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Ports-to-Plains Committee Meeting draws crowd at Hotel Settles

The first of four Ports-to-Plains Corridor Feasibility Study meetings regarding Segment #2, took place at Hotel Settles on Monday morning. TxDOT and Ports-to-Plains Committee members gathered together to discuss results of the current study, possible issues that could arise and to hear community input from those affected by the corridor in Segment #2.

"This is a corridor study looking at needs. No specific funding tied to any specific part of this project. This is strictly so we know exactly what we need in order to go to the legislature, speak with different partners along the way, etc.," Steve Linehart, TxDOT Transportation Planner out of Austin, said. "This will allow us to find a starting part on how to fund it and how to move forward accordingly."

According to TxDOT Public Information Officer Gene Powell, out of the Odessa District, there will be three more rounds of meetings, with the next round starting in February 2020.

and TxDOT had another view, well we want to understand those differences early on."

The Ports-to-Plains Corridor Feasibility Study is designated by HB 1079. The 86th Texas legislature passed HB 1079 relating to a study by TxDOT of the Ports-to-Plains Corridor, including an evaluation of the feasibility of certain improvements to I-27. The governor signed the bill into law on June 10, 2019. With that bill being signed into law, TxDOT was tasked with conducting comprehensive studies of the Corridor. The study must evaluate the feasibility of and the costs and logistical matters associated with, improvements that create a continuous flow, four-lane divided highway that meets highway standards to the extent possible, includ-

ing improvements that extend I-27. The study is anticipated to conclude in January 2021.

"Segment committee reports will be due at the end of June 2020, then provided to the advisory committee. From there, the advisory committee will in turn produce a report by the end of October 2020," Powell said. "The next leg of construction won't begin for several years, after all this data has been gathered, analyzed and presented." Linehart added, "The segment committee and

advisory committees are just making recommendations, which will be presented to TxDOT and then on to the Governor's desk and presented to the legislature. There is no predetermined outcome for this ... this is just the grass roots part of the pro-The Ports-to-Plains Corridor is made up of three

segments; Segment 1 extends from New Mexico and Oklahoma border to Hale/Lubbock County line; Segment 2 extends from Hale/Lubbock County line to Sutton/Edwards County line; Segment 3 extends from Sutton/Edwards County line to I-35/ Juarez-Lincoln Bridge in Laredo. "You might say it's a lengthy process, but you

have to look at it; there are three different segments, each segment has four meetings, a dozen meetings, plus reports and conversations amongst other meetings. Everyone has their input so we can choose the best path forward that we (TxDOT) suggest and then from there, it's always possible for a legislature or governor to change things,' Powell said. "It's not TxDOT making a decision or a recommendation. It's the elected officials from the communities that will be impacted.' During the meeting, several areas of focus in-

cluded safety on roadways, existing conditions and possible future issues that might arise after construction. Some of the highlights from the presentation regarding safety included:

*Over a five year span, there were 17,000 crashes along the corridor, 7,600 occurred in Segment #2.

*The highest rate of those crashes occurred around the Big Spring and Midland area

*42 percent of truck crashes occurred in Segment 2, with the highest rate being between Midland, Glasscock County and Big Spring (more than 2,500)

*San Angelo had a moderate rate of crashes occur and Lubbock was actually lower for the city area. *Fatal crashes totaled 220 over the time span and

half of those occurred in Segment #2 (highest rate in the Big Spring, Midland and Lubbock area) "The reason behind these meetings is so that the community can come out and speak their thoughts. It's important that we hear all the viewpoints,' Powell said. "If you look at any election, most may-

ors win with about 60 percent vote so there are

other viewpoints in the community. We want to be

as comprehensive as we can which will allow us to make the best decisions. One of the great things about conversations with constituents is that we hear viewpoints we haven't really crystalized or thought of before, and it can change projects.' Powell added, "We appreciate everyone's patience and participation; it is a lengthy process. In our microwave society we want answers right now and in projects like this they just don't come really quickly appreciate the candor and the par-

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3 killed in Oklahoma Walmart shooting

DUNCAN, Oklahoma (AP) — Two men and a woman were fatally shot Monday morning outside a Walmart store in southwestern Oklahoma, and the shooter is among the dead, authorities said.

