**State Sen. Kel Seliger holds Town Hall meeting at Howard College**

State Senator Kel Seliger, who serves District 31 – Big Spring’s district – in the Texas Legislature, is on a tour of counties in his district, and stopped in Big Spring Wednesday.

Seliger appeared at Howard College’s Hall Center for the Arts at 11:15 Wednesday and spoke briefly about his current challenges in the Senate before opening the floor to questions from the audience.

“A watershed legislature,” Seliger said at the start of his presentation. “I think mostly positive, but some areas...not so positive. We’ll talk about things like that.”

The state’s budget was the first speaking point on

**Lights on Afterschool taking place this evening**

“We want the community to come tour our facility, learn about what we do, and see all the activities we have to offer,” Duane Shackelford, Salvation Army Boys and Girls Club Director, said.

The national program - Lights on Afterschool - celebrates and acknowledges all afterschool programs. The local celebration will begin with club

members and staff releasing balloons.

“This is the first time for us to celebrate the event in Big Spring,” Shackelford said. “We want the community to be aware of the advantages of afterschool care.”

Seliger's list.

"This one was a particularly interesting one because the budget that we passed in 2017 was \$217 billion, all funds, be they federal funds or fees, fines, permits, things like that. The budget that we passed in May was \$250 billion. An increase of 14 percent...the largest budget increase I think in the history of the state of Texas...maybe the largest budget increase. Thank heavens we live in Texas. Thank heavens we have the sales tax situation that we have in Texas. It's just a big budget. This is a big state and we have lots of needs, and we didn't meet them all even with that budget."

Seliger listed some of the budget allocations made by the legislature, including \$11 billion for education, of which \$5 billion went to the Basic Allotment.

"That's the money that goes to every school district, everywhere in the state, based on the number of kids sitting in seats in that school district. We raised the basic allotment per child by about \$1,000 per child per year. That's a positive thing. Could we have done some more? I think we should have."

Seliger also touted teacher raises authorized by the legislature.

"At the beginning of the session, the governor and lieutenant governor said every school teacher is going to get a \$5,000 raise. I think that's a great idea. I'm concerned, because I think some teachers are not going to get \$5,000, and my problem is, if you tell someone they're going to get something, they need to get it. Nothing complicated there."

Seliger also addressed tax increase caps mandated by the legislature.

"We went in and we capped revenue increases for school districts at 2 1/2 percent without an automatic election," said Seliger. "We capped it for cities and counties at 3 1/2 percent revenue, excluding new property, without an automatic election. I think I was the only Republican that voted against that, because it is the state getting involved in local business, when the state raises no property tax. State doesn't get a nickel. We could go in and reduce property tax in Big Spring to zero, and it wouldn't hurt the state of Texas."

The legislature has increased funding for higher education, said Seliger.

"\$1.1 billion additional in higher education," he said. "Having been the chairman for higher education, I think that's extremely important. If we're going to meet the stated state goal of 60 percent of Texans having a certificate or diploma by 2030, we're going to have to work at it at all levels...certainly in public schools and higher education. The biggest increment of growth will be in community college. It's just because of the very broad offerings, both academic and career and technical that go on in community colleges."

Student loans are an ongoing problem, he said. "The president of West Texas A&M in Canyon went to every school district in the Panhandle, and what he told a group of kids in an auditorium - probably in Canadian or Spearman or some place like that - if you've got to borrow money to come to West Texas A&M, don't do it. Go to your community college, get your associate's degree, then, by all means, come to this University. You'll graduate at the same time as the kids who

started here, with a really good education, at a fraction of the cost. As much as we talk about the cost of public education, if you get an associate's degree from Howard College and then go somewhere like UTPB, and it will be one of the most economical educations you can get anywhere in the country. Now, you take \$2,800 or \$2,900 a semester tuition, which I think is pretty close to UTPB, I realize there are some families that have trouble affording that, and that's why we have to continue working at it. But it's a matter of perspective. It's as affordable as public education gets. It's why we put another \$80 million into Texas grants. They're not loans, they're grants from the state of Texas for every student who qualifies."

