it so that they could be wealthier than all the other ants. They would let the weaker ants in the colony starve, and they would probably spend most of their time in "ant court" defending the right to their possessions. "Ant lawyers" would probably claim the greatest portion of the wealth.

Why can't we learn from these little creatures? According to UNICEF, 3.3 million children die from undernutrition every year. They often die in remote villages far from public view. Over ten percent of the world's population live on less than \$2 per day.

I have to admit this convicts and alarms me. I need to be more like the little critters that invade my patio. I need to sound the alarm, send out the signal, marshal others and join them in distributing food and resources to those who need it, but how do we do this? How do we know that our gifts get to the people and places where they are needed? There is so much graft and corruption in the world that charitable gifts are often routed into the pockets of the greedy.

I guess the best thing is to be alert to opportunities. When one of our international students returned to Zambia to start Christ Life Ministries, I sent a check. When refugees lined up for shelter at the border, I sent a gift to the Annunciation House in El Paso. There are many others. The point, I guess, is to choose some way to help. If all of us gave more generously, we could make a difference, like the ants.

Proverbs says, "Go to the ant ... consider its ways and be wise! It has no commander, no overseer or ruler, yet it stores its provisions in summer and gathers its food at harvest" (Prov. 6:6-8). John the forerunner, described what we should do if we really want to respond in faith to the Messiah. He said, "Anyone who has two shirts should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same" (Luke 3:11).

In fact, our oldest begged us for weeks to buy some fireworks. He finally persuaded me to stop one day while we were out running errands together. He was so excited as we pulled up to the stand because the sign said, "Buy One Get One Free!" Ephraim believed that we got a great deal because for every firework we bought, we got one free. It became one of those "teachable moments" as I attempted to enlighten him to the whole concept of advertising.

I believe that there is a desire deep within the human heart to be free. That is why I think we are drawn to anything labeled "free", which is why the word is used so often in advertising. However, it is also the desire that inspired 56 men to sign a document drafted by Thomas Jefferson in 1776 declaring our independence as a free nation. And the rest, as they say, is history.

The most famous words of that powerful document are known by nearly all Americans: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness..." Jefferson goes on to declare that the United Colonies are free and independent states and are absolved of all allegiances to the British Crown, "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."

Freedom is not free. It is so valuable these men were willing to give up their fortunes, their lives, everything they had to secure freedom for themselves, their families and all who would call the United States their home. We were not created to be controlled. We were not created to live in bondage. I believe that we were created to be free. That desire within can drive us to do great things, and yet, the freedom that we ultimately seek, true freedom, spiritual freedom, can only be found as we lay down our life to follow Christ.

Paul articulates it so clearly in Romans 8: Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set you free from the law of sin and death. For what the law was powerless to do because it was weakened by the flesh, God did by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh to be a sin offering. And so he condemned sin in the flesh, in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fully met in us, who do not live according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. ~ Romans 8:1-4

As we live in the Spirit of Christ, we experience genuine freedom. Freedom from condemnation, freedom from fear, freedom from worry, freedom from others expectations, freedom from idols, freedom from the power of sin and death - as Jesus tells us, "Whoever the Son sets free is free indeed." May we experience the deeper freedom that God offers us and live as free people today.

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Combat Gear

When I was very little, we had an air force base on what was called Winnemucca Mountain. I dated a few of the airmen, and my sister married one of them. They would come into town in their full uniforms, and all the girls would swoon over them. Now, I just respect any man in uniform for the service to their country, be it military, law enforcement, or community helpers.

I didn't see many of the men in full combat gear because, at that time, we were not at war with anyone, but, once in a while, the National Guard Armory would put on a display of men in combat-ready gear. It was amazing how much stuff was included in their readiness to do battle.

As I was reading in God's Word, Ephesians 6 tells us as Christians, we are to wear the full armor of God. We are wrestling with evil in our present day world. God even tells us in the latter days the world will wax worse and worse. I think we may be in that second worse.

The armor of God is for the Christian's protection against those who oppose the plan and purpose of God. The helmet is the first piece we put on, which is salvation. Without the helmet, we are not protecting our mind from evil, but with it we have the mind of Christ.

The second piece is to gird our loins about with truth. Integrity is what makes others have confidence in how we live our lives. So when we tell others the truth, they will either accept it or get angry with us for telling them the truth. It remains their choice, but we mustn't fight against them.

The breastplate of righteousness is next. It protects the heart from evil's onslaught. If a person gets to the heart of any matter, righteousness will win and glorify the Lord every time.

We shod our feet with the preparation of the Gospel or Good News of Jesus Christ, which can bring the lasting peace of God to people who we talk to. Above all else, Jesus came to reconcile us to God with peace.