Two victims were shot inside a car and the third was killed in the parking lot just before 10 a.m. outside the store in Duncan, Police Chief Danny Ford

Authorities did not immediately describe a motivation for the shooting. Stephens County District Attorney Jason Hicks authorities said during a news conference Monday afternoon that there was never an active shooter inside the store and he described the shooting as an isolated incident. He did not further explain.

Two bodies covered with sheets were visible in the parking lot Monday afternoon. One body was in the driver's seat of a red, two-door car. The other

body was lying on the ground next to the vehicle.

Bullet holes were visible in the car's windshield. Police said in a Facebook post that a handgun was found at the scene. At the news conference, Ford described the gun as semi-automatic but said he had no further details. He said the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation was still processing the

He said he believed nine shots were fired.

Authorities have not released the identities of those killed but did confirm the shooter was among the dead. Ford said all three knew each other but declined to describe their relationships or other identifying information pending notification of immediate family. Police have also interviewed witnesses to the

shooting, Ford said.

Aaron Helton, of Duncan, said he was parking

outside the Walmart where he planned to buy groceries when he heard about nine gunshots.

"I arrived and there were three bodies." Helton

Walmart spokeswoman LeMia Jenkins said in an email that no staff members were involved in the shooting and the store was not evacuated. Ford told The Associated Press that based on the social media posts of the woman who was killed, he believed she may have been a Walmart employee at

some time. Duncan is about 80 miles (130 kilometers) south of Oklahoma City. The Walmart is in a commercial center that includes a sporting goods store and a dollar store along U.S. Highway 81, the main road that passes through Duncan heading south toward

US asks federal judge to toss out Nevada plutonium lawsuit

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The federal government wants a judge to reject Nevada's request for a court order to remove weapons-grade plutonium from a site north of Las Vegas, arguing that officials have already promised that no more will be shipped to the state. In documents filed Friday in U.S. District Court

in Reno, the federal government brands as "conjectural" or "hypothetical" state claims that residents are harmed by radiation from the one-half metric ton of plutonium secretly trucked a year ago from South Carolina to Nevada.

The decision cannot be undone, the material is already in the state and the federal government has sovereign immunity, meaning the state can't force the federal government to act, the motion

The Department of Energy "routinely and safely transports nuclear materials into and out of Nevada and stores classified amounts of plutonium in Nevada," it added. State Attorney General Aaron Ford is pressing

for the court order, saying the state was not informed of the shipments until they had already been made and can't trust the federal agency to abide by after-the-fact promises.

"While we appreciate the Department of Energy's new position that it will not ship additional plutonium here, a court order to this effect will hold the department accountable," Ford said Monday in a statement.

The state maintains the Energy Department failed to conduct proper environmental reviews, and that an accident transporting, handling or storing the highly radioactive material could permanently harm Las Vegas — home to 2.2 million people and host to more than 40 million tourists a

"The long-term storage of this plutonium has exposed — and will continue to expose — Nevada's property, lands, water, air and citizens to greater radiological pollution and increased risk of ecological and economic catastrophe," state attorneys said in documents filed Oct. 23.

The Energy Department disclosed last January that the plutonium had been taken in late 2018 to a specialized facility at the vast Nevada National Security Site, an area larger than the state of Rhode Island. The site was used to conduct nuclear weapons tests from 1945 to 1992.

The U.S. government had been ordered by a federal judge in South Carolina to remove a metric ton (2,204 pounds) of plutonium from the Savannah River nuclear weapons refining complex by 2020, and to remove another 5 metric tons (11,020 pounds) in future years.

