town by taking care of their Adopt a Highway section – located on FM 700 - but have not limited their efforts to only that section of town. To aide in their efforts, KBSB purchased them a trailer to help pick up litter and trash that has been illegally dumped throughout the county.

"In addition to having adult probationers accomplish their required hours of community service, this Probation office has them perform activities that beautify the county and make public areas safer," Skiles said. "A project around the courthouse and county library involved tree trimand stumps, removing old stone edging and general landscaping. Department has also provided assistance when there were flooding issues around county buildings.'

In three years from 2016-2018, 884 individuals were involved in the department's activity, providing 61,763 hours of labor. In two years (2017 & 2018), they were able to pick up 46,566 pounds of litter and illegally-dumped items were removed from the county. Just as KBSB gave back to support

the department's efforts, the favor was returned when The Adult Probaceived a \$500 grant for desert plants. Upon reciept of the grant monites, they donated to KBSB, which allowed KBSB to restore grass to a burned area at the State Park.

"KBSB wants to share this inspiration and encourage all Big Spring residents to stay vigilant to prevent littering and dumping in the first place," Skiles said. "Please also let it become a habit to pick up the random litter that you see as you go about your day.'

and is about 4.1 cents per \$100 valuation higher than the Effective Tax Rate – the rate necessary to bring in the same amount of revenue as the City brought in this year.

According to City of Big Spring Financial Director Don Moore, new state laws might prove problematic for Big Spring's financial situation starting

"What they've done is, they've limited the amount that the Rollback Rate increases," Moore said. "The Rollback Rate is where taxpayers can force an election, citywide or whatever your local government is, election to reduce the rate back to the Effective Rate. The Rollback Rate, there are various calculations. The big one is, your Maintenance and Operation Rate could increase by 8 percent; the statute limits that now to 3 1/2 percent."

A tax structure Big Spring has adopted to receive additional Sales Tax revenue makes the lower Rollback Rate cap even more pronounced, Moore said.

"All cities are entitled to 1 percent on Sales Tax. The state gets 6 1/4, cities gets 1 percent. Most cities, there are things they can do to get up to 2 percent, so the total sales tax is 8.25," Moore said. "Most cities doing that, they did an EDC, an Economic Development Corporation, that allows another halfcent, and there's various ways they can get that last half-cent. The way this city chose was called an 'Adjusted Sales Tax Rollback Rate,' and what that means is, that half percent basically reduces the Rollback Rate to what that half percent would be. If we went up to the full Rollback Rate, the amount of tax revenue that would give is reduced to whatever rate it would be if that last half percent of Sales Tax came through."

Moore said the City portion of residents' Property Tax should increase slightly. City Property Tax on a home valued at \$100,000 will increase by about \$14.49 per year, from about \$729 to about \$744. Moore emphasized that the Council's actions

Tuesday night did not officially set the tax rate, it simply set the proposed rate which will be open for public commentary before being voted on Sept. 10. In other business, the Council approved increases

for garbage collection and landfill gate fees, while at the same time eliminating landfill gate fees altogether for residential customers. According to City Manager Todd Darden, the increase is the City's first bump in sanitation rates since 2014. With the ordinance passed Tuesday evening,

monthly collection fees for single-family dwellings will increase from \$19.10 to \$21.97; fees for additional roll-outs for single-family dwellings will increase from \$15.50 to \$17.83; and fees for additional requested pick-up of containers will increase from Commercial collection fees will also increase.

Commercial customers' rates will increase from \$32.85 to \$37.78 a month for a 1.5 cubic yard container collected once per week, and from \$42.19 to \$48.52 for a 3 cubic yard container collected once per week. For two collections weekly, rates will increase from \$65.79 to \$75.56 per month for a 1.5 cubic yard container, and from \$84.38 to \$97.04 for a three cubic yard container. Commercial customers whose garbage is collected four times per week will see increases from \$131.40 to \$151.11 for 1.5 cubic yard containers, and from \$168.76 to \$194.07 for three cubic yard containers.

In addition, roll off container and compactor service landfill charges will increase from \$45 to \$46 per ton. The daily fee for 30-yard containers, scheduled service charges Monday through Friday, unscheduled collection service charges, and delay charges for scheduled or unscheduled collections requiring more than one hour will remain unchanged.

Landfill entry fees will be free for residential

customers, and are set at \$25 per dump or \$500 per year per vehicle for commercial customers. Weight fees will be set at \$46 per ton for regular, limb and brush, and large items and household trash. Additionally, a "Permit for Private Collector," allowing a private garbage collector permission to bring municipal solid waste into the City Landfill from outside the city limits, is increased from \$400 per year to \$3,000 per year.

