The 24th lecture in the series, Events That Changed History, focused on Charles Darwin. In my opinion, another very controversial topic with many opinions on his book, “On the Origin of Species.”

Darwin’s ideas on evolution were not completely new. Many ideas were evolving and revolutionary in the 18th and 19th cen-

turies, as we’ve witnessed with prior lectures regarding Adam Smith and Karl Marx and their views on capitalism and communism.

Charles Darwin was a naturalist, geologist and biologist. His book on natural selection, where only the strongest of a species survives, became widely accepted amongst scientists.

In 1831, Darwin sailed from England where he would travel for the next five years, to chart the coast of South America. Along this journey, Darwin examined and cataloged all the plants and animals he encountered. It would not be until almost 30 years later that he wrote his revolutionary book.

Darwin’s theory is not

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Voter-Approval Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is \$1.1200. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the voter-approval rate of \$1.1200.

Briefly: Colby Harwell defeats Jake Istnick 5 and 3 at Shadow Hawk Golf Club to win his second Texas Mid-Amateur Match Play Championship in three years. Harwell won the 2017 Texas Mid-Amateur Match Play at San Antonio Country Club and adds another TGA state championship to his decorated mid-amateur career.

Golf Course: Opened in 1999, the award-winning course at Shadow Hawk was designed by Rees Jones. The 7,207-yard, par-72 layout stretches across 274 acres of pristine land and features a great variety of shape and length of holes, ample fairways, artistic bunkering and small, elevated greens. All the subtle challenges are front and

center at Shadow Hawk; there are no tricks or gimmicks. Shadow Hawk has earned the well-deserved reputation as a straightforward test of a player's skill.

Weather: Sunny, humid morning with in the mid-80s and a slight southerly breeze.

Championship Match Summary: With the match all square through four holes, Harwell began his charge with birdies of the fifth and sixth hole to take a 2 up lead. He maintained that lead and added to it with wins on the par-3 11th and par-4 12th to go 4 up with six to play. Harwell closed out the match with a stellar approach shot on the par-4 15th, leading to Istnick conceding the hole and the match 5 and 3.

"I tweaked a few things and everything seems to be clicking," the two-time defending Texas

Mid-Amateur Champion Harwell said. "This golf course really sets up well for me; I like being able to see the landing zones and the greens which allowed me to just play my game. There is nothing tricky about this place, it is a great golf course."

Harwell attributed his success this week to a solid performance on the greens.

"My putting has been really, really strong lately," Harwell said. "I have gone 11 rounds without a three putt and the greens out here were perfect this week."

The Texas Golf Association extends its sincere appreciation to the membership and staff at the Shadow Hawk Golf Club for hosting this year's Texas Mid-Amateur Match Play. The 2020 Texas Mid-Amateur Match Play will be contested at Willow Brook Country Club in Tyler next July.

Semien homers, A's beat Rangers 6-5 on walk-off walk

OAKLAND, Calif. — Khris Davis told himself to think small, and the reigning AL home run champ delivered.

Marcus Semien homered and scored the game-winning run on Davis' bases-loaded walk in the bottom of the ninth inning as the Oakland Athletics beat the Texas Rangers 6-5 on Sunday.

"Just get the job done, don't try to get too big and hit a home run," Davis said he told himself when he stepped to the plate.

Texas led 5-4 in the ninth with José Leclerc (1-3) pitching for a third straight day, seeking his sixth save. His blown save was his third.

Leclerc walked Davis with one out after Matt Olson singled in Chris Hermann with the tying run.

Davis, who was 1 for 3 with two walks, is mired in one of his worst slumps in years. He's batting .142 (11 for 78) this month and hasn't homered since June 18.

"You really want to be that guy and get the hit in that situation, but you know you have to be patient," A's manager Bob Melvin said. "He saw it well enough to see it was a ball and in

that situation it's as good as a hit, as good as a homer, and it gives us a win. So it was a key at-bat, obviously."

Hermann singled leading off the ninth and Semien followed with a walk.

Leclerc threw 31 pitches and 15 were fouled off.

Rangers manager Chris Woodward called on Leclerc again because Chris Martin was experiencing back tightness. Martin's injury isn't believed to be serious, Woodward said.