Native American shield returned to New **Mexico from France**

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — A ceremonial Native American shield has been welcomed back to New Mexico by tribal leaders, in the culmination of a yearslong international campaign to reclaim the sacred object that held a place in a cycle of ceremonies until it vanished from a mesa-top indigenous village in the 1970s. Nearly four years ago, the shield surfaced as an

auction item in Paris, prompting tribal leaders to begin making public appeals for it to be pulled from bidding and returned to them. U.S. and Acoma Pueblo officials announced Mon-

day that an FBI agent delivered the shield from Paris last week following a multiagency effort that involved U.S. senators, diplomats and prosecutors. It will be formally returned to Acoma Pueblo after

a judge dismisses a civil forfeiture case that prosecutors filed to secure the shield's return, U.S. Attorney John Anderson said. Until then, it's being held in a federal building in Albuquerque. "It will be a day of high emotion and thanksgiv-

ing," Acoma Pueblo Gov. Brian Vallo said ahead of the expected return.

The shield — a colorful, circular piece featuring the face of a Kachina, or ancestral spirit, and dangling feathers — is among hundreds of Native American items, many of them considered sacred by tribes, to be sent to Paris auction houses by collectors over the years. U.S. laws prohibit the trafficking of certain tribal items domestically, but it doesn't explicitly ban dealers from exporting them. A U.S. Government Accountability Office report

last year found that sales of Native American cultural items began to decline following a 2016 outcry over plans to sell the Acoma Pueblo shield and other items. About 1,400 Native American cultural items were listed for sale between 2012 and 2017, with about half selling for nearly \$7 million. The auction houses long stood their ground

against pressure to halt bidding on Kachinas, mask-like pieces and Plains war shirts, saying that doing so could have broad repercussions for the art market in general. In the years since the Acoma Pueblo shield was

pulled from auction, the EVE auction house has not responded to interview requests from The Associated Press. Federal officials said the shield was stored at the

auction house since 2016. An FBI agent retrieved it about a week ago. "This shield obviously is a high priority item for

us and for Acoma, but it's by no means unique," Anderson said Friday. "It's not the only item out there of cultural patrimony that is subject to purchase and sale that shouldn't be." U.S. law enforcement is still quite active in that

area, Anderson said.

The uproar over auction plans for the shield in

2016 was followed that year by legislation to prevent more items that tribes hold sacred from being sent overseas. U.S. Sen. Martin Heinrich, a New Mexico Demo-

crat, earlier this year re-introduced legislation to

ban collectors and vendors from exporting Native American ceremonial items to foreign markets. He and others blamed legal loopholes for stifling the return of the shield. "No matter where they are, all sacred and culturally significant items must be returned to their

rightful home," Heinrich said Monday in a Twitter post, praising the arrival of the Acoma shield from His legislation would increase prison time from five years to 10 years for violating the law more than once. The bill also would establish a frame-

work for collectors to return protected items to tribes and avoid facing penalties. For generations, the shield, considered the property of the entire tribe, remained safely in a home atop a 367-foot, sandstone mesa, tribal leaders say. It was placed in the care of different community members over the years but did not belong to any single person, making its removal from the pueblo illegal under tribal law, according to Acoma lead-

An affidavit from Acoma Pueblo obtained by the AP in 2016 said the shield disappeared after a

In a statement Monday, Acoma Pueblo officials said the shield had been in the possession of a family for decades that did not know of its ceremonial

Jerold Collings, who court records show sent the shield to Paris for auction, said previously he had inherited it, not knowing it may have been stolen. The tribe's leaders credited Collings for agreeing to a court settlement in July that called for EVE auction house to release the shield to the U.S. Embassy in Paris.

That agreement set in motion the process for the shield to return to Acoma Pueblo, where Vallo, the governor, said it will eventually be held at a museum before it's returned to the Sky City village and re-introduced into ceremonies.

"There's no place for illegal acquisitions and sale of these items," he said. "We hope future laws ensure these items are protected and returned."

The tribe's reservation west of Albuquerque is bordered by mountains and El Malpais National Monument, where historians say Puebloan ancestors built homes amid cliffs and ancient lava fields as early as 950 A.D.

