One-vehicle accident results in fatality

On Tuesday morning, at 11:40 a.m. on the South Service Road of IH-20, at mile marker 191, just three miles east of Coahoma, DPS responded to a one vehicle accident.

According to DPS, a 1996 Ford F-350, driven by Paul A. Escobedo of Del Rio, was traveling east on IH-20, when Escobedo exited onto the south service road at an unsafe speed, lost control, overcorrected and rolled the vehicle.

Escobedo received incapacitating injuries and was transported to Medical Center Hospital in Odessa. The passenger, Luis A. Pena, also of Del Rio, was transported to a local hospital where he was pronounced deceased by Justice of the Peace Angela Griffin. Escobedo was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the accident, while Pena was not.

The roadway was dry and weather conditions were clear at the time of the accident. No other vehicles were involved and no other injuries were sustained.

For those who fought, for those who were injured, for those who gave it all. A recognition that began more than 230 years ago – while it has transformed from it's inception – by General George Washington is aimed at bring-

ing recognition to those who not only fought, but suffered an injury in battle. with the honor of keeping the names of those who didn't have the privilege of returning home alive," Mike Tarpley, local Purple Heart recipient, said.

The first Purple Hearts – originally known as the Badge of Military Merit – were created and issued in 1782. The badge was to symbolize a soldier who had been wounded or killed in any action against an enemy of the United States or as a result of an act of any such enemy or opposing armed forces.

Across the nation, several cities have become Purple Heart cities. Through-

BSISD board to hold budget/ tax public hearing Thursday By ROGER CLINE

The Big Spring Independent School District Board of Trustees will hold their regular monthly meeting Thursday at 5:15 p.m. in the High School Board Room, 707 11th Place.

At the onset of the meeting, the board will hold a Public Hearing to listen to feedback from residents regarding the District's proposed budget for 2019-2020, as well as the proposed tax rate. The proposed tax rate, set at the board's previous meeting July 11, is \$0.97 per \$100 value, plus \$0.15 per \$100 value for debt service.

In other business the trustees will:

• Hear an update on the District's Guardian Program, through which some District employees are authorized to carry concealed firearms during the school day as a line of defense against the threat of active shooters at a local

Texas Speaker gives vague apology for 'hurtful' things said

The Texas House speaker offered lawmakers a vague apology Tuesday for "embarrassing" and "hurtful" things he said on a secretly-recorded conversation with a hardline conservative activist in a scandal that has rocked state Republicans.

The apology from first-term Speaker Dennis Bonnen didn't detail what was said, and it notably avoids mention of an alleged "hit list" of Republican lawmakers to target in the upcoming 2020 primary.

Activist Michael Quinn Sullivan has said he recorded his June meeting with Bonnen, and that it includes an offer from the speaker to give the media arm of Sullivan's Empower Texans lobbying group press credentials to the House chamber if Empower Texans would attack a specific group of Republicans in the primary.

Bonnen previously denied a target list of lawmakers, but didn't address it in Tuesday's note.

"I said terrible things that are embarrassing to the members, to the House, and to me personally," Bonnen said in the email. "You know me well enough to know I say things with no filter."

Bonnen also asked for "forgiveness" and said, "I hope to rebuild your trust."

The scandal is dragging into its third week and has rocked Bonnen's tenure as leader of the Republican-majority House as the GOP heading into the critical 2020 elections. Republicans have held the 150-member state House since 2003, but Democrats have shrunk the GOP majority to 16 seats and can re-take control if they flip just nine in 2020.

Even if they can't win a majority, Republican distrust in Bonnen could give Democrats a valuable bargaining chip to elect a new speaker in the nation's most populous conservative state.

Bonnen's apology note renewed his call for Sullivan to release the recording. Sullivan has so far refused and played it for only a handful of Republican lawmakers or consultants who are political allies.

"At what point will he apologize for lying to the public and his #Txlege colleagues?" Sullivan responded in a tweet. "When will he apologize to me for putting me in the position of hearing his unethical proposal?" Despite Republican control of the Legislature, Sullivan's group has long attacked GOP lawmakers it deems not conservative enough on spending, gun rights, abortion and other issues. Sullivan and Bonnen were sharply critical of each other earlier this year and news of the June meeting surprised many Republicans.

Empower Texans is bankrolled by wealthy West Texas businessman Tim Dunn and is best known for ranking lawmakers on a conservative scorecard and pumping millions into legislative campaigns, often in attempts to oust moderate Republican incumbents.

Bonnen had promised lawmakers he would work to protect incumbent Republicans in the upcoming primaries and the general election. In 2021, state lawmakers will be tasked with redrawing political voting maps.

'Republican Rep. Travis Clardy, who ran against Bonnen for speaker, has said he listened to Sullivan's recording and that it backs up the claim of a political hit list, which included him. He called the conversation "repugnant."