"It's unfair to put him in that role three days in a row and four out of five," Woodward said. "It hurts my heart to see him take the loss."

Danny Santana was 3 for 4 with a homer and a double for Texas. Nomar Mazara also went deep for the Rangers, winless in eight straight series. They are 0-6-2 since sweeping Detroit from June 25-27.

Santana was 8 for 19 in the series with two homers, two doubles, a triple and nine RBIs. His eight hits matched the most by a Rangers player in any series this season.

Texas rallied from a 4-2 deficit in the eighth when Willie Calhoun's RBI double off closer Liam Hendriks highlighted a three-run inning.

Melvin summoned Hendriks looking for a five-out save after Shin-Soo

Choo singled and Santana doubled to start the eighth against Joakim Soria.

Blake Treinen (4-3) worked a scoreless ninth for the win.

Oakland starter Mike Fiers, seeking his eighth straight win, gave up two runs in six innings of four-hit ball. He struck out six and walked four. The 34-year-old right-hander is unbeaten over his last 15 starts with a 2.30 ERA in 97 2/3 innings during that stretch.

Rangers starter Pedro Payano gave up three runs over 5 1/3 innings in his first career start.

Semien homered off Payano leading off the fourth. His 17th of the season broke a scoreless tie.

Santana hit his 15th home run leading off the sixth against Fiers, and Mazara connected on his 15th two batters later.

MINOR MOVE

The Rangers pushed back left-hander Mike Minor's next scheduled start from Tuesday to Wednesday. Minor has been the subject of trade speculation in recent weeks, and the move bumps his upcoming outing until after Wednesday's deadline, avoiding the possibility of issues with interested teams, Woodward said.

SHORT HOPS

Texas right-hander Edinson Vólquez, on the injured list with an

elbow strain since April 5, told reporters Saturday he wants to pitch again this year but plans to retire at the end of the season. ... Right-hander Kyle Dowdy, a Rule 5 selection claimed by the Rangers during spring training, cleared waivers and was accepted back by the Cleveland Indians after Texas designated him for assignment on Thursday.

Astros hit 3 homers, beat Cards 6-2; Goldschmidt streak ends

ST. LOUIS — George Springer has become a master at setting the tone for the Houston Astros. Springer led off the game with a home run, Jose Altuve and rookie Yordan Alvarez also connected and the Astros beat the St. Louis Cardinals 6-2 Sunday.

Houston has won nine of 11, including two of three in this interleague matchup of division leaders.

Paul Goldschmidt's team record-tying streak of six straight games with a home run ended for St. Louis. He singled in five at-bats.

Springer hit the second pitch of the game from Dakota Hudson over the wall in left for his seventh leadoff homer of the season and the 31st of his career.

"That's a good pitcher over there and once he gets established, it's tough sledding," Springer said. "I was just looking to hit a ball hard and I was fortunate enough to do that."

The 2017 World Series MVP is second on the Astros' all-time leadoff home run list. Hall of Famer Craig Biggio finished his career with 53.

"I've always said from the very first pitch of the game, he's very dangerous," Houston manager AJ Hinch said. "He's our spark. He's huge for us on so

many levels."

Dexter Fowler had a pinch-hit homer in the ninth for St. Louis, which lost for the third time in 11 games. The Cardinals fell back into a tie with the Cubs atop the NL Central.

Altuve had three hits, including a three-run homer that was his 16th of the season and made it 5-0 in the fifth inning. It was the 1,500th hit of his career — the star second baseman has four homers and eight RBIs over his last eight games.

"The game was on the line when I hit the ball," Altuve said. "You're not thinking about 1,500 hits. You're thinking about winning the game."

Altuve deflected credit to Springer, who had three hits, for kick-starting the win.

"For me, he's the best leadoff hitter in the game," Altuve said. "An elite player, a superstar."

Hudson (10-5), who gave up eight hits and five earned runs in four-plus innings, was aware of Springer's leadoff magic, but was unable to shut him down.

"He got a pitch he could handle and then hit it out," Hudson said. "That showed me pretty much what they were trying to do today."

