

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A revolution of kindness hits Big Spring

Calvio brings The Kindness Revolution to Howard County

One person, one smile, one kind gesture and 300 bracelets; one small spark and before you know it a wildfire of kindness - The Kindness Revolution. Local resident Adrian Calvio is on a mission to find those who are spreading kindness, and he is inviting the community to join in. "I had another agent contact me

with this idea he had seen, and he said this would be right up my alley, and he was right, this is right up my alley. It's something that's in my heart; I love this kind of stuff," Adrian Calvio said. "There is a lot of negativity out there on social media and in society in general. The underneath of all this is to get people looking for the good. Instead of searching for crazy, bad sensational news, look

for the good in people. It may be a pipe dream for some people, but hey, at least I'm dreaming. It's kind of cheesy, but I hope people take it serious and it be the starting point of (our community)

starting to look for the good in people."

Ed Horrell wrote The Kindness Revolution in 2006, as a way to inspire culture shift inside of businesses, but his idea soon spread to a much bigger type of impact. In 2007, Horrell decided to create the Kindness Revolution that was structured on a pay it forward concept.

"The concept is simple. It's so corny it just might actually work. It's about teaching our kids that it's cool to be kind - trying to do a paradigm shift and help them understand It's awesome to be nice. If you want to be a cool kid then be kind," Calvio said. He continued, "I'm the ambas-

sador in our community, but that doesn't mean others can't get involved. There shouldn't be an agenda other than to be an ambassador for kindness. Let's work together to show kids it's cool to be kind."

Calvio described a scene; kids walking down the hall noticing a cool bracelet just like his. It sparks a conversation about how they got it. One kid points

out the cool bracelet and mentions he has one too and then wants to know how the other kid earned one.

"Can you imagine, let's start conversations about the positive things, a different kind of conversation. Too often, kids – and even adults – are only recognized for the wrong, but it's time we start recognizing the positive things. If we start recognizing people for the good then we will start looking for the good, even without a bracelet."

Initially Calvio is starting with 300 bracelets and endless opportunities. The first step of the launch will take place with local schools and a short presentation about the objective behind the movement. After visiting with teachers, administration and students, bracelets will be handed out and according to Calvio, the movement should go from

It's a pay it forward concept; the idea is not to keep it, but instead, when you see someone perform a random act of kindness you pass it on and just say "Hey, what is this? It's the Kindness Revolution. You've earned this, but it's not to keep it, but keep an eye out and pass it on." While teaching the youth the importance of being kind is one of the main focuses, the movement touches on all aspects of society – youth, adults and service members. Each category has a designated bracelet, but the message remains the same – Be kind.

"Service men and women are also part of the focus. Active military, retired, firefighters, police officers; they can hold on to it if they want, but I want

It's easy to give this to one of your buddies at the station, but let's go a step further. When you see a veteran think about that. Stop for a moment thank them for their service and give them a bracelet. From there they could pass it on to a police officer, EMS, whoever. This way all the services get touched by this bracelet."

Hopefully the bracelets will help create a thinking process of looking for good to reward good instead of looking for how someone messed up.

"It's about causing that paradigm shift in our community on the broad spectrum. Instead of looking how can I make myself feel better than you beause that makes me feel good. That's where a lot of society is right now and I want to help create something different than that. I'm not exempt from that, I'm human and it's tempting to be that way, but that's what this is about, to try and change that by training our minds to look for the positive instead of the negative," Calvio said. While the initial idea began with bracelets, Calvio

is thinking of other ways to recognize random acts of kindness in the community. The possibilities are endless, from spotlighting teachers, certificate presentations to local businesses and even Kind Student of the Year. "We don't need pats on the back, but it sure feels

good when someone notices you doing good. When you are looking down at the bracelet or looking at your certificate, and you are thinking that you've earned this. It may not have been the easiest thing to do that day. You could have just gone through that door because you were in a hurry, but you took five seconds extra; it was a little bit harder of a task, but you did it. That act of chivalry is gone..."