The traditional village of Sky City, situated on the mesa, dates to 1150. Its multistory adobe complexes and homes overlook an expanse of desert marked by rock monoliths.

Coahoma Bulldogs prepare for secondround playoff matchup with Canadian

When Friday night comes along, the Coahoma Bulldogs will not be intimidated by their opponent. In a season where everyone bet against them, Coahoma is currently riding a four-game win streak heading into the second round playoff matchup with the undefeated Canadian Wildcats (11-0). When these two teams meet on the football field later this week at neutral-site Plainview High School, there will be a clashing of high-powered balanced offenses and stingy defenses that will be attempting to apply pressure to their opponent and set the tone

"We're just taking it one week at a time," Bulldogs coach Chris Joslin said. "We've known for a while that this was a possibility of happening so our kids have known that for a while. It's a chance to go out there and prove a lot of people wrong. That's what our mentality has been all-year and this is the biggest time to do that. Starting the year, a lot of people didn't give us much of a chance just because of past experiences. We've answered the bell every time and so this is a chance to prove everybody

The Bulldogs are led into the fire by senior quarterback Zack Schneider, who has accounted for over half of Coahoma's yardage during his last season in the red and white. Following last week's emphatic 69-7 win over Anthony, where Schneider led his team in rushing with 80 yards on only three attempts and tossed a touchdown pass, the captain will look to maintain his solid play and extend his high school football career in the pro-

On the year, Schneider has accounted for 20 total touchdowns and has settled into his role as starting quarterback. The versatile former running back has been efficient through the air by passing for 12 touchdowns and completing just under 60.0 percent of his passes. Schneider's dual-threat ability to also be able to run the ball effectively adds another dimension to the Bulldogs offense that has been difficult for their opponents to stop all season.

"I would take Zack Schneider on any football team I've ever coached," Joslin said. "He's a football player, number one, but he's a great kid firstand-foremost. Just the work that he has put in from last year to this year is huge. He has turned himself

Coahoma is giving up 15.6 points per game to opposing offenses and will look to shut down the Wildcats potent balanced attack. On the season, Canadian has scored more than 50 points on five separate occasions and head into this Friday averaging a whopping 51.1 points per game.

On the other hand, the Bulldogs are averaging upwards of 43.0 points per game on offense, while the Wildcats are allowing their opponents to score only a measly 12.8 points per game

What does Joslin expect from this meeting of thunder and lightning?

"On paper we're pretty evenly-matched," Joslin said. "We're a little bit bigger in spots than they are, they're a little faster in some spots than we are. Sometimes bigger is better. Sometimes faster is better. We'll just see how it plays out on that night."

Canadian will look to mix up their offense by keeping a balance between run and pass plays. With a very impressive quarterback in junior Grant McCook, the Wildcats have a star dualthreat option at the most important position on the

field. McCook has racked up over 2,000 yards passing and 700 yards rushing this season while finding the end zone a combined 36 times. The signal-caller has a favorite target in quick-twitched junior wide receiver Twister Kelton, who has notched 38 receptions and six touchdowns this season.

Another star junior for Canadian, running back Hayze Hufstedler, is picking up a first-down almost every time he touches the ball. Hufstedler has already passed the century-mark in rushing yards for the year and has punished opposing defenses all year on his 24 trips into the end

In order for the Bulldogs to pull off the big upset, they will need to win the battle at the line of scrimmage and apply the squeeze to the three-headed monster of Canadian. Facing off against a team that has sacked the quarterback an astonishing 42 times, Joslin will need his offensive line to play their best game of the year.

"We need to win up front," Joslin said. "I've said that all vear and the one game all-year that we didn't play well in, we didn't win

this week. Whoever wins the line-of-scrimmage is going to win the ballgame." With both teams combining for an 20-2 record, there are sure to be both offensive and defensive

up front. If we win up front on defense and on of-

fense, we'll be successful. That will be very true

fireworks on the field this Friday night in Plain-The Bulldogs have not advanced past the Area round of the postseason since 2003 and will be looking to change that fortune this week. Coahoma has never won this many games in a season and Joslin

has his squad oozing with confidence heading into their biggest challenge they have faced so far. With the season on the line this Friday night up north, look for the Bulldogs to leave it all on the field. Looking to continue their unprecedented season, every player on the roster will need to give it everything they have. In a year where no one was expecting this from the Bulldogs, Joslin and his

team will be looking to keep surprising the state. "If you want to shock the world, you have got to come out and play in games like this."