Next Seliger moved on to healthcare.

"Healthcare continues to be one of the biggest challenges we have because of the cost - and I say this every year when I come to town hall meetings - the cost of healthcare continues to go up," he said. "I was watching parts of the debate last night, and there was a lot of discussion of healthcare - universal Medicare and healthcare and things like that. But you know what they all talked about? Insurance. They didn't talk about the cost of healthcare, they talked about the cost and availability of healthcare insurance. And until that discussion goes to the cost of healthcare, nothing is going to be done really substantively for those of you who run businesses - be they governmental businesses, school districts, counties; or private businesses - healthcare is eating us all alive. It's true with the state of Texas, too. When I went into the legislature, our healthcare cost, primarily Medicaid, was about 23 percent of the budget. They're now about 33 percent of the budget. There is nothing that is going to change that until we fundamentally change the way that we cost healthcare."

Seliger spoke about the recent change in the name of the South West College for the Deaf from the South West Collegiate Institute for the Deaf.

"Not a big thing, but it more properly defines what the institution is here at Howard College," he said. "Where 'institute' used to imply some sort of remedial or research sort of thing, this is a college. It's Howard College. The most important thing there, the young people from South West College who came to testify at our hearing. Y'all would be really proud at the job they do and how proud they are of Howard College and of Big Spring."

During the question-and-answer session following his presentation, Seliger fielded questions on local watersheds, environmental pollution and monitoring, local vs. state politics, mass shootings, and other topics.