He continued, "The big picture – change of attitude. Attitude changes so much. The overall outcome I'm looking for is everyone respecting every-

ones opinions, even if they don't agree with you. It doesn't matter what side of the fence your on, what color of skin you have, what your beliefs are; it doesn't determine that we can't hang out with each other, we can hang out with each other and disagree with each other. Can you imagine the type of impact that has on this city - just our little city.... We all know we live in a society where differences create a split. Imagine if instead of splitting each other up because of our difference we were able to work together and create an amazing community. We can all agree we love people and we want the best for Big Spring. We may not agree how we are going to change things, and that's okay, the advantage of this is that people see the good in people and work together instead of tearing each other apart."

The Kindness Revolution isn't the first positive moment to sweep through Big Spring, but it is one that Calvio believes in and is encouraging the community to jump on board with. Other initiatives have included Richie Vasquez's "You are Important" movement and the Mayo Sauce's wall of paying it forward with free meals.

"At the end of the day, love wins and kindness wins. People may be reading this and thinking this is naive, or silly, but those are the ones who need to reactivate their life and rethink the way they. Positive thinking creates positive life. I'm not saying life is cherries; a lot of time life is terrible, but at the same time, we all deal with stuff, stuff happens how you choose to react to it makes all the differne in the world. I hope this will help people react kind.

Police: 13-year-old Texas boy dies in accidental shooting

JASPER, Texas (AP) — Authorities say a 13-year-old boy was accidentally shot and killed when two or three children were playing with a gun they found at a home in eastern Texas.

The Beaumont Enterprise reports that County Sheriff Mitchel Newman says Nick McBride died at a hospital in Beaumont Saturday night.

Newman says Nick was shot in the head at a house near Jasper, about 110 miles (180 kilometers) northeast of Houston.

It's unclear if Nick was one of the children who were playing with the gun. Newman says the shooting is under investigation, but all signs indicate it

Jasper Police Sgt. Cody Christopher says he encourages all firearm owners to use gun locks, which are provided for free by the police department.

2 Texas workers die after overcome by toxic fumes from truck

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities say two men have died after being overcome by toxic fumes while working with a mobile fertilizer truck near a Houston

Houston Fire Department Deputy Chief Richard Galvan says one worker had opened a hatch on the truck's fertilizer tank Monday morning when he inhaled toxic fumes.

Galvan says the second worker tried to help but he was also overcome by Both workers died at the scene. Their names were not immediately released

A hazardous materials crew from the fire department was determining if

any toxic fumes remained around the truck. Houston school district police chief Paul Cordova says there is no danger

from the toxic fumes to the neighborhood around the school.

2 dead in North Texas plane crash

GAINESVILLE, Texas (AP) — A flight instructor and her student are dead after the fiery crash of their twin-engine plane at a North Texas airport.

The Federal Aviation Administration says the Piper PA-34 went down soon after 4 p.m. Sunday while preparing to land at the municipal airport in Gainesville, about 75 miles (121 kilometers) northwest of Dallas near the Oklahoma border. It crashed about 440 yards (402 meters) from a runway. The Texas Department of Public Safety says Chinese student pilot 22-year-

old Yu Qiu was pronounced dead at the scene. Twenty-five-year-old instructor Francesca Norris of North Richland Hills later died at a hospital.

It's unclear who was in control when the plane went down. The National Transportation Safety Board is investigating the crash.

The FAA has not yet released the plane's tail number.

9 hurt after roof collapses at Houston construction site

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Fire Department says nine workers were taken to hospitals after they were injured when part of the roof of a building under construction collapsed.

Firefighters responded to the roof collapse Monday morning at a hotel under construction north of downtown Houston.

Video from local TV stations showed firefighters using a ladder from a truck to bring down some injured workers on stretchers.