The ordinance under consideration also provides for regular increases of 2 percent to the garbage collection and landfill fees per fiscal year, beginning in October of 2020.

- Heard Mayor Shannon Thomason read a proclamation in support of El Paso in light of the August 3 shooting. The proclamation designated this week "El Paso Strong" week in Big Spring.
- Heard the Delinquent Tax Annual Report for July 2018, presented by Drew Mouton of Mouton and Mouton Law Firm, the firm that handles collections for the City's delinquent taxes. Mouton told the council "This is one of the best reports we've had in a good while."
- Approved a fee waiver request for Big Spring Youth Soccer Association teams at Roy Anderson Sports Complex for the current year.
- Approved an eight-month extension of a contract with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper for Water Plant operations services, allowing time for City employees to take classes and receive supervisory certification. The cost of the contract extension is

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Welding operations spark wildfires

SAN ANGELO, Texas — Over the last 14 days in West Texas, temperatures climbed over 100 degrees and the last significant rain occurred in June, resulting in dry conditions ripe for wildfire ignition. Local fire departments responded to multiple fires sparked by welding in the last week.

Texas A&M Forest Service reminds everyone to be aware of the increased wildfire potential while using welding equipment and encourages preventative measures and maintenance to avoid ignitions.

Welding fires are caused by sparks, droplets of melted metal (hot slag), torch flames, combustible materials touching a hot piece of equipment, or flammable vapors igniting due to heat. Sparks can travel up to 35 feet at temperatures hotter than

2500°F and become lodged in cracks or holes, other small openings, clothing or any receptive fuel bed.

By taking the time to maintain equipment and prepare work areas, you can mitigate the threat of starting a wildfire. Welders should take the following precautions:

Investigate surroundings before welding begins Wildfire prevention begins, first and foremost, with the welder. Clear away vegetation or any other combustible materials around the welding area and use a sprayer to wet down the area prior to starting welding operations.

Keep flammable materials far from welding areas The sparks and expulsion of molten metal produced by welding and cutting processes are ready sources of ignition that can travel up to 35 feet from their source. Because sparks can travel so far, any combustible material in the immediate area can pose a significant fire hazard. As a result, all welding areas should be free of flammable materials.

Always keep a fire extinguisher nearby

It is important to be ready for any fire danger that may occur. As such, all areas where welding is being performed must have a fire extinguisher nearby. Fire extinguishers are very effective in handling the early stages of a fire. When utilized, portable fire extinguishers effectively eliminate 80% of fires.

Exercise science student presents study on asthma

(DENTON, Texas)--This summer, Yeremyah Phillips '20 completed a tenweek internship at the University of North Texas Health Science Center in their Summer Multicultural Advancement Research Training (SMART) program. He worked on a research project and presented a poster and abstract titled "Effect of Aerobic Exercise on Lung Function in Those with Asthma: NHANES 2007 to 2012."

The study found that "Physical conditioning through moderate to high levels of aerobic exercise...will significantly reduce asthma and improve lung function"

"It's exciting to have a response that matched my hypothesis," Phillips said. "These results could actually help people with asthma. That's been the most inspiring part."

Phillips is the first author of the abstract, meaning he conducted the majority of the research. He created a literature review of a data set from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, wrote the paper, and created a cell diagram showing where exercise can help reduce asthma in the body.

Phillips has submitted his project to the Society for Advancement of Chicanos/Hispanics and Native Americans in Science (SACNAS) conference and the Annual Biomedical Research Conference for Minority Students (ABRCMS). If his project is accepted, he will have the opportunity to present it in Hawaii and Anaheim, California, respectively.

Phillips is a senior majoring in Exercise Science with a minor in Leadership. He works as a physical therapy technician at Hendrick and as a chemistry tutor on campus. Phillips is involved at HSU as the president of the Physical Therapy Club and the Student Government representative for Gamma Beta Phi honor society. He is currently applying for PT school and hopes to attend HSU's program.

"HSU has lots of resources and opportunities," Phillips said." I've found a lot of ways to build my resume and prepare for grad school. It's a small school, but we have lots of mentors and advisors to help you along the way."

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2 guards suspended and warden reassigned after Epstein death

NEW YORK (AP) — The warden at the federal jail where Jeffrey Epstein took his own life over the weekend was removed Tuesday and two guards who were supposed to be watching the financier were placed on leave while federal authorities investigate the death.

