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Council approves budget amendments, vows to do better in the future By ROGER CLINE

The Big Spring City Council unanimously approved more than \$2.3 million in increases to the recently passed 2019-2020 budget at their meeting Tuesday evening, but vowed to investigate how such budget tweaks could be incorporated into the budgetary process in the future.

"What happens in our budget process, first we come up with a budget that the city manager turns in. Then, eventually that is the backbone of the proposed budget, and that becomes the backbone of the adopted budget that the elected officials vote on and adopt," Finance Director Don Moore told the council. "In that process, we have what's called the 'revised budget.' For this year, that would be the budget ending 9-30-2019, and the proposed budget. What happened

was, there were several items mostly projects - that the qualifications to be in the '18-'19 year that was ending, were not met. Things were not finished, items were not received, payments were not made. I want to kind of apologize. As professionals, the city staff...we're going to try to do a lot better next year. \$2.3 million...that is kind of excessive."

Jim DePauw questioned Moore about ways the budget amendment process could be handled better in the future.

"What can we do to avoid this in the future?" DePauw asked. "You were saying 'We should do better'...could we just put this in the new budget as we're developing the new year's budget, like we did with the million dollars for the streets? How could

that work?" "That's something we could do," replied Assistant City

'Stop the Bleed' emergency training at Forsan

Traumatic events seem to be on the rise across the nation and area schools are doing their part to be prepared. Forsan ISD was one of the most recent schools to go through the Stop The Bleed training.

"Uncontrolled bleeding is the number one cause of preventable deaths from trauma," Eddie Levens, Stop the Bleed instructor, said. "As my time as a paramedic I have seen the repercussions of what can happen; too many deaths happen due to lack of training, which is why I have such a passion for teaching this program."

According to Levens and Forsan Superintendent Randy Johnson, the Stop the Bleed training is a new requirement for all schools, and is a direct response to the violence that is taking place across the nation. Forsan ISD took a little bit of a twist to the training

and added in additional training. "We combined our training with additional training on active shooter situations. Schools are doing more to provide safety for our students and staff than ever before. What a shame that our society has come to this, Johnson said.

In addition to enhancing security on school campuses, having a knowledge base on how to



Manager John Medina. "One of the things we did have was some conference calls with some of our engineering firms trying to assess our time frame and things like that. What we normally do is the city council will go out for bids, then come back and award it. Usually in 30-45 days we get contracts. All of that, the time frame put together, affects the start date and things of that nature. What we're trying to do now is shorten that window and get those projects out. But naturally, some of those things are just going to roll into the next budget. It is what it is at this point. I think we could do a better job, and we will, but that's where we are."

The council voted on the five budget amendments combined in one vote, and they passed unani-

deliver treatment or aide until emergency personnel can arrive on scene can make all the difference when it comes to saving a life.

We need to continue to work as a community on reducing mean behavior, reducing bullying, and teaching our children to be civil to one another, to develop appropriate relationships with all people - whether we agree with them or not. Let's focus on healthy relationships in addition to preparing for the unthinkable."

In addition to Forsan ISD, Coahoma and Stanton ISDs have also taken part in the course. Big Spring High School is also set to take the course in the near future. In addition to the training in the local schools. Martin County Hospital has stepped up and will be purchasing training kits that will allow the class to be made available to the general public, as well.

education can come in handy," Levens said. "It's all about being able to provide direct pressure in the right way to stop the bleed and that one act could potentially save a life. This is a good course for everyone to have."

The staff who have already taken the course have had positive feedback and believe the education they received will be beneficial should a traumatic event occur.

"Teaching is a science. The data training for our teachers helps them get a true picture of what each student knows and doesn't know. We can then target gaps and weaknesses in the students' learning. There is a lot more to teaching as a profession than what many people realize. I am very proud of our teachers for their serious approach to the teaching-learning process," Johnson said.

As Levens stated, "The more educated we can get the public the better. Hemorrhage control is beneficial and can prevent unnecessary deaths."

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Death toll rises to 15 as violence wracks Chile for 5th day SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Rioting, arson attacks "I've walked several kilometers searching for

and violent clashes wracked Chile for a fifth day Tuesday, as the government raised the death toll to 15 in an upheaval that has almost paralyzed the South American country long seen as the region's oasis of stability.

President Sebastián Piñera announced a program Tuesday night calling for modest boosts to the lowest incomes and increased taxes on the wealthiest as he sought to calm anger in the streets.