The injuries to workers who were taken to hospitals included cuts and bro-

Officials said other workers were also injured but were treated at the scene

The cause of the roof collapse was not immediately known.

Armed man shot dead by Dallas police DALLAS (AP) — Dallas police have shot dead a man who they say fired a

handgun he was waving in an intersection. The incident happened shortly after 10 p.m. Saturday at the intersection of

Texas 342 and Camp Wisdom Road in the city's South Oak Cliff district.

Police Sgt. Warren Mitchell says someone flagged down police to report a man was waving a handgun in the intersection. As officers approached, the man fired his weapon. Officers then opened fire, wounding the man fatally.

Mitchell says no one else was wounded. The suspect's identity hasn't been released.

Midland International Air and Space Port to receive \$6M federal grant

WASHINGTON - The Midland International Air and Space Port has been awarded a \$6,023,406 federal grant to improve the terminal building, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn announced today. This grant will fund construction to help more efficiently move passengers and baggage by replacing five passenger boarding bridges and the outbound baggage system. The funding comes through the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) Airport Improvement Program (AIP).

Texas teenager accused of murder, rapes to be tried as adult

DALLAS (AP) — A Texas judge said she ordered a 16-year-old boy who's ac-

cused of killing a woman and raping at least four others in Dallas and Louisiana to be tried as an adult because the "public was indeed in need of protection" Dallas County Juvenile Judge Andrea Martin Lane told The Dallas Morning

said the allegations against Lenario Jarvis Washington are so serious as to warrant prosecution as an adult. The judge certified Washington as an adult on Wednesday. He's charged with crimes that include capital murder and four counts of aggravated sexual as-

News that she prefers to seek a rehabilitative approach for teen offenders, but

"I don't usually certify," she told the newspaper. "If there is a chance, then I'm most likely going to give them a chance."

The punishment Washington faces is much more severe if he's convicted as an adult. It's possible that he could be paroled after 40 years but a parole board may not allow it. A capital murder conviction can bring with it the death penalty but Washington won't be eligible because he's younger than 18.

Police have said Washington was seen as a suspect in part because the victims reported similar attacks: a suspect knocking on their door and asking for money or work, and then forcing his way inside while brandishing a weapon He was linked to the November death of 23-year-old Maria Ezquerro because of the proximity of her apartment to where three other Dallas attacks occurred, police said.

Washington was living in Dallas at the time of his arrest and previously was living in Bossier City, Louisiana, when two women were attacked in separate incidents there, police have said. He was 15 at the time. While Washington is charged with four counts of aggravated sexual assault, authorities said they've tied him to two other assaults.

Bossier City is about 170 miles (273 kilometers) east of Dallas.

A Dallas attorney listed in court records as representing Washington, Phillip Hayes, did not return a message Monday seeking a response to the allegations.

The case is reminiscent of one in Oklahoma where 18-year-old Deonte Green was sentenced earlier this month to life in prison for fatally shooting a teach er, raping an 81-year-old woman and other crimes. Green was 16 when he committed the crimes, which included a series of armed robberies, over the course of one day in October 2017.

Texas woman accused of cooking up raw beef insurance scheme

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities are accusing a Texas woman of taking part in an undercooked scheme in which she claimed she was served raw hamburger meat at two different locations of a fast food chain.

Cassandra Brooks, a former lieutenant with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, has been charged with insurance fraud and faces up to 10 years in prison if convicted.

Harris County, District Attorney Kim Ogg says Brooks was awarded more than \$10,000 as part of an insurance settlement after she claimed that she had been served raw beef at a Sonic restaurant in Lake Charles, Louisiana, in July 2018.

50th Anniversary Moon Landing Remembrance

After first steps on moon, crew welcomed home with aloha

HONOLULU (AP) — Neil Armstrong, Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin and Michael Collins' trip to the moon concluded with a stay in Hawaii.