Wade Miley (9-4) gave up five hits in five shutout innings. He struck out six and walked two in winning his third game since July 3.

"Our offense is always big, we score runs," Miley said. "(My stuff) wasn't very good. From the bull-

pen on, it was a grind."

Alvarez hit his 12th homer of the season in the third.

Hudson walked Miley to lead off the fifth. Springer followed with a double to set up Altuve's homer.

Astros infielder Yuli Gurriel extended his hitting streak to 16 games with a two-hit performance.

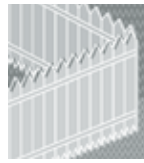

This deal occurred in a match between Canada and Mexico, and features a brilliant defensive play by Miguel Reygadas of Mexico, who held the West hand.

The Canadian North-South pair reached four hearts as shown. As played by them, North's notrump response was forcing for one round, and South's two-heart rebid guaranteed at least a six-card suit.

Reygadas led his singleton club, taken by dummy's ace. Because declarer couldn't afford to broach the

trump suit before doing something about his three spade losers, his next move was to lead a low diamond to the king.

Reygadas took the king with the ace, led a low spade to East's ace and ruffed the club return. It was the third trick for the defense. He then exited with a diamond to dummy's queen. After discarding the 10-4 of spades on the Q-J of diamonds, declarer next led the heart ten and, when East followed low, finessed the queen.

Since the heart finesse succeeded and the jack and king of hearts were going to fall under the ace on the next round, it might seem that South was sure to take the rest of the tricks. But a funny thing happened on the way to making the contract.

Visualizing perfectly what was about to take place, Reygadas refused to make life easy for declarer. When the heart was led to South's queen, he played his jack instead of woodenly following with the four.

Declarer cannot really be blamed for what happened next. To him it appeared, naturally enough, that West had no more trumps, which in turn meant that a second finesse would be necessary to trap East's "marked" K-4 of hearts. But when declarer tried to cross to dummy with a club to repeat the finesse, Reygadas trumped with the four of hearts to set the contract.

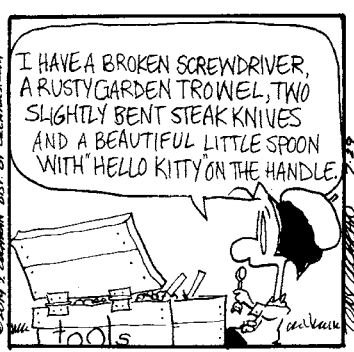

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Monday, July 29, the 210th day of 2019. There are 155 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 29, 1981, Britain's Prince Charles married Lady Diana Spencer in a glittering ceremony at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. (The couple divorced in 1996.)

On this date: In 1914, transcontinental telephone service in the U.S. became operational with the first test conversation between New York and San Francisco. Massachusetts' Cape Cod Canal, offering a shortcut across the base of the peninsula, was officially opened to shipping traffic. In 1921, Adolf Hitler became the leader ("fuhrer") of the National Socialist German Workers Party. In 1958, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the National Aeronautics and Space Act, creating NASA. In 1965, The Beatles' second feature film, "Help!" had its world premiere in London. In 1967, an accidental rocket launch on the deck of the supercarrier USS Forrestal in the Gulf of Tonkin resulted in a fire and explosions that killed 134 servicemen. (Among the survivors was future Arizona senator John McCain, a U.S. Navy lieutenant commander who narrowly escaped with his life.) In 1968, Pope Paul the Sixth reaffirmed the Roman Catholic Church's stance against artificial methods of birth control. In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford became the first U.S. president to visit the site of the Nazi concentration camp Auschwitz in Poland. In 1980, a state funeral was held in Cairo, Egypt, for the deposed Shah of Iran, who had died two days earlier at age 60. In 1994, abortion opponent Paul Hill shot and killed Dr. John Bayard Britton and Britton's bodyguard, James H. Barrett, outside the Ladies Center clinic in Pensacola, Florida. (Hill was executed in Sept. 2003.) In 1997, members of Congress from both parties embraced compromise legislation designed to balance the budget while cutting taxes. In 2004, Sen. John Kerry accepted the Democratic presi-