About half of Chile's 16 regions remained under an emergency decree and some were a under military curfew, the first — other than for natural disasters — imposed since the country returned to democracy in 1990 following a bloody 17-year dic-

Unrest sparked last week when a relatively minor, less-than-4% rise in subway fares led to students jumping station turnstiles in protest. But the defiance exploded into violence Friday with demonstrators setting fire to subway stations, buses and a high-rise building. Demonstrations escalated with wide-ranging demands for improvements in education, health care and wages, and spread nationwide, fueled by frustration among many Chileans who feel they have not shared in the economic advances in one of Latin America's wealthiest na-

"I fight so that all that will end and so that all of us will have something fair," said one protester, José Tomás López, a cook.

He said he took to the streets "because I've seen how my mother lives, with a salary of not more than (\$700 a month) to maintain my three siblings, and I know her debts and all her efforts to meet

milk, but the supermarkets remain closed and neighborhood stores have run out," said Carmen Fuentealba, a retiree.

Many stores, subway stations and banks were burned, damaged or looted during protests over the weekend, and some people have reported problems getting cash at ATMs.

"It's enough with this," said store owner Fernando García. "They want to destroy it all. I don't sleep at night because I fear that they'll loot."

Shortly before the rioting broke out last week, Chile's conservative president boasted in an interview with The Financial Times that Chile "looks like an oasis" in the region because it has a stable democracy and a balanced and growing economy that has been creating jobs and improving pay.

But the wealth is unevenly spread, with one of the region's highest rates of inequality. Many Chilean families earn \$550 to \$700 a month and pensions can be as low as \$159. "It's indispensable that they lower the price of

medications because there's no salary that can hold up to this," said Hernán Pavéz, a retired teacher. Long lines of cars also continued to snake from

gas stations as drivers worried about supplies in a country that imports nearly all its gasoline. "People are desperate," said gas station attendant

Jacqueline Zúñiga. "They think the gasoline, the petroleum is going to end, and they keep filling and filling their tanks. ... This has all led to aggressive-The disorder has prevented many people from

getting to their jobs, and about 2 million young people are unable to get to classes. Marta Lagos, director of the polling firm Latino-

barometro, said problems have accumulated over at least the last four governments, which were of both the left and right.

Officials can argue "that we have reduced poverty, that there's no inflation these days, that the economy is controlled, etcetera, etcetera," Lagos said. "And all those arguments mean nothing to the people who can't make it to the end of the month."

After the protests erupted, Piñera rolled back the subway hike while also declaring a state of emergency. He said this week that Chile is "at war with a powerful, relentless enemy that respects nothing or anyone and is willing to use violence and crime without any limits."

But he did not identify the enemy, and the remark brought rebukes from celebrities, politicians and soccer players. "A war needs two sides," Chilean soccer player

said Joe Eldrige, an analyst at the Washington Office on Latin America. "Are we going to go back to the old kind of right-left extremes ... or are these institutions sufficiently flexible and adaptable to address the current situation?"

Mason was found in Texas living under the alias Walter James Allison. Authorities have not released details on what led investigators to Mason.





Soto, Nationals top Cole, Astros 5-4 in World Series opener

HOUSTON (AP) — Juan Soto and the Washington Nationals quickly derailed the Cole Express.

A 20-year-old prodigy with a passion for the big moment, Soto homered onto the train tracks high above the left field wall and hit a two-run double as the Nationals tagged Gerrit Cole and the Houston Astros 5-4 Tuesday night in the World Series opener.

"After the first at-bat, I just said, 'It's another baseball game,'" Soto said. "In the first at-bat, I'm not going to lie, I was a little bit shaking in my legs." Not even a history-making home run by postsea-

son star George Springer — and another shot that nearly tied it in the eighth inning - could deter Washington. Ryan Zimmerman, still full of sock at 35, also

homered to back a resourceful Max Scherzer and boost the wild-card Nationals in their first World Series appearance — tres bien for a franchise that began as the Montreal Expos in 1969.

"They waited a long time," Nationals manager Dave Martinez said.

Otherworldly almost all season, Cole looked downright ordinary. Trea Turner singled on the second pitch of the game and the Nationals were off and running, ending Cole's 19-game winning streak that stretched back 25 starts to May.

"I didn't have my A-game tonight," Cole said.

Not what Cole or anyone else at Minute Maid

Woods, Spieth, McIlroy lead star field in Japan

INZAI CITY, Japan (AP) — With a field that includes Tiger Woods, Jordan Spieth and Rory McIlroy, the PGA Tour's first tournament in Japan has plenty of star power.