Texas man convicted second time for wife's 1999 killing

HOUSTON (AP) — A former high school football coach in the Houston area has been convicted for a second time in his pregnant wife's killing 20 years ago.

A jury convicted David Mark Temple of murder Tuesday during his retrial. Belinda Temple, a high school teacher who was seven months pregnant, was killed in January 1999.

Another jury found David Temple guilty of murder in 2007, but Texas' top criminal court overturned that conviction in 2016 because prosecutors withheld evidence.

Prosecutors told jurors Temple staged a burglary at the couple's home in Katy and shot his wife because he was having an affair.

Defense attorneys argued Belinda Temple was killed by a 16-year-old student of hers.

The punishment phase is next in the retrial. Temple faces up to life in prison.

4 people found dead in apparent San Antonio murder-suicide

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Emergency personnel responding to a San Antonio house fire found four people dead in an apparent murder-suicide, police said Tuesday.

Police spokeswoman Romana Lopez said officers received a report of a family disturbance Monday at a home in southwest San Antonio just south of Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland.

Responding officers found the house in flames and two bodies in the front yard with gunshot wounds. Firefighters were unable to immediately knock down the flames because the suspect was still considered a threat. The bodies of the suspect and his grandmother were later found inside, authorities said.

It's believed the bodies in the front yard — a man and a woman both in their 60s — were pulled from the home by neighbors who rushed over after seeing the flames, authorities said.

The three people who were killed lived together in the home, police Chief William McManus said Monday.

Officers responded after the sister of the man suspected of killing the three called police saying her brother was overturning tables and breaking items in the home, McManus said. The sister was not at the home when she called police.

The names of the victims and the suspect have not been released, and the matter remains under investigation have waited for a transport unit at the location of arrest."

Hale said his department has "immediately changed the policy" to prevent further use of the technique.

The officers had linked the rope to handcuffs worn by 43-year-old criminal trespass suspect Donald Neely and led him to a mounted patrol staging area.

Neely is free on bond. He has no listed telephone number and couldn't be reached for comment.

Hale told The Galveston County Daily News that he regularly talks to his officers about how their actions affect people's perception of the department.

"You have to be aware of the images we portray," he said. "We talk about it when we talk about use of force, when we talk about vehicle pursuits.

Photos of the Saturday arrest were widely circulated on social media, with many commenting on the appearance of a black man being led by mounted officers through city streets. Galveston police Chief Vernon Hale said in a statement Monday that while his officers used a technique that's acceptable in some situations, such as with crowd control, they "showed poor judgment in this instance and could

Greinke wins Astros debut with HR help, tops Rockies 11-6

HOUSTON - Zack Greinke's debut with the Houston Astros on Tuesday night was made easier by the warm welcome he received from his new teammates in the days since his trade from the Arizona Diamondbacks.

It didn't hurt that the Astros also provided him a ton of offense on a night where he didn't have his best stuff.

Greinke labored through six innings but wound up with a win as Houston hit four home runs to beat the Colorado Rockies 11-6.

"Sometimes it's a little awkward, but I feel pretty good here," said Greinke who is playing for his sixth team. "Guys make it real easy. So, it didn't feel awkward at all like some other times when I've been on new teams."

Playing in front of a season-high crowd of 43,243, the AL West leaders won their fifth straight. Yuli Gurriel hit two homers, Yordan Alvarez added a two-run drive and Carlos Correa homered and drove in three runs.

Greinke (11-4), a six-time All-Star who was traded on Wednesday, yielded seven hits and five runs with two walks and two strikeouts. He left with the game tied at 5, tagged by Raimel Tapia's three-run homer in the sixth.

But Houston scored two runs in the bottom of the inning, highlighted by Correa's home run, to give Greinke his first win since July 5.

"I was telling (catcher Martín Maldonado) Maldy that it kind of reminds me of back when I was in Milwaukee, it seemed like we scored like 10 runs a game," Greinke said. "So it's a good offense and it's fun to pitch with that going on."

He did have one gripe about Houston's powerful offense, though.

"Yeah, it's kind of boring," he said of the long wait between innings. "And just trying to stay loose, staying focused (when) not having anything to do.'

The AL West leaders got Greinke for four prospects in a startling trade just minutes before the deadline to complete deals. The 35-year-old righty added another top-level starter to an imposing rotation led by All-Stars Justin Verlander and Gerrit Cole.

Though he was with a new team, Greinke faced a

familiar opponent after making four starts against Colorado this season while playing in the NL West with the Diamondbacks. Tuesday's win gives the 2009 AL Cy Young Award winner 14 in his career against the Rockies, which is his most against any opponent and improves Houston's starters to 15-1 in their last 18 starts.

"Not having been around him, I was impressed by how he goes about his business, how he prepared, how he worked his way through his outing," manager AJ Hinch said. "He was very calm and very interactive during the game."

Charlie Blackmon hit a solo shot off Astros reliev-



er Chris Devenski in the seventh to cut it to 1. But Houston tacked on four more runs in the bottom of the frame on a two RBI double by Correa and a tworun homer by Gurriel to push the lead to 11-6.