The move by the Justice Department came amid mounting evidence that the chronically understaffed Metropolitan Correctional Center may have bungled its responsibility to keep the 66-year-old Epstein from harming himself while he awaited trial on charges of sexually abusing teenage girls. Epstein was taken off a suicide watch last month

for reasons that have not been explained, and was supposed to have been checked on by a guard every 30 minutes. But investigators learned those checks weren't done for several hours before he was found Saturday morning, according to a person familiar with the case who was not authorized to discuss it and spoke on condition of anonymity. Guards on the unit are now suspected of falsi-

fying log entries to show they were making the checks, according to another person familiar with the probe. In the past, guards at both federal and state pris-

ons have faced criminal charges over false entries in duty logs that were discovered after something went wrong with a prisoner. Surveillance video reviewed after the death

showed guards never made some of the checks noted in the log, according to the person, who also was't authorized to disclose information and spoke to The Associated Press Tuesday on condition of anonymity. Attorney General William Barr ordered warden Lamine N'Diave temporarily assigned to the Bu-

reau of Prisons' regional office while the FBI and the Justice Department's inspector general investigate. The two guards were not identified. While the exact manner of Epstein's death has not been officially announced, another person fa-

miliar with operations at the jail said the financier was discovered in his cell with a bedsheet around his neck. That person likewise spoke on condition of anonymity for the same reason. Under the jail's protocol, Epstein would not have

been given a bedsheet had he been on suicide watch. He was placed on suicide watch last month after he was found on the floor of his cell with bruises on his neck, but he was later returned to the jail's special housing unit for inmates needing close supervision.

The Bureau of Prisons sent a team of prison

psychologists, known as a suicide reconstruction team, to the jail on Tuesday, a Justice Department official said. They are expected to reconstruct the scene, analyze why Epstein took his own life and look at how it happened, the official said. The official couldn't discuss the matter publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

The official said Deputy Attorney General Jeffrey Rosen was being briefed by the FBI every three hours on the progress of their investigation.

On Monday, Barr said that he was "frankly angry to learn of the MCC's failure to adequately secure this prisoner." adding: "We will get to the bottom of what happened and there will be accountability." The warden of an institution in upstate New York

has been named the acting warden at the jail. Eric Young, president of the union council that

represents prison guards, said that such reassignments are routinely done to "protect the integrity of investigations until any formal action, if any, is warranted." Jose Rojas, a union leader and teacher at a fed-

eral prison in Florida, said N'Diaye should be home without pay instead of being reassigned. He said it appears to him that the Bureau of Prisons is "protecting him and putting the blame on officers." "I put this on the warden," he said. "If he would

have had common sense and followed policy, we wouldn't be here discussing this."

More details began to emerge Tuesday about the guards who were supposed to be supervising Epstein and the conditions under which they were working.

The guards on Epstein's unit the night of his

apparent suicide were working overtime shifts to make up for staffing shortages, two people familiar with the matter said. One of the guards, who had a different job in the jail and did not regularly perform correctional officer duties, was working a fifth straight day of overtime and the other guard was working mandatory overtime, the people said.

Although the guard doesn't currently regularly work as a correctional officer, he had previously been one for seven years and specifical ly requested to work overtime shifts to make more money, one of the people said.

The prison has been pressing non-custodial staff into working as correctional officers because staffing levels are less than 70 percent of what they should be, union officials said.

The Bureau of Prisons considers all employees "correctional workers" and trains them in "basic correctional duties to secure the facility in the event of a disturbance and to provide inmate supervision," according to a 2012 Government Accountability Office report on overcrowding.

All new employees are sent to a training academy in Georgia for a three-week "Introduction to Correctional Techniques" course that covers firearms, self-defense, policies and procedures. They must also pass a physical-abilities test that

measures their "ability to perform the essential functions of a correctional worker," such as detecting movement, climbing ladders and using hand-Epstein was being held without bail on federal

sex trafficking charges that could have brought 45 years in prison. Federal prosecutors in New York are pursuing a

parallel investigation into whether any of his associates will face charges for assisting him in what authorities say was his rampant sexual abuse of girls as young as 14. According to police reports, FBI records and

court documents, Epstein had a team of recruiters and other assistants who knew of his penchant for girls and lined up victims for him.

The Latest: Nevada AG says plutonium fight will continue

RENO, Nev. (AP) — The Latest on the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals denying Nevada's appeal in a battle with the U.S. government over secret shipments of plutonium (all times local):

Nevada's attorney general says he'll continue to pursue all legal options to block unlawful shipments of weapons-grade plutonium to a site near Las Vegas after a U.S. appeals court denied the state's appeal in an ongoing battle with the federal government.