The Zozo Championship, which begins on Thursday, will be held at the Accordia Golf Narashino Country Club, about 80 kilometers (50 miles) east of Tokyo in Inzai City. It is part of three tournaments that make up the PGA Tour's Asia Swing,

including the CJ Cup in South Korea won last week by Justin Thomas and

the HSBC Champions in Shanghai next week. The Japanese tournament, co-sanctioned with the Japan Golf Tour, is a 78-

man, no-cut field with a \$9.75 million purse. The weather could prove to be a factor on the weekend. Japan is bracing

for two more storms heading its way a week after a typhoon devastated the country's central and northern regions. A forecast for another typhoon has been downgraded to a tropical storm. Woods last played in an official tournament in Japan in 2006 at the Dunlop

Phoenix, where he lost in a playoff to Padraig Harrington. He won the Dunlop Phoenix the two previous years. "It's going to be a lot of fun to be back here in front of fans that really un-

derstand and respect the game of golf," Woods said in a pre-tournament interview. "The game of golf is so strong here in Japan, and to have seen it grow like it has over 20-some odd years that I've been playing is very special." The Masters champion is making his first start in his 23rd season on the

PGA Tour, needing one victory to reach 82 wins and tie the career record held by Sam Snead. Woods had arthroscopic surgery on his left knee two months ago — his fifth

Leonard leads Clippers over LeBron and Lakers 112-102

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Kawhi Leonard hit seven straight shots in one stretch, creating a run for the Clippers that his new teammates quickly joined. "It's a great sign of leadership," coach Doc Rivers said. "He talks with his

Leonard began a new career chapter Tuesday night, scoring 30 points to go with a strong bench effort in a 112-102 victory over LeBron James and the Lak-

ers in the teams' season opener. Leonard chose the Clippers because he wanted to come home and his family

was on hand. "All those emotions went through me again," he said.

Lou Williams added 21 points and Montrezl Harrell had 17 off the bench when the Clippers began their 50th season overall and 36th in Los Angeles as the once unlikely but now favorites to win the franchise's first NBA championship.

"It's one of 82 (games)," Rivers said. "Next question."

Leonard won his second NBA title last season in Toronto.

The Lakers showed off their new 1-2 punch of James and Anthony Davis. Davis scored 25 points, making 9 of 14 free throws, and James had 18.

"For us, we're both aggressive," Davis said. "Sometimes we kind of miss each other. I missed him a couple times and he missed me, so just trying to figure it

Danny Green outscored them both with 28 points, including seven 3-pointers, in the highest-scoring debut by a Laker in franchise history.

Leonard got it done without his personal recruit Paul George, sidelined in-

definitely while rehabbing from a pair of offseason shoulder surgeries. "It's just the first game of the season, so it's going to take the season and mistakes and success to get us on the same page," Leonard said.

Wearing a black tuxedo jacket and bow tie, George received a mixed reaction when introduced in the playoff-like atmosphere at Staples Center, where the Clippers were the home team for the first of four meetings in the arena the teams share.

"Their fans were very loud early and I thought our fans took over from that point on," Rivers said. "It's great for the city."

The Clippers' reserves outscored the Lakers' bench, 60-19. Last season, Williams and Harrell were the NBA's highest-scoring reserve duo, and they picked

up where they left off. "This bench is going to be better this year than even last year," Rivers said.

It came down to the fourth quarter, and the Clippers dominated.

Tied 85-all, they opened with a 19-7 run to go up 104-92. Five different players scored and Leonard assisted on Maurice Harkless' 3-pointer. James had three of the Lakers' six turnovers in the fourth, when Harkless

and Leonard each blocked shots by Dwight Howard. "That was just very careless and they capitalized off of it," James said.

With 4 ½ minutes left, Lakers fans chanted "Let's go, Lakers! Let's go, Lakers!" while others hit the exits.

"The NBA's back and everyone's trying to have the narrative of it's a rivalry game and it's a huge test," James said, "but I think both teams are not where they want to be. We have a lot of room to improve."

The Lakers erased a 14-point deficit in the third, led by Danny Green's 18 points. He capped a 15-0 run with his fifth 3-pointer before JaMychal Green's 3-pointer pulled the Clippers into an 85-all tie heading into the fourth.

Sometimes a defender, through inspiration or intuition, hits on an offbeat opening lead that proves to be

a real thorn in declarer's side. Such was the case in today's deal where West, holding no long suit and a paucity of honor cards, decided that his best chance to defeat three notrump was to find his partner's

head by leading the four of spades. Declarer played the jack from dummy, took East's queen with the

strong suit. He then hit the nail on the

king and then tried a diamond finesse, losing to the king. East's spade return was ducked all around, and another spade was taken by the ace.