Doncic scores 42 in triple-double, Mavs top Spurs 117-110

DALLAS (AP) — Luka Doncic grew up idolizing LeBron James, and now the young NBA prodigy has joined James in the record book.

The Dallas Mavericks needed everything Doncic delivered in a sensational performance

Monday night. Doncic scored a career-high 42 points to go with 12 assists and 11 rebounds as the Mavericks held off the skidding San Antonio Spurs 117-110. The 20-year-old second-year guard joined James as the only players in league history younger than 21 to have a 40-point triple-

"It feels like every day there are stats you don't know about, stats that you read about," Doncic said. "It's great to hit."

Dallas led wire to wire but had to fend off a late Spurs rally, with Doncic hitting a 3-pointer with 26.5 seconds to play that put Dallas up 115-110 after the Spurs had rallied from 14 down at the start of the quarter.

Doncic has an NBA-leading six triple-doubles in just 13 games this season.

"This guy can do anything he wants to on a basketball court," Mavericks coach Rick Carlisle said. "He's having one of those magical runs right now. It's a phenomenal thing to watch. It's a phenomenal thing to be a part of."

Dallas also got a career-high 22 points from Dorian Finney-Smith, and Kristaps Porzingis

added 18 points and 10 rebounds. The Spurs have lost six in a row, their longest slide since 2011, and dropped eight of nine since a 4-1 start. They're off to their worst start since 1996-97, the season before they drafted former star and current assistant coach Tim Duncan.

DeMar DeRozan scored a season-high 36 points for the Spurs, helping to lead a fourthquarter surge after they trailed 93-79 entering the period.

"When adversity hits you can't run from it, you can't shy away from it, you can't let it get you down," DeRozan said. "Try to channel that energy and put it in the right place so we can understand why we got beat."

KEY SEQUENCE

With Dallas up 110-107, both Bryn Forbes and Patty Mills missed potential game-tying 3s. On the ensuing possession, Porzingis lost the ball going up to shoot but Finney-Smith scooped it up and fired an off-balance 20-footer as the shot clock expired. It fell through to put Dallas up five.

"I looked at the clock, and it just bounced right to me and I threw it up," Finney-Smith said. "Exactly like we drew it up."

After Rudy Gay's 3 brought the Spurs back within two, Doncic stepped back and hit the 3 that finally finished off San Antonio.

FINNEY-SMITH EMERGES

Finney-Smith shot 8 for 10 from the field, including three 3s. All the more impressive was that the fourth-year wing, who has built a reputation with his defense, had his career game while also drawing a tough assignment in DeRozan. "I think I owe (Carlisle) some money because I said I wouldn't go for his pump fake, and he

got me one time," Finney-Smith said.

Spurs: Coach Gregg Popovich talked about Duncan, in his first season as an assistant coach: 'His mere presence is valuable. When a young kid has Tim Duncan put his arm around them and guide them in a certain way, give them a piece of advice, that's way more important than what I can do."

Mavericks: This was their first matchup with the Spurs since the retirement of Dirk Nowitzki, who played against the Spurs 78 times in the regular season.

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





Rebuilding After Betrayal

Dear Annie: I read "Dear Annie" now, just as I read "Ask Ann Landers" and "Dear Abby" starting in the 1950s. I hope you can give me some advice.

My husband, "Fred," and I have been married for 58 years. We met when we were both working in Washington. D.C. We were 18 years old. We dated for 3 1/2 years. Reader: You sound like a remarkable and very strong woman. My advice is that you make the decision NOT to make a decision at this time. Instead, focus on yourself and making you -- and only you -- happy, whatever that might mean. Go to your church, visit your children and grandchildren. At some point, you will realize that your husband had a very troubled upbringing, which contributed to his acting out. This does not excuse his behavior, but hopefully, the realization will give you some peace of mind. Remember that his actions had nothing to do with you or how much he loved you but rather with how little he loved himself.