This week marked the 50th anniversary of the moon landing, but after those historic first steps NASA still had to get the three astronauts safely back to Earth - and the waters off Hawaii are where the cone-shaped spacecraft splashed down.

The Honolulu Star-Advertiser reported Wednesday, the anniversary of the astronaut's return to Earth, that the crew hit the atmosphere at 25,000 mph, creating a fireball that was visible to the crew of the waiting recovery aircraft carrier USS Hornet stationed about 900 miles (1,448 kilometers) southwest of "It was like a shooting star when it come out of the sky," recalled Vance Hege,


who was a 20-year-old Marine on the Hornet 13 miles from the splashdown site. After two sonic booms, three huge parachutes slowed the descent to the Pa-Hege, now a 70-year-old Columbus, Indiana, resident, said the Navy "had he-

licopters all around" the command module after it splashed down in the Pa-The astronauts were scooped up and placed in quarantine, where the trio

was met by President Richard Nixon and returned to Pearl Harbor. About 25,000 people watched on July 26, 1969 as the astronauts made a 3-mile

(4.8-kilometer) trip to board their flight back to Houston. "It looked like a Kamehameha Day parade — and that was just to see the

trailer," said state Archivist Adam Jansen. The astronauts were only able to look out a closed window on the sealed camper as cheering and flag-waving spectators lined the route.

A 12-year-old boy ran all 3 miles alongside the quarantine unit, which was on

a flatbed truck, "so he could keep his eye on his heroes," the Sunday Honolulu Star-Bulletin and Advertiser reported at the time. Then-Gov. John A. Burns told the astronauts through a microphone system

that Hawaii was "immensely proud" to be the first state to welcome the trio back from the moon.

"We would just like to thank you for being here," Armstrong said from inside the unit. "This is perhaps the warmest welcome that any man or group of men have ever witnessed."

"It was all of you - all of mankind had a role in what we were able to accomplish," Collins said. "We have seen some amazing sights, but I've not seen

Quinn: Anthem protests 'might come up' with Cowboys' Jones

OXNARD, Calif. — Dallas defensive end Robert Quinn says he chose his new team before an offseason trade from Miami because it felt like the right fit when he visited the Cowboys.

There remains one issue unaddressed with owner Jerry Jones: protesting during the national anthem.

Quinn raised his fist during the anthem while he was with the Rams and then the Dolphins. Jones has always taken a hard stance against such displays by his players, saying a year ago at training camp: "Our policy is that you stand at the anthem, toe on the line."

Quinn said he hasn't addressed the topic yet with Jones.

"It might come up," Quinn told The Associated Press on Sunday when asked if he planned to discuss it with Jones. "Right now, it's not on my mind. I'm here to play football right now. Focus on my new journey."

Asked if he and Jones had to get on the same page on the issue before the season, Quinn told the AP, "I don't know. You'll have to talk to Jerry about that one." Jones declined to comment Mon-

The Cowboys open the regular season at home against the New York Giants on Sept. 8. Their preseason opener is Aug. 10 in San Francisco.

Since Colin Kaepernick sparked the debate in 2016 by kneeling during "The Star-Spangled Banner," players have been kneeling, sitting or raising fists during the anthem to protest police brutality, social injustice and racial inequality. Quinn said he grew frustrated with the reporting on the issue during his time with the Dolphins because he thought the message getting out was too much about "war and prison."

"Until we start talking about peace, love and happiness, this world will never get better," Quinn said. "That's my message. To you and whoever wants to listen, my message is peace, love and happiness. If you can't find peace, love and happiness within yourself, you'll never find it in somebody else.

"As sorry as it is, the type of world we live in, we've just got to, again, like I said, peace love and happiness within yourself. Just try to make the best out of every day. It's frustrating. But only so

much you can control. I got my family I need to take care of and some other folks. It sucks the way this world is. You can't fight a war by yourself."