The shield of faith is our body covering to the joints and marrow of our being. It keeps us fighting the good fight even when the world is against what we are called to do. We quench all the fiery darts of the opposers of God with faith in Him.

The helmet of salvation and the sword of the Holy Spirit are our in-filling as we study His Word and use it to combat evil. Studying and praying for direction, we are able to watch and persevere and plead for protection for even the saints we don't know.

All of this armor of the Spirit makes us bold to help others see the mystery of the Gospel. We become ambassadors and faithful ministers in the Lord.

When Heaven comes into view, I believe we will be able to take our armor off, receive our crowns of righteousness, and lay those rewards at the feet of the King of kings and Lord of lords. We will wear the victor's crown and be welcomed into His Heaven He is preparing for all those who love Him. I can hardly wait.

And yet, by faith we have the God given ability to choose to forgive. My mom taught me that if someone has wronged you or hurt you, the best thing you can do is pray for that person. You can't continue to hold a grudge and pray for them. Try it. I promise it works.

AP source: Russell Westbrook going to Rockets for Chris Paul

LAS VEGAS — Russell Westbrook and James Harden are together again, and Chris Paul is leaving Houston to make that reunion happen.

A person with knowledge of the situation says the Oklahoma City Thunder have traded Westbrook to the Houston Rockets for Paul in a swapping of top point guards. The Thunder also are getting first-round picks in 2024 and 2026, plus the right to swap first-rounders in two other seasons, according to the person who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity Thursday because the trade has not been announced.

ESPN first reported the agreement.

Paul is a nine-time All-Star, Westbrook an eight-time selection. Paul has 9,181 career assists, the most among active players. Westbrook has 138 triple-doubles, tied with Magic Johnson for second-most in NBA history behind only Oscar Robertson's 181. Both members of Houston's new glitzy backcourt are recent MVPs: Westbrook won it in 2017, Harden won it in 2018. And the trade means that the NBA's two highest scorers over the last five seasons — Harden with 11,958 points, Westbrook with 10,025 — are now teammates.

Westbrook and Harden were Thunder teammates

for three seasons, the last of those being the 2011-12 campaign when that duo and Kevin Durant took Oklahoma City to the NBA Finals. They lost in five games to LeBron James, Dwyane Wade and the Miami Heat, and Harden departed that summer for Houston — where he's been an All-Star ever since.

But when the Thunder agreed last week to trade Paul George to the Los Angeles Clippers — in a move that essentially sealed 2019 NBA Finals MVP Kawhi Leonard's decision to leave Toronto for the Clippers — it became clear quickly that Westbrook would be on the move as well. And this trade, when completed, will mean that Thunder general manager Sam Presti has added the last week or so.

Oklahoma City got five first-round future selections as part of the George trade. The Thunder are getting two more in this trade, and got a 2020 first-round pick in the deal completed earlier this week that sent Jerami Grant to Denver.

It's the latest bold transaction in a wild offseason of movement that already saw Leonard become the first reigning Finals MVP change teams in the offseason after winning that award, Anthony Davis get traded from New Orleans to the Los Angeles Lakers, All-Star point guards like Kyrie Irving (Boston to Brooklyn), Kemba Walker (Charlotte to Boston) and D'Angelo Russell (Brooklyn to Golden

State) change teams, Durant leave the Warriors for Brooklyn, Jimmy Butler go from Philadelphia to Miami in a sign-and-trade, Al Horford move from Philadelphia from Boston.

"Craziest NBA summer by far," longtime NBA guard Jamal Crawford tweeted.

Paul and Harden were teammates for two seasons in Houston. The Rockets had a 3-2 lead over Golden State in the 2018 Western Conference finals when Paul injured a hamstring, and the Warriors rallied to win that series in seven games on the way to the NBA title. This past season, Houston was ousted in the second round by the Warriors.

The 34-year-old Paul is owed roughly \$125 million over the final three years of his contract, including a \$44.2 million option for 2021-22. Westbrook, who turns 31 early next season, is owed \$171 million over the final four years of his existing deal.

Paul has called Oklahoma City home before. He played his first two NBA seasons with the New Orleans-Oklahoma City Hornets while the team was displaced from Louisiana by the damage caused by Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

"Every game we played, I've never seen fan support like that," Paul told The Oklahoman for a story in February 2014 about his time in Oklahoma City.

The trade will become final after NBA approval, which is standard procedure.