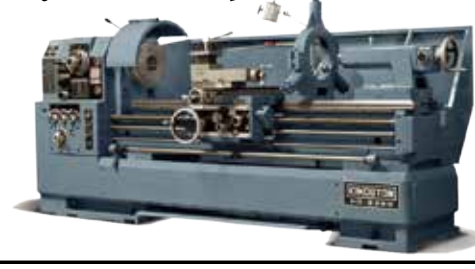

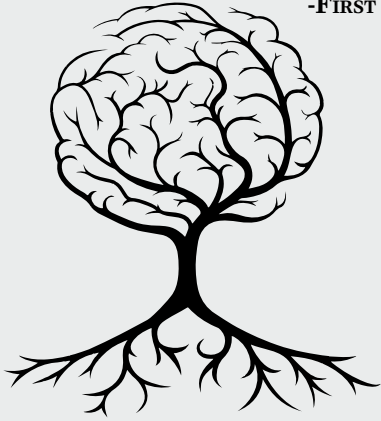

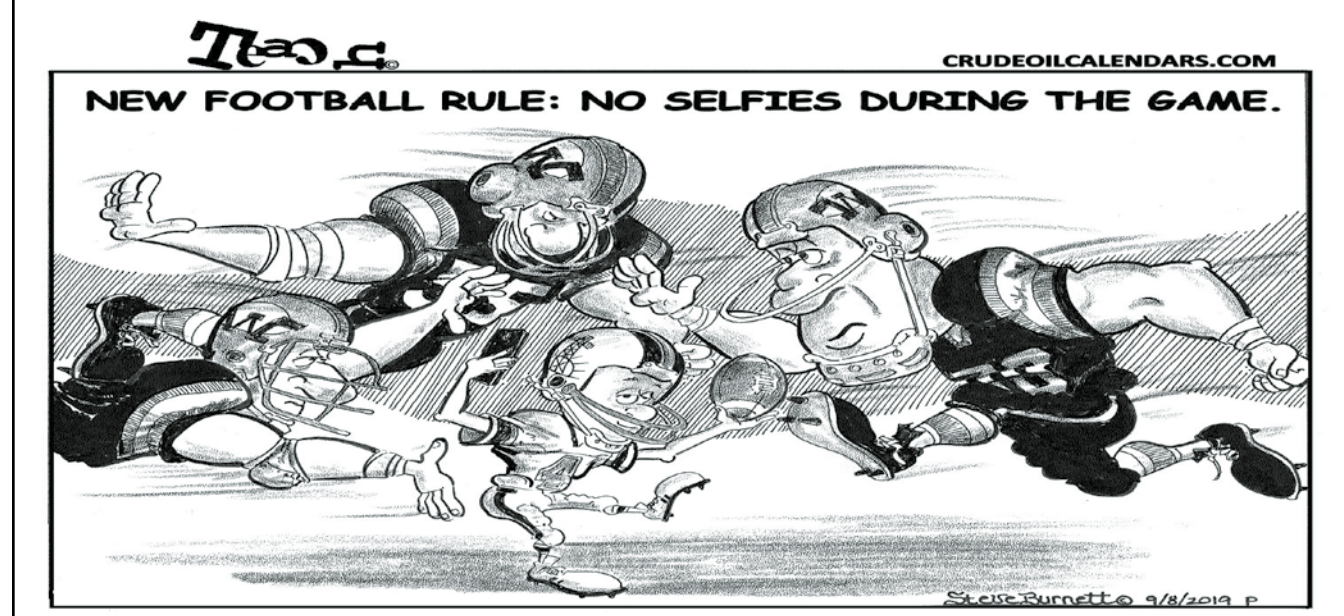

Naturally, in the past, I assumed I was a lot like the dog I owned. I imagined I was sort of a golden retriever mix. I was a cool dog, a chill dog. I was mellow and relaxed and, if something out of the ordinary occurred, I would tilt my head slightly in bemusement.

I am actually nothing at all like this.

If I were a dog, I would jump on the furniture when a new person entered the house. "Look at me! Look at me! Don't you like me?!" I would yap. If they failed to react, I would run circles around them until I got their attention. I would get overexcited and probably piddle on the kitchen floor. (For the record, I do not do this in real life.)

# Detectives grill serial killer, close cold cases

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Keep him talking, don't interrupt him and, no matter what, don't ask why he killed his victims.

Those were the instructions Texas Ranger James Holland gave to the dozens of homicide detectives around the country when they got their moment with Samuel Little, hoping to solve decades-old cold cases and bring back answers to desperate families from the man the FBI identified this month as the most prolific serial killer in U.S. history.

Little ultimately spilled forth with chilling confessions, claiming he killed 93 women in all between 1970 and 2005 and smilingly recounting the details with startling clarity.

But to get what they needed, detectives had to employ a certain amount of psychology, some of which made them uncomfortable, such as laughing along with him or putting up with his flirting.

Miami-Dade Police homicide detective David Denmark and his partner interviewed Little last October about two murders in the Miami area from the 1970s. Holland had told them what to expect.

"You have to change your attitude and you have to become his friend," Denmark said. "And you have to laugh with him and make fun of his victims sometimes, sort of like, 'Yeah, I guess at that point she deserved it.' Even though you hate saying it. You want him to think, 'These guys are pretty cool' to keep him talking."

For Denmark, Little recalled his first victim, 33-year-old Mary Brosley, saying that he would never again try to bury a body in Florida's hard limestone soil and that he had to leave part of her leg exposed.

He also confessed to killing 25-year-

old Angela Chapman in 1976, saying he started to drown her, then pulled her out of the water and strangled her.

He remembered Brosley's flowered sundress and how he played with her chain necklace and marveled at her beautiful neck before strangling her.

Brosley's sister Clare Coppolino said she had no idea her sister had moved to Florida, describing it as "an absolute shock" when she heard from the detective after nearly 50 years. She said her initial reaction to Little's crime was "anger, but then more pity for him than anything. Pity to think, 'I don't know what his background was,' but to think this man ended up murdering all these women."

Little, 79, is now serving multiple life sentences for three killings in California. He also pleaded guilty to a 1994 murder in Odessa, Texas.

Holland elicited scores of confessions from him last year in Texas and then set the guidelines for detectives who would later arrive in the state one by one with stacks of old case files from California to Florida. The detectives would visit him as if on an assembly line, with sometimes two or three agents a day going in.

The killer has also drawn remarkably detailed, color portraits of dozens of his victims that have proved helpful in cracking cases.

Police around the country have confirmed about 50 of his confessions so far and consider the rest credible.

As Little detailed his crimes, he showed no remorse, talked candidly, almost proudly, and seemed to be enjoying himself, detectives said.