Colorado starter German Márquez gave up eight hits and five runs in five innings. Chi Chi Gonzalez (0-4) allowed one hit and two runs without getting an out in the sixth for the loss.

Manager Bud Black lamented the struggles of his bullpen after the Rockies rallied to tie it.

"It's frustrating that when you come back a couple times, you have some momentum and you feel good about where you are and when they come back against you," he said. "Our guys are trying to make pitches tonight, and it didn't happen."

Daniel Murphy reached on a single by Alex Bregman to start the sixth before Greinke walked Ryan McMahon with one out. Ian Desmond grounded into a force out that left Murphy out at third before Tapia knocked a 66 mph curveball into the first row of the right field stands to tie it.

Tapia had struggled against Greinke before that homer, going 2 for 19 with one double and no RBIs.

Bregman doubled to start Houston's second before Alvarez's home run sailed to the second deck in right field to make it 2-0. An RBI single by Michael Brantley extended the lead to 3-0 in the third.

The Rockies cut the lead to 2 in the fourth when Trevor Story scored on a sacrifice fly by Nolan Arenado, which was his 700th RBI. McMahon followed with an RBI double which skipped down the left field line to make it 3-2.

Astros: Cole (13-5, 2.87) is scheduled to start for Houston on Wednesday. Cole, who leads the majors with 216 strikeouts, yielded four hits and one run in seven innings in his last outing against Cleveland to win his ninth straight decision.

There is a play in bridge called the scissors coup, but you don't have to know the name of the play to execute it; you can reap the benefits just the same if you make the play without knowing its name. Take this case where you reach five clubs on the bidding shown and West leads the nine of diamonds. It's not difficult to judge that the lead is a singleton, so all your thoughts should

be devoted to trying to stop West from getting a diamond ruff. Note that if you win the diamond in either hand and lead a trump, you one. West ace of clubs, puts East on lead with a spade and ruffs the diamond return to bring a sad end to the affair. But if you're more careful, you can short-circuit the impending ruff and make the contract. All you have to do is to win the first diamond in dummy, lead the king of hearts and discard your singleton nine of spades on it! It costs you nothing to make this play. You're simply substituting a heart loser that you don't have for a spade loser that you do have. But the reward for exchanging these losers is that you wind up making the contract instead of going down, since West can no longer reach his partner's hand to secure the killing diamond ruff. In effect, discarding a spade on the king of hearts serves as a scissors that cuts the vital link of communication between West and East and enables you to avert the threatened ruff. The scissors coup — whether you know what it's called or not - provides a neat solution to the dilemma.



In 2017, medical examiners said the remains of a man who'd been killed at the World Trade Center on 9/11



"We're looking for guys who are competitive, who can handle the discipline it's going to take to get this done, play a team game and basically fall in love with each other and have that empathy so that they feel responsible to each other and depend upon each other," Popovich said. "That obviously means you don't need the greatest amount of talent in the world.

"Too little talent is not a good thing, but we don't have that problem."

The biggest U.S. names — LeBron James, Kawhi Leonard, Stephen Curry, Kevin Durant, James Harden and so on — aren't playing World Cup. There are four current All-NBA players expected in the tournament, and three of them will be aiming to beat the U.S. Nikola Jokic will lead gold-medal hopeful Serbia, NBA MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo is playing for Greece, and Rudy Gobert is playing for France. The only American All-NBA guy in the mix is Kemba Walker, who knows team building over the next few days is vital. "On the court is pretty easy. I think we'll get that," Walker said. "Off the court is where we need to figure out, where we need to spend more time

other. Like Pop said, just love each other. That's the way it has to be, because it has to translate to on-the-court if we want to do something special with this team."

Even though the U.S. roster lacks the biggest stars, there's already a clear sense of competition.

Popovich brought in the select team - the younger NBA players who were invited to Las Vegas this week to push the national-teamers and potentially compete for their jobs — into practice Tuesday, and players said the intensity of play immediately ramped skyward. There's no grace period for players to ease into camp, not with stakes this high.

"They came to play," Miami center Bam Adebayo said. "I give them respect."

It's already clear that Popovich, entering his first tournament as the U.S. coach, doesn't want the 12 best players. He wants the 12 best-fitting ones.

So the roster is still anyone's guess.

Everything that happens on the practice floor and in scrimmages will matter in terms of evaluation, of course. But there's also the off-the-court bonds that Popovich will be wanting to see, the ones forged over dinners and meetings and conversations. When the U.S. plane leaves Los Angeles for Australia next Saturday, bonds that might not currently exist will have to be firmly in place.

"It's about how the group fits together," Popovich said. "You know. 12 All-Stars probably aren't

going to work great unless you have the right mix of point guards and defenders, big guys who can spread the court and shoot it. It's how they fit together. It's about being competitive, who the most team-oriented guys, who are the most
