2 mass shootings in less than 24 hours shock US; 29 killed

It took just 30 seconds in Ohio and zero bullets in Texas for officers to stop two mass shooters this weekend, but not before 29 people were killed and about 50 injured in less than 24 hours.

Officers gunned down the Ohio shooter at the doorstep of a bar-turned-hiding place in the middle of Dayton's nightclub district, and arrested the El Paso shooter as hundreds fled a crowded shopping center. Though the two attacks staggered a nation accustomed to gun violence, the bigger shock may have been that the death toll wasn't worse.

In the Texas border city of El Paso, a gunman opened fire Saturday morning in a shopping area packed with thousands of people during the busy back-to-school season. The attack killed 20 and wounded more than two

dozen, many of them critically.

Hours later in Dayton, Ohio, a gunman wearing body armor and carrying extra magazines opened fire in a popular nightlife area, killing nine and injuring at least 26 people.

The attacks came less than a week after a 19-year-old gunman killed three people and injured 13 others at the popular Gilroy Garlic Festival in California before dying of a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

The El Paso shooting was being investigated as a possible hate crime as authorities worked to confirm whether a racist, anti-immigrant screed posted online shortly beforehand was written by the man arrested. The border city is home to 680,000 people, many of them Latino.

El Paso authorities offered few details about the assault, but Police Chief Greg Allen described the scene as "hor-

rific" and said many of the 26 people who were hurt had life-threatening injuries.

In Dayton, the bloodshed was likely limited by the swift police response. Officers patrolling the area took just 30 seconds to stop the shooting, which unfolded around 1 a.m. on the streets of the downtown Oregon District, Mayor Nan Whaley said.

Video released by police shows 24-year-old Connor Betts being shot down by officers, just steps away from entering a bar filled with hiding patrons.

Had police not responded so quickly, "hundreds of people in the Oregon District could be dead today," Whaley said.

Betts' 22-year-old sister, Megan Betts,

The season begins September 12, 2019, with the Association's annual Kick-off Gala, which will be held at Trinity Baptist Church in The Fellowship Hall. The evening will include dinner, entertainment and a detailed report on the upcoming season from Dr. Keith Graumann, music director and conductor. Follow the Big Spring Symphony's Facebook page for more about the Gala.

The first concert will be September 14, and will feature Antonin Dvorak's Symphony No 9, "The New World," and selections from Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No 9.

The second concert, "The Nutcracker," will be December 14. The Midland Festival Ballet will be join the orchestra once again for this classic holiday experience.

The third concert, "Beethoven is 250" will be February 8, 2020, and will feature perennial favorite guest conductor Maestro John Giordano; and soprano Nicole Keeling.

The season closer on April 18, 2020, will be the orchestra's annual pop music concert, and will be entitled, "Bohemian Rhapsody." The BSSO welcomes back guest performers Jean's N' Classics to perform the music of Queen, as directed and arranged by Peter Brennan.

In addition to purchasing tickets and attending the concerts,

there are many ways to support the Symphony; which, as a non-profit organization, takes a great deal of funding to bring quality entertainment to Big Spring. was among those killed in Dayton.

Authorities identified the El Paso suspect as 21-year-old Patrick Crusius from Allen, a Dallas suburb which is a nearly 10-hour drive from El Paso.

El Paso Mayor Dee Margo said he knew the shooter was not from his city.

"It's not what we're about," the mayor said at a news conference with Gov. Greg Abbott and the police chief.

President Donald Trump denounced both shootings, saying "hate has no place in our country." Addressing reporters in Morristown, New Jersey, the president said Sunday that "we're going to take care" of the problem. He said he's been speaking to the attorney general, the FBI director and members of Congress and will make an additional statement Monday.

Trump also pointed to a mental illness problem in the U.S., calling the shooters "really very seriously mentally ill."

Democratic presidential candidate and former

Texas congressman Beto O'Rourke, who is from El Paso and was at a candidate forum Saturday in Las Vegas, appeared shaken after receiving news of the shooting in his hometown.

He said he heard early reports that the shooter might have had a military-style weapon, saying we need to "keep that (expletive) on the battlefield. Do not bring it into our communities."

The shootings were the 21st and 22nd mass killings of 2019 in the U.S., according to the AP/USA Today/Northeastern University mass murder database that tracks homicides where four or more people killed — not including the offender.

Including the two latest attacks, 125 people had been killed in the 2019 shootings.