On Nov. 19, 1969, Apollo 12 astronauts Charles Conrad and Alan Bean made the second manned landing on the moon. On this date: In 1863, President Abraham

Lincoln dedicated a national cemetery at the site of the Civil War battlefield of Gettysburg in Pennsylvania. In 1915, labor activist Joe Hill

and three girls. In 2006, British authorities said they were investigating the apparent poisoning of Alexander Litvinenko (leet-vee-NYEHN'koh), a former KGB agent who had been critical of the Russian government (Litvinenko died

in London four days later of polonium poisoning). In 2017, Charles Manson, the hippie cult leader behind the gruesome murders of actress Sharon Tate and six others in Los Angeles in 1969, died in a California hospital at the age of 83 after nearly a half-century in

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama wrapped up his weeklong Asia trip in South Korea, where he said the United States had begun talking with

allies about fresh punishment against Iran for defying efforts to halt its nuclear weapons pursuits. President Hamid Karzai (HAH'-mihd KAHR'-zeve) pledged to get tough on corruption and strengthen security in Afghanistan as he started a second five-year term. Artist Jeanne-Claude, who helped create various "wrapping" projects with her husband Christo, died in New York at age 74.

Five years ago: Defying Congress, President Barack Obama ordered sweeping changes in U.S. immigration policy possibly affecting as many as 5 million living illegally in the country. Film and theater director Mike Nichols, 83, died in New

One year ago: A federal judge in San Francisco temporarily barred the Trump administration from refusing asylum to immigrants who cross the southern border illegally. Nissan said the company's chairman, Carlos Ghosn (gohn), had been arrested for allegedly underreporting his income and misusing company funds. The Trump administration dropped its effort to bar CNN reporter Jim Acosta from the White House, but said he could have his credentials pulled again if he didn't follow guidelines governing the behavior of journalists. For the first time in NFL history, each team scored more than 50 points as the Los Angeles Rams outlasted the Kansas City Chiefs, 54-51; the game featured 14 touchdowns, included three by defensive play-



Harden, Westbrook help Rockets rout Trail Blazers 132-108

HOUSTON (AP) — James Harden has been scoring at such a prolific rate this season that his 36-point effort in Houston's rout of Portland on Monday night actually caused his average to dip.

"For him he had a subpar night," Portland coach Terry Stotts said with a

Russell Westbrook added 28 points and a triple-double to help the Rockets to their eighth straight win, 132-108.

Harden, who has scored at least 30 points in eight straight games, had six rebounds, five assists and a steal. He leads the NBA by averaging a career-high 39.2 points this season. The second-highest scorer in the league is Milwaukee's Giannis Antetokounmpo, who is well behind Harden at 30.3 points a game.

"I think that a lot of people like to normalize greatness when you see it over and over again," Westbrook said. "But it's not normal because there's no one else that can do it. If it was normal everybody would do it. He's put himself in a position to one of the best ... scorers of all time."

Westbrook had 13 rebounds and 10 assists for his third triple-double of the season and the 141st of his career after sitting out to rest in Houston's last game on Saturday night.

Coach Mike D'Antoni loved the way Harden and Westbrook worked together on Monday night.

"You've got a dose of (Westbrook's) athleticism coming at you and they've got to get back and get a wall and then ... it didn't quite go and get it back to James and just let him do what James does," D'Antoni said. "It's a pretty good 1-2 punch, that's for sure."

The Rockets led by double digits for most of this one on a night they got starters Clint Capela and Danuel House back after both players had missed time

Houston was up by 18 with about five minutes left when Harden made a 3-pointer to make it 120-99. Westbrook collected his 10th assist when Harden made a layup with about 3 1/2 minutes left for Houston's next points and the pair along with P.J. Tucker headed to the bench for good after that.