Last year, the NFL quickly scrapped a proposed compromise that would have allowed players to stay in the locker room during the anthem while subjecting them to potential punishment for any displays during the anthem.

Jones said he wouldn't even support players staying in the locker room, then offered his "toe on the line" declaration. A year earlier, the outspoken billionaire was the first owner to suggest a player would be benched for protesting during the anthem. The closest any Dallas player has come to pro-

testing during the anthem came in 2017 when defensive linemen David Irving and Damontre Moore raised their fists briefly as the song ended. They weren't disciplined. Neither player is still with the Cowboys, but their departures weren't related to issues over the anthem. When the anthem issue flared again early in

players by President Donald Trump, the Cowboys decided on a show of unity before a game in Arizona. Before the anthem was played, Jones knelt with the players in a long line of locked arms. They stood before the anthem started. Jones has said he understands the point of view of players who have said they weren't protesting

He agreed on an \$8 mil-

"Literally, it was the feeling I got when I just walked in both buildings," Quinn said. "I don't think I could have went wrong either way. There's a reason my gut brought me here. Clearly it's my destiny."

Longtime AFL-NFL star Robinson headed to Hall of Fame

KANSAS CITY. Mo. — It seemed that one by one. members of the only Kansas City Chiefs team to win the Super Bowl would get a phone call or a knock on the door letting them know they had become Hall of Famers.

The quarterback, Len Dawson. The linebackers, Bobby Bell and Willie Lanier. Even the coach, Hank Stram. Eight in all from the team that beat the Vikings in Super Bowl IV were enshrined in

Now there are nine.

Johnny Robinson, the former LSU standoutturned-star safety during the years of the AFL-NFL merger, was chosen by 48 selectors after being nominated by the Hall of Fame's seniors committee. Robinson was passed over six times during the 1980s, but will finally get to slip on that famous gold jacket.

"I'm thrilled," he said in a statement. "I can't tell

you how pleased I am to have been selected." Robinson declined interview requests through a Chiefs spokesman, but his induction still echoed through the halls of their team facility. He is the sixth defensive starter from the 1967 championship team headed to Canton, joining Curley Culp,

Buck Buchanan and fellow defensive back Em-

mitt Thomas, along with Bell and Lanier.

He shined during that Super Bowl win, too. The Chiefs led the Vikings early in the second quarter when Robinson was in position to pick up a fumble that scuttled Minnesota's drive. Then in the fourth quarter, he had one of three interceptions of Joe Kapp and Gary Cuozzo that helped them seal the 23-7 victory.

It remains the last Super Bowl appearance by the Chiefs.

"We are thrilled that Johnny Robinson will be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame," team chairman and CEO Clark Hunt said in a statement. "Johnny was part of the foundation of the Super Bowl 4 championship team and was one of the best defensive backs of his generation."

Truthfully, he might have been an even better tennis player.

Robinson's father, Dub Robinson, spent four decades coaching tennis at LSU, where his precocious youngest son enrolled after a memorable three-sport prep career. Robinson teamed with his older brother, Tommy, to win a national boys junior tennis championship, and they continued to win after teaming up again for the Tigers. Johnny won an SEC singles title and together they won a doubles crown.

Meanwhile, Robinson had emerged as one of the biggest stars on the Tigers' football team, joining Louisiana locals Billy Cannon — the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner— and Warren Rabb in the backfield. In fact, Cannon and Robinson were so talented that innovative coach Paul Dietzel overhauled his offensive system and implemented the Wing-T so their talents could be maximized. They were unranked at the start of the season,

soared up the AP poll and defeated Clemson in the Sugar Bowl on New Year's Day to cap an unbeaten season with a national championship. Robinson was drafted twice in 1960, by the Detroit Lions in the NFL and the Dallas Texans in

Houston Oilers to win the AFL title in 1962, then followed the rechristened organization to Kansas

City in 1963. He became one of 20 players to play all 10 seasons of the AFL, then left an indelible mark on the NFL. He finished his career with 57 interceptions in a decade playing safety, earned a spot in seven Pro Bowls, received all-league recognition five

times and was chosen to the AFL's all-time team. What Robinson, now 80, accomplished after his playing days has been just as important.