Bidding quiz

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable, and open One Diamond. Partner responds One Heart. What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

- ♠ A83 ♥ 6 ♦ KQJ875 ♣ A74
- ♠ A9 ♥ KQ52 ♦ AQJ63 ♣ K7
- ♠ A874 ♥ — ♦ AK8632 ♣ AJ5
- ♠ 7 ♥ QJ7 ♦ AKQ95 ♣ AK83

- Two diamonds.** The choice is between bidding two and three diamonds, and neither one is fully accurate. Two diamonds is an underbid; three diamonds is an overbid. If partner's response had been one spade or two clubs, either of which would elevate the value of your hand, a three-diamond rebid would be in order. But with the one-heart response, your hand depreciates in value, and game possibilities are remote unless partner can voluntarily continue over two diamonds. If partner does bid again, some constructive move should then be made to show you are at the top of your previous rebid.
- Four hearts.** This is the type of hand with which some players might bid only three hearts, thinking it is a forcing bid. But the fact is that three hearts is only a strong invitation to continue bidding. If responder has only six or seven points, he is not required to bid over three hearts. With 19 high-card points, two doubletons and an excellent trump fit, you should not run the risk of playing at less than game. Also, you may reach a slam as a result of bidding four hearts that might be missed if you were to rebid only three hearts.
- One spade.** Here again we are influenced by partner's unsatisfactory initial response. Had partner bid one spade, two clubs or supported diamonds, the value of your hand would have improved significantly, but after a one-heart response, you have nothing to get excited about. One spade — rather than rebidding your diamonds — is chosen for two reasons: It is an open-ended bid that can show up to 18 points, and it also caters to the possibility that partner may have four spades. Rebidding diamonds would deny possession of four spades, and you could miss a game (or slam) in spades by failing to mention them at this point.
- Three clubs.** Not only must a game be reached, but slam possibilities must be explored, and the investigation is initiated by a jump-shift in clubs (forcing to game). You intend to support hearts on the next round to complete the picture of your high-card values and distribution. Once partner hears you support hearts, he will be able to evaluate his honor cards more accurately and decide how high to go. In deciding his next move, he should regard any honor cards in spades (other than the ace) as practically worthless.

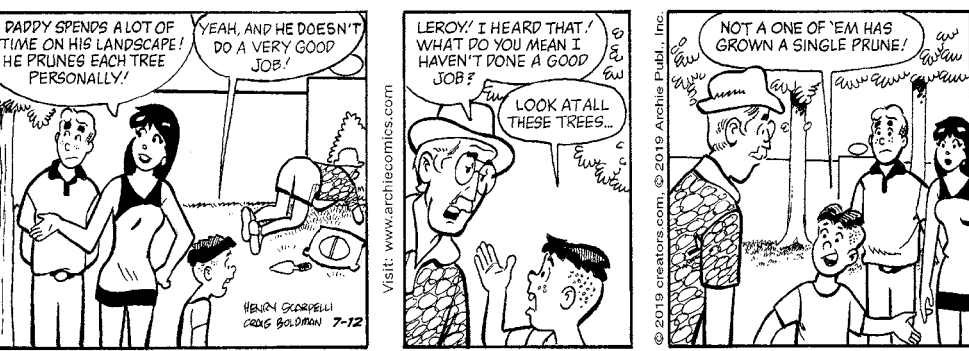

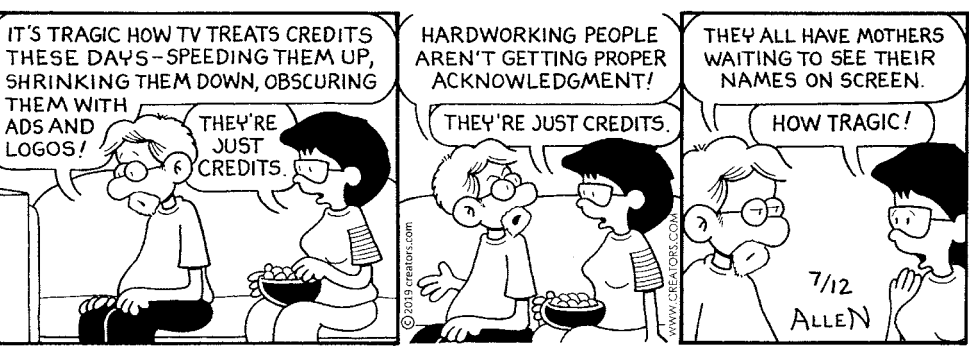

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Friday, July 12, the 193rd day of 2019. There are 172 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 12, 1984, Democratic presidential candidate Walter F. Mondale announced his choice of U.S. Rep. Geraldine A. Ferraro of New York to be his running-mate; Ferraro was the first woman to run for vice president on a major-party ticket.