CJ McCollum led the Trail Blazers with 25 points in a game where Damian

Lillard shot just 4 of 15 and had 13 points.

Stotts was unhappy that his team had more rebounds overall than Houston but had just 12 offensive rebounds to 17 by the Rockets.

"The thing that was probably the most disappointing was their offensive rebounding and how they converted their offensive rebounding into points," he said. "I thought that was the difference in the first half."

Houston led by 23 points entering the fourth quarter after scoring 35 points in a big third quarter. The Trail Blazers cut it to 102-85 with about 9 minutes to go but Westbrook had the next three points to pad the lead.

The Trail Blazers cut the lead to 11 with a 3-pointer by McCollum with about 8 1/2 minutes left in the third quarter. The Rockets then used a 19-6 run to make it 94-70 with about 2 1/2 minutes left in the period. Harden had six points in that stretch and Tucker made a 3-pointer and added five points.

The Rockets were up by 14 at halftime after a 15-point second quarter from

Capela added a season-high 22 points and had 20 rebounds to become the first Rocket to have at least 20 rebounds in four straight games since Hall of Famer Elvin Hayes in 1971. Hayes sat courtside with fellow Hall of Famer Hakeem Olajuwon to witness Capela's big game.

"I talked to him a little bit after the game and he congratulated me," Capela said. "So I'm just proud and hopefully I can keep going."

Texas went from Big 12 favorite to 4 losses again

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas began the 2019 season right where Longhorns fans always expect them to be: ranked in the top 10 and ready for a run at the Big 12 title, maybe even the College Football Playoff.

But now that it's mid-November, Texas is right back where it has usually been the last decade: saddled with four losses and the head coach facing questions about what went wrong.

Last week's 23-21 loss at Iowa State sent Texas to its 10th consecutive season with at least four losses, a run of mediocrity unprecedented in program history. The Longhorns (6-4, 4-3) head into Saturday a matchup at No. 13 Baylor (9-1, 6-1) in what could have been a de facto playoff for a berth in the Big 12 title

"Their season has been eerily similar to ours," Herman said Monday, "other than they've been able to win those close ones."

But wins and losses are the point. And Baylor didn't start the season as a favorite to win the Big 12. That was supposed to be Texas.

Both programs have third-year head coaches. Baylor was 1-11 under Matt Rhule in 2017 then qualified for a bowl game last season. The Bears started this season unranked before ripping off nine straight wins and are still in control

of their own destiny for a spot in the Big 12 title

Herman's first season in 2017 got Texas back to a bowl game after a twoyear drought. Last season saw Texas return to the Big 12 title game and cap the year with an impressive Sugar Bowl win over Georgia.

That success set up expectations that Herman's third season had the potential to be a special. It hasn't gone that way.

Herman, who faced backlash over late-game play calling in the loss at Iowa State, acknowledged Monday that Texas fans are upset about what could have been. The Longhorns haven't been relevant in the national championship picture since 2009.

"They have every right to be," Herman said. "We have not played to our

level of expectations. If you are a fan of us, you have similar expectations." Even some of Texas' wins have been shaky. Texas needed a last-play field

goal to beat Kansas at home. The Longhorns needed another game-winning kick to beat Kansas State after surrendering a 10-point lead in the fourth quar-

"I knew we had a difficult schedule. I knew we had a lot of inexperience defensively, especially when the rash of injuries hit early," Herman said. "I'm disappointed we couldn't overcome those things better."

Texas lost to No. 1 LSU in the second game, but the Tigers were the only unfamiliar opponent on the schedule. The Longhorns got to avoid typically tough trips to Kansas State and Oklahoma State this season and got two wins at home, but lost at TCU and Iowa State.

The final two games on the schedule become a matter of pride, Herman said. And to start looking ahead to 2020.

"We've still got a bunch of seniors in that locker room who have bled, sweat and cried for the program," Herman said. "We owe it to them to try to correct the mistakes that were made and do our best.'



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