At one point, he smiled when recalling a murder, and Detective Mali Langton from Fort Myers, Florida, found the corners of her own mouth turn up — and was horrified.

"He was giddy. That's what threw

me," Langton said. She said that Little also flirted with her and that Holland had braced her for that, telling her to "just let it happen."

Holland also told detectives not to bombard Little with questions, just be patient and let him fill in the details. If he tilts his head to the side and scratches his neck with the back of his hand, don't interrupt him; he's going back in time and reliving the crimes. When he pats his leg a certain way, pretend not to notice; he's getting aroused thinking about the killings.

"He's really big on respect," said Lubbock, Texas, Detective Brandon Price. "If he sees disrespect in the room, then sometimes that may end the interview." He added: "If you showed emotion, you're excited or get angry, then that could end the interview. We made sure to maintain a poker face."

Detective Sgt. Michael Mongeluzzo of Florida's Marion County questioned Little about Rosie Hill, a 20-year-old woman who was picked up at a bar and strangled, her body left next to a pig pen in 1982. Mongeluzzo called the victim's mother, Minnie Hill, and told her his last question to Little would be whatever had been weighing on her mind all these years.

"She said, 'I just want to know why,'" the detective said.

Knowing he had to be careful how he phrased the question to the serial killer, Mongeluzzo remarked on how Little had gotten away with so many slayings over the years, and Little offered a glimpse into his motive.

"That's when he started talking about God and how 'When God made me, he knew what I would do,'" the detective said, adding that Little believed he was doing what he was "made to do."

## Ex-Texas prison official pleads guilty to evidence tampering

HOUSTON (AP) — A former prison major has pleaded guilty to felony tampering for planting screwdrivers in an inmate's cell at a Texas prison that was investigated by the state following allegations that a captain required employees to hit a daily quota of disciplinary write-ups.

Juan Jackson entered a plea this week that handed him four years of probation. Jackson is also required to pay a \$1,500 fine, abide by curfew rules and perform 120 hours of community service. He won't face time behind bars and his records will be expunged, as long as he doesn't violate his probation, the Houston Chronicle reported.

Prison officials and Jackson's attorney didn't respond to the newspaper's request for comment Tuesday.

Jackson was one of four former prison officials accused in the evidence-planting scheme at W.F. Ramsey Unit in Brazoria County that came to light last year. He resigned in June 2018.

Former sergeant Marcus Gallegos also pleaded guilty and agreed in a plea deal last year to the same penalties as Jackson. Brazoria County District Attorney Jeri Yenne said the men could face up to 10 years in prison if they fail probation.

The other two ex-officials accused of involvement in the evidence tampering — Lt. James Thomas and Officer George Wolf — haven't entered pleas.

## Opioid industry presses for settlement as trial looms

CLEVELAND (AP) — With a trial looming, major drug distributors and manufacturers are pressing to settle thousands of claims against them related to the nation's persistent opioid crisis.

The companies are negotiating with state attorneys general as jury selection is expected to wrap up on Thursday in the first federal trial over an overdose epidemic that has claimed more than 400,000 American lives in the past two decades. Arguments are scheduled to begin Monday against some of the biggest names in the pharmaceutical industry unless they can strike a deal.

A source familiar with the negotiations described the outlines of a tentative nationwide settlement as worth tens of billions of dollars. The talks involve the distributors AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health and McKesson, as well as drug makers Johnson & Johnson and Teva.

Under the proposed terms, which could change, the three distributors would pay a total of \$18 billion over 18 years, Johnson & Johnson would chip in \$4 billion over time, and Teva would contribute an estimated \$15 billion worth of overdose anti-dotes and treatment drugs.

Another \$14 billion would come from distribution of those drugs, based on calculations of how much a distributor could charge for them.

The person spoke to The Associated Press on the condition of anonymity because the talks were continuing. Samantha Fisher, a spokeswoman for the Tennessee attorney general's office, confirmed a \$50 billion settlement framework that was first reported by The New York Times.