A three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled against Nevada on Tuesday. It said the matter is moot because the Energy Department already shipped the radioactive material in question and has promised no more will be hauled to Nevada.

Nevada Attorney General Aaron Ford said in a statement late Tuesday he intends to continue to litigate the case because of the Energy Department's record of "deceitful behavior."

He didn't provide any details about his next legal move.

The state's options include requesting a rehearing before the full 9th Circuit or seeking a new court order to remove the plutonium that's already been shipped from South Carolina to Nevada.

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

Today in History

Today is Wednesday, Aug. 14, the 226th day of 2019. There are 139 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On August 14, 1945, President Harry S. Truman announced that Imperial Japan had surrendered unconditionally, ending

World War II.

In 1900, international forces, including U.S. Marines, entered Beijing to put down the Boxer Rebellion, which was aimed at purging China of foreign influ-

In 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act into law.

In 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill issued the Atlantic Charter, a statement of principles that renounced aggression.

In 1948, the Summer Olympics in London ended; they were the first Olympic games held since 1936.

In 1969, British troops went to Northern Ireland to intervene in sectarian violence between Protestants and Roman Catho-

In 1973, U.S. bombing of Cambodia came to a halt.

In 1980, actress-model Dorothy Stratten, 20, was shot to death by her estranged husband and manager, Paul Snider, who then killed himself.

In 1992, the White House announced that the Pentagon would begin emergency airlifts of food to Somalia to alleviate mass deaths by starvation.

In 1997, an unrepentant Timothy McVeigh was formally sentenced to death for the Oklahoma City bombing.

In 2003, a huge blackout hit the northeastern United States and part of Canada; 50 million people lost power.

In 2008, President George W. Bush signed consumer-safety legislation that banned lead from children's toys, imposing the toughest standard in the

In 2017, under pressure from right and left, President Donald Trump condemned white supremacist groups by name, declaring them to be "repugnant to everything that we hold dear as Americans." The CEO of Merck, the nation's third-largest pharmaceutical company, resigned from a federal advisory council, citing Trump's failure to explicitly condemn white nationalists who marched in Charlottesville, Virginia. (Kenneth Frazier was one of the few African Americans to head a Fortune 500 company. The CEOs of Intel and Under Armour also resigned from the American Manufacturing Council later in the day.)

Ten years ago: Kicking off a four-state push for his health care overhaul plan, President Barack Obama denounced what he suggested was news media overemphasis on scenes of angry protesters at town-hall meetings, telling his own gathering in Belgrade, Montana, that "TV loves a ruckus." Charles Manson follower Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, 60, convicted of trying to assassinate President Gerald Ford in 1975, was released from a Texas prison hospital after more than three decades behind

Five years ago: Nouri al-Malaki, Iraq's prime minister for eight years, relinquished the post to his nominated successor, ending a political deadlock. Pope Francis called for renewed efforts to forge peace on the war-divided Korean Peninsula as he opened a five-day visit to South Korea. Rob Manfred was elected baseball's 10th commissioner, winning a three-man race to succeed Bud Selig. San Francisco said goodbye to Candlestick Park — the stadium where the city's beloved Giants and 49ers celebrated some of their greatest triumphs - with an evening concert by former Beatle Paul

McCartney. One year ago: A highway bridge collapsed in the Italian city of Genoa during a storm, sending vehicles plunging nearly 150 feet and leaving 43 people dead. Vermont Democrats chose the nation's first transgender gubernatorial nominee, Christine Hallquist. (Hallquist would get 40% of the vote in November against Republican Phil Scott, who won with 55%.) A state grand jury report concluded that some 300 Roman Catholic priests in Pennsylvania had molested more than 1,000 children since the 1940s and that church officials had covered up complaints. Puerto Rico officials announced that power was restored to the entire island for the first time since Hurricane Maria nearly 11 months earlier. Los Angeles transit officials said the city's subway system would become the first in the country to install body scanners to screen passengers for weapons and ex-

OXNARD, Calif. — Jon Kitna unfolded a piece of paper detailing that day's practice plan because he thought it was a good way to illustrate why the former Dallas quarterback was back in the NFL with the Cowboys after coaching high school football for seven years.

Dak Prescott's new position coach never stopped communicating with Jason Garrett, who replaced the fired Wade Phillips as head coach while Kitna was starting for an injured Tony Romo halfway through a lost season in 2010. Now Kitna is on the staff of a man he calls a mentor - even though Garrett is only seven years older.