In the Men's Division, Charlie Garcia duplicated his performance from Saturday with another outstanding score of 70 and won his 12th City Championship. Calhoun's 3-run triple keys Rangers in 9-4 win over Tigers

ARLINGTON, Texas — Rangers manager Chris Woodward stayed with Nomar Mazara and Willie Calhoun, and they delivered.

Calhoun hit a tiebreaking three-run triple in the seventh inning, and Texas beat the Detroit Tigers 9-4 on Sunday to finish a three-game sweep.

The Rangers had runners on the corners with two out in the seventh when Tigers manager Ron Gardenhire replaced José Cisneros (0-3) with Nick Ramirez.

Mazara and Calhoun were both hitting .200 against lefties, and Mazara was benched the previous three games against lefty starters. But Woodward sent them to the plate anyway.

Mazara worked a walk from a 1-2 count before Calhoun pulled a 2-0 pitch just inside the right-field line. Calhoun later scored on a wild pitch.

"For (Mazara) to be able to fight back and see that many pitches kind of like set it up for me," said Calhoun, who is hitting .303 since being recalled from Triple-A Nashville on July 25. "Against a lefty, it's nice to be able to square him up pretty good."

Rafael Montero (1-0) closed with 2 1/3 scoreless innings for his first major league win since September 2017 with the New York Mets. Texas' four-game win streak is its longest since a six-game streak in late June.

The Tigers went 2-8 on a 10-game road trip.

Detroit right-hander Jordan Zimmermann permitted four runs and six hits in six innings. He was trying to win for the second straight time after going 0-8 in his first 13 starts of the season.

Zimmermann had retired eight straight batters and was working with a 3-2 lead with one out in the fifth when Shin-Soo Choo hit a liner back to the mound. Zimmermann spun to his left and dropped to the dirt as the ball skimmed off the top of his glove for a hit.

"I was fine," Zimmermann said. "(Trainer Doug) Teter came out there, made sure everything was good."

The next batter was Danny Santana, who hit a 2-2 slider into the seats in right.

Texas rookie Pedro Payano allowed

three runs, two earned, and six hits in 4 1/3 innings in his second career start.

TEXAS HEAT

Rangers right-hander Emmanuel Clase pitched 1 2/3 innings of no-hit relief in an impressive major league debut. Clase struck out one and walked one. Ten of his 25 pitches hit double digits according to MLB.com, topped by 101.1.

Clase's contract was selected from Double-A Frisco on Friday. He had a combined 50 strikeouts in 44 2/3 innings this season with Frisco and High-A Down East.

Woodward said he was particularly impressed with Clase's demeanor. "We all knew he threw hard," Woodward said.

FOUL BALL INJURY

A female fan seated in the 25th row down the right-field line was struck in the head by a liner hit by Calhoun. He waited for a few minutes and watched as the fan was attended to at her seat before returning to the batter's box. The fan eventually walked out of the seating area accompanied by stadium personnel and was transported to a hospital for further evaluation.

SHORT HOPS

Texas swept the season series 6-0. Its only other sweep of an American League opponent was going 12-0 against the Minnesota Twins in 1999. ... Tigers DH Miguel Cabrera went 2 for 3 with two walks and has a seven-game hitting streak. ... Detroit is 1-64 when trailing after seven innings.

TRAINER'S ROOM

Tigers: INF Josh Harrison (hamstring), out since Memorial Day, played his fourth rehab game for Triple-A Toledo. He went 2 for 3 with two RBIs and a walk after previously going 0 for 9.

UP NEXT

Tigers right-hander Spencer Turnbull (3-9, 3.65 ERA), sidelined since July 17 with an upper back strain, will start Monday with a 70-pitch limit in the first of three games at home against the Chicago White Sox. Rangers left-hander Mike Minor (9-6, 3.21 ERA) will open a three-game series at Cleveland, having held the Indians to one run in eight innings in a win on June 20 in Arlington.

Verlander fans 10, pitching-rich Astros beat Mariners 3-1

HOUSTON — Another day, another dominant pitching performance by the Houston Astros.

Justin Verlander struck out 10 on Sunday and the Astros beat the Seattle Mariners 3-1 Sunday for a three-game sweep.

A day after Astros newcomer Aaron Sanchez and three relievers combined on a no-hitter, Verlander (15-4) took over the major league wins lead and left with an AL-best 2.68 ERA.

Houston's starters are 14-1 in the last 17 games, and Verlander has won his last five starts for the AL West leaders, striking out a combined 53 in that span.

"Each guy, when you create a competitive atmosphere like we have here, not that you want to one-up the guy before you, but you want to go out there and compete against some of the best in the world, and we've got a lot of the best in the world right here in the starting rotation," Verlander said.