On this date: In 1543, England's King Henry VIII married his sixth and last wife, Catherine Parr. In 1817, author, poet and naturalist Henry David Thoreau was born in Concord, Massachusetts. In 1862, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln signed a bill authorizing the Army Medal of Honor. In 1909, the House of Representatives joined the Senate in passing the 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, allowing for a federal income tax, and submitted it to the states. (It was declared ratified in February 1913.) In 1957, President Dwight D. Eisenhower was flown by helicopter from the White House to a secret mountaintop location as part of a drill involving a mock nuclear attack on Washington. In 1960, the Etch A Sketch Magic Screen drawing toy, invented by French electrician Andre Cassagnes, was first produced by the Ohio Art Co. In 1962, The Rolling Stones played their first-ever gig at The Marquee in London. In 1967, rioting erupted in Newark, New Jersey, over the police beating of a black taxi driver; 26 people were killed in the five days of violence that followed. In 1977, President Jimmy Carter defended Supreme Court limits on government payments for poor women's abortions, saying, "There are many things in life that are not fair." In 1994, President Bill Clinton, visiting Germany, went to the eastern sector of Berlin, the first U.S. president to do so since Harry Truman. In 2003, the USS Ronald Reagan, the first carrier named for

a living president, was commissioned in Norfolk, Va. In 2005, Prince Albert II of Monaco acceded to the throne of a 700-year-old dynasty. Ten years ago: Rebels in Nigeria set fire to an oil depot and loading tankers in Lagos, killing five people in the group's first attack outside the Delta region. Eun Hee Ji of South Korea made a 20-foot birdie putt on the 72nd hole, finishing off an even-par 71 to win the U.S. Women's Open. Five years ago: Afghanistan's two rival candidates reached a breakthrough agreement brokered by U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry to allow a complete audit of their contested presidential election. (Former Finance Minister Ashraf Ghani emerged the winner over former Foreign Minister Abdullah Abdullah.) One year ago: After an emergency gathering of NATO leaders held to address his criticisms, President Donald Trump said the U.S. commitment to the alliance "remains very strong," despite reports that he had threatened to pull out in a dispute over defense spending. Trump then flew to Great Britain for his first visit as president. Syria's government raised its flag over the southern city of Daraa, the cradle of the 2011 uprising against President Bashar Assad, after rebels in the city surrendered. "Game of Thrones" led the way with 22 Emmy nominations; Netflix programs captured 112 nominations, taking away HBO's front-runner title.

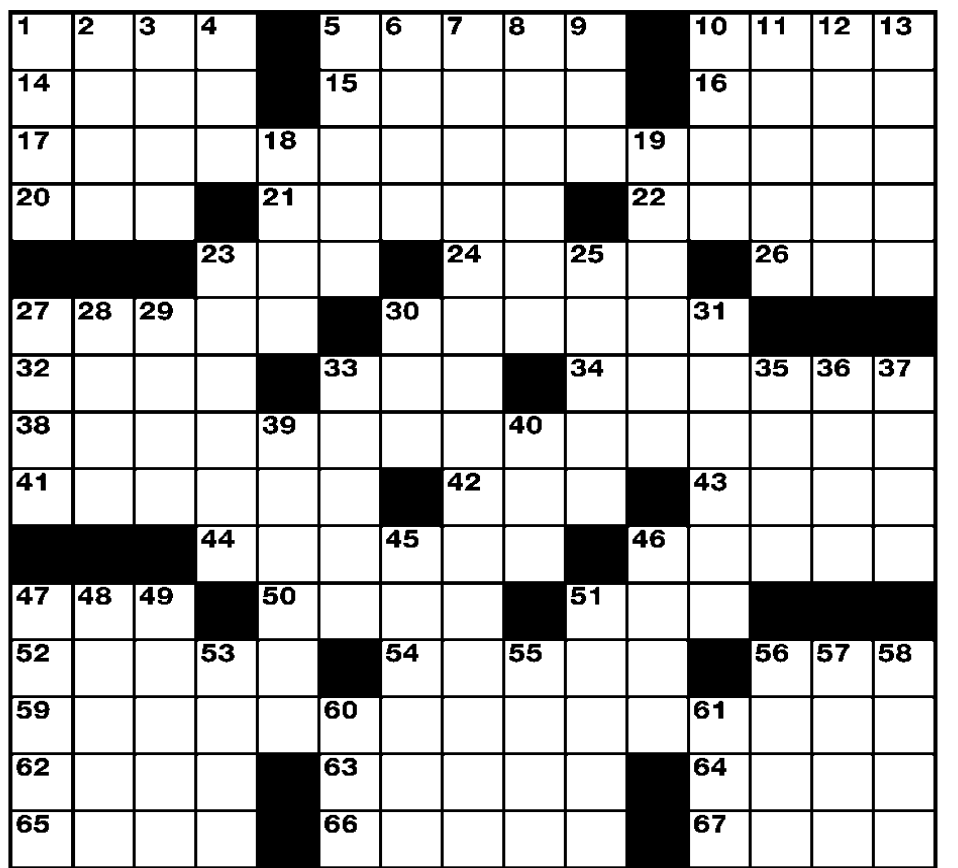