After hearing the plight of a young boy at church, Robinson purchased a home in Monroe, Louisiana, and established Johnny Robinson's Boys Home for at-risk youth. It has grown from an endeavor launched on a whim into a house that has more than two dozen full-time employees and houses 30 boys and young men.

It has been his life's work for much of the past four decades, through the 1985 death of his own son, Tommy, and the numerous health problems Robinson has battled through the years: arthritis in his spine; thyroid cancer; non-Hodgkin lym-

phoma; a quadruple bypass; and a severe stroke. He has acknowledged over the years that some of that may stem from his days playing football.

Those health concerns are the reason he has remained out of the public spotlight in recent years, and why he asked members of the Chiefs' communications team to politely decline interview requests.

"Our family and the entire Chiefs organization are delighted for Johnny and his family," Hunt said. "At long last, he will take his rightful place the AFL. He wound up in Dallas and helped the among the greatest to ever play the game, in Canfranchise beat the two-time defending champion







This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, July 30, the 211th day of 2019. There are 154 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On July 30, 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a measure making "In God We Trust" the national motto, replacing "E Pluribus Unum" (Out of many, one). On this date:

In 1619, the first representative assembly in America convened in Jamestown in the Virginia Colony.

In 1729, Baltimore, Md. was founded.

In 1792, the French national anthem "La Marseillaise" (lah marseh-YEHZ'), by Claude Joseph Rouget de Lisle, was first sung in Paris by troops arriving from Marseille. In 1916, German saboteurs blew

up a munitions plant on Black Tom, an island near Jersey City, New Jersey, killing about a dozen people. In 1942, President Franklin D.

Roosevelt signed a bill creating a women's auxiliary agency in the Navy known as "Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service" — WAVES for short. In 1945, the Portland class heavy

cruiser USS Indianapolis, having just delivered components of the atomic bomb to Tinian in the Mariana Islands, was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine; only 317 out of nearly 1,200 men survived.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed a measure creating Medicare, which began operating the following year.

In 1975, former Teamsters union president Jimmy Hoffa disappeared in suburban Detroit; although presumed dead, his remains have never been found.

In 1980, Israel's Knesset passed a law reaffirming all of Jerusalem as the capital of the Jewish state. In 2001, Robert Mueller (MUHL'-ur), President George W. Bush's choice to head the FBI, promised the Senate Judiciary Committee that if confirmed, he would move forcefully to fix problems at the agency. (Mueller became FBI director on Sept. 4, 2001, a week before the 9/11 attacks.)

In 2002, WNBA player Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks became the first woman to dunk in a professional game, jamming on a breakaway in the first half of the Sparks' 82-73 loss to the Miami Sol.

In 2003, President George W. Bush took personal responsibility for the first time for using discredited intelligence in his State of the Union address, but predicted he would be vindicated for going to war against Iraq. Ten years ago: Harvard scholar Henry Louis Gates Jr. and Sgt. James Crowley, the Cambridge, Massachusetts, police officer who'd arrested him for disorderly conduct at his home, had beers with President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden at the White House to discuss the dispute that unleashed a furor over racial profiling in America.

Five years ago: The House overwhelmingly approved, 420-5, a landmark bill to refurbish the Veterans Affairs Department and improve veterans' health care. Three Israeli artillery shells slammed into a United Nations school in Gaza crowded with some 3,300 people; the shells, which Israel said came in response to mortar fire nearby, killed 17 people.