South had eight tricks at this point. When he eventually led a club, East won with the ace and cashed two spades to defeat the contract.

Although West found the opening lead that could give declarer any trouble, South must be charged with bringing about his own demise. Even after the spade lead, the contract was certain to succeed regardless of how the opposing cards were divided. All declarer had to do was to play a low spade from dummy rather than the jack at trick one.

South fell victim to the delusion that he was getting a "free finesse" by putting up the jack. Instead, he should have allowed the opening lead to run to his king and retained the A-J in dummy in case the diamond finesse lost. Then, East would not have been able to continue the attack on spades without conceding a trick to the

South should reason that if the diamond finesse loses, he will have only eight winners and will need to look elsewhere for a ninth. But with East on lead and the A-J of spades still in dummy, no return can stop him from making the contract.

My sister has made life miserable for me for the last five years, since the decision was made to have my mom moved into a nursing home because of her dementia. I have educated myself and followed the rules and state regulations required by law. She continues to send letters demeaning me, which I send along to my mom's attorney to file. She has told lies about me to friends and relatives and continues to think she is smarter than me and knows what is best for mom. However, she has not educated herself regarding nursing home and state regulations, rules, etc.

Recently, Annie, I have read some letters asking about this process of being the power of attorney and medical proxy, and I have some words of wisdom for those dealing with the same thing.

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The first step is hiring an elder attorney, if not done already, to represent your mom's wishes and enact the power of attorney and medical proxy she, here's hoping, chose in sound mind years before.

The second step is to have a medical doctor deem your mom incompetent. Then the power of attorney and medical proxy your mom chose will be able to make decisions on her behalf without interference from other family members. You can keep siblings informed but don't have to bend to their wishes. Siblings would no longer have the authority to make or cancel appointments you feel necessary for your mom. This is from experience.

It is an extremely difficult job; however, if your mom chose you to carry out her end-of-life wishes, be honored and do it out of pure love for her. Be strong and know your mom chose you to be in charge for a reason. -- Chosen Daughter

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

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




This Date In History

Today in History Today is Wednesday, Oct. 23,

the 296th day of 2019. There are 69 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 23, 1973, President

Richard Nixon agreed to turn over White House tape recordings subpoenaed by the Watergate special prosecutor to Judge John J. Sirica. On this date: In 1707, the first Parliament of

Great Britain, created by the Acts of Union between England and Scotland, held its first meet-In 1910, Blanche S. Scott became

the first woman to make a public solo airplane flight, reaching an altitude of 12 feet at a park in Fort Wayne, Ind.

In 1915, tens of thousands of women paraded up Fifth Avenue in New York City, demanding the right to vote.

In 1925, talk show host Johnny Carson was born in Corning, Iowa.

In 1944, the World War II Battle of Leyte (LAY'-tee) Gulf began, resulting in a major Allied victory against Japanese forces.

In 1956, a student-sparked revolt against Hungary's Communist rule began; as the revolution spread, Soviet forces started entering the country, and the uprising was put down within weeks.

In 1983, 241 U.S. service members, most of them Marines, were killed in a suicide truckbombing at Beirut International Airport in Lebanon; a nearsimultaneous attack on French forces killed 58 paratroopers. In 1984, BBC Television report-

ed on the famine in Ethiopia; the story, which shocked viewers, prompted rock star Bob Geldof to organize "Band Aid," a group of celebrities who recorded the song "Do They Know It's Christmas?" for charity.

In 1987, the U.S. Senate rejected, 58-42, the Supreme Court nomination of Robert H. Bork.

In 1995, a jury in Houston convicted Yolanda Saldivar of murdering Tejano singing star Selena. (Saldivar is serving a life prison sentence.)

In 2001, the nation's anthrax scare hit the White House with the discovery of a small concentration of spores at an offsite mail processing center.

In 2006, former Enron CEO Jeffrey Skilling was sentenced by a federal judge in Houston to 24 years, four months for his role in the company's collapse. Eventually 10 years was cut off Skilling's prison sentence, and he was released to a halfway house in Aug. 2018. Ten years ago: President Barack

Obama declared the swine flu outbreak a national emergency, giving his health chief the power to let hospitals move emergency rooms offsite to speed treatment and protect non-infected patients. Bank closings for 2009 surpassed 100, hitting 106 by day's end. The NBA and the referees union agreed on a two-year contract, ending a lockout of more than a month. Character actor Lou Jacobi died in New York at age 95.