He didn't give up a hit until Kyle Seager singled with two outs in the fourth inning. The Astros ace took a two-hit shutout in the seventh and exited after Seager led off with a home run.

"Verlander was really good today," Seattle manager Scott Servais said. "Oftentimes you see him with one or the other, the curveball or the slider going, and he had them both going today."

Verlander's 206 strikeouts rank second in the majors behind teammate Gerrit Cole (216). This is the fourth straight season the 36-year-old Verlander has fanned at least 200 batters and his ninth overall.

His reveling in the work of Houston's rotation as the Astros roll toward the postseason.

"It's pretty incredible," he said. "You just kind of stay in your own lane and try to keep doing what's making you great, and at the same time you appreciate everything that's going on around you."

Next up for the Astros: Newly acquired All-Star Zack Greinke makes his Houston debut.

Roberto Osuna struck out one in the ninth for his 25th save. The victory improved Houston to 12-1 against

Seattle this season and 38-12 against the AL West.

The Mariners couldn't get much going on offense throughout this series, getting four hits on Sunday and managing just seven hits and three runs in the three games.

"It's tough," Seattle right fielder Dylan Moore said. "They're obviously a good ballclub, but we can do better than that. Everybody in here is going to tell you that we didn't play offensively to our potential or our standards that we hold ourselves to."

Houston manager AJ Hinch raved about the work of not just his starters, but also the bullpen in this series.

"Everything from the attention to detail to the game planning to the execution and then to the bullpen coming in and getting huge outs, it's a really good stretch for us," he said. "One of the things that we pride ourselves in is preparation, and I think this series and leading up to this series it's been excellent."

Seattle opener Sam Tuivailala walked two in one-plus innings before Tommy Milone (1-6) came in. He yielded four hits and two runs in five innings for the loss.

The game was scoreless until the fourth, when Alex Bregman singled, Yordan Alvarez doubled and Carlos Correa singled for a run.

Bregman doubled with one out in the sixth and advanced to third on a wild pitch. Alvarez then hit a ball to the warning track in center field for a sacrifice fly. Alvarez got shaken up earlier in that at-bat when he fouled a ball off his knee.

Moore tripled with two outs in the Seattle fifth, but was left stranded when Verlander retired Mallex Smith for the third out.

Seager finished Verlander with his home run, and reliever Joe Smith worked around a single by J.P. Crawford.

Jake Marisnick singled in the Houston seventh, stole second, advanced to third on a wild pitch and scored on a sacrifice fly by Josh Reddick.

VERLANDER'S K'S

Verlander is the seventh player in MLB history to strike out 200 or more batters in nine seasons. He joins Nolan Ryan (15), Randy Johnson (13), Roger Clemens (12), Tom Seaver (10), Pedro Martinez (9) and Bob Gibson (9) on the list.

Bed-Training Twins

Dear Annie: We are grandparents who have adopted our twin 9-year-old grandchildren, a boy and a girl. They have lived with us permanently since they were 2 years old. They have separate bedrooms upstairs but have always slept together. The past year, they have chosen to sleep on the main floor in the guest bedroom. It is at the point in their lives where they'll soon grow into puberty, so within the past two months we have been trying to get them to sleep upstairs in their own bedrooms.

Every night we find them in the middle of the floor in various places: bathroom floor upstairs, closet floor downstairs, spare bedroom downstairs, on a couch or together in our grandson's bed. We have made efforts to make their rooms special: buying radios for their music; having them pick out their own paint colors and night lights; adding special "happy" posters, new beds & bedding with soft, cozy blankets; letting them sleep with their stuffed animals; and reading to them separately each night.

We kiss them good-night, tell them we love them and say, "sweet dreams" but every night they wake up at all hours and relocate. When we wake up during the night, we chase them back into their beds but still find them somewhere else

later. We have talked to them numerous times to allow them to express their fears -- darkness, ghosts, whatever -- and we've tried to offer helpful suggestions.

We have rewarded them with special privileges and treats on the three nights when they actually stayed upstairs, even though they did not stay in their own beds. We have also taken away privileges: no sleepovers with friends, no campouts (we let them camp out on the family room floor on weekends).

They do several things separately during the days, have separate friends, separate activities and separate classrooms. Please help us as we are all losing sleep over this life transition. -- Bedtime Help Needed

Dear Bedtime Help:

No one ever said parenting was easy, and you and your husband are experiencing a particularly difficult challenge. You are wise grandparents to recognize the danger of their sleeping together as brother and sister as they begin to go through puberty. You took all the right steps by using a reward system initially, and when that didn't work, imposing negative consequences for their actions. Since that is still not working, it's time to seek the help of a professional therapist as you and your grandchildren adjust to this new transition in life. Heading foreseeable problems off

at the pass is always a good step to take.