If a tentative settlement is reached in the days ahead, it would need sign-off by the states and local governments that have sued numerous players in the opioid industry. Perhaps the most well-known of those, Purdue Pharma, was taken out of the consolidated federal lawsuits after it filed last month for bankruptcy protection.

The litigation is being overseen by a U.S. District Court judge in Cleve-

land, who is moving ahead with an initial trial that involves Ohio's Cuyahoga and Summit counties. They claim the companies engaged in a conspiracy that has ravaged their communities, while the companies say they complied with the law and supplied only drugs that doctors prescribed.

Several companies, including Johnson & Johnson, have already reached settlements with the two counties and have been removed from the trial. If the three distributors and two manufacturers succeed in getting a nationwide settlement, it would leave only two defendants in the immediate case: the pharmacy chain Walgreens, in its role as a distributor to its own stores; and Henry Schein, a small distributor.

While the case concerns only claims for the two counties, it can pave the way for resolving more than 2,000 other lawsuits filed over the opioid crisis.

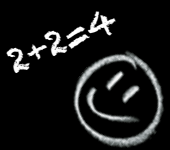

Mallory's special awards from Forsan include being chosen as a drum major, being nominated as a junior class Dutchess, and being crowned as the 2019 homecoming queen.

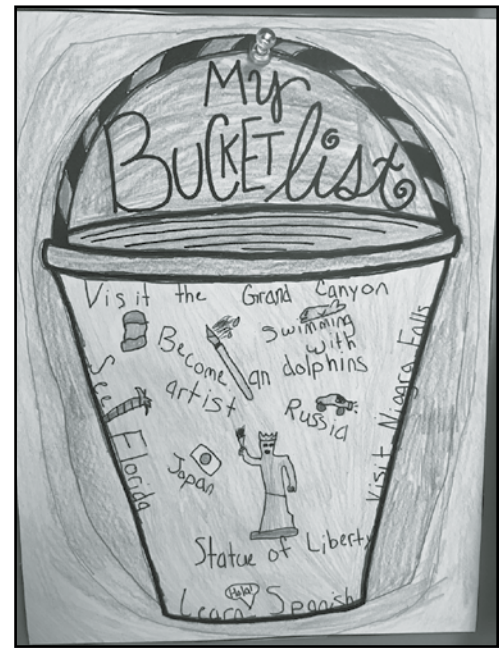
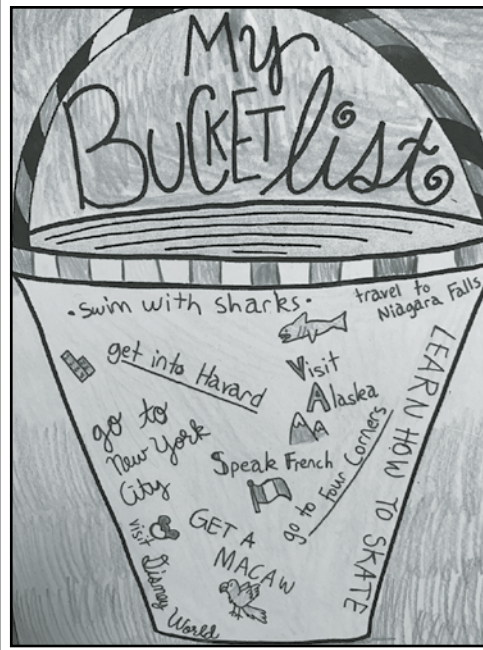
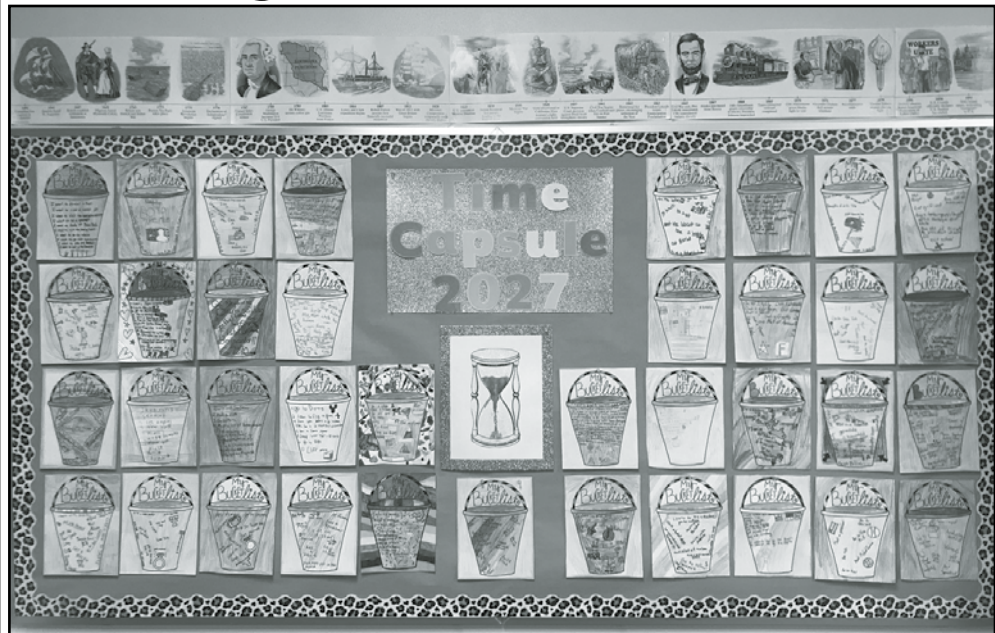