dential nomination at the party's convention in Boston with a military salute and the declaration: "I'm John Kerry and I'm reporting for duty." In 2017, U.S. and South Korean forces conducted joint live-fire exercises in response to North Korea's second launch of an intercontinental ballistic missile; experts said the North Korean launch showed that a large portion of the United States was now within range of North Korea's arsenal. Ten years ago: Microsoft and Yahoo announced a 10-year Internet search partnership under which Bing would replace Yahoo Search, as the companies agreed to take on the overwhelming dominance of Google in the online advertising market. Federal authorities arrested more than 30 suspects, including doctors, in a major Medicare fraud bust in New York. Five years ago: Spurred to action by the downing of a Malaysian airliner over rebel-held eastern Ukraine, the European Union approved dramatically tougher economic sanctions against Russia, including an arms embargo and restrictions on state-owned banks; President Barack Obama swiftly followed with an expansion of U.S. penalties targeting key sectors of the Russian economy. Mississippi's effort to close its last abortion clinic was blocked by a federal appeals court. One year ago: President Donald Trump tweeted that he was willing to see the government shut down over border security issues, including money for a U.S.-Mexico border wall. Pitcher Sean Newcomb of the Atlanta Braves was within one strike of a no-hitter before Chris Taylor singled for the Los Angeles Dodgers. (After the game, the 25-year-old Newcomb apologized for racist, homophobic and sexist tweets he had sent as a teenager; he described the tweets as "some stupid stuff" he said with friends.) 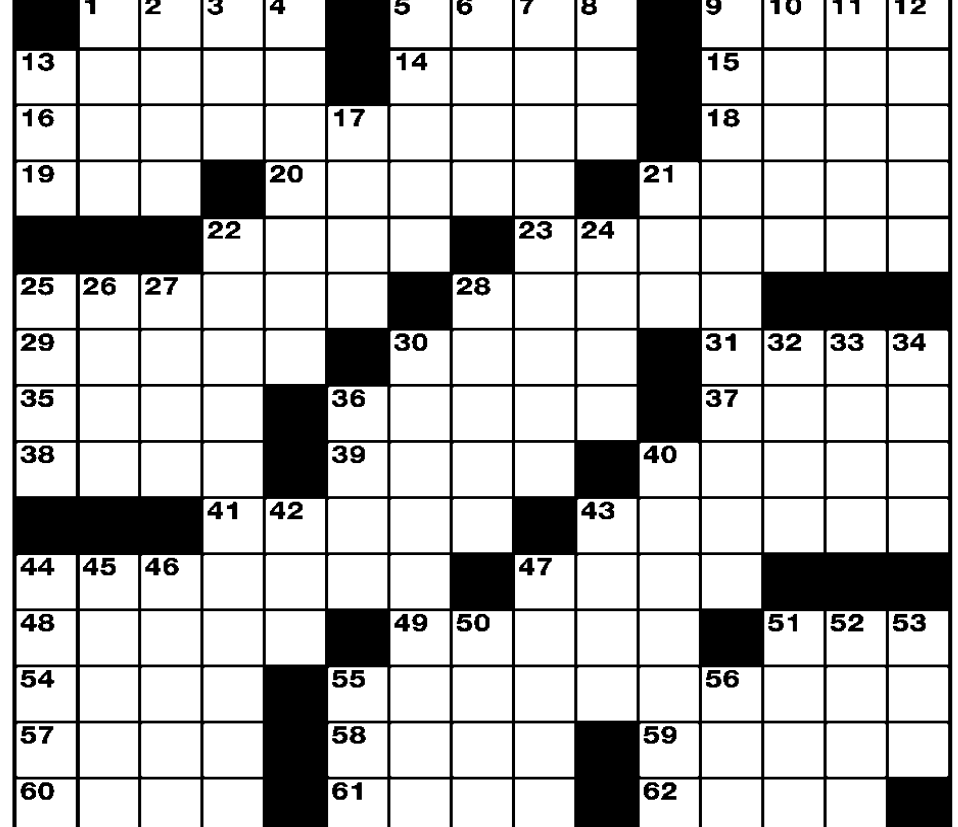