Dear Annie: My letter is about aging and manners toward the elderly.

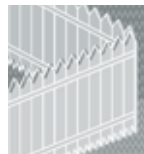

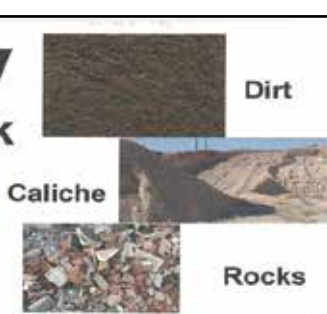

Contract Bridge

This famous hand occurred in the 1948 European Championship during a match between Norway and Great Britain. West was S.J. Simon, author of the classic "Why You Lose at Bridge," and East was the British star Terence Reese.

Reese missed the winning play, as he himself relates, but it is likely that most players would have done the same thing. Simon cashed the K-A of clubs — East playing high-low — and led a third club, which Reese ruffed. Reese then returned a heart. The Norwegian declarer won the heart, crossed to dummy with a diamond, took a trump finesse, returned to dummy with a diamond, took a second trump finesse and so made four spades. His only losers were two clubs and a ruff.

The same series of plays occurred at the second table, where the English declarer also made four spades. The deal was thus a standoff, but later received wide attention because both Easts could have defeated the contract by making an extraordinary play.

East can stop the contract by discarding a diamond at trick three instead of ruffing the third round of clubs! Declarer can then reach dummy only once, and — since he requires two trump leads from dummy to stop East from making two trump tricks — he must go down one.

The contract is easy enough to defeat on paper. But at the bridge table, where second thoughts don't count, practically any player holding the East cards would ruff the third club and then start thinking about what to do next.

The hand is an exceptionally fine illustration of why you can't afford to play the game mechanically.