Before proceeding with the play, declarer should first identify all of his assets. The trouble is that some assets are not as easy to spot as others.  
Consider this deal where it seems that making six spades depends strictly on the outcome of the heart finesse. If East has the king, you make six; if West has it, you go down one. But closer study reveals that the contract is ice-cold regardless of who has the king of hearts. All you have to do to assure the slam is to play the hand correctly.  
Ruff the opening diamond lead, cross to dummy with a trump, ruff another diamond, return to dummy with a trump and lead the four of clubs. If East follows low, play the ten from your hand. The effect of this play is that you lose a club trick you didn't have to lose, but this has a very attractive redeeming feature: You are now sure to make the slam no matter how the opposing cards are distributed.  
Whatever West returns after he wins the club, you're home free. If he leads a heart into your A-Q, you win and dispose of dummy's third heart on the club ace; if he returns a club into your A-J, you discard two hearts from dummy; and if he leads a diamond instead, you discard a heart from dummy as you ruff in your hand and dispose of another heart from dummy on the ace of clubs.  
If East plays the king or queen on the club lead from dummy, the outcome is the same. You win with the ace and return the jack of clubs. If West covers the jack, you ruff in dummy and later discard a heart on the ten; if West does not cover the jack, you discard a heart from dummy and subsequently discard another heart on the ten. Either way, you're sure to make 12 tricks.

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Oct. 17, the 290th day of 2019. There are 75 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 17, 1979, Mother Teresa of India was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. On this date: In 1610, French King Louis XIII, age nine, was crowned at Reims, five months after the assassination of his father, Henry IV. In 1777, British forces under Gen. John Burgoyne surrendered to American troops in Saratoga, New York, in a turning point of the Revolutionary War. In 1807, Britain declared it would continue to reclaim British-born sailors from American ships and ports regardless of whether they held U.S. citizenship. In 1907, Guglielmo (Goolie-AH'-moh) Marconi began offering limited commercial wireless telegraph service between Nova Scotia and Ireland. In 1931, mobster Al Capone was convicted in Chicago of income tax evasion. (Sentenced to 11 years in prison, Capone was released in 1939.) In 1933, Albert Einstein arrived in the United States as a refugee from Nazi Germany. In 1939, Frank Capra's comedy-drama "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," starring James Stewart as an idealistic junior U.S. senator, had its premiere in the nation's capital. In 1966, 12 New York City firefighters were killed while battling a blaze in lower Manhattan. The TV game show "The Hollywood Squares" premiered on NBC. In 1967, Puyi (poo-ye), the last emperor of China, died in Beijing at age 61. In 1973, Arab oil-producing nations announced they would begin cutting back oil exports to Western nations and Japan; the result was a total embargo that lasted until March 1974. In 1978, President Carter signed a bill restoring U.S. citizenship to Confederate