One year ago: Zimbabwe voted for the first time without Robert Mugabe on the ballot; there were long lines at some polling stations. President Donald Trump said he'd be willing to meet with Iranian President Hassan Rouhani "anytime" with "no preconditions." More than 27,000 people remained evacuated because of a Northern California wildfire that ranked as the ninth most destructive blaze in the state's history; the fire in the area of Redding had destroyed more than 800 homes and left two firefighters and four civilians dead. Ron Dellums, an anti-war activist who championed social justice as Northern California's first black congressman, died of cancer at his home in Washington at the age of 82.

BASEBALL

BOSTON (AP) — Former Red Sox slugger David Ortiz says he is glad to be home with family after a botched assassination attempt in his native Dominican Republic.

More than seven weeks after he was shot, Ortiz said on Instagram in his first public comments, "Being at home and look at my family celebrating that lm here safe is priceless." Ortiz was released from a Boston hospital on Friday.

He also thanked fans for their prayers. The post included pictures of a steak, pasta and grilled fish. Ortiz said, "Too bad l can't crush food yet!!!!"

Ortiz was shot in the back at a Santo Domingo nightclub June 9 by a hit man who police say was supposed to be targeting a different man. Ortiz was brought to Boston the next day needed three operations before he was released.

NEW YORK (AP) — The Philadelphia Phillies bolstered their beleaguered rotation.

Left-hander Jason Vargas was acquired from the New York Mets on Monday for Double-A catcher Austin Bossart.

The 36-year-old Vargas is 6-5 with a 4.01 ERA, winning his last three starts. He became expendable when the Mets acquired right-hander Marcus Stroman from Toronto on Sunday night for a pair of pitching prospects.

Vargas could start Friday night against the Chicago White Sox on normal four days' rest. Zach Eflin, who is scheduled to pitch that night, has a 10.46 ERA in his last six starts.

Vargas is owed \$2,666,667 of his \$8 million salary for the remainder of this season, and his contract includes an \$8 million club option for 2020 with a \$2 million buyout. He receives a \$250,000 assignment bonus. New York agreed to pay \$666,667 of Vargas' 2020 salary, with \$333,333 payable Sept. 2 and \$333,334 on Oct. 1, and \$250,000 to offset the assignment bonus. In addition, the Mets will pay \$2 million in 2020 to offset the salary or the buyout.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Max Scherzer is back on the 10-day injured list, unwelcome news for the Washington Nationals as they try to catch the Atlanta Braves in the NL East while pushing for a wild card berth.

The Nationals announced Monday that Scherzer was placed on the IL with a minor rhomboid strain. It's similar to the inflammation under his right shoulder that forced the ace right-hander to the IL for 19 days earlier this month.

Scherzer was dominant in June and won seven consecutive starts as Washington worked its way back into playoff contention following a 19-31 start. He returned from the IL last Thursday and allowed three runs in five innings in a no-decision against the Rockies. The next day, he had an MRI that revealed the injury. The three-time Cy Young Award winner is 9-5 with a 2.41

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Los Angeles Dodgers have traded left-hander Zac Rosscup to the St. Louis Cardinals for cash.

The Dodgers also put Enrique Hernández on the injured list with a sprained left hand Mon-

Rosscup is headed to his fourth team this sea-

Rosscup finished last season with Los Angeles, but was designated for assignment in November. He signed with Seattle, but was designated for assignment May 17.

Toronto claimed Rosscup off waivers, but designated him for assignment May 28 after two appearances. He re-signed with the Dodgers last month and made seven appearances, but was designated for assignment two weeks ago.

Rosscup is 2-0 with a 5.00 ERA in 28 combined appearances this season. He likely will join the Cardinals' Triple-A affiliate in Memphis.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Jordan Lyles is heading back to the Milwaukee Brewers, who are desperate for starting pitching as they try to repeat as NL Central champions.

The Brewers acquired the right-hander from the Pittsburgh Pirates on Monday for pitching prospect Cody Ponce, giving them a familiar name in their injury-depleted rotation. Lyles has struggled since the end of May.