Five years ago: Officials announced that an emergency room doctor who'd recently returned to New York City after treating Ebola patients in West Africa tested positive for the virus, becoming the first case in the city and the fourth in the nation. (Dr. Craig Spencer later recovered.) John "Bull" Bramlett, a former professional football and baseball player who was nicknamed the "Meanest Man in Football," died in Memphis, Tennessee, at age 73.

One year ago: Turkey's president demanded that Saudi Arabia identify those who ordered the murder of Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi in the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul and turn over the suspects for trial. A lotterv ticket sold in South Carolina was the only one to match all six numbers drawn for the Mega Millions jackpot, which totaled \$1.537 billion - just short of the record for all U.S. lotteries. China opened the world's longest sea-crossing bridge, a 34-mile span connecting Hong Kong to the mainland. Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court, announced that she had been diagnosed with "the beginning stages of dementia, probably Alzheimer's disease." No. 9 Tar Heels add Anthony at helm an overhauled offense

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina needs freshman Cole Anthony to live up to his lofty billing right away.

The ninth-ranked Tar Heels must replace their top five scorers, including three first-round NBA draft picks. That's created a significant overhaul to the rotation, and it starts with Anthony at the point of Roy Williams' fast-paced offense. "It's a process," Anthony said. "I'm not coming in

here expecting (Williams) to just give me the keys from Day One. I'm going to try to work — no, I'm not going to try, I'm going to work as hard as I can in practice every single day and hopefully he gives me that right."

The 6-foot-3, 190-pound Anthony is the son of former UNLV and NBA point guard Greg Anthony. He was the nation's No. 4 recruit according to 247sports.com, then was named most valuable player of the McDonald's All-American game then shared MVP honors in the Jordan Brand Classic.

He's widely regarded as a high lottery pick if he

bolts for the NBA after a year, and he's taking over for Coby White — who made a rapid rise in his lone season to become the No. 7 overall pick in the June "He's a different point guard," Williams said of Anthony. "Coby was more of a scoring point guard,

which I'm OK with. ... Cole can score, but Cole is more of a quarterback there. He's trying to get other people the ball in that situation."

Williams said he thinks UNC could be a good de-

fensive team that will have to figure out how to replace the scoring lost when White, Cameron Johnson and Nassir Little left departed as first-round picks along with seniors Luke Maye and Kenny

Anthony's presence, at least, provides some major upside at the helm of a team picked to finish second in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"He's one of the best players in the country already," junior big man Garrison Brooks said, "and he hasn't played a game. I think that's a lot to say. I believe in him."

GOING TO GRADUATES

The Tar Heels went an unusual route by bringing in graduate transfers Christian Keeling and Justin Pierce after adding just two through Williams' first 16 seasons at his alma mater.

The 6-3 Keeling led Charleston Southern with 18.7 points and 6.9 rebounds while shooting 38% from 3-point range, while the 6-7 Pierce averaged 14.9 points and 8.9 rebounds at William & Mary with the ability to step outside, too.

DOUBLE POST

The Tar Heels haven't had the size to consistently use the two-post approach that Williams prefers since losing Kennedy Meeks and Isaiah Hicks from the 2017 NCAA championship squad, but that could

The 6-9 Brooks returns after serving as a reliable rebounder and interior defender, while the Tar Heels added 6-10, 232-pound McDonald's All-American Armando Bacot.

"That's what they recruited me in here for, just to come and be able to play the 5 and 4 spot — and

being able to play them with Garrison," Bacot said, adding: "We can feed off each other, regardless if I'm down low or up top or vice versa."

OUTSIDE SHOOTING

So where will the outside shooting come from?

Johnson made 45.7% of 3s last year to rank seventh nationally, while White, Maye and Williams all could stretch a defense. Senior Brandon Robinson is back after shooting 46% (23 of 50) in limited reserve work but no returning player made more than five 3s last year.

BANGED UP EARLY

The Tar Heels have early injury concerns with junior big man Sterling Manley, and freshman guards Anthony Harris and Jeremiah Francis dealing with knee injuries — all of which could hinder their depth.

Manley has continued to have knee soreness despite having an offseason procedure after missing significant time last year. Harris and Francis both had significant knee injuries in high school.

GAMES TO WATCH

The Tar Heels open Nov. 6 at home against Notre Dame as the ACC moves to a 20-game conference schedule.

The nonconference schedule includes a home date with No. 18 Ohio State (Dec. 4) in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge and a trip to No. 8 Gonzaga (Dec. 18) in the return game of a home-and-home series.

The Tar Heels also play in the Battle 4 Atlantis tournament in the Bahamas over Thanksgiving, part of a strong field that includes Gonzaga, No. 12 Seton Hall and No. 15 Oregon.