"Like, literally, I could bring one of my coaches here from the last seven years and I could hand them this, and they'd know exactly what this is and how it works and what we're doing," Kitna said as he held out the paper. "He gave me all that

When Garrett and the Cowboys were dealing with another Romo injury and needed an emergency backup for a 2013 regular-season finale with a playoff berth on the line, Kitna traveled from Washington state, where he was coaching his high school alma mater, to wear the headset for one Sunday.

A year later, Kitna returned to Texas as coach at Waxahachie High School, just south of Dallas. After three years there, he coached at a private school in Arizona before the Cowboys promoted Kellen Moore to offensive coordinator after just one year as QB coach.


Re-enter Kitna, whose playing career overlapped with Garrett's for almost a decade - although they were never teammates — before Garrett became his offensive coordinator in Dallas.

"At that time, I always said to myself at some point he is going to stop playing," Garrett said. "At some point we got to get him back on board. He's got great knowledge of the game. He's got a great way to connect with people. The way he interacts with players. The way he interacts with coaches."

Garrett's been known to say many of the same things about Prescott after two NFC East titles in three seasons, along with NFL Rookie of the Year honors in 2016 when he led Dallas to a franchiserecord 11-game winning streak.

Kitna is coming along at an important time, the 46-year-old looking like the perfect complement for someone exactly 20 years younger.

Viewed by the front office as the face of the franchise for the next decade and perhaps beyond, Prescott seeks his first big contract after significantly outplaying his fourth-round rookie deal The Cowboys believe they have the pieces to end



a nearly 25-year Super Bowl drought.

Prescott keeps coming back to footwork when asked how he thinks Kitna is going to make him better.

"He does a great job of staying on top of us every practice, going in the film room and making sure we touch up on it as well," Prescott said. "I'm seeing the improvement. It feels great."

When he finally decided to make the jump, Kitna went from coaching teenagers to a two-time Pro Bowler looking for answers on how to get past the divisional playoffs after losing in that round twice.

The difference wasn't lost on a former player who never made the Pro Bowl, had a losing record (54-70), lost both his playoff starts and threw al-

Kitna returns to NFL with Cowboys, seeks growth in Prescott most as many interceptions (165) as touchdowns (169). A career that spanned 14 seasons also included stops in Seattle, Cincinnati and Detroit.

"The thing I had to get over was, and it was quick, 'I have something to offer,'" Kitna said, chuckling at the memory of showing up with Garrett's staff at the Pro Bowl before the Cowboys had announced his hiring, feeling as if "the staff doesn't even know who you are."

settle on Prescott's backup. Cooper Rush had the job the past two seasons and appears in line for a third, particularly after Mike White struggled in the preseason opener at San Francisco last week-

Rush and White were on the roster last season, but the Cowboys might not have the luxury of keeping three quarterbacks this season. This is where Kitna's voice becomes important again.

"At the end of the day, this is Dak's team and we need to make sure that he's ready to go come Week 1," White said. "I think (Kitna) does a great job of spending time with me and Coop as well. whether it was extra meeting times on the field after practice, before practice. He's really dialed in with it all.'

During his three years as a high school coach in Texas, Kitna usually took at least a day each season to bring his staff to a Cowboys practice. His last two years of that were Prescott's first two seasons in the NFL. For Kitna, the familiarity ran deeper than that.

"I don't know that I ever stopped coaching high school kids like I was in the NFL," Kitna said. "My high school kids would come here right now and go, 'Oh, that's that play. That's that play. That's that play.' We didn't have quite the volume. But we had heavy volume.

"At the end of the day, you have to be able to teach what you have up here. It's not OK to just have knowledge. You have to be able to give knowledge. I think that's the same way as high school or here."

With Wright's busy training schedule that has him in the gym five to six times per week, he does not have free time often. However, when he does have spare time, his activities include playing video games with his brother, learning to cook, and showing his Abilene friends what his hometown of

Wright is the only medically recorded person in the world with Arthrogryposis, also known as multiplex congenita, which is congenital joint contracture in two or more areas of the body, in one arm rather than two. As far as every day living goes, Wright's condition does not hold him back.

"I love answering this question," he explained." I tend to forget I even have a disability. I do life the only way I know how. I just do it. I've never had to live life any differently." As a former patient at Scottish Rite Hospital, Wright now volunteers as a counselor working with mentally and physically disabled children and would like to become an Orthotist after graduation.

After the Para Pan-American Games, Wright's next goal is to compete in the Paralympic Games in Tokyo 2020.



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
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


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