"I'm definitely looking forward to a change," Lyles said during a conference call. "This last month hasn't gone in my favor. I've pitched poorly. We got off to a really good start, hot start, and kind of faced after some injuries here and there." Lyles worked out of the bullpen for Milwaukee

last fall, going 1-0 with a 3.31 ERA in 11 appearances for the Brewers while helping the club win the NL Central title. Lyles translated his success with Milwaukee into a one-year contract with the Pirates and earned a spot in the starting rotation out of spring training. NEW YORK (AP) — Troy Tulowitzki was frus-

trated his body kept letting him down.

A five-time All-Star with the Colorado Rockies who was limited to just five big league games since July 2017, Tulowitzki announced his retirement last Thursday. He finished with a .290 average, 225 homers and 780 RBIs in 13 seasons with Colorado (2006-15), Toronto (2015-17) and the Yankees.

He agreed to become a volunteer coach with the Texas Longhorns baseball team under head coach David Pierce.

HOCKEY

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — The New Jersey Devils acquired left wing Nikita Gusev from the Vegas Golden Knights and signed him to a two-year contract with an average annual salary of \$4.5 million.

The Devils sent a 2020 third-round draft pick and a 2021 second-round pick to Vegas in the deal announced Monday.

The 27-year-old Gusev has spent his entire professional career in the Russian Kontinental Hockey League. He is a four-time KHL All-Star who had 17 goals and 65 assists for SKA St. Petersburg in 2018-

Gusev has 119 goals and 213 assists in 391 career

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Goaltender Andrei Vasilevskiy has signed an eight-year, \$76 million contract extension with the Tampa Bay Lightning.

The team announced the deal — worth an average of \$9.5 million per season — with the Vezina Trophy winner on Monday.

Lightning vice president and general manager Julien BriseBois says the 25-year-old has "shown

unmatched work ethic and professionalism both on and off the ice" and that the club looks forward to Vasilevskiy "continuing his career in Tampa Bay for the foreseeable future."

The two-time All-Star appeared in 53 games last season, going 39-10-4 with a 2.40 goals-against average and a .919 save percentage while helping Tampa Bay match the NHL single-season record with 62 wins.

SUNRISE, Fla. (AP) — Hockey Hall of Famer Denis Potvin has announced his retirement as a television broadcaster for the Florida Panthers. Potvin, a former captain for the New York Island-

ers, was part of the Panthers' first broadcast team in 1993-94 and spent 21 seasons as their TV analyst. Potvin, 65, was the first overall pick of the 1973

draft and a cornerstone of the Islanders' four Stanley Cup championship teams from 1979-80 to 1982-83. He ranks second in playoff goals among NHL defensemen with 56.

SOCCER U.S. Soccer says the players on the World Cup

champion women's national team were paid more than their male counterparts from 2010 through 2018. According to a letter released Monday by U.S. Soccer President Carlos Cordeiro, the federation

has paid out \$34.1 million in salary and game bonuses to the women as opposed to \$26.4 million paid to the men. Those figures do not include the benefits received only by the women, like health care. Players for the women's team filed a federal lawsuit in March alleging "institutionalized gender discrimination" that includes inequitable com-

pensation when compared to players on the men's team. The two sides have agreed to mediation to settle the lawsuit. SAO PAULO (AP) — Brazilian police say they have finished the investigation of the rape accusa-

tion against soccer star Neymar but its conclusion will be made public on Tuesday. São Paulo police investigator Juliana Lopes Bussacos delivered her report on the case on Monday.

Brazilian model Najila Trindade has accused the 27-year-old striker of raping her in a Paris hotel in May. He denied the accusation and says their relations were consensual.

The Associated Press doesn't name alleged sexual assault victims unless they make their identities public, which Trindade did in several interviews.

Neymar is currently in a preseason tour of Asia with his club Paris Saint-Germain.