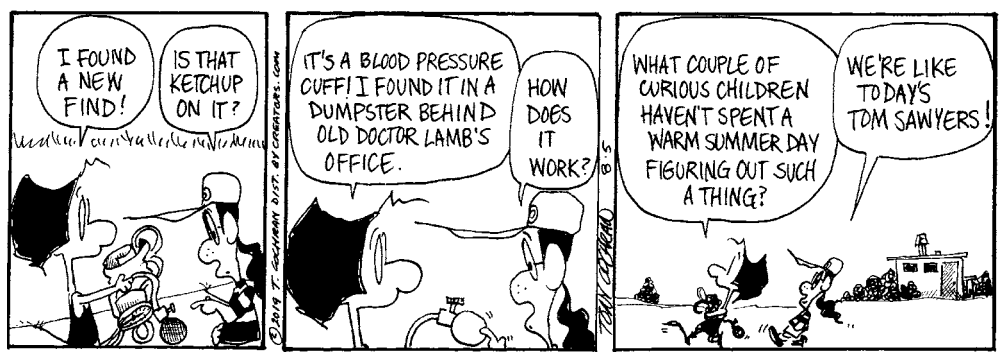

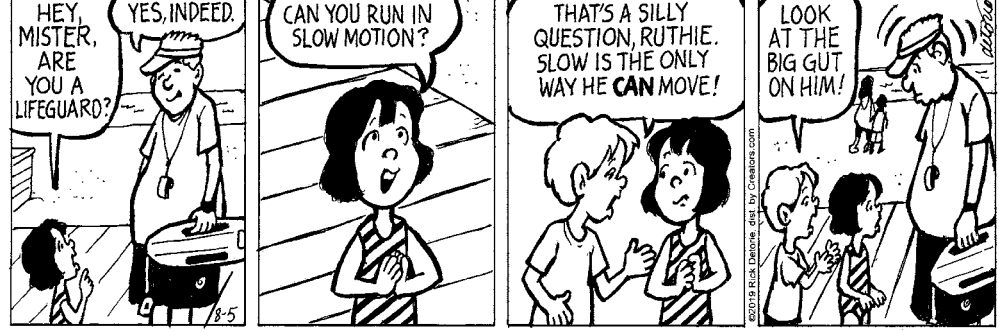

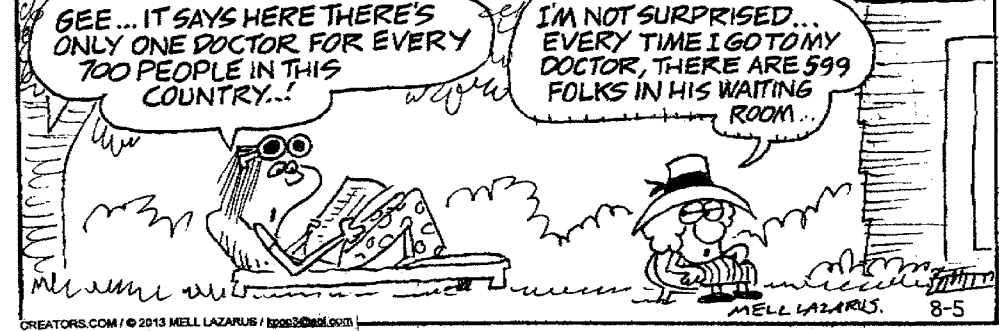

Today in History
Today is Monday, Aug. 5, the 117th day of 2019. There are 148 days left in the year.
Today's Highlight in History:
On August 5, 1962, actress Marilyn Monroe, 36, was found dead in her Los Angeles home; her death was ruled a probable suicide from "acute barbiturate poisoning."
On this date:
In 1864, during the Civil War, Union Adm. David G. Farragut led his fleet to victory in the Battle of Mobile Bay, Alabama.
In 1933, President Franklin D. Roosevelt established the National Labor Board, which was later replaced with the National Labor Relations Board.
In 1936, Jesse Owens of the United States won the 200-meter dash at the Berlin Olympics, collecting the third of his four gold medals.
In 1953, Operation Big Switch began as remaining prisoners taken during the Korean War were exchanged at Panmunjom.
In 1961, the amusement park Six Flags Over Texas had its official grand opening day in Arlington.
In 1962, South African anti-apartheid activist Nelson Mandela was arrested on charges of leaving the country without a passport and inciting workers to strike; it was the beginning of 27 years of imprisonment.
In 1964, U.S. Navy pilot Everett Alvarez Jr. became the first American flier to be shot down and captured by North Vietnam; he was held prisoner until February 1973.
In 1967, the U.S. space probe Mariner 7 flew by Mars, sending back photographs and scientific data.
In 1974, the White House released transcripts of subpoenaed tape recordings showing that President Richard Nixon and his chief of staff, H.R. Haldeman, had discussed a plan in June 1972 to use the CIA to thwart the FBI's Watergate investigation; revelation of the tape sparked Nixon's resignation.
In 1981, the federal government began firing air traffic controllers who had gone out on strike.
In 1991, Democratic congressional leaders formally launched an investigation into whether the 1980 Reagan-Bush campaign had secretly conspired with Iran to delay release of American hostages until after the presidential election, there-

by preventing an "October surprise" that supposedly would have benefited President Jimmy Carter. (A task force later concluded there was "no credible evidence" of such a deal.)
In 2002, the coral-encrusted gun turret of the Civil War ironclad USS Monitor was raised from the floor of the Atlantic, nearly 140 years after the historic warship sank during a storm.
Ten years ago: Journalists Laura Ling and Euna Lee arrived in Burbank, California, for a tearful reunion with their families after a flight from North Korea, where they'd been held for 4 1/2 months until former President Bill Clinton helped secure their release. Mahmoud Ahmadinejad (ah-muh-DEE'-neh-zahhd) was sworn in for a second term as Iran's president.
Five years ago: U.S. Maj. Gen. Harold Greene was shot to death near Kabul in one of the bloodiest insider attacks in the long Afghanistan war; the gunman, dressed as an Afghan soldier, turned on allied troops, wounding about 15, including a German general and two Afghan generals. American aid worker Nancy Writebol, infected with Ebola while in Liberia, arrived in Atlanta, joining Dr. Kent Brantley, a fellow patient being given an experimental treatment. (Both recovered.)
The San Antonio Spurs hired WNBA star Becky Hammon as an assistant coach, making her the first woman to join an NBA coaching staff.
One year ago: President Donald Trump tweeted that a 2016 meeting at Trump Tower involving his son and a lawyer with Kremlin connections had been aimed at collecting information about his opponent, an apparent change from an earlier assertion that the meeting "primarily" dealt with adoption of Russian children.
Authorities in Venezuela detained six people suspected of using drones packed with explosives in a failed bid to assassinate President Nicolas Maduro. Actress Charlotte Rae, best known as the housemother on the long-running sitcom "The Facts of Life," died at her Los Angeles

home at the age of 92.