President Jefferson Davis. In 1989, an earthquake measuring 7.1 on the Richter scale struck northern California, killing 63 people and causing \$6 billion worth of damage. Ten years ago: Pakistani soldiers attacked militant bases in the main al-Qaida and Taliban stronghold along the Afghan border. Songwriter Vic Mizzy, 93, who'd composed the catchy themes for the 1960s sitcoms "The Addams Family" and "Green Acres," died in Bel Air, California. Five years ago: The World Health Organization acknowledged it had botched attempts to stop the Ebola outbreak in West Africa, blaming factors including incompetent staff, lack of information and budget cuts. Riot police cleared an offshoot Hong Kong pro-democracy protest zone in a dawn raid, taking down barricades, tents and canopies that had blocked key streets for more than two weeks, but leaving the city's main thoroughfare still in the hands of the activists. Sixteen people watching an outdoor pop concert in Seongnam, South Korea, fell 60 feet to their deaths when a ventilation grate they were standing on collapsed. One year ago: Residents of the Florida Panhandle community of Mexico Beach who had fled Hurricane Michael a week earlier returned home to find homes, businesses and campers ripped to shreds; the storm had killed at least 59 people and caused more than \$25 billion in damage in Florida, Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia. Canada became the world's largest legal marijuana marketplace; customers stood in long lines for hours and then lit up and celebrated on sidewalks. Caroll Spinney, the puppeteer who had played

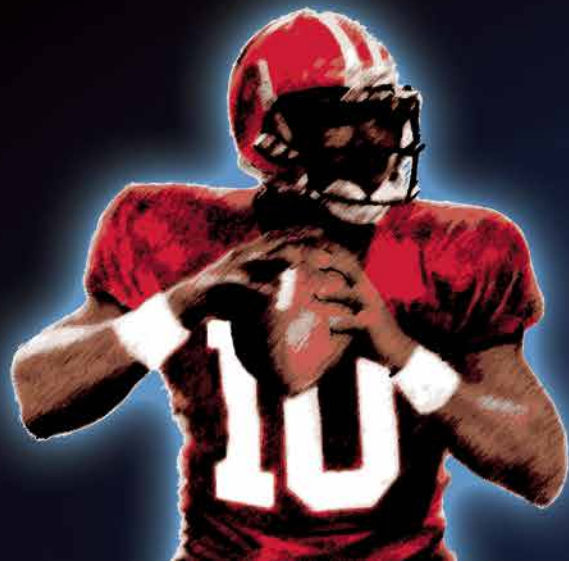

Coach Phillips and the Buffaloes are heading into their first game of District play and encouraging Buffalo fans to come out and cheer on the boys.

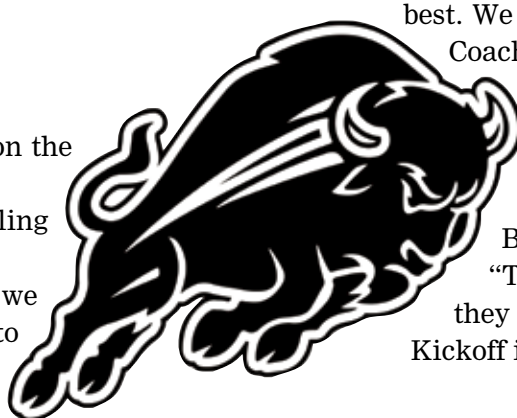

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. in Ozona this Friday.

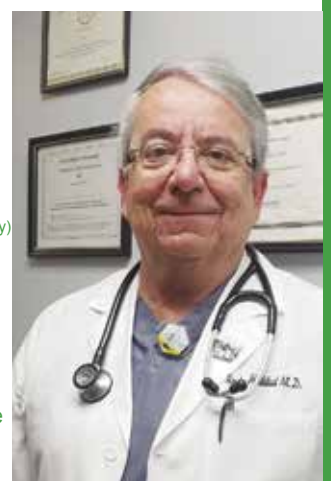
